
FBLA Celebrates 25th Anniversary

School Budget

A school budget totaling, \$9,984,934 for 1974-75 was adopted by the Bethlehem Central Board of Education last week and will be voted upon by district residents on June 12.

The proposed budget represents an increase of \$874,554, or 9.6 per cent, over this year's budget. It will mean a tax rate increase of between \$7.70 and \$7.95 per \$1,000 assessed valuation for Town of Bethle hem residents, and an increase of between \$20.95 and \$21.25 per \$1,000 for Town of New Scotland residents. This is a percentage increase of 7 1/2% for Bethlehem residents, and 14 1/2% for New Scotland residents.

The tax rate increases cannot be more firmly projected, because of uncertainties at this time on the amount of, State Aid to be received, increased assessment totals in the two towns, and changes in equilization rates.

During the past two years, Bethlehem residents have had slight reductions in their school tax bills, while New Scotland school taxes have increased only because of equilization rate changes.

At the Board meeting held on Wed., May 8, when the proposed budget was, adopted, many district residents objected to the Middle School staff cuts reflected in the budget. They asked for information on the legal possibility of placing the money amount for, retention of those teaching positions as a separate vote on the June 12 ballot:

The Board agreed to investigate the legal requirements of such action, and scheduled a public meeting this past Monday to clarify the legal questions for anyone interested in initiating such action.

Budget Meetings Set


CINDERELLA LIBERTY







Poison Plants & Flowers Those plants and flowers which brighten your garden and home during the warm seasons also can be a source of danger to children, State health commissioner Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham warned parents today.

Dr. Ingraham said that each year there are hundreds of incidents of poisonings involving the ingestion of plants or flowers, with the majority of victims being children under' five years of age.


"Bright flowers or unusual plants often fascinate little eyes and some plants may literally look good enough to eat to a toddler." Dr. Ingraham said. "However, parents should be aware that the leaves, stems and petals of many common garden variety flowers and plants can cause severe illness or even death if ingested. For this reason, children should be cautioned to look and smell but not to touch or eat the backyard flora."

Dr. Ingraham cited the rhubarb plant as an example of

the type of health hazard that can grow in the backyard. Even though the stem and root portion is edible and is often used in pies and jams, he noted, the leafy portion of the plant if eaten, even cooked, can result in stomach pains, vomiting, convulsions and, in some cases, death.

The Commissioner observed that with the recent popularity of "back to nature" cookbooks and foods gathered in nature, plants, could also present a danger to adults. He urged those who would make an exotic dish from wild plant leaves, berries or nuts to make sure they know exactly what they've picked before eating it.

If a child should eat a plant or flower, Dr. Ingraham said, parents should contact their local Poison Control Center immediately. It is a good idea, he noted, to have the phone number of the center prominently displayed near the phone along with other emergency numbers.






