



A Fresh Start

World events often dictate immigration trends

Reasons for immigration can be broken down into two main categories: the push and the pull.

Those who come here searching for a better life, for religious freedom, better work opportunities and generally to improve their lives are pulled here.

Those whose lives have become unbearable due to persecution, war, and famine are pushed — they have no choice.

"Why particular groups come is a reflection of what's going on at the time," said state Assemblyman John McEneny, D-Albany, and former Albany historian.

Spree leads to arrest

The Bethlehem Police Department is investigating an incident that occurred at 716 Route 9W in Glenmont that has led to the arrest of a Shawn P. Corbett, 28, of 101 Beacon Road in Glenmont.

Corbett was arrested for first degree reckless endangerment, second degree assault, third degree criminal possession of a weapon and third degree criminal mischief, all felonies. He was also arrested on misdemeanor charges of second degree menacing and fourth degree criminal possession of a weapon.

Police said that Corbett was involved in two separate altercations on Wednesday, March 15, between 9:30 and 11 p.m. During the first altercation, Corbett pointed a loaded shotgun at the victim before firing a round over the victim's head, police said. The victim was able to flee the area without further incident.

Corbett then fired multiple rounds at the victim's vehicle, which was unoccupied, causing damage, according to police.

The second altercation took place a short time later, involving a second victim. Police said Corbett struck the victim in the face with the shotgun causing facial injuries. The victim's injuries are not life threatening. Corbett was arraigned in Town Court and sent to Albany County jail in lieu of \$25,000 cash bail. A total of four weapons have been recovered.

Budget still in flux

BOE continues to deliberate; adoption could be by next week

Bethlehem Central's school board is still deliberating the budget for the 2006-07 school year, as it's listening to and deciding on budget requests from all departments.

The working total is \$73,167,286, but the proposed budget total will not be known for sure until the board adopts the budget, which may be as early as this week.

Budget discussion at last week's meeting included anticipated increases in revenues. A total state aid increase is both the operating (spend-to-get) state aid.

The board tentatively approved some staffing additions at last Wednesday's meeting, which include an additional high school teacher, a half-team of teachers at the middle school, and some part time positions for English as a second language teacher and for elementary math. Total cost of these staff additions is \$308,510. The addition of an elementary math academic intervention services teacher would provide academic support to students who struggle with math and would help create smaller groups of students. The teacher would be available to consult for elementary math instruction at all elementary schools.

The additional high school teacher would provide more time for art, math and science. The board also discussed hiring a second high school teacher for an additional cost of \$60,040.

Students who qualify as "English language learners" has grown from 12 students in the current school year to 18

anticipated students next year.

Other budget requests include extracurricular stipends, which include modified swimming and football coaches, two National Coalition Building Institute coordinators at the middle school and high school, six new clubs at the middle and high schools, elementary intramurals, and middle and high school intramurals. Total cost of these stipends is \$21,790.

After the board adopts the budget, the district then holds public meetings to discuss the proposed budget with community until the budget vote in May.

Police Blotter

Police arrest supermarket employee on weapons charge

On March 18, Bethlehem police arrested Markel J. Johnson, 20, of 95 Clinton Ave. in Albany, for third degree criminal possession of a weapon, a felony, and for menacing the second degree.

The incident happened the

previous day. Police were called to Price Chopper in Slingerlands, where loss prevention personnel told Officer Timothy Travis that an incident involving a knife between two employees happened about 4 a.m. March 17.

A verbal altercation occurred between Johnson, an employee, and the victim, also an employee. The victim was asked to assist Johnson in stocking items, and he became verbally abusive with her, continuing even after she told him not to disrespect her in that way, police said.

Johnson then pulled out a box cutter toward the victim, police said, and the victim, fearing her safety, pushed Johnson away before he came too close.

Johnson replied, "Don't touch me" and swore at her, and began advancing toward the victim. The victim told Johnson if he didn't stop, she would punch him in the face, and Johnson approached her and dared her to do it, police said.

At that point, another person stepped between them and told Johnson that she was going to advise the assistant night manager, but Johnson continued to follow the victim through the store, saying he was going to kill her, police said. Johnson then told the victim he would be waiting in the parking lot for her.

Officer Travis interviewed the victim, who filed a deposition and requested an order of protection.

Officer Regina Cocchiara followed up the next day, and Johnson was arrested and arraigned by Judge Paul Dwyer. He was brought to Albany County jail and is due back in court April 25 at 4 p.m.

On March 16, police arrested Jeffrey M. Blanche, 28, of 28 Forest Ave. in Albany on charges of DWI.

Blanche's vehicle was seen by police headed south on Route 9W near the D&H train underpass, and the vehicle passed into the oncoming lane with Officer Jeffrey Vunck taking action to prevent a crash, police said. The vehicle turned on Herber Avenue and then onto Glendale Avenue, police said.

Blanche was pulled over in the driveway, and police detected a strong odor of alcohol. Blanche stated, "Just take me in," and held out his hands to be cuffed, police said. He refused chemical testing for alcohol.

Blanche was placed into custody and was arraigned before Judge Paul Dwyer. Bail was set at \$1,500 and was posted by Blanche.

He is due back in court April 25 at 4 p.m. A refusal hearing will take place March 30 at 1 p.m.

BOU auction marks 20 years

On Friday, Bethlehem residents will have a chance to win some fabulous prizes while helping to keep area kids safe from substance abuse.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the auction hosted by Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited, a substance abuse prevention group which raises grant money for student activities.

