

Family waits for word of child

For Janet Rathgens, the anguish and fear in the wake of last month's devastating tsunami hits close to home. In fact, it hits her straight in the heart. Since the disaster, each day begins with a yearning for hope but ends with the same frustration of not knowing the fate of a loved



one, someone dear to her, even though they never met. The loved

ong is an 11year-old Sri Lankan girl named Priyanka Premaratne, who lives with her

family in the island nation's Bedula District, inland from the coast. Since the Dec. 26 disaster, there has been no word of her fate.

"It may be difficult for some to understand, but you can become quite attached to someone you never met," Rathgens said. "We love and care for her as if she were our own.'

Three years ago, Janet and her husband Dave, who live with their two daughters in their Delmar home, decided to sponsor a needy child overseas.

"I wanted to do this to help a child but also to expose my two daughters to someone of another culture and give them an appreciation for what they have and sometimes take for granted," Rathgens said.

Teen sets sights on Olympic spot

Hannah Beresford leads a transitory life.

During the week, the 15year-old is a student at Clayton A. Bouton High School in Voorheesville. But as soon as the school day is done, she's in a car heading south to Tatra Farm North in Clinton Corners, where she trains to become a horse show rider in the jumper division. For good measure, she lives at the farm on weekends and during school vacations. In the summer months, she spends two months out of every winter at Tatra Farm South in Williston, Fla. Hannah said she's gotten used to the constant travel and being away from her mother, Cynthia LaFave; her stepfather. Paul Rapoli: and her father, D. Jonathan Beresford, for long stretches of time.

who served in the Peace Corps and is currently working in Cameroon with the U.S. Foreign Service. She asked her what charity she could count on to spend the greatest portion of her dollar on an individual child and thus make a difference in one person's life.

"I didn't want a lot of my money going into overhead," she said. "So my friend recommended the Christian Children's Fund based in Richmond, Va."

According to Rathgens, sponsors donate a minimum monthly contribution but are free to send additional money or gifts directly to the child and his or her family. The child then writes back and sends a picture. From there, a pen-pal relationship keeps the sponsors and children in touch with each other. The letters often kindle long-lasting ties.

"It's like a home away from home." Hannah said of Tatra Farm North. "It's business during the day, but at night it's more like a family."

"It makes her happy, and it's what she is destined to do," LaFave said. "It's hard, but you have to let her go."

Hannah's riding career has progressed quickly. At age 9, she won the Eastern United States championship

Police had found a quantity of cocaine in his pocket, along with a razor blade with residue on it. Rohloff was sent to Albany County jail without bail.



The office advises taxpayers to begin organizing records and receipts as well as determining whether their 2003 tax returns are vastly different from what they anticipate earning in 2004.

If changes are dramatic, they may need to consult the tax department's Web site at www.nystax.gov or contact the department's customer service representatives at 1-800-CALL-TAX. The Web site has information on how to obtain or download tax forms, determine whether they qualify for free online New York state tax preparation and e-filing.

Tax filers can also consult the department's catalogue of frequently asked questions, which provides answers to questions regarcing estate taxes, gift and prize winnings, sales and use tax, child support enforcement, technical assistant and help with other tax-related matters. 

Collection chronicles years of environmental spats

The construction of Crossgates Mall, the fight to block an incinerator on Cabbage Island in Bethlehem and the preservation of the Pine Bush are all a part of local environmental history that has yet to be written.

Residents interested in such hometown history need only head to the University at Albany's M.E. Grenander Department of Special Collections and Archives to get a look at the tokens and pamphlets that tell those local stories.

This is the sort of history that would not yet be in books," said Amy Schindler, curator of manuscripts.

demonstrated by the popularity of range of state legislative issues. television shows such as "Antiques Road Show" and "History Detective." It's just that they don't always make the connection between their interest and the archives.

Papers and artifacts from environmental activists including Save the Pine Bush, Concerned Citizens Against Crossgates and Bethlehem Work on Waste, as well as the personal papers of the late activist and Guilderland resident Hope Donovan, await researchers. Much of the information has been inventoried online. Most recently, the archives opened 30 years of records from Environmental Advocates of New York. The statewide organization, established in 1969 as Department head Brian the Environmental Planning Keough said that people do have Lobby, was one of the nation's first an interest in such history, as organized environmental groups. The collection adds to the large amount of material that the archives has on public policy, Keough said. Environmental activism may well be considered a hallmark of the second half of the 20th century by historians documenting the period.

