Schools struggle with Internet safety

An unknown predator lurking off in the distance, disguised as a sympathetic playmate or a concerned adult with one thing in mind: exploiting the vulnerability of an innocent child. For many parents, it is one of their worst nightmares.

Young people used to be warned about talking to strangers or taking candy from someone they didn't know. But with the advent of the Internet, those admonitions may not go far enough anymore. And with the online search of databases becoming a standard educational tool, schools are facing major challenges as they seek to keep the information superhighway from becoming a dangerous place for children.

School systems throughout the Capital District are struggling with the challenges this poses as they seek to protect student safety while maintaining their access to modern technology. South Colonie's school board became one of the first in the

If any good came out of Rachel Bruno, granddaughter to one of the most powerful men in the state, running off with a would-be pimp she met on a popular Web site, it helped rise the already rapidly rising profile of dangers the Internet presents to children and otherwise susceptible people.

The stories came fast and furious when it first came out that state Senate Majority Leader's Joseph Bruno's granddaughter was missing. It made state news, and even national news, when the pretty blonde's 20-year-old face was plastered all over the tabloids along side a self-proclaimed pimp John Savage, 30, of Clifton Park.

Rachel Bruno did call home a couple days after she was reported missing on July 26 to let everyone know she was not hurt, but still nobody knew where she was. On July 31, she called her mother crying

Slingerlands welcomes public input using pre-20th century exercises

"When the planning document is complete, we hope to have a blueprint and a set of design guidelines showing how New Scotland Road could look as a traditional, pedestrian friendly, mixed use town center where residents can live, eat, shop, stay and play," wrote Egan.

Returning students to see major changes

Construction projects enhance, expand Bethlehem schools

Three years ago, taxpayers approved a \$93 million construction project for the Bethlehem Central School District. The project is now more than 50 percent complete, according to District Facilities and Operations Director Gregg Nolte.

"We tackled a tremendous amount of work this summer," said Nolte. "It's amazing to see the amount of change from day to day."

More than 300 people are

working on projects at both the high school and middle school, with 13 contractors and 30 subcontractors working at the high school alone.

"Virtually all trades are represented here," Nolte said.

One of the biggest changes students and faculty will notice in the coming school year is the new 15 classroom science lab E-wing that extends out to the school athletic fields.

"I am incredibly impressed with the scope and quality of the work being done," said Superintendent of Schools Les Loomis. Loomis

"The teachers are coming back and it's been a daily effort to work with the construction manager and contractor to clean and prepare for the beginning of the school year."

Gregg Nolte

said the changes are not lavish but will allow for "outstanding space in which our students will now learn in."

Another major change is the newly repaved and expanded

parking lot and front entrance to the high school.

"The asphalt, curbing and utilities are in," said Nolte. "We will be gaining 100 spots in the parking lot."

The new entry to the high school will be the existing gym entry and athletic lobby, according to

Nolte.

The current main entrance of the high school will be closed throughout this school year to



Under review

IMAC board issues recommendations to Senior Services, Public Works departments

The Bethlehem Senior Services and Public Works departments last week presented Bethlehem's Town Board with the draft recommendations of the Town's Interdepartmental Agency Advisory Committee (IMAC) findings.

The IMAC advisory committee was created by the town board last fall to explore the many efficiencies of government.

"I think this has been a good process for us internally," said Karen Pellettier, director of Bethlehem senior services.

Bethlehem's 55 and over age group is on the rise with 6,000 residents over the age of 60. By the year 2020, over one third of the town population will be 55 or older.

"This is a huge demographic we are now serving in our town," said Supervisor Theresa Egan. "We are growing and not diminishing in terms of our senior numbers."

The IMAC report recommended increased training of personnel and a more coordinated fleet management program. Other recommendations included trying to find outside revenue sources for the program, streamlining the town phone system and coordinating with the parks and recreation department on a town wide master senior plan. One of the biggest issues facing the department is the staff of six full time and three hourly employees.

"With growth of our senior population there will be a need for growth in staff," said Pellettier.

The staff also urged the board to help the department find more space for better one on one communication with clients in need of services.

"We just have very little privacy," said Pellettier.

Bethlehem's baby boomer population will be the next group of seniors in need of a variety of activities.

"This group may enjoy gourmet cooking classes, tai-chi, or other programs that attract a younger senior

population," said Pellettier.

Trying to enlist more youth volunteers to help the department will be another top priority.

"Senior services would not be what it is without participation of the entire community," said Pellettier.

Board member Kyle Kotary called Bethlehem's senior program a 'shining star'. "Our public/private model is the wave of the future meeting the needs of residents with limited tax dollars," Kotary said.

Tim Gordon, another Bethlehem town board member said the senior services program exemplifies the community.

"It is terrific," said Gordon.

Asset management and long range planning were the main

focus of IMAC's evaluation in the department of Public Works. Sixty-four million dollars is the

estimated cost of the town's capital needs over the next several years, and the report stressed that town officials need to be proactive when addressing infrastructure.