BOU started 22 years ago by parents and school staff who were concerned with kids using alcohol and drugs.

"Back in the 80s, house parties were a real problem," said Kathy Betzhold, president of BOU. "There was a lot of property damage, and parents and teachers were concerned. Kids would say this is 'Dull-mar,' and that there was nothing to do. We said that just isn't true, and began working to help kids find fun and constructive ways to spend their time."

The problem has not gone away, she said.

"It's ongoing, and we're an ongoing organization," she said.

The yearly auction is BOU's only fundraiser. Most years the auction is well-attended, with anywhere from \$10,000 to \$15,000 donated by individuals and local businesses.

The auction is a fun and family oriented affair. Some of the auction items are specifically geared toward children and teenagers, but there are quite a few items for adults up for bid, such as a weekend at Martha's Vineyard, gift certificates for dinner out, and sports tickets such as pre-season tickets to see the New York Jets and tickets to see the New York Yankees.

And of course, the auction would not be complete without a wide selection of "priceless" or novelty items. Hamagrael Elementary School principal Davied Ksanznak is auctioning his services as the singing waiter for some lucky students at lunch time, and another lucky student will get to be superintendent for the day and follow BCSD Superintendent Leslie Loomis around all day. A chance to ride in the fire truck at the Memorial Day parade will sure to be a hit with younger children, and older kids will appreciate a Kaplan SAT course.

"We try to have a variety of things for all ages," said Betzhold. "We have a nice range, but our primary mission is to support kids through adolescence and the difficult choices they have to make. We want to be the village behind the individuals."

Most of the money raised goes to school based activities, simply because that's where most of the adults who work with children are. After school clubs and programs get some of their funding from BOU. Coming programs include a talk from Sandy Slade, a professional basketball player and motivational speaker who uses her basketball skills to teach life skills. Slade will be coming May 1 to the middle school. BOU is also co-sponsoring Glenmont Elementary School in the kids race portion of the Delmar Dash in April.

The auction is Friday, March 24, at 7 p.m. in the high school cafeteria.

"The cafeteria will be transformed for the gala, and there are always lots of people," said Betzhold "It's a good time."

Scouts preparing public for worst

Girls educating people on the importance of having a 'File of Life'

It's not just older folks who need to be prepared for emergencies, and two Girl Scouts in Delmar have been spreading the word.

Colleen Bernstein and Karin Beswick, both in sixth grade at St. Thomas the Apostle School, have been working hard to educate people on the importance of having a File of Life.

File of Life is a red magnetized envelope that is attached to the outside of the refrigerator and contains pertinent medical information—information that can save lives in an emergency, when every second counts.

File of Life is funded by Bethlehem Senior Projects, a nonprofit organization that works with Bethlehem Senior Services, and 10,000 Files of Life were purchased in 2004 for \$4,100. It replaces the outdated Vial of Life, a tube containing medical

information and kept in the refrigerator.

File of Life was begun in honor of the late Maynard "Red" Goyer, a longtime community volunteer. "Red" also began the original Vial of Life.

"Before he died, he asked that any contributions be given to Bethlehem Senior Projects, so we thought this would be a great thing to do with that money," said Karen Pellettier, director of Bethlehem Senior Services. Money that was donated in Red's honor as well as donations from the Bethlehem Lions Club funded File of Life.

"It's not just for unhealthy people," said Maureen Bernstein, mother of Colleen. "People don't want to think about it, but they really should."

Bernstein is leader of the Girl Scout troop her daughter, Colleen, and her friend Karin Beswick are part of. Both girls are pursuing the Girl Scouts Bronze Award, which requires a 15-hour community service project. The girls have distributed over 1,000 Files of Life. After completing the project, the girls have to write an essay telling what they have learned about the experience.

"They were very motivated and have gotten pretty good at their organizational skills and public speaking," said Bernstein.

In addition to speaking at the town of Bethlehem senior luncheon, the Second Miler's Club, and the St. Thomas School and Parish, the girls also stood outside Hannaford, Price Chopper, and CVS, offering free Files of Life and talking to people one-on-one about the program.

"It was fun, and I got to work with a friend," said Colleen Bernstein. "Public speaking is easier when you know what you are going to say."

Bernstein and Beswick spoke at each gathering for three to four minutes, and got in lots of one-on-one time with their booths at the supermarkets.

"It's great what the girls have done," said Pellettier. "We've tried many different ways to distribute the File of Life."

"People are still confused about what it is, and the girls have been coming up with ways to make people more aware of it," said Bernstein.



Mosaic tile artwork a passion for Delmar resident

If Christine Shea isn't careful, everything she owns will soon be covered in mosaic tile.

The 56 year-old part time nurse at St. Peter's Hospital is spending more and more time working on mosaic art. What started three years ago as an outgrowth of stained glass work has become a passion, which has blossomed into a part time career and recognition from Mosaic Art 2005, an international portfolio of mosaic art on CD-Rom.

"I'm like a junkie, I order all the supplies online, and I can't wait until the UPS man arrives," she said.

Always an artistic person, Shea used to do stained glass years ago but stopped because of work pressures and breathing in fumes from soldering was bad for her health. Shea just happened to pick

up a book on mosaic art, and the rest is history.

She started selling her pieces to her friends at work, and by word of mouth, has developed a nice sideline.

