# **IDA OKs PSEG tax break**

Bethlehem's Industrial Development Agency (IDA) pulled the trigger last week on a project that has occupied a large amount of the agency's time for the past year: the proposed 20-year payment-inlieu-of-taxes (PILOT) agreement with PSEG Power-New York.

The PILOT will slash the utility's current annual \$6.5 million local property tax bill for the next 23 years – rising in 2.5 percent annual increments from a baseline of \$2.875 million in 2004 to about \$4.3 million by 2024.

But at an unusual evening meeting of the IDA on Tuesday, July 31, the PSEG tax deal provided a stepping-stone to discussion of a broader issue: how best to grow the town's business tax base in the future. By meeting's end, talk turned to the possibility of hiring a full-time economic development director or coordinator for the town - a discussion

likely to resume when the IDA meets next on Aug. 22 at 8 a.m.

IDA chairman Michael Tucker told last week's meeting - with Supervisor Sheila Fuller, Councilman George Lenhardt and Bethlehem Central Superintendent Les Loomis among those present - that the topic was in keeping with the agency's actions earlier in the evening.

"If we've done anything tonight, I believe what we have done is not only approve the resolution authorizing the lease transaction and PILOT for PSEG, but we've committed ourselves to expanding the tax base of this community by attracting businesses that are residentially friendly and fit the character of the town," Tucker said. "I think we're all in agreement that that's our next job. If we don't succeed at that, we haven't succeeded."

# **Town candidates contest** most minor party lines

The 2001 election will be Bethlehem's most wide-open in years and minor party primaries on Sept. 11 will provide a sneak preview of Election Day, with every contested office on November's ballot the subject of one or more primaries.

In New Scotland, the Conservative Party ballot lines for town board will be contested in a primary as well.

The county board certified a series of opportunity-to-ballot (OTB) petitions Monday, setting the primaries in motion. In Bethlehem, with the exception of the election for highway superintendent, where incumbent Gregg Sagendorph is running uncontested, all other town offices on November's general election ballot will first face primaries for the Independence Party ballot line.

The most wide-open primary contests will be a pair of showdowns among all four major party candidates for Bethlehem town justice, seeking both the Independence and Conservative Party

The Bethlehem judicial race includes Democratic incumbents Theresa Egan, who picked up the county Independence committee's Party executive endorsement in June, and Kenneth Munnelly, and Republican challengers Paul DerOhannesian and Frank Milano, both of whom were endorsed by the Conservatives, DerOhannesian was also backed by the Independence committee.

All four, however, filed designating petitions to contest the party endorsements in a primary. Judicial candidates need only file such petitions to be named on a primary ballot. According to the Board of Elections, Munnelly also secured through petitions two additional party-line designations unsought by his rivals - the Working Families and Green party lines.

Also among the Bethlehem primaries is a head-to-head ballot line challenge for the Independence line by first-time candidate Tim Gordon to Supervisor

Bethlehem is a small town full of streets lined with mature trees shading houses with neatly kept lawns and window boxes. At the supermarket, the drug store and the barbershop, neighbors greet neighbors, giving the suburb the sense that this is a safe place full of familiar faces.

Parents and kids meet on playing fields, at school activities, and at Scout meetings. Kids ride bikes, scooters and skateboards up and down their streets, to friends' houses or to the local toy store, record store or bookstore.

Bethlehem Central Assistant Superintendent John Maguire said the district has more than 100 prevention programs that serve kindergartners through high school seniors. They range from reading programs to service clubs to parent newsletters.

Thirty-two of the programs are designed for middle school students and their parents. For the kids involved with Smith, these programs are now of little help, but the district is ready to assist in

'We can't comment specifically on this case," Maguire said, "but school district resources are available to the

kids who've been hurt by this."

Those resources specifically include access to social workers, psychologists and guidance counselors.

Bethlehem Central Middle School Principal Steve Lob-

ban said this incident is an opportunity to "hold the mirror up and see if there's something more we can do."

One immediate thing to do is not take the feeling of safety for granted.

"We've had too many reminders that all the needs of society are represented in this community," Lobban said.

