Ambulance Fund Sets Record; New Vehicle to Arrive Jan. 15

Responding to an appeal for funds to buy a new ambulance made some weeks ago by the Rescue Squad of the Delmar Fire Department, Tri-Villagers have dug into their pockets with such quick generosity that thousands of dollars have poured in and —

- 1. The Ambulance Fund will end on Jan. 11.
- Our community has set a new record for moneyraising.
- A brand-new, ultra-modern ambulance has been ordered and will arrive at the Fire Hall on Jan. 15!

"We're absolutely amazed," said a jubilant member of the Department. "We had hoped to be able to replace the wrecked ambulance, but honestly, we

never dreamed it would be so soon. We were afraid it would take months and months. Please tell your readers how grateful we are to everyone."

The new ambulance will be on display at the Delmar Fire Hall on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, Jan. 16 and 17, 1-5 P.M. Uniformed members of the volunteer Rescue Squad will be on hand to explain their lifesaving techniques and to demonstrate the scores of advantages in design and construction of the new vehicle (which will go into service soon after its official welcome).

Asked for some specific instances of assistance, the Department spokesman told us of the Stratton Place carolers who







The Delmar "Village Four" have scored an impressive triumph at the Albany Institute of History and Art.

Despite slippery driving, competition with the Globe Trotters and Althea Gibson's exhibition tennis, and an opening date very close to Christmas, more than a hundred guests slipped and slid into the Institute to attend the opening reception last week and to view the 28 paintings of the 4 artists.

Marking their first big exhibit together, these artists; Edwin W. Becker, Harold Laynor, Clover Mikol and Joseph Todak; have moved rapidly in their purpose to establish a recognized group to further art in this community.

Considered a "particularly well balanced show" by Janet MacFarlane, director of the Institute, the exhibit shows four distinct yet facile styles.