"The work is pleasantly steady," she said. "It gets a little crazy around the holidays."

Shea works out of her home in

Delmar, and can make mosaic art out of just about anything. Tables, mirrors, vases, knick knock holders, lanterns, jars, candle holders, kitchen backsplashes, almost anything can be made more beautiful by Shea's mosaic design work.

Mosaic is a very old art form, which goes back to Greek and Roman times, and consists of creating a design with very small glass tiles. Tiles can be clear, cloudy, mirrored, and made out of anything the artist wants. The tiles can be small, perfect squares or large pieces made from smashing the glass. There really are no rules.

"It can be as simple or as complicated as you want it," she said.

Her favorite pieces have Asian symbols, mostly because she finds them peaceful, and the symbols and the simplicity makes them pleasant to work on. Many of her pieces take about a day to complete.

Shea considers it humbling that she was chosen as part of Mosaic Art 2005.

"I have a lot to learn, and I want to take some more classes," she said. "Just to see what others have done is very humbling."

The hardest part of mosaic

artwork for Shea is also the most fun. Coming up with an idea for someone else can be difficult, she said. Currently she is working on the sign for Just Pilates.

"You put it together hoping what you see and feel is what they will see and feel as well," she said. "It's a labor of love."

Shea prices her work based on what materials she had to buy and how much time and effort went into it. Still, she wants to keep prices reasonable — if no one can afford her work, then she won't sell it, and she won't be able to afford to do it anymore.

As well as being a nurse, she also teaches a class at Creative Art Time Studio at 135 Adams St., which she wants to do more of. Learning other ways to create mosaics are goals for the future, and she loves that she is able to spend as much time doing it as she does.

"I feel like I'm a better nurse, because when I'm there, I want to be there," she said. "I get to spend time doing what I really love."

I guarantee you have not heard the last of Kathy. And instead of feeling sad for yourself, feel sorry for me instead. Not only won't I have her column to read, I also have to fill the space. No easy task.

Literally minutes after I e-mailed Kathy my first column for this space, I sat down to read her farewell column. I experienced feelings of melancholy. Then panic set in.

"Oh my lord" I yelled to my husband as I spotted my name in the paper. "Kathy has described

me as insightful and I just sent her a column about my inability to defrost food for dinner."

But then I saw that it wasn't me after all she was describing. It was someone named Schrager, with a "c", and I have no "c" in my name.

"The pressure is off," I told Jeff, "If I am ever accused of lack of insight, I will simply say I am being confused with Robin Sccccccccchrager."

Somewhere, the Schrager-with-a-c woman is writing insightful pieces, and I commend her for doing so, because writing is hard work.

Just ask my dad, who shocked me when I told him about the column offer.

"You don't want to do that," said my father.

What? This from the guy who demanded I e-mail him my Point of View columns so that he could forward them to all his friends in South Florida.

"It's too much pressure," he continued. "You already have enough going on."

I do? True, I do go to work and come home and go to work and come home and take my daughter to dance and go to work and then come home. I also spend time avoiding housework, nagging about homework and feeling hopeless about feeding my family nutritious meals. But gee, it can't be fun and games all the time!

"A weekly column is a lot of work," said my sister, a real-life full-time paid journalist who has been writing commentaries for many years.



V'ville focus still on allegations

This is the time of year that school boards are deliberating budgets and planning for the future. In Voorheesville, though, the focus remains on a Jan. 24 report from the office of the State Comptroller Alan Hevesi alleging financial misconduct on the part of former Superintendent Alan McCartney and Assistant Business Superintendent Anthony Marturano.

The issue of the alleged misappropriation of over \$200,000 in vacation time caused the 15 minutes allotted for public comment at the March 13 board meeting to last nearly an hour.

"A lot of people want to know what went on here," resident Marty Finkle said.

"These were transactions that

didn't abide by his own contract," board president Joseph F. Pofit said about McCartney's actions.

"The auditors have completed their function," Pofit said. "Administrative staff has been cleared. We will be bringing Sarita back."

Those in attendance applauded at the news that Sarita Winchell, school business official, who had been placed on administrative leave pending further investigation, will be returning.

When asked, Pofit indicated that previous audits were exclusively financial in nature and did not comment on internal controls.

"How many signatures were required?" asked Valerie Glover.

The board said that only one was required.

"Controls are in place," said Superintendent Linda Langevin, commenting on steps to strengthen the business office.

C. James Coffin, board vice president, said that an internal auditor will be added. Reporting directly to the board, this position will provide, "the ability to get to information that should come to

the board, things we weren't able to get to before," Coffin said.

"The board is unanimous that we continue the course," Pofit said.

The board is pursuing a civil lawsuit to recover the funds.

Pofit said that due to the ongoing litigation, he was limited to what he could state publicly.

"The public wants answers from this board about the cost in additional funds," Finkle said.

Pofit said that although he did not have the exact figures in hand, the board was carefully monitoring the additional financial burden.

"Our children's education is now vulnerable," Ann Biese said. "The board has a responsibility to the children," she continued. "They have to answer to the parents."

"Morale is shot," said bus driver Chris Allard.

"Is this over?" she asked in reference to the various investigations, including the probe by the District Attorney. "It needs to be in the public record that good employees have been exonerated."

