**Students testify  
 Where was Porco?**

**Witnesses didn't see him sleeping in lounge**

Seven students from the University of Rochester, which Christopher Porco once attended, testified in his murder trial they did not see their frat brother and friend sleeping in the student lounge at Munro Hall dormitory during the early morning hours of Nov. 15, 2004.

Porco is on trial for the murder of his father, Peter Porco, and attempted murder of his mother, Joan Porco. Peter Porco was murdered with an ax on Nov. 15, 2004, and Joan Porco survived severe injuries by an ax.

Prosecutors called graduates and current students of the university to bolster their case that Christopher Porco lied to friends and authorities when he told them he was sleeping in the fraternity's student lounge the night his parents were attacked at 36

Brockley Drive in Delmar, over 200 miles away.

"I watched a movie from 11:45 p.m. until 1:45 a.m. in the student lounge," said Gregory Whiteside, the president of Sigma Phi Epsilon, Christopher Porco's fraternity.

"Was Christopher Porco there at all?" asked Assistant District Attorney Michael McDermott.

"No, he was not," Whiteside said.

Christopher Halas, a 2005 University of Rochester graduate and fraternity mate of the defendant, said he was in the

**Calls to parents go unanswered**

Phone calls or the lack thereof made by Christopher Porco to his parents the morning of Nov. 15, 2004, could be the new information soon to come forward in Christopher Porco's murder trial.

Porco has been charged with murder and attempted murder for the ax attacks that killed his father, Peter Porco, and left his mother, Joan Porco, severely injured, inside their 36 Brockley Drive home in Delmar in November 2004.

Prosecutors believe Porco drove from the University of Rochester late Sunday night, Nov. 14, 2004, to Delmar in Albany County to attack his parents inside the master bedroom as they slept. Authorities believe Porco left Brockley Drive close to 5 a.m. on Monday, Nov. 15, and drove back to Rochester in the early morning hours to get back to his dorm, Munro Hall.

Witnesses in the Porco murder trial including Sarah Fischer, Porco's former girlfriend, and Jason Novak, a

University of Rochester senior, both testified the defendant was worried about his parents on Nov. 15, 2004, the day after the crime.

According to many of Porco's friends who testified on Monday, July 17, he tried to make several calls to his mother and father at the Brockley Drive home and on their personal cell phones and there was no answer.


"He said he was worried about his parents because he was trying to call them and could not get in touch with them from Sunday afternoon until Monday afternoon," said Novak.

Gregory Whiteside, another friend of Porco's at the University of Rochester in 2004, said the defendant was "fairly fatigued and somewhat distressed" on Monday, Nov. 15, because he could not reach his parents.

"At one point, he mentioned he had difficulty reaching his parents on their cell phones and he was quite concerned because it was unusual," said Whiteside.

Last week, Fischer testified that on Nov. 15, 2004, Porco sent

**Playing in Character**

**Towns strive for balance between growth and charm**

A bragging point for many area communities is history or quaint, homey character. Old Victorian mansions in Saratoga, sprawling farmland in Ballston and the Stockade in Schenectady all have significant attributes that make each town unique.

People want to live in the area, and businesses want to be where those people are. With increases in residential and commercial development, many communities are concerned with keeping their town's unique characteristics without hindering growth.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Saratoga County's population grew 7.1 percent between April 2000 and July 2005. The state's population grew 1.5 percent during the same period. Schenectady and Albany counties grew 1.7 percent and 1 percent, respectively.

This growth, especially in Saratoga County, means more commercial and residential development.

Advanced Micro Devices announced plans last month to build an advanced semiconductor manufacturing facility at the Luther Forest Technology Campus in Malta and Stillwater. The project is expected to bring about 12,000 new jobs.

Keeping the hometown, friendly feel of the area an important goal for residents and officials.

As Malta prepares for AMD, it is improving roads so they are more functional and can retain service levels.

A roundabout is planned at the intersection of Dunning Street and

Fox Wander Lane to control traffic problems using engineering and design; utilizing more green space and traffic calming devices. A roundabout project for the area off Exit 12 coming into the town is just winding down.

"Now the road is one straight-away and people rev up to 50 or 60 mph. When we're through, people will travel down that highway and feel as if they are in a residential neighborhood," Supervisor Paul Sausville said of the Dunning Street and Fox Wander West intersection.

Sausville said the perfect 21st-century town is a place where people want to live and raise their children, not necessarily a place full of skyscrapers and high-tech buildings.

The suburban utopia has attractive green spaces, trail networks so people can walk or ride their bikes to work, and a feeling of safety.

Sausville said he wants buildings that last for centuries and are respected and honored. There are not a large number of historical resources in the town, but Sausville said historic buildings are treasured, and the town works to preserve them. Last week, the town board designated three new historic landmarks in town, bringing its historic landmark total to 29.

Saratoga Springs is very familiar with historic buildings. Planning board chairman Geoff Bornemann said Saratoga has 12,000 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places.

Bornemann said there is a lot of construction in the downtown area, including condos and apartment complexes. The planning board, he said, receives 200 applications for building permits a year.

## Bethlehem police arrest one for DWI

Bethlehem police stopped a vehicle that Fordly was a passenger in along Route 32 in front of the Elm Avenue Park. Fordly was placed in custody because of two outstanding warrants for his arrest and was returned for processing.

More than 20 members of the Delmar Fire Department, along with other area agencies, spent several days in Delaware and Broome counties last week helping residents and communities ravaged by the recent floods.

"These communities needed help, and we were glad to be able to provide them some relief," Delmar Fire Chief James Kerr said.

Delmar Assistant Fire Chief Daniel Ryan led a team of emergency personnel that provided assistance. Crews were sent to Conklin in Broome County and Oneonta to pump out flooded buildings, help clear debris and to coordinate a door-to-door check on the welfare of residents.

"The work performed was more recovery work than rescue work," Delmar assistant fire chief Steven Kroll said.

Kroll said fire personnel noticed that many parts of these

communities were completely "wiped out."

"It's amazing just how devastated some of these places were," Kroll said. "There was no electricity and no water."

The Delmar Fire Department also sent an ambulance staffed with EMTs to Hancock in Delaware County as part of an Albany County ambulance task force. Agencies from Selkirk Fire, Ravena Rescue and Western Turnpike Rescue Squad in Guelderland also assisted.

"People in these counties

woke up one morning, saw the weather forecast for the day and had no idea their lives would fundamentally change," Kroll said. "We are all just minutes away from a natural disaster so we are constantly trying to prepare."

In nearby Montgomery County, the damage is estimated to be around \$100 million.

Sens. Hillary Clinton and Charles Schumer called on the secretary of agriculture to release funds for farmers in New York hardest hit by the recent flooding.

More than 20,000 acres of farmland in Delaware County are estimated having been affected by the floods, along with more than 12,000 acres of farmland in Montgomery County.

"They are suffering huge losses in crops, equipment and facilities," Schumer said.


Gov. George Pataki announced that 12 counties are eligible for state and federal aid to flood victims. Eight disaster preparedness centers have also been set up in these counties. The state currently offers a \$25 million flood relief package.

