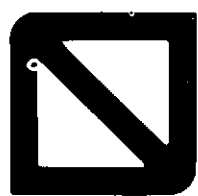

sense about noting all "Suspicious Vehicles" and preparing surreptitious dossiers for the police?

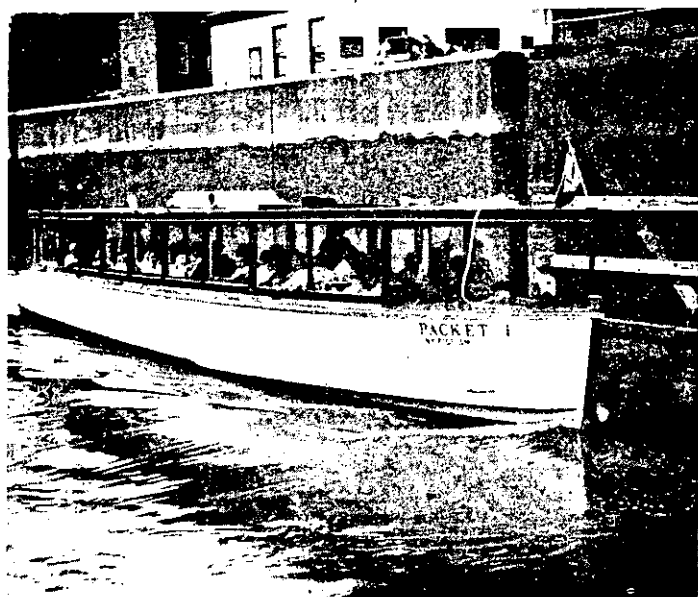
HUDSON RIVER GONNA RISE AGIN

Turgid, oil-slick, stupor, ignored and abandoned by all but freighters for years, our fantastic river is really, finally, emerging into an exciting recreational resource. Canoes, yachts, sailboats, families fishing from shore and rowboat, even swimming below New Baltimore, are becoming frequent sights. The fish are coming back. Bethlehem and Green Island have already developed riverfront parks. And prime rib dinner cruises started this year operating out of Poughkeepsie

every evening, proving so popular that they are booked 3 weeks in advance. The firm expects to expand to include cruises, charters and private parties out of Albany next spring.

We've been poking around the river for years, begging our way into Norwegian oil and Russian grain freighters for guided tours by the radio operator, who speaks English. Captain of the ship full of Volkswagens from Wolfsburg confided that he drives a Ford Falcon. Even sitting in a rowboat at our Cedar Hill Park, one gets the feeling that the entire world is just down the river.

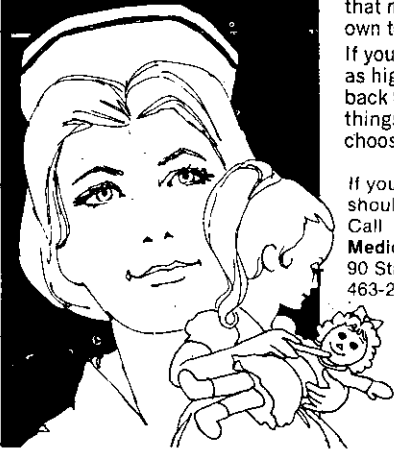

It's a great big beautiful marvelous lake that goes somewhere, and does something important in the work of the world. The "Rhineland of America" brought Henry Hudson and his followers to Albany, carried their goods, took them to visit their neighbors, and spawned the industrial revolution in America with factories manufacturing shirts, collars; brushes, linoleum, iron, steel, coke, bricks, ships, now cars, thanks to water power from the locks area and cheap transportation by water.