"It all leads to opportunity and collaboration," said Oliver Holmes, director of public works.

A long range water distribution plan and re-evaluating the town's current water rate structure will also be addressed. Public works administration will work toward stronger documentation and better internal operating procedures.

Board member Sam Messina urged officials to move from asset management to a capital program.

"Let's look at programs so we don't have a deferred maintenance problem in the future," said Messina.

Holmes said plans to update the capital program will begin in the fall.

Sharing services between town departments is another IMAC recommendation that has been discussed with the town's legal counsel.

"Formalizing a shared services agreement will be very challenging to say the least," Egan said.

The IMAC advisory committee members include Supervisor Egan, Judith Kehoe, town comptroller, economic development director George Leveille, and town board member Sam Messina.

Enrolled Dem feels confident in race

108th District hopeful feels he has best chance to get things done

Assemblyman Pat Casale, R-Schaghticoke, announced in late May he would not seek reelection to his 108th District seat he has held the past 14 years so he could pursue other interests.

A scramble has ensued since that announcement resulting in six people running for the position to represent residents from Albany to Rensselaer to Greene County in the state Legislature.

A four way democratic primary will be held Sept. 12, pitting Tim Gordon, William Reinhardt, Keith Hammond and Kenneth Preston against each other. *The Spotlight* spoke with Gordon and Reinhardt last week. Gordon is currently

serving a term on the Bethlehem town board, while Hammond is a member of the Rensselaer County Legislature, along with republican candidate for Assembly Martin Reid. Reinhardt is a member of the Averill Park School Board.

Although Gordon, Reinhardt, and Hammond are all vying for the Democratic spot, candidate Kenneth Preston believes he is the only true Democrat running for the party nod.

"I believe as the only enrolled Democrat that I will have the best chance at getting anything accomplished," said Preston.

Preston said candidate Gordon is an enrolled Independent while Reinhardt and Hammond are enrolled in the Conservative Party. Preston said he enjoys the support of Albany County chairwoman Betty Barnette

and vows he will be a better representative to his constituents than Assemblyman Casale has been.

"He never did anything for this district," said Preston.

Preston is a resident of Slingerlands and currently manages his own construction firm called Jade Company. He also works for CSX as a conductor and once served as an Albany firefighter for 13 years.

Along with the four way Democratic primary for the seat, there is a Conservative

party, Independence and Working Family party primary as well on Sept. 12. Reid and Gordon are also running for the Independence line. Reid and Reinhardt are squaring off for the Conservative line and Ron Coalts and Hammond will each attempt to win the Working Party line.

It's hard to leave the beach behind

I've heard that it's illegal to remove sand from the beach in Hawaii. I'm sure glad that law doesn't apply to the Jersey shore. When we returned from our East Coast vacation, the sand-embedded in the lining of my swimsuit alone was enough to construct a small dune.

We also unintentionally smuggled home sand in our beach blanket. We repeatedly shake out the blanket, yet weeks after we've left the beach there is still evidence of sand. It's like those horror movies where you think the blob has been defeated, but then a little bit of ooze is spotted lurking in a corner.

The sand somehow hides and hibernates deep in the fibers of the blanket's material. All through fall and winter the grains wait. Spring arrives and we go out for our first picnic. When resting back on our hands we feel something slightly scratchy on our palms. There's still sand in that darn blanket!

A lot of people say, "I love everything about the beach except for the sand." That's like saying you like everything about the ocean except for the water.

I love the feel of sand between my toes. It's relaxing to sit in a beach chair and dig a hole with my feet, pushing

down and out with my heels. I create a waterless moat around the front of my chair. The sand is soft and cool to touch.

My husband and 10-year-old daughter dig deep into the sand until they hit water (we have a folding, metal-tipped shovel for this purpose). Then they erect giant walls using wet handfuls of sand scooped from the hole.

They also form various creations. For example, one day Rachel fashioned a sand puppy, complete with a sculpted tail and floppy ears. Another day she and Jeff made a turtle with a carved patchwork-patterned shell. Beside the turtle they placed a set of oval sand eggs.

Meanwhile, I use my finger to draw smiley faces. I just lack creativity for building sand objects. If I'm really ambitious I'll fill up the plastic castle molds and try to create a royal housing complex. I must not have the right technique or the patience because one or more turrets always fall off when I turn the mold over to release the sand.

What I like most about the

sand is that it leads to the ocean. The ocean, vast and powerful, soothes my nerves. I don't even have to get wet. Just feeling the sand on my feet, seeing the waves and the white foam, hearing the roar of the water rising and crashing, I am completely entranced.

I find the ocean so mesmerizing that three times during our recent vacation I was on the beach at daybreak. Me, the queen of the snooze alarm, the anti-morning person, was outside watching the sun rise.