**PORCO ON TRIAL**

**Timeline around murder includes instant messaging, exit tolls**

**Prosecution hopes jury draws conclusion from string of events**

Christopher Porco is charged with the murder of his father, Peter Porco, and the attempted murder of his mother, Joan Porco inside their Brockley Drive home, sometime in the early morning hours of Nov. 15, 2004.

Prosecutors believe Porco drove from the University of Rochester, where he was a student, in the late-night hours of Sunday, Nov. 14, 2004, and traveled more than 200 miles along the Thruway to stage a break-in, then attempt to murder his parents, at his family's home at 36 Brockley Drive, in Delmar early Monday morning Nov. 15.

Based on prior court testimony in the Christopher Porco murder trial in Orange County Supreme Court, and published *Spotlight* news articles about the crime, a timeline is beginning to emerge based on witness testimony and police investigations.

• Porco allegedly drove from the University of Rochester to Slingerlands on Friday, Nov. 12, to stay overnight at the family home of his former girlfriend Sarah Fischer. According to Fischer's testimony, Porco left the Fischer family home Saturday afternoon around 3 p.m., Nov. 13 to drive back to the University of Rochester.

• Sarah Fischer testified she continued to communicate with Porco throughout the afternoon and evening hours of Sunday, Nov. 14. The last communication through instant messaging on their computers took place just before 10 p.m. Porco was in Rochester at the time and Fischer was in Fairfield, Ct., where she was enrolled at Fairfield University at the time.

"He signed off at 10 p.m. and said he had to pick up an economics book," Fischer testified.

• Thruway toll collector John Fallon working at the Exit 46 Henrietta tolls and testified that he saw a yellow Jeep Wrangler come through his toll lane around 10:45 p.m., Sunday night, Nov. 14, with a young man driving.

"It was a white male in his early- to mid-20s with a baseball cap on," Fallon said.

• Approximately three hours and 10 minutes later in the early hours of Nov. 15, 2004, Exit 24 Albany toll collector Karen

Russell testified in Orange County Court in Goshen, that she saw a yellow Jeep come barreling through her toll lane just before her 2 a.m. break.

"I remember seeing a yellow Jeep because of the speed it entered," Russell stated in court.

• Kurt Meyer, a Time Warner Security employee, testified that he sold the home security alarm that was installed inside the Porco family home at 36 Brock-



ley Drive. Meyer said a check of the home's security system following the attacks show the Porco family security system was disarmed at 2:14 a.m., Nov. 15, 2004.

"The security system was disarmed or turned off by using the master code," Meyers said in court.

Meyers added that phone lines outside the building were cut that same morning, less than three hours later, at 4:54 a.m.

• Albany County Assistant District Attorney David Rossi, who is prosecuting the case against Porco along with Chief Prosecutor Michael McDermott, believes Porco went through the Exit 24 Albany toll plaza at 1:51 a.m. on Nov. 15, 2004, entered his family's home, attacked his parents Peter and Joan Porco with an ax, then cut the phone lines at 4:54 a.m. before driving back to the University of Rochester where he passed the Henrietta Exit 46 tolls again that morning on Nov. 15, at 8:18 a.m.

"The two toll collectors' testimony fits in with our timeline," Rossi said. "They are both very credible witnesses."

• At 11:35 a.m., Nov. 15, 2004, Third Appellate Division Court Officer Michael Hart found the body of Peter Porco at the bottom of the inside stairs of Porco's home.

"He was on his right side, shirt pulled up, and face covered in blood, dark blood," Hart said.

• The next documented conversation someone had with Christopher Porco took place in the early afternoon around 2 p.m. Monday, Nov. 15, 2004, according to Fischer. Porco communicated with Fischer through another computer text message.

"We were talking, and he said he wasn't feeling well," Fischer said. Fischer received an online message from her sister Kate in Slingerlands while she was communicating online with Porco. The message stated that something had happened at 36 Brockley Drive in Delmar. Porco's response, according to Fischer, is that "he hadn't heard from his parents all morning and that he was nervous."

• Fischer then went to her 2 p.m. class at Fairfield and when she got out at approximately 3 p.m., Monday, Nov. 15, she received her last message from Porco that day.

"His message said 'My parents are dead,'" Fischer recalled.

• At 3:09 p.m., Monday, Nov. 15, 2004, Porco contacted the Bethlehem police department from his dorm room at the University of Rochester.

"My name is Christopher Porco, and I'm calling to find out if my parents are dead," he allegedly stated to Bethlehem police dispatcher Brianna Tice. Tice said someone would call Porco back.

Porco called again at 4 p.m. and repeated to Tice the statement he made earlier. She then forwarded the message to Bethlehem police Detective Charles Rudolph. Rudolph said he would meet Porco when he reached Albany Medical Center to see his mother Joan Porco who was in critical condition from injuries sustained in the attack.

"Hopefully the jury will have enough understanding of how this all fits together," McDermott said. "During our summation, we will try and connect all of these pieces together."



10 p.m.: Christopher Porco communicates with then-girlfriend Sarah Fischer for the last time that evening.


**10:45 p.m.:** Toll collector John Fallon recalls seeing a yellow Jeep at Exit 46 on the Thruway.




**November 15, 2004**

**2:14 a.m.:** The security system at 36 Brockley Drive is disabled. The defense points out irregularities in determining the actual time.





# Ninety years measured in the joys of family

In 1916, Woodrow Wilson won re-election to the American presidency in the midst of World War I and the stock market crash was still 13 years away. And in a bedroom of the house her grandfather had built in Bennington, Vt., Katherine Anna Whitman was born.

Now Katherine Foucher, my grandmother, turned 90 in April, and on a recent July Saturday, about 80 people gathered to celebrate her life. We had a formal party at the local country club and spent the rest of the weekend moving in and out of the house she has lived in for all but a few years of her life.

My siblings and I remember what a great treat it was to visit Grandma and Grandpa. To go there for a whole week and be the only child instead of one of five was a wonderful thing; it was even fun when we went as a group. Grandma was a great activities planner. There were trips to Fairdale Farms — where my middle brother, then a toddler, was awed by the "big dogs" that were cows. There were trips to the monument that memorializes the Battle of Bennington and always surprise out-of-towners. Once, Grandma took us to ride on a steam train

that ran out of Bellows Falls, Vt., because she was sure that train travel would die out in our lifetimes. She used to take us to pick blackberries or blueberries, and the first jars of jam I ever made, I made in her kitchen with the knotty pine cupboards.

My cousins remember vacations and travel with our grandparents; when they got older, Grandma and Grandpa bought an RV and traveled across the country with Uncle Bud and his sons. There are pictures of Paul and Marc in campgrounds and parks, arms around each other, next to our grandparents, with their father, grinning in every picture.

And every "16th of August," as Grandma calls it, we gathered in her backyard for a picnic after watching the Bennington Battle Day parade. We'd play at least one game of killer croquet and wait for the moment when somebody would forget and stand up from the rickety picnic table Grandpa had built.

"Whoaaaa," the cry would come as the table sent people on the other side tipping precariously backward and the mustard and ketchup starting a slow slide, "sit down again, sit down!"

There was always a slight realignment in the picnic population, as family members grew up, moved away, broke up, met up with new people, married and started families. Grandma always found relatives many of us were unaware of to join in the family festivities.

