Racism rears head at BCBS

A series of apparently unrelated racial incidents within a matter of days of each other before April break at Bethlehem Central High School prompted district officials to hand down a number of five-day suspensions and send a letter home alerting parents to a situation Superintendent Les Loomis said is representative of society in general, but not tolerable in the school district.

"To the best that I can determine, the three incidents were separate altogether, but it indicates a certain presence of racial attitudes and a certain lack of sensitivity," Loomis said. "A vast majority of our students are good people that show sensitivity. There are students or groups of students who don't show the same kind of respect."

In one incident, two students, of different races and genders, became involved in a conflict, which eventually escalated to an assault and use of a racial slur. The conflict apparently had no racial undertones to begin with, Loomis said.

A female student assaulted a male

Doctor serves U.S. at home & abroad

When Delmar native Gregory Mark Winn enlisted in the Army, he saw it as a way to pay for medical school. Nineteen years later, the doctor is still in the Army.

"The military has treated me well," Winn, a lieutenant colonel who earned a Bronze Medal in Operation Iraqi Freedom, said.

The son of retired dentist Gerald and his wife Ginny Winn, Winn and his wife Karen live in Vienna, Va., where he works at an outlying clinic of Family Health Care Center of Fairfax. Winn, 49, works with the families and dependents of active duty military members.

"My job changed when I went to Iraq," Winn, who's been home for about a year, said.

Winn was with the first wave of soldiers in Iraq, where he was a civilian affairs physician. Part of the time, he worked on emergency cases in a combat support hospital (CASH), and part of the time, he escorted civilian patients – including prisoners of war – to a hospital in Baghdad.

The CASH was a mobile unit that worked out of tents. "It supported a pharmacy, a lab, radiology service, surgical service, and an intensive care unit," the soft-spoken Winn said. That

unit was outside of Baghdad and generally, Winn worked from about 7 a.m. until noon in the emergency room. In the ER, physicians treated people regardless of who they were.

Winn took care of nearly every imaginable sort of casualty: those injured by car bombs, rocket-propelled grenades, or people burned by blown-up munitions. Winn said the car bomb injuries increased as more insurgents arrived in Iraq from places like Syria, Egypt and Iran.

Winn has served in combat situations in Somalia and Haiti and been on a number of mission trips, but said the carnage in Iraq was worse than those he had previously experienced. Working conditions in the desert were also tough. "It got hot in the tents," Winn said. "During the hottest part of the summer,

it was 138 degrees outside; and 116 in the ER tent. Some days were hard, and others felt like it was OK," Winn said it felt like there was enough medical support for the situation.

In addition to his hospital duties, Winn worked with a group of Iraqis to re-establish a rundown clinic 18 miles outside of Baghdad. The clinic had had a rock and dirt floor. After getting some things up and running, the locals thanked Winn and his group with a special meal.

"They served us lamb, chicken, Coke, flat bread," Winn said. "If you were to go to a farm community in the United States, that's what it was like there, only nobody spoke English."

Winn worked side by side with a lot of British, Australians, and people from East Bloc countries like Georgia. "As a member of the military, it's not my position to project policy," he said. "But we did well at what we set out to do."

Winn's impressions were that Iraq needs food and water, and the government that had been in disarray was improving.

"Ninety-eight percent of the Iraqis wanted us there," he said. "There's no question in my mind that we set them free."

Winn graduated from Bethlehem Central High School in 1974 and attended Wheaton College in Illinois before going on to medical school. He chose family practice so he could address a broad scale of health care and work in the Third World. "It's worked out well," Winn said. "I don't get tired of anything."

The Winns have six children between them: Joshua, 23; Jesse, 20; Elena, 17; Andrew, 17; David, 14; and Kathryn, 4.

Pristine G'mont golf course up for grabs

The environmental fate of a world-renowned golf course in Glenmont is up in the air, after the owners have decided to put the property up for sale late last year.

The course's superintendent, Patrick Blum, wants to keep Colonial Acres as is, a virtual environmental antithesis of what many believe makes golf courses harmful to the environment, after going through an extensive application and review process that resulted in an Environmental Protection Agency Performance Track certification in 2004, the only golf course to receive such a certification in the world.

The nine-hole course is also certified through Audubon International, an organization that

Literacy volunteers need tutors for program

Nearly 20 percent of the adult population in Albany and Schenectady Counties are reading at or below a fifth-grade reading level.

Literacy Volunteers Mohawk Hudson serve the two counties and are always looking for adult volunteers.

The organization serves about 500 people out of an estimated 60,000 whose reading, writing and speaking skills are not where they should be.

Volunteers are needed for two programs: one that serves English-speaking adults with poor reading skills and another to non-English-speaking adults who are interested in improving their

knowledge of and skills in the language.

Volunteers are typically asked to commit to at least one year of tutoring; about one to two hours a week after completing a 15-hour training course.

Tutors are matched up with students in a geographically convenient fashion.

No. 1 animal league supporter gone, but not forgotten

For many, there was a noticeable absence at Thursday's Whiskers Animal Benevolent League annual gala.

Dorothy Thomas, 82, worked the Monday morning shift for upwards of a decade before she became ill with cancer and passed away this winter.

Thomas never missed a shift until she was admitted to the hospital, said Whiskers' co-president Carol Hall.

Depending on whom you talk to, Thomas was many things: an animal lover capable of delivering one-liners, a leader, a churchgoer, a veritable Ms. Fixit.

Nancy Smith, who worked Monday morning shifts with Thomas at Whiskers, a no-kill, all-volunteer rescue shelter for cats, recalled a trip she took with Thomas' son, David, to his mother's assisted living facility to move her car after she had passed away.

"We had to knock all of this snow off of her car, because it had been sitting there for a couple of months," Smith, who spoke at Thomas' memorial service, explained. "In the backseat, there was this huge, No. 10 tin can of coffee. I shook it, you could hear all the things rattling around. I thought, 'Jackpot!'"

When Smith opened the canister, there was no money, but perhaps a treasure that lends insight into Thomas' heart.

Smith had laid her hands on scores of tiny plastic parts, knobs, handles and screws — all spare parts to broken cat carriers that Thomas had assumed responsibility for fixing.

Every week, she'd take one or two home, scrub them down and bring them back clean, Smith said, noting that that's probably her responsibility now.

"But I don't do nearly as good a job as Dorothy did," Smith admitted. "She was a character that way."

Thomas continued working until she was too tired to do so. She was diagnosed with cancer in August, Smith said.

There were no excuses for Thomas, Hall said.

"I know women one-third of her age," Hall said. "The tiniest thing, littlest excuse and they were off their shift. But not Dorothy."

Thomas, who had been a nurse at Ellis Hospital in her professional life, ruled her shift

with "an iron hand as much as an 80-year-old woman could," Hall said.

Smith, who began volunteering for Whiskers after her retirement about 10 years ago, remembers that she first started out on the Monday afternoon shift.

She always wanted to meet whoever worked Monday mornings because, Smith said, the place was spotless, not unlike Thomas' own home, and all put together when she came in. Years later, Smith would not only meet Thomas, but would come to be friends with her, a woman much her senior.

"We got along great," Smith said, noting Thomas' tendency to get peeved at careless disorder or general sloppiness at Whiskers.

Every Monday, midway through their shift, Thomas and Smith, the "cat ladies" to the men behind the counter, would go for lunch to Bob and Ron's Fish Fry on Central Avenue, but never until noon, Smith said.

Her choice was always a sure bet, for the most part.

"She'd always get a fry with no roll and a milkshake, either chocolate or strawberry," Smith recalled, smiling. "The guys in the back would place bets on what flavor Dorothy was going to order. She never knew, it went right over her head."

Smith said she could always count on a loud grunt of approval from the winning bettor.

Thomas was active at McKownville United Methodist Church.

Smith recalled a story one of her fellow church members told at Thomas' memorial service.

Thomas made a dish for a cultural night at the church, which featured a potluck dinner with dishes from different countries and cultures.

"So Dorothy made her dish and comes in with it and the man asked her what culture it was

from," Smith said.

"Montana!" Smith said Thomas answered.

Thomas had animals all her life, including a horse, cats and dogs, while she lived on about 9

acres of land in the country off Johnston Road. Her husband, Dave, had been a pilot in World War II and had died many years before, Smith said. The animals had all died late in Thomas' life, meaning none were left behind when she passed away.

"We always encouraged her, 'just get another cat,'" Smith said. "But she wouldn't. Maybe she had

a premonition herself."

Thomas' son was an underwriter for Thursday's event, in memory of his mother, who attended the event every year.

The annual Barbara Delaney Memorial Humanitarian Award was presented to firefighter Jim Hilton and foster mom Kara Mueller.

