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



### Ferro Appointed Chairman




### **Memorial Parade**

# HISTORIC SLINGERLANDS — BEAUTY OR BEHEMOTH? by

(Some of the residents of Slingerlands have asked me to republish parts of articles about Slingerlands which have appeared in the Spotlight in the past. The rural village aspect of Slingerlands is suddenly threatened by a planned land development and it is their hope that after reading these historical notes you will be made aware of the heritage of the village of Slingerlands and will be aroused to protect the quality of life that is today found there.)

An early Dutch settler named Teunis Slingerland came to America and circa 1665 purchased a vast tract of land in south western Albany County. He and his descendents prospered and in due time some came to purchase farms in the area that was called "Normanskill" in the Town of Bethle-


hem. They were such successful and enterprising men that in 1852 the name of the area was changed to Slingerlands in honor of this family. They were large landowners and several of their homes are still being lived in and some of their descendents are among the village residents.

The particular area known as "Font Grove," came in to being over 100 years ago, when Col. James Hendrick, lawyer, director of the D and H railroad, president of several other Albany corporations, owner of a large insurance company, started acquiring lands from his father-in-law, James B. Wands, Dr. Albertis Becker and Abram Oliver. This property ran from the lower railroad crossing on Font Grove Road and fanned out to include this side north of the present Mayfair development, then along New Scotland Road as far west as the present "Heavenly Inn" restaurant, It also included over 70 acres in the vicinity of where Heldervale is now located. It extended north to the old Bender Melon farm across the D and H tracks to Upper Font Grove Road.

Col. Hendrick made this vast acreage into a country estate filled with the advantage of a by-gone era of leisurely living. He built a manor house for his own family and had extensive barns and outbuildings to house the pure bred cattle and the pro-

duce of the extensive orchards. Several other homes were also budt as summer cottages for his friends from the city. Some of these are still standing along Font Grove Road and have been turned into comfortable year round homes, as hive the four cottages on Ridge Road, which were built around 1905. The manor house has burned, but just north of the railroad tracks on Font Grove Road lies "Edgewood", originally built for the daughter of the Colonel, Mrs. Charles T. Terry. Her husband was a professor at Columbia University and for many years this was their vacation residence; it has lately been occupied by Dr. and Mrs. Irwin Conroe. The brick colonial on New Scotland Road, now the home of the Brewsters, was the Wands family home in the 1860s.

The Albany, Rensselaerville and Schoharie Plank Road was constructed in 1859 and runs through Slingerlands today on much of the original path. Astride the plank road stood the toll gate, located where the D and H underpass is now. This was an actual wooden building with gate, to bar the way of those who would skip the toll. and the place where the toll was collected from the users of the highway. John I. Slingerland was one of the original directors of this turnpike and he was grandfather of C. H. Sling-



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


erland who operated the printing company in later years. This old printing company building has been turned into apartments.

In 1902 William Henry Slingerland, a civil engineer and surveyor, organized the Suburban Water Co., and supplied water to the village of Slingerlands. He lived in the big white house directly behind Sanders gas station. This water came from a spring in the Helderbergs above New Salem and flowed by gravity to a reservoir, and from thence to Slingerlands. There was low pressure in many places and individual pumps had to be installed, especially if a house stood on a hill. In 1927 this water line was sold to the Town of Bethlehem and the Suburban Water Co. was purchased from the Slingerland estate.

William Henry certainly had a ready market for the water he provided for his family, as at that time nearly every home in the village of Slingerlands was occupied by a Slingerland family or their immediate relatives. John I lived in the present Zimmerman house, probably the oldest house still standing in the village, and C. H. Slingerland, who owned the printing company lived at the end of Mullens Road. The brick house now owned by the Ouderkirks near the railroad overpass was the Shady Lawn Hotel and Leah Slingerland Haswell and her father, Albert I. Slingerland, built the five Victorian style homes along Kenwood Avenue. Albert I. was also responsible for the building of the Slingerlands Community Church. In 1872 the Methodists had a chapel near the Sporthaven Lanes in Delmar. A dispute arose and one section bought land from the Adams family and built the present Delmar Methodist Church, The other faction tore down the old chapel and used the building materials for the new church and parsonage in Slingerlands. The Dr. Kiley, Dr. Guest and Dudley Mattice homestead at 1580 New Scotland Road were also Slingerland properties.

