2004: Year in Review

January

• Supervisor Theresa Egan is sworn in as the town's first Democrat in 150 years to hold the position. Tim Gordon, an Independent, is sworn in as a town board member, the first registered Independent to hold an elected position in that party's 10-year existence.

• Keith Wiggand, chairman of Bethlehem's GOP Committee, loses that position and his politically-appointed state job after he resigns amid allegations that he used his state office and state resources to solicit political contributions from agency employees. Republican board member Thomas Marcelle is unanimously appointed to replace Wiggand as the GOP Chairman.

• Democrat Jack Cunningham, in a special meeting of the Albany County Legislature, is appointed to a vacant seat previously held by Delmar Republican David Young. Cunningham is later elected to the 34th district seat, beating Republican Jeff Perez, who, announcing his candidacy in February, ran on a platform of cutting government costs by reducing the size of the Legislature from 39 representatives to 21.

• Longtime Voorheesville Elementary School Principal Ed Diegel retires.

• Elsmere Fire Department Chief and the town's Chief Building Inspector Kevin M. Shea dies of a heart attack after responding to a routine smoke detector call at Good Samaritan Lutheran Nursing Home.

• Bethlehem Town Center, including big-name retailers Wal-Mart and Lowe's, means convenience for many residents who flock to the center by the hundreds in early January. Bethlehem police reports show an increase in police activity, mostly petty larceny, in that area of town.

February

• A Level-3 sex offender moves into town, prompting police to notify identifiable high-risk areas including schools, libraries and other popular hang-out areas for young children.

• A proposed limestone mine near the Feura Bush and Bethlehem town line sparks a grassroots movement of residents who oppose the operation, proposed by Peter Frueh. The operation eventually made its way through town channels, with the town's building inspector telling the Department of Environmental Conservation that use is allowed for that piece of property. An appeal made by the Feura Bush-Bethlehem Heights Alliance is up for a final decision by the Zoning Board of Appeals in January.

• Albany Police Lt. John Finn, whose wife, Maura McNulty, is a seventh-grade teacher at Bethlehem Central Middle School, passes away after being shot in the line of duty during a December robbery.

• BC alum Thomas Robbins, 27, is killed Feb. 9 in the Mosul region of Iraq when a collection of rocket-propelled grenades and mortar rounds detonate. Robbins, the son of Douglas Robbins of Delmar and the Rev. Charlene Robbins, was a standout athlete while at BC.

• Longtime Voorheesville teacher

William Vinson dies suddenly of an apparent heart attack. Vinson organized the elementary school's Clown Fest in 1989 and was named 1995's Educator of Excellence by the New York State English Council's Executive Board.

• Voorheesville Central School District draws media attention when a 10th-grade social studies teacher assigns students to list both positive and negative attributes of Adolph Hitler, Josef Stalin and Benito Mussolini as national leaders.

• County Legislature races begin to heat up as Republican Peter Potter sets his sights on Democratic Incumbent Herb Reilly's seat for the 33rd district. Potter, like 34th district Republican candidate Jeff Perez, proposes cutting the size of the county Legislature from 39 to 21 seats. Reilly, former New Scotland supervisor and board member, touts his accomplishments of balancing that town's budget, renovating town hall and building a community center.

March

• The town of Bethlehem makes preparations for town-wide land use study by contracting Saratoga Associates, a design and planning firm, for \$158,000. The goal is to identify areas in town suitable for future development and to change out-of-date zoning codes.

• One of New Scotland's oldest buildings, the historic location at 2143 Delaware Turnpike, is ravaged by flames, drawing more than 100 firefighters from surrounding departments to the scene.

• The Voorheesville girls basketball team makes it to the final of the Section II Tournament, having just won the Class B Title in its first year in the division, after moving up from Class C. Seniors Brittany Baron, Michelle Nadratowski and Jackie Markert came up big for their team in a victory over Potsdam before losing to a tough South Jefferson Lady Spartans team in the Region II Championship.

