Scheckton submitted information to the governor's office that explained steps the district is taking to promote good health among its students.

G'mont woman to continue work in Ghana

Three villages and towns in Ghana, all of varying size, traditions and locations, will be the subject of a Glenmont resident's documentation of the area, on which she will be collaborating with high school seniors for nine months.

Carrie Brown, who already has published a book that is a photographic documentary of her time and experiences in Ghana and doubled as her final thesis project, has a plane ticket to return to Ghana Aug. 4.

She said she had known she wanted to document other areas last time she was there and picked three towns that show the range of life in Ghana.

Ho is a city in the north; Keta is a small town with rich history and a spot right on the ocean, which was built; and Klikor is a small, traditional village with many shrines.

Brown has received some interest from publishers in a book similar to what she has already produced, but if those efforts don't yield results, she believes the projects will serve as a living history in all of the towns. Brown also has plans after her return for an exhibit in Savannah, Ga., where she attended college.

Brown is interested in dichotomous topics: institutionalized religions, like Christianity, versus traditional spirituality and health care — Ho and Keta both have hospitals — versus traditional healing methods, which may be prevalent in Klikor.

Keta was a town that saw much activity regarding the slave trade, Brown said.

Brown purposefully picked out the three towns with diverse landscapes and lifestyles.

Students in the towns will use both their native languages and English in the books, though the project will serve mostly as an exercise for their English skills.

"I'm excited about photography and excited about documenting their culture and writing. It's exciting for them to be able to write and publish (their work)," Brown said of the new students she'll be working with.

For the first two weeks she'll be in Ghana this time, Brown will spend time with a local church group, the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Albany, which will be performing missionary work. Brown has turned to a local church, First Reformed Church of Bethlehem, to help her with fund-raising efforts.

Brown is paying her own way to Ghana, including transportation, shelter and food.

Fund-raising efforts from her first publication, *Born on a Monday*, have reached \$1,800, though she's still selling books.

She wants the money to go toward building new kindergarten classrooms in the village of Woe (pronounced Way).

Four new classrooms will cost around \$5,000, Brown said.

Schools in Woe have little or no walls to separate the classrooms, which are in buildings that are mostly just woven palms. Many children go to school for split days, so the building can accommodate them.

That book is being carried locally at three locations — I Love Books and Friar Tuck Books in Delmar and The Book House in Stuyvesant Plaza. All proceeds from those sales will benefit the village of Woe.

Also, on July 12, Brown will be at the Bethlehem Public Library at 7 p.m. to speak about her past experiences and this project.

After chase, Bethlehem P.D. makes felony DWI arrest

A Memorial Day high-speed chase along Route 9W that wended its way into the town of Coeymans, led to a felony driving while intoxicated (DWI) arrest by Bethlehem Police last week.

The driver faces a host of other charges stemming from the incident.

On May 30, police observed 34-year-old Robert W. Holt of 1734 Route 9W, Lot 13 in Selkirk, driving 59 mph in a 40 mph zone. His front license plate was also attached upside down.

Police said that as they attempted to pull Holt over, they saw him look in the rearview mirror and accelerate his car, passing cars in no passing zones and running three red lights, almost causing several accidents.

Holt passed an estimated 15 cars facing south, according to police and forced several cars driving northbound off of the roadway. He continued at a high rate of speed into the town of Coeymans, where police there assisted Bethlehem police with the arrest.

Holt continued his high rate of speed, passing more cars and running more red lights, police said, making an abrupt turn onto Route 143 that almost caused his car to roll over. After losing control of his car several times on Route 143, Holt turned his car abruptly west of Starr Road, becoming airborne and landing in a large field, according to police.

Holt then got out of his car and ran into the woods, police said, eventually being apprehended

just off of the sixth hole at the Sycamore Country Club.

Holt was placed into custody, and later tested positive for alcohol on a chemical breath test. Holt was sent to Albany County jail without bail and is due back in court on June 21, after already having a preliminary hearing.

Holt faces felony charges of DWI, aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle, and reckless endangerment, along with misdemeanor charges of reckless driving and resisting arrest and several traffic infractions.

On May 25, in the area of 180 Delaware Ave., police pulled over William J. Blanchet for wearing no seat belt and having a passenger under 16 with no seat belt.

Blanchet, 49, of 36 Sparkill Ave. in Albany, admitted to

drinking earlier in the day after police said they detected a strong odor of alcohol on his breath. His 13-year-old son was in the car.

Blanchet was placed into custody and processed for DWI. Police said they later found two open cans of beer in his car. Blanchet is due back in court on June 7.

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Club plants seeds of grant program

Now that the Bethlehem Garden Club has used its collective green thumb to turn dying interest from high school students in a scholarship program into a successful first-year grant program for teachers and classes at Bethlehem Central and Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk elementary schools, the club's new plant sale takes on significant importance.

The club has offered grants to high school students for at least five years, but dwindling applications sent the club's grant committee searching for ways its money could affect more people, according to grant committee chairwoman Carolyn Miller.

The club sifted through six proposals of what teachers would do with money as part of their curriculum, scoring each proposal on a scale of 1 to 5. Miller said that teachers were a good group to receive grant offers,

Miller said that with the promising response from the program's inaugural year, the club is looking forward to next year, hoping to bestow a larger reward on a teacher or more rewards of the same size. If the program can't grow, Miller said, the least the committee wants to do is keep it above ground.

"This was the first year, so we're still in the planning stages of where we want to go, but wouldn't it be great to do more?" Miller wondered.

That's why sales from the Bethlehem Garden Club's ninth annual Garden Tour and Plant Sale are so important this year, Miller said.

The Becker project spurred even more grant money and physical help and other donations from area businesses, including Selkirk Cogen, which donated time from employees, materials

because they could reach possibly 30 students at a time.

"We were so encouraged to get the response we did. With each school we talked to, the teachers were eager to get money, because of all the cuts that were being made," Miller said.