The opening of this collection marks a significant addition to a large push, begun in 2000 by university archivists, to preserve environmental history — the battles fought over how much to preserve and how much to develop.

The artifacts of preservationists have proven easier to acquire than those they fought against, Schindler said. Archivists, like historians, are always seeking out both sides of the story, she added.

"We seek to document not just a point of view but an issue," Schindler said.

There's a certain serendipity involved in the work of preserving these moments that make up an

Bethlehem Work on Waste because it took a great deal of networking with environmental activists before archivists even heard of the group, and then the keeper of the papers, Betsy Lyons, after holding on to them for eight years, almost threw them out.


"(Lyons) said she didn't because 'It was just a great little episode of defeating the man,' Schindler said.

Keough said that the archives was lucky to obtain the 30 years of Environmental Advocates' records from file cabinets in the group's basement.

"Thankfully, they didn't recycle them," he joked.

Available to the public at the university's archives and inventoried online are the group's correspondence, meeting minutes, reports, publications, research files and promotional materials. The material covers a

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area's past. People don't always keep their papers, and if they do, they sometimes land in basements or attics, where water and mold can ruin them.

"It's such a cliché that archivists spend all their time in basements, attics and outbuildings. But there's some truth to it," Schindler said.

Other times, people don't realize that their correspondence or meeting minutes might be of interest to anyone.

"It's very much a catch-if-youcan kind of thing," Schindler said.

Case in point, the university almost didn't get the records of

welcome calls from people wanting to donate artifacts or papers, they also reach out to the community, targeting specific areas of interest. Schindler said. In this way, they can build a comprehensive storehouse of material, making it easier for university researchers, students and interested community members to do their work.

In addition to its environmental collections, the state Republican Committee's papers and many artifacts from members of the Rockefeller administration are housed there.

Internet correspondence yields dubious viewpoint

Here's a conundrum. I've been serving as e-mail translator between two senior citizen women whose common interest in genealogy has led them to discover an ancient ancestral tie. One, an aunt by marriage to my mother-in-law, is here in the States; the other is in Germany.

Translating between the two of them has let me keep up with the language that, when I chose it as a major at college, I was sure would be a springboard to something like the diplomatic corps. I never got that far, but did once use German in a job in the tourism industry that was more fun than a person really ought to have been paid for doing.

Nowadays, I only use German with our dog, who, bizarrely,



responds well to commands in that language, strengthening our belief that she is not the Akita/ Lab mix the shelter offered, but a fierce Rottweiler/German shepherd hound.

So helping Doris and Lydia trace their roots has provided an opportunity to brush up on my language skills, and a window onto a different world. It's a window I should be looking through for my own uncle, who also jumped into genealogy when he retired a few years ago, and found a German village our promise, I'll get to tracing our cwn roots. For now, t's enough to be the go-between for two unrelatedto-me women.

It's the stories each person on a family tree can tell that is most interesting, and the stories don't have to be ancient to be gripping. As with most human relations, tracing ancestry can bring up some issues we may not want to face.

Just before Christmas, Lydia in Germany e-mailed an account of her little town at the end of 1944. Although her small town near the Lahr. River was relatively undisturbed during World War II, bridges, a munitions depot, a quary and a train station made it the target of occasional Alled attacks. One attack on a train killed a German woman going to visit her wounded soldier husband in a nearby hospital, leaving their son motherless. Another time, a bomb wrecked a beautiful, - in concentration camps. two-story inn in the village. As the air raid siren had sounded, people

ancestors once forsook for life in had headed for the bomb shelter site after understanding it to say the New World. Someday, I in that inn's basement. Most that Poland had been complicitin survived, climbing out a cellar window to safety in the wake of the attack. Quick-thinking German soldiers at the quarry got two injured people to the safety of the hospital.

> Personal accounts of war are very moving. When I sent the translation on to Doris, I wondered how she had spent the war years in America. Had she waited at home for a husband fightir.g overseas?

