As summer approaches, the Voorheesville board of trustees addressed issues of beautification and recreation, including whether the town should provide facilities for skate-boarders.

The board discussed the possibility of constructing skateboard ramps in the Village Park. Public Works Department Superintendent Will Smith said skateboarders are using the basketball

court, which is causing damage to the grounds. Smith asked trustees if they would consider constructing some skateboard ramps so the kids who skateboard can have their own place to use. Mayor Jack Stevens

said the village has received many requests from residents for a skateboard park, and the subject will be reviewed. Village Attorney Anne-Jo Mc Tague said:

"The village needs a liability waiver if it is going to entertain building ramps for a skateboard park." The trustees agreed that liability concerns have to be addressed before a decision is made.

As the board considers adding ramps to the park, the Heldeberg Garden Club will coordinate this year's beautification project with \$550 from the current budget. That will go for new shrubs and plantings in the Village Park.

The Voorheesville summer youth employment program will start its eightweek run in June. Smith said five applications for employment had been received, two from residents of the village and three from New Scotland town residents.

"We try and hire youth from the village when we can. Last year four people were hired," said Smith.

Deputy Mayor and trustee William Hotaling gave an update on the summer recreation programs in the village. This year's programs include arts and crafts, a youth basketball clinic, youth tennis and soccer. Those programs will begin June 26.

An upgrade is in store for the Voorheesville Justice Court. The village board of trustees approved the Justice Court's application for grants from the New York State Unified Court

System. The village resolution's approval of the application allows Voorheesville Justice Court to apply for a new computer, printer, new court chairs, file cabinet, calculators and other upgrades. Village trustees unanimously passed a motion to approve the line in the court's annual budget that included the grant application so the court could obtain money through the Justice Court Assistance Program.

The trustees scheduled a June 15 date for a public hearing regarding the renewal of the village's cable franchise agreement. Time Warner is the current franchisee, with contract up for renewal. The public will have an opportunity to comment on Time Warner as the current provider at that hearing.

Trustee Robert Conway took time

Many Americans make a choice about how much of Memorial Day weekend to spend welcoming summer and how much to spend in memory of those who died serving their country.

But many families do not have that choice.

Margaret Gilbert of Berne who lost her 23-year-old son, Glenn, 35 years ago on Aug. 4, 1970, hardly sees Memorial Day as offering her any kind of choice.

"It's a very sad time. I remember my son every day. Every night when I say his prayers ..."

# Verizon to expand fiber-optic lines

Verizon, which is already completing a project in Delmar, has announced that it will be running thousands of miles of high speed, multi-carrier transmission lines to Colonie homes later in the year.

The fiber-to-the-premises network uses multifaceted fiber-optic lines to transmit phone, Internet and, eventually, video information to and from each home on one line.

The project is in the later stages of completion in Delmar.

"The major advantage the consumers are going to find here is it's an all-forone package," said company spokesman Cliff Lee.

Essentially, one bill could cover phone, Internet and cable television services, cheaper and faster, he said.

Typically, the direct lines to sites are offered only to large commercial and retail areas that need fast Internet and communication exchange on a large

scale, Lee said. The service has been available to homeowners, but the costs associated with the connection made them prohibitive to many customers.

"It would benefit the residents and especially the business people in the town," said Colonie Supervisor Mary Brizzell. The town's offices will be eventually moving toward the service when it becomes available, she said.

The service could have significant impacts on home businesses, giving them a faster and more secure connection to the Internet.

The fiber-based Internet service, called FiOS, will offer three tiers of downstream speeds of up to 5, 15, and 30 megabits per second (mbps). The tiers are priced \$34.95 per month for 5 mbps; \$44.95 for 15 mbps; and \$179.95 monthly for 30 mbps. The latter service is designed for home businesses with intensive power and bandwidth needs.

Over the next few months, the company will be connecting the fiberoptic network together and linking the Delmar and Colonie service areas through a main switching station, the hub of the "digital fiber based community," said Lee.

Such communities already exist in the Syracuse area, on Long Island and in Westchester and Rockland counties. The development of the network will mean hundreds of new jobs in New York, according to Verizon.

Primarily, infrastructure will be serviced by existing telephone poles lining community streets and thoroughfares. A portion of the network will be run under ground, said Lee.