Claudia Verga, a teacher with A.W. Becker School in the RCS school district submitted the winning proposal, to complete its

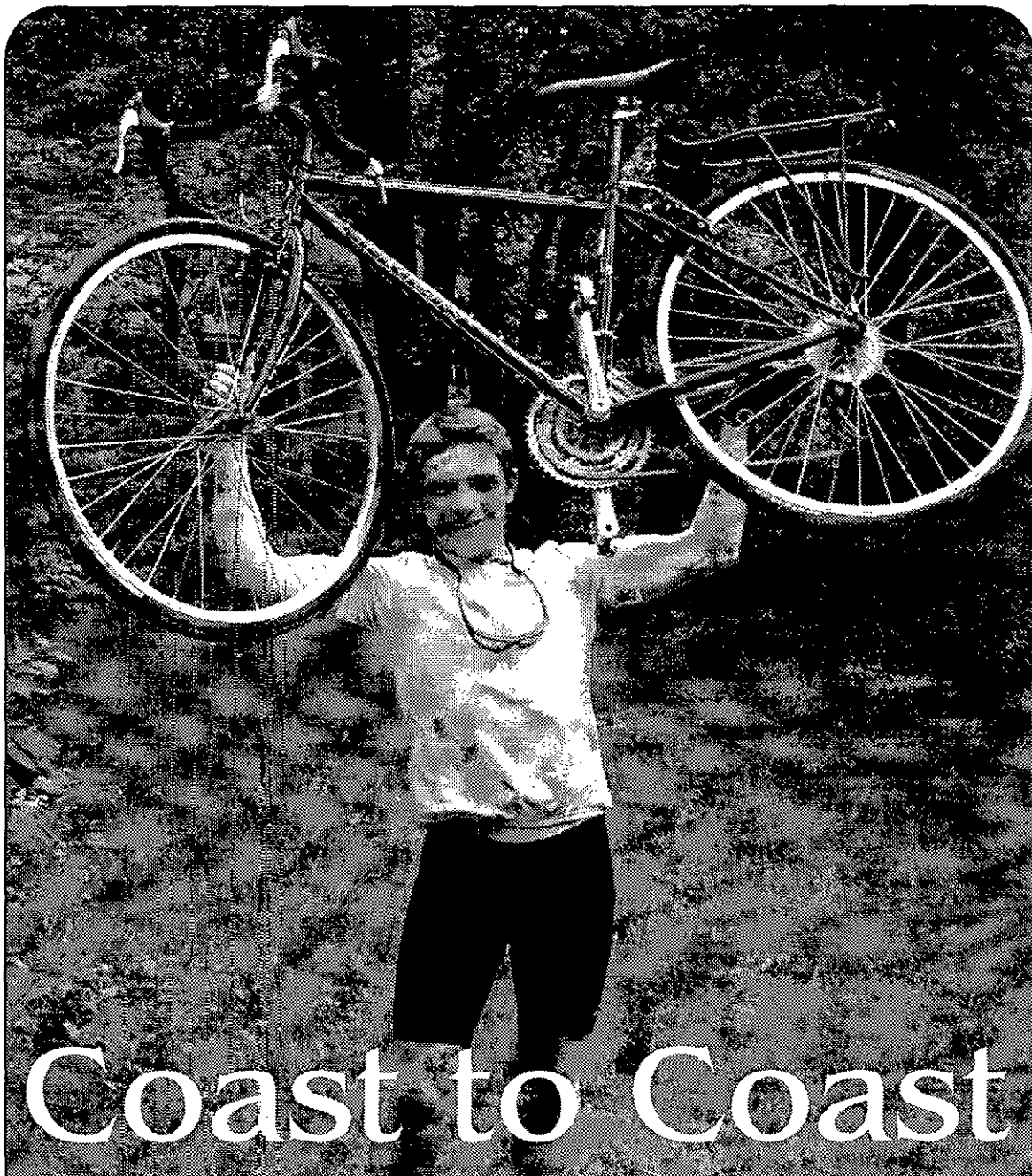
and money to clear the trail and complete the garden.

Delmar cyclist makes trek for cancer patients

It might just be in his blood.

Bethlehem Central High School junior Josh Finkle likes to do fun things on his summer vacations.

He's already racked up 46 High Peaks in the Adirondacks, a summer of kayak, ice climbing and hiking in Alaska and five days of mountain

biking in Hawaii.

This summer, he'll ride his bike from San Francisco to Virginia Beach, ocean to ocean.

He'll dip his wheel in the Pacific Ocean and start riding with five other bikers and two counselors, through Nevada, Utah, Colorado and on to the East Coast, where he'll conclude the trip by dipping his bike wheel in the Atlantic Ocean.

His aunt and uncle met on a similar trip, though through a different organization, and return to the camp where they met every 10 years.

His trip will benefit Camp Quality USA, Inc., a volunteer-run and community-funded nonprofit organization that provides free camping experiences for children with cancer and their families.

His first goal was to raise \$5,000, which would pay entirely for his trip and get the camp \$2,500.

"Now, I'm almost up to \$7,000," Finkle said, "but I'm trying to get as much as I can."

Finkle expects to continue fund-raising up until the day of the trip, and then through the trip with the other riders, as they look for places to camp and even stop at one or more of the 14 or so Camp Quality locations around the United States. The bikers will have to carry all of their equipment — tents, sleeping bags, pots and pans — with them on their cross country trip, a different aspect from past trips, where a wagon follows the bikers.

Besides the generosity from family, friends, teachers and, perhaps, strangers, Finkle has received a bike, donated by Trek, sunglasses from Adidas and 20 percent of off all of the equipment

he needs for the trip, from Klarsfeld's Cyclery and Fitness, on Central Avenue in Albany.

"We were just thrilled," said Lauren Finkle, Josh's mom.