To feel totally alive, head for Manhattan. In the short 150 miles from the Amtrak station in Rennselaer to Penn Station in New York City — or in the three hours by car along the Thruway — you can see the season changing along the Hudson, whether it's sailboats plying the water or small buds starting to peek from the bushes and trees as you speed along.

Pastoral spring yields to pure adrenalin, though, as you step

onto New York City's pavement.

Ask Manhattan aficionados what they love best about the Big Apple, and they'll all say about the same thing: There's a kind of energy there you don't find anywhere else.

Maybe it comes from the crush of humanity, all dressed just a little more sharply than those of us in the Capital District. Maybe it's the way everybody moves just a little more quickly, leaving us to imagine that they have someplace vitally important or incredibly scintillating that they must be in the next half hour.

The world's media center remains in midtown, so how about a tour of NBC at Rockefeller Plaza, which looks a whole lot different when the Christmas crowds are gone? Where to stay in New York depends on your budget. One current tip is the chain, Affinia Suites. The chain's nine hotels are in central locations, priced right, and the kitchen provides a great way for a family to start the day — no shrieking, confined children while Mom and Dad try to shower before heading into the city that only seems to sleep on Sunday mornings.

Kids in the city? You bet. Head for the Alice in Wonderland statue in Central Park. The best way in is from Fifth Avenue and 74th Street; head down the hill, past the pond of water where Holden Caulfield wondered where the ducks go in winter (give yourself two literary points if you remember who Holden is) and head right.

Kids under 10 — maybe under 12 — will love to scramble up, over and under the bronze statue of Alice, the March Hare and the Mad Hatter, and parents can sit for just a minute and wonder what it's like to live in Manhattan with kids.

There's not enough ink in the world to describe New York — and if you follow your best-laid plans too closely, you could miss the occasional surprise that New York offers. Best advice? Check out nycvisit.com for enough tips to jump-start you, put on a comfortable pair of shoes, and just go.

It's ironic that the day the Chamber of Commerce announces a campaign to place flowers in Delmar is the same day a CVS construction crew cuts down a beautiful mature tree at the corner of Elsmere and Delaware avenues.

That tree, old as it was, could still shade pedestrians, block the sunshine from drivers, provide habitat for birds and other animals and help maintain the pleasant approach on the Delmar/Elsmere corridor. That tree is now gone forever and will most likely be replaced by a small diameter "parking lot" tree.

It is also ironic that the result of a "beautification" plan for Bethlehem Public Library was the loss of at least two mature maple trees and several other mature trees. Yes, the benches, walkways and plantings are nice but the loss of mature trees, even ones with some dead branches, is also a loss of animal habitat, shading potential and beauty.

A new bus exit for the middle school resulted in the loss of three very large trees on private

property. They will never be replaced and their stately beauty and energy saving shading of the apartment building next door is now gone. Soon, the large trees in front of Elsmere Elementary School may soon suffer similar destruction if the parking lot is expanded.

While growth in this town is inevitable and its merits debatable, smart growth is certainly achievable.

Big box businesses can co-exist with trees that were there before construction began. Gardens can be planted and benches can be placed around mature trees and newly planted trees. Driveways can be realigned so that trees can stay. Creative design of parking lots can allow for trees to remain while still making room for a few more parking spots. If the town and the school district don't take more care in their respective planning and if concerned residents don't speak out, the precious little green space we now have is sure to be threatened more than ever.

BCCA backs all-weather turf field

Editor, The Spotlight:

The Bethlehem Central Athletic Association (BCAA) supports all the sports programs at all Bethlehem Central Schools, in addition to raising money and awarding college scholarships to seniors. Our association represents the needs and concerns of hundreds of student athletes and their parents.

Two years ago, school board members met with our association's representatives to ask for our support for the school bond project that was up for a vote. Our organization wholeheartedly supported the bond measure. I personally contacted over 100 parents who are members of the BCCA asking for their support. The bond passed by a narrow margin, and may not have passed at all if BCAA members did not ask their members to support it.

The bond measure includes

the construction of two new athletic fields. However, these two new fields will require the removal of green space by cutting down trees and encroaching into federal wetlands. Additionally, the school board does not yet have federal approval to use these wetlands, plus these grass fields will only be usable six months out of the year due to inclement weather.

BCAA has learned of a viable and cost effective alternative to the current plan to destroy trees and wetlands to build two new athletic fields. That alternative is to install an all-weather turf field on an existing field rather than cut down trees to build two more fields. The funding for this turf field already exists in the bond budget, and in fact the turf field will actually generate income for the high school through tournament and sectional games and activities.

More important than cost savings, the most worthwhile benefit of a turf field will be the

safety of our children. The new technology used in turf fields today has proven to reduce sports injuries. Moreover, our spring sports teams are currently all practicing indoors because the outside fields are unusable until April. Teams must stagger practice times due to limited gym space with some teams practicing as late as 9 p.m. on a school night. We could add 10 new grass fields and they will still be unusable until mid-April. However, a turf field will give all our student athletes the ability to practice on a regular full-size playing field year-round.

It is a concept that will preserve the environment, reduce injuries to our children, save taxpayer money and provide a far better athletic facility for our students. I encourage the community to support this resolution. If it passes, our sports teams could be playing on a state-of-the-art athletic field as early as the fall.



Bethlehem's winning science team heading to D.C.