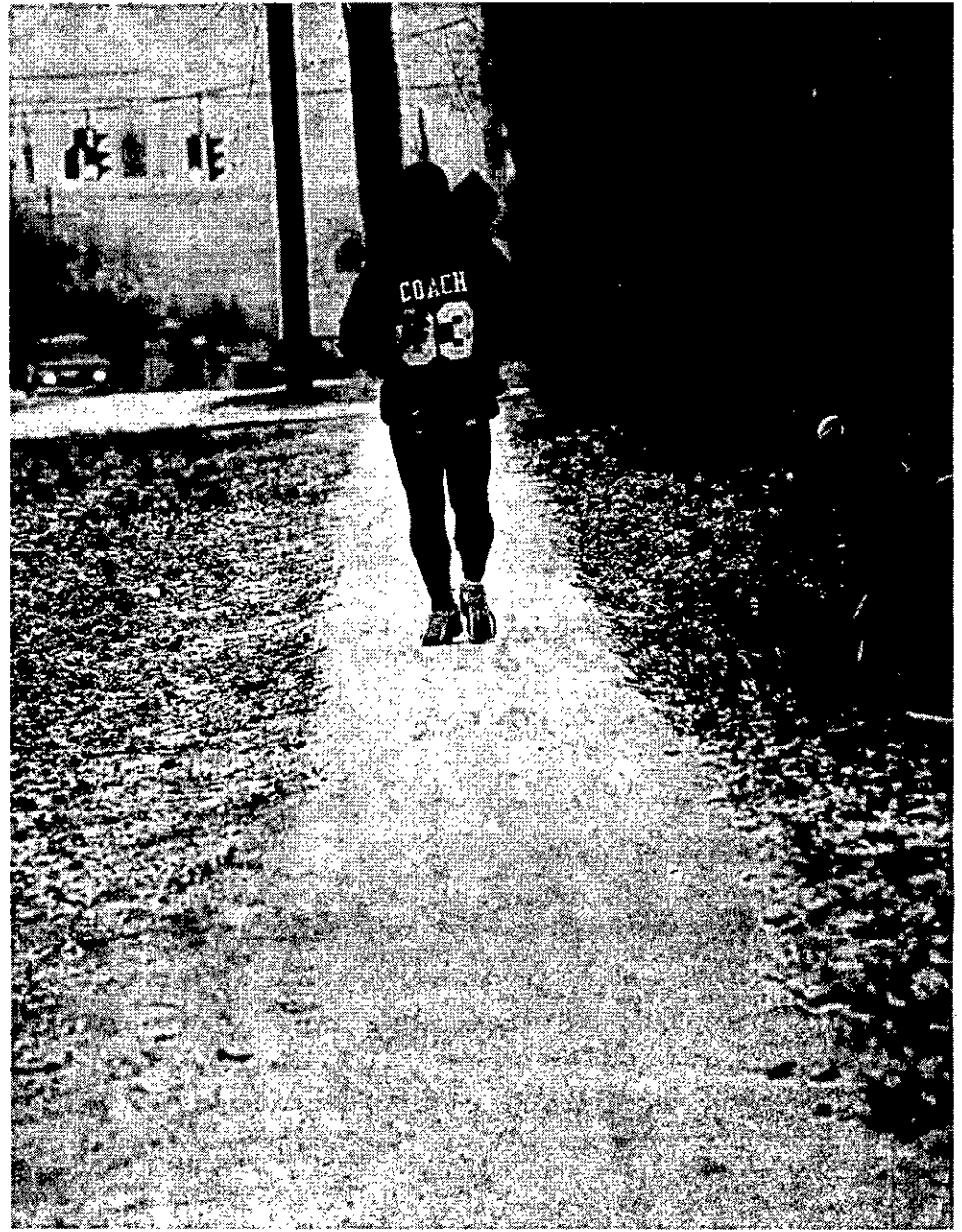
• The town of Bethlehem's Highway Department announces a sidewalk project to be launched over the summer that will eventually put sidewalks in place along Maple and Elsmere avenues, in Selkirk and Delmar, respectively. A pedestrian group also identifies other roads, including Route 9W and Feura Bush Road, which stretches through Glenmont, Selkirk and North Bethlehem, as potential areas that could benefit from sidewalk projects of their own.

• A driveway plowed by the town for years, possibly dating back to World War II, sparks a controversy when a resident questions why private driveways are plowed by town employees and equipment. The town eventually decides to abandon plowing the 250-foot driveway. A public outcry also brings into question the plowing status of five other driveways around town.

• A nine-member planning advisory committee is formed and assigned the responsibility of working with Saratoga Associates to develop a comprehensive land use plan. The committee includes

Town police use Taser on man after accident

For the second time this year, Bethlehem police used a Taser on a man resisting arrest after responding to a report of a vehicle driving into a house on Herrick Avenue in Delmar Christmas night.

None of the occupants of the home at Herrick Avenue were injured as a result of the 3:15 a.m. crash, according to police, though there was some structural damage to the residence. The occupants of the car face a slew of charges, ranging from driving while intoxicated (DWI) and traffic infractions to felony assault.

After police arrived, police said the passenger in the vehicle, 23-year-old Brendon B. Griffin of Glenmont, attempted to leave the scene of the accident by foot.

Griffin had a marijuana pipe that had burned and unburned residue in it, according to Sgt. Bob Helligrass. After Griffin was placed under arrest and in the backseat of the police car, police said he kicked out the back window and escaped

through the broken window. As officers chased Griffin down, he continued to resist arrest, police said, eventually resulting in the sprained knee of a police officer.

A Taser was eventually used on Griffin, police said.

Helligrass said Monday that the police officer, who was treated at Albany Medical Center and released, and whose name is not being released by the department, is currently out of work but is expected back in a couple of days.

"Mostly precautionary," Helligrass said of the reasons the officer is out.

Griffin also received minor injuries for which he was treated at Albany

Police make DWI arrest V'ville students enjoy travel abroad

Bethlehem Police made one driving while intoxicated arrest recently.

On Dec. 21, about 8:20 p.m., police received a report of a car crash in the area of River Road, near Corning Hill Road. When police arrived, James L. Leuthner, 37 of 24 Plain Road in Vernon, Vt. said he was traveling northbound on River Road when he lost control of his car, went over the double yellow line and

ended up overturned on the southbound side of the road.

Police said they detected an odor of alcohol on his breath. Field sobriety tests were administered and failed by Leuthner.

He was arraigned in Town Court. Leuthner's Vermont driving license was suspended on the spot, and bail was set at \$2,000. Leuthner couldn't make bail and was sent to Albany County jail. He has a return date of Jan. 18.

A group of students from Voorheesville's Clayton A. Bouton High School recently learned that a Spanish tortilla is much different than its Mexican namesake covered with jalapeño cheese. In fact, they learned that actually speaking Spanish is a little bit harder than reciting it in class.

