Clover Mikol, one of the motivating forces behind the Library's art shows, has at last hung her own works there.

Mrs. Mikol and Mrs. Barbara Rau had the idea for these shows three years ago and have persistently encouraged local artists to exhibit.

Water colors, oils and illumi-

nated manuscripts make up the varied show at the Library, Mrs. Mikol's paintings have been seen in the area far more than have her illuminated manuscripts. This work is an art almost lost in this world where typewriter and printing press hold sway. However, wherever an illuminator still works, the

demand for tributes, testimonials and messages of appreciation is constant. The individual quality of the lettering, the personal relationship which the pictures, symbols and decorations can add still outdoes the many mechanical machines of our times.

"God Bless You" loaned by Mrs. Kenneth Johnson of Syracuse and "Corinthians" loaned by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Pellman of Albany, are both excellent examples of this dying art. Symbols of buds, seeds and flowers indicating development may be seen in both examples; in fact Corinthians is developed entirely around growing things.

The late Peter Sharpe, one of New York's famed illuminators, assisted Mrs. Mikol in many ways in the development of her art. He left her many of his tools which she highly prizes and also gave her a book "1001 Initialed Letters" printed in 1864 by Day and Son, Lithographers to the Queen. Mrs. Mikol believes it is possibly the only copy in America.

Clover Mikol's contribution to art wherever she is has always been enthusiastic - she works at it from all directions - from helping to develop outlets and exhibitions for artists, to teaching and to painting. She does it with her sleeves rolled up ready for action.

A number of the paintings at the Library come directly from the exhibit last month of "The Village Four" at the Albany In-

stitute. In addition to these and the illuminated manuscripts is a charcoal "Portrait of an Actor in Character." 

DELMAR KIW ANIS SPONSORS 4-H CHICK REARING PROJECT

Since 1955, the Agriculture and Conservation Committee of the Delmar Kiwanis Club has sponsored a 4-H Chick Rearing project. The purpose is to encourage and recognize agricultural achievements of 4-H members by helping them to carry on a worthwhile poultry raising experience. The project is open to boys or girls between the ages of 8 and 18 who live in the Bethlehem Central School district or in adjoining areas of the Ravena - Coeymans - Selkirk district.

Each boy or girl enrolling in

the project is given 50 straightrun baby chicks of a well-bred strain late in March. This year they may be either White Plymouth Rocks or New Hampshires. These birds are brooded and reared for the following 6 months and in September, two male birds are dressed as roasters and returned to the Delmar Kiwanis Club. Later these roasters are auctioned off to Kiwanis Club members to help finance the project. At this same time the boys and girls who have completed the project are the guests of the Kiwanis at dinner
