Lutherans planning anniversary rites

The Bethlehem Lutheran Church, standing on seven acres of land at 85 Elm Ave., Delmar, has roots dating back to the tiny Delmar Lutheran Mission formed in 1933. It is in recognition of those roots and the growth that has made the church one of the largest in the community that the congregation is celebrating the 25th anniversary of the purchase of the land with a special service on Sunday.

The spiritual beginnings found in the Lutheran Mission clung tenaciously in the growing communities of Delmar, Elsmere and Slingerlands until, in May of 1953, the Atlantic District mission board sent Rev. Lawrence Heuchert from Springfield, Ill. to serve as a much-needed missionary to the area. Under his influence and with the purchase of land at the corner of Murray and Elm Aves., the Community Lutheran Church had its tangible, physical beginnings.

Sunday's celebration will bring together Rev. Heuchert and the three pastors who succeeded him in the past 25 years under the theme "Growing for Christ." The worship service at 10:30 a.m. will be followed by a reception banquet at Bartke's Restaurant in Ravena, with tickets available from the church office, 439-4328.

"Growing for Christ" is only the latest growth evidenced by the Bethlehem Lutheran Church. At the outset, members' concerns were of a less esoteric variety—building a church, furnishing the nave, and growing as a congregation. They

began worshipping in the old Delmar Library at 90 Adams Pl.

Under the pastorship of Rev. Heuchert, ground was broken for the church and the Sunday School began functioning. Superintendent Al Marshall and two teachers, Mrs. Anne Markus and Mrs. Irma Rappe, started with five students. It was also during Heuchert's pastorship that the congregation adopted the name Bethlehem Lutheran Church.

The first elected officers were Earl Pinney, president; Frank Markus, vice president; Carl Rappe, secretary; Otto Rauch, treasurer; James Michaels, financial secretary, and Alton

Marshall, elder. Within a year of their installment, Wanda Herbert established the Ladies Aid.

Women in the congregation soon took an active role. By 1958, changes were rocking the church, with Rev. Heuchert leaving after a fruitful two years' service and Rev. Harold W. Sheibert replacing him. The Ladies Aid merged with the Alter Guild to become the present-day Ladies Guild. In other changes, the church council was increased in size from six to 11 members—all male. This, too, was soon to change.

In 1963 the church became fully self-supporting and one of

its first actions of independence was to extend the right to vote on congregational matters to women. The congregation continued to grow under the new leadership of Rev. Sheibert until there were over 470 members.

In January, 1965 Pastor Sheibert moved on to fill a vacancy in Massachusetts and Rev. Paul H. Gassmann replaced him. The next 11 years saw physical growth in the form of a new parsonage and larger congregations, but they also saw the emergence of "Growing for Christ" as the emphasis shifted from building to learning more about the religion and faith that brought

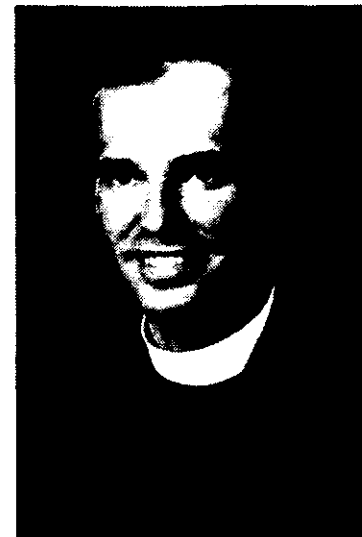

them together. Church services were consolidated to one service at 10:30 a.m. and a new constitution was approved granting women the right to serve on the church council as trustees. Then, in 1976, events came together to disturb the growth.

Just as Rev. Gassman announced his retirement, the entire Lutheran Church was embroiled in a schism between the older Missouri Synod and the newer Assn. of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, and Bethlehem Lutheran Church was forced to take a side. The members eventually chose to remain with the synod, though this decision cost them 30 families who strongly favored the AELC. Then, a replacement was found in Rev. Warren Winterhoff in 1977. Under

his firm leadership, the church has reaffirmed its strong Christian programs—social ministry, evangelism and missions.

NEW SCOTLAND Court setback blow to zoning

A Clarksville businessman has won a second case against the town of New Scotland that town officials say threatens the fabric of their zoning ordinance.

An appeal of a 1979 ruling by Judge Roger J. Miner in State Supreme Court clearing the way for a used car sales lot on Rt. 85 adjacent to an upper-income Slingerlands residential area was struck down last week by the Appellate Division.