Twenty members of the school's international club recently got some real-life experience with the Spanish language and culture during a 10-day foreign exchange visit to Spain.

The students shared their recent experiences to a packed house at the Dec. 14 school board meeting.

Accompanied by foreign language teacher Bob Streifer, guidance counselor Barbara Blumberg and social studies teacher Patrick Corrigan, the students spent much of their trip attending school in Valladolid, a city two hours north of Madrid. In class, the Voorheesville students helped the Spanish teacher conduct English and social studies lessons.

"Our club is growing and now numbers 50 members," said club President Elizabeth Funk, a junior. "It's great for us to make

these connections with people from other cultures."

According to Streifer, this is the third exchange with the school in Valladolid. Other recent exchange trips included visits to Mexico, Russia and France. Voorheesville has also hosted student visitors from Spain, Mexico and Brazil.

During the presentation, Bruno Silva, a senior exchange student from Brazil, told the audience that he is impressed with the amount of family and community involvement at

"Here in class we can joke around with the teacher, but in Spain, class is very formal, and the teachers are strict," said Thea Carlson, a senior. Sara Dimmitt, also a senior, agreed.

"We take some things in school for granted, like lockers," she said. "They have none in their school."

Most challenging of all, each of them said, was dealing with the language

"Even though we have taken Spanish, it's still hard to communicate. Sometimes we had to improvise," said senior Kaitlyn Lyons.

When they weren't in school, the contingent toured Madrid and nearby cities. They visited museums, castles and Roman ruins and sampled Spanish cuisine. Most of all, they expanded their

world view, learned about people firsthand and made a few friends on the way.

"We keep in touch with the families and students we made friends with during our stay," said senior Alex LeClair, the club's vice president who went on the past two trips. "We share news, current events and politics as well as break down cultural misconceptions."

"In Brazil it's not like that," he said. "In my city we have 20 schools but no close relationships."

He added that the only good schools in his city are private schools.

Likewise, students on the trip to Spain found the culture there much different than what they are used to. For them the daily schedule, food and school atmosphere was an eye opener.

County to offer flu vaccine clinics

The Albany County Department of Health will be holding flu vaccine clinics. County residents must meet Center for Disease Control criteria to be eligible.

The criteria are: all children ages 6-23 months; adults 65 and older; people from 2-64 years with underlying chronic medical conditions; all pregnant women carrying during the influenza season; residents of nursing homes and long-term care facilities; children from 6 months

to 18 years who are on chronic aspirin therapy; health care workers in direct patient care; and out-of-home caregivers or household contacts that will be around children 6 months or younger.

Those younger than 65 must bring a doctor's note explaining their eligibility.

The clinics will be at the county Department of Health on Monday, Jan. 3, from 9:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. and Tuesday, Jan. 4, from 2 to 7 p.m.

Welcome wall honors retired principal

Visitors to Voorheesville Elementary School might think they took a wrong turn and ended up at an art museum instead of a grade school.

On Dec. 14, school officials, teachers, parents and pupils were on hand for the ribbon cutting that officially opened the school's new art display and welcome wall. The permanent art exhibit is located in the main entranceway of the school.

Proceeds from the Voorheesville Community and School Foundation's spring gala and dinner dance last May paid for the welcome wall, which was dedicated in honor of former principal Edward Diegel, who retired last summer.

"It was a phenomenal success with nearly all tickets sold out," said the foundation's chairman, Thomas McKenna, of the spring event. "We hope this tribute will spur interest in the arts, as that was one of Diegel's greatest wishes."

Art teacher Stacey Vitelli had the idea for the permanent art display, Diegel said.

"We looked into a number of high-traffic areas but decided this would be the best location," the honoree said. "When the foundation offered to fund a project in recognition of my retirement, I chose this one because it would be something long-lasting."

Selkirk family uninjured in devastating fire

A Dec. 20 fire, being called accidental, ravaged a one-story Selkirk home, destroying all the belongings, including a car, of a Selkirk couple.

Brian and Valerie McDermott, now believed to be staying with relatives for the time being, escaped the fire without injury, though all four of their cats perished in the blaze that took the Selkirk Fire Department three hours to fight.

The department had to return Tuesday morning for a rekindle that took about another hour to put out, according to Chief

Cresap, Laura Sowalskie, Sarah Van Cleve and Robert Feeney.

"This is an opportunity for kids to be proud of their work and strive to someday be on this wall," Vitelli said. "I thank Mr. Diegel for his generosity in doing this for the art program." She added that artwork will be rotated periodically with newer exhibits.

The idea for the Voorheesville Community and School Foundation first came up in 1998, as a vision of what people can do for their schools and community. The foundation has previously funded kid's summer recreation programs, track and field equipment for the school, senior citizens outreach, school plays and a bus driver recognition event.

Borger said the response has been "fair" so far.

