

INDIAN ARTISTS TO DEMONSTRATE CRAFTS

Six American Indian craftspeople will be demonstrating their crafts for four days at the 8th anniversary celebration of American Indian Treasures, 2558 Western Avenue, Guilderland. The Festival of Crafts will take place on Sept. 18 through 21, Thursday through Sunday, with all the craftspeople demonstrating from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. each day.

Participating will be Rameijio Rosetta, renowned Pueblo silversmith from Santo Domingo, New Mexico; Arlene Begay, Navajo weaver from the Four Corners area of New Mexico; Mary Adams and Margaret Torrence, nationally known Mohawk basketmakers; Richard Chrisjohn, well-known Oneida carver, and Tom Two-Arrows, Lenni-Lenape painter with a national reputation. In addition to the craftspeople, an outstanding Indian craft expert, Wayne Bailey of New Mexico, will be present to appraise old Indian items free of charge.

All of this is planned by Lillian Samuelson, manager of American Indian Treasures, as a public service to the community, in answer to the often voiced comment that people would like to see Native Americans creating their crafts. It is her hope that the community will take fll advantage of it. craftspeple will be demonstrating in a tent outside the shop, and there is no admission or obligation of any kind.

REPLACEABLE PARTS FOR PEOPLE

Thanks to modern plastics, there is now a full catalog of spare parts for the human frame that is not only remaking people's bodies, but their lives as well.

Arteries, heart valves, hand joints, toe joints, hips, chins, ears, are only a few of the artificial parts that are now available in unlimited quantities and sizes, and can be stored as easily as any other off-the-shelf medical product.

One of the important virtues of artificial implants is that they short-circuit the ethical, moral and legal dilemmas and the agonizing decisions that surround the use of human and, to a lesser extent, animal transplants. Research has already demonstrated a number of substances that the body is unlikely to reject, among them silicone elastomers, such as Silastic and Teflon, Dacron and Vitallium.

Attachable devices are available for patients who have lost features as a result

of cancer or accidents. There are a small number of crafts-



men around the country who create artificial, yet lifelike, replacements for noses, ears, cheeks, and fingers and toes. These devices are made of vinyls, various silicone elastomers, acrylics and they are sculptured, molded, custom fitted, and painted to match the patient's complexion, even including moles, freckles, hairs and pores.

Not even the brain is offlimits to today's spare-parts researchers, and the development of artificial replacements for diseased bodily components has become the fastest growing area of medical research today.

Religion and the Revolution

The story of the American Revolution is interwoven with the patriotism and courage shown by members of the colonial clergy. From the American point of view, freedom of religion, as well as political and economic rights, was clearly at stake in the revolutionary struggle.

Today, the role of religion in the American Revolution is being revived in the historic old churches of Delaware, where American religious heritage has lain dormant in the silent churchyards and shrines for the last 200 years. At the Welsh Tract Baptist Church outside Newark, the military and religious conflicts are dramatically united near the site of the only Revolutionary War engagement fought on Delaware soil.

In early September, 1777, one of the first Stars and Stripes was unfurled in land battle at Cooch's Bridge. Here Washington's troops attempted to delay the British redcoats at the creek while the Commander-in-Chief and Lafayette hurriedly assembled Continental Army units for the defense of Philadelphia.

Outnumbered, the Americans retreated along an old colonial post road and reassembled at the Welsh Tract Church. The advancing British continued their fire, and one cannon ball passed through the church.


Two centuries have witnessed few changes at this old-

est primitive Baptist church in the country. The fundamentalist religion is still preached on one Sunday each month by self-taught elders in the severely plain meeting house, where the cannon's scar remains evident in a brickedover portion of the wall.

Old Welsh Tract Church is one of 16 historic attractions on the "George Washington Country Heritage Trail," a self-guided tour of the five mid-Atlantic states, Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, and Washington, D.C., that visits sites associated with the life of the First President. A side trip to other Delaware churches—all within two hours' driving time—offers an interesting Bicentennial tour of religion in colonial America.

Nearby is New Castle, a small town which served as the capital of Delaware in the early Revolutionary War era and today retains much of its colonial charm. It is believed that William Penn stood on the present site of Immanuel Episcopal Church in 1683 to conduct the solemn "livery of seizen" ceremony, accepting "turf, twig, soyl, and water" to symbolize his taking possession of Pennsylvania and the three lower counties on the Delaware River.

Across the village green stands New Castle Presbyterian Church, its interior restored to an authentic pre-revolutionary appearance. In March of 1706, the year Benjamin Franklin was born, the Presbyterian minister from New Castle met with six others from the middle colonies to organ-







TREES IN AMERICAN HISTORY



Charter Oak.

Perhaps the most famous tree in American history, this great oak provided a hiding place for the charter of the Connecticut Colony when King James II demanded its surrender in 1687, The tree, which stood near Hartford, Conn., blew down in a gale in 1856.