The Hudson-Mohawk Industrial Gateway, a non-profit educational corporation chartered by the Regents of the University of New York, is concerned with 19th century industrial buildings and sites and ongoing industries in Troy, Waterford, Cohoes, Green Island and Watervliet. This group sponsors a series of tours, open to the public at nominal fees, which included several charter cruises this year, and will sponsor many more next spring. Professor William Shuster of R.P.I. acted as cruise guide, discussing various sites along the river from an historical, environmental, engineering and archaeological viewpoint. I was fortunate enough to attend one of the cruises. My seat companions turned out to be a crane operator and his wife who had helped with much of the current construction along the river. (His daughter, an architecture major from R.P.I., gave him the trip for a birthday present.) Together, we pumped the tour boat operator for cruise information, as he leaned over our seat to hold the boat close to the edge of the lock with a "boat-hook", to keep us

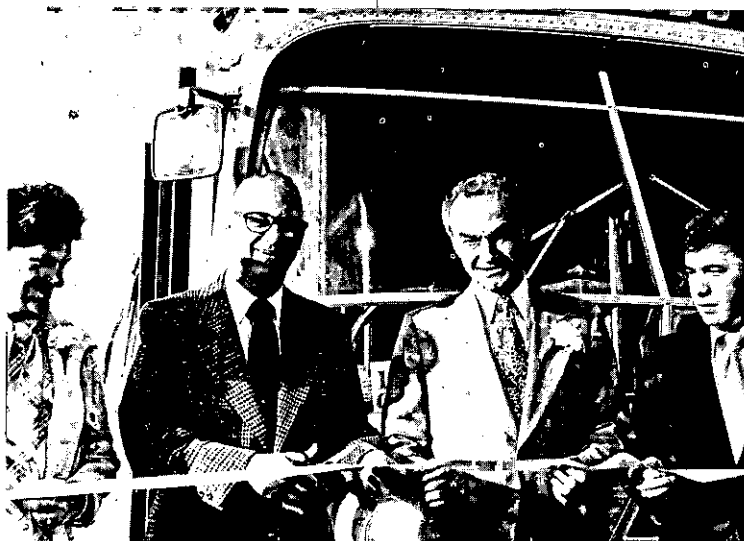

BICENTENNIAL KICK-OFF

THE KICK-OFF CAMPAIGN of Bethlehem and the Bicentennial got underway Friday, September 19, 1975. The start of the year-long observance of the American Revolution was marked with souvenir buttons, colonial costumes, flags, decorations, a stone marker, advertised specials, punch, cookies, programs and plenty of rain. But even the rain couldn't dampen the spirits of the participants and spectators who assembled at Town Hall that historic day After presenting Town Supervisor Harry Sheaffer with a Bicentennial flag and scroll, Mr. Neal Moylan addressed some brief remarks to a jam-packed audience which consisted of students and residents of the the Town of Bethlehem. Mr. Moylan, a member of the New York State Bicentennial Commission, told his audience of the importance of this area to the colonists during the American Revolution. He also indicated that the designation of the Town of Bethlehem as a "Bicentennial Community" is not easily attained. He commended the work of the Bethlehem Bicentennial Committee, an organization comprised of representatives of the various clubs and civic groups throughout the town.

The rain had tapered off by 6 P.M. that evening down at the Cedar Hill Park. The half-hour program was marked with colonial music by the Village Fife and Drum Corps, an invocation by the Rev. Charles H. Kaufuss, and the unveiling of the marker dedicating the area "Henry Hudson Park at Cedar Hill." Henry Hudson (Sgt. Pat Dorsey) greeted the audience of about 150 people who braved the weather; and yes, there was even an indian who paddled up the river in his canoe. The Indian has yet to be identified.

The Bethlehem Bicentennial Committee under the leadership of Mrs. Ruth Bickel invites your organization to participate in celebrating our nation's bicentennial. The next general membership meeting will be held MONDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1975 at 8 P.M. at the National Commercial Bank and Trust Company's Community Room — Delmar Office. Don't let this opportunity pass you by; after all, a Bicentennial only comes around once every 200 years. Hope to see you there.