BC tops 18 area teams to win regional competition

The Bethlehem Central High School Science Bowl team captured first place in the regionals of the National Science Bowl competition March 4. The team is made up of captain Jacob Abolafia, a senior, and four juniors: Stefan Weijolola, Liam Bowne, Peter Bonaventure, and Paul Fang.

"This is our fourth win," said the team's coach, Paul O'Reilly, a biology teacher at the high school. "There were 18 teams at the competition. Because of the way it was set up, our team played only 10 matches."

Only. The team went undefeated all day. The regional competition took place at the General Electric Research and Development Center in Niskayuna. GE is a regional sponsor.

The regional win means the Bethlehem team, along with winners of the other 64 regional competitions, will go onto the National Science Bowl competition in Washington, D.C. April 27 through May 1.

"At the national level, the kids tour Washington, D.C., and visit landmarks on Friday. On Saturday they get to hear top scientists lecture on amazing topics," said O'Reilly. "Theories on how the universe was created, for instance. And on Sunday they play."

O'Reilly compared it to a sporting event.

"The competition is a fun thing; quite exciting to watch," he said. He said it was similar to a sporting event, "but not as well advertised."

The team members meet once a week and practice together after school. O'Reilly drills team members in their specialty areas.

"We even have buzzers," O'Reilly said with a laugh.

Some of the team members are also on O'Reilly's Master-minds team, and are familiar with the format.

Is the team hard at work preparing for nationals?

"Most of them were in *Les Miserables* this past weekend," said O'Reilly of his well-rounded team.

Indeed, four of the five team

members were part of the cast or crew of Stage 700's recent offering. O'Reilly said once the final curtain had come down, the team members would continue to drill together as a team, and study individually in their areas of expertise. And O'Reilly would continue acquiring new questions to throw out at his team.

"One of the best things about the national competition," said O'Reilly, "is that the kids get to meet and interact with other kids from all over the country. They met students from Alabama, and from Hawaii, that they connected with."

The National Science Bowl is an academic competition that began in 1991. The competition tests the teams' knowledge (each

team has four members and one alternate) in all areas of science in a team format. The event is run by the Department of Energy and involves 12,000 high school students from 1,800 schools across the United States.

There was a separate National Middle School Science Bowl competition, also held on March 4. Bethlehem's middle school team won third place in the

academic competition. The team was quizzed on biology, chemistry, physics, astronomy, earth science, computer science, and mathematics.

The team was made up of eighth graders Samuel Stern, Allison Teevan, Jared Mayron, and Connor Duffy, and seventh grader Tom Hart.

BCMS science teacher Todd Tyler coached the team.

Author presents Naples from 'back streets'

For Dan Hofstadter, living in Naples was "like having my ear to the seashell of the world." Hofstadter's new book, *Falling Palace: a Romance of Naples* (Knopf 2005) was praised in the *New York Times* Sunday Book Review as "free of knowingness, charged with experience ... written with the ease of affection and discovery."

The book weaves the tale of an elusive personal romance with a vivid and haunting evocation of the legendary city.

The author will talk about his latest work in "Naples: Voices from the Back Streets" at the library on Sunday, April 2 at 2 p.m.

Hofstadter graduated from Columbia University and studied at the Sorbonne on scholarship. He began frequenting Naples in the 1960s, discovering a city



whose bustle and vitality resembled the vanishing street life of Manhattan. Damaged by war and plagued by endemic social problems, Naples nonetheless remained physically beautiful and culturally authentic, with its own dialect, theater, cabaret and cuisine.

In *Falling Palace*, the author interweaves his sojourns in Naples' back streets and his involvement with a young woman named Benedetta. This interlude offers an occasion for character sketches of various eccentric Neapolitans, including a radio fortune-teller, a doctor practicing

medieval medicine, a male nurse with his fingers in several illicit pies, and a pair of brothers who wander the abandoned subway. From the mysterious Benedetta the author learns to accept and enjoy a city where everyone knows everyone else's business, where no one is ever alone, and where no one stands on truly solid ground.

Hofstadter has lived abroad much of his life and speaks fluent French, Italian and Swedish. He is the author of three previous books. His collection of essays on French writers, *The Love Affair as a Work of Art*, was nominated for a National Book Critics Circle award. He has written features for many magazines specializing in the field of visual art, and was a regular contributor to *The New Yorker* for eight years. He now lives in the Hudson Valley.

Lutheran church hosts Haydn concert in April

The Jubilate Singers will present Haydn's "The Seven Last Words Of Christ" on Sunday, April 2 at 7 p.m. at Bethlehem Lutheran Church, 85 Elm Ave., Delmar. Professional soloists and orchestra will join the Singers for the concert. Individual tickets are \$15 and family tickets are \$25.

In 1801, Haydn wrote the following about his masterpiece. "About 15 years ago I was asked by the Cathedral Chapter of Cadiz (Spain) to compose instrumental music on the Seven Words of Jesus on the cross. Following an appropriate prelude, the bishop ascended the pulpit, said one of the words and then added his own sermon on it. When he had finished, he descended and knelt before the altar. This interval was filled with music. The bishop ascended and descended the pulpit for the second time, third time, and so forth, and each time the orchestra filled in the intervening period with music."

By 1787, Haydn prepared two versions of the original orchestral work, one for string quartet and another for piano. In 1794, Frieberth, a little-known musician in Passau, added words and arranged the piece as a choral work.