"Family was always the most important thing to Ma," my uncle Bud said at her party, and boy, is that true. When we visited as children, it seemed like one or another of her four brothers lived with her, and other relatives were always in and out of the house. The house was hers because of her commitment to family. Her mother deeded it to my grandparents with the understanding that she and Grandma's sister Mary would always have a place to live. That meant my mother grew up in a multi-generational house, and as I watch Grandma and my own mother age, I think it might not be the worst idea.

Grandma's care for Mary taught all of us about compassion, tolerance and the unexpected joy life can offer in places you might not otherwise think to look. Sent home from school as a child because she "couldn't learn," Mary was sent to her room when company came, but was a vibrant part of the family the rest of the time. When her mother died and her care fell strictly to my grandparents, she came out of the bedroom all the time, and joined them on their cross-country RV trips.

All of us grandchildren grew up learning about mental retardation without ever naming it. Mary's collection of dolls, stuffed animals and costume jewelry delighted all of us. My husband got the family's OK in our early courting days when he played an enthusiastic game of jacks with Mary on the front porch of the house she had always lived in.

I know I'm getting old by the way people often react when they hear I have a grandmother still alive. I think, then, about how remarkable it is for my 16- and 14-year-old sons to still have a great-grandmother who lives on her own, is alert, and can talk to them about her life. She doesn't just

connect them all the way back to 1916; her stories of her parents make even more of the past part of our current life.

In his own retirement, Uncle Bud picked up the genealogy work his son Paul had to stop as his children were born. Uncle Bud has carried Grandma's family back to 1605. He's gotten all of us thinking about what it might have been like to board a ship and head for the wilderness and start a brand new life. What would those people say if they could see all of us gathered to celebrate one of their descendants who has lived 90 years?

I like to think about everything Grandma has seen in her life. Her house got electricity, central heating and a telephone. Until Grandma gave up driving, there was a car in the garage and, for a while, an RV in the backyard.

Born in one World War, she prayed every night for her husband to come back safely from the Navy during World War II and for her son's safe return from Vietnam. She watched children and grandchildren marry and bear children.

At her party, her two sons and one daughter paid tribute to her life and her love, and she stood to address friends, nieces, nephews, her three children, 10 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren, the youngest an exuberant 7-month-old with a bald head and giant, infectious grin.

We may look at Grandma and see the years that have passed, but when she looks at us, she sees the future.

"I thank you all," she said with a wide smile. "And I'll see you at my 100th."







## Grassroots group saves the geese

Three days was all it took.

Saturday morning, June 3, I arrived at Collins Park in Scotia with my wife, Kat. As the rain fell, we met up with Laura and Matt Brown, residents of Scotia. We counted almost 200 Canada geese, the very ones sentenced to death in the coming weeks at the behest of the Scotia village board, as it sought to keep the beach clean and usable for humans.

Did we know when the killings would occur? No. Would we have advance warning? No. Did the village board acknowledge our proposals to use non-lethal alternatives? No.

Was it time to take matters into our own hands? Yes.

Laura and Matt took to the waters of Collins Lake in a two-person kayak. Kat and I patrolled the shore, the ball fields. As the rain soaked through our clothes, we ran, we paddled, we shouted, we clapped our hands — all in a concerted effort to chase the geese out of Collins Park. And the geese took flight. We had hope.

At noon, we joined the weekly rally at the intersection of Route 5 and Schonowee Avenue. Even as the rain fell, dozens of activists held signs protesting the kill plan. Passersby honked their horns in support of saving the geese. We spread the word that we were chasing the geese away. A volunteer list formed, growing to over 30 members within days.

For the remainder of the weekend and Monday, joined by additional volunteers with kayaks and border collies, we chased the geese out of Collins Park. As the sun set Monday night, we counted 18 geese, a number that quickly diminished to zero.

And three days was all it took.

### People unite

Knowing that some of the geese of Collins Park were non-migratory resident birds, our volunteers took to the Mohawk River, scattering the birds as far up and down the river as

possible. Frantic e-mails and phone calls of geese sightings rallied our volunteers to return to the waters day after day.

Less than a month earlier, on May 10, after a newsworthy village board meeting in Scotia, our group, Save the Geese, formed. By Friday, May 12, we launched a Web site (<http://savethegeese.webhop.net>), followed by an e-mail list of over 80 participants. Phone trees and media contacts grew, and we garnered support from animal-welfare groups across the nation. We were on the map, making waves, taking action, signing petitions, calling and writing letters to village officials, elected government representatives, state officials including the DEC, and federal representatives, including the USDA.

Our message? Please put a stop to this unnecessary killing. After all, what sense did the kill plan make? Kill the geese today, more return tomorrow.

### Guilty until proven innocent

We repeatedly heard accusations that Collins Lake was contaminated and closed last season because of the geese and the hazards they pose to human health. The Schenectady County Health Department and village officials all agreed coliform levels were too high in the lake, but stated the cause was unknown, attributable to any number of factors.

Why blame the geese?

A joint study conducted by University of Maryland's Department of Microbiology and John Hopkins' Department of Pathology concluded Canada geese "do not harbor detectable, enteric pathogens as a component of their natural flora." A separate study performed by the National Wildlife Health Center determined the "risk of humans [contracting] disease through contact with Canada goose feces appears to be minimal."

At the June 14 village board meeting, Ward Stone, wildlife pathologist for the state for the last four decades, reiterated these conclusions. Stone emphatically advised Scotia Mayor Michael McLaughlin and village trustees that geese carry nothing harmful to humans. Even Scotia's parks director, Jim Marx, concurred, stating in an article published last year, "there is no known pathogen that a Canada goose can pass to a human."

In a Gazette article by Mary Martialay published on July 15, both Marx and the Schenectady County Health Department remain stumped. Goose-free since June 5, Collins Lake still has exceedingly high coliform levels, even with multiple applications of herbicides and an extensive aeration system.

### Fear and molting

In mid-June, the geese began to molt, losing their feathers in an annual ritual of nature. They were now vulnerable. Though Collins Lake was goose-free, clusters of flightless geese floated along the Mohawk River. Could the USDA round the geese up on the river? We had no clear answers, so our efforts to chase geese continued.

On June 26, days before Scotia's

scheduled Fourth of July event, the USDA and DEC trucks arrived. Was it a roundup? The lake was empty, but not the river. Panic! Should we notify the media? Volunteers redoubled their efforts to chase geese away, but truck sightings continued.

On June 28, we heard reports that the USDA was probably not going to kill any geese. We rejoiced, but McLaughlin remained silent on the issue. Then the floods came. The destruction was awful and all attention turned to the people and families in need of assistance. When the waters receded, our fears intact, we continued to chase geese up and down the Mohawk River.

On July 11, McLaughlin released a statement accepting the USDA's decision to not kill the geese. Our group gave a collective sigh of relief. We had won! We stopped the unnecessary killing of close to 200 Canada geese in Collins Park.

But we knew our job was not yet over.

### Plans for a non-lethal future

We are still dedicated to chasing Canada geese out of Collins Park and the surrounding areas. The village planned to leave 30 survivors in Collins Lake, so our goal is to chase geese away when their numbers grow beyond 30. To be effective in the long term, our chasing techniques must be integrated into a comprehensive non-lethal Canada goose population management program.

