





BETHLEHEM SMALL CLAIMS COURT

Judge Donald D. DeAngelis. Bethlehem Town Justice, announced today the establishment of a Small Claims Court for the Town of Bethlehem.

Under recently enacted Legislation small claims hearings are now authorized in Town Courts. Judge De-Angelis stated that small claims will include any claim for money up to the sum of \$500.00 which may now be brought directly in the local Town Justice Court by any resident by merely paying a \$2.00 filing fee and the cost of a registered mail "Notice of Claim" letter to the defendant.

The Judge explained that this new small claims part of

Justice Court was specifically created to provide the layman with a simplified, legal procedure where he could himself prosecute his own small claim promptly and with a minimum of expense and trouble.

Judge DeAngelis emphasized that the streamlined small claims hearings will allow a more informal, relaxed courtroom proceeding where any resident may pursue his own claim without the necessity of a lawyer, if he so desires. "The strict rules governing the admissibility of evidence are liberalized in the hearing," Judge DeAngelis noted, "so as to allow the Court to promptly hear both sides of the controversy, expeditiously determine the facts and fairly accomplish justice between the parties."

The Judge requested that anyone who desires to have a small claims hearing to simply provide the Justice Court Clerk with the necessary factual information in order to prepare a Notice of Claim and commence the lawsuit.

The Bethlehem Justice declared that the Town Court of Bethlehem will conduct a Small Claims Court for the hearing of such claims every other Monday evening throughout the year beginning at 7:00 P.M. This newly created small claims part will begin sessions on Monday, Oct. 6. All hearings will be held at the Town Court, Justice Department Building, 118 Adams Street, Delmar.

Q. My wife and I both will be 62 next year and I'd like to retire then. But my wife says we'll lose money because our benefits will be reduced, and she wants to wait until we're 65. Would we really get much less in benefits if we retire early?

A. The exact amount that your benefits will be reduced depends on the number of months you get checks before you reach 65. But even if you retire early, you'll get about the same value in total benefits over the years. You'll just receive smaller checks over a longer period of time.

Q. I get social security student benefits, and I'm transferring from the school I've been attending to a college out of State. Do I have to report this change to social security? I'll still be attending school full time.

A. Yes, you do have to report the transfer. The type of institution you attend can affect your monthly payments. You should also notify social security if you leave school, start attending on a part-time

basis, get married, or have a change in your earnings.

Q. The one thing about Medicare that's always confused me is the benefit period under hospital insurance. Just exactly what is a benefit period?

A. A benefit period begins when you are admitted to a hospital. It ends when you have been out of a hospital (or other facility primarily providing skilled nursing or rehabilitation services) for 60 days in a row. For example, suppose you have to go into a hospital. The day you are admitted is the beginning of a benefit period. When you are discharged from the hospital, you go home. The benefit period ends 60 days after the day of your discharge from the hospital. Or, if you had to go into a skilled nursing facility after your hospital stay, the benefit period would end 60 days after the day of your discharge from the skilled nursing facility.


Q. My son gave me \$50 for my birthday. I've decided to put the money in my savings account, rather than spend it. Is this \$50 considered income under supplemental security income?

A. No. Under the supplemental security income law, money that you save (accrued income) is considered a resource. As long as your total resources do not exceed \$1,500, and there have been no changes in your income or living arrangements, your supplemental security income payments will not be affected.

Q. My doctor just told me that I need an operation, and I'll probably be in the hospital for a month. Medicaid will help pay my hospital bills. Will this affect my supplemental security income payment?

A. Your payment may be reduced. Whenever a supplemental security income beneficiary is in a hospital or health facility for an entire month and Medicaid pays over half the cost of his care, his supplemental security income payment is reduced. For more information, call a social security office.

Q. My nephews have been getting social security benefits since my sister-in-law died about a year ago. According to an article I recently read, the Supreme Court has ruled that

A. He may be. Under a Supreme Court decision made in March 1975, monthly benefits can be paid to a father if he; is the widower of a woman who died while insured under social security; has not remarried; and has in his care any unmarried child under 18 (or older if disabled before 22) who is entitled to benefits. Your brother can apply for father's benefits at any social security office.

Q. My wife died 6 months ago. My daughter already gets social security checks on my late wife's work record, and I'm going to apply for father's benefits next week. If I'm eligible, how will my earnings affect our payments?

A. If you earn more than \$2,520 in a year, \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 in earnings above that amount. You can get your benefit, however, for any month in which you neither earn more than \$210 in wages nor perform substantial services in self-employment. Your earnings will affect only

They will not affect your daughter's payments.

SURRENDER OF BURGOYNE

After suffering major defeats at Princeton and Trenton, the British decided to make 1777 the year they would win the war. Their strategy was to gain control of the Hudson River Valley and thereby divide the colonies in two. General Burgoyne's army was to attack from the north, General Howe's from the south and General St. Leger's from the west.

By the fall of 1777, the plan had crumbled: St. Leger retreated north and Howe never arrived. Burgoyne was left alone to face the American army without sufficient supplies or the support of his Indian allies. Meanwhile, enthusiastic patriots had been joining the militia until it grew to three times the number of Burgoyne's force.

Ignoring the odds, Burgoyne, still moving southward, decided to attack at Saratoga. His immediate goal was Bemis Heights and the formidable defenses constructed for the patriots by the Polish engineer Thaddeus Kosciuszko. Planning on fighting a Europeanstyle battle, Burgoyne led out three columns of British and Hessians in a shoulderto-shoulder march against the American positions. American sharpshooters, responding to turkey calls from "Big Dan" Morgan of Virginia, picked off the red-

coats through the cover of a stand of trees. The American commanders, Philip Schuyler of New York, Horatio Gates of Virginia, Benjamin Lincoln of Massachusetts and Benedict Arnold of Connecticut, continued to repulse the attack in all sectors of the battle until the only course left open to the British general was retreat or surrender. While Burgoyne hesitated, the Americans cut off his line of northward retreat to Canada.

Formal surrender came on October 17 when Burgoyne rode into the American camp in full dress uniform and presented his sword to Gates: "The fortune of war, General Gates, has made me your prisoner." American artist Howard Smith took this moment as the subject for his oil painting, "Surrender of Burgoyne," part of the collection of The Continental Insurance Companies.

Saratoga proved to be the military turning point of the Revolution. It demonstrated that a large British army could be defeated in the field and convinced the patriots that they need not accept the pardon that Parliament had belatedly offered in hope of ending the war. More importantly, it influenced France to abandon its neutrality and to enter the war as America's ally-a crucial advantage for the patriots' cause.