David Golub of the Golub Foundation received the Community Humanitarian Award for its commitment to the shelter and its cause, Hall said. Whiskers consumes almost 500 cans of food, 50 pounds of dry food and 200 pounds of litter each week. Price Chopper delivers regular shipments of food and litter to the shelter.

Hall calls the shelter a sanctuary for cats, and if the volunteers are remotely like Thomas, it's easy to see why.

Even after her death, people remember her with a smile.

"I love talking about Dorothy. I really do," Smith said.

Garcia's Tacqueria gets go-ahead from board

Garcia's Tacqueria got all but the official stamp of approval from the planning board last Tuesday, as discussion touched on topics both physical and philosophical.

Eventually, the board approved the plan as it was proposed, with a colorful awning and lighting scheme, with board members agreeing that the take-out restaurant would be a great addition to Elmsere.

The vote was 6-1 for the business that is proposing to move into the vacant deli next to My Place and Co. on Delaware Avenue.

The board had seemed about evenly divided about whether it was appropriate to attempt to sway the applicant for the tacqueria, Rick Lamperelli, who has owned the full-service Garcia's on Central Avenue for more than 20 years, to use more muted colors in parts of his scheme, particularly two bright red pillars.

"It turned out great," Lamperelli said after the vote. Later, noting the town's comprehensive plan that has been drafted but not yet adopted, Lamperelli said he hopes his business will be an example for development on Delaware Avenue.

"Businesses want (to do business on) a good-looking commercial corridor," Lamperelli said. "My hope would be that this is what people would point to as what they're looking for, this level of fit and finish and creativity."

The project made its way to the planning board from the building inspector because of the proposed facade changes. When some discussions moved toward potential parking problems, board member Dan Odell put on the brakes.

"I think we've gone far afield on this particular application,"

Odell said. "We've gone outside the bounds to what the inspector referred us to. We're wading into waters here and I can't see the bottom and that makes me very uncomfortable."

Odell said if the project put the health and safety of residents or pedestrians at risk, then he would speak up.

Aesthetic design standards may or may not result from the comprehensive planning process, but the board was divided on whether the board has the right to impose them on an applicant whose project lay on the cusp of the possibility.

"I don't want to get into the color thing. They have a better understanding of the flavor they want to add to the facade," said board member Brian Collier. "I like that they don't just want to slap up another neon sign. Let's give them a building permit."

Board members Kathy McCarthy, Thomas Cotrofeld,

Christine Motta and chairman Parker Mathusa believed it was the board's responsibility to at least discuss the aesthetics and aspects of the project.

After saying she thought the business would be an improvement over what's there, board member Christine Motta said: "We'd be remiss not to express our opinions on what could be done that would make the proposal better or more attractive to the town."

In the end, McCarthy was the only member to vote against the proposal.

Some board members questioned the need for 14 gooseneck lamps that would hang over the roof, Motta and Cotrofeld noting that the much longer Central Avenue facility has 13 lamps.

Dan Dembling, an architect from Dembling & Dembling Architects in Albany that specializes in revamping

buildings that held previous businesses, said he is proposing lower wattage lights at the Delmar facility, accounting for what some planning board members believed to be a high number of lamps for a smaller store.

Board members agreed the scrutiny was based on the store's location.

"If it's on 9W, it's not an issue," said Mathusa.

Lamperelli will not be in front of the planning board again, though he is still awaiting final approval from the building department on building elevation drawings with the final changes to the facade.

He was set to begin orders for paint and other materials Monday, in hopes of opening the new tacqueria in June.

Worst-case scenario, he said, residents can be eating tacos by Monday, July 4.

Principal returns to elementary roots

Armed with a newfound knowledge of the difficulties elementary students and their families face progressing from the lower grades to middle school, Bethlehem Central Middle School Principal Dave Ksanznak can focus on what needs to be done to ease that transition.

Ksanznak will face his own transition this summer, when he leaves his post at the middle school on July 1 to head back to his roots to become principal of Hamagrael Elementary School.

Ksanznak started his career teaching at Glenmont Elementary School and was principal of Clarksville Elementary School for three years before moving to the middle school, where he's concluding a three-year stint.

He said his interest lies in

elementary education.

Cindy D'Angelo retired as Hamagrael principal after being on an extended medical leave.

"I had had an interest in returning to elementary education," Ksanznak said. "Elementary positions don't open up that often. Usually, when someone is named principal of an elementary school, they stay put for many years. I knew if I didn't take this opportunity, there wouldn't be another opening, possibly, for quite some time."

According to Ksanznak, who requested the transfer in March, now there won't be another opening anytime soon at Hamagrael, where he plans on staying put for a long time.

The transition from fifth grade to sixth grade is always an issue with families, Ksanznak said.

"They're going from one teacher all day long to eight different teachers in a day, with a whole different class," he said. "I certainly want to focus on how to

make that transition easier for kids, and parents, as well. Sometimes it's a bigger adjustment for (parents), coordinating homework time with eight different teachers."

Ksanznak expects to utilize the school's Web site and maintain a more consistent dialogue with parents than is possible at the larger middle school, to help achieve smooth transitions.

There are obvious differences between the elementary and middle school environments, each that adds to the stress, sometimes, of growing up, Ksanznak said, noting more activities and sports, new friends and classmates from different elementary schools and parts of town, a bigger environment in general and even newfound independence.

A search for a new principal at the middle school has been under way since at least the beginning of April, and an announcement of the new appointment is expected by June.

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Family ties bring out best in family's tolerance

Some people are so easy to be around that you don't realize how lucky you were to have them living right in your backyard until opportunity calls them to another place.

That's what it's like with Caitlin, Michael and Tadhg, my husband's sister, her husband and their son, who recently moved to Washington, D.C., for the job of a lifetime. Their change echoes the one we made when our older son came up on school age, the same age that Tadhg is now.

When the excitement of New York City wore out and we headed north to really trench ourselves in the child-rearing phase of our lives, being closer to family was a huge draw.

We cut the time to visit my family in Burlington, Vt., in half when we moved to the Capital District 10 years ago and landed just minutes from Chris' mother and Caitlin and Michael.

"Well, I'll be honest with you," my father said to my mother-in-law at the first Easter we celebrated upstate. "We're jealous as hell of you."

Gathered around the dining room table my father had just finished building for us, in the rented ranch house our then 2- and 4-year-old children had nicknamed The Little Red House, we all laughed.

We all won by our move to this area, and it continues to surprise me how much I've liked being so close to family. It doesn't seem like it was so very long ago that I was in such a hurry to cut the ties to the family that had held me so close for so long.

I needed to see the bigger world! I needed to make my own mark! I needed to boldly go where no one in my family had gone before!

Thankfully, the people who love me the most loosened the ties enough that I didn't have to break them. Regardless of the thinking of famous writers, it can be awfully reassuring to go home again — if only for a visit.

And it's a comfort beyond measure to take our children home again, to be with people who love them just because they exist.

As our children grew, our homes became the focal point for holiday gatherings. When Christopher was born 15 years ago this May, my husband made a unilateral declaration that he insisted came from his own paterfamilias.

"Christmas is for children, and we won't travel at Christmas anymore," he said. "Everyone is welcome to have Christmas with us. If they prefer to have Christmas in their own homes, that's fine, and we won't be hurt. Everyone needs to do what works best for them."

It's that not being hurt that I have come to admire so very much in his family. Their genuine fondness and resulting tolerance for one another seems an anomaly in a time and country that seems to pride itself on dysfunctional families. Chris is the oldest child in his family; his sister who now opens her beautiful Irish home to us every summer but who lived in a Manhattan apartment at the time of the Great Christmas Proclamation only gently reminded Chris that their father's offer of a place to celebrate Christmas had been a house, not a two-bedroom, seventh-floor apartment.

Our ranch house gave us all a little more holiday space and more than one McCarthy abode for overnight purposes, since Caitlin and her mother lived nearby. That left Timmy to good-naturedly point out that he lived in the Cosmo Mecca of the whole world, yet spent more time burning up the Amtrak route to the Capital District than any of us did coming to visit him in Brooklyn.

Moving here let our boys strengthen their ties to Nana, Aunt Caitlin and the man they called "Michael the Man" until Caitlin and Michael's marriage gave him the proper moniker of "uncle." Sleepovers at their apartment were a great treat, and when they bought a house in Pine Hills, the attic became the boys' special abode. Blessed with patience that I wouldn't acquire if I had five lifetimes to try, Caitlin and Michael lavished our children with attention. The four of them pitched tents in their attic; played "predator and prey" with them; invented "the food wars" (if you could only have one of two foods for the whole rest of your life, would it be...and they'd pair together impossible-to-choose-from foodstuffs like chocolate

there was somebody to call regardless of the time.