A Day at the Races

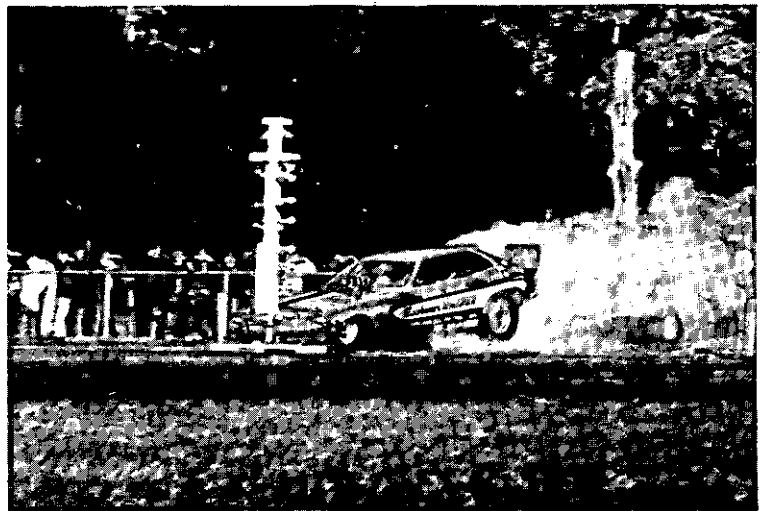
If you've never been to a funny-car show at Lebanon Valley Dragway, you're missing a real treat. Lebanon Valley Dragway is located on Rt. 20, halfway between Albany and Pittsfield, Mass. Five or six special funny-car shows are held there every summer.

On this particular Sunday, they also featured two wheel stander cars. These cars go the entire length of the 1/4 mile track on their back two wheels, using a system of brakes to steer with. They do this in a mere 8 to 10 seconds at about 130-140 mph. The two wheel standers that were there last Sunday were the world's fastest truck called the "Chuck Wagon," owned by Chuck Poole and the "Hemi Under Gear."

A funny-car is an eighteen hundred horse power car with a fiberglass body. They run the quarter-mile track in an unbelievable 6 seconds at speeds of over 200 mph. Remember that these cars are starting from a dead stop at the beginning of the 1/4 mile.

I promise you a real thrill if next year you go out to the Dragway and see one of the several funny car shows.

Regular drag racing is held every Sunday at 2:00, with time trials starting at 10:00 A.M.

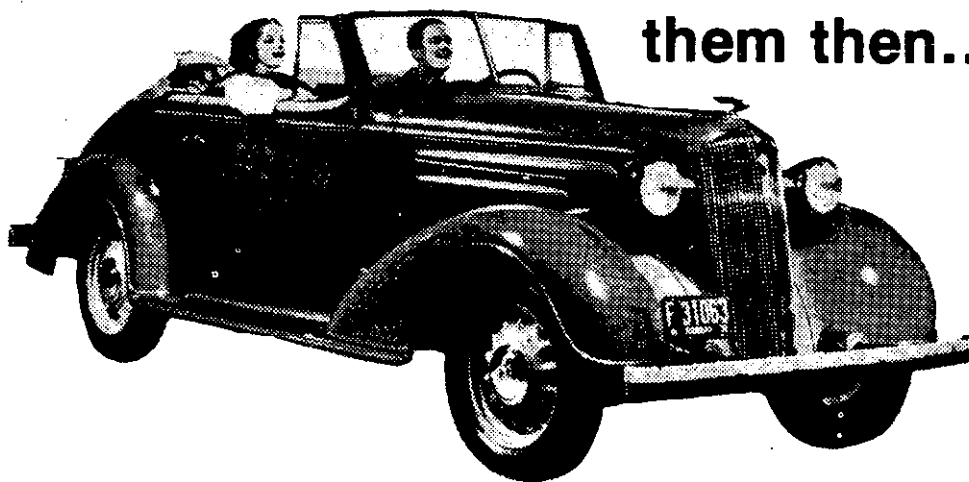

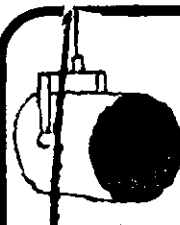