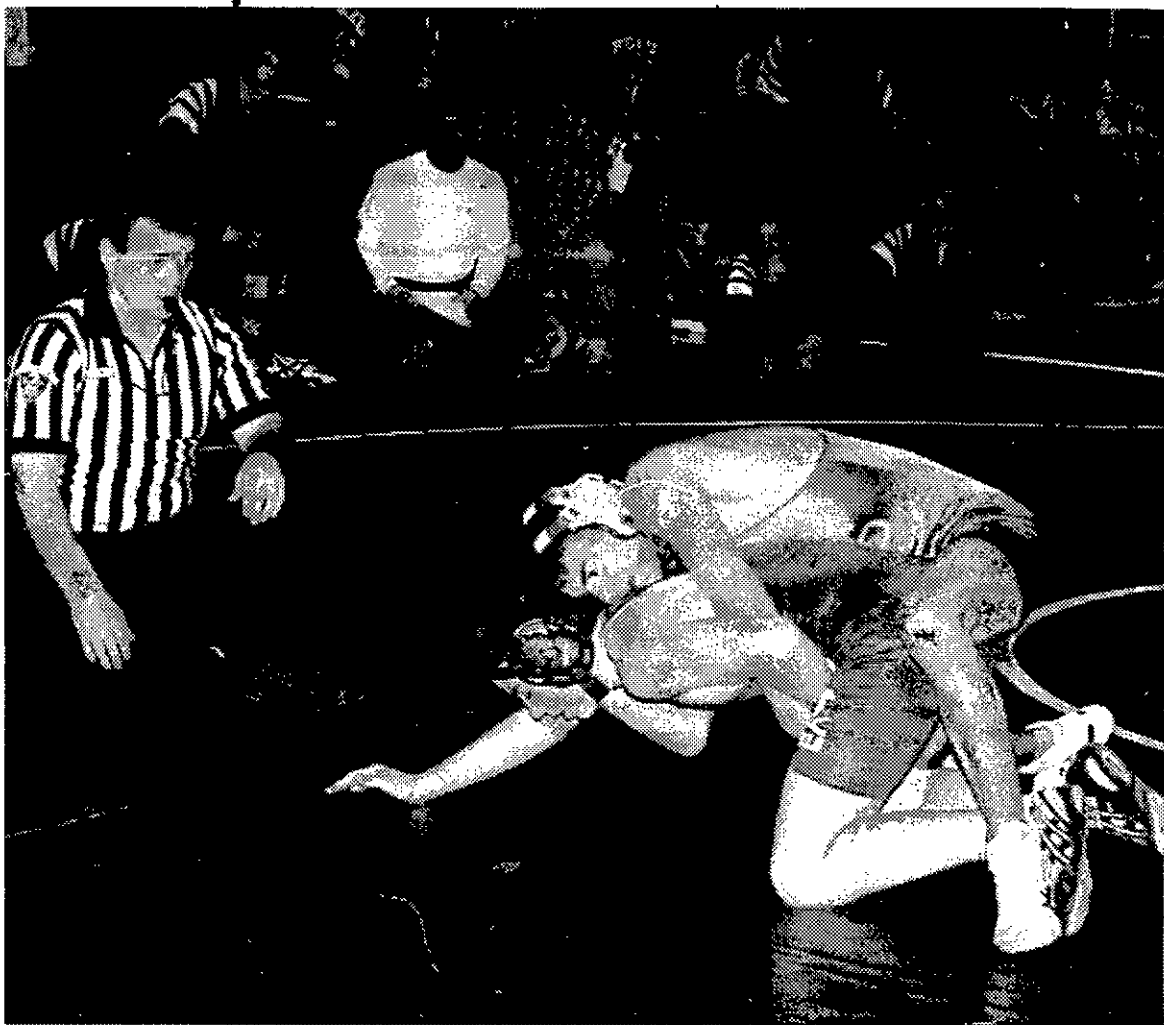
"It's tough around the holidays," he said.

representatives from all walks of town life, including the planning board chairman, landowners and members of citizens groups and town associations. A week later, a yearlong residential moratorium is unanimously adopted by the town board while the planning advisory committee goes to work. The moratorium affects around 3,000 housing projects somewhere in the development pipeline.

April

- A Bethlehem police officer acts quickly to save a 46-year-old man, who was asleep on a burning couch in his River Road home and his 15-year-old son, who was asleep in an adjoining room. No one was injured in that blaze.

- With multi-million dollar technology development looming for the area, Bethlehem town officials join other Capital District officials, growth associations and commerce chambers to travel to Hillsboro, Ore., a town widely considered a prototype for a technologically-driven town.

- Voorheesville village leaders note that sales tax revenues may be higher than expected, allowing the property tax to remain stable at 66 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property for its budget.

- The Bethlehem town board drafts a resolution opposing the Patriot Act, post-9/11 federal legislation which was criticized for violating personal freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution. Republican Councilman Thomas Marcelle and Democratic town board member Daniel Plummer joined forces to draft the symbolic

resolution.

- Arrangements begin to properly bury remains uncovered at the Goes/Van Derzee Farm site, believed to be those of two adults and five children of a tribe of Mahican Indians from around 1000.

May

- A 68-year-old farm owner is arrested on charges of housing dozens of animals in deplorable conditions. Police allegedly fielded years of calls complaining about the Oakwood Road Farm, where Dominick Cubello allegedly held fowl, pigs, rabbits, goats, sheep, and cows in unsanitary conditions, some close to death.

- The Capital District YMCA finalizes plans to buy out the defunct BIG Arena in Delmar. The price tag on the facility, on 29 acres, was listed at \$4.2 million. YMCA would eventually make a number of renovations to the arena, including cutting the ice rink area in half. In the summer, a public hearing drew about 75 residents, none of whom spoke against turning the facility into a Y.

- Tenants at Elsmere Arms Apartments, operated by Albany Management of Colonie, are informed of plans to sell the property. That piece of property would later be acquired by developers of CVS, looking to build a bigger store across the street from its current location.