Last year was the first time I ever saw the sun rise over the Atlantic Ocean. I had gone out for an early morning walk. The trucks that comb the beach and pick up garbage had just appeared. Their headlights formed spotlights over the sand.

I found an abandoned beach chair and dragged it down to the water's edge. I sat down and waited.

Suddenly, what looked like a glowing red bouncy ball floated out of the horizon and up into the sky. The sky began to lighten and the red-ball shape turned into the super bright yellow sun we're all familiar with.

I had a camera, but the resulting photographs in no way captured the experience.

I would love to stay on the beach from sunrise to sunset. This year, in the early morning I went out with a chair, a book, and a bottle of water. I took a walk, collected some shells, and then settled in for the sunrise and a long stretch of uninterrupted reading.

By 8 a.m., the heat would become quite uncomfortable, so I'd head back to the hotel room and have breakfast with my family. Certain family members preferred watching cartoons to daybreak walks at

the ocean. Later in the morning we'd all head back to the beach with our many accessories: the blanket, the coolers, the umbrella, the boogie boards and the sand toys.

Some days we'd stay until very late afternoon. When the sun began its descent, the air became pleasantly warm, rather than uncomfortably hot.

What I like most about the sand is that it leads to the ocean. The ocean, vast and powerful, soothes my nerves. I don't even have to get wet. Just feeling the sand on my feet, seeing the waves and the white foam, hearing the roar of the water rising and crashing, I am completely entranced."

So, I saw sunrises and sunsets at the beach but was never continuously present from dawn to dusk. This is because other family members preferred taking breaks to swim in the hotel pool, eat meals away from blowing sand, and cool off in air-conditioned locations. These are the sensible people who prevent me from getting heat stroke. That's why I love vacationing with them.

Like many families, we have several vacation routines: Stopping for giant ice cream cones at the place where the workers wear hoop skirts, climbing up on the lifeguard chairs in the early evening, sitting out on the hotel balcony reading, flying kites, playing whiffle ball on the beach, and last, but best of all, boogie boarding.

When I'm on my boogie board I feel completely carefree. I simply wait for a good wave, jump on the board and enjoy the ride. If I'm really lucky, the rolling water will propel me all the way to the sand. If it doesn't, that's OK too. I'll just linger on the board and wait for the next wave to roll the cool water over my shoulders; and the next, until I have floated

closer to the shore. Up until six years ago, I never knew that riding on what's essentially a giant Styrofoam kickboard could produce such joy. But in the summer of 2000, I became a boogie board addict. Jellyfish don't scare me away and I've even ridden the waves in the rain.

"I just want to catch one more wave," I plead to my family knowing full well that everyone's exhausted, including me, and it's time to leave the beach.

My husband indulges my request, even though he knows that "one more wave" really means "one more really, really big wave," and it may take several tries before that one comes along. He lets me soak up as much ocean time as possible, to store as a mental life preserver, a virtual happy place to return to in times of stress.

After playing in the ocean it's time to go back to the room and clean up. Of course the hotel shower has no water pressure. The drizzling water fluctuates in temperature from freezing to scalding with a few seconds of "bearable" in between. That's when I jump under and try to rinse the shampoo and sand from my head. "Try" being the key word.

Yes, my hair, like my swimsuit and our blanket, knows how hard it is for me to say goodbye to the beach. Everything close to me tries to take a piece of it home.

I've heard the beaches in Hawaii are fabulous, but it takes too long to get there and I can't begin to imagine how I'd transport my boogie board. The Jersey shore, however, is within driving distance, and no one seems to care if you carry away a Ziploc baggie filled with sand.

RCS makes administrative changes for upcoming year

Students returning to classes at RCS on Sept. 6 will see a lot more of the principals.

It doesn't mean that the students have done anything wrong; rather the increased profile of the district's principals is the direct result of an administrative realignment designed to increase student-principal interaction and create smaller learning environments, said Superintendent Vicki Wright.

The realignment of administrators abolished two administrative positions and created a grades 9-10 principal, leaving four principals overseeing the middle and high schools and creating more time for the principals to interact with students in the classrooms and hallways.

With the creation of the grades 5-6 principal, 7-8 principal, 9-10 principal and 11-12 principal, we are focusing on smaller learning environments in which the principals are more involved in the support of faculty and staff and more involved in the daily lives of our students, Wright said.

Curriculum

The principals will work daily with teachers on curriculum and enhancing the "team environment" in the schools.

"In order to enhance student achievement, the principal's role as supervisor of instruction is extremely important," Albano said.

In addition, because the principals are responsible for half instead of the full student body in the buildings, there will be a better knowledge of the individual students, their needs and actions.

"This will help us keep students engaged in the school and the entire learning community," Wright said.

Last year's appointment of Grades 5-6 Principal Claudia Verga has led to an alignment of the grade 5-6 curriculum, which will be implemented through Verga's oversight, she noted.

Smooth transition

The creation of the grade 9-10 principal, following last year's creation of the grade 5-6 principal, furthers RCS' goal of making the transition from school to school easier for students and thus enhances their abilities to perform better academically.