Only a great opportunity could make the dissolution of such a tight net bearable. When the incredibly talented Michael got a job with *The Washington Post*, we focused only on the joy we felt for the opportunity they'd been handed.

"But I'll miss them so much," Cormac said and we all blinked back tears.

The great thing about our mobile society is that it's easy to jump in the car and make the trek to visit them this spring. Harry Potter on tape made the distance from Capital District to Capital District bearable and it was worth every minute when we pulled into the driveway of the house Caitlin

can affliction that leads us to all have food for 10 if five are expected, and whipped up the bacon and eggs that we lingered over as we plotted our days' sightseeing.

Washington's Metro looks alarmingly clean to Chris and me, who fondly recall the graffiti and grime of New York's subway system in the 1980s. The Mall always wows me and led by Tadhg's enthusiasm, we headed for the carousel outside the Smithsonian and the Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum. We staged a family picture with cutouts of the Wright Brothers,

chip cookies or oatmeal raisin cookies) and formed their own band, NKL and Nefu.

Five years ago, Caitlin went into labor with their son Tadhg and our boys went to bed reluctantly.

"Wake us when the baby's here, no matter what time," they insisted. They smiled in sleepy delight at 6 a.m. on Dec. 13 when I told them they had a boy cousin.

It was our turn to have sleepovers with a little baby and marvel at how quickly time had passed, turning our own boys from babies who weighed nothing to the sizable people in front of us. Our two families formed a safety net that Nana helped hold together until she retired to Ireland. When a child was sick, a grown-up needed to go to the emergency room, and when the unthinkable happened and Timmy was taken from us all,

looked at John Glenn's capsule and wondered how he'd even stood the cramped space, and laughed at what looked to us like gold foil around the replica of the Eagle that landed on the moon in 1969.

While my kids loved the flight simulator best — rolls and dips and enough maneuvers to make Christopher advise his younger brother to not give up the day job — it's the sense of emotional history that I like in Washington the portrayal of America's greatness.

"One small step for man, one giant leap for mankind," ran through my head as I gazed at the models of those first moon travelers.

After dreaming of space, we headed for the capital's newest monument, the World War I Memorial. We posed in front of the Vermont pillar so we could send a photo to my grandmother as a reminder of my grandfather's service in the Navy during World War II. We stood at the marker that proclaimed "Here we mark the price of freedom," and hummed the NKL and Nefu song that our family's best-loved musicians had written last May when we had spent Memorial Day — the opening weekend of the monument — in Lake Placid.

"Though we may miss the one we love, we remember how they changed the world," the chorus goes.

We miss Caitlin, Michael and Tadhg, but distance is insurmountable when there are people you love so much. Our time together leaves our children with the legacy of family, so that when they move forward to change the world, they'll know they've got good back-up.

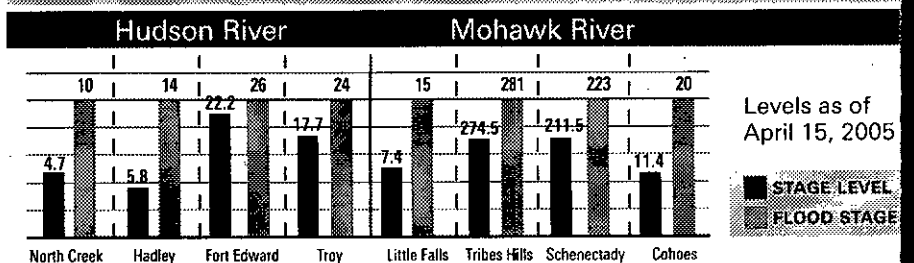

Kids enjoy Barn School at Indian Ladder Farms

In the old days, vacations from school in the country meant work on the farm. Knowing the importance of farming as our source of food and other necessities, the folks at Indian Ladder Farms in Voorheesville have put together an extraordinary program to teach children about agriculture while raising money to provide better farming in poverty stricken areas.

"The Barn School, as we call it, teaches kids about natural farming and its importance to the earth's limited food supply," said Laurie Ten Eyck, retail manager for Indian Ladder Farms. The program began last year and was a success, Ten Eyck added. This year's first session took place April 18 through 22. Two more sessions are scheduled for August.

Children attending the Barn School help feed and care for livestock at Indian Ladder Farms while learning about global hunger and sustainable agriculture.

In addition, the children attending the summer sessions will learn to speak basic Spanish words and phrases. Guests come to the Barn School each day to speak to the children on subjects ranging from beekeeping, to working with wool, to farm animal veterinary care.

Special programs in April included a presentation by Fred DePaul, a sheepherder from Plymouth, Vt., who, with the children's help, sheared two sheep with an antique hand-cranked sheepshearer dating from 1900. He talked to the

children about the importance of sheep and their wool.

"It's really nice when I get a good group of kids," he told them. "Some groups hoot and holler and scare the sheep."

The following day, Mary Oates of the Spinning Room in Altamont taught the children how to card wool, spin with drop spindles and even try to spin with a spinning wheel.

Other demonstrations included "Good Bugs Bad Bugs," an introduction to pest management, a beekeeping

No place for racism

Recent racial harassment incidents at Bethlehem Central High School triggered surprise, shock, sorrow and even embarrassment that we are living five years into the 21st century, and some of our children are still acting as if the Civil War was still going on.

Bethlehem and some of our other suburban school districts are considered among the best in our coverage area. The kids are smart, do well in Advanced Placement courses and the majority end up in prestigious colleges throughout the U.S. and abroad.

We believe part of the problem rests on our own suburban shoulders. Many districts have few if any black faculty, and black students represent a very small percentage of the student body.

If these kids are being targeted by several students that are white, we can only assume that somehow the white children are being influenced at home or within their peer groups.

The Bethlehem school district acted swiftly, and we think accurately, after the incidents occurred at the high school. Students involved in the incidents were suspended and some will face a superintendent's hearing.

Still, that won't solve the underlying racial harassment issue or provide students with appropriate role models and lack of diversity in the schools. We received only one letter from a parent concerned about the overall problem of racism, but the district sent out a mailing to the entire BCHS community. The point is, why aren't more parents concerned enough to express outrage by writing to *The Spotlight* or other local newspapers?

Racial harassment should not be an issue in 2005, but it apparently is for some students and likely some adults in suburban school districts. What a horrible message these kids are buying into. In one of the recent incidents, several BCHS students went so far as to make a rap music CD containing numerous racial slurs and brought it in to school.

What were these kids thinking? This goes way beyond schoolyard fracas. Have we learned so little from the lessons of history that we can dismiss these problems with "Well, kids will be kids?"

We think that a good deal of bridge building is needed to get to the root of racial incidents and eradicate them forever. We as local communities must take a firm stance against any and all racist incidents. We must also get this message across to our children so that the scourge of racism is wiped out in our homes and in our schools in our workplaces and in our lives.

Aunt Selma's Passover pointers

The writer lives in Delmar.

In late March I called my Aunt Selma to check in on her Passover plans. "I only have two seconds to talk to you," she told me. Two seconds? Our normal conversations are so long that my cell phone battery gives out and even then I choose to connect the electric charger and continue talking. I shudder when I remember the long-distance bills before the advent of "unlimited evening and weekend minutes."

"My toaster broke," she explained, "and your cousin is coming to take me shopping." I confirmed that she was referring to her toaster oven, an appliance she has kept so clean that even after decades of use it shines like new. This is in contrast to my toaster oven, dulled by grease and weighed down by a permanent crumb collection.

"I can't get just any toaster," my aunt said, "I need one that doesn't weigh too much because it has to go on top of the washing machine."

To make sense of this comment, one needs to visualize my aunt's tiny galley kitchen in her second-floor Queens apartment. It's no more than 10 feet long by 6 feet wide, and that includes the counters, a sink, an oven, a refrigerator and a washing machine. Open space is only a strip about 8 feet long by maybe 2 feet wide.

At first I didn't understand her quandary. Surely her washing machine could withstand the weight of even the heaviest toaster oven. Then I realized what she meant: the washing machine doubles as counter space, so when she needs to do laundry she has to lift the toaster and move it someplace else.

"So your aunt is going out to weigh toasters," she said, employing her oft-used habit of referring to herself in the third person.

Alas, our Passover discussion was delayed.

My aunt and I haven't had a Passover Seder together in many years, but we always chat be-

forehand about our preparations and menus. "I made about 11,365 matzo balls, but ate a good number as I was going along," she'll tell me.