Denial of the appeal requires the town to issue a building permit to Alfred Cook, who purchased the property formerly occupied by a tavern known as Cookie Osterhout's Checkered Flag. The burned shell of the frame structure has been an eyesore in the area for a number of years. Cook had the vacant structure knocked down last week after obtaining a demolition permit.

In the wake of the latest ruling, Walter Miller, New Scotland building inspector, said he would issue Cook a building permit for the used car business as soon as Cook has obtained the required approval of Albany County health authorities.

"We've done all we could," said Miller. "We were in court and we lost. There's nothing more we can do."

Cook's property is in a section zoned B-1 that permits "light business" including retail stores, offices and other uses. The litigation stemmed from the town's original action in serving Cook with a notice of violation after the owner had

started to develop his property without applying for a permit. In the town's interpretation of "light business," Cook's proposed operation did not qualify.

At a public hearing, a number of Slingerlands residents voiced vigorous objections to Cook's plans for an auto sales and service operation in a neighborhood close to residences and light businesses such as a nursery and restaurant. Cook subsequently argued he did not need a special use permit on the ground he would be selling cars without a service facility.

BETHLEHEM

Board ponders ban on hunting

Most of the spectators at last week's special meeting of the Bethlehem town board had come to voice encouragement for the planned sewer extension into North Bethlehem, but several had equally strong views on another item on the agenda: the opening of the southern portion of the town to deer hunting with shotguns. Both items were tabled for further study.

Councilman Edward Mock-er had introduced a resolution opposing the opening on the basis of potential hazards to residents and livestock. Mock-er himself owns several acres of property that would be affected.

Biologist Nathan Trip of the State Dept. of Environmental Conservation, cited increasing numbers of complaints of deer foraging in farmers' crops and an accelerating number of deer-automobile collisions as reasons for the department's proposing the change. On parts of Rts. 9W, 144 and 396 abutting the area in question, 63 such collisions occurred in

the period between 1976 and 1978, he said.

After heated words on the hunting issue, debate over the sewer extension was tame in comparison. Citing "offensive odors" and malfunctioning leachfields" plus recent citations from the State Health Dept., Bethlehem txx collector Kenneth Hahn summed up for the delegation. "For 13 years we've been hanging by our fingertips. We want to live like first class citizens. We're not afraid of a public hearing because we will turn out the troops."

Supervisor Tom Corrigan assured the group that "your pleas will not go unanswered." A public hearing on sewers planned for both North Bethlehem and South Bethlehem is expected to be scheduled for June or July. Residents of the South Bethlehem area have been embroiled in their own debate, with petitions circulating both in favor and in opposition to the sewer proposal.

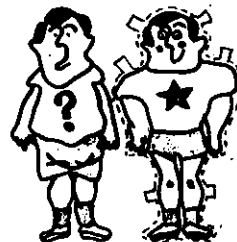

Betsy Carter went on to Vermont College after graduating from Bethlehem Central High School, and received her

degree in nursing in May, 1976. After passing her New York State Nursing Board examinations, she joined the staff at Methodist Hospital, Houston, Tex., on Aug. 1, 1976. During a routine physical examination in her first week of employment it was discovered she was afflicted with leukemia. She returned to the Albany area for hospitalization, and died at her parents' home in June, 1977.

In a letter to her parents, Anita Ristau, chairman of the department of nursing at the college, stated that the Betsy Carter Award was "to be given to the student who demonstrates superior clinical skills and exemplifies the qualities of caring, warmth and compassion which were characteristics of Betsy."

The former student's father, an Albany attorney, said the award was "established without any prior knowledge on our part, and we were deeply moved."

The Carters have three other daughters, Mrs. Ann Usher of North Greenbush, Mrs. Sue Wagoner of Newton, Mass., and Carrie, a junior at Skidmore College.