Verga developed plans and programs that make the move from fifth grade in the elementary schools to sixth grade in the middle school an easier one for students.

At the same time, Chase last year oversaw the creation of a transition program that helps eighth graders transition to ninth grade.

He will work to further that program that target students most at-risk to have problems academically and otherwise when they change school environments, Albano said.

Responsibilities

The principals are responsible for the faculty, curriculum and students in their assigned grade levels, including the discipline of those students.

In addition to that, Grade 11-12 Principal Hakim Jones and

Grades 7-8 Principal Pam Black hold lead-principal responsibilities in their respective buildings in the event of crises or emergencies.

No cost

The realignment of the administration to create the four principal positions actually resulted in a savings for the district.

New Grades 9-10 Principal Greg Chase previously served as student services supervisor. His former position as student

services supervisor position is not being filled. Additionally, Grade 7-8 Principal Pam Black, who succeeds the retired Ralph Lyons, previously served as data assessment specialist. Her previous position is being abolished, resulting in a salary savings of about \$75,000.

"What we have essentially done is realigned our administrative team in a way that not only saves the district money, but also places our principals in a more visible and more involved role," Wright said.

BC taxpayers to receive big surprise with bill

Editor, The Spotlight:
Dear fellow Bethlehem taxpayers: Do you like surprises? Be prepared for a big surprise when you receive your school tax levy for 2006-2007.

Unwilling to wait for the 2006-2007 tax bill letter, I recently called the town tax department and was shocked to learn that the school tax levy rate per thousand (as of that moment it is still being finalized) is almost 20 percent higher than the original estimate we taxpayers received from the town of Bethlehem in March of this year. The estimated school/library rate per thousand assessed valuation provided in March was \$15.03, but based on the revised levy provided to me by the tax department, the levy is closer to \$18 per thousand.

Still in shock, I signed on to the Bethlehem Central School District's (BCSD) online tax calculator Aug. 20, and found that the rate being used there for the calculation of tax is \$17.26 per \$1,000 of assessed value. Apparently the BCSD Web site

has not been updated with the new rate since the May 2006 "Budget Edition" of the Bethlehem Central School District Highlights. The Star exemption (basic-Bethlehem in my case) was generally the same dollar amount as the 2005-2006 Star exemption.

You can do the math, but be ready for the surprise! We Bethlehem taxpayers deserve to have timely, accurate information on an issue as important as the school tax levy. How could the estimated levy be 20 percent off (\$15 vs \$18 per \$1,000 of assessed value)? Why hasn't any information been distributed by the BCSD to alert us of this huge increase in the school tax levy and provide details to support the increase? We need to know the facts in order to vote responsibly on future school budgets. Can we rely on any future estimates that the BCSD provides to us?



Assembly hopeful outlines concerns

Hi folks,

My name is Bill Reinhardt. By now you have seen my election signs around town. I am running for the 108th Assembly seat. It covers parts of Troy, six towns in Rensselaer County, two in Albany, two in Greene, and four in Columbia.

We have invested almost \$2.5 billion dollars in chip plants over the past five years. (That is \$800,000 per job) Our area deserves to see the benefits. We need to get feeder businesses identified and running in order to take advantage of the purchasing that will occur.

Finally, I will push for a state wide prescription buying group, much like CANARX. (A Canadian prescription supply house) Averill Park Schools has begun purchasing from them and will save more than \$250,000 this year alone. If you are on a maintenance drug, this is the place to buy.

Manner of Donovan's appointment irks ex-board member

Editor, The Spotlight:

I write to express my disappointment with the manner in which Ryan Donovan was recently appointed at a town board meeting to serve the remainder of Town Justice Frank

Milano's term.

According to the town board minutes of its June 28, 2006 meeting, three board members (Tim Gordon, Kyle Kotary & Dan Plummer) claimed that Mr. Donovan, who has been admitted

to practice for approximately five years, had to be appointed immediately without interviewing any of the six applicants who expressed interest in the position. This was contrary to the practice used to hire individuals to appointed town positions. There was no urgency to appoint Mr. Donovan since the appointment had no impact on any person's ability to obtain the requisite signatures to appear on the ballot for any political party in the upcoming September primary, a fact noted by Supervisor Theresa Egan who with Sam Messina abstained from voting.

During my 12-year tenure on the town board, we always prided ourselves on the concept of open and fair government at the town level. The agreed upon process followed by the elected officials was to invite all interested citizens to apply for the position, conduct interviews and appoint the most

worthy candidate. Supervisor Egan reminded the rest of the town board of that duty at the meeting when she stated: "... I think it is our job, independent of any political process, to make a determination, and rushing to judgment to do that without full consideration of all the resumes and people that have indicated an interest to run in this position or apply for this position, I think, would be derelict of our duty." She further observed that the position of town justice is "not just legal education, there is a lot of other stuff that comes with it — experience, maturity, having a good gut for where you need to be forceful and sometimes where you have to be a little more sympathetic. And, a lot of that comes from life experiences and the fact that Ryan ran ... it's obvious he ran but ... I don't find that as the most important factor we should be looking at".