In an area smaller than my front hallway my aunt prepares amazing feasts. She is an excellent cook and she caters to everyone's special needs and desires. "This one's diabetic, that one's allergic to gluten, and of course, there have to be meatballs for the grandson."

For example, the recipe says to boil the cabbage for about 10 minutes. What it doesn't say is: "Don't boil the cabbage too long or the leaves will fall apart when you try to peel them. If it's not boiled long enough, the leaves will be too stiff and you won't be able to fold them. Sometimes after you peel the leaves you'll need to return them to the pot of hot water to soften them."

There are usually multiple selections for the main dish: turkey, meatballs, stuffed cabbage. Her offerings are delicious, and she makes cooking look so effortless. One year she announced, "I think I'll also serve veal chops tonight." And she pulled open the broiler drawer, put in a pan lined with foil, tossed in the frozen veal, covered the meat with sauce and left it to cook. It was delectable!

One staple we both serve is homemade chicken soup with matzo balls. I make my soup in a 12-quart soup pot, a gift I received from Aunt Selma several years ago. I cherish this cookware so much that I still store the pot and its lid in their original plastic packaging, so as to avoid stray scratches.

On select years, when I can build up the motivation, I make stuffed cabbage. I make it using the directions my aunt provided during a telephone conversation, and I still have the scrap of newspaper where I jotted down the ingredients. I recently submitted the recipe for inclusion in a Passover cookbook my synagogue compiled. It's really my version of her recipe. After preparing the dish for half a century I'm pretty sure she no longer measures ingredients, if ever she did.

In the cookbook entry, entitled "Aunt Selma's Turkey-Stuffed Cabbage," I attempted to provide as much detail as possible to prospective cabbage stuffers. After all, folks using the recipe won't be able to call my beloved aunt for assistance. So I feel badly that some information is missing. For example, the recipe says to boil the cabbage for about 10 minutes. What it doesn't say is: "Don't boil the cabbage too long or the leaves will fall apart when you try to peel them. If it's not boiled long enough, the leaves will be too stiff and you won't be able to fold them. Sometimes

after you peel the leaves you'll need to return them to the pot of hot water to soften them."

The recipe also needs the following warning: "Fighting with cabbage leaves after 9 p.m. is hazardous to your health. Please use this recipe during daylight hours." The prep time of mixing the meat, boiling the cabbage, stuffing the cabbage, and mixing the sauce, is followed by two hours simmering on the stove. If you add the time it takes my husband to clean up the mess I've made in the kitchen, you can see this is a significant commitment.

Aside from the Seder nights, meal times are a challenge throughout the eight-day celebration. Passover's list of forbidden foods includes bread, pasta, rice and legumes. You can make a tuna-on-matzo sandwich, but it's not a highly portable lunch. And about midway through the holiday, when you're

not sure if your digestive tract will survive any more matzo and you can't face another hard-boiled egg, you really start to appreciate the plight of our ancestors who spent 40 years wandering in the desert.

Passover is a celebration of the Jews' escape from slavery in Egypt and the religious and personal freedoms we enjoy today. As a child I didn't fully comprehend the significance of these freedoms. Nor was I willing to taste stuffed cabbage. And I was a bit wary of Aunt Selma. Over time I grew to love and appreciate all three.

My 8-year-old daughter won't eat cabbage, but she does participate in the Seder. Rachel appreciates the tradition of our homemade Passover felt-board story books like *Matzo Ball Moon* and *The Passover Parrot*, and the giant stuffed dog she once got as a prize for finding the afikomen, the hidden matzo (she named him Matzah.)

In *Matzo Ball Moon*, the grandmother arrives, pulls two pots out of her suitcase and begins making matzo ball soup. Each family member sneaks a matzo ball before dinner and there is none left for grandma when the meal is served. Of course, Bubbie doesn't mind. As she says, "As long as my family enjoys, I enjoy."

I picture myself, many years in the future, arriving at my daughter's house with my soup pot from Aunt Selma and my giant felt board in tow. Together, Rachel and I will roll the matzo balls and drop them into the boiling water.

For now, I will practice making potato kugel, a dish I tried for the first time this year. Although I followed her recipe, it just didn't taste like my aunt's. Perhaps I need to take a trip to Queens. If there's any leftover kugel, I'll reheat it in her enormous new toaster oven.

Community must take active role in combating racism

Editor, The Spotlight:

Our community is facing a moment of truth.

When I first lived here in the 1950s, hate crimes were perpetrated against black families. Intolerance was tolerated or ignored. Bethlehem was not an inclusive community.

If many of us think times have changed, then we need to take a dispassionate look at recent events.

Over the past several weeks, "hate crimes" have been perpetrated at our high school. These "crimes" — racial epithet scrawled on a car; racial epithet used following a fight and hate materials taken by students to the school and shared with others — were detailed in a letter (April 13: Dr. Loomis et. al.) sent by the school administration to parents.

The letter cites suspensions for the students, and indicates the administration will "initiate a conversation with student leaders and representatives to plan programs and activities designed to unify the school in support of respect and diversity."

The law as it relates to "hate crimes" is new law. It was not passed until July 10, 2000. ("Laws of New York, 2000, Chapter 107: TITLE -Y- HATE CRIMES ACT OF 2000, ARTICLE 485: HATE CRIMES). I'd like to quote a relevant portion:

"A person is guilty of aggravated harassment in the first

degree when with intent to harass, annoy, threaten or alarm another person because of (the) a belief or perception regarding such person's race, color, (religion or) national origin, ancestry, gender, religion, religious practice, age, disability or sexual orientation, regardless of whether the belief or perception is correct, he or she..."

These recent acts did not — in the judgment of local law enforcement officials — rise to the level of hate crimes, as defined by New York state.

The students weren't charged; the police responded in other ways, and the administration has promised to "plan programs and activities designed to unify the school in support of respect and diversity."

I am writing to express my support and appreciation for the actions of our school administration and our police officers. I strongly encourage all taxpaying members of our community to be engaged with, review and follow these proceedings.

I'm suggesting this because we must make sure that such acts do not recur here. I would like us to do all we can so that we do not find ourselves facing shocking headlines about more violent acts. It seems prudent to me that our entire community come together to take a public stand against any and all activity based on prejudice.

Many agree that student behavior reflects parental attitudes and actions. This issue

is not just the school's issue. A community that doesn't come out clearly against such attitudes will be seen as tacitly promoting such behavior.

It is time for us all to make Bethlehem a "hate-free zone."

I propose that the entire school community, business community, our law enforcement professionals, our emergency responders, our municipal leaders and institutions, our school volunteer groups, our civic organizations and our homeowners' associations join in a collaborative effort that cuts across all lines to unanimously proclaim Bethlehem to be a community that welcomes diversity, insists on tolerance, and moves swiftly to counter any manifestation of hatred.

There are proven models for intervention strategies available for community education and action. Some of the best are made available by such groups as the Southern Poverty Law Center. Study and teaching materials are available for downloading and duplication at www.splcenter.org/

center/torg/toler.jsp.

Grants may be available for efforts proposed by local groups. Some resources may be at hand, others might be sought.

There are many capable people here from all walks of life, including expert trainers, facilitators and other skilled professionals.

I commend the school system for taking a step toward informing and enlightening our school-age residents and their parents.

It seems to me and to others with whom I've spoken that it's up to the community to exhibit

initiative and make sure that Bethlehem not only complies with the law as written, but also, as a community, asserts its will to model the sensibility and virtue which is the source of the law.

We must not allow the 21st Century to replicate the shame of the centuries we've left behind.

The wisdom of those that have gone before is written in the law which governs our country. It serves all of us. It protects all of us.

