The program will begin at 7:30 and conclude at 9:30 with a coffee hour in the cafeteria.


#### **RCS School News**

On Sunday afternoon October 20 something very special happened at the Bethlehem Public Library. A sculpture by Mark Eliot Schwabe was unveiled. 


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
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#### **Petition for Playground**