# Parents on best behavior on Bronx Zoo road trip

The wisecrack is too easy not to make: taking 300 seventhgraders on a field trip to the Bronx Zoo is a little bit like taking coals to Newcastle. Yet, on a Friday morning at 6:45, there we all stood; that many middle school students and enough teachers and parents to divide the kids into easily supervisable groups of six or seven. Bagged lunches packed, worksheets and pencils in backpacks, we shuffled onto the comfortable Yankee Trails coaches with the video players that let adults nap and kept total mayhem from breaking out among the children.

There's a curricular reason for field trips, explained Lisa Wood, the Bethlehem seventh-grade science teacher who was instrumental in mobilizing this many of the human species to go study members of the animal species.

"It ties things together, and lets kids see that what we learn in class is applicable to real life," Wood said. On past trips to Mystic Seaport and the nearby aquarium in Mystic, Conn., for instance, kids watched history come alive and saw facts in action when they played a round of sea-mammal life Jeopardy after watching the sea lion show.

Going on a field trip to a place not every family might go to also levels the playing field. "Some kids have vast experiences and others don't," Wood said. Ferrying a bunch of kids in chaperoned safety to a zoo in the Bronx gives kids whose families might not have the financial means or the inclination to go a chance to see something new and different.

For the parents who go on the field trips, the new and different is often the kids themselves.

"I'm more interested in the homo sapiens," said a doctor taking a day away from her medical research to be part of the Bronx Zoo experience. For those of us who are the constant guides and directors of our children's Mom's **//**Oord

lives, it's interesting to take a step back and combine our own observations of zoo wildlife with watching our own children and their friends furiously filling out the worksheets that would teach them that all the words in front of an exhibit actually contain useful information,

Sue Caesar of Delmar is a veteran field trip-goer and watching the kids in action has always been part of the appeal of accompanying her four daughters on their field trips.

"It's great to watch the kids interact when I'm not the authority figure," Caesar said, adding that it's always reassuring to see that your own kids can rate pretty high on the behavior scale.

Wood said that field trips also show teachers a different side of the kids than they often see in the classroom.

"We tend to see them as older," she said. "Then we see them goofing around on field trips and interacting with friends." It may sound corny, Wood said, but being together with the students outside of the classroom strengthens the teacher-student bond.

Judging from the number of parents who showed up to go to the Bronx Zoo, it's a fair guess that parents are also looking to get in on that bonding action.

Middle school is often the first big push toward students' independence. More of the responsibility — and consequences - fall on students, as they're the ones who have to know what their assignments are, have to keep their binders organized and have to get their work in on time. Notes to parents from teachers become rarer and often remain undelivered and unretrievable from the sacrosanct

space that is the backpack of the middle schooler.

My invitation to accompany the field trip to the zoo was delivered in an offhand manner, with a fair amount of shoulder shrugging.

"There's room if you want to come," Cormac said.

"IF?" I asked, nearly jumping up and down with anticipation of being able to observe the species of seventh-graders among its own kind, "Of course I want to come!"

Before he could roll his eyes or I could scare him away, I calmed down.

"If you want me to," I said. "If you want," he said, adding in a very gentle tone, "but I'll probably want to sit with my friends. No offense.

None taken and I promise to keep an appropriate distance, not kiss you in public, not put my arm around your shoulders, not try to give you a spit shine if some of

your lunch remains on your face and I'll try my hardest to let one of the teachers be the one to tell you to keep it down to a dull roar.

There are few opportunities in middle school for parents to get involved," Wood said, offering up the understatement that parents are grateful when their kids want them to come along.

If Wood watches her students go from serious scholars to goofing-off adolescents on field trips, I thought they looked a lot older as they negotiated their way around the zoo. Our group was great: all boys, they all got along, did their work well, and worked out their differences of opinion about how to read a map.

The Bronx Zoo — not quite three hours away — is also an awesome place to visit. I think its signage could have been better, but with a bevy of navigators and a map, we got where we needed to go. The zoo is big enough that 300-plus Bethlehem students and easily that many other students from other schools didn't make it seem crowded at all. Lushly landscaped, it felt like a day in the country ... or a few different countries, as we went from sea lions to ibises to reptiles to tigers to polar bears to creatures of the night ("My mom must be hating this!" was the echo as rapt students watched fruit bats fly behind plate glass).

That learning experience is part of what Caesar also likes about going on field trips. "Howe Caverns," she said. "I always love that trip.'

A friend with a 16-year-old who lives in the Boston area observed that high school is a lot easier the second time around — as a parent — and field trips often become a second learning experience for parents. Best of all: no homework for us, although I'd gladly trade a night of cooking and doing laundry for reading the chapter about manifest destiny in the social studies book.