Haydn, prompted by Frieberth's attempt, prepared his own choral version in 1796 with a text compiled by Baron van Swieten who later provided the texts for Haydn's *The Creation* and *The Seasons*. Van Swieten chose verses from both the Old and New Testaments dealing with Jesus' final words. In the resulting oratorio, the choir offers each word, except the fifth, before the meditation on the word with a quartet of soloists. The piece concludes with a musical picture of the earthquake that accompanied the death of Christ. An English adaptation of the text made by the Rev. H. Clementi-Smith, Precenter of the Cathedral, Manchester England will be used for this performance.

This was the last piece Haydn conducted in public before his death.

The Jubilate Singers have been in existence for five years under the direction of Ralph C. Schultz. They have presented Handel's *Messiah*, Brahms' *Requiem*, Bach's *St. John Passion*, Bach's *Cantata: Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands*, and *Chorale Mass* by Schultz.





The weather may still feel wintry, but the 19th annual Capital District Garden and Flower Show is sure to put a little spring in your step.

Scheduled for this Friday, March 24, through Sunday, March 26, at Hudson Valley Community College, this year's

theme is "Nature's Magic," and will offer lectures, tips, and of course, thousands of flowers, plants and sample gardens for visitors to view. Vendors will also be on hand so that gardeners — and garden lovers — can purchase goods to get a jump-start on the season.

bunch."

The victory certainly captured the rest of the state's attention, especially on Long Island, where lacrosse is virtually ingrained into the youth sports culture.

"I think when a team like Massapequa, which is ranked seventh in the state (in a preseason poll), is calling to arrange a game with us shows that they want to see what they're up against," said Vorgang.

The primary reason why Section II teams have improved has been the

development of strong youth programs in the region. Many of the largest suburban communities have boys teams in the Capital District Youth Lacrosse League, which has divisions for players as young as third grade. Certain schools such as Niskayuna and Guilderland also have youth programs in place for both boys and girls players.

"Our youth program is huge," said Vorgang. "We have almost 70 fifth and sixth graders playing."

"They can play year-round now," added McQuade. "There's indoor facilities that they can use like the one in Halfmoon and the new one in Queensbury."

McQuade also cited other factors in the evolution of Section

II lacrosse.

"It's no longer a baby (sport) anymore. There's a few schools that are celebrating their 25th year this season," he said. "The other thing is I think coaches are working hard at it. They're not leaving the gym and washing their hands of it anymore. They're thinking about it full time."

"I think the coaching has evolved and has caught the other sections," said Vorgang.

With better coaching, players being educated in the sport at an earlier age and more frequent success at the state level, area coaches are saying it's only a matter of time before a Section II boys or girls lacrosse team wins a state title.

"I think lacrosse in general has taken the Capital District by storm and has never let up," said McQuade.

for basically the same price that Miami paid to get him.

The risk here is minimal. Culpepper may not have the same mobility that he had before last season's knee injury, but he still has a cannon of an arm. Give him some good receivers to work with, and he has the ability to be one of the top quarterbacks in the NFL. Why not give up a second-round draft pick to acquire someone like that?

Certainly, Miami needed a quarterback like Culpepper. The Dolphins have been one of the best defensive teams in the league, but their offense has been maddeningly stagnant the last several years because they've been led by the likes

of Jay Fiedler, A.J. Feely and Gus Frerotte. Culpepper gives Miami a marquee performer at a critical position.

As for Oakland, the Raiders are in real trouble now. Not only did they pass on Culpepper, but they also missed out on Drew Brees (who signed with New Orleans), and they got rid of Kerry Collins — a guy who may not always play well, but put a chip on his shoulder and watch him suddenly turn into Joe Montana. Unless Oakland trades up in the first round or gets lucky when several teams pass on drafting Vince Young, the Raiders may be stuck with someone who, at best, would be a second string quarterback.

• I like the direction the Cleveland Browns are going. They acquired a reliable receiver (Joe Jurevicius), some offensive line help (LeCharles Bentley) and a big-time defensive lineman (Ted Washington). If they are successful in luring Willie McGinest away from New England, the Browns may be able to compete in the AFC North as soon as next year. That is, as long as Pittsburgh and Cincinnati fall back to the pack a bit. As a Browns' fan, I can only hope for that.

• Anthony Weaver (Saratoga Springs) and André Davis (Niskayuna) now have the opportunity to be stars in the NFL, but at a price. Weaver could become an anchor on the Houston Texans' defensive line, and Davis could be Buffalo's No. 1 or No. 2 receiver if Eric Moulds leaves. However, they probably won't get to the Super Bowl while playing for those teams. Still, being a starring starter is better than being a bench player, so let's hope our local NFL players get the time in the spotlight that they deserve.





Section II lacrosse teams have state coaches talking

The days when Section II lacrosse teams were happy just to be competitive against the rest of the state are over.

With the recent playoff success stories at Niskayuna, Shenendehowa and Bethlehem, area teams now believe that they can not only be competitive at the state level, but they can also win.

"I think it's a natural progression," said Niskayuna boys lacrosse coach Mike Vorgang, whose Silver Warriors became the first Section II team to reach the state finals last season. "I think the natural progression is that a team from Section II can compete for the state title."

"I think the overall level of play has been raised in Section II," said Bethlehem girls lacrosse coach Dawn Austin. "What I find is that it makes it better to be competitive in Sectionals. If you have a tough section to go through, then it makes it better for you once you get to the regional level."