With ongoing volunteer support from Save the Geese, the village of Scotia has the opportunity to humanely keep Collins Park clean using only non-lethal methods. We urge the village to adopt a plan to use non-lethal hazing techniques prescribed by the USDA and GeesePeace (a national advocacy group), create natural hazards and barriers (e.g. plant vegetation that geese do not like, spray grape extract to make grass unappetizing to geese), continue to "adddle" eggs so that they will not hatch, and use birth control feed from Innolytics and other organizations.

We invite the village of Scotia to meet with us to develop a comprehensive non-lethal plan. As is evident by our efforts, volunteers are willing to take action and remain both steadfast and dedicated until desired goals are met. Long-term plans will ensure the cleanliness of the park is maintained and the lives of geese are not in danger.

By accepting the help of the Save the Geese group, the village of Scotia has an opportunity to show leadership and humanity, serving as an example to other communities facing conflicts between humans and wildlife.

We teach our children that killing is not a solution, but some seem to forget the lesson. Let the lesson be clear. Killing is not the answer.



## Planning: the way to avoid student debt

recently read a staggering article in *USA Today*, "In debt before you start." According to the author, Sandra Block, the average college senior in 2006 graduated with more than \$19,000 in debt. More shocking: one student who had recently earned his master's degree has student loan payments averaging nearly \$800 a month...even after the university he attended paid his final year of graduate tuition based on his record of high achievement. Ouch.

The simple truth is that the cost of college education is rising. Couple this with the fact that the amount of financial aid available to students is diminishing and you arrive at the end result that more and more students are going to graduate with loan pay-

ments that will exceed their monthly housing payments.

So how can students and parents brace themselves for this reality? In a word: planning.

Planning begins long before a student ever steps on campus with an understanding of the costs of attending college, the value of selecting the right college and a college savings plan. It ends with a spending plan and financial responsibility—a demand that the student take an active role in establishing a strong financial foundation for his or her future.

### The Costs of College

College expenses can be categorized in one of five ways:

1. tuition and fees;
2. room and board;
3. books and supplies;
4. personal expenses; and
5. travel.

Tuition, fees, room and board are the easiest costs to prepare for. The expenses for each are clearly defined by colleges on their Web sites and in school catalogs. However, expenses for books and supplies are not as predictable, even if colleges do provide estimates. Fine arts majors, for example, have many more supply-related expenses—canvas, paints, brushes, and so forth.—than a math major. The best approach for anticipating the cost of books and supplies is to talk with a student or advisor within the department. He or she should be able to provide you with a more realistic expectation for the cost of these necessities, which will help with your spending plan.

Personal and travel expenses are much trickier to anticipate. In fact, the lure to do more with less—or in the case of college students, nothing—is often responsible for the more than \$3,000 in credit card debt

with which the average college senior graduates. Although assuming that a college student does not need much more than a place to live, food, tuition, and supplies may be easy, the reality for today's under-graduate is that the temptation and pressure to spend money is greater than it has ever been. Socializing—dinners, movies, clubbing, shopping—is the foundation on which many lifelong friendships are made, and these relationships are a large part of the college experience. Therefore accepting these costs and setting limits is far better than underestimating their importance and tempting your child to rely on credit cards. The same is true of travel and vacation.

Another important consideration is insurance. Long gone are the days of a hot plate and trunk full of clothes. Instead, many of today's student dorm rooms could pass for electronics stores with stereos, computers, televisions, gaming systems and cell phones as common a sight as lofted beds. These are all very valuable items and are expensive to replace. Although many parents' homeowners, auto and health insurance policies will cover their child while at college, reading the fine print and learning about potential coverage limitations is important.

Once you begin to get a grasp of these costs, making informed decisions and developing a plan is much easier. A good online tool for helping you and anticipate expenses can be found at [www.edonline.com/collegecompass/budget.htm](http://www.edonline.com/collegecompass/budget.htm).

### The Importance of Selection

Given the scenario of the college graduate with \$116,000 in student loan debt and \$800 monthly payments, and that more than 10 percent of all college graduates today have more than \$40,000 in accumulated student loan debt, serious consideration needs to be given to school selection. This is particularly true for students with an interest in modest-income careers.

For example, according to the *USA Today* article, 38 percent of education majors cannot afford to repay the debt on their student loans. This number increases to 55 percent for students pursuing careers in social services. These are important statistics to think about when choosing a college. And as unfair as it may seem to ask prospective students which is more important to them, attending the expensive college of their dreams—a college they may have worked very hard to gain acceptance to—or a college that will support them in pursuing their career interests and building a financially secure future, it is a question that should be asked.

### The Power of Planning

As mentioned, planning for college should begin long before selecting a college. Factors such as costs and selection should be weighed heavily, and the earlier a high school student can begin setting educational goals, the farther along in the process he or she will be and the more options will be available. This is true of parents, as well. 529 college savings plans are a long-term investment strategy that can lighten the load of financing an education by making regular, tax-deferred contributions to a child's account beginning at any time after birth. Your child can do his or her part by working part-time

and/or summer jobs during high school and using the money to contribute to education costs.

In an ideal world, every student would be able to afford whatever

school he or she wanted to attend. However, as we know, we do not live in an ideal world. So once parents and students have taken stock of what school offers the best value, and the student's application has been submitted and accepted, developing a spending plan that will clearly spell out how much money, realistically, the student will need to attend and flourish in college is really

in the students' and parents' best interest.

Here are some factors to consider when putting together and working a spending plan:

- determine income, the amount of money available to the student through jobs, allowances, loans, etc.
- evaluate expenses, which includes the costs of college, social activities, travel and insurance.
- keep it simple and easy to understand.
- be realistic.
- define goals.
- review the plan's effectiveness.
- be flexible and willing to make changes.
- include rewards.

### The Reward of Perseverance

As important as developing a plan is, the real work is staying within the plan's parameters. Justifying putting a \$20 dinner or \$10 movie on a credit card is easy. After all, \$20 is not much. However, if that money is not accounted for in the spending plan, paying off that credit card in full when the bill comes due is often trickier than most students—even adults—anticipate.

An even greater danger to the spending plan is peer pressure, whether it be to go on spring break to Cancun or, as one college student said, "to order late-night takeout," which was just one of many "surprise expenses that I didn't count on in college."

Another college student in my neighborhood, a sophomore at St. Michael's College in Vermont, agreed: "It's hard not to succumb to peer pressure to spend," she said. "Students are always looking for others to chip in to keep costs down. Taxi rides alone are a huge expense."

The challenge of budgeting and saving money is not isolated to college students. As a nation, America consumes. We save less than 5 percent of our income. So more often than not, the adults in students' lives are not shining role models for financial responsibility. However, as parents we need to reemphasize the importance of financial responsibility, both for ourselves and our children—especially our college-age children, who are at a very important and understated point in their financial lives. A sound college-spending plan that focuses on minimizing debt accumulation is a great way to do this. Not only will it be good for your child's wallet, it will be good for their resume and future earning potential.



student lounge where Porco said he was asleep from 10 p.m. until 2 a.m. on Nov. 14 and 15, 2004, and told the jury he did not see Porco.

