placement cost of the litem, but all the other expenses involved: printing of notices, postage, clerical help, etc. When you pay for a lost item. you are not buying that item, because the Library is not a store. The Library loans materials, it does not sell them.

Please be cooperative if you have lost any library materials. There are legal penalties if library materials are not returned or paid for.

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
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



THE PASSING OF A DEAR FRIEND

Now that Mr. Do is gone, many questions have been asked: Where did he come from? How long has he been a part of Little Folks?, etc. Mr. Do was the result of an idea for the Little Folks Shop in Delaware Plaza shortly after the store was opened some 18 years ago.

While on a trip to Minnesota, Mr. Warsh saw a television program originating in Minneapolis in which the star of the show was a Mynah bird named Mr. Do. He was a loveable little fellow and he talked as clear as a human. Shortly after a friend of the Warsh family was going to India and asked if he could bring anything back as a gift to the family. Jokingly a suggestion was made to arrange for an infant Mynah be sent to Little Folks in Delmar. Nothing further was ever mentioned in this regard until an

imports called the Delmar store and said that the baby Mynah had arrived. Everyone was guite shocked and really did not know what to do with him. A quick trip to the State Library gave the information that was needed as to care, treatment, diet and the other essentials for the survival of Mr. Do. Needless to say the first task was the naming and since the "good talker" on television was called Mr. Do, it was logically felt that this would be an appropriate name for the Mynah. Since they learn by repetition, the store invested in a small tape recorder and with repeat after repeat started the learning process. Unfortunately he grew to hate the machine and the repeats, so after several days we discontinued this mode of learning and for the next several weeks Mr. Warsh spent nearly every nite and Sunday with Mr. Do, trying to teach him words. This did work and with the help of many youngsters, now Mothers and Fathers themselves, Mr. Do did learn what is the maximum number of words one can expect; in the neighborhood of 98 words.

This learning process must all be accomplished under the age of 6 months, after which there is no further learning process. They did teach him to say: What's your name, my name is Mr. Do; if you like it charge it; how are you; it's fun shopping here, where is everybody, you are nice and other sundry words based upon expressions he would hear the children say to him. From that day forth, when Mr. Do arrived at Little Folks and was put in the cage high above the register where he never left the Plaza, with the exception of one time when the store manager, Mrs. Virginia Gray, took him to a Cub Scout meeting. He never said a word and it was only after, that they discovered he would talk only when perched high above the people he was "conversing with." Mr. Do was part of the Little Folks Shop and Delmar community family. Youngsters of all ages would stop in to say Hi to Mr. Do and exchange greetings of the day. His famous Wolf whistle would make heads turn and he did appreciate the attention by responding with words and whistles. Many a fresh whistle would turn a ladies' head and soon he made another friend.

Over the seventeen years he was attended with daily baths, a clean cage and a little exercise by just three people and most recently by Anthony Lassi, who game him all the love and attention any bird could want. Many times when he was undergoing his



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freshen up time, youngsters would go to the rear of the store to watch this daily ritual, and awe at the responsive way he would react to this procedure. With cage wide open he would just play in his bath with no attempt to get out, but rather just to enjoy the love and attention he was receiving. Mr. Do became a friend to youngsters from the outset of his new home in Little Folks at Delaware Plaza and now was a friend of the children whose parents were his friend when they were children. Children and parents alike were heard saying - I want to go to the store where Mr. Do lives; and in some cases remembered his name better than the name of the store in which he resided; that's how big a little attraction he was since he was less than 10 inches long. A more potent 10 inches of personality and friendship would be hard to come upon again. Mr. Do was first taken sick 13 days ago and he was removed to the veterinary hospital of Dr. Lynk. From that point on, the Little Folks Shop office, and its stores were deluged with phone calls, letters, and drop in questioners with regard to his health and whereabouts. Literally thousands of inquiries were, and still are, coming in with regard to Mr. Do. People talk of him as a very dear friend, and no one ignores the empty space where Mr. Do lived without an inquiry, and many ask about him with a tear in their eye. Mr. Do was one of the most well 6nown "people" in all of the community and missed he will be for the many hours of cheer he brought to all his friends for two generations of shoppers at the Little Folks Shop in Delaware Plaza. It is hoped that Mr. Do will have as his final resting place, the town park of Bethlehem, near the community where he has resided for these many years and near all the people who loved him as a real friend.

Scouting