"This community is no safer, or less safe, than any other."

Maguire agreed: "We can't control the environment. Even in a child-centered community like this, where we do everything we can around safety for our children, we do it knowing we can't guarantee their safety."

Bethlehem police officer Mike McMillen is head of the department's youth bureau and has worked as a resource officer in the middle school.

"We need to keep in mind that we are one of the main suburbs of a capital city," McMillen said. "We'll get some overflow, and things will happen."



# Towns are cool to proposed Census challenge conference

A simmering dispute over how soon Albany County should use 2000 Census figures as the basis for distributing sales tax revenues awaits a decision by state Supreme Court justice Thomas McNamara, who on July 25 ordered that millions in dollars in overdue revenue checks withheld by County Comptroller Michael Conners be dispatched to several suburban municipalities, including Bethlehem.

The underlying issue in the tax distribution fight — the accuracy of figures released by the U.S. Census Bureau last March may take many months to resolve. Conners last week issued a call to municipal leaders to join him in a workshop in September to resolve potential mistakes in the Census figures, which are used as a basis for both the tax distributions and reapportionment of county legislative seats. But his appeal drew lukewarm responses from leaders of the communities he said would be most helped by the gathering.

McNamara's ruling granted an injunction requested by County Executive Michael Breslin on behalf of the seven municipalities from whom Conners had withheld second quarter sales-tax revenue checks, which are normally received in city, town and village comptroller's offices on or about July 15.

McNamara ordered the immediate release of most of the sales tax money due Bethlehem, Westerlo, Guilderland and the village of Altamont, and the town and village of Colonie and village of Menands — more than \$10 million. But he ordered that a portion be held in escrow, and is still mulling a decision, argued before him by attorneys representing Breslin, Conners and the affected municipalities, on its distribution.

The affected seven municipalities all showed growth under the 2000 Census, and are therefore slated to receive a larger future share of the county sales-tax distribution formula, which is based on population. The question before McNamara is how soon? The 2000 Census numbers were used by county finance officials just a month after their release as the basis for the distribution checks cut in April and received by the municipalities in early June. The size of those revenue payments produced an uproar from municipalities, particularly, the city of Albany, that lost ground in the Census and had projected higher sales tax revenues in the first quarter

# Town board to consider realigning Blessing Road

A major town road project in North Bethlehem, a controversy over a dumping permit request near Becker's Corners and the reappointment of a key town official highlight the agenda for the Aug. 8 Bethlehem town board

The road project in question is a major realignment of Blessing Road with Schoolhouse Road to improve traffic along the Krumkill Road corridor in North Bethlehem.

First proposed by Commissioner of Public Works Bruce Secor in July of last year, the new Blessing connector would depart from the current road between Stafford's Crossing and Mosall Drive and intersect with Krumkill at the intersection of School-

It would cross through lands owned by Quadrini Builders, the residential developer that will share the costs of the estimated \$700,000 project with the Public Works department. It would also address long-identified traffic congestion problems, rush-hour delays and awkward turning movements for vehicles at the current Krumkill-Schoolhouse and Krumkill-Blessing intersections. The Blessing-Schoolhouse corridor is a shortcut between Slingerlands and Western Avenue in Guilderland.

In March, Secor sought the board's approval to pursue the relevant permits for the project from the Army Corps of Engineers and the state Department of Environmental Conservation. The board also place at the nearby A.W. Becker declared itself lead agency for the

Review Act (SEQRA).

At tonight's meeting, Secor will ask the board to adopt a negative declaration under SEQRA— a would not have a significant environmental impact and therefore does not require a detailed environmental impact review.

# **NS ZBA OKs new fuel tank**

A business that sits astride a key Clarksville intersection plans to launch a small diesel fuel fleet service operation on its property, primarily to service the nearby Onesquethaw Fire Co.

Superior Oil of 2059 Delaware Turnpike was scheduled to appear before the New Scotland planning board Tuesday seeking a special use permit and site plan approval to install a 4,000-gallon diesel tank on the rear of its property, at the intersection of County Route 301. Superior cleared a hurdle on the way to realizing that project on July 24, obtaining variances from the town's zoning board of appeals after a lengthy public hearing.