"Was he there during the hours you were there?" asked Assistant District Attorney David Rossi.

"No, he was not," said Halas.

Porco offered to let the regional director of the fraternity who was visiting that weekend sleep in his room on Sunday night, Nov. 14, 2004, and Porco would in turn sleep in the student lounge where many students mingled. Porco's roommate at the university in the fall of 2004, Joshua Felver-Gant, worked a late shift at the school library until 2 a.m., and did not see the suspect when he got back to Munro Hall's student lounge where he chatted with a few friends until 3:30 a.m.

"Was the defendant there?" asked Rossi.

"No, he was not," said Felver-Gant.

Porco was last seen that Sunday night around 10 p.m. with his friend Marshal Crumiller. The two had dinner at a Wendy's restaurant close to the dorm before Crumiller drove Porco to his Jeep parked off-campus.

"He told me he needed to help his aunt and uncle (who lived in the Rochester area) mulch the next morning and that he was going to park his Jeep behind Munro in a grassy area not in the normal parking area," said Crumiller.

Whiteside then saw Porco the next morning, Monday, Nov. 15, 2004 around 9:30 a.m.

"He had just commented he had gone for a jog that morning and had a lousy night's sleep," Whiteside said.

Whiteside, along with other students, testified they never saw Porco jog in the fall of 2004.

The testimony from other students was much the same.

However, Defense Attorneys Terence Kindlon and Laurie Shanks were successful at times in showing inconsistencies in the testimony. Even though all the students testified they were at Munro Hall student lounge that night, many watching the movie "Shrek," they could not remember their classmates who testified being at the scene.

"I think we managed to demonstrate college students stay up late, college students sleep late, and they don't know who is sleeping in what room," said Kindlon.

Late in the day's testimony, Kindlon bounced up from his chair with renewed vigor less than seven days after an angioplasty to open up a blocked artery in his heart, to ask for another mistrial after hearing a question posed by McDermott to a witness for the prosecution. McDermott asked Whiteside if Porco offered any explanation of where he was during the overnight hours of Nov. 14 and 15, of 2004.

"The prosecution is desperate to make this an alibi case," Kindlon said. "It goes right to the heart of my client's right to remain silent."


Judge Jeffrey Berry once again explained to the jury that the burden of proof — beyond a reasonable doubt — rests with the prosecution.

"The defendant, under no obligation, has to explain or offer any evidence where he was in this case," said Berry.

Porco's aunt Barbara Balzano, who lives with her husband John in Fairport, about 20 minutes from Rochester, was asked to testify whether Christopher Porco planned on going to their house the morning after the crime to do some yardwork as he had told Crumiller.

"Did you or your husband make any plans to have Christopher Porco at your house to do some yard work?" asked McDermott.

"No," answered Balzano.

"Did Chris ever come to your home for yard work?" asked McDermott.

"No," said Balzano again.

Balzano told Shanks that she was at Joan Porco's side almost daily through her operations, recovery, and rehabilitation from critical injuries sustained in the ax attacks at Brockley Drive.

"Joan is very outgoing, friendly, considerate and thoughtful of family," said Balzano. Joan Porco now lives in the Balzano home in Fairport with her brother and sister-in-law.

Douglas Montayne, a garage mechanic at Albany's Armory Garage, testified that he was asked to remove the fuel tank from Porco's yellow Jeep Wrangler by Bethlehem police in December 2004 to see how many gallons of gas remained in the vehicle. Police had seized the Jeep Wrangler the day of the crime.

Joseph Killian, director of Albany County's Sealer of Weights and Measures testified that 29.4 pounds of gas or 4.8 gallons remained in the gas tank container removed from the yellow Jeep.

"I checked the scales three

times for an accurate reading before measuring," said Killian.

Prosecutors believe Porco filled his Jeep gas tank in Rochester the day before the attacks occurred at a Mobil gas station. Daniel Lawler, the owner of Exxon Mobile at 1810 Mount Hope, in Rochester, read off a credit card statement registered to Joan Porco's credit card approved in Rochester on Saturday afternoon, Nov. 13.

"The amount is \$35.64 and I can tell it was an outdoor purchase from my station," Lawler told the jury.

Joseph Catalano, a Delmar resident who works for State Higher Education Services, testified that he has known the defendant since Porco was a junior in high school through Catalano's former job as a youth minister at St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Delmar. Catalano said Porco e-mailed him for help in obtaining a \$5,000

student loan.

"He asked if I could help him get an unsecured loan at school because his scholarships had not kicked in," said Catalano, a past candidate for town supervisor. The former youth minister also went to Albany Medical Center on Nov. 15, 2004, to see Christopher Porco after the attacks on his parents, and spent three hours speaking with him that night.

Porco spent most of the three hours talking about his interrogation by the Bethlehem police department.

"He was very upset with the Bethlehem police department," said Catalano.

"Did he speak about his mother at all?" asked McDermott.

"No," said Catalano.

"Did he speak about his father at all?" McDermott continued.

"Other than saying goodbye to him (on Saturday, Nov. 13, 2004), that's about it," said Catalano.

her an instant message from his computer stating that he could not reach his parents.

"He said he had not been able to contact his parents all morning and that he was nervous," Fischer said.

Chief Prosecutor Michael McDermott said employees from Verizon and Sprint phone companies will be called to testify in the next several days to verify the result of any phone calls made by Christopher Porco to his parents' cell phones or to 36 Brockley Drive. McDermott told *The Spotlight* there is no evidence gathered, nor any information obtained that Christopher Porco made any phone calls to his parents the day before or the morning after the crime. Someone had cut the phone lines at 36 Brockley Drive at 4:54 a.m. the day of the crime.

When Christopher Porco finally got word on Monday afternoon, Nov. 15, around 3 p.m. that his father had been murdered and his mother wounded, his reaction, according to Novak, was "relatively calm."

"There was no panic in his voice," Novak said. "When he hung up the phone, he said 'my parents are (expletive) dead,' and then he walked past us," said Novak.

McDermott was asked if the jury will have a hard time deciphering the prosecution's case with so much circumstantial evidence that is being heard and no rock solid physical evidence connecting Porco to the crimes.

"My concern with the jury is that they are all taking notes on everyone's testimony, and it will be our job to bring it all together in the end," McDermott said.

Several members of the jury bring notepads into the courtroom and take several notes during the daily proceedings.

The defense counsel, Terence Kindlon and Laurie Shanks, and Judge Jeffrey Berry have made it clear since the beginning of the trial that the burden of proof is on the prosecution, and does not rest with Christopher Porco.

After a year of police investigation there is little if any evidence provided by authorities that physically links Christopher Porco to the 36 Brockley Drive crime scene. The evidence gathered and testimony offered so far ranges from toll collectors stating they saw a yellow Jeep Wrangler going through the toll on Nov. 14 and 15, 2004 to a police officer and several paramedics stating that Joan Porco nodded yes to a question as to whether her assailant was her son Christopher the morning after the crime.

Joan Porco has no recollection of the attacks since, and has publicly professed her son's innocence.