When Paul Dwyer was appointed town justice approximately three years ago, it was after a full and fair application and interview process which, by the way, resulted in the appointment of a Democrat by a town board with a Republican majority.

The total disregard of the established process by three members of the town board was an abuse of the public trust and a disservice to the citizens of Bethlehem.

Ethanol needs study

Editor, The Spotlight:

The Aug. 23, *Spotlight* highlights the production of ethanol from corn as a major answer to the political and economic woes caused by our dependency on foreign oil. The use of natural gas to make ethanol will make it economically difficult for the average person to stay alive in a bitter winter. Food costs will skyrocket. These are two of the many environmental impacts that will result from ethanol production. Before going full steam ahead the following question must be answered: Is ethanol efficient?

There are scientists and engineers who have reported that it takes more fossil fuel energy to produce corn ethanol than the energy in the ethanol produced; therefore corn ethanol will make the U.S. more dependent on foreign oil, not less. On the other hand there are scientists and engineers who have published reports that show that corn ethanol is in fact energy efficient and will decrease our dependency on foreign oil. Who is correct?

There is a simple scientific way to answer the question — is ethanol made from corn energy efficient? Examine the distilleries.

The DOE should establish a team of unbiased engineers who have expertise in the three laws of chemical thermodynamics. The team should go to modern ethanol fuel distilleries and determine all of the energy inputs to convert corn starch to ethanol fuel that meets all of the EPA, state and local requirements for protecting the environment.



Niskayuna man doesn't let odds faze him in race

When he was 6 years old, Tom Raleigh made his first trip across the border. But it wasn't a venture to some far-off Middle Eastern land like Iraq or even a journey across the mighty Hudson River. Instead, it was a ride to Schenectady from his childhood home in Watervliet so he could see

Freddie Frehofer.

"I was all excited, and I think it's the first time I ever went to Schenectady," Raleigh remembers. "It was a pretty big deal."

But two years ago, his connection to the county known as the historic home of General Electric grew much closer when the veteran with 22 years of military experience settled in Niskayuna so

that his wife, Bernadette, could be closer to her sister.

"There was a hockey coach from Union College who was leaving for a position at another school, and we heard about the house so we moved in," said Raleigh.

Since then, his two sons have settled into the Niskayuna school district, and Raleigh has begun what he admits is the uphill pursuit of a goal that few believe he can obtain, a seat in the House of Representatives representing the 21st Congressional District. To make that dream a reality, his low-budget campaign will have to make a case to thousands of Democrats who live in a district covering all of Schenectady, Albany and Rensselaer counties. He will also have to reach the residents of several

other area counties in time for an upcoming Sept. 12 Democratic primary.

In that race, he is facing U.S. Rep. Michael McNulty, D-Green Island, a longtime Democratic

powerhouse who has represented the congressional district for nearly two decades. A fixture on the local scene, McNulty last faced a primary in 1996, when insurgent Lee Wasserman, a multimillionaire with strong ties to environmental activists, challenged him in a high-profile race. After multiple mailings by both candidates, McNulty retained his seat.

Despite the steep odds, Raleigh hasn't been discouraged. "You know, my dad was drafted when he was 28 years old, pulled out of his Irish neighborhood in Troy and thrown down in the segregated South with people from all walks of life," he said. "I think that's why I joined the Army."

"And the amount of positive feedback I am getting is really encouraging," he said. "Truth is, the last thing that you say to a soldier, a paratrooper and an Army Ranger is that something is impossible."

His military service is something that Raleigh believes will give him a leg up if voters send him to the nation's Capitol.

"I've served as an Army attaché in Moscow, and I know firsthand how the military works," he said. That direct personal experience in military affairs is a key reason he doesn't believe American troops should be withdrawn from Iraq at this time. Instead, Raleigh wants policy-makers to strengthen ties with allies around the world and re-establish America's "moral ascendancy" in dealing with the region.

McNulty originally voted for authorizing President Bush to take military action in the area in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001. But his views have changed in recent months, and the congressman feels the issue highlights the contrasts between the candidates.

"Tom believes in keeping the troops in Iraq, and I don't," McNulty said. "We have had our soldiers on the ground in Iraq for three and a half years, and we have stayed through three elections."

"We have been told that it was necessary for our troops to be there so the Iraqi military could get the training they need, but it only takes about six months to train a soldier," said the congressman. "It is time for Iraqis to step forward and defend their own government."

The Hills are alive with the sounds of applause

When a nearly flawless production of a nearly flawless play is presented, the result is spectacular. Such is the case with Berkshire Theatre Festival's production of Wendy Wasserstein's Tony award and Pulitzer Prize winning "The Heidi Chronicles."

