
If past performances are any criterion, this will be a most enjoyable occasion. The quality of the music is extremely high and audiences are increasingly appreciative.



decision which may be a false economy.

The high quality of education offered in the Bethlehem schools should be a source of great pride to us all. But this should not make us smug.

The Board of Education argues that Bethlehem teachers' salaries "are comparable to those paid in like districts." We should aim higher than being a "like" district. In fact, if we were a "like" district, the number of scholarships won by Bethlehem students would have been many fewer than they were in recent competition.

As taxpayers we are concerned with the most effective use of tax dollars. Every time a teacher leaves for a more lucrative position in another district. we incur considerable expense in recruiting and training a new (continued on next page)



teacher. In addition, the morale and enthusiasm of teachers is probably the most important single factor in high quality education. A high level of compensation is, of course, only one element in motivating teachers, but we can achieve a tremendous advantage by keeping teachers' salaries higher than those in "like" districts.

Industrial wages and governmental salaries have been moving upward with the higher cost of living. It is important that teachers' salaries should not lag behind. With greater demands for better education in a rapid-