# Kindlon files a dozen motions in Porco murder trial

Attorneys for the defense in the murder trial of Christopher Porco have filed a total of 12 motions on behalf of their client, many involving information they believe prosecutors obtained from a six-and-a-half-hour videotaped interrogation of Porco by the Bethlehem Police Department that Judge Jeffrey Berry has

previously ruled inadmissible. "When you threw out the statement judge, it didn't bother them at all," Kindlon said. "They have changed nothing. We find example after example, your honor, that (the prosecution's) case is derived and intertwined with the unlawful interrogation of Christopher Porco," Kindlon said. Detectives from Bethlehem police interrogated Porco for

several hours the night after the attacks occurred inside the squad room of the department between the hours of 8:30 p.m. and 4 a.m.

Kindlon asked Berry to shut down the trial and hold a hearing similar to a suppression hearing. "Find out what the basis is for each and every witness they offer," Kindlon said.

Another point of contention is the testimony offered by city of Rochester police officer Michael Cotsworth.

Berry would not allow Kindlon to ask Cotsworth about a sweep of the neighborhood the officer took along Genesee Street where Cotsworth found Christopher Porco's yellow Jeep Wrangler parked outside his dorm.

A woman named Celestina Brown told the officer she saw a yellow Jeep parked outside her house on the street all weekend long prior to the crime against Joan and Peter Porco during which the couple was attacked with an ax, killing Peter and leaving Joan with severe, lifelong injuries. Police believe Christopher Porco drove

from Rochester to Delmar and back between the hours of 10 p.m. on Nov. 14 and 8:18 a.m. Nov. 15, 2004, and attacked his parents inside their Brockley Drive home.

Berry said allowing Cotsworth to testify about his sweep of the neighborhood would be "classic hearsay."

Kindlon, however, filed a motion that he believes supports his argument to allow the officers testimony in the trial.

"Our defense is that this was a shoddy, superficial investigation based on the assumption that Christopher Porco is guilty," Kindlon said.

"My decision stands at this point," Berry said.

Kindlon also filed motions to suppress other information he believes prosecutors are trying to allow in the trial. It includes the possibility that Porco may have told a relative the day following the crime that he may consider selling the 36 Brockley Drive home his parents lived in.

"What is becoming a persistent problem in this case is any statement made by my client out of court before or after his father's death is hearsay and not admissible until it is established," Kindlon argued. "The statement in response to a question that my client would sell his parents' house or not is much too ambiguous to infer guilt."

Kindlon said every single statement made by Porco should not be admissible just because he

is the defendant.

Another motion filed by attorneys for the defense involves how much gasoline was in Christopher Porco's Jeep Wrangler the weekend before and after the crime. Prosecutors believe Porco made a sales transaction on his credit card purchasing gas before the crimes occurred but the gas tank only had 4 gallons of fuel left when authorities seized the vehicle the next morning.

"The jury would have to make a number of assumptions and wholesale speculation," Kindlon said. "The presence of 4.5 gallons of gasoline in the tank of the Jeep proves nothing, and I am filing a motion to preclude any testimony on the amount of gasoline Christopher Porco had in his gas tank."

The Christopher Porco murder trial was delayed at the end of testimony July 10 and adjourned until Monday, July 17.

Berry halted the trial due to the death of the mother of defense attorney Laurie Shanks. Also on Tuesday, July 11, Kindlon, Shanks' husband as well as co-counsel for the defense, was admitted to Albany Medical Center for chest pains.

Doctors performed an angioplasty because of a blocked artery. The procedure was successful, and the trial resumes this week in Orange County Supreme Court in Goshen.







# Bethlehem IDA sees replacement of two veteran members

Joanne Cunningham and Joseph Richardson are the two newest members of the Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency.

With the appointments, an old IDA relationship will be rekindled as Richardson, a former IDA leader, and Cunningham replace town Economic Development Director George Leveille and Comptroller

Judith Kehoe, because of conflicts stemming from their respective full-time jobs.

"George and Judy are town employees and could not remain as voting members of the IDA," Supervisor Theresa Egan said.

Cunningham is currently the executive director of Healthcare Trustees of New York, in Rensselaer, an organization that serves 4,000 members.

"She has a tremendous amount of management experience and will be a very valuable asset to the IDA," Egan said.

Richardson is a director of development for Berkshire Bank and once served as the vice-chairman of the IDA.

"We want him back on the board," Egan said.

The new Web site for the town of Bethlehem is on the Web at

www.townofbethlehem.org, and the feedback has been positive, Egan said.

The Web site was redesigned to enhance the image and organize content in a more user-friendly way.

Jeff Dammeyer, the town's management information systems director, redesigned the site, along with Mercury Web Solutions of Albany.

New on the town's Web site are areas for public notices, bids and police press releases. Minutes from town meetings and advisory committees remain available for downloading. There is also a feedback form.

In other news, the town received donations totaling \$8,000 for enhancements at the new Maple Ridge Park Playground off Elm Avenue.

The park has picnic areas and a basketball court, and serves more

than 370 families near Dutch Mills and Haswell Farms.

Several volunteers from the neighborhood, along with members of the town recreation department, Selkirk Fire Department and Verizon installed the playground equipment.

The town board also approved measures calling for a raw water supply option study and to survey boundaries around the Vly Creek Reservoir. The study will allow town officials to see if purchasing raw water from the city of Albany is less expensive than upgrading the reservoir.

"We will have a menu of choices when we are done to see what the best choice is for the town," said Oliver Holmes, public works commissioner. The town is trying to make an additional 6 to 10 million gallons of raw water available for users.





# Cool ideas for saving energy this summer



Electricity demand in New York State continues to grow. Once again this summer, when hot weather places even greater demand on New York's electric grid, supplies may be tight, especially in New York City and Long Island. Statewide, the New York Independent System Operator (ISO) forecasts that we should have enough electricity to meet demand. It projects that New York's 2006 peak demand will be 33,295 megawatts (MW), 1,220 MW higher than last summer. Add another 5,993 MW for the required cushion, and the total need for 2006 is 39,288 MW.

In the past few years, new generating plants have come on line, improvements to older plants have been made, and demand reduction programs have been implemented that are helping meet the need. But if we have a prolonged heat wave, the margin between peak demand and available supply could be tight.


## What to expect

This summer, you may be asked to help ensure system reliability and the availability of electricity by conserving energy. Your efforts can make a big contribution to the plans of utilities, large-use customers and New York State that go into effect during a heat wave. If everyone reduces the amount of electricity they use just a little, it can make a big difference.

## Adequate supply and reliability

On an extremely hot day, New York's electric utilities may take steps to maintain system reliability. Utilities may:


- Issue public appeals to residential customers on the radio and TV.
- Ask large customers to reduce their consumption.
- Ask customers to voluntarily reduce consumption.



## What you should do


Using less electricity or shifting usage to off-peak hours will help ensure that there will be an adequate supply for everyone and can help lower your bills.

- Use major appliances early or late in the day.
- Turn off your air conditioner when you leave home or set the thermostat at 78 degrees or higher.



- Use an electric fan to bring in cool air from outside during morning or evening.

- Close curtains or blinds during the day to block out heat from the sunlight.



- Shop for the ENERGY STAR® symbol for energy efficiency when you're in the market for a new air conditioner or major appliances.