I thanked Lydia for sharing the interesting account with me. She replied with a link to a Web site that she said "gave details of the horrible actions of the Americans during World War II.'

In a twinkling, my image of this woman as Mrs. Santa Claus flew out the window, and I had to stop myself from e-mailing back, in all caps, what many Americans think of when they think of Nazi Germany: six million Jews, dead

I clicked off the proffered Web

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the German invasion of it. I'll return someday, with a German-English dictionary to ensure that I read it correctly.

My conundrum is what to think of this woman I only know through e-mail. I want to respect her many years of living, but can't possibly agree with thoughts she's putting forth.

Do Lydia's description of the "horrible actions" reflect the current anti-Americanism that we read is now rampant in Europe? Would she have used those words in the late 1940s, when the Marshall Plan helped the Germans rebuild their cities? Would she have used them in the 1960s, when the number of American troops stationed in Germany formed an intangible wall to counter the one that the Soviet Union built to divide Germany's former capital city, and clarify Europe's new geopolitical lines?

The question goes deeper: would Lydia and her peers have chosen to avoid the horrible acts of the Americans in favor of living in Adolf Hitler's genetically-pure dictatorship?

Was Lydia hinting at a parallel to Iraq, where so many American and Iraqi lives are being lost as America pursues democracy in that country?

Would Iraq be better off with a dictator who built palaces and lived richly while he jailed children who wouldn't fight with him, raped and tortured people, and left most of his country impoverished?

Who's to decide which horrible acts by whom are more horrible?

The only answer that seems certain is that silence is an unacceptable answer. In time, I will get out my dictionary and read Lydia's link very carefully. I will weigh the words I will send to an elderly woman I've never met, as I ask her about her beliefs and the events of her life. I will tell her about Jewish friends and the dignified members of the greatest generation in America. I'll share my belief that the world would be a better place without any brutal dictators, and that my most fervid prayer is that every nation can work toward peace in our lifetime.


As we come up on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, it feels more





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important than ever to speak up. HBO keeps showing "Driving Miss Daisy," and in a good example of how mainstream movies can help impart important lessons to the general populace, the scene where Miss Daisy listens to Dr. King speak while her black driver waits outside with her car proves moving every time it's shown.

Dr. King talks about not just the words of the bad, but the silence of the good.

In a letter from a Birmingham jail, he wrote, "We will have to repent in this generation not merely for the hateful words and actions of the bad people but for the appalling silence of the good people.'

They are words to live by, at any time, but especially as we honor the man who fought so hard and non-violently for peace and equality among the races. We all have an obligation to speak and act out against things that are evil.

As we all enjoy a day off next week, let's remember how lucky to live in a country where we can easily do this.

received Dec. 27, the day go to step two." following the disaster. It had been mailed some time before that.

In it Priyanka, a Buddhist, drew a Christmas tree and wrote, "Merry Christmas and Happy New Year."

"She would send greetings to us on our holidays and we would do the same on Buddhist and observances celebrations," Rathgens said, adding that Priyanka will be 12 on her birthday in March.

After news of the tsunami flooded the press and airwaves, the Rathgens said they were gripped with sadness and fear.

'The hard part is not amounts to less than \$1,000 per knowing," Janet said. "I feel so close to her, as if she were here stretched to feed and care for and one of my own. She is part of our family and we really love and care for her."

For David Rathgens, seeing his wife endure the turmoil is as Priyanka was young and not troubling as fearing for Priyanka's safety. "I wish this wasn't happening," he said. "All I can do is be supportive to Janet and the kids while we wait.'

Janet Rathgens explained that even if Priyanka and her family survived, she feels terrible knowing the difficulties they face in the disaster's aftermath.

"I want to know where they are so I can help them," she said. "Right now I feel helpless without any news of their safety. First, I need to get past step one before I

In addition to waiting, Rathgens, a part-time health teacher at Scotia-Glenville High School, calls the Christian Children's Fund every day hoping for any news, but praying for good news.

"My frustration is with the situation, not with the people I'm other in touch with," she said. "They are very good and patient."

Wimmer, Kelly а communication associate with the fund, reported that the organization has received thousands of calls, hundreds of them daily, from sponsors.

