





#### **BC School District Vote**

All residents of the Bethlehem Central School District will have the opportunity to vote on June 11 on these ballot items: 1) a proposed school budget for 1975-76, 2) a proposed Bethlehem Public Library budget for 1975-76, 3): candidates for two seats on the Bethlehem Central Board of Education, and 4) candidates for one seat on the Library Board of Trustees.

The proposed school budget, adopted by unanimous vote of the Board of Education, totals \$10,734,120, or an increase of \$650,463 over this year's budget. The budget would increase taxes for Town of Bethlehem residents by \$4.59 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, and by \$6.74 per \$1,000 for Town of New Scotland residents. these projected tax increases, 1.4 per cent is due to bond issue and 2.8 per cent is for other budget needs.

The proposed Bethlehem Public Library budget totals \$462,375, or an increase of \$45,881 over the current Library budget.

Five persons are running for the two open seats on the Board of Education. Voters will elect either Mary Anne Stringham, Robert D. Reed, or John H. Williams to one Board seat, and either Guy D. Paquin or Robert Ruckterstuhl to the other seat.

The two persons running for the open seat on the Library Board of Trustees are Florence Newell, the incumbent, and Robert E. Vines.

More detailed information on these Annual Election ballot items will be mailed to all district residents in the June issue of "Central Highlights" on June 2. That little bit extra: tipping. Here's the general pattern: bellmen: 50¢ minimum; doorman: 25¢ for calling a cab; waiters or waitresses: 15 to 20 percent of the total bill, Some services in a hotel are usually provided free, such as: ironing boards, cribs, and a wake-up call.

As for money. It's wise to carry traveler's checks, which can be redeemed even if they're stolen

Good-bye. Try to adhere to the check-out time so that your room can be prepared for the next batch of guests.