Lauren Finkle said the woman running the trip wants to make sure the campers at Camp Quality benefit the most from the trip, subsidizing the trip for the bikers as long as they raise half.

"She's very altruistic," Lauren Finkle said.

For his part, Josh Finkle wrote a poem he sent out to family and friends describing the trip and why he needed their help.

"I feel very strongly about helping these kids, and I would appreciate any donation you can give, whether it be \$5 or \$500, because together, we can help these kids with cancer be kids again," Josh Finkle wrote in his letter soliciting donations, borrowing Camp Quality's motto.

Indeed, Josh Finkle received a \$5 check, but he also received a \$1,000 donation, too, along with largely every denomination in between.

"People are very kind, it's amazing," Lauren Finkle said.

Josh Finkle said everyone's been supportive, and with each new day that brings him closer to his trip, he's still getting donations.

"Some people surprise you," he said.

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Season offers many kinds of special life gifts

Suddenly, summer. That's usually the way it goes in the Capital District: winter one day, full-blown summer the next. Perhaps in other parts of the country there are a few gentle months of spring, full of delicate green grass, gradually warming breezes and crocuses poking miniature heads out of the ground.

Here, though, it often feels like spring lurches into the area, starting and stopping like a stick-shift car being driven by a teenage learner. There's always a tantalizingly warm week in April, too often followed by a chill snap that sends down a flurry of the white flakes that really aren't pretty much past February. May was cool and wet this month, and although it meant that flowers were in bloom longer, it was hard to believe that the warm days we'll complain about in August would ever stay for good.

As if to join in all the parades and celebrations honoring veterans on Memorial Day, the

weather finally made a permanent turn for the better, unleashing parade-goers to mow unsuspecting lawns, tend plots that would become vegetable gardens, and load up the grill with hot dogs and hamburgers.

It is a time of year that offers us many gifts. In the abundance of the warmer weather, it's a good time to think about how we should best use those gifts and the resources around us; about the best way to live our lives.

Of course, it's always easier to figure out how others should live their lives. Recent news reports about a population boom (echo of the baby boom, apparently) means more kids in schools, something that's coinciding with the retirement of all the boomers who've been instructing future generations in the past 30-

something years. It's not a crisis, and there surely are plenty of young people going into the teaching field in the traditional way. But wouldn't it make for a really rich pool of teachers if it were easier for mid-career people to make a transition into the field? Certainly we need teachers who are qualified, but I've encountered more than a few 40-somethings who'd chuck it all in for a chance to teach, but are put off by the need — and associated costs — of going back to school to get into school. Seems like some sort of credit for past education along with life experiences combined with selected education classes, student teaching and a whole lot of mentoring could produce some middle-age teachers who would offer a great deal to our future generations.

It's also easy to look at the Catholic church with its priest shortages and see the obvious solutions: take married men, take women and presto, you've got shepherds aplenty to lead the flock.

And everybody has an idea about how our government should work.

Of course it's easy to see the answers for everyone else. It might be hard to assess our own abilities and flaws, but it sure is fun to solve the world's problems with a few keystrokes of the computer.

Maybe it's hard to figure out if we're on the right track because the darn train feels like it's going too fast to get a clear view.

Sometimes the brakes are applied from the outside world. During the past month at our church, for instance, the theme has been stewardship, which offered up the notion that our lives, and the money that we earn, are just gifts that we need to be putting to good use.

The money part is surprising, since it's too easy to feel that today's world takes every penny, and there will never be enough to give *any* away. Too many people seem to stand at our door and demand the lucre that doesn't have time to get filthy before it heads back out again. There are mortgage payments to make,

utility bills to be paid, and anyone feeding a family knows that really, paychecks should just be direct-deposited into the supermarket.

There's also the high cost of college to consider and 401Ks seem de rigueur — especially with all the dire warnings about Social Security running out and those in charge divided about how best to fix it.

So I draw a deep breath, have a little faith and try to think about how to better use our money. This sends the kids into a full-fledged panic.

"We won't have to give up broadband, will we?"

"Can we still go see the Star Wars movie a third time?"

"Can we have dinner at Yan's Chinese buffet this weekend?" No, maybe and yes, I tell them, along with Lecture No. 24 about how privileged they are that the thought of not going to a movie AGAIN counts as deprivation in their books.

In truth, those children are the resources I most want to be investing in, and those investments never miss a chance to tell us that they'll still be young and fit when we're old and decrepit.

"You'd better be nice to me," is the general response to any sort of disciplinary action or the suggestion that empty pistachio shells are not the best floor covering in the world. "After all, I'll pick your nursing home."

I'm still willing to be the bad guy sometimes — the days of infirmity feel far enough away that I can put in the time now to make sure that homework gets done and we all speak nicely to one another.

These are interesting days in the child-rearing cycle, as my young teenagers seem to spend as much time out of the house as in it. Gone are the pre-school days

that I scripted: breakfast, Sesame Street, Mr. Rogers, hours on the playground, lunch, naptime (in a best possible case scenario), more outdoor time, dinner, stories, bed.

I would have told you that the resources I'd worked so hard to develop — a second language, good writing skills, the discipline

to adhere to a work day, the ability to get along with most of my colleagues — were withering away then. With time, I realized that I had developed other skills. I learned to get by with very little sleep; I knew the name of every train in the Thomas the Tank Engine set; I developed a

modicum of patience; I could read five children's books to two boys taking up every inch of my lap; and I could (usually) prevent that one awful moment when a child's fatigue could lead to something akin to a nuclear meltdown.

As my children become more independent, I get to redevelop some of my old skills. The skill I'm working hardest on now is balance — providing for our children's future while being around to still have an influence on the greatest gifts in my life.

The gift I would most like to give my sons is a sense of their own abilities. I am curious about where they will end up, what work they will do, who they will marry, what their children will be like and what they will like doing when they are grown.

