

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

An exhibit of archaeology from the Quackenbush House



In the summer of 1972, salvage work began at the "oldest extant structure in Albany, one of the few Dutch urban buildings in America"... the Quackenbush House, at the corner of Clinton Avenue and Broadway. Since then, hundreds of artifacts have been unearthed at the site. Among these are clay pipes dating from 1800-1860, pieces of plates, pitchers, and serving dishes made of Delft, Creamware, Red Slipware and White Salt-Glazed Stoneware, bottles, an axe head, flint arrowheads.

Some of these artifacts are now displayed in the lobby of National Savings Bank's downtown Albany office at 90 State Street. Color prints of paintings by De Hooch and Vermeer show ceramic items — similar material has been found at Quackenbush House — in use in Holland. There's a replica of a colonial land development map of the Albany-Rensselaer area, and a display of clay pipes and other artifacts.

Come in and spend a little time reliving Albany's beginnings.

A perfect opportunity to think especially about our country is during Constitution Week. How long has it been since most of us have read the Constitution?



A major victory for the Dolfins at the outstanding area AAU Swim Meet of the year! The 1974 Adirondack District A.A.U. Long Course Championship Meet was hosted by the Delmar Dolfin Swim Club and the Town of Bethlehem Parks and Recreation Department at the Elm Avenue Park 50 meter championship pool on Aŭgust 23-25.







New Scotland Town Park

Residents of the Town of New Scotland may soon be enjoying the benefits of their own town park facilities if the plans of Town Supervisor Steve Wallace become a reality.

According to Mr. Wallace, the town has an option to purchase a tract of approximately 60 acres facing on Swift Road and backing up on the Salem Hills section of Voorheesville which is being considered for this purpose.

The development of this area, which would extend over a period of 7-8 years, is planned eventually to include picnic areas, two ball fields, tennis courts, a swimming pool, bicycle trails and outdoor iceskating facilities during the winter months.

First priorities will be given to the development of the pic-

nic areas and one of the two proposed ball fields, with an eye towards having these ready for use by the summer of 1975.

Monies for the land acquisition are presently avadable and consideration of the overall project is being advanced by permissive referendum. The actual park development will be financed by revenue-sharing funds which the town receives from the federal government.

According to Mr. Wallace, with the development spread over a period of time and the availability of the federal revenue-sharing funds, which by law must be assigned to a specific local project, the effect on the town's tax rate would be minimal, if any.

"The way these revenue-sharing funds work, if we don't utilize them for the benefit of our township, we could eventually lose out on time altogether," Mr. Wallace stated.



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If the plan to purchase the land is successful, the Town of New Scotland would be on Its way to joining its neigh-boring Towns of Bethlehem and Guilderland in providing park and recreational accommodations for their respective residents. At this point, the town would then engage the services of a professional engineer to work on a one-shot, consulting basis in conjunction with the Town Board and the town recreation committee to obtain the maximum utility from the proposed park acreage.

Mr. Wallace commented that while the Swift Road park project will receive the attention at the present time, "hamlet" parks are being considered for other parts of the township to provide basketball and iceskating facilities for residents in those areas. He also stressed the fact that the New Scotland landfill on Flat Rock Road could eventually be developed for park purposes when its use as a landfill has been exhausted. "We'd be one leg up on that one," he said, "as the town already owns the land."

Commenting upon the total project, Mr. Wallace said that the idea of a park and recreational area for the enjoyment of Town of New Scotland residents had long been in his mind, and the possibility of accomplishing it without increasing the tax burden to the town's residents — the elderly who are living on fixed incomes and the younger people who are struggling to make ends meet in the face of present-day infla-

Dorsey Attending FBI Academy

Detective Sergeant Leo E. Dorsey of the Town of Bethlehem, Delmar, who is assigned to the Youth Division said he was never quite sure what the FBI National Academy (NA) in Quantico, Virginia, was all about, but now he knows work.

Dorsey, 34, a 12-year veteran of the department, is among 247 policemen midway through the exhaustive 12-week course of study and he is convinced that he is a better man for the work.

"The instruction is great" because the instructors (all seasoned FBI Agents) take a lot of time with you. I'm going to take a lot back to my department, there is no question about that," Dorsey said.

Organized in 1935, the NA provides in-depth training in a wide range of law enforcement related subjects. More than 8,000 of the finest policemen in this country and nations throughout the free world have successfully completed training at the NA, which is now housed in a spacious and mod-


ern complex about 40 miles south of Washington.

Assistant Director Joe David Jamieson, head of the FBI Training Division, points out that FBI Director C.M. Kelley stresses that the underlying positions and principles of the NA are to enhance a man's progress and prepare him for a role of leadership in law enforcement.

Each of the men attending the NA is exposed to courses in the management sciences, behavioral sciences, and forensic sciences as well as classwork in law, education communications arts, and law enforcement arts. A total of from 14 to 16 hrs. of undergraduate credit can be obtained througe the University of Virginia by those completing the course work. Physical fitness is emphasized and attendees participate in a rigorous physical training program.

"Just as important as the classroom work, though, is the affiliation with the other policemen," Dorsey explained. "The friendships I am making will last a lifetime and I am learn-

ing about law enforcement problems and solutions that are hard to measure in degrees of importance to my career."

When Detective Sergeant Dorsey graduates in September Se will return to his department, but the learning process will not end. The members meet at regular intervals to exchange views and information and to rekindle friendships.