- Work nears completion on the Bethlehem Energy Center. In all, about two years of work will be completed before the 750-megawatt natural gas plant will go online in the fall.

- Developers of two proposed housing projects seek exemptions from the yearlong moratorium that began in March. They

would later get word from the planning board that they failed to make their cases, which necessitates a demonstration of financial hardship stemming from an inability to continue the projects.

June

- The Bethlehem girls lacrosse team heads to the state tournament for the third year in a row. The Lady Eagles dominated games against Kingston and then Lakeland-Panas, eventually heading to Cortland to defend their undefeated record. The girls lost in the state semifinals.

- Planned upgrades to the New Salem water treatment plant will cost about \$3.7 million more than originally projected, town officials find out from engineers upon completion of the town's long-range water study.

- Bethlehem police arrest a convicted sex offender for scheduling a sexual rendezvous with a 17-year-old boy he met over the Internet. Stephen Wieland, a 27-year-old Glenmont resident, also faced federal charges for allegedly possessing child pornography. He had previously been convicted of second-degree attempted sodomy for attempting to engage in sex with a 13-year-old boy. In an unrelated case, a McDonald's manager was convicted of inappropriately touching two teenage girls who worked for him. Oscar Turpin, 39, of Ravena, was convicted of forcible touching.

- Fourth-grade Voorheesville teacher Mary Ellen O'Brien retires after 33 years of service, leaving her class in the hands of a former sixth-grade student. O'Brien began her career out of college in Voorheesville, where she stayed until her retirement.

The year in review will continue next week.

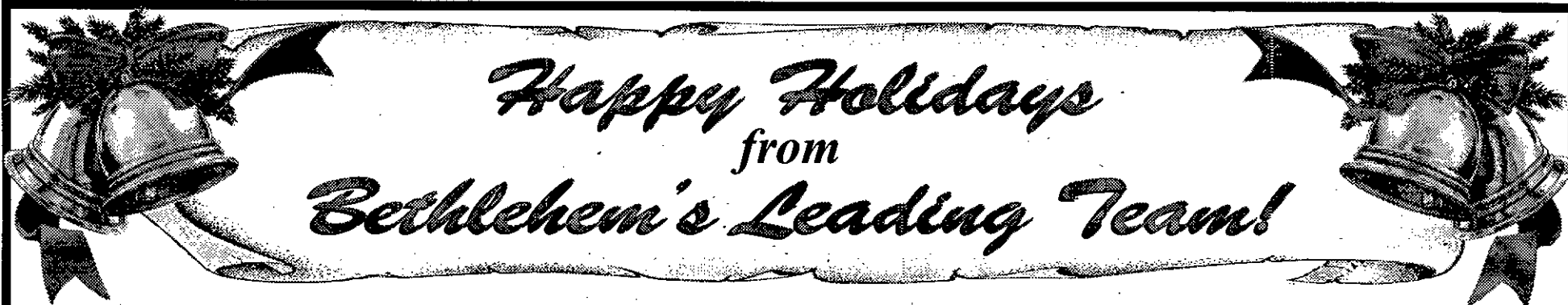

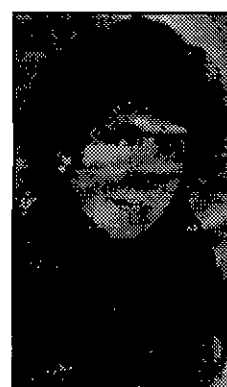

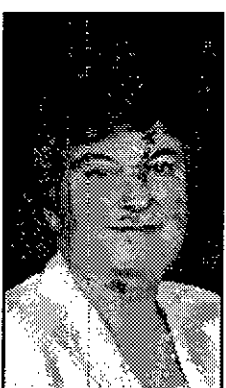

Drive sober: You could save a life

The United States holds the world's record for having the highest number of motor vehicle deaths. Vehicle crashes are the leading cause of injury for individuals 1 to 34 years old. In 2002 and 2003, a little more 17,000 fatalities each year were due to alcohol impairment. These deaths were totally preventable.

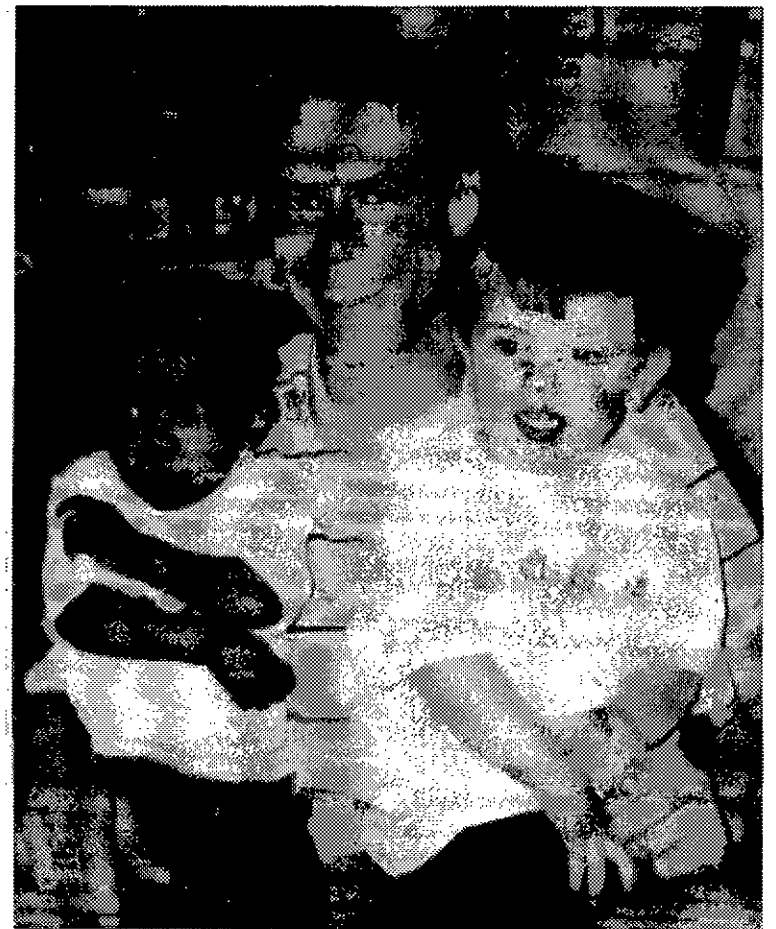
Someone thought they were invincible. What happens when the drunk driver meets someone who has suffered a loss?

