



BCHS STUDENTS LEAD COUNTY IN WINNING REGENTS SCHOLARSHIPS

Merchants of the Tri-Village have donated many prizes and some of the refreshments for the event.

In an outstanding demonstration of excellence, Bethlehem Central Senior High School students won 28 of the 103 Regents Scholarships offered in Albany County, An additional 11 were named alternates.

Some 55,000 high school seniors from about 1,200 schools took the competitive examinations last Oct. 14.

The senior class at BCHS represents approximately 7.5% of all seniors in Albany County. They won 27.2% of the scholarships. Last year, with 8% of the senior class population, they won 22 of the 88 scholarships offered, or 25%.

BCHS placed 3 in the County's top 5 scores. Valerie Lowe was first, with 264; Allan Groves was fourth, with 254; Richard Cease was fifth, with 252.

Other schools in the County ranking near the top in number of winners were:

Albany High School with 18. Vincentian Institute with 12 Shaker High School with 9.

Five BCHS students won scholarships for Education in Engineering, Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics and one was named as an alternate. Another was named alternate for Basic Professional Education in Nursing.


BLANCHARD POST PLANS ANNUAL MASQUERADE PARTY ON FEB. 27



Plans for taking part in National 4-H Week, March 5-12, will be made at the next meeting.



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
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