Students planning drive for Cindy

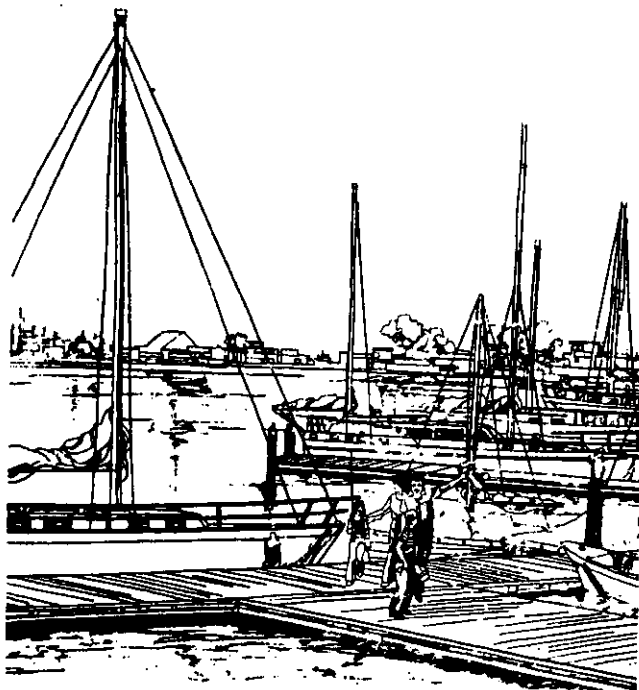

Blue Jays open 33-game slate

For the third straight year, Delmar's Blue Jays will launch their season with a double-header at Doubleday Field, Cooperstown, against the talent-rich Milford Macs Sunday.

The bargain bill, starting at 1 p.m., kicks off a 33-game schedule for the Blue Jays, 16 of them in the Capital District Baseball League. key Brantley and outfielder-first baseman Eric Felter.

Toffenetti will depend on returnees Jack Dalton of Delmar, who pitched for St. Lawrence in his college days, and John MacDonald of Slingerlands, former Lehigh pitcher who had a good year for the Jays in 1979, for hurling duty. This pair will be the probable starters in the Cooperstown foray.

Others on the mound staff are Ward Phelan of Saint Rose and Jeff Rose, Siena relief standout. Ken Gall will be returning behind the plate, with help from Rich Camaner, who played at Niagara University and in the Canadian semi-pro leagues, who at 29 is coming out of retirement for sheer love of the game.

Also returning are Mark Kleinke, a hometown product who hits the long ball and covers wide acreage in center; Steve Caruso, who led the team in hitting last year; Al Bradt, strongarmed shortstop, and Ken White, a long-ball hitter who batted .292 last season.

The Blue Jays will play four games each with Rotterdam, Colonie, Halfmoon Tigers and defending champion Schuylerville in the Capital District League, and will play weekend games with the Schenectady R&R Pools, Milford Macs, Bennington Generals, Dalton, Mass. and other competitive clubs.

BC has shot at net title

Four straight victories last week gave Bethlehem Central's varsity tennis team a seven-match win streak and a chance for a triple tie for the Suburban Council championship.

The Eagles dropped only three singles matches in blizzing Guilderland by 9-0, Scotia by 7-2, Mohonasen by 9-0 and Colonie by 8-1. The critical match, however, was the only one of the five scheduled encounters that was rained out—the key confrontation with league-leading Shenendehowa. That match, twice postponed by weather, was set for Tuesday of this week on the Delmar courts, and by the time this is in print, Coach Phil Ackerman's young team will know (weather permitting) whether they will be in a playoff for the crown or just runners-up.

Meanwhile, BC had a return match at Niskayuna Monday, a second-round exercise that doesn't count in the league standings, and a home duel with Columbia Wednesday. The Suburban council tournament gets started Thursday and will occupy the rest of the weekend.

Bethlehem hasn't lost since the opening setback at the hands of defending champion Niskayuna, and the Niskies have lost only to Shenendehowa. Ackerman's optimism spiraled after the whitewash of Guilderland, a strong team that figured to be tough.

There are other positive symptoms. Jeff Goodman had his best day of the season against Guilderland, coming from behind to upset Tim

Dague, one of the Council's better players, 1-6, 7-5, 6-2 in the No. 1 singles. At Scotia two days later, BC's John Matuszek, extended the Council's best No. 2 singles player, undefeated Tom Schmitz, before yielding in three sets, 6-1, 4-6, 6-2. At Mohonasen, Goodman had a 6-3, 6-4 win over Tom Larsen, who has beaten Shenendehowa's No. 1.

Bethlehem hasn't lost a doubles match since the season opener against Niskayuna, and two singles players, sophomore Alex Macario and junior Scott Rukwid, have each won six straight after dropping their first two matches.

The Council tourney has been expanded this year to permit each school to enter four singles and four doubles representatives. Ackerman will send Goodman, Macario, Rukwid and Adam Yarinsky to the singles eliminations at Burnt Hills Thursday, and his three regular doubles combos plus a new tandem, Matuszek and Brian Segel, to the doubles shootout at Shenendehowa.