At the Albany County STOP-DWI victims panel held in Guiderland town hall on Dec. 14, three family members told convicted drunk drivers of their experiences living through the death of a loved one. Six times a year, approximately 200 offenders come to Guiderland town hall for two hours to hear stories similar to Matt's story, Kathleen's story, Brian's story, and Trooper Catalfamo's story.

Who are the drunk drivers? Almost three-quarters are male; most are single and employed. Surprisingly, almost 18 percent are licensed professionals. Prominent doctors, lawyers, and teachers are mandated to the panel. Three percent of attendees are over 65 years old. However, the majority of drunk drivers are in the 21-to-29-year-old category.

Locally, the median age of the drunk driver is declining. More students have become binge drinkers; when they have access to cars, many impaired young adults drive. Most drunk drivers are not caught. Statisticians tell us that the chance of arrest is one in 200.

Sam Messina of Bethlehem explained how he has dreaded holidays since son Matthew, age 25 and a former Marine, was struck and killed on his Mongoose bike just yards from his home. Matt had decided to go back to college and was living in Chico, Calif. He was struck,

according to police, on June 17, 2003, by a 31-year-old woman making an evening beer run. The mother of three children, all under 10 years of age, had been drinking during the day.

Matt was in top physical condition. His life was before him. Sam and his wife Janet now live one day at a time. Their lives are shattered. Sam thinks of Matt every day. Sam hopes that by knowing something about Matt's

was less than three miles from her home. You may have seen the billboard on I-787 or elsewhere in area with Kathleen's face pictured with the telling words, "An alcohol impaired driver took my life. Celebrate life. Drive Sober."

Young Trooper Anthony J. Catalfamo Jr., stopped a speeder on the Thruway near Canajoharie in July, a little past midnight, while in his state police Crown Victoria. He was rear-ended by a drunk driver.

"Luckily, I was not burned," Catalfamo said. "Crown Victorias have a tendency to explode when rear-ended, and I had just gassed up so there was no vapor."

The trooper did not know if he would live. He cannot remember the accident. The side of his face carries scars. Every time he enters a state police car, he experiences a brief moment of fear. He has dedicated himself to DWI enforcement on the Thruway.

Deputy STOP-DWI Coordinator and Albany County Sheriff's Department Senior Investigator Leonard Crouch lost his son Brian on May 18, 2001, in a single car crash at Spring Street Road adjacent to Siena College. Brian was two minutes from his destination. Crouch told the convicted drunk drivers that there are "predictable consequences" to impaired driving.

Drunk drivers don't think of consequences. With intoxication comes the delusion that somehow you are in complete control when the opposite is true. The severely intoxicated driver feels invincible. However, his or her vision and psychomotor skills are severely challenged.

If you have a problem with alcohol, take action. Seek treatment. When you get intoxicated, you make poor decisions.

For Brian, Kathleen, and Matt, life was short and no choices exist. The convicted drunk driver has choices. Change requires acknowledgement and action; a resolution to never drink and drive.

life, dreams, and accomplishments, drunk drivers will not drive after drinking alcohol.

They will know how Matt took care of then 3-year-old Justin, a severely physically challenged young boy with cerebral palsy, as a primary aid at the Children's Place at the Empire State Plaza and at the Children's Corner at the state Department of Education.

Sam said, "I am sure Matt wants me to (speak at the victims panels), and I also want to be involved and with people who have felt the impact of DWI and are committed to making a difference."

Linda Campion lost her daughter Kathleen, a junior at the University at Albany, to a drunk driver who himself was killed. The man drove on Route 9 in Halfmoon without headlights. Did he think himself invincible?

Linda remembers seeing the driver's body on the roadside before it was covered, his eyes staring blankly into the starry sky. She still can smell the stench of alcohol. Did the driver consider he would take a life, the life of a young woman who wanted to be an assistant district attorney to prosecute drunk drivers? Kathleen had known someone who had killed himself when drinking and driving.

On the night she died, Kathleen had just left Burger King, and

Tax office offers information about Web site, changes in laws

As the new year approaches, the state Department of Taxation and Finance advises taxpayers to get ready now for the upcoming tax season.

The office advises taxpayers to begin organizing records and receipts as well as determining whether 2003 tax returns are vastly different from what they anticipate earning in 2004.

If changes are dramatic, people may need to consult the tax department's Web site at www.nystax.gov, or contact the department's customer service representatives at 1-800-CALL-TAX.

