Pataki chose the Bethlehem Central School District to kick off his Activ8Kids! program, a \$9.6 million endeavor designed to fight obesity in children. As part of the program, students will learn the methods of a healthy lifestyle, including eating balanced meals and cutting back on passive activities, like watching TV, in favor of physical

activities.

As part of the program, New York children will learn, before the age of 8, how to live a daily lifestyle where they

consume at least five fruits and vegetables, participate in at least an hour of physical activity and limit the time they spend watching television or playing video games to no more than two hours a day.

Pataki picked Slingerlands Elementary because of the district's demonstrated commitment to promote good nutrition to its students, according to Jessica Scheckton, public information specialist for the district.

Scheckton submitted information to the governor's office that explained steps the district is taking to promote good health among its students.

G'mont woman to continue work in Ghana

Three villages and towns in Ghana, all of varying size, traditions and locations, will be the subject of a Glenmont resident's documentation of the area, on which she will be collaborating with high school seniors for nine months.

Carrie Brown, who already has published a book that is a photographic documentary of her time and experiences in Ghana and doubled as her final thesis project, has a plane ticket to return to Ghana Aug. 4.

She said she had known she wanted to document other areas last time she was there and picked three towns that show the range of life in Ghana.

Keta was a town that saw much activity regarding the slave trade, Brown said.

Brown purposefully picked out the three towns with diverse landscapes and lifestyles.

Students in the towns will use both their native languages and English in the books, though the project will serve mostly as an exercise for their English skills.

Four new classrooms will cost around \$5,000, Brown said.

Schools in Woe have little or no walls to separate the classrooms, which are in buildings that are mostly just woven palms. Many children go to school for split days, so the building can accommodate them.

Brown has received some interest from publishers in a book similar to what she has already produced, but if those efforts don't yield results, she believes the projects will serve as a living history in all of the towns. Brown also has plans after her return for an exhibit in Savannah, Ga., where she attended college.


Brown is paying her own way to Ghana, including transportation, shelter and food.

chase along Route 9W that Sycamore Country Club. wended its way into the town of Coeymans, led to a felony driving while intoxicate: (DWI) arrest by Bethlehem Police last week.

The driver faces a host of other charges stemming from the incident.

On May 30, police observed 34-year-old Robert W. Holt of 1734 Route 9W, Lot 13 in Selkirk, driving 59 mph in a 40 mph zone. His front license plate was also attached upside down.

Police said that as they attempted to pul! Holt over, they saw him look in the rearview mirror and accelerate his car. passing cars in no passing zones and running three red lights, almost causing several accidents.

Holt passed an estimated 15 cars facing south, according to police and forced several cars driving northbound off of the roadway. He continued at a high rate of speed into the town of-Coeymans, where police there assisted Bethlehem police with the arrest.

Holt continued his high rate of speed, passing more cars and running more red lights, police said, making an abrupt turn onto Route 143 that almost caused his car to roll over. After losing control of his car several times on Route 143, Holt turned his car abruptly west of Starr Road, becoming airborne and landing in a large field, according to police.

Holt then got out of his car and ran into the woods, police said, eventually being apprehended

Holt was placed into custody, and later tested positive for alcohol on a chemical breath test. Holt was sent to Albany County jail without bail and is due back in court on June 21, after already having a preliminary hearing.

Holt faces felony charges of DWI, aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle, and reckless endangerment, along with misdemeanor charges of reckless driving and resisting arrest and several traffic infractions.

On May 25, in the area of 180 Delaware Ave., police pulled over William J. Blanchet for wearing no seat belt and having a passenger under 16 with no seat belt.

Blanchet, 49, of 36 Sparkill Ave. in Albany, admitted to

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odor of alcohol on his breath. His 13-year-old son was in the car.

Blanchet was placed into custody and processed for DWI. Police said they later found two open cans of beer in his car. Blanchet is due back in court on June 7.