Daniel Boone's "Bar" Tree. This was a beech which stood in northeastern Tennessee until 1917. Boone, probably the first man to explore the forests of the Middle Appalachians, carved this inscription on the tree: "D. Boon cilled A BAR On Tree in THE YEar 1760.



Indian Trail Tree.

To mark a trail for hunting or trading, Indians often bent young trees over and tied their tips to the ground. Frequently, these trees took root a second time, as did this one, now preserved in a park near Evanston, Ill.



Sailor's Sycamore.

As far back as 1800, sailing masters used this tree to locate their anchorage as they came into Santa Barbara, California. These drawings are part of the St. Regis Paper Company exhibit, "Man & Nature." Over half a million people have seen the art in cities where the company has packaging, paper and construction products operations. The company plants about 25 million seedlings a year, some of which may become historic trees of the future.



Dueling Oak.

In the early Creole days of New Orleans, honor was delicate, and almost-any real or fancied slight was an excuse for a duel "under the oaks." This live oak in New Orleans' City Park is a memento of that era.


Victor Carrk Head Coach



Indian Literacy Helped By New Typing Device

American Indian children, studies have shown, learn at a

faster pace if they have been given a pride in their own culture.

Newly-developed typewriter elements, which make it possible to type the related Athabascan Indian languages, will not only encourage these children but will further literacy among Indian peoples of all ages. Athabascan languages are spoken by tribes from Canada and Alaska to the U.S. Southwest.



Now text materials in Navajo, Apache and other related Indian tongues can be prepared on all IBM "Selectric" Typewriters. All that's needed is one of the newly created type elements, made up of the Roman alphabet and five special symbols, which were recently introduced by the Office Products Division of International Business Machines Corporation.

The elements are named Dine, an Athabascan word which identifies the people who belong to these related cultures. It means "the people," "ourselves," or "man."

The new typewriter elements were developed by IBM in conjunction with 'AK'E'ELCHIIGI, a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting literacy among Navajo and other Indian peoples, and to preserving their oral and written languages as important literary modes.



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Inflation 🔊 🦃 Fighting Ideas

A new plant to be built south of the border will help to fight inflation on both sides of the border.

The efficient new hydrofluoric acid plant, which will be one of the largest in the world, will make a chemical used in producing stainless steel and in removing certain deposits on steels before they are processed.

The new plant, which will be built by DuPont at Matamoros, Tamaulipas state, will supply both domestic and international markets. When it is in full production it will generate foreign sales of \$25 million annually.

DuPont, which has had operations in Mexico for 50 years, currently has investments there totalling \$216 million and employs 5,000 persons. Its investments in Mexico will increase by 25 percent over the next few years, according to Irving S.

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

"BIG" PESTS

Some of us who live in the "outer city" or suburbs near the city are not bothered too much by "big" pests in our gar-den. These are the large animals like rabbits and deer that eat the foliage of our

vegetable and flower plants.

There are several solutions to the problem. In one of the large display gardens in the East an extremely high chain link fence was put up completely surrounding the garden. It was tall enough so that deer couldn't jump over it.

Deer are a problem in the winter

Fencing can also be used for the summer problem of rabbits. The fence does not have to be as tall, but the Bill Meachem wire should go



down into the soil several inches because if a rabbit is hungry it will burrow under a fence.

Rabbit repellents are also used. I have seen some folks scattering moth balls around the perimeter of their gardens. They seem to work for a time, but unfortunately after a heavy rain the moth balls get covered with soil and lose their effectiveness.

The organic fertilizer dried blood is another repellent frequently used. But this has quite an odor that is unpleasant to some people, especially if the garden is close to the house. And, again, after a rain this loses its effectiveness and you have to apply more.

I recently heard of something that sounds as if it has possibilities. The idea, I understand, came from England. Here's what was done. A burlap bag was soaked in the wood preservative creosote. This was then dragged around the edge of the garden. The rabbits, it is claimed, came up to this "barrier" and turned away.

This may be worth trying. But remember — creosote can

damage plants. It should be kept away from the "growing" soil and applied only on the edges of the garden.

A final note about "big" pests. Moles are frequently blamed for damage to flower bulbs. The moles are innocent. It's the mice. Mice will use the convenient underground runs made by the moles to seek out the choice plant morsels. Moles feed on insects in the soil. To get rid of moles - and the plant-chewing mice eliminate the soil insects. If there is no food for them, moles will seek other feeding ground.

Dear Bill:

I'm 13 and no professional, but have a great Science teacher. You recommend aerosols like Raid House and Garden. Aren't there chemicals in aerosols that destroy the ozone laver?



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
BETHLEHEM TO KICK-OFF BICENTENNIAL FESTIVITIES

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
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