## Protect your appliances

Using dedicated surge protectors can help protect your appliances from power surges. In the event of a power outage or voltage reduction:

- Disconnect your personal computer, VCR, DVD, TV, microwave and stereo.
- Turn off other appliances that were on to prevent blowing fuses or tripping circuit breakers when power is restored.

## Protect yourself

To protect your health and safety if your electricity goes out:

- Check to see if your neighbors have power.
- Notify your utility of the outage.
- Keep a battery-powered radio, flashlight and batteries on hand.
- Have at least one phone in your house that does not require household electricity.
- Have a list of emergency numbers available.
- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible.


- Register special needs customers (blind, elderly, disabled) with their utility so they receive priority attention.
- Follow all safety precautions for operating portable generators.

**During an energy alert, your actions can help maintain the system. If an energy alert is announced, make every effort to reduce your electricity use. Turn off**





himself, Mann knew that a shoe created by a company specifically geared toward baseball would have an advantage over one created by a company that makes shoes for a variety of sports.

"I wasn't in the marketing (of the shoes), but it's all stuff that you learn by osmosis and just listening," Mann said. "Nike is the best company to learn from."

Mann isn't solely focused on outfitting professional baseball players, either. His company has developed baseball shoes for amateur players ranging in age from Little League through the collegiate ranks. 3N2 also outfitted the 2004 United States women's baseball team that played in the world championships, members of the Long Haul Bombers traveling softball team and the 2003 Rus-

sian team that played in the Little League World Series. More recently, 3N2 was the official shoe company for the Sony PlayStation All-American high school baseball game in New Mexico.

"We figured if we could do this for big leaguers, we could also do this for the Little Leaguers," Mann said.

The company has also been working with area Little Leagues to help players who need shoes and other gear. 3N2 has helped leagues in Albany, Schenectady and Mechanicville, and Mann said he wants to do more.

"Our big focus next year is the local communities. We want to help out with all the Little Leagues

and Babe Ruth leagues," he said.

3N2 will have extra capital to work with as it grows. An investment group led by Les Trachtman is merging with Mann's company to give 3N2 a financial boost.

"They'll keep the financial end going forward, and we'll keep the shoe end going forward," Mann said.

And as more 3N2-sponsored players reach the major leagues, Mann envisions a time when his company's name is as well known in baseball circles as Nike.

"We want to be the premier baseball company. That's the first thing," he said. "After that, who knows? There's endless possibilities."



**No business like shoe business****Mann makes inroads  
in baseball world  
with his sneakers**

By ROB JONAS

If Jim Mann has his way, Schenectady will be as well known among Major League Baseball players as Beaverton, Ore.

Mann's company, 3N2, is currently making inroads in professional baseball with its shoes and wristbands. Among its growing list of sponsored players are Milwaukee Brewers second baseman Rickie Weeks and San Diego Padres' prospect Kennard Jones, as well as Capital District natives Casper Wells (Oneonta Tigers) and Chris Salamida (Tri City ValleyCats).

"I think we'll be adding more people next year, and we may be adding more major leaguers next

year," said Mann. "Not necessarily at the same level as Rickie Weeks, but definitely some more major leaguers."

Mann, a Colonie native, started 3N2 (named after a full count on a batter in baseball) five years ago after leaving Beaverton's primary employer, Nike. Within two years, the company manufactured its first baseball shoe, and two years later it had its first sponsored Major League Baseball player in Weeks.

"A lot of work and a lot of luck" helped Mann land Weeks, he said. "Paul Barbour, who is our promotional guy, lives down in Louisiana. He knows Roger Cador, who's the baseball coach at Southern University, where Rickie played college ball. We talked about having Southern wear our shoes, and coach Cador said, 'Why not get Rickie to wear your shoes?' So it was through coach Cador that we got Rickie."

Landing Weeks proved to be a

turning point for 3N2's reputation. Now, Mann said he can enter any major league locker room and talk to players about wearing his gear, whereas he had been shut out before because larger companies such as Nike, Reebok and addidas held exclusive rights.

"That helped us legitimize ourselves in the baseball world," he said.

Mann used to be part of the professional sports merchandise machine when he worked for Nike from 1989 through 1999 as a shoe designer. But he grew tired of living and working overseas in Nike's Asia quadrant, so he returned to his Capital District roots by opening 3N2 in Schenectady with a friend, Jamey Storvick.

"It's nice to be able to come back to your hometown, and Schenectady is going through a huge rebuild," said Mann. "Metroplex, who we rent this building from, has been a big part of that rebuild."

The company has a family feel to it. Mann's mother works as a receptionist, and his three children — two sons and a daughter — help out when they're not in school.

"They're always in here helping with cleaning or maybe boxing the shoes during our busy season (January through March)," he said.

Mann's goal was to develop a line of shoes specific to a baseball player's individual needs, such as the position they play in the field and what type of surface (artificial or natural turf) they play on. He also wanted to create shoes that were lightweight and ready to be used out of the box.

"The nice thing about them is that you don't have to break them in," Mann said.

Having worked for Nike and having played amateur baseball



**Saratoga buzz won't include Barbaro**

When Saratoga Race Course opens next Wednesday, there will be two main topics of conversation among the horse racing fans: which horses will be running in the Travers Stakes, and how much they would have loved to see Barbaro there.

The speculation surrounding the Travers is as much a part of the legendary track as the water flowing from the Big Red Spring and the oversized hats the ladies wear in the clubhouse. Fans always clamor for rematches from the Triple Crown, but seldom get that because there are several other major summer stakes races for trainers to choose from as they



prepare for the Breeder's Cup Classic in the autumn. Instead, we might see a winner from one of the Triple Crown races, like we did a couple of years ago when Belmont champion Birdtown won the "midsummer derby."

Unfortunately, Saratoga fans rarely see the horse they want to see in the Travers. Remember the disappointment several years ago when Funny Cide couldn't race

because he was still recovering from an illness? Everyone including the gelding's numerous owners wanted him in the field, but there was no way he could go. If Funny Cide had run in the Travers, there would have been people hanging from the treetops to watch the Saratoga-born horse run. The crowd was still huge that day, but not as big as it could have been.

Which brings us to Barbaro. Had he not suffered that career-ending leg injury in the Preakness, area horse racing fanatics would be debating the chances that Barbaro would run in Saratoga and what other horses would show up to challenge him. Instead, all we're left with is to

wonder what might have been.

Not that we would have likely been talking about a Triple Crown winner in the first place. Until his ill-fated run in Baltimore, Barbaro always had long breaks between races. He had a four-month break between a victory in a preparatory race and his blowout win in the Kentucky Derby. Prior to that, he only had a handful of races — all of which were victories, but none of which came within a month of each other. Asking Barbaro to win three races in a five-week time span seemed like it was a lot even before his injury.

Yet, it was because Barbaro looked so dominant in the Ken-

# Tax credit could help restore historic sites

In an area rich with historic landmarks and districts, the Capital District could soon get a huge boost in encouraging preservation and reuse of residential and commercial buildings via the state Legislature's approval of incentives intended to spur preservation of approved properties.

The legislation awaits approval from Gov. George E. Pataki.