Now that the Bethlehem Garden Club has used its collective green thumb to turn dying interest from high school students in a scholarship program into a successful first-year grant. program for teachers and classes at Bethlehem Central and Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk elementary schools, the club's new plant sale takes on significant importance.


9/11 Memorial Garden and the adjoining nature trail.

Delmar cyclist makes trek for cancer patients

It might just be in his blood. Bethlehem Central High School junior Josh Finkle likes to do fun things on his summer vacations.

He's already racked up 46 High Peaks in the Adirondacks, a summer of kayak.ng, ice climbing and hiking in Alaska and five days of mountain



biking in Hawaii.

This summer, he'll ride his bike from San Francisco to Virginia Beach, ocean to ocean.

He'll dip his wheel in the Pacific Ocean and start riding with five other bikers and two counselors, through "Nevada, Utah. Colorado and on to the East Coast, where he'll conclude the trip by dipping his bike wheel in the Atlantic Ocean.

His aunt and uncle met on a similar trip, though through a different organization, and return to the camp where they met every 10 years.

His trip will benefit Camp Quality USA, Inc., a volunteer-run and community-funded nonprofit organization that provides free camping experiences for children with cancer and their families.

His first goal was to raise \$5,000, which would pay entirely for his trip and get the camp \$2,500.

"Now, I'm almost up to \$7,000," Finkle said, "but I'm trying to get as much as I can.".

Finkle expects to continue fund-raising up until the day of the trip, and then through the trip with the other riders, as they look for places to camp and even stop at one or more of the 14 or so Camp Quality locations around the United States. The bikers will have to carry all of their equipment — tents, sleeping bags, pots and pans — with them on their cross country trip, a different aspect from past trips, where a wagon follows the bikers. Besides the generosity from family, friends, teachers and, perhaps, strangers, Finkle has received a bike, donated by Trek, sunglasses from Adidas and 20 Wilshire Drive in Delmar, percent of off all of the equipment 12054.


"She's very altruistic," Lauren Finkle said.

New principal named at BCM

The Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education has appointed a new Bethlehem Middle School principal, who will start July 1.

Jody Monroe, who is currently principal of Stillwater Middle and High School, will replace Dave Ksanznak, who will return to his elementary roots as principal of Hamagrael Elementary School, also July 1.

Likewise, Monroe said she is returning to her real passion, Education. which is working with students at · the middle school level.

"I'm really excited. I love the middle school age," Monroe said. "They have so much energy."

Monroe, 34, was approved at the board's June 1 meeting.

She has been principal of Stillwater since 2002, supervising about 115 teachers and support staff and more than 900 students in grades 5 through 12.

Now, Monroe will be supervising 1,200 students in grades 6, 7 and 8.

"I got to see a good cross section, I think, represented

(during my interview process). I met with parents, teachers, staff, and I had an interview with the board of education," Monroe said. "I got a good sense of what I have to look forward to, things that they want addressed, perhaps, right away."

Monroe, a Ballston Lake resident, began her teaching career more than a decade ago, as a special education teacher for the South Colonie School District in 1994, later serving as subcommittee chairwoman for that district's Committee on Special

Then, Monroe moved to the Stillwater School District in 2000, serving as assistant principal and director of technology for two years before becoming principal.

In a press release from the district, Monroe said she is looking forward to beginning her new position, given the encouragement she has already received from parents, faculty and administration she met through the interview process.

Monroe was one of 73 total applicants for the middle school's top post and one of six the district interviewed.

Superintendent Les Loomis said Monroe was chosen for a combination of reasons.

Monroe holds a Bachelor's degree from Russell Sage College in Troy, where she graduated in 1992. She went on to earn a master's degree from The College of Saint Rose in 1994 before beginning her career.

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found guilty of forcibly and inappropriately touching a 16year-old female employee who worked for Turpin, manager of the Glenmont McDonald's at the time. Turpin also used force by hitting the victim with his hand or fist on her thigh and buttocks.