A smaller tank on the premises has long been used to fuel

Superior's own delivery trucks, needed a larger capacity, \$30,000 tank, already on order, to serve the fire company. Company officials, who said their own onpremises diesel storage tank was inadequate to their needs, approached Dunston last winter to become their diesel supplier.

Dunston said the facility would be limited to his own company's vehicles and those of the fire company.

The ZBA voted unanimously to grant the necessary variances to install the new tank, attaching conditions barring through traffic, restricting use of the tank for diesel fuel only, and barring Superior from filling cargo carriers from the new tank.

The planning board was tentatively scheduled to take the issue up at its Aug. 7 meeting.

The more informed you are, the less likely it is that you'll be hoodwinked.

Local charities like the Kiwanis Bell of Life campaign and the Bethlehem Festival Fund are run by local people volunteers — and practically every penny collected is used to help local people.

It's a sad comment on today's world that some people use the misfortune of others to solicit money that goes directly into a scammer's pocket.

There are many worthwhile charities that appreciate community support and don't resort to unscrupulous tactics to solicit funds. Don't hesitate to give when you know who you are giving to - give but give smart.

# Hot times

With more hot weather coming, it's important to take precautions against heat stroke, as the recent death of a professional football player reminds us.

The main thing is to stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water and that means more than one or two glasses a day; health experts advise a minimum of eight glasses, or a half gallon, a day, even when it's not sultry out.

Do outside work in the morning or early evening and avoid strenuous exercise. Take frequent breaks and stay out of the sun as much as possible. Don't take chances. If you become ill, seek medical help immediately.

At home, keep windows closed and drapes drawn during the hottest part of the day, then let cool air come in during the evening and night.

Seniors should stay indoors and keep their air conditioner or fans on. If electricity costs are a concern, seniors should contact the town or county senior services department. Try to schedule medical or other appointments early in the day.

And, finally, take sensible precautions with your pets. Don't take pets for rides when you do errands. It only takes a few minutes for a car to heat up and this can be fatal for animals.

Make sure your pets have continuous access to water and shade and take dogs for walks in the morning when it's cooler.

# Common sense weight loss plan works

The following weight loss testimonial is not brought to you by a drug company, a food supplement or a gym. However, a doctor was involved.

Let me start with the "before" picture. A few months ago, I was a bit on the hefty side, to the tune of nearly 20 pounds. In my profession, being overweight is common. About half of all sports writers tend to eat the wrong things, mainly because we're always on the go. We're not home when most people are eating dinner, so we make pit stops at fast-food burger joints or all-youcan-stuff-into-your-face buffets to fuel up on the way to the office or a game.

Then we subject ourselves to sitting in front of a computer and typing for several hours at a time. so we never get the chance to work off those double greasepatty burgers and fries that we

It's no wonder that some of the people that grace ESPN's "Sports Reporters" show on Sunday morning look like they've just swallowed a Blimpie sub or, in some cases, a blimp.

Fortunately, my weight problem wasn't that extreme. In fact, I didn't really see it as a problem; that was, until I stepped into my doctor's office for a routine physical in April.

The first thing that the nurse practitioner did was weigh me. I stepped on the scale figuring that I would probably be around 175 pounds, give or take a couple of ounces. When the scale got pushed to 182, that was the first sign of trouble.

The next thing was running some routine blood tests, including a cholesterol count. I was nervous at the prospect of giving blood for the various tests they do, but once the needle was out of my arm, I lowered my heart rate by 50 percent.

The rest of the examination was the usual check-every-bodypart procedure. Luckily, the doctor was efficient; I am convinced that too much poking

and prodding can lead to ailments popping up during the exam.

The lab at the doctor's office was also quite efficient. The doctor had my blood test results before I could tie my shoelaces.

The doctor started out by telling me the good news — there was nothing seriously wrong with me. But then the doctor pointed to my cholesterol count. It was a whopping 214.