In this bounteous late spring the maple trees are in full leaf and are shedding the seeds that rotate like helicopters to the ground coating sidewalks and driveway and putting down roots where they strike soil. As our children spin off from us, I wonder what gifts they will use to make the world better.

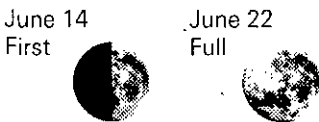

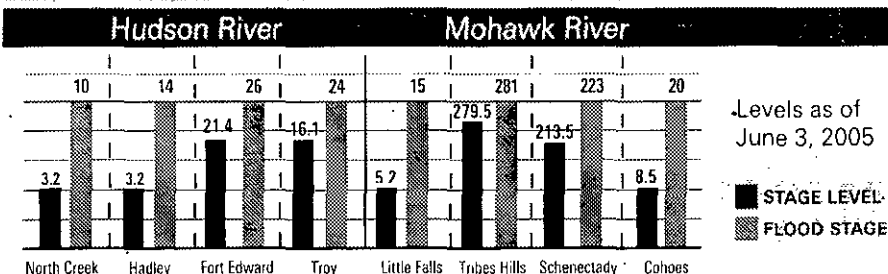

Milano has final say on local sex offender

A convicted sex offender who used to work in Glenmont and live in Ravena, was recently classified as a Level 3 sex offender by a Bethlehem town

judge, a rare occurrence that was facilitated by certain aspects of the case.

Oscar Turpin, convicted in August 2004 of a Class A misdemeanor count of forcible touching, was classified as a Level

3 sex offender by Judge Frank Milano, who upheld the state Board of Sex Offender Examiners' recommendation for the classification after a review process.

Turpin, now living at 2837

Halsey Drive in Schenectady, was found guilty of forcibly and inappropriately touching a 16-year-old female employee who worked for Turpin, manager of the Glenmont McDonald's at the time. Turpin also used force by hitting the victim with his hand or fist on her thigh and buttocks.

Town judges do not have the jurisdiction to try felonies. But because the charge was a misdemeanor charge that involved a minor, Milano had the last call on classification, something he has called a rare situation because few sex crimes are considered actual misdemeanors.

After Turpin was convicted, he was certified as a sex offender during sentencing. The state board of examiners then reviewed the characteristics of the case, including the age of the victim,

whether physical force was used and whether the defendant had a prior criminal record. The board follows a point check system, where as a certain score increases, a defendant moves up from a Level 1 sex offender to a Level 3, considered the most violent and most likely to commit a sexual crime again.

When the board makes a recommendation, the judge who tried the case can uphold the decision or deviate from it, but if the judge deviates, he must give compelling reasons why.

All Level 1 and 2 offenders must register with the state sex offender registry for a period of 10 years after the crime. Level 3 offenders are on the registry for the duration of their lives after their convictions and must register with local police every 90 days.

New principal named at BCMS

The Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education has appointed a new Bethlehem Middle School principal, who will start July 1.

Jody Monroe, who is currently principal of Stillwater Middle and High School, will replace Dave Ksanznak, who will return to his elementary roots as principal of Hamagrael Elementary School, also July 1.

Likewise, Monroe said she is returning to her real passion, which is working with students at the middle school level.

"I'm really excited. I love the middle school age," Monroe said. "They have so much energy."

Monroe, 34, was approved at the board's June 1 meeting.

She has been principal of Stillwater since 2002, supervising about 115 teachers and support staff and more than 900 students in grades 5 through 12.

Now, Monroe will be supervising 1,200 students in grades 6, 7 and 8.

"I got to see a good cross section, I think, represented

(during my interview process). I met with parents, teachers, staff, and I had an interview with the board of education," Monroe said. "I got a good sense of what I have to look forward to, things that they want addressed, perhaps, right away."

Monroe, a Ballston Lake resident, began her teaching career more than a decade ago, as a special education teacher for the South Colonie School District in 1994, later serving as sub-committee chairwoman for that district's Committee on Special Education.

Then, Monroe moved to the Stillwater School District in 2000, serving as assistant principal and director of technology for two years before becoming principal.

In a press release from the district, Monroe said she is looking forward to beginning her new position, given the encouragement she has already received from parents, faculty and administration she met through the interview process.

Monroe was one of 73 total applicants for the middle school's top post and one of six the district interviewed.

Superintendent Les Loomis said Monroe was chosen for a combination of reasons.

Monroe holds a Bachelor's degree from Russell Sage College in Troy, where she graduated in 1992. She went on to earn a master's degree from The College of Saint Rose in 1994 before beginning her career.

Heartfelt thanks

Another chapter in American history closed when Watergate's Deep Throat surfaced last week. W. Mark Felt ended the political intrigue surrounding Watergate after decades of speculation about his identity. Despite the efforts of many of the curious, *Washington Post's* reporters Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein kept Felt's secret for 30 plus years after the scandal eventually forced Richard M. Nixon to resign his presidency.

Watergate also brought on another change in the public's attitude about politicians on a grand scale.

Officials in the nation's highest positions were "caught" in lies and skullduggery in their attempts to cover up behavior that was morally reprehensible and often downright illegal. In pre-Watergate days people were far less suspicious about politicians — especially on the national level.

Living through the Watergate era was like living in a spy novel with all sorts of unscrupulous characters calling the shots. It was like peeling an onion with a healthy looking top layer, but with each succeeding layer more rotten and the core being totally spoiled. The Watergate story is ugly and one where truth is really stranger than fiction. The outrageous web of secrecy, lies and deception is still an enigma in that something like this could ever happen.

That the now fragile 91-year-old Felt waited so long to reveal his identity as Deep Throat suggests the danger he must have felt himself to be in during the Watergate fiasco. Nixon clearly viewed Felt as untrustworthy and wanted him out of the political picture.

But Felt was onto what had happened and fed the two young reporters information that would eventually expose the wrongdoers and bring many of them down.

Felt survived and is viewed as something of a hero in the public eye. Deservedly so.