The semi-biographical show of an art historian seeking to find herself in the social upheaval of the 1960s, 70s and early 80s rings so clear and true that anyone remotely recalling the time and the eras will identify immediately with every one of the show's characters. Casting Director Alan Filderman and Director Maria Mileaf have done their jobs to perfection. The characters are allowed to live and breathe with ease and angst, without one ever domin-

ating the other.

Scott Lowell is Scoop Rosenbaum, the philandering nonconformist who sets the tone of men coming of age in the turbulent 60s. His character grows but never truly grows up. Tom Story's Peter Patrone, the closeted gay pediatrician who is Heidi's best friend, outs himself to family and friends at a time when a gay lifestyle is rife with conscious-raising, free love and then the fear of AIDS. Both gentlemen are both the perfect foils for Heidi as well as creating a rich fabric of their own lives.

Patricia Buckley, Jenn Harris and Laura Heisler superbly perform a variety of roles as the various friends who pass through Heidi's life.

The evening however, belongs to Kate Jennings Grant as Heidi Holland. I was captivated by her

powerful entrance ... she riffs through monologues on art history, discussing the female masters of the art world while at the same time adding innuendo and humor along with a vitriolic pronouncement of how women have been overlooked in the ages. Her character constantly changes and grows yet the thread of who Heidi is, is always present. Proving, by the show's conclusion, that while people may grow and mature throughout their lives, they never really change.

David Lander's lighting design and Janus Stefanowicz's costume designs collaborate beautifully to round out this near perfect production. The evening however is clearly that of the late Ms. Wasserstein. Her words echo with such nuance and accuracy of a time, as well

as a great clarity of humor (both laughing at oneself and the world around). What a tragedy for all of us that her life was cut so short earlier this year after a valiantly fought battle with cancer. One can only watch, listen and think what has been silenced from this brilliant talent.

"Gigi" at The Mac-Haydn Theatre

Applause continues to grow at The Mac-Haydn Theatre in Chatham with their season finale of Lerner and Lowe's classic "Gigi." Set in Paris at the turn of the 20th century, this complex sophisticated tale of love, women and marriage is one of the less often produced shows of this talented duo. The show is written with nods and winks to the audience and follows the frustrations of the rich bachelor, Gaston Lachailles as he is bored with life, love and the beauty of Paris. Enter Gigi, the granddaughter of family friend, Mamita, who amuses Gaston and ultimately with whom he falls in love with as she makes the transition from childhood to womanhood.

Gaston's uncle, Honore, played by regular Michael Shiles, does a fine job with such L&L classics as Thank Heaven for Little Girls, and I Remember it Well. He looks the part and commands the stage whenever he is on. Karla Shook proves once again what an asset she is to area stages when she ages herself quite believably to take on the role of the protective, but somewhat naïve

Mamita. Her strong voice and deft dancing ability shine through the makeup and wig proving yet again what a wonderful talent she is. Jarusha Ariel and Sean Zimmerman are perfectly matched as Gigi and Gaston. Both present strong singing voices, smooth acting and the audience is presented with wonderful transformations in the characters as the show progresses. Gaston's second act rendition of the title song is one of the highlights of the evening.

The show is stolen by Monica Wemmit. Wemmit's absence from the theater in the round is even more pronounced by her rousing return. Even with the few dropped and stumbled-on lines, she brings more to the stage with a wink, a glance or a nod than the entire cast. She is a tour de force in the role of Aunt Alica, the family matriarch and "well experienced" voice on all things male. She manages to insinuate herself perfectly into the cast, though the light of her star clearly radiates.

Doug Hodge's direction and choreography again prove what a talented cast is capable of doing on a small stage in the right hands. Dana Kenn and Andrew Gmoser set the scene well with their turns for set and lighting. The costumes for the men get short shrift as they appear cobbled together by whatever is in the closet. The women's costume's make up for the shortfall.

In all "Gigi" is a delightful way to end the summer season. Mac-Haydn continues to amaze with the growth and maturity it has seen over the years.

allow for the construction of a new chorus room. A six-foot chain link fence around the front entrance will prevent anyone from entering. A new student foyer along with a new cafeteria addition and entrance has also been built.

"This was probably our most disruptive and critical year at the high school," Nolte said.

"The teachers are coming back and it's been a daily effort to work with the construction manager and contractor to clean and prepare for the beginning of the school year," Nolte said.

Sano-Rubin Associates is the project construction manager and Collins/Scoville Architects are the

lead design team for the district. The total cost of high school construction is \$32 million.

"We have just a beautiful facility and it is definitely starting to reflect the type of education we provide," said Nolte.

Loomis is encouraging community groups to call either the superintendent's office or Jessica Shekton at the district communications office to arrange for tours to see the many changes.

"I think it is going to help for people to see what their tax dollars have built," Loomis said.

Bethlehem's Middle School has also undergone major changes this past year. When students arrive in a week, they will see a new parking lot and a 27-classroom wing near completion.

