He and Mrs. Smith and their son live at 51 Kimberly Road, Delmar.





clean up our yard, instead of rushing off to help put out a fire in another yard! It doesn't ever happen, because the season of the careless "could be avoided" fire is here again.

Each year when the tree buds begin to swell, and while the grass is stil dead and dry, the fire horns in Delmar, Slingerlands and Elsmere are seldom quiet. While not all of these "grass fires" are unavoidable, a very large percentage is due to carelessness. One of the most avoidable is the "incinerator" fire. Too many people place the incinerator in the rear of the yard, in the tall, dry grass. Perhaps thinking that because it rained vesterday, it is quite safe to burn papers today, thus making an emergency. So you throw a match on the contents of a wastebasket, and because there is still a chill in the air, rush back to the warmth of your home, Suddenly a small breeze springs into action, lifting the papers from the basket and into the dry grass. By the time you smell smoke, the grass is ablaze. Too late now to do anything but call the firemen. And these men come! They may have been in church, if it is Sunday, or working in their yards, or just taking it easy on a day off from work. They stop what they are doing and rush to your aid.

the match was put to the papers? Did you think to hook a hose to an outside faucet for an emergency? Did you think to cut the weeds around the incinerator last Fall, or even to burn them off while there was still a little snow around for safety? No, you just didn't think! You did think of the Fire Company for protection, though. Well, how about some self protection by taking precautions at this time of the year?



This is the way it should be for a clean healthy community, and most people stay with a pile of burning leaves and take some safety precautions. It is the "incinerator" fire and those set by children which are so avoidable and so very unnecessary. Year after year it seems to be the same streets where these fires occur. A fireman can usually tell where a careless fire might occur by looking at the place where the incinerator is kept. Our days have been so windy lately, it is hard to believe anyone would be anything but extremely cautious when burning. But instead of cautious, too many are careless! Slingerlands had an incinerator fire last Sunday, Delmar and Elsmere had two or three during the week when most firemen are at work. This is a very dangerous situation, since it takes a large crew of men to cope with a runaway grass fire. For your own and your neighbors' safety, the firemen would rather a fire be prevented than to be called on to extinguish one!

These careless fires can be stopped if everyone will think twice before burning anything. Let's save the energy and knowledge of our firemen, and the expense of running a fire truck, for the real emergencies that are truly unavoidable. Be prepared for grass fires by taking safety measures before striking that match!



Beware of writing directly on the back of the photo. Chances are, the pressure of your pen - ball-points are murder! - or pencil will make weird marks through the emulsion on the face of the print... and these will be picked up by the printer's camera. Makes a bride look like The Tattooed Lady.

Speaking of the printer's camera, every now and then we get an interesting picture that's too faint - too much dull grey; not enough contrasty black - and white — to reproduce properly. Polaroid shots are the worst offenders. If it's grey when we get it, you may be sure it'll be a sad, wan sight when it's printed.

By the way, if you're taking the publicity photo yourself, try to stay up close to your subject; distance shots of people won't reproduce well. Size? We prefer 8x10's.

If you want the photo returned, be sure to say so. It'll be back from the printer's about a week after it's used and you can pick it up at our Four Corners office.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT ON DANGER TO CHILDREN

The New York State Motor Vehicle law states that it is illegal for any vehicle to pass a school bus, from either direction, that has stopped to pick up or discharge passengers.

The fact that cars do pass the school buses quite often, when the bus is stopped, and the roof lights are flashing, presents the bus drivers with a very dangerous problem. The school bus driver has in his care, during the day, students from 4 to 18 years of age. The students are given safety instructions in the class room, and also have bus safety drills. The bus drivers attend safety meetings and are always on the alert for unsafe traffic conditions. The school bus is equipped with mirrors for both front and rear visibility. signal lights, flashing roof lights, to indicate that the bus is stopped to load or unload students. There are indicator lights inside the bus, in view of the driver, to tell that the outside lights are operating. The bus is painted yellow for easy identification, but still quite often a car or truck will pass the bus illegally.

Many phone calls have been received at the Transportation Office, from operators of vehicles, saying that they had just passed a stopped school bus, and how sorry they were. How fortunate for all concerned that a child was not crossing the street at that instant.

The Bethelehem Central School buses are on the streets and roads of the district from 6:45 A.M. to 6:15 P.M., and we in transportation, hope that motorists will help us to protect the lives of the children.