We think he is clearly a hero. Felt fought the powers that be and ultimately won. This is a David and Goliath story that deserved the attention it has received throughout the years. So many life lessons about power and the lengths people will go to in its name are gleaned from Watergate.

Watergate is one of the defining moments of the second half of the 20th century, and it should be something future generations study so as not to reproduce a generation of politicians who are so filled with their own sense of self importance and hubris that they risk their reputation and integrity for personal gain.

DWIs cut off victims' lives

The standard 10-13 call of an officer needing assistance brings all area police to the officer's side. On June 16, between 4:30 and 8:30 p.m. at the Midway Fire Department, a benefit for Investigator Edward Frank of the Colonie Police Department will occur. Frank, a 19-year veteran detective, has Adenocarcinoma, a rare form of bowel cancer. He requires overnight travel to Boston's Dana Farber Institute, where he is undergoing chemotherapy.

Ed Frank's latest project was a collaboration between Ed Frank, the racer, of Race Kleen Motor Sports, who races stock cars at local racetracks Fonda and Lebanon Valley, and the Albany County Stop-DWI program. Ed wanted to make an impact, and he thought the best impact he could deliver was in the form of presentations including a hands-on object, a racecar with a five-point restraint system that would appeal to middle school and high school males, most at risk for not using their seatbelts. As a detective, he apprehended criminals; he had seen the crashes, and the senseless loss of human life. He wanted to prevent carnage on the high-

ways. with his father, retired Colonie Deputy Chief Edward Frank, the staff of the Albany County STOP-DWI Program, and Gerri Walsh of Art Associates Gallery, expanded the idea of a racecar going from school to school as a hands-on tool for seatbelt safety education by using an actual trailer to house a portable exhibit of the predictable consequences of speed and underage alcohol use.

A time line tells the story of tragedy and chance. Forensic photographs and objects add to the narrative. What happens when a 28 year old and a 16 year old engage in drag racing on Route 7 with cars ahead and stopped at a light? A young girl's parents are away at the ballet, and the party begins in one Colonie house before the parents' return. The parents call; they are leaving the ballet at SPAC. Seven teenagers, ages 15 to 17, pile into

Patrick O'Connell's 1989 Acura. They make sure to bring the beer and Smirnoff Ice. He is traveling at a speed in excess of 90 miles an hour. After watching the basketball game until after midnight, an intoxicated Jeffrey DeBlasis fails to observe a stop sign on Route 9 and crashes into a Nissan Sentra, killing the passenger, University at Albany sophomore Kathleen Campion. He suffers minor injuries. Kathleen was less than two miles from her home.

Ed Frank is fighting cancer. His battle is in the hands of a higher power. Yet, wear your seatbelt and drive sober, and you increase your chances of enjoying another great summer in the Northeast. Our community needs your assistance.

Wearing a seatbelt can prevent motor vehicle deaths in between 45 and 60 percent of crashes. It was a no brainer. If the population which did not wear seatbelts wore them, lives would be saved. He could use his passion for racing to impact on the risk-taking cohort: young underage males.

must follow. Hurray! — at last the zoning and subdivision regulations are available for review (for 28 days) before the public hearing. I have 20 days left.

My family is interested in minor subdivisions, as four of us are now holding jointly title to land owned by our father and grandfather. The town of Bethlehem draft plan states that options should be available to landowners to reflect varying circumstances. It furthermore says, "in some cases a landowner may simply wish to split off a lot or two for a friend or relative, or to generate some needed cash." This is referred to as a minor subdivision, allowing the creation of up to four lots to be taken off a parent parcel in a 10-year period. The assurance that

a landowner would have a more streamlined process and reduced requirements would ensure that entire properties need not be sold off and could remain farmed or undeveloped for a longer period of time was very pleasing.

In the subdivision regulations "103-13. Review of Minor Subdivisions," I noted at least 12 steps to be followed for a landowner to split off even one lot from his property and a potential time frame of over a year once a sketch plan is drawn. Included in the steps are many required reviews; proofs of compliance with at least seven other governmental bodies and, of course, numerous fees and the necessity of property owners to hire several professionals to meet

these requirements. These step-by-step protracted performance standards are, of course, contingent up on the goodwill of the appointed seven for seven planning board (seven members receive seven-year terms) as it is stated, "Nothing herein shall be interpreted to prohibit the use of the procedures for review of a major subdivision of any subdivision application."

Well, "thet ain't what it seem to be!" What was said by Saratoga

Associates, planning personnel, and discussed at various meetings just does not seem to be what it was purported to be. Furthermore, a proposed minor subdivision would be left up to the presumptive power of our prestigious planning board. It does not appear to follow the intent of the executive summary nor the draft comprehensive plan.

This would not be simple!

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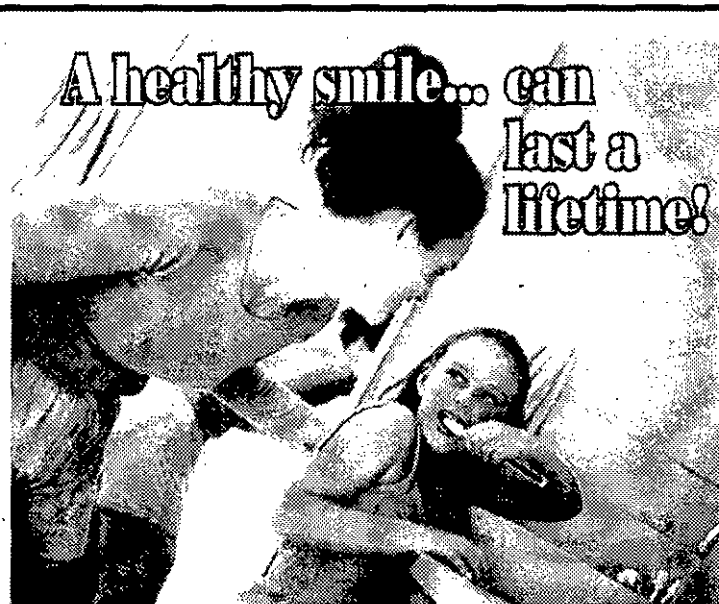
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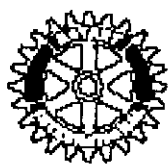

"You don't think like us! Move out of town!" What will be next? Will we ask all those, with a different religion to leave because the majority of the community disagrees with their set of beliefs?

