Something different has appeared this year in the wake of the fragrant apple and pear blossoms at Will-Roy Orchards. Blended among the fruit trees and the stately oaks are the new buildings of Tall Timber Day Camp, ready for boys and girls four to 14 years old.

Director Kenneth George says that the new camp will emphasize values most closely akin to true camping; an appreciation of our natural resources and an ability to enjoy and use them. To this end, the camp's 25 acres of pleasant woodland will be used for the teaching of fascinating wood lore and nature activities under the direction of Robert Andrews who has had years of experience in scouting and camp activities.