Town judges do not have the jurisdiction to try felonies. But because the charge was a misdemeanor charge that involved a minor. Milano had the last call on classification, something he has called a rare situation because few sex crimes considered actual are misdemeanors.

After Turpin was convicted, he was certified as a sex offender during sentencing. The state board of examiners then reviewed the characteristics of the case, including the age of the victim,

and whether the defendant had a prior criminal record. The board follows a point check system, where as a certain score increases, a defendant moves up from a Level 1 sex offender to a Level 3, considered the most violent and most likely to commit a sexual crime again.

When the board makes a recommendation, the judge who tried the case can uphold the decision or deviate from it, but if the judge deviates, he must give compelling reasons why.

All Level 1 and 2 offenders must register with the state sex offender registry for a period of 10 years after the crime. Level 3 offenders are on the registry for the duration of their lives after their convictions and must register with local police every 90 days.

Heartfelt thanks

Another chapter in American history closed when Watergate's Deep Throat surfaced last week. W. Mark Felt ended the political intrigue surrounding Watergate after decades of speculation about his identify. Despite the efforts of many of the curious, Washington Post's reporters Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein kept Felt's secret for 30 plus years after the scandal eventually forced Richard M. Nixon to resign his presidency.

Watergate also brought on another change in the public's Editorial attitude about politicians on a grand scale.

Officials in the nation's highest positions were "caught" in lies and skullduggery in their attempts to cover up behavior that was morally reprehensible and often downright illegal. In pre-Watergate days people were far less suspicious about politicians - especially on the national level.

Living through the Watergate era was like living in a spy novel with all sorts of unscrupulous characters calling the shots. It was like peeling an onion with a healthy looking top layer, but with each succeeding layer more rotten and the core being totally spoiled. The Watergate story is ugly and one where truth is really stranger than fiction. The outrageous web of secrecy, lies and deception is still an enigma in that something like this could ever happen.

That the now fragile 91-year-old Felt waited so long to reveal his identity as Deep Throat suggests the danger he must have felt himself to be in during the Watergate fiasco. Nixon clearly viewed Felt as untrustworthy and wanted him out of the political picture.

But Felt was onto what had happened and fed the two young reporters information that would eventually expose the wrongdoers and bring many of them down.

Felt survived and is viewed as something of a hero in the public eye. Deservedly so.

We think he is clearly a hero. Felt fought the powers that be and ultimately won. This is a David and Goliath story that deserved the attention it has received throughout the years. So many life lessons about power and the lengths people will go to in its name are gleaned from Watergate.

Watergate is one of the defining moments of the second half of the 20th century, and it should be something future generations study so as not to reproduce a generation of politicians who are so filled with their own sense of self importance and hubris that they risk their reputation and integrity for personal gain.

The standard 10-13 call of an officer needing assistance brings all area police to the officer's side. Wearing a seatbelt can prevent motor vehicle deaths in between 45 and 60 percent of crashes. It was a no brainer. If the population which did not wear seatbelts wore them, lives would be saved. He could use his passion for racing to impact on the risk-taking cohort: young underage males.

The same concept could be extended to drinking and driving. If students realized that alcohol is a drug, a central nervous system depressant that impairs their driving abilities, then students would not drink and drive. Ed, working

He suffers minor injuries. Kathleen was less than two miles from her home.

Ed Frank is fighting cancer. His battle is in the hands of a higher power. Yet, wear your seatbelt and drive sober, and you increase your chances of enjoying another great summer in the Northeast. Our community needs your assistance.

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Expanded animal shelter means hope for more cats and dogs

Serving more than 20 area municipalities and thousands of Capital District residents since 1887, the Mohawk Hudson River Humane Society has expanded in an effort to keep up with demand.