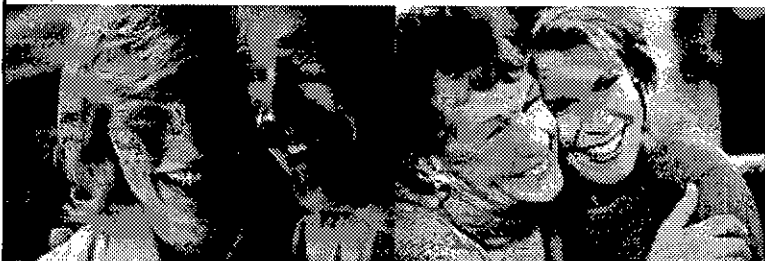
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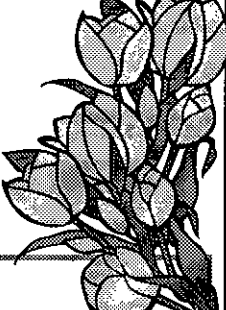
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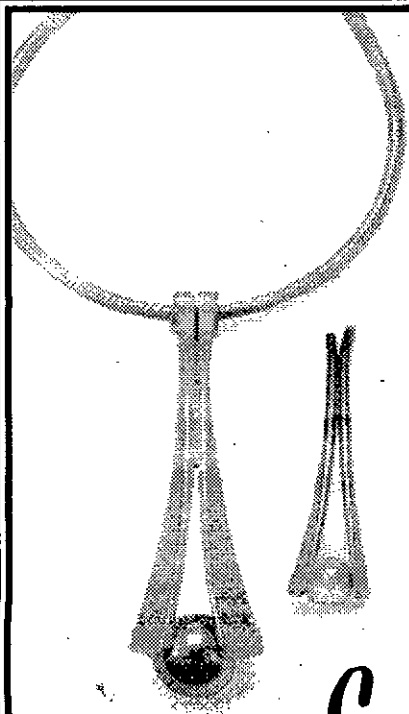
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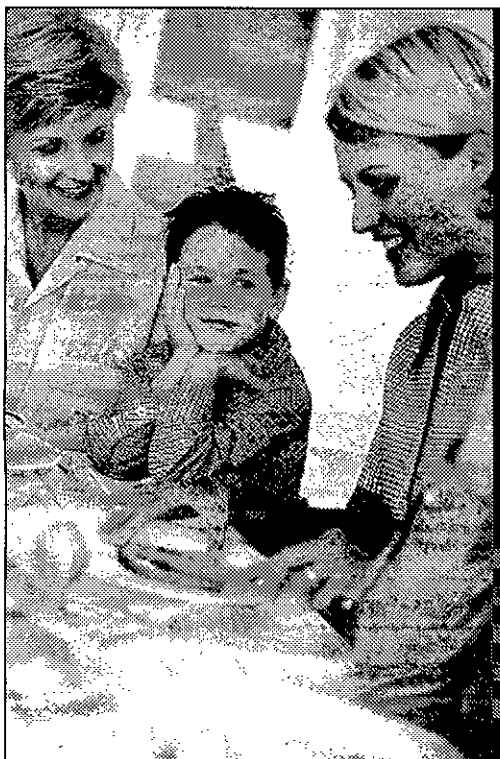
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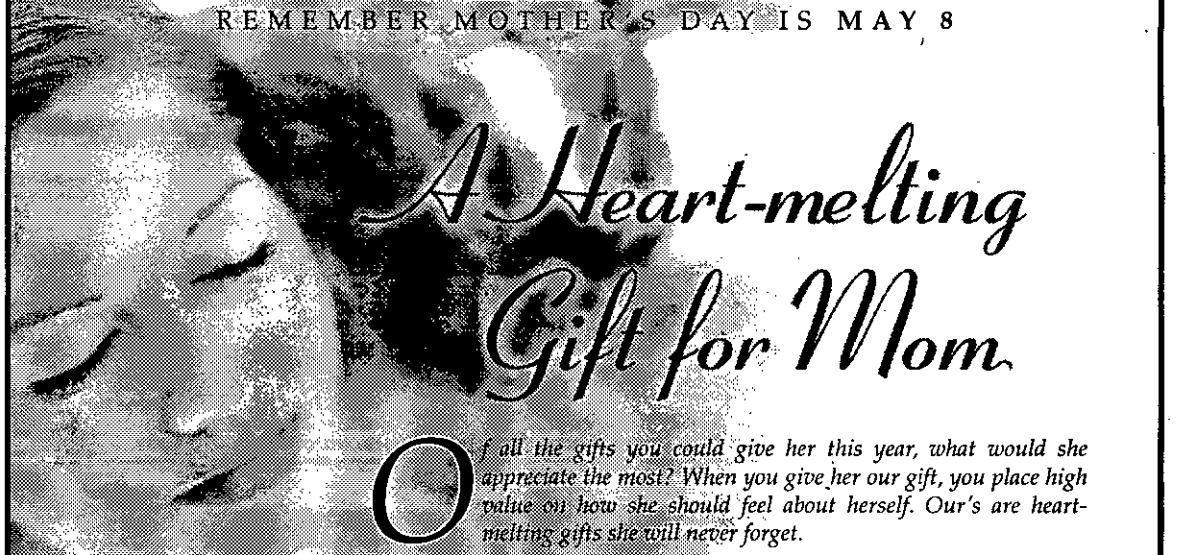
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Trustee wants libraries to continue to foster growth

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of articles that takes a look at the individuals who give of their time to serve on the Bethlehem Public Library board of trustees.

Trustee Louise Kavanaugh is watching our gardens grow. For several months she has facilitated the garden component of the library's landscape project, bringing together volunteers and businesses to fund, plan and plant gardens of various kinds on the library grounds.

Her view of the library also involves growth. She recognizes the library's commitment to



personal enrichment and lifelong learning.

Kavanaugh serves as treasurer for the board. A former administrative manager for the regional office of a large insurance company, she brings to her trusteeship a penchant for organization, planning and evaluation, all of which require an open mind.

"My goal as a trustee is to help

the library grow in a healthy, transparent and efficient manner," Kavanaugh said. "One of the challenges for libraries today is balancing necessary expansion of services with cost controls. Libraries are facing big issues now, not the least of which is decreased state and federal funding."

Kavanaugh has a broad appreciation for libraries in terms of her own research and professional development as well as opportunities for cultural enrichment, volunteer service and social interaction for people of all ages.

"The best thing about our library is its commitment to lifelong learning. The library must never lose sight of its attention to personal growth and the public good."

In those respects, a library is much like a community garden.

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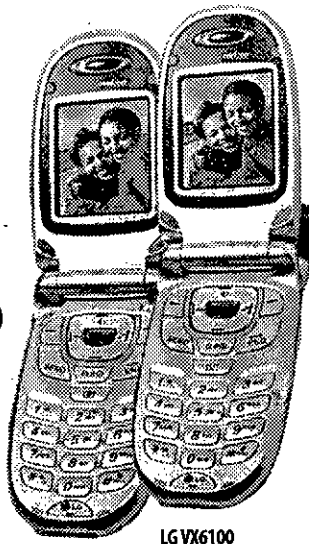

The Friendship Singers are embarking on this spring's schedule of performances for area organizations and residences — with one new twist.

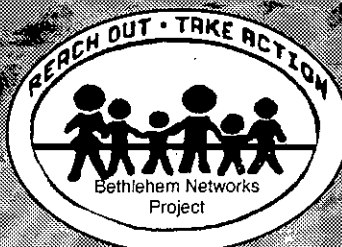

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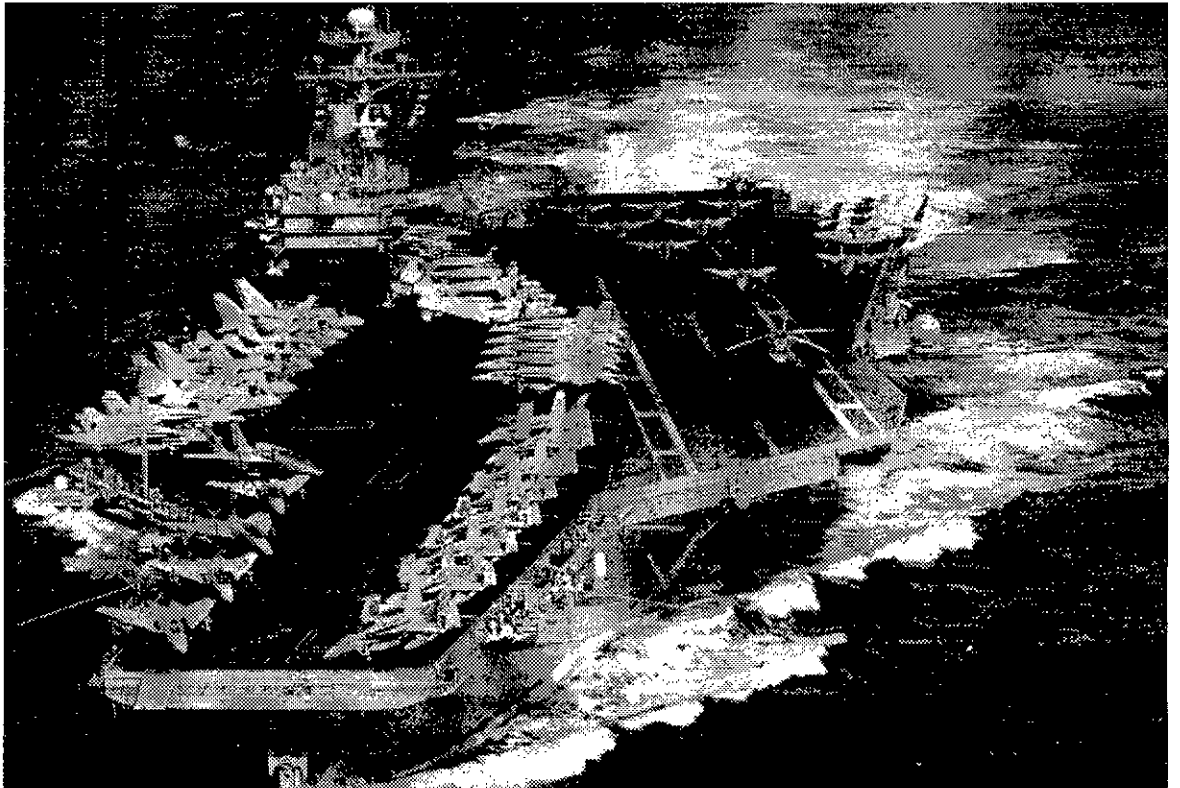
'Tiger Cruise' evokes patriotic feelings

The writer is a Delmar resident whose many adventures include an unauthorized flight into Cuba.