Perhaps those with a different skin color should leave too.

Religious persecution and segregation are part of our history, and we must not forget their lessons. In our haste to build our local community, we must not ignore those self-evident truths that our society is built upon.

The measure of a community has less to do with the width of the roads and style of its buildings than it does with the quality of its people.

There are will continue to be different opinions on what should be and should not be included in the comprehensive plan and zoning. Eventually, and with the appropriate processes, decisions will need to be made.

During that process, we must ensure that we have done our very best to embrace the diversity of opinion and respect individual rights.

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


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Expanded animal shelter means hope for more cats and dogs

Serving more than 20 area municipalities and thousands of Capital District residents since 1887, the Mohawk Hudson River Humane Society has expanded in an effort to keep up with demand.

The society has renovated a garage on its Oakland Avenue property in Menands to house the number of stray animals brought in from towns, cities and villages throughout the area. The number of stray cats and dogs has been steadily increasing and space was beginning to dwindle, said MHRHS Assistant Manager Cydney Cross.

"We took in about 14,000 animals last year," she said.

The nonprofit humane society has operated on minimal funds and limited space for some time in its efforts to see each and every stray and abandoned animal kept well and healthy enough to be returned to a loving environment.

Essentially the society exists in two capacities: to serve municipalities and to serve residents of the area.

The new building acts as a 24-hour-a-day drop off for municipal animal control officers. They each have a key to the processing room in the facility, where dogs or cats can be booked and kept in

kennels until their owners are located, or, if they are strays, they meet the criteria for adoption.

The new facility has 42 sanitary state-of-the-art kennels that can house 21 dogs. The kennels are built back-to-back so society volunteers can open and exchange an animal between the kennels for safe cleaning and feeding. Out back, a running area for the strays is underway and Cross hopes to have it completed by the end of summer.

The society can now house nearly 100 dogs, she said.

"We are not a time facility but a space facility. It's almost unbelievable, the number of animals that come in," she added.

Nearly 200 volunteers clock long hours accepting and caring for a multitude of animals, from adult critters to pups, dogs to kittens, rabbits to monitor lizards. Volunteers walk dogs and tend to the animals' needs, all the while pushing their adoption. The society spays and neuters all animals, as well as checks and treats animals for known ailments from heartworm to rabies before animals can be adopted.

The society has a saying: don't breed or buy while sheltered dogs die, said Cross. Although the new facility helps alleviate some of the stress on the animals, more and

more animals continue to filter in because of their human counterparts' irresponsibility.

Cross cannot emphasize enough how important it is to have animals spayed or neutered. The problem has become so bad, up to 90 cats per day have been arriving at the shelter. The society is not a no-kill operation and relies heavily on adoption.

June is adopt-a-cat month. Each Saturday, the society creates a different deal to connect cats of all ages with potential owners.

The facility has room for roughly 200 cats. To date 300 cats are spread out between the nooks and crannies of the facility and outside foster homes, said Cross.

Although adoption numbers have been solid over the last year, the numbers of animals coming in is on the rise, said volunteers. Some volunteers have given up holidays to assist in the daily operations of the society and to see that animals are getting adopted.

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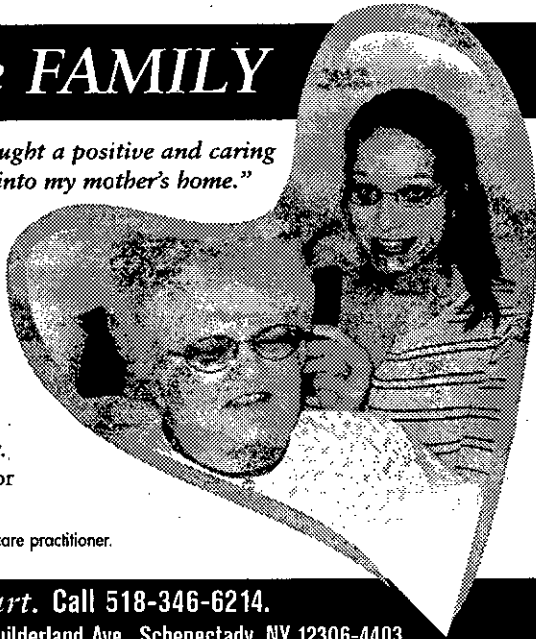
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Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

Marla Runyan, a champion runner, visited Clarksville Elementary School last Friday. She came to the school to talk about her life, her disability and her accomplishments.

Runyan, who has Stargardt's disease, started losing her sight in the fourth grade. She remembered looking up at the chalk board wondering what was wrong with the chalk. She is now legally blind.

But Runyan didn't let her disability stop her — she became an Olympic runner. In 1988, she set a goal to go to the Olympics. She went to Athens in 2004 to run

the 5,000-meter race and made it to the semifinals, where she placed ninth.

Runyan is well known in the Capital District because she has won the Freihofer's Run for Women race for the past three years. She didn't run this year because she is having a baby. She told the students that it is a girl.

Runyan shared her love of running with the elementary students and said that running is a great hobby because you get a lot of exercise. The first race she ran was in fifth grade; she was the only girl in the 75-meter race, and she came in second. It made her mad because she wanted to win.

Today, Runyan runs at least 80 miles a week, and while she is training for a race she runs up to 120 miles a week.

Not being able to see while she runs sometimes causes dilemmas. Once, she ran into a parking meter during a race. Another time when she was practicing, she tripped in a pothole and sprained her ankle.