"We report what we know and will immediately call sponsors if we learn that a child that they are


sponsoring perished in the disaster," she said. "We can't imagine how torn apart they must feel. For them, it's like not knowing if their children or grandchildren are safe. So far, we have been lucky in that we have not lost too many of our children."

Wimmer added that concerned donors have given more than \$3 million to the fund in the wake of the tsunami.

Waiting in uncertainty, Janet and Dave Rathgens have decided to buffer their two daughters from their fears.

"I don't want to explain anything in depth to them until I know something," Janet Rathgens said. "When I have definite news, good or bad, I will tell them."

His son was a member of an Army color guard attached to the Pentagon and had helped bury the people killed after a jet hit the Pentagon on Sept. 11. I interviewed him for an article I was trying to write about military families. His father was a helicopter mechanic turned recruiter. He told me about the time he got totally tanked on Czechoslovakian hooch.

It was summer 2002 when I inquired about joining up. At the time I figured, why not? I was working as a bartender/ painter/ pizza delivery guy in Rutland, Vt.,

and had been since leaving a newspaper job. I was making cash, but I was going nowhere. Since Rutland is a hell of a place to be going nowhere, I figured I should get out soon and do it with style.

I admire the discipline, work ethic and system of merit espoused by the military. The Army seemed like a good route, and I am always down for some action. I have a college degree and a background in language. I also like guns. The sergeant told me I'd rate quite well for Military Intelligence.

"No problem," he guaranteed and handed me a brochure. "The leg might be an issue but, remember, your worst enemy is your mouth."

The brochure was for the Defense Language Institute in lovely Monterey, Calif. If I enlisted, and qualified, I could go there for two years of military school. Enrollment should not be a problem. Enlistment incentives were available. If I signed up I could receive a bonus, steady pay and free room and board. The sergeant assured me that I could do nothing but save money.

"And remember the DLI." he reminded. The Army could pay me to learn a foreign language.

"French?" I asked.

"No," the Sargeant replied. "We're not at war with them."

Ouch!

My legs are different lengths and have been since birth. Had they been left uncorrected, the difference could have crippled me. For the entirety of childhood, I wore a stride-evening lift on my left shoe. I was X-rayed often and at age 11, I went under the knife. The surgeon, Dr. Anthony Guidarelli, made an incision about an inch below the cap on each side of my left knee. He drilled a hole at the base of my tibia and another at the top of my femur. He scraped the growth plates from each bone in my left leg so my retarded right leg could catch up. I spent three nights in St. Clare's Hospital and then went back home to Galway. loaded on codeine, with a new set of crutches and a plaster cast. My months.

The Sergeant told me the scars would be the only obstacle between me and Army green. But, no worries, he said. I was otherwise Army raw material. I played rugby. I could run six miles a pace, and I could bench press 200 pounds. That plus a college degree and no criminal history ...Hoooahhh! I shook his hand and walked away smiling. It was time for a drink. I went to the C-street Saloon, ordered a Scotch and soda and gave the Saloonatics details. If I cleared the medical exam I would be bound for Army boot camp in a few months. I could be trained as a soldier/linguist, I told them.

Sanborn is an ex-Marine. He is a Semper Fi guy who spends Nov. 11 chestbutting his buddles and taking long pulls from a bottle of Jim Beam.

Your moron, redneck ass signed up?" he said, reciting a play on "US Army" spelled backwards.

Sanborn was a radio man who spent a nervous three months in the run-up to Kuwait enduring Scud alarms, practicing gas mask drills and trying to cope with the stress of knowing the world's fourth largest army was a few miles from the business end of his M-16. He hated Iraq, he hated sand, and he drank heavily. He tipped me well. Sanborn's Gulf War-I buddy, Big Dave, was due at the Saloon later that day. Sanborn said I'd get it worse from him.

Duck

Big Dave walked into the Saloon and sat near the window. He ordered a Ketel One and cranberry juice. Sanborn, bleary from the Blue, loudly informed him about my choice of the Army. Dave grinned and sipped his drink. He was a John Deere tractor salesman and knew the value of a subtle approach.

"Come here, man. I want to shake your hand," he said and shook it. "Congratulations. Let's have a shot."