The Web site has information

on how to obtain or download tax forms and determine whether taxpayers qualify for free online New York state tax preparation and e-filing.

Tax filers can also consult the department's catalogue of frequently asked questions.

The FAQ section provides answers to questions regarding estate taxes; gift and prize winnings; sales and use tax; child support enforcement; technical assistance and help with other tax-related matters.

Information about the STAR school tax abatement program; tax help for individuals serving in and in support of the Iraq War;

changes to the state's individual and corporate tax forms is also available online.

Taxpayers looking for detailed information about tuition tax credits or tax credits for homeowners or renters can log on to the department's Web site. From there, they can click on publications and technical bulletins for appropriate information.

Also on the Web site, people can also get information on earned income tax credit qualifications; tax issues related to domestic help; questions and answers on New York state's Farmers' school tax credit; and tax information for non-residents and part-time residents.

Filers should also be aware that changes have been made to the tax law that may benefit them.

Some of those changes include an increase in the deduction for the college tuition tax credit.

New York City residents have a new earned income tax credit.

Long-term health care insurance credit has been increased.

The alternative fuel credit has been extended.

There are new tax breaks for members of the military and militia. Taxpayers will also have an opportunity to contribute to the prostate cancer research, detection and education fund.

Town GOP shouldn't try to make dewatering site a political issue

What an interesting turnabout. The Republican Party of Bethlehem has embraced NIMBY status regarding cleanup of the

Hudson River.

The town Republican chairman's vitriolic letter to the editor carried in *The Spotlight* is full of inaccuracies and distortions. It

ignores the EPA's painstaking effort to explain the process of PCB removal from the Hud-on.

It ignores the success of PCB removal at other sites in the U.S. and the imperative of protecting the health of our fellow citizens. Ignorance is not bliss.

The EPA is solicitous of and sensitive to community input. It is open to advances in the science and engineering of PCB removal and has expressed flexibility in solving problems that will arise.

When the EPA does a project, it does the work, cleans up when it is done, and goes away. The EPA did not cause this problem. GE did. Do not blame the EPA.

The process of site selection has been going on for years. The

present town administration has been in place for months. The GOP letter implies that site selection is a Democratic or environmentalist plot.

Trying to score political points over this issue is grotesque. Our elected officials have been involved in the process of selection. I have seen them ask tough questions and voice the concerns and anxieties of townspeople.

To suggest that town officials, past or present, somehow failed to prevent this is ridiculous. Local officials have influence but not ultimate control over this issue. Do not blame our officials. GE caused this.

PCBs are harmful to the intellectual development of children.

The research data on this persuaded the Medical Society of the State of New York to endorse the cleanup of the Hudson. The dewatering site will be tested to prevent emissions. The children of Bethlehem will be safe.

Unfortunately, children who continue to eat fish out of the Hudson will not be safe until the PCBs are removed. If one isn't persuaded of the benefits of PCB remediation, then consider that PCBs are migrating into the oceans and the food chain and ultimately into the people of Bethlehem.

Fire commissioner is wrong about lack of support

Editor, The Spotlight:

It is sad to see that some people involved with the Delmar fire district refuse to see that the Dec. 14 vote against the proposal was not a vote against the fine job the volunteers do, rather a vote against the lack of public involvement in a \$6.6 million capital program.

Mr. John Smith, a district commissioner, would have a fine second career in a local drama club should he walk away from

the fire district, judging by his quotes in the Dec. 16 *Times Union* article.

He should be aware of a few things that everyone else is already aware of:

According to Mr. Smith, without the funding, the district faces dissolving and merging with adjacent fire districts (Slingerlands and Elsmere). We know this is not going to happen.

If, by chance, it does, Mr. Smith notes that response times

will be an additional 10 to 15 minutes. Today, I walked the 1.1 miles from the Elsmere fire station to the Delmar firehouse, and it took 15 minutes to walk without the assistance of a vehicle with flashing lights. Just my feet.

Furthermore, the public does not "spit on you," Mr. Smith. In a community where 200 people regularly turn out for planning events, it should not have surprised you that the public is concerned with lack of notice and

involvement. It is not a vote against the volunteers, and anyone who voted no will tell you that. Everyone appreciates the work of the volunteers.

And, it is not the "20 cents a day" that concerned voters. You are talking about much the same electorate that voted for a school bond that dwarfed the fire station proposal. Many of the people who voted for that do not even have children in the schools.

I am proud of those who stood

outside on a cold Dec. 14 evening to vote against the bond. I'm sure many of those same people, as well as myself, would have no problem voting for a bond if there were real public involvement and input, not just last minute notice.

Mr. Smith, I suggest that you and the rest of the powers that be go back to the drawing board, and tell everyone about it in advance this time, before asking for \$6.6 million again.

Ask the dentist

Should I have sealants placed on all of my child's teeth?

Sealants are only beneficial for prevention of decay if a tooth has deep pits and grooves. By placing the plastic coating on these teeth it prevents food from sticking in the tooth and ultimately causing decay.

Do sealants last forever?

Sealants often fall out and need to be replaced. The reason they tend to fall out is due to the constant pressures placed on these teeth during chewing. A sealant is not the same as a filling in strength and therefore is not retained the same way. Your child's sealants will be checked at their hygiene appointments every 6 months. Many dentists have office policies to replace sealants at no charge for up to 3 years. Although sealants may not last forever, research shows that they are effective both in cost and prevention.