"She went through everything and did not give up," said Henry Taylor, an aspiring runner who ran in the Freihofer's kids race on Saturday. He said he wants to be like Runyan when he grows up.

Runyan told the class that they should never give up, but keep going and live life. Even if it is tough, she said, "Don't stop because if you have a dream you shouldn't give it up."

As Runyan finished her talk with the students, she received a surprise. Carol Walts, the physical education teacher at Clarksville, presented her with a stuffed duck for her daughter's room. Runyan was surprised by the gift because she had decided to decorate the baby's room with frogs and ducks. She asked how the students knew she liked ducks. Walts replied that she had read Runyan's Web site (www.marla-runyan.com) and it was in her journal. Runyan thanked the class, telling them she would put the gift in her daughter's room.

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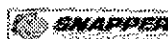

Flying with the top dogs

Bethlehem boys 3,200 relay team places second to nation's best at state meet

Albany County runners turned in some big performances at last weekend's New York State High School Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Cicero-North Syracuse High School.

The Colonie Central girls 1,600-meter relay team won the public school Division 1 (large school) title, while Gunderland's Brian Rhodes-Devey set a new state record for sophomores when he finished third in the third in the boys 800-meter Federation final.

Bethlehem's boys 3,200-meter relay team turned in a clutch performance when Shaker's relay team stumbled. As Shaker, the nation's third-ranked relay team, got caught up in a collision during the first baton exchange, Bethlehem kept pace with national No. 1 Syosset and finished second with a school-record time of 7:50.35.

"I was pretty surprised," said Bethlehem anchor runner Conor Murphy. "I thought it was going to be us, Shaker and Syosset. I was surprised to see Shaker drop back that far (to 11th place)."

Murphy was only several feet behind Syosset's anchor runner, Chris Howell, when the final baton exchange took place. But Howell took off and broadened Syosset's lead to six seconds by the time he crossed the finish line.

"I wasn't expecting to hang with their best runner, but to finish six seconds behind them was very good," Murphy said.

Rhodes-Devey had two sub-1:53 runs in the 800. He finished with a third-place time of 1:52.73 in Friday's public school final and then ran a time of 1:52.25 in Saturday's Federation final to set a new state sophomore record

and a new Section II mark.

Rhodes-Devey had high hopes for a top-three finish in Saturday's 1,600 final, but running the 800 in the morning and the high heat of

the afternoon combined to suck the energy out of him. He placed sixth with a time of 4:18.05.

"I didn't run too good in the 1,600, but I set a Section II record

and a state sophomore record in the 800," Rhodes-Devey said. "I have nothing to be ashamed of. I'm satisfied with today."

On the girls' side, Colonie earned one of the few state titles for Section II won when the 1,600 relay team of Marisa Poleto, Alicia Williams, Nanditha Badami and Stacy Gregory finished with a time of 3:52.53, 42 seconds ahead of Suffern. Shaker was sixth with a time of 3:59.13.

Gregory wasn't around to run Colonie's anchor leg in Saturday's Federation final, and her absence was felt. Colonie placed seventh with a time of 4:09.62.

Before she left Saturday, Gregory wrapped up her high school career with a third-place finish in the Federation 100-meter dash. The senior, who was second in the public school finals earlier in the day, ran a time of 12.22 seconds in the 100 dash finals.

"I've had a great time. High school was a blast," Gregory said. "I'm going to miss it, but it's time to move on to the next level."

Several more Albany County athletes and relay teams had top-10 performances at the state meet:

- The Colonie boys 400 relay team of Colin Frederickson, Brian Lenge, Kyle Nadler and Cjantai Williams was third in the Federation finals with a time of 43.12 seconds

Hornets sting Eagles in state finals

Just short. Again.

For the second time in three years, the Bethlehem girls lacrosse team fought its way to play for the state Class A championship at SUNY-Cortland, only to be kept from the crown by a powerful opponent from the Syracuse area.

Unlike the West Genesee overtime heartbreaker of 2003, though, this final was not as suspenseful. Fayetteville-Manlius, the defending state Class A champions, earned back-to-back titles with a convincing 16-7 victory over the Eagles.

This marked the second year in a row that the Hornets beat Bethlehem in the state final four, the other one being a semifinal victory in 2004.

The Eagles were a young team (just one senior) last year, though, performing beyond expectations. When Bethlehem met F-M again on April 19 of this season and fell by just one goal, 8-7, it sensed that just a few improvements, here

and there, could finally bring the program the state title it has always wanted.

Yet according to head coach Dawn Austin, a lot of factors conspired to make this state final a lot more lopsided in the Hornets' favor.

"F-M was the same team," she said. "It was my team that was different. We didn't have our mental focus, and F-M was just a step faster and a little bit stronger."

Barely six minutes into the game, Bethlehem was already behind 5-0, with three of the goals coming from junior Kristen Taylor, who finished with five goals and three assists on her way to tournament MVP honors for the second year in a row. The Eagles recovered a bit, getting goals from Kelly Hughes, Theresa Ladouceur and Halley Quillinan — but F-M met every challenge and built its lead to 10-3 by halftime.

At one point in the second half, the margin grew as big as 11 goals. Bethlehem had a late scoring flurry, but the Hornets

were simply too far ahead.

"The kids played hard to the very end," said Austin.

In defeat, Hughes had three goals, while Ladouceur scored twice. Quillinan and Katie Rowan each had one goal and one assist. Goalie Emily Szelest made 12 saves.

Austin said her team was accustomed to playing back-to-back games during the season, so the schedule of the state final four should not be an excuse for the defeat. Still, unlike F-M (who beat Rush-Henrietta 16-4 in one semifinal), the Eagles had to go through a high amount of drama and tension in its semifinal on Friday night, pulling out a 10-9 victory over Bay Shore, the Section XI representative.