The society has renovated a garage on its Oakland Avenue property in Menands to house the number of stray animals brought in from towns, cities and villages throughout the area. The number of stray cats and dogs has been steadily increasing and space was beginning to dwindle, said MHRHS Assistant Manager a space facility. It's almost Cydney Cross.

"We took in about 14,000 animals last year," she said.

The nonprofit humane society has operated on minimal funds and limited space for some time in its efforts to see each and every stray and abandoned animal kept well and healthy enough to be returned to a loving environment.

Essentially the society exists in two capacities: to serve municipalities and to serve residents of the area.

The new building acts as a 24hour-a-day drop off for municipal animal control officers. They each have a key to the processing room in the facility, where dogs or cats can be booked and kept in

located, or, if they are strays, they meet the criteria for adoption.

The new facility has 42 sanitary state-of-the-art kennels that can house 21 dogs. The kennels are built back-to-back so society volunteers can open and exchange an animal between the kennels for safe cleaning and feeding. Out back, a running area for the strays is underway and Cross hopes to have it completed by the end of summer.

The society can now house nearly 100 dogs, she said.

"We are not a time facility but unbelievable, the number of animals that come in," she added.

Nearly 200 volunteers clock long hours accepting and caring for a multitude of animals, from adult critters to pups, dogs to kittens, rabbits to monitor lizards. Volunteers walk dogs and tend to the animals' needs, all the while pushing their adoption. The society spays and neuters all animals, as well as checks and treats animals for known ailments from heartworm to rabies before animals can be adopted.

The society has a saying: don't breed or buy while sheltered dogs die, said Cross. Although the new facility helps alleviate some of the stress on the animals, more and

kennels until their owners are more animals continue to filter in because of their human counterparts' irresponsibility.

> Cross cannot emphasize enough how important it is to have animals spayed or neutered. The problem has become so bad, up to 90 cats per day have been arriving at the shelter. The society is not a no-kill operation and relies heavily on adoption.

June is adopt-a-cat month. Each Saturday, the society creates a different deal to connect cats of all ages with potential owners.

The facility has room for roughly 200 cats. To date 300 cats are spread out between the nooks and crannies of the facility and outside foster homes, said Cross.

Although adoption numbers have been solid over the last year, the numbers of animals coming in is on the rise, said volunteers. Some volunteers have given up holidays to assist in the daily operations of the society and to see that animals are getting adopted.

Albany County runners turned in some big performances at last weekend's New York State High School Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Cicero-North Syracuse High School.

The Colonie Central girls 1,600-meter relay team won the public school Division 1 (large school) title, while Guilderland's Brian Rhodes-Devey set a new state record for sophomores when he finished third in the third in the boys 800-meter Federation final.

Bethlehem's boys 3,200-meter relay team turned in a clutch performance when Shaker's relay team stumbled. As Shaker, the nation's third-ranked relay team, got caught up in a collision during the first baton exchange, Bethlehem kept pace with national No. 1 Syosset and finished second with a schoolrecord time of 7:50.35.

Murphy was only several feet behind Syosset's anchor runner, Chris Howell, when the final baton exchange took place. But Howell took off and broadened Syosset's lead to six seconds by the time he crossed the finish line.

"I wasn't expecting to hang with their best runner, but to finish six seconds behind them was very good," Murphy said.

Rhodes-Devey had two sub-1:53 runs in the 800. He finished with a third-place time of 1:52.73 in Friday's public school final and then ran a time of 1:52.25 in Saturday's Federation final to set

The national focus on the issue of childhood obesity has led many school districts in the area to turn the microscope internally, to seek policies that will prevent further health issues pervading their districts.

One reason districts are seeking to reduce childhood obesity is that it has been linked to juvenile diabetes.

In Bethlehem, according to the district's Supervisor of Health and Physical Education Fred Powers, the policies the district has come up with are a mix of prevention and troubleshooting.

With its inaugural fitness assessment of students in grades 4 through 10, the district found