"We are moving classroom furniture for the new wing now," said Nolte.

Another 23 classrooms at the middle school, in an area known as Hudson House, will be renovated during the coming school year. The two school projects represent a 25 percent increase in school space for a total of 265,000 additional square feet.

Other projects include an expanded cafeteria and new gym station that have been completed with a new orchestra room to be built this year. A new roof and central air and heating system have been installed at the district's Adam Street offices. Work on Clarksville and other elementary schools continue. All projects are expected to be complete by the end of 2008.

These students would then rush themselves and their almost-completed drawings from the studios to the Ecole des Beaux Arts in the back of a cart called a 'charette.' The students completed the design drawings on the way to the school.

"Out of this planning session will come a concept for how this should evolve," said economic development director George Leveille. "We think these meetings will be stimulating."

Some ideas that may come from the three scoping sessions, according to the Assistant Director of Economic Development Michael Morelli, could include new curbing and sidewalks, new lighting and a place for people to live, work and recreate all in one location.

"It's referred to as a new urbanism," said Morelli.

The first meeting, from 2 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. in room 101, will help develop the desired character people want to see for the hamlet. The second and third meetings to be held Sept. 14 and 15 at 9 a.m. in

the town hall auditorium will function as design meetings where an illustrator will show different ideas on how New Scotland Hamlet could be developed.

Leveille said the three workshops will be intensive and several talented individuals will be asked to come up with ideas and a concept to implement.

"We want the town to buy into something a little more challenging and complex," said Leveille. "The dynamics are here."

The New Scotland Road area of Bethlehem is already one of the busiest in the town with a Price Chopper Plaza, post office, medical plaza and several other shops. A new Vista Technology Park just behind the proposed hamlet between LaGrange and Mahar roads will be home to at least 3,000 new employees who will be looking for places to go for breakfast, lunch and dinner. Pedestrian links and nature trails are already under consideration by many town, county and state officials to go with the Vista Park development.

"People are looking for sustainable alternatives," said Leveille in regard to the future of Slingerlands. "The dynamics are in place for a truly special location we can live in."

Exit 15 off the Northway in Saratoga is one area officials point to as a pedestrian friendly hamlet currently under construction with a new hotel and other attractions.





George Bernard Shaw comes alive in a new play

George Bernard Shaw successfully lived up to his reputation for being witty, urbane, arrogant and perverse. Today he is best known for supplying the idea for *My Fair Lady*. But in his heyday he was one of the best playwrights of his time and probably the most provocative. During the first months of World War I, he spoke against the conflict so vociferously that he was almost indicted for treason and if he had said as much in America after we joined the war President Wilson would have jailed him.

Shaw had an opinion on about everything. He was a socialist, a vegetarian, and enjoyed being irritating. Before Shaw confined himself to playwriting, he was a music critic who admired Richard Wagner and wrote a book on

Henrik Ibsen whose stage plays, dealing with realistic situations, finally escaped 19th century melodrama and brought the public, sometimes kicking and screaming, into the world of Modern Drama. If nothing else, Shaw was a modernist and when he switched to writing plays he dedicated himself to disturbing the self-satisfied middle classes and tweaking the aristocrats who ran Great Britain. He believed he could instruct his audiences while at the same time entertaining them. He thought himself better than Shakespeare because his plays had ideas and social commentary. Not content to use the stage to advance his opinions, he would often write long prefaces to explain his thoughts even further. Shaw was by no means a modest man and made no attempt to hide his genius. In fact, he thoroughly

enjoyed himself in this role and took such delight in being impossible and intolerable that he was actually delightful and amusing.

For the next few weeks a new play by John Morogiello, presented by Oldcastle players in their charming and comfortable theater in Bennington, shows not the familiar elderly gray-haired GBS, but rather the man in his 40's on the cusp of world-wide fame. An avowed iconoclast and confirmed bachelor, he believes that marriage is the doom of any great mind, for it limits his freedom and is nothing but a temporary infatuation solidified into a lifelong duty. When he meets an equally stubborn and independent woman who becomes indispensable to him, he realizes he cannot survive on his own and, thereby outwitted, succumbs to what he long believed was the deadly

institution of marriage.

The play is full of laughs in the lively exchange of sprightly lines and is made convincing by the remarkable performance of Mark Leydorf who tackles the challenging role of Shaw and brings to life the many sides of this frequently impossible and incorrigible intellectual. His future wife, played by Katrina Ferguson, is equal to confronting and convincing him to abandon his bachelorhood. The only other characters in the play, the Socialist couple, Sidney and Beatrice Webb, provide some background to the events and some relief from the witty badinage of the two principal players.

In contrast to the elaborate staging of *Dracula*, the previous offering by the theater, *Engaging Shaw* has a simple set, allowing the audience to concentrate on the dialogue. The play well deserved the applause it received.