Colonel Hendrick had developed a series of large greenhouses in which to raise the flowers and plants for his estate. Frederick Goldring had come to America from England and decided to try his hand at business, so he rented the greenhouses in 1900. Here

were grown all sorts of flowers and garden plants, the business prospering until Mr. Goldring eventually bought the greenhouses for himself. The day of the small commercial flower grower is fast coming to an end and the greenhouses were torn down last year, but the Goldring family will be remembered for many years for the beauty their flowers brought in to so many lives.

If you drive down Font Grove Road today you can still see the tall evergreen trees which Colonel Hendrick planted to outline the boundaries of his estate. The homes in Slingerlands still have comfortable sized lots and there are vistas of open fields and woodlands, with the sight of the Helderbergs rising blue on the horizon. Slingerlands is one of the last vestiges left in our Town that is reminiscent of country village life of the last century. Will we be content to cover all the green fields of our town with standardized, pseudocolonials, or will taste and individuality be allowed expression in the future development of the Town of Bethlehem?



# **How To House Your Plants**

Whether a friend has just given you a single tomato in a pot or you have a whole indoor garden of potted primroses, ferns, chrysanthemums, or chives, the time is bound to arrive when you zero in on how to house your pet plants.

What kind of container should you choose? Elegant china? Tough redwood? Glazed oriental pottery? Woven baskets, plastic or wire? A cast-iron jardiniere? Or unglazed clay?

To decide what containers to use to showcase your plants, consider some down-to-earth information from House Plants Indoors/Outdoors, a new Ortho garden book.

Among pot materials, the old-fashioned unglazed clay ranks highest among the experts. As the book points out, "these classic, time-honored containers are hard to beat." Clay pots help the plant water evaporates through the sides and helps the roots stay cooler. Clay pots usually range in size from 2 to 18 inches in diameter—and all have a drainage hole.

For people with indoor plants, especially, containers


of glazed pottery have a lot of appeal. These containers come either with or without a drainage hole. If you want the esthetic pleasure of a decorative container and it doesn't have a drainage hole, it's best to grow the plant in a slightly smaller clay pot inside the cachepot.

Plastic pots and baskets have their virtues. The material is light-weight, less expensive than clay, and available in the same range of sizes.

You can come up with a real decorator look using all white plastic pots, but exercise care when you choose bright colors which may tend to appear garish. Plastic pots with drainage holes are preferred to those without.

Some container gardeners go for wooden boxes or planters. Redwood does especially well outdoors. It's rot-resistant, long-lasting and attractive. Be sure to check how it's put together before you select a box or planter---metal banding is often used and it's quick to rust. The book, *House Plants Indoors/Outdoors*, now available at local garden stores, offers sound advice: "The bet-

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ter way is to build, or have built, your own wooden planter boxes, sized to fit your particular needs. Don't overlook marine plywood as a relatively inexpensive material for making planters."

Like glazed pottery, baskets


offer fascinating possibilities for interior decoration. But on the practical side, all of them rot very quickly when subjected to constant moisture. So if you want to use a basket, put the plant first into a utilitarian pot and then into the basket.

Fool Mother Nature -And Help Your Garden

There are more adventures to gardening than you may think—and to succeed with raising your late crops, you may have to fool Mother Nature.

If you want to lengthen your growing season, make it cooler or warmer, wetter or drier, provide more sun or special protection from the wind, there are some tested ideas which can help you.

From the new Ortho book, Weather-Wise Gardening, now available at local garden centers, here are ingenious tips for the gardener who wants to "cheat the season:"



### **Reflective Panels**

*Problem:* You are intent on planting corn in a shaded back yard, but the sun is blocked in both morning and the afternoon.

Solution: Use panels of reflective metalized plastic, glued to plywood panels, and hinged to a wooden frame. Placed on the east and west sides of the planted area, the panels can effectively intensify solar energy and help produce food in an otherwise shady place. Panels with an adjustable angle of reflection are more efficient than simply using aluminum foil, stapled to plastic.

### **Trellis Training**

*Problem:* You want to make the most of a small amount of space, get the most out of the sun and, in turn, out of your fruit trees or vining vegetables.

Solution: Draw on the experience of European gardeners and train your fruit trees against a wall, preferably a light colored wall. From the reflected light and increased heat by the wall, fruit will ripen that will not mature in the open.

Trellis training of plants (with walls, fences or freestanding panels) helps conserve precious space. It also makes the most efficient use of light and heat. As Weather-Wise Gardening says: "The idea that you can enjoy 3 or 4 varieties of dwarf apples on a 15 foot long trellis makes good space saving sense. . . . Many gardeners are successful with standard trees for this type gardening. However, the dwarf varieties are more adaptable to trellis training." And as an added bonus, trellis training also helps expand the growing season by placing plants where there is more light and heat.