A glance at the cell phone indicated it was son Kirk calling. This was unexpected, since he

was undertaking a medical research project on the USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67) offshore at the carrier's home port in Mayport, Fla. His project was "A Study of Naval Aviation Safety on the JFK and its Relationship to Safety in the Field of Medicine." Could medical practices aboard that

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"city" of 5,222 crew (with air wing) provide insight into being helpful to general medical services to Americans? We await the report of this project.

"Dad, the JFK has scheduled a 'Tiger Cruise' next week and Captain Fitzpatrick, our CO, has invited you to join us. Can you make it?" Kirk asked.

The "Tiger Cruise" takes family members of the crew 100 miles offshore to execute an extensive demonstration including catapults and traps of aircraft. Family members return with a better understanding of carrier operations.

The JFK's Commanding

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Officer Dennis Fitzpatrick and Kirk Harmon graduated from Bethlehem Central High School in 1976, were partners on a remarkable swimming team and have remained friends. Fitzpatrick assumed command of the JFK in October 2004.

Arrangements were made for a commercial flight ticket, a rental car and motel accommodations, and the following e-mail was sent:

"Captain Dennis Fitzpatrick:

No one steps aboard the JFK without the invitation of the 'boss.' I'm delighted with your generous invitation, and look forward to joining you.

Many thanks!

Mil Harmon"

A response came quickly.

"Welcome aboard, Dr. Harmon.

Should be a lot of fun. Not sure if you remember, but you gave me my first airplane ride in Ten Romeo. Seems only fair that I return the favor and give you your first aircraft carrier ride on the JFK.

See you soon.

Dennis"

And thus began one of the most exciting days of my life!

Dockside in the Mayport U.S. Naval Air Station, the USS John F. Kennedy is a magnificent piece of equipment. It was commissioned on Sept. 7, 1968. It is 1,052.5 feet long, 252 feet wide, 23 stories high. Its displacement is 80,000 tons, speed 33.5 knots with four propellers, and carries four

catapults. In combat there are 80+ jets aboard.

I went aboard at 7:30 a.m. at the hangar-deck level, met son Kirk, and we went directly to the "Captain's In-port Cabin" where the captain's family and guests were to gather. This is an elegant location, which can serve diplomacy needs when beyond the continental USA. The table in the center of the room held a double spread of a delectable breakfast buffet, which served the 30-plus present. The appointments of this cabin are unique, and include beautiful wood paneling. We were told that Mrs. John F. Kennedy entered this room on her inspection tour and said, "This room is too stark for diplomatic use in foreign areas. It needs wood paneling, and I have some wood from a special place that will dress it up properly."

I understand her military escort gently reminded her that as a military vessel no wood is allowed on board, since it might burn in combat. He added, "It would take an Act of Congress to panel this room with wood." Jacqueline Kennedy got her "Act of Congress," and her special "touch of class" which we have seen in the White House, is also evident on the JFK.

On the wall opposite the

entrance there is a display area with a replica of General George Washington's saber and sheath. Twenty replicas were prepared and submitted to experts for examination. Eight were so finely crafted they could not be distinguished from the original. The eighth one was given to Mrs. Kennedy and she made it a gift to the CV 67's special cabin.

Inside the entrance door on the wall to the right is a portrait of President Kennedy sailing with First Daughter Caroline in Cape Cod waters. The beautiful central table, the furniture, the appointments and decor of this room are elegant — an appropriate setting for official guests of the U.S. in faraway places.

Lt. Marcia Love, the ship's secretary, was an excellent hostess, attentive to our every need, answered many questions and made us feel at home. After a leisurely breakfast, we went

topside to observe our getting under way.

It was exciting to watch tugs nudge us away from the dock, ease us into a 180-degree turn, and head the Kennedy out of the harbor, led by a Coast Guard vessel. Once we cleared the harbor, we were on our way to the designated demonstration area about 100 miles out into the Atlantic Ocean.

Our cruise time was excellent for becoming familiar with the ship. The hangar deck — the work area where aircraft are maintained and kept flight-ready — is huge. The four elevators are formidable. Passageways run the length of the ship next to the hull, starboard and port. Bulkheads (outer walls of the ship) carry a bull's-eye every few feet to identify location. The numerical codes are helpful: the first number indicates the deck, the next the distance from the bow (1-249

Frames), followed by distance from the center of the ship and type of compartment. Guests, with their sponsors, had full range of the ship and were invited to visit the mezzanine gym, mess decks, aft diesel, laundry, chapel/library, bake shop, machine shop, medical and dental.

As we approached the area for the air-power demonstration, it was time to go topside to the island, the structure that rises above the flight deck. The Captain's Bridge is the top location facing forward, directly below is the Admiral's Bridge, also facing forward. The Flight Operation Bridge is below the Admiral's Bridge and faces 90 degrees to the left with full vision of the flight deck and two control seats side-by-side. The left one is identified with 'BOSS' in large block letters on the back — the right one says "MINI BOSS." It boggles the

mind to consider the magnitude of critical information flowing into this center when under full operation. Every phase of the launch and retrieval process goes through this center — a busy place.

As we approached our planned operation area, the carrier headed into the wind, and the ship's speed was adjusted to give the optimum

combination for launch.

I had determined I'd watch the first three launches from the bow of the flight deck and moved forward to the point of aircraft lift-off. The F-14s and F-18s are attached to the catapult and within 450 feet the aircraft goes from zero to 130 kph, and lifts off with both engines at full power.

Standing on the forward flight

deck of the Kennedy and experiencing the launch of an F-18 aircraft lifting off 50 feet from me with 17,700 pounds of thrust (without afterburner) from each of its two engines was a unique experience. I was shaken to the depths of my soul and I "tingled from every hair on my head to my toenails!

After three launches I went to the Admiral's Bridget o watch from that vantage point. The height and glass windows cut back on the gut-wrenching noises on the flight deck, but were replaced by a new kind of respect and pleasure.

As an aircraft was prepared for catapult, a half-dozen handlers provided a beautifully choreographed "ballet" — 19-year-olds who carry out their responsibilities in a very dangerous environment, where death lurks within a moment's lack of concentration or misstep of only a few feet. How wonderful that age is — invincible, immortal, and with no fear of danger (it was reminiscent of a former day when my colleagues and I were flying U.S. military aircraft at age 19, with no thought of consequences).

Lunch was another sumptuous meal in the Captain's In-port

Cabin as we turned toward homeport, there was much to enjoy: videos/movies were shown on the hanger bays followed by band performances, souvenir sales were available on forward mess decks and a talent show was offered.

It was dark by the time the Kennedy worked its way skillfully back to dockside at the Mayport U.S. Naval Station. The 3,000 guests for the day left that magnificent vessel with joyous hearts and increased pride in the crew and the U.S. navy's "QUEEN" of the fleet. How thankful I am to be a part of a nation with the capability the JFK represents in serving democracy throughout the world.

Back in my motel, I thought about the remarkable "Tiger Cruise" experience. And, as impressed as one is by the power and majesty of the Kennedy's physical being, it may be possible to miss the most important part of that remarkable ship, which is its crew. On its last six-month deployment to the Gulf, it averaged 126 launches every 24 hours with 100 percent efficiency. This record is a result of a finely tuned crew that knows its equipment and task perfectly.

It is planned for the JFK to be retired to Boston Harbor as a

museum — an appropriate location and assignment for many reasons. Navy budget allocations are not scheduled to keep the vessel operational for the next fiscal year, even though from January to October 2003 Kennedy underwent the largest maintenance period ever conducted pier-side. The \$300 million upgrade was to extend the operational life of JFK to 2018.

