
Please remember that all copy must be received at *The Spotlight* office on Thursday, one full week before publication. In other words, if you'd like something to appear on the 8th of the month, we must have it no later than the 1st.

No sir, no ma'am, this isn't just a whim of ours. We have to get all our copy prepared on Thursday night so the linotypers can set it in type on Friday. They don't work on weekends, but we do. While all you lucky people are lolling in the sun, we're slaving over our hot drawing boards readying what's called a "paste-up" — a pageby-page montage of ads, news,

pictures, etc. for the offset printer's cameras on Tuesday. Obviously, if we were to accept copy later than Thursday, we'd never get anywhere.

(This "copy" we keep talking about is the graphic arts and communications industries' word for anything that's to be printed or broadcast. For instance, "advertising copy" is simply the text of an ad.)