· I've ridden on hay wagons at Stanton's Feura Farms, ogled the excellent art on the concourse of the Empire State Plaza and at the Clark Art Institute Massachusetts and listened raptly as docents and guides have provided new insight into things I never would have thought about otherwise.

The only field trip I didn't like was the nursery school trip with Cormac's class to the supermarket. Even with free cookies and a visit to the back of the milk cooler, the only thing worse than a 4-year-old begging for M&Ms in the checkout line is 15 4-year-olds begging for M&Ms in the checkout line and one saying that he will wet his pants if he doesn't go to the bathroom RIGHT NOW.

But for every trip to the supermarket, there's the kid staring in wonder at the tarantula or noticing that the grizzly bear is sitting as if he were meditating, And few things are as wonderful as a group of kids strengthening friendships with a hearty laugh.

"These are the things we remember," Wood said. "These extra-special experiences."



# Mary Rowley gave joy to the world

As much as I enjoy ogling the lovely newer homes in Bethelhem, with their expansive lawns and gardens, living in those parts of town would have denied my family and me the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and great joy to have known Mary Rowley.

Mary died recently at the age of 101, having left her stately older home on Delmar's Adams Street only briefly prior to her death.

Every time I've walked past Mary's house, these nearly 20 years we've lived on the street. I've wondered how many generations of kids learned to ride their tricycles and bicycles on her circular driveway I know our three did.

Mary's driveway was an invitation to kids learning to master pedals and handlebars: a flat wide half-circle of asphalt that fairly called out to children cycling by. As each of our kids entered the bike rite of passage, we instructed them to ring Mrs. Rowley's door and ask her permission to use her drive.

Each time, she would come to the door and welcome the kids to cycle freely, reminding them to exercise caution leaving the driveway on their wheels.





# To Plan Or To Control

That is the Question

We commend the Town's desire to plan for the future of our community. We applied the Comprehensive Plan for including such measures as reasonable lot sizes, minor subdivisions and recognition of individual property rights.

- However sections of the Plan are designed to Control the future rather than Plan for it. A perfect example of this is:

Conservation Advisory Council (CAC) or Citizens Advisory Council on Conservation (CACC).

# The CACC is just a CAC in training.

- How would YOU, as good stewards of your homes, yards and businesses, like it if a committee of appointed individuals made a listing of all of your assets, drawings of your homes or businesses and the recommended what the most appropriate uses of these would be? Under local law, the CAC "shall keep an inventory and map of all open areas within the Town with the plan of obtaining information pertinent to proper utilization of such lands."
- What if a committee were to put on file with the Town and distribute to the public information regarding Your house lots? 401 (k)s? IRAs? Investment accounts? Land is all of these for many people in this Town. Under municipal law the CAC, "may advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which in its judgment it deems necessary for its work. "
- What if it was your house and land that were desired to be acquired?? The CAC municipal law also allows "written recommendation of the Council to recommend to the Town Board acquisition through negotiation or by condemnation, such real or personal property as may be needed to fulfill the purpose of this act."

We oppose including in this Plan an appointed group such as the CAC or CACC which will go on in perpetuity, for which the residents have not elected them and therefore have no recourse in disbanding them. We recommend that when issues arise that a committee be formed that has an interest and expertise in the project, they report to the Town Board on their stated task, then be disbanded. When a new issue arises for which a voluntary committee is necessary, a new committee with an interest and expertise could be appointed and the process would be continued.





# Exhibit's artwork represents two lives - one long, one short

"America Rediscovered," photographs by John Hotchin, is on display in the Bethlehem Public Library lobby this month. Hotchin hails from the small seaside village of Sutton-on-Sea in Lincolnshire, England. He served in the British Navy as a surgeon in World War II.

A Rockefeller Traveling Fellowship to Johns Hopkins University brought him and his wife Peggy to America in 1953, where he worked with Nobel Prizewinners Max Delbruck and Renato Dulbecco, pioneers in advanced virus disease research.

A cross-country camping trip that same year produced photos of U.S. national parks and the Canadian Rockies.

"We were never the same again," he says, and hopes that viewers of his pictures can partake in some measure of that experience.

Here is Hotchin's own delightful account of his 75-year history with a camera:

"My photographic experience began at age 5 with the gift from my father of an old folding camera. This so fascinated my boyish brain that within a few days of experimentation (occasionally resorting to the use of a small hammer), I managed to destroy its functional ability trying to determine what made the delightful zzzzzzip when one released the shutter mechanism. As I worked my way through some 30 or more different cameras, I never lost my love of that exciting zzzzzzip sound, the birth cry of almost every new photograph.'