However, the Kennedy has been a first line combat vessel for nearly 40 years and has amassed an unparalleled record of achievement with 18 deployments, each of which was executed with skill and honor. It is indeed a national treasure. Could there be one more two-year assignment with one year of port visitation on the East Coast and a second year on the West Coast at reduced operation levels to give Americans an understanding of the heritage this "Queen" of the oceans has given all Americans? "Tiger Cruises" for the public and elected local officials on both coasts could be a worthwhile finale.

Steps are being undertaken to review this possibility. Options for funding need to be investigated and the value of such a Navy PR project should be considered. There are potentially large dividends in such an investment, which could be privately financed.

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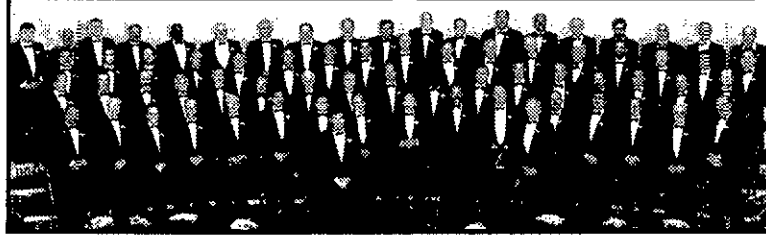

works with communities toward sustainable development.

"It's a piece of property that's a model internationally," said Joellen Zeh, program manager for Audubon International, "having achieved a level of environmental stewardship."

There has been at least one offer on the land, but years ago, Blum said, an unofficial agreement was struck between the 18 shareholders of the 33.33-acre course, in operation since 1964, and the town of Bethlehem, that the town would have the first option to buy the course, possibly to keep it as a municipal golf course. Blum said he believes the town has a recreational treasure in its backyard that few know about.

But Blum is having difficulty getting any direction from the town, he said, and has become fearful that developers and real

estate agents are interested in snatching up the property.

"I was hoping the town would take some pride (in having one of the top environmental facilities). I was hoping the town would be our allies in this," Blum said, "because it's going to be such an asset to the town's recreational value."

Supervisor Theresa Egan said she plans on working with Blum to find a solution.

"The town is not really in a position to purchase a golf course right now," Egan said. "I'm hoping we can sit down in the next few days to pursue what other connections there could be, community groups that I haven't been able to get a hold of in my absence." Egan was out of her office for two days last week.

Albany County Land Conservancy could be an option, Egan said. Neither Audubon International nor Blum can legally do anything to ensure it's maintained as a golf course, though both said that is their

desire.

Many of the shareholders are in their 70s, Blum said. Others have inherited their shares from family members who have died. Blum believes many of the stockholders are simply tired and done owning a golf course.

Pete Strand, a part owner of Colonial Acres, wouldn't confirm that the course is even on the market.

"If you want to talk about how to get people up there to play golf, we can talk about that," Strand said.

Blum said the Performance Track certification was one of the most involved processes he's ever experienced.

"I did it for my children's

future," Blum said.

The EPA and Blum had to work together on the application process, he said, because it had never been outlined for a golf course before. Meticulous records had to be kept, of amounts of fertilizer, the area over which and the time for which mowers were used and their energy, and pounds of waste output, among other things.

Blum said the process was so tedious, he wouldn't expect another golf course to even attempt such a certification.

The course has no running water; the entire facility and irrigation is run on rainwater. That means no food service or working plumbing. Blum uses

organic, non-petroleum-based fertilizers and keeps a majority of the course — a little more than 19 acres — as natural areas, including wetlands, wild areas and ponds.

"We're not a big cause of why gas prices go up," Blum said. "It's crazy. It starts out as one little thing and it just snowballs."

Speaking of the snowball effect, Blum said it takes effect in other ways, such as sponsoring a Colonie elementary school's membership in Audubon International's Cooperative Sanctuary program and another foundation's efforts in Miami.

Zeh said she fears that real estate property can carry a much higher value than golf courses.

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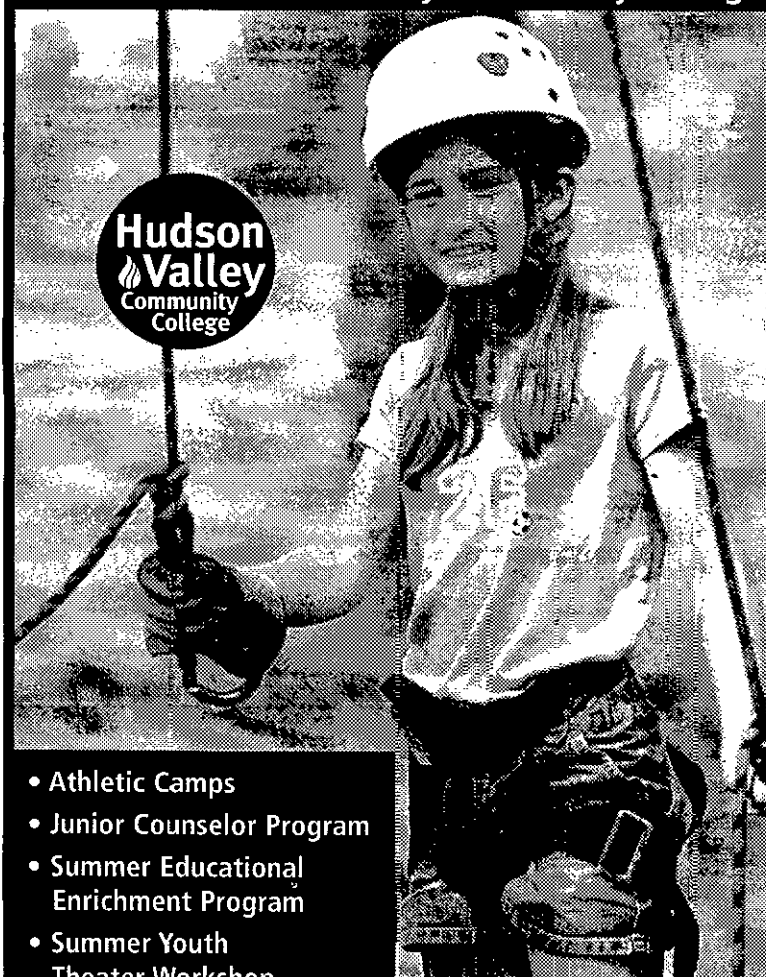

Albany's History Fair

From its 16th century Colonial Dutch beginnings to its extraordinary 19th century Gilded Age architecture, Albany is synonymous with history. Near the confluence of the Hudson and Mohawk Rivers, the city began as a center of trade and transportation. Later, its strategic location transformed it into a prime military target during both the French and Indian War and the American Revolution. Albany's history is marked by notable firsts, intriguing characters, statesmen, industrialists, jazz age night life and hidden secrets below its pavements.

Celebrating this mosaic of people, places and happenings, Historic Cherry Hill, together with the Albany Heritage Area Visitors Center, Historic Albany Foundation, Hartgen Archeological Associates and Hudson River Construction Company, is sponsoring the sixth annual Albany History Fair, a fun-filled day of events, music, exhibits and tours on May 1.

"The city truly has historic value," said Kathy Quandt, director of operations for the visitors center. "There are so many places of historic value as well as architectural gems that it certainly calls for an annual celebration."

At the visitors center, numerous historical organizations, including the Albany Institute of History & Art, New York State Capitol, New York State Museum, Schuyler Mansion State Historic Site, Underground Railroad History Project and the USS Slater, will

have exhibits, activities and displays highlighting the city's rich heritage.

There will be hands-on activities for children including educational information about the Hudson River's fragile and changing environment. Students from the Boys & Girls Club at the Ida Yarborough Community Center will re-enact historic figures of Albany. In addition, dozens of area restaurants, retailers and attractions donated generous gifts and gift certificates for the popular Albany's Big Dig raffle. For \$5, each visitor can dig for one of the great prizes. All proceeds from this and other fee-based activities support the educational mission of Historic Cherry Hill.

"We started the fair six years ago to raise money for a new collections research and storage center," said Cherry Hill Director Liselle La France.

"Today proceeds support our educational program," La France added that the fair has grown in size and offers more venues for children and families. Places, Spaces and Faces of Albany, a photography exhibit consisting of photographs taken by students from the Boys & Girls Clubs of

Albany's Image Makers Program, provides the theme for this year's History Fair. The photos feature the people and places of the city (on display through May 31), and the history fair expands the theme through a variety of exhibits, tours and activities.