I had prepared myself for a high cholesterol count before I walked into the doctor's office, but seeing that 214 was a bit shocking. After all, I reasoned: I had at least tried to eat vegetables once a day.

The doctor was kind enough not to tell me that I was on a path

pounds, most of which came from my legs. It helped that the course I walked in my neighborhood had some hills. It also helped that the neighborhood dogs encouraged me to walk faster by barking angrily at me. It was as if they had never seen a grown man walk past their houses before.

A stomach bug in mid-May broke my exercise and diet patterns for a few days, but my weight continued to go down. By the beginning of June, I was down to 167 pounds.

At that point, my stomach was no longer bulging over my belt. In fact, my belt could barely keep my pants up. There were times when I had to hitch up my pants to the middle of my stomach in order to complete a 35-minute walk without incident. I may have looked like I was imitating an old man, but better that than showing the neighborhood my underwear.

> The last month brought a short period of weight gain, which led. me to add a highfiber bran cereal to my diet.

> I won't get into details, but the first time I had a bowl of that stuff, I dropped about five pounds in 24

hours. Anyone wanting to try a high-fiber cereal should follow the recommended serving directions religiously.

Today, I'm back to the lowweight mark of 167 pounds I reached in early June. I have replaced my old habit of having a high-sugar, late-night snack with eating pineapple fruit cups. Dinners now mostly consist of poultry, fish and lean pork instead of hot dogs and hamburgers, and I haven't craved peanut butter in quite some time. My walks now last more than 40 minutes, and I get in at least three walks per

Even with all of the improvements I've seen in my body, there is one thing that still hasn't sunk in. I can never go back to my old habits, no matter how much I want to. It's hard to get my head around the fact that I can no longer drop in at the Golden Arches and order a burger with fries and a soda. Yet if I want to avoid seeing the number 214 again, that's what I have to do.

Perhaps someone will open a restaurant specializing in baked fish with . couscous and steamed vegetables someday. I'll probably be the only sports writer to frequent the

of self-destruction, but it was obvious that a change in eating habits and exercise patterns was

Mentally, I began picturing visits to Weight Watchers and getting a membership to the YMCA. That led to the song "YMCA" being played over and over in my head, which immediately made my skin crawl.

There are a few things that can tip you off to a charity scam. The "sad story approach" appeals to your emotions but offers little or

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



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

# Baby Bottle Tooth Decay

Baby bottle tooth decay is a dental condition that can cause severe damage to an infant or toddler's teeth. This condition occurs when a child's teeth are exposed to sugary liquids (milk, formula and fruit juice) for long periods of time. This most commonly occurs when using a bottle.

You should never try to appease your child with a sugary liquid during naps or at night, because ultimately you are contributing to an unhealthy environment in your child's

There are ways to prevent baby bottle tooth decay. You can start oral care early. Wipe the baby's gums with a clean gauze pad or wash cloth after each feeding. Begin brushing your child's teeth as soon as the first tooth appears and always check your child's teeth regularly. If you notice any discolored areas, call your dentist immediately. The most important step to remember for prevention of early decay is to avoid sugary liquids in



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



A key to success, he said, would be identifying a "dedicated point person" to promote the town and marshal its economic development resources.

At the meeting, the IDA unanimously approved the lease transaction that nominally makes PSEG an agent of the IDA for undertaking the \$400-million-plus redevelopment of the Bethlehem Energy Center on River Road in Glenmont. The agreement grants PSEG sales tax exemptions on the purchase of equipment and materials for the proposed reconstruction of the former Albany Steam Station into a more modern and efficient plant; a mortgage-recording exemption related to the purchase of the station property; and local property tax exemptions that set the groundwork for the PILOT agreement.

The PILOT is the linchpin of a complex agreement, announced in June and the subject of several public meetings and a public. hearing last month, that resolves

outstanding tax-assessment disputes involving PSEG and the property's previous owner, Niagara Mchawk Power Corp. It also sets in motion the redevelopment project by granting the company tax incentives through 2024.