Dave and I bumped a Jägermeister. We let the alcoholic licorice slide down our throats and then looked at each other. Pause. One second. Two seconds, Three seconds passed

Dave palmed the back of my skull and shoved my head toward a metal pole that supported the Saloon's roof. I put my hands on the pole, stopped my forward motion and turned to see the same sly grin I had seen before I took the shot. I threw an arm block and tried to catch Dave's wrist, which was like trying to catch a loaf of bologna moving at 30 mph — I couldn't do it. Dave jabbed me in the ribs. He was still grinning

"So you're gonna be cannon fodder?" he said and turned toward the bar. "Oh well, nice knowing you."

Dave was with his brother Steve, who was on extended leave from the Marine Corps in 29 Palms, Calif. The two were bent leg was in the cast for nine on a night of booze, but Steve was also interested in hearing about my decision to enlist. He was a Marine Corps sergeant. Like Dave, he did not like my branch of choice but was less judgmental in discussing it. I told him everything about my reasons for wanting to join the Army — a mix of patriotism, restlessness and financial selfinterest. He nodded. I told him about my surgery and about my short leg. He told me that telling the recruiters was a big mistake. But I should be OK, provided I did not have any screws or metal plates in my body, which I don't-

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Sanborn looked up from his pint of Labatt's Blue and laughed. He thinks Army men are chicken poop, and he said I was chicken pounding on my door. poop for wanting to be one.

"And you'll need to be able to walk like a duck," he said.

Huh?

I had no idea what I was getting into. On the day I was to enlist, I was awakened at 4 a.m. by a

Planner sees no pros in EPA dewatering plan

Editor, The Spotlight:

As a member of the town planning board, I have had the opportunity to hear the pros and cons of many local projects.

A few weeks ago, it was announced that an 80-acre parcel here in the town of Bethlehem will serve as one of two PCB dewatering locations for the EPA's Hudson River PCB dredging project.

The scope of the EPA's dredging project for the Hudson River is unprecedented.

There are many who believe that the dredging project as proposed will create new health risks, and is likely to cause more problems than it solves. There are many unanswered questions about the dredging project and it was recently reported in the Times Union that the EPA has yet to decide how the Bethlehem site will be used.

While the benefits that may result from this project are debatable, the potential negative impacts on the area are predictable.

For town of Bethlehem residents, I believe that there are no pros associated with the use of this site for PCB de-watering.

And yet, where is the interest and concern for this project and the potential impacts it may have on our community? Given comments in the media by officials, and the involvement to date of a very small number of town residents in this process, perhap inevitable is a good word to describe the outcome of the EPA's site selection process.

But surely, a project in our backyards that will process and/ or transfer toxic waste has a much greater potential to negatively impact this town than, say, a new firehall could ever have.

If you're concerned about this community and about the quality of life that we enjoy, I urge you to get involved and to make your voice heard.

The EPA will be holding a public meeting regarding the PCB dredging project on Wednesday, Jan. 19, at 6:30 p.m., at Delmar Reformed Church, 386 Delaware Ave.


Several days prior to her birthday, one of the nurses diagnosed an urgent medical problem with my mother-in-law, who required emergency room treatment for


ceived respectful, kind, skilled, the problem. The care she and loving care and attention from received over the next few days enabled her to attend, and fully enjoy, her birthday celebration.








"Hey man, it's Sergeant Gonzalez. You good to go? You gotta hurry up. We need to be there by 6:30," he said.

It was a two-hour drive from Rutland to Albany, and I was still feeling the effects of victory drinks after winning the softball game for the Saloonatics the night before.

"Uhhhh," I told Gonzalez. "Yeah, give me a second."

We got to Albany right on time. I passed all of the fairly standard tests. I did exceptionally well on the Defense Language Aptitude Battery, a special test given to Military Intelligence candidates. So I was feeling pretty good when a group of us were ordered into a cold room with a linoleum floor room and told to strip to our skivvies. We nervous soldiers-tobe sat in silence, quietly appraising one another. One by one we were called into the medical officer's office. I went in and he looked me over. Teeth, eyes, feet ...OK. No hemorrhoids, very good. But ...

"Say, what are those scars on your knee, son?" he asked.

I forgot all the advice I'd been given about keeping my mouth shut and told the medical officer everything.

"Well, I want to see you do the duck walk," he said.