The state Senate and Assembly approved the bill in June. It grants state and national historic register-listed, owner-occupied residential structures in distressed areas an income tax credit covering 20 percent of exterior rehabilitation costs, up to \$25,000. The incentive for residents is the first of its kind in the state.

"Honestly, this is one of the most exciting things I've seen," said Susan Holland, executive director of the Historic Albany Foundation.

"It's been a long-protracted effort to get this program started in New York state," said Daniel Mackay, director of public policy for the New York State Preservation League.

The bill, as originally proposed, would have included any home listed on historic registers statewide. This would have provided credits for some 47,000 structures, Mackay said. The legislation on Pataki's desk provides incentive for homes only in

distressed areas, approximately 4,100 to 4,300 homes across the state.

"It's a form that's a little more restrictive than we hoped for," said Mackay, who said the current bill cut out 70 percent of homes that could have been included.

The tax credits would go toward helping homeowners in Albany neighborhoods like Arbor Hill, the South End and along Clinton Avenue.

"I think to be truly successful for a much larger community in New York state, we're going to have to push the program's boundaries back to a more meaningful set of standards," Mackay said. "I think once we can prove it works in Arbor Hill and the South End, we're going to see the same benefits applied to other communities in New York state."

The bill also provides incentives for historic commercial properties. National Register-listed or eligible commercial properties that qualify for the Federal Rehabilitation Tax Credit would qualify for an additional state income tax credit covering 30 percent of rehabilitation costs, up to a tax credit of \$100,000.

The commercial tax credit provides a financial incentive that complements an existing federal program for historic structures in hopes of attracting additional

government more control over what businesses are allowed to do.

One area that is championing development is the Electric City. Schenectady's once-barren downtown area is now beginning to thrive.

History has always been important to the city; the Stockade is New York's first historic district.

According to Metroplex Board chairman Ray Gillen, preservation is the theme of the development efforts in the downtown area. For the past two years, \$150 million has been invested in downtown Schenectady.

"There is huge growth and a lot of activity in the downtown area," Gillen said. "Every other week, we are announcing a new project."

Metroplex has a matching grant program that gives up to \$30,000 to building owners to preserve the building façade.

The best example of historic preservation, Gillen said, is the 1970s effort to save Proctor's Theatre. Gillen said the 1926 vaudeville theater has become the centerpiece of development efforts.

Gillen said Metroplex avoids speculation demolition, when someone knocks a building down hoping a new building will take its place. Gillen said that is dangerous, and usually no new business comes in. Metroplex is trying to avoid that practice at all costs.

Preservation helps to establish a sense of pride in community. In Malta, preservation of open space and historic buildings has given people have the opportunity to interact with each other.

Sausville's biggest fear is having a community where people commute to work, come home and keep to themselves.

"If we don't interconnect and relate to each other in the future, we are not moving forward, but backward," he said.

projects to the federal program.

If Pataki OKs the legislation, New York would join 21 other states that provide rehabilitation tax credits for commercial and/or residential historic properties.

"Thanks to the leadership of Assembly members Ron Canestrari, Sam Hoyt and Pete Grannis; and state Sens. Vincent Leibell, Frank Padavan, and Catherine Young. New Yorkers will now have preservation tax credits to help make and keep our communities great places to live," said Jay DiLorenzo, president of the Preservation League.

## An Economic Stimulus

"This legislation will undoubtedly prove one of the most effective programs in New York state for the revitalization of historic residential neighborhoods and downtown commercial districts," DiLorenzo said. "We applaud the Assembly and the Senate for recognizing the significant community and economic benefits of this program."

Studies show a direct relationship between historic preservation and increased economic development. A 2005 study released by Colorado, which has a

statewide residential tax incentive program, "Preservation in Colorado," states that since 1981, rehabilitation activities in Colorado have created almost 29,000 jobs and generated a total of over \$2 billion in direct and indirect economic impacts.

In a recent year, heritage tourism in Colorado created \$3.4 billion in direct and indirect economic impacts and over 60,000 jobs throughout the state.

A similar study in Florida, "Economic Impacts of Historic Preservation in Florida" states that more than 123,000 jobs were generated in Florida from historic preservation during 2000.

Job creation occurred mainly in manufacturing, retail trade, services and construction. The study also states that more than \$650 million in state and local taxes were generated from spending on historic preservation activities during 2000.

Mackay said that by encouraging investment in developed areas, the incentives reinforce build-out that have already occurred in local municipalities. "The public investment in those areas is already made," Mackay said. "You're improving a tax base that already exists."

"If it's there, people are going to use it," Holland said of the incentive. "It's an economic stimulus."

## The Next Step

Mackay said the state Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (SHPO) could begin to design the program after the governor signs the bill.

"Hopefully, by Jan. 1, the agency will have a program in place so applicants can go to the state preservation office to receive tax credits," Mackay said.

To qualify, residential structures need to be listed on State and National Historic registers in

distressed census tracts that are determined, among other things, by areas where poverty rates are at least 20 percent and unemployment rates are at least 1.25 times the statewide unemployment rate.

Commercial properties, said Mackay, are not bound by the same restrictions as residential properties.

According to Mackay, any renovations that occur to a historic structure would probably first have to be approved by the SHPO before a tax credit could be granted. Mackay said the renovations would most likely be those that come with maintaining any old structure and would not include material upgrades like hanging a chandelier.

According to Erin Tobin, director of preservation services for the Albany Historic Foundation, for a residence to be considered a historical structure and appear on the National Historic Register, the structure must be first be nominated by any interested individual or group.

The state approves the nomination, according to Tobin, before sending it to the National Park Service to be approved for a listing on the National Register of Historic Places. If the state approves it and sends it along for federal approval, said Tobin, "it's more of a formality than anything" at that point.

The criteria for approval, according to the National Parks Service Web site, are far-ranging and are based on "the quality of significance in American history." Any area or, in this case, structure that has been associated with significant contributions in the past, associated with the lives of significant people, embody the distinctive characteristics of a time period or architecture, or may be likely to yield important information about the past," could qualify for the National Historic Register.

Those permits contain many regulations and guidelines for new building projects, especially in the historic and architectural zoning districts, which include all of downtown Saratoga.

"We try to have new building designed so they are compatible or comparable to the buildings they are next to," Bornemann said.

The new YMCA being built on Saratoga's West Avenue, for instance, will have design elements similar to neighboring buildings.

Bornemann said Saratoga also tries to regulate what gets built in the rural areas. Conservation is an emerging trend, and there are strict standards as to where things get built and what needs to be preserved.

In Ballston, open space and sprawling farmland are a key draw for many people. Planning department chair Charles Curtiss said the more people want to come to Ballston, the more housing developments need to be built, which means the loss of open space.

Home prices in the area are also on the rise because so many people want to live there, which in turn draws businesses.

Curtiss said the planning board tries to proactively address the impacts and issues of commercial development. When Dunkin' Donuts was approved on Route 50, the board made sure the building was a light historic gray color and the sign was low to the ground.

Traffic is a big issue with many new commercial endeavors in the area. Curtiss said the perfect business to come into Ballston would be one that pays a substantial amount of taxes but does not cause any traffic.

Ballston has recently adopted a set of new zoning laws that give
