Canoe Trips

Sharon Lee Carnahan, spring graduate of Bethlehem Central Senior High School, who will be enrolled as a freshman at Kalamazoo College in Kalamazoo, Michigan in the fall, will spend the month of August in a unique manner as a guide on Adirondack Wilderness canoe trips. Some 80 boys and girls, most of them from the Helderberg region, will trip through Adirondack Mountain streams on 7 day trips with 20-25 on each of the four, 7-day journevs.

For 7 days the teenagers will paddle canoes, tote their own belongings over portages, climb a mountain, swim, do their own cooking and sleep in tents or lean-tos in the remote and beautiful Adirondack Mountain region of Northern New York.

The trips are privately organized groups headed by James H. Carnahan of Glenmont and guided by his daughter Sharon and have been in existence in the Adirondacks and Canada since 1946.

Mr. Carnahan is the Director of Health and Safety Services for the Eastern New York Division of the American Red Cross Chapter but these trips are a private vacation plan of

his and his family and each year a large number of teenagers make the journey through the mountain streams during the month of August.

A final organizational meeting of the trippers and parents will be held at the Carnahan's home, 10 Wiggand Drive in Glenmont on Sunday afternoon, July 20 at which time transportation will be arranged and final plans will be completed for the trips.