"We taught kids ages 11 through 18 the basic mechanics of photography," said Pam Landers, development director

for the Boy's and Girl's Club of Albany. "From there the kids learned artistic composition, computer enhancement and the aesthetics of framing and presentation." Framed works taken by participants will be on sale at the fair. For entertainment, Tame Rutabaga, a group whose repertoire includes a blend of traditional Irish, French Canadian and American folk tunes dating from the colonial period through the Civil War, will put you in the mood for dancing.

Visitors can also enjoy 19th century games including rolling hoops, graces and Jacob's ladder; take a pony ride offered by Albany Carriage Service or go on a splashdown with the Albany Aqua Ducks.

"All events depart from the Visitor's Center," LaFrance said adding, "It should be a lively afternoon."

For those wishing to stroll along one of the city's more historic thoroughfares, architectural historian Anthony Opalka

will lead walking tours through the Ten Broeck Triangle neighborhood. Don't forget to stop and get a rare peek inside historic St Joseph's Church along the way.

Finally, the presentation of this year's Sense of Place Awards will honor and celebrate people, places, projects and organizations that make Albany unique.

This year's award recipients are: Underground Railroad History Project of the Capital Region, Inc.; Palace Theatre; local artist, Len Tantillo; and Albany's Historic Old Schools web site (www.albanyschools.org). The award ceremony starts at 3:45pm.

The fair runs Sunday, May 1st, from 12 noon to 4:00 p.m. at the Albany Heritage Area Visitors Center, located at historic Quackenbush Square at the corner of Clinton Avenue and Broadway, in conjunction with several other locations in downtown Albany. Free admission (minimal charge for some activities) and free parking is available behind the visitors center off Broadway via Spencer Street.

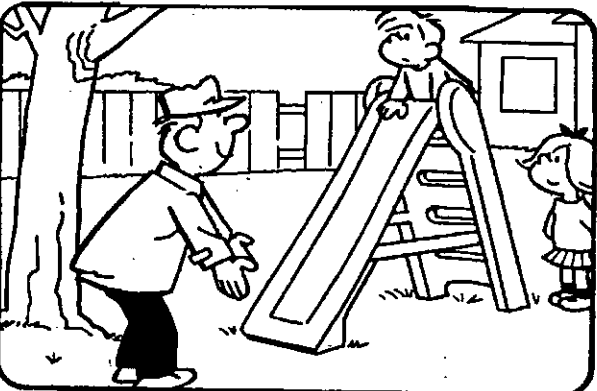
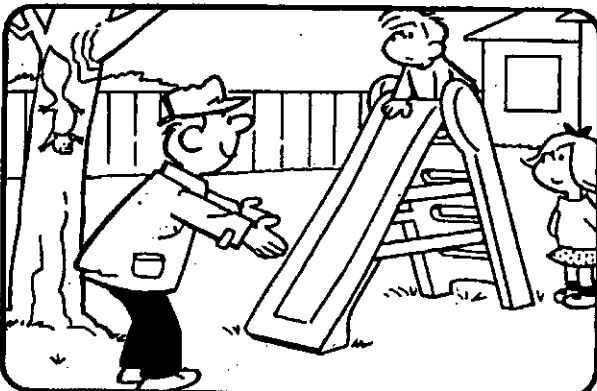

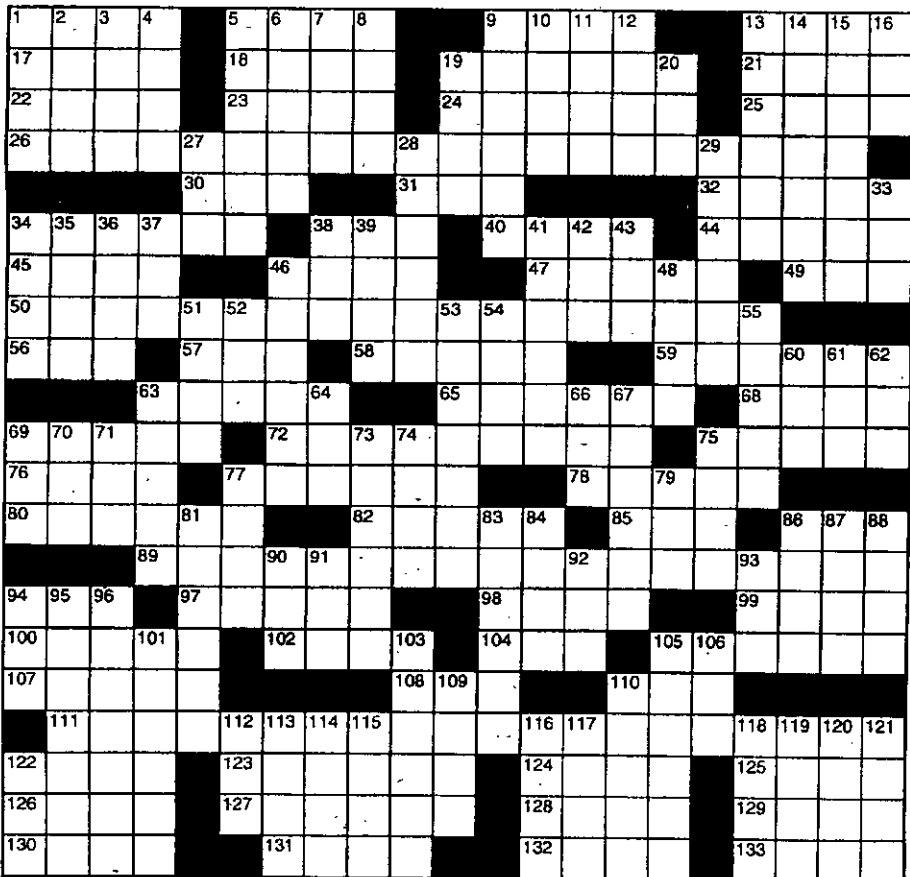

student, who then responded, after he was hit, by calling the girl a racial epithet.

"Only after he was hit did he use a racial epithet. Still we were concerned on both sides," Loomis said, "with the assault, which was

a problem. Then, in anger, a racial term was used, which is inappropriate in any situation."

Loomis said the punishments reflected a determination that the male student, who did suffer an injury but is in school, showed restraint to avoid confrontation up until he used a slur and that the

female student was ultimately responsible for the assault.

In another incident, Loomis believes a group of white students wrote a racial epithet on a student's car parked near the soccer field after school.

Loomis was able to determine at least one student who was responsible and hand down a suspension.

"We were able to track down one of the students that was responsible, and they were disciplined. I think there were others involved, but I wasn't able to prove that (to a degree to be able to punish them)," Loomis said.

In a third incident, two copies of a rap CD with numerous racial slurs made weeks earlier by a group of white students were brought to school.

"Students of color heard the CD and heard who some of the

students were involved in making the CD and confronted them. They became engaged in a verbal conflict, nothing physical, no assault took place," Loomis said. "That's how it came to our attention."

Loomis said visible acts of racism haven't been a problem with this particular cohort of students. Out of 1,666 students officially enrolled at the high school this year, about 7.26 percent are minorities. Of the 380 full-time and part-time teachers, 1.1 percent are minorities, according to Jessica Scheckton, communications specialist for the district.

"It's a fact that we know of, that incidents of racism and anti-Semitism and other forms of harassment is in many, if not all of our schools, because it exists within our society," Loomis said.

"It is up to us to do everything we can to counter it and eliminate it."

Following the incidents, the high school's Assistant Principal Scott Landry made an announcement over the school's PA system during morning announcements. Then, a voluntary faculty and staff meeting was held.

Loomis, in speaking to the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce about the school budget and Capital Improvement project, made remarks about the incident as well.

"I believe it's important to have a community-wide conversation about this," Loomis said.

In the near future, Loomis expects a series of meetings for and with parents and students including student organizations and student body leadership.

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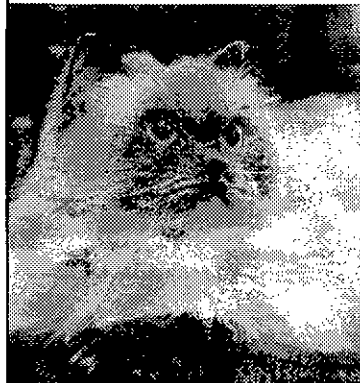
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Residents can sharpen up on boating safety

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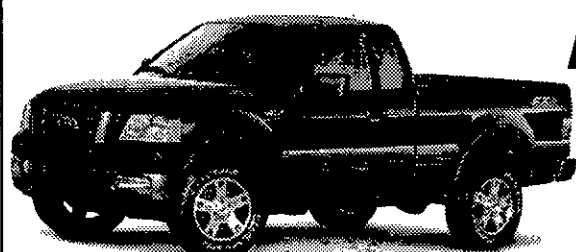
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
