The contests were held at Russell Sage College in Troy, and the winners in each category will represent the Area at the Annual New York State Distributive Education Leadership contest in March.


Lisa Beckett and Sue Jenks presented campaign speeches, running for State Office.

WE'RE CONTINUING OUR HARPING on the fuel crisis because now it's obvious that the big oil companies do not love their Delmar gas stations! Did you ever see anything any more ridiculous than the shortages and station closings that were taking place along Delaware Avenue last week — and this was the 5th and 6th days of the month — long after the February allocations should have been delivered, or at least enough to tide the stations over and not cause the long lines that were evident. Those drivers who were given tickets because of illegal parking have our sympathy too. It's a damned shame when drivers are forced to sit in line by the hour in order to get to work or carry on a business. And it's adding insult to injury when one of those drivers is cited for illegal parking.


We are **not** being critical of our Police Department! We are critical of those who are responsible for the conditions that make illegal parking and all the rest a way of life!

As an example: we were unable to make our deliveries of composition to our Albany customers on Monday, Feb. 4, because it took from 9:30 A.M. until 3 P.M. to find a gas station that was open, had gas and was willing to sell us any. All three conditions were present that day in Delmar: most stations were closed; some were open but had no gas; others chose to sell selectively.

All of which brings us to a letter that came in last week's mail. An excerpt:

"I find it (the gas shortage) shocking especially since my son tells me that one of his classmates witnessed the **FILLING** of tanks of a station in Delmar that **HAS BEEN OUT OF BUSINESS FOR SEVERAL MONTHS!!** This is, as I understand it, against the law."

The letter asked us to investigate. We didn't have to be urged — we were anxious! When you want the answers, ask the man at the top. So we called the Federal Allocation Officer for this area. He was very courteous and helpful — but his answers were **not** what our writer had hoped for. He said there is no regulation prohibiting the storage of gasoline in tanks, for future use; there is no regulation that specifies that a gas station must

be operating before gas is delivered there. He suggested that it may have been a small distributor who had permission to use the tanks for extra storage capacity. There was nothing the Federal Agency could do about it.

We know the reasoning of our letter writer. She wondered why gas should be put in a closed station where it couldn't possibly do anyone any good while the motoring public went slightly nuts trying to purchase a few gallons. Well, things just don't work that way, do they?

Kim Tournquist wrote this paragraph in an editorial in a recent issue of the BCHS **Star**:

"Do not be surprised if, when the gas prices have sky rocketed, that you see many of those once boarded-up gas stations open for business; it is no miracle. The explanation is simple. As you sit in your car in shock, try to remember those freezing cold nights a while back, when you sat wrapped in blankets, newspapers, your cat, or anything else you could find that was warm, as you waited for the oil man to bring your heating fuel. Because it was on those cold and dark nights that oil companies were filling the under-ground storage tanks of their gas stations, waiting for gas prices to soar so they could un-board these stations, and watch their profits skyrocket. It seems to me, and many other Americans also, that the only shortage is the one felt by the consumer. As we freeze because of a lack of oil to heat our homes, the big oil tycoons are snuggling up to their nice warm profits."
