For the fourth consecutive year, the young people of our community will combine the ancient customs of Hallowe'en with the modern idea of help to children in many troubled lands of the world. Once again, UNICEF "Trick-or-Treaters" will come to our doors for our "treat" to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund. The young collectors will wear an identifying arm band or tag to show that they are part of the nation-wide effort of American children to aid programs of disease control, improved nutrition and health services in needy areas of the world.

UNICEF collections are the newest and most unselfish holiday tradition in our land. All children and high school students in the Tri-Village are urged to join this worthy project and it is hoped that residents will contribute as generously as they have in the past three years. The Bethlehem Police Department has promised cooperation, as always, in protect-

A \$500,000 contract for reconstruction of a 1.4 mile section of Delaware Ave. (Route 43) in The Town of Bethlehem. Albany County, from a two-lane to four-lane highway will be up for bids on December 9, according to State Superintendent of Public Works J. Burch Mc-Morran.