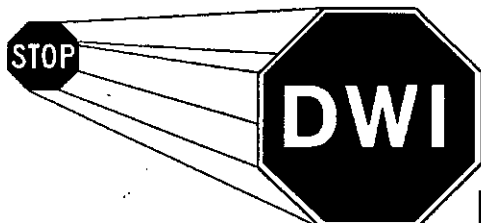

Despite slow start, swim team is optimistic

The Bethlehem boys swim team couldn't have picked two tougher opponents to open its dual meet season with.

After a 101-84 loss to Saratoga Dec. 9, the Eagles were doubled up by defending Section II champion Shenendehowa 63-31 last Tuesday.

Despite the setbacks, Bethlehem coach Doug Gross remains optimistic.

"We have a really good team," he said. "We have quite a few good swimmers. The difference is that there are some new faces at other schools who are just as strong. If you were looking at a normal year ... we would have a really good chance at winning Sectionals."

Bethlehem has a group of swimmers that will be challenging for Section II titles in February. Senior Craig Alfred is strong in the breaststroke and the freestyle sprints, while sophomore Larry Gloeckler should challenge in the 200- and 500-yard

freestyle races. Sophomore Paul Cafiero specializes in the 200 individual medley and the 100 breaststroke, and junior Tim DeGroff is among Section II's top 10 in the 100 backstroke.

"All the guys we have are swimming great," Gross said. "They're either going faster than they did at this point of the season (last year) or are swimming personal bests."

The only hole in Bethlehem's lineup is in diving. With the graduation of defending Section II champion Ben Richardson among others, the Eagles are left with newcomers Tim Pasquini and Drew Facticeau.

"It's the exact opposite of what we had last year," Gross said.

Bethlehem goes after its first win of the season Jan. 6 when it hosts Ballston Spa. The Eagles have six dual meets left on their schedule, including a Feb. 3 showdown with Niskayuna.

"They took these losses hard, but they're pulling together and working hard. They're ready to go," Gross said.

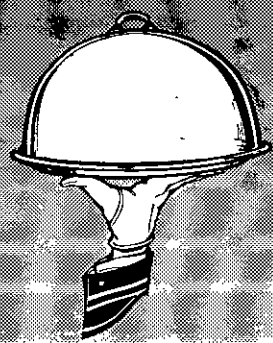

Body image and dieting for the holidays

During the next week, many people will do two things: overeat foods they reserve only for the holidays, and then make a New Year's resolution to lose weight when Jan. 1 rolls around.

Today's fashion advertising would have girls believe that striving for the fantasy images their ads present will make all their troubles disappear. In 2001 a national survey showed that nearly 36 percent of 12th-grade girls thought they were overweight, while only just over 6 percent of them actually were. Put these things together and a lot of diets will begin this January.

If you are one of those considering the diet plans and products on the market next month keep the following tips in mind:

- Quick weight loss on low carb/high protein diets are mostly due to water loss, and eating excess calories does count.

- Liquid diet aids can be helpful for calorie reduction, but should not be used to replace more than one meal per day because you will make no permanent change in eating habits, and weight typically returns.

- There is no scientific evidence that "fat blockers" and other pills will make you lose weight effortlessly, and with such "pills," you have no way of knowing whether they will interact or interfere with important medications your doctor may have prescribed.

Taken to its extreme, dieting can sometimes result in eating disorders such as anorexia and bulimia. In such circumstances, a mental health professional should be contacted immediately.

Medical Center Hospital and later released to police.

Helligrass said the police department is getting an estimate on the kicked-out window, damage he described as "not anything substantial."

That charge carries with it a fine of \$250, and Helligrass said the estimated damage is more than that.

The driver of the vehicle, 24-year-old Tyler S. Metevia of Delmar, suffered injuries as a result of the accident and was treated and released from Albany Medical Center to the Bethlehem Police Department, where he was processed for DWI. Metevia also faces charges of reckless damage to property and several vehicle and traffic infractions.

He was ticketed for those and released, and is scheduled to return to Bethlehem Town Court at a later date.

Griffin faces two felony charges of second-degree assault and third-degree criminal mischief.

He also faces charges of resisting arrest, escape and possession of marijuana. Griffin posted \$10,000 bond and will appear in court at a later date.

In August in an unrelated case, town police used a Taser on an

Bring in 2005 at Albany's First Night celebration

The city of Albany is gearing up for its largest First Night celebration in its 18-year history. On Friday, Dec. 31, downtown Albany will be full of performances and fun activities to say goodbye to 2004 and to ring-in 2005.

"First Night has become an Albany tradition," said Albany Mayor Jerry Jennings. "It's an evening shared with family, friends and the community, and filled with fireworks, music and entertainment is the perfect way to begin the new year."

Activities begin at 2 p.m. and run through midnight when the ball drops and fireworks light up the sky over the Hudson River. Over 200 performances – from children's entertainers, comedy, dance to Irish music – will be staged in 40 indoor venues throughout downtown Albany.

"I find the event real exciting and the public embraces it," said Susan Cleary, public relations coordinator for the city of Albany. "It's a family event from all sides. Number one, there is no alcohol and, number two, it's a family friendly event for all age groups."

Albany was the first city in New York state to hold a First Night. The First Night tradition began in Boston in 1976. This year, First Nights will be held in 121 cities in the United States, Canada and New Zealand.

"The purpose of First Night is to celebrate your community and this is our city's five-block downtown radius," explained Cleary. "The event really brings the city alive."