Bethlehem has set the bar high for girls lacrosse in the region. The Lady Eagles have won seven consecutive Section II titles, reached the state semifinals the last four years and made the state finals in 2002 and 2005.

"I think what Bethlehem does lends credibility to what Section II is doing," said Guilderland girls lacrosse coach Gary Chatnik. "It just transcends into people outside the section having a favorable view of this area."

Austin, who took over for John Battagino last year, said that what has kept Bethlehem a step ahead of its Section II competition is the depth of talent within the program.

"I think that's why Bethlehem is so successful — we build a team," said Austin, who coached the JV team for several seasons before moving up to the varsity level. "Even though we've lost seven seniors from last

year's team, I have players who can replace them."

As Bethlehem has maintained its strength, other Section II girls lacrosse programs have grown stronger in the attempt to catch the Lady Eagles. Besides Saratoga — which won the first five Sectional titles before Bethlehem began its run — the list of contenders has grown to include Guilderland, Shenendehowa and Niskayuna.

"I see our section this year as an incredible section," said Chatnik, whose Guilderland squad upended Saratoga in last year's Sectional semifinals to reach its first championship game in the program's

history. "These kids have all improved tremendously."

Likewise, Section II boys lacrosse has grown more competitive in recent years, and Niskayuna's run to last year's state class A final shows the progress. Prior to that, Shenendehowa had reached the state semifinals three consecutive years beginning in 2002 and became the first Section II team to have a halftime lead over a team from Long Island when they grabbed a 4-3 advantage over West Islip in the 2004 state semifinal — a game the Plainsmen lost 12-5.

"For us to have the lead at halftime was amazing," said Shen coach Mark

McQuade.

Niskayuna's 11-6 victory over West Islip in last year's state semifinal was a significant step forward, though. Not only did it send the Silver Warriors into the state finals, but it also ended Long Island's dominance over upstate competition. Typically, Long Island teams have met the Syracuse-region champion in the state finals by beating the champion from the Section II-IX region.

"That Niskayuna team will probably go down (in history) like our 2002 team or our 2003 team," said McQuade. "That was a special

Several teams to compete for championships

Here's a look at how area high school lacrosse teams are shaping up for the 2006 season.

Bethlehem

The 2006 lacrosse season brings a lot of question marks for the Bethlehem Eagles boys team as they look to fill voids left by a very senior laden 2005 team.

The Eagles, who won the Gold Division last year, will be looking to repeat as champions. They will have to do it without their leading scorer from a year ago, Andrew Kelleher, and their goalkeeper, both graduated.

"We had a lot of seniors that graduated last year who were key players. We're a younger team, and without question one of the areas we're going to have to take a look at is experience because as a team we don't have a lot of it," said head coach Dave Rounds.

Rounds said he expects three players to carry the load offensively

this season: junior midfielder Matt Johnson, senior middy Ryan O'Donnell and sophomore middy Dylan Eder.

On defense, the Eagles return Steve Hannigan, who is expected to lead from his position.

The goaltending spot might pose problems for the Eagles' who are expecting a first year varsity starter to step in and perform the goaltending duties.

The Eagles' begin their quest to repeat as Gold Division champions when they play CBA Thursday, March 29.

Shaker

The Shaker Boys lacrosse team is expected to challenge for the top spot in Section II Class A this season as they return a solid core of seniors.

"We had a couple of years where we fell off a bit and these kids have paid their dues playing here for 3 or 4 years through the tough times with us," said head coach Joe Bennett who enters his 11th season at Shaker.

"Our key players this season will be our five seniors."

The five seniors are all captains, two of which have been four-year starters — Aaron Kennedy and Griff McLoughlin.

"I think these are the two top defensemen in Section II," Bennett said.

The Bison's three other returning seniors are three-year varsity starters: midfielders Ryan Tibbitts and Owen Harris and attackman Bruce Lee.

Shaker will also rely on a few of their juniors, attackman Mike Bette, midfielder Mike Hayes, and defensemen Brian Tourtellott.

Bennett will be looking to A.J. Battaglia to handle the goaltending duties, he begins his first season at the varsity level.

The Bison open April 4 against Columbia.

Shenendehowa

Shenendehowa Plainsmen head

coach Mark McQuade isn't too sure what to expect from his boys lacrosse team this season.

The Plainsmen lost some key players from last year's team, including leading scorer Bobby Karl.

The brightest spot on the team might be goaltender Alex Bayer.

"We want to be competitive this year, we lost some kids from last year that can play the game pretty well," said McQuade, who starts his eighth season at Shen. "We're looking for some kids to step in and fill some of those rolls that we lost to graduation."

At the midfield position the Plainsmen return Sam White, senior Ryan DeSalvatore and sophomore Adam Hitchko.

On defense, Shen will be looking to Micah Stratton to lead a relatively young defense.

Croats and Poles were among those who settled in New York during the late 1600s and 1700s.

The Dutch language was predominant throughout the 1700s, with about 50 percent of people speaking it, and even more in farm country. After the American Revolution, English became the predominant language.

The first major immigrants were the Irish, who worked on the Erie Canal and the railroads. In the 1840s, the Irish potato famine brought staggering numbers of Irish immigrants to this country. The Germans and

French were also arriving.

Mill towns in the area, like Cohoes, Watervliet and Troy, were growing at this time, and many immigrants were recruited to work here from their own country or directly from Ellis Island, McEneny said.