One of his assistants showed me the duck walk. To walk like a duck, you squat and, without

the air, walk forward. When I squatted to attempt the move, my left knee popped audibly. The doctor looked up. I managed to duck walk for a few paces, and I saw the doctor scribbling in my file.

"That's all. You can stand up," he said. "I can't allow you to enlist yet. I want to see an X-ray of your leg."

It was an anticlimactic end to what I had hoped would be a promising life change. I was Xrayed, and the results showed that there is still a slight difference in the length of my legs. I was denied a medical waiver for enlistment on the grounds that my condition could be aggravated during the rigors of boot camp and active Army duty.

The Sergeant broke the news. He was just as disappointed as I was but assured me there was still a chance for me to join the military.

"You should try to join the Air Force," he said.

So I did, but they wouldn't take me either.

Addendum

The United State's Army is short-handed. Current analysis shows that the military does not have enough people in Iraq and Afghanistan to contain the problems the invasions have created.

Members of the National Guard, many of whom signed up for financial reasons or to gain a

I wonder how many of those luxury auto-owning motorists have put their lives on the line to really support our troops in the way it counts most.

Some have, to be sure, but many have not. Of those, how many would trade their stateside

insecurity of a foreign war zone? Perhaps they have all tried. Perhaps they all have short legs and just couldn't make the cut at MEPS.

What of our politicians — the ones who sent started this country on a path to global war. The current crop — Cheney, Rumsfeld, Wolfowitz, Rice-was largely absent when their own time came to stand and be counted.

Perhaps they have short legs too and couldn't join up.

Perhaps. But I doubt it.

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
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Bernstein program coming to Bethlehem Public Library

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I took my first spin last weekend, and I mean I went for a spin, all the way down the hill. What a feeling it is lying on your back soaring like a rocket. Having experienced the ride of my life, I plan to take my wife with me as I explore all of the local snow tube trails in the Capital Region. Not far away is a variety of tubing parks geared up to entertain families and people of all ages. Take a ride to any of them and catch the thrills.

In the Catskills, Ski Windham operates 14 lanes of down hill fun.

"The cool thing is it requires no special skills or equipment. You just hop on and enjoy the ride," said marketing manager Kirt Zimmer. "You . can ride solo or tie six tubes together for a group run."

This year, Zikmmer said the park's added more snow making equipment to open the park earlier and keep it going later. Tubing is available at the Mountain Top Adventure Park from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Fridays; 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Saturdays and holidays; and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays and the last day of holiday periods. The tubing season is planned through March 27. A two-hour session is \$15, a four-hour session \$20, all day and night is \$25, the last two hours the park is open you can tube just for \$10. On Friday nights from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. the cost is \$12. A family pack (six tickets for a 4-hour session, is \$75. For information see the Web site at www.skiwindham.com.

Not far away from Windham is Hunter Mountain, the first to offer snow tubing in the state. The park features three chutes, each nearly 1,000 feet long and a tube tow to haul you back to the top. There is a minimum height requirement of 42-inches. The cost for a 2-hour session is \$12. On Fridays and Saturdays tubing is available from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. and on Sundays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. He urges anyone looking to ride the tubes to call ahead for reservations as tubing sessions book up quickly. Snow tubing at Jiminy Peak is sold for 90minute sessions at \$12.99 per session, and reservations with pre-payment are recommended, as the tubes sometimes sell out. Call 413-443-4752 ext. 205 for reservations. Children under the age of 4 are welcome to use the children's tubing area, but are not allowed in the regular tubing area. Children 4 to 12 must be accompanied by an adult and may use either the children's tubing area or the regular tubing area.

The times to tube are Friday night from 4:30 p.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday and holidays from 10:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sunday 10:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. Tubing sessions run every 90 minutes from the beginning of operations that day. The last tubing session begins 90 minutes before the resort closes.

Up north there's West Mountain, located not far from Glens Falls and the Northway. To accommodate tubers young and younger, Their Powerade Tubing Park has eight tubing lanes, three advanced 1000-foot long lanes with a 100-foot drop and five gentler lanes only 700 feet long with a 65-foot drop. Next year, West Mountain plans to open a much larger tubing park complete with family tubes similar to white water rafts. Children under the age of 6 are half price with the purchase of an adult ticket. The minimum age for tubing participation is at the discretion of a parent or guardian. All riders regardless of age

or size must ride on their own tube. A 2-hour ticket will cost \$16 and a 4hour ticket runs \$21. For information visit www. skiwestmountain.com.