Americans set aside a specific time for a yearly top-to-bottom cleaning, and most say it takes a whole weekend to complete.

With a few quick and simple tips, you can easily improve the look of your home.

•Get organized: Spend a few minutes in each room you plan to improve and make a list

# Sprayer makes hitting the deck easier

pring showers might be bringing summer flowers, but odds are the raindrops haven't been beading on the surface of most decks. Studies show that nearly 40 million American homes have wood decks, yet only 25 percent of those decks are stained and sealed each year.

# Do-it-yourself roof maintenance

Here's a roof

inspection checklist

Provenzano

recommends you

follow each spring.

he next time you step outside, take a good look at the roof on your home. Are there trees touching it? Do you see loose or damaged shingles? Are some of them covered with black streaks? If so, your roof is well overdue for a maintenance checkup.

"Inspecting the roof for signs of damage is something homeowners should do every year, but in my experience enough people do it," said Connecticut builder John Provenzano. "They think just because their roof is only a few

for about 15 years. Slate, clay, tile and certain metal systems can last longer, but only if well maintained.

Here's a roof inspection checklist Provenzano recommends you follow each spring:

•Check to see if trees are growing too close to the roof. Trees can cause a myriad of problems for roofs of all types. Branches

> roof will scratch and gouge roofing materials when they are blown by the wind; falling oranches from overhanging trees can

leaning on the

damage, or even puncture shingles and other roofing materials; and falling leaves can clog gutter systems, causing water to backup into the attic or living spaces, or to run down behind the fascia. If you have trees growing near your home, take steps immediately to trim them back from the roof.

•Are there black or discoloring streaks on the roof? If you have

indication that you have a problem with mold, algae or fungus. They readily grow during periods of high humidity, especially on north facing roofs and on roofs that stay in the shade for long periods of time. If left unchecked, over time they will eat away at the roofing material, causing deterioration and eventually leading to leaks. Trimming back-nearby trees to reduce shade and improve air circulation could help with the problem, but for permanent protection, it's a good idea to install zinc strips, such as Shingle Shield Roof Protector strips, along the ridge of the roof. "These strips form harmless zinc oxide when rainwater runs over them, and as the water rolls down the roof, it carries with it a protective coating that prevents growth from occurring," said Provenzano. If you have a new roof, just the strips will suffice. If you're installing them on a roof with streaks, Provenzano says you'll need to first clean off the vegetation. "Some people think they can just use bleach for that purpose, but I advise against it. It can be corrosive. I recommend

•Inspect roof for signs of damage. When shingles are missing or torn off, a roof structure and home or building interior are vulnerable to water damage and rot. Weakened shingles or tiles are easily blown off, torn or lifted by wind gusts. Since a deteriorated roof system only gets worse with time, once you discover a problem, you should take steps to repair the damage immediately. If you have an asphalt shingle roof, fixing the damage is something you can do yourself. You'll need to loosen the first row of good shingles above the damaged one; then use a pry bar or putty knife to gently pull away the ad acent shingles so the good ones are separated from the damaged one. Gently rock the damaged shingle back and forth to remove it; then replace it with a new shingle. Provenzano says replacing damaged tiles requires more precision and is a job best left to the professionals. "The key to a roof system's effectiveness is complete pretection," he says. "Don't leave your roof's integrity to chance. Make a point of doing an annual inspection. You'll be glad you did.'

Gilbert, who also has a daughter, said her son did not have to serve because he was the only son in his family. Still he wanted to go, she said.

"He was ready to fight for his country," Gilbert said.

On his last Memorial Day, Gilbert remembers her son talking to her about the flag: "He says, 'Mom, fly it high," Gilbert

"He was my only boy. He graduated from Berne-Knox-Westerlo High School. He belonged to the East Berne Firemen ... He was just so young; he didn't have a chance yet to live," Gilbert said.

Her son left for Vietnam on June 27, 1970, and he lost his life on Aug. 4 of that same year.

"He drowned," she said.

He was on a river and went to retrieve some cargo that had fallen overboard.

Gilbert said that because of the Iraq War, Memorial Day has been harder than ever.

"I hate to pick up the paper or turn the TV on. It brings it all back," she said.

Dorothea Rockenstyre of Albany has similar feelings on Memorial Day.

"It's very emotional," she said. She spent Friday afternoon at

the Lisha Kill Midcle School family to go to war, she said. honoring fallen soldiers like her son Richard who died 38 years ago at the age of 19.