PSEG can now turn its attention to completing the Article X licensing process before the state Public Service Commission and the Board on Electric Generation Siting and the \$75,000 budgeted for the Environment. The PILOT agreement, Tucker said, is "a step that allows PSEG to move forward concerning the ongoing Article X process and on the financial arrangements for the

Tucker said the bill for the year-long PSEG negotiations, which the IDA authorized at the meeting, was just over \$70,000. Most of those were fees for legal services, incurred by IDA counsel Tom Connolly's firm, McNamee Lochner Titus (\$15,000) and attorney Michael Whiteman of Whiteman Osterman Hanna (more than

\$21,000); or for consultants, like utility analyst Ronald Promboin of California, who received \$17,000 to review PSEG's economic analysis of the project; public relations consultants Sawchuck Brown Associates (\$12,000); or two consultants contracted through Tucker's firm Mercer Companies, to review the agreement at various stages (just over \$3,300).

The expenses were within the negotiations, Tucker said. With PSEG's initial, non-refundable \$75,000 fee now in hand, he said, "We have been able to keep those costs within the original payments so we haven't had to dip into previously earned IDA monies" or spend any taxpayer money on the negotiations.

In other business, the IDA approved a standard lease transaction with Malm Realty of Glenmont, granting them sales and mortgage-recording tax exemptions for their proposed 95,000-square-foot distributionwarehouse-office building on 3.4 acres adjacent to the Hamilton News facility at 41 Hamilton Lane in Glenmont. 






ack in the days when we lived in a more agrarian society, families looked forward to the harvest and the county fair that usually came at the end of the growing season. Farmers and their families would bring livestock they had raised, produce they had grown, jams and jellies and pies and pickles and other products they had prepared for display and competition.

Entertainment and amusements would be provided and the family could take a day or several days to enjoy the fun.

At a time when there were not nearly as many diversions and entertainments competing for attention, parents and children would look forward to the fair and the break from routine it provided.

In spite of the urbanization of our culture, state and county fairs remain a mainstay of the late summer, drawing attendance from both cities and towns and the more traditional rural areas.

Almost every county in New York State boasts a summer fair. In our immediate area we have the Altamont Fair, a joint venture of Albany and Schenectady Counties which opens Tuesday, Aug. 14 and continues through Sunday the 19th.

Now it its 109th year, the Altamont

Fair has many favorite attractions. There is the circus museum with both miniature and full size displays celebrating this unique entertainment forum.

An actual circus will also be on the grounds. Corona's Hollywood Circus will present acts of skill and daring do each day at 1, 3:30 and 6 p.m. in the infield.

There is also an auto museum with antique cars on display and a Blacksmith Shop where Dan and Sarah-Richie Crowther create objects of metal using the same techniques that were used in early America.

One of the popular returning attractions at the Altamont Fair are the Robinson's Racing Pigs. The races take place daily at 11:30 a.m., 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. See the pigs run the 100 foot oval course with legs churning and ears flapping as they rush to the finish line in hope of being the victor and receiving the reward — an Oreo cookie.

On Tuesday, opening day of the fair, the Grove Stage will be dedicated to the late Reid Northrup. Northrup was the manager of the fair for 18 years. Following the dedication, the band Blue Creek will perform.

The state fair is a huge event with a number of large permanent buildings and barns to house the various exhibits.



McMillen said that this has been one of the police department's busiest summers in a

This particular child abuse case has nothing to do with the school, McMillen said. And although he never heard any kids talking at school about what happened at Smith's house, he felt that his role as a school resource officer helped put one victim at ease when reporting her story.

"Here she was at 10 p.m. at night, in the detective's office, working with uniformed police, and she felt comfortable," McMil-

len said. "That's the strength of the resource officer program."

McMillen said the school resource officers at the middle school and high school serve as resources to the students and staff; respond to any crimes that might be committed on campus; and teach in physical education, social studies and science classes.

McMillen is also on the middle school's coaching staff, and that, combined with walking the halls at school, provides kids with a chance to interact with him.

That sense of connection, Lobban and Maguire said, can be crucial to middle school students.

"Students need to be key in establishing the culture of the school," Lobban said. "The next step is to draw them in and. communicate more effectively with them."
