

A building fund appeal for the proposed new church to be erected at the parish of St. Thomas, Delmar, was inaugurated recently. The Most Reverend William A. Scully, D.D., Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany, launched the campaign when he presided at the opening ceremonies and imparted his blessings upon the 200 men workers.

The new church will be located adjacent to the Parish House and will face Adams Place. It will provide a seating capacity for approximately 900 persons. Preliminary plans are being drawn by August Lux and Associates, Albany architects. Construction will begin this spring and is expected to be completed by early spring in 1962.

In announcing the plans, Monsignor Rooney, Pastor of St. Thomas Church, remarked, "The present church, which seats 365 persons, was built in 1924 and has served the parish well for many years. With the increased number of parishioners, it became necessary to use our school auditorium for three of the 9 masses which must be celebrated each Sunday. The rapid growth made the need for a new and more commodious church necessary."

Completion of the church will be one step further in the parish building program which has already provided a school and Parish House. Construction cost

Although subject to last minute revisions, the year's total has been estimated as 63.6 bilion pieces of mail which includes about one billion pieces of parcel post. It was stated that this would mean an increase of nearly 25 per cent over the corresponding figures for 1953 when the annual volume was 50.9 billion pieces.

During the same period, it was pointed out, the revenue of the Department also has shown an impressive gain with an increase from \$2,091,714,000 in fiscal year 1953 to \$3,276,800,000 for fiscal year 1960.

Here in Delmar, receipts of the post office climbed from \$65,000 in 1953 to \$110,000 last year.
