Owens-Corning Delays Start-Up

Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corporation announced recently that it is delaying the summer start-up of its new manufacturing facility in Delmar. The company cited weaknesses in the construction market as the reason for the delay.

"Construction will continue and be completed by the middle of the year," said plant manager Richard O. Webb. "We will then be ready to begin production as soon as markets improve."

The facility which will produce Fiberglas insulation for residential, commercial and industrial applications, will have one manufacturing line and employ approximately 250 people. Construction of the plant began in April, 1974.

The company said start-up plans will be under continuing re-evaluation in light of changing conditions in the overall economy.