After an early exchange, Bethlehem made what it thought was a decisive move, putting home five unanswered goals in the last 10 minutes of the first half to break a 4-4 tie. All through the first half, Rowan and Quillinan were tough to stop, as each of them got three goals, with Rowan adding two assists. Hughes

scored twice.

Refusing to see its season end, Bay Shore roared back, shutting out the Eagles for more than 18 minutes. All but carried by Kaitlin Leggio (six goals), the Marauders forged a 9-9 tie with its own five-goal run.

Bethlehem absorbed it all, then regained the lead on Libby Leroy's goal with 7:52 left. From there, the Eagles hung on, as a foul negated a possible Bay Shore tying goal with 3:20 left and Jennifer Aiken made a big strip of the ball in the final seconds.

That would prove to be the last victory of Bethlehem's 18-3 season — the first with Austin at the helm.

Six starters graduate this year, including Rowan, Hughes, Aiken, Emma Strachman, and defenders Mackenzie Riegel and Sarah Fudin. But with stars like Ladouceur, Leroy and Szelest still around, Bethlehem will be armed in 2006 to run through the Section II ranks again — and perhaps, at last, go all the way to the top of the state Class A heap.

meet before and after school that offer opportunities for fun and physical activity to students who might not otherwise join a sports team or intramural club; nurses visiting classrooms to tell students about healthy snack choices; and health-related fitness assessments of all students between grades 4 through 10, results of which are then sent home to parents.

The national focus on the issue of childhood obesity has led many school districts in the area to turn the microscope internally, to seek policies that will prevent further health issues pervading their districts.

One reason districts are seeking to reduce childhood obesity is that it has been linked to juvenile diabetes.

In Bethlehem, according to the district's Supervisor of Health and Physical Education Fred Powers, the policies the district has come up with are a mix of prevention and troubleshooting.

With its inaugural fitness assessment of students in grades 4 through 10, the district found

that with male students in grades 6 through 10, Bethlehem students are above the national average for Body Mass Index (BMI).

"It's not good. It's not horrid," Powers said, "but something we need to look at as a staff."

The results will be sent home on a yearly basis. The FitnessGram is an assessment tool that the Cooper Institute in Dallas, Texas developed. It looks at varying components of fitness and wellness in children, including cardiovascular and abdominal strength and BMI.

Lawmakers told Slingerlands students that they are the most important people in making Pataki's program successful.

While that's true, 8-year-olds don't typically buy McDonald's for themselves, so the BC district is looking to involve parents as well.

"Absolutely, we want to involve the parents," Powers said. "If you look at the research, parents who are overweight and obese are likely to have children that are overweight or obese. There's a certain level of heredity, but it's

also environmental. We're trying to get parents to be good role models."

Perhaps another trick to having successful policies in place is to look at what students eat in the course of a day, Powers said.

Especially in the elementary grades, less-than-healthy snacks can play a role in a child's school day in many ways, from a cupcake celebrating a classmate's birthday, to a piece of candy bestowed as a reward.

"Individually, it doesn't seem like a lot, but put it on the whole, and an elementary child could be facing a number of things (throughout the day)," Powers said. "So we've begun to look at

that, to talk about that."

Slingerlands' intramural Kids Fitness Club, which is similar to a club in place in Clarksville Elementary School, teaches students about healthy eating and then conducts an activity — like snowshoeing — or teaches children how to increase the number of steps they take a day, with a goal set at taking 10,000 daily steps.

"Children should really have healthy, active parents, who can make sure the child plays with other children who are also healthy and active," Powers said, citing a top physical education

professor's recent seminar he attended. "Children just really need a good understanding of skills to do movement activity. They don't necessarily have to play on a team, but they should have enough skill where they can pick up a tennis racket and play or play volleyball recreationally."

The assessments and policies will take a district-wide turn next year, Powers said, with a wellness committee that will address issues in grades kindergarten through 12 to determine a food and nutrition policy in the district, looking at the results of the FitnessGram and other tools.

remove 30 years' worth, or 1.65 million cubic pounds of, PCB-laden sediment from the river.

Many town officials have been outspoken in their desire to keep Bethlehem out of the project; the town has a lavish, multi-million mixed commercial harbor and marina project proposed by Victor Gush on the books for the same piece of property, the OG Real Estate site.

Fifteen residents, all with varying degrees of expertise and interest, in fields related to the dredging project and safety concerns related to the project, sent in letters of interest to Supervisor Theresa Egan.

All 15 will sit on the community-based group that town officials hope will ensure the town gets the best possible scenario if it's to be a part of the project, expected to begin in 2006.

Town officials will also sit in on regular meetings with the group, Egan said.

"Anybody who sent in a letter will sit on the committee. We did that because to show enough interest to send in a letter, we like to be able to accommodate that," Egan said. "It's a very diversified group."

The town can expect, within the next two months and probably sooner, according to EPA Community Involvement Coordinator Leo Rosales, to find out what exactly is in store for that site with regard to the dredging project, which is a Superfund project.

"We're pretty close to knowing more of the details of the site at Bethlehem," Rosales said. "If it will be a full dewatering facility, just a transfer station, or we will know if it's not going to be used at all. That's still a possibility."

Egan said the town group would make recommendations for a health and safety plan if Bethlehem either gets a full dewatering facility or a transfer station.

"If it's just a transfer station, there's much less risk associated with that, but we still want to have something in place (for safety) though the risk isn't as great as with a full dewatering facility," Egan said.

Part of the holdup in determining what role Bethlehem would play in this project is GE not having decided on a location to deposit the sediment or a transfer route and methods to get the sediment to that location.

GE spokesman Mark Beehan said the two entities continue to "make progress on everything, especially the remedial action agreement."

The remedial action agreement is the third agreement out of three that needs to be signed off on.

The first two concerned a sediment sampling program, conducted by GE to determine where the PCB sediment was most concentrated.

The second concerned the design project itself, a three-year endeavor which is two-thirds completed.