Closer to home is Willlard Mountain, in Washington County, boasting the three longest tube lanes in the state, each measuring a hairraising 12,000 feet. The tubing park hours are Thursday from 4:30 p.m.

to 9 p.m., Friday 4:30 p.m. to 10 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m. to – 9 p.m. and Sunday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tube rental and lift \$11 for 2 hours and \$16 for 4 hours. Visit www.willard mountain.com for information.

> It's more the merrier if you bring **a** whole group. Many local tubing parks accommodate gatherings ranging from birthday

parties to corporate outings.

"It's not just for kids," said Chic Wilson, owner of Willard Mountain. "We see corporate officers attending conferences dressed in snow suits laughing as they fly down the hill." Many tubing parks also hold special events including a Hawaiian luau taking place this Sunday at Willard.

If you're planning to give it a whirl, be sure to dress warm. Van Dyck says he's seen everything from sneakers and sweat pants to arctic snow wear at Brodie. He, however, recommends dressing with layers, decent outer winter wears and snow pants.

In the Berkshires, Jiminy Peak's tubing park at Brodie Mountain offers three lanes of controllable tubing where riders control both speed and steering.

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"These are specially designed tubes with breaks and limited steering," said tube park manager Jim Van Dyck. Tubers can either zoom or glide down curved trails with turns, humps and bumps taking them 1,000 feet to the bottom. According to Van Dyck, each trail has its own character but neither is any easier or harder than the other.

Maple Ski Ridge, outside ~ Rotterdam, located just minutes from exits 26 or 25A of the NYS Thruway and Schenectady's I-890. If you're looking to save a few bucks, Maple Ski Ridge sponsors charity events such as food drives where customers earn discounts off their ticket prices by making a donation. The tubing park is open for holidays and, school vacations on Jan. 17 and Feb. 21 through 25. and each week Thursday

horses.'

Hannah has two of her own horses that she rides in competitions — Goldfinger, which was purchased for her four years ago, and Jewel, which she got last year.

"The older horse (Goldfinger), has pretty much taught me everything I know" about riding in hose jumping competitions, Hannah said. "Because of him, I was able to get a younger horse (Jewel). She's still a little leery (of jumps), but what we're trying to do is give her a little more confidence.'

Also helping Hannah learn the ropes are two trainers with competition international experience - Tatra Farm coowners Pavel Blaho, a former rider with the Czech Olympic team, and Patricia Garthwaite Towle, a current Grand Prix rider.

"It's a funny thing because she has a very high determination to make it, and you seldom see that in young people," Blaho said. "She is a very dedicated rider, and she is very good with the horses.'

"The amount that she's learned here is incredible." LaFave said of Hannah's time at Tatra Farm, "and the way they've taken care of her here ... they really took her under their wing.

LaFave said Hannah has been fascinated with riding horses since she was old enough to talk. In a letter she sent to Hannah's teachers at the Voorheesville schools, LaFave wrote that her daughter was pleading her case at the age of 4.

"I thought she was way too young to get on a horse, and I never really thought she was serious about it until she said, 'Mommy, I really want to ride.' LaFave said.

Hannah said her desire to ride came from watching her mother when she was an active rider.

"I think that had an immense thing to do with that," Hannah said. "Growing up, I was surrounded by horses."

Hannah's early success on the Welch ponies circuit increased her desire to move up into the show jumping division.

"It was really exciting," she said of her days on the Welch ponies circuit. "At the time, I think I was too young to understand what a big deal it was. When I look back, it's pretty amazing.'

Making the transition to the jumping division was easy for Hannah. In fact, she said, she may have been a little too bold about

"I don't want to jinx myself," she said. "I don't want to say I'm definitely going to make it, but I think it's possible I can get there.'

Hannah will get a taste of international competition later this week. She is flying to Puerto Rico Wednesday to participate in an international invitational show.

"I think it will be different," she said. "The riding style in Puerto Rico is a bit different. They're known to be more extreme in their riding — more daring."