"G.E would recruit these people, get them to come to Troy and Watervliet and Schenectady, to work," he said.

Groups of the same nationality forming communities were one of the draws of this area. Immigrants would cluster, forming churches and communities where they were. Some came to this country for seasonal work and were allowed to go home when the work was done, with their job waiting for them.

Churches in the area are a good indicator of who was being recruited and who was attracted to the area.

"The onion domes of Watervliet are from the Ukrainian and Russian Orthodox immigrants

who moved there," said McEneny.

African American immigrants had a huge role to play in the 1600s and 1700s, but their role diminished because of the overwhelming number of European immigrants. The African American population has grown mostly because of internal migration in the 20th century.

Discriminatory immigration laws, which allowed only a certain number of immigrants from each country, were passed in the early 1900s but were changed under President John F. Kennedy, who said those laws were racist and biased. After World War II, there was a huge quota of European immigrants, but not so many came to the Capital District. In the 1960s, people came on the basis of merit, instead of quota.

"Many of the new immigrants were Asians and South Americans," said McEneny.

Also different is that new immigrants are more scattered.

"There is no 'Little Bosnia' anywhere," said McEneny. "So we're not as conscious of it."

Molly Short, director of the U.S. Committee for Refugees and Immigrants field office in Albany, said refugees get placed according to need. Formerly the International Center of the Capital Region, which closed in 2003, the U.S. Committee resettles refugees in areas where their needs will be met.

"We look to see if they have close friends in an area, if they are minors, if they have specific health problems, and we decide where they should go based on the area that can help them," Short said.

Not a lot of special cases come to Albany, she said. Most of the refugees who resettle in this area are here because there are others in their population. It is also employment based.

"Many refugees have been in situations where they have not

worked, or have had no control over what they were doing," she said. "Many are happy with the jobs they can get here."

Albany is a good community, she said, because there is good housing, it's fairly inexpensive, and the smaller community can make them more secure.

"Many came from rural areas, others came from cities, so Albany is a good blend," she said.

The resettlement process can take a long time, sometimes about 15 years. Physicals, referrals, interviews, and background investigations are part of what makes the process so lengthy.

"There is a lot of decision making before someone is accepted," she said.

Since the office opened last May, about 60 people have been placed around the Capital District, and this year, about 160 more will be placed. Those groups include a Burmese population in Rensselaer, Liberians that arrived this summer and are already forming a community, Afghans in Schenectady, and a large Russian population in Albany.



The drive inside

The room is bright and airy with candy in dishes on glass tables. The two energetic women inside greet customers warmly.

It's hard to imagine the struggles these two women have faced, fleeing the war in Bosnia, their home country, to Germany and ultimately ending up in Delmar. Their smiles and contagious laughter display the happiness these women have found, finally feeling safe and secure.

Samra Bartula, 28, and Amra Bartula, 47, own and operate Ines Beauty Salon on Delaware Avenue. Samra's husband Damir, Amra's son, is the manager.

Samra and Damir met in Germany, where many Bosnians went during the war. Amra and her family moved to Delmar eight years ago, with Samra coming the year after to be with Damir, when her family returned to Bosnia.

"We left Germany because we couldn't stay there anymore," Samra said. "My husband wanted to come to the States so I followed him. I couldn't come with him and had to wait 10 months."

Amra had wanted the family to move to Delmar because she has a sister in Glenmont, who owns Casa Mia Restaurant, and would help them to get on their feet.

"Before, I didn't see my sister for eight years," said Amra. "I couldn't believe I was seeing her again after so long."

Samra had gone to beautician school in Germany, and worked various jobs after arriving in America to make ends meet. She was determined to have her own business and joined up with Amra to do so.

"I feel a lot of people from other countries have the intention to do something bigger," said Samra. "We always wanted to do something with our lives."

Neither of the two women knew any English when they immigrated to the area, and learned it just by talking to people and asking the words for certain things. The two laughed as they remember pointing to objects and

asking "this?"

"It's a huge transition because we didn't know English and had to look for jobs right away," said Samra.

When asked about any homesickness, she said, "I miss my country a lot, my whole family

too."

"We believe in being good people and one God for everyone," said Samra. "A lot of Bosnians came here for that reason. After the war there was a lot of ethnic cleansing. I think that's why America let people come over, because of that."

Amra tells of being in a "mixed marriage," because she and her husband do not practice the same religion. The ethnic cleansing would have put the couple in a very difficult situation.

"Many people had no choice and had to go back," said Amra. "We are a strong

people."

There are about 80 Bosnian families in the area that the Bartulas know about. They travel to Utica occasionally to get Bosnian food because there is a large Bosnian population there. They want to stay in Delmar since the family they do have is nearby and because it welcomed them from a turbulent journey.

"It's a small town where everybody knows everybody and likes everybody. Our family lives in this area and helps us to feel more at home," said Samra.

"I think America is a very great place with huge opportunities for education and business," said Amra. "I'm really happy to be here."

lives there."

The last time she saw them was over three years ago, and she currently is planning to visit again this summer.

Amra misses the way her country was before the war and does not want to return to what it has become.

"Delmar is a very good place for family, we feel safe here," she said.

Learning English and raising her two daughters to be bilingual, Samra tries to balance her ethnicity and her surroundings.

"I maintain Bosnian mentality, we speak Bosnian at home," she said. "I cannot give up who I am but am trying to adopt America