Engaging Shaw runs at the Bennington Center for the Arts at the intersection of Route 9 and Gypsy Lane in Bennington until Sept. 3. Performances are at 8 p.m. Wednesdays through Saturdays, with 2 p.m. matinees on Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. Tickets are \$29 for adults and \$10 for students. The Wednesday matinees on August 23 and 30 feature \$15 tickets for senior citizens. The box office can be reached at 802-447-0564 or go to their Web site at www.oldcastletheatreco.org.

The presentation will be *Hard Times*, a Dickens drama by Stephen Jeffrey, which will run Sept. 22 to Oct. 8.

Savage's Myspace.com Web

playing in the background and
photos of scantily clad women — but
it is clearly targeting people like
Rachel Bruno.

"I believe that I'm the solution
for those who lost or need elevation
to their situation," a narrative about
himself states. "My name is Jazzo
and my interests in Myspace is to
meet beautiful young
women that want to
travel and get down wit
a playa. If your that deal
for real hit me up and we
can chat some more."

While Rachel Bruno's
story is the most high
profile recent case in the
Capital District, it is
atypical in that she was a

20-year-old adult when she fell
under Savage's spell. Generally,
those in their early and mid-teens
are most susceptible because they
are just starting to establish their
own identities, including, as they
go through puberty, their own
sexual identities and are some-
times perfect targets for predators.

Some signs parents should be
aware of according to the FBI's "A
Guide to Internet Safety" are: an
inordinate amount of time a child
spends online, the existence of
pornography on the child's com-
puter, phone calls to strange and/
or long distance numbers, strange
gifts or if the child shuts off the
monitor when a parent enters the
room.

region to explicitly address the
issue on May 23 when they
adopted a Code of Conduct pro-
hibiting students from using the
Internet to disseminate infor-
mation in district schools, "that is
illegal, defamatory, abusive,
threatening, racially offensive...
or adult oriented."

Students who violate that rule
are subject to a parent conference
with their school principal with
the possibility of a "3-5 days ex-
ternal suspension" and a hearing
before the district's top admini-
strator. That's the same penalty
facing students who make obsc-
cene gestures or use vulgar
language.

In Niskayuna, the school
district addresses safety concerns
by reserving the right to look at
any messages sent or received on
their computer network. All e-
mail sent through the district's
computers is "deemed to not be
confidential and is subject to
random review" under a policy
adopted last year.

Regardless of the approach
schools take, the dangers remain
real. More than one-third of
young people who use the
Internet saw unwanted sexual
material online, according to
results of a 2005 survey con-
ducted by the Crimes Against
Children Research Center at the
University of New Hampshire.
That's an increase from the 25
percent exposed five years ago.

The news is not all negative
with the center finding that the
number of youth sexually soli-
cited online declined from 19 per-

cent in 2000 to just 13 percent last
year. But four percent of those
approached sexually in the most
recent data were subjected to
"aggressive solicitation," in which
someone "attempted to make
offline contact" with a young
person.

Much of the problem involves
solicitors and victims knowing

each other, making it even more
challenging to deter, the univer-
sity study said. "Acquaintances
played a growing role in many of
the unwanted solicitation inci-
dents," researchers said with 14
percent coming from the victims'
friends. That's a sharp increase
from just three percent in 2000.





Bethlehem school district sets tax rate

At its Aug. 9 meeting, the Bethlehem Central Board of Education set the school district's 2006-2007 tax rate at \$17.40 per \$1,000 dollars, an increase of 3.71 percent.

The increase came in just under the 3.75 percent estimated at the time of the budget re-vote in June.

The new rate applies to both Bethlehem and New Scotland due to the town-wide reassessments. Last year, tax rates were set at \$27.74 for Bethlehem and \$25.83 for New Scotland.

At the time of the budget re-vote, the district estimated the 2006-07 tax rate at \$16.98 per \$1,000 of assessed value, based on preliminary assessment figures provided by the Bethlehem and New Scotland assessor's offices. The difference between the estimated tax rate and the board-approved tax rate is due to significant reductions in the final total assessment figures from both towns, resulting from successful homeowner reassessment griev-

ances, according to Assistant Superintendent for Business Steve O'Shea.

"The difference between our estimated tax rate at the time of our budget vote and the tax rate the board has set is solely the

Bethlehem and New Scotland total town assessments dropped approximately \$60 million and \$10 million, respectively, between March and August as numbers were revised through the appeals process.

The STAR program will continue to lower the burden on school property taxes for qualifying property owners because the homeowner exemption amount has risen proportionally with the rise in property assessments. The basic STAR exemption has risen from \$27,350 to \$42,270, and the enhanced STAR exemption (for qualifying senior citizens) has risen from \$45,580 to \$80,020 this year.

O'Shea said when a reassessment occurs like the one in Bethlehem there is a one third formula that is a basic measuring stick many people use.

"One third of the residents taxes goes up, one third goes down and the other third usually stay about the same," O'Shea said.

"The district can't take credit for someone's bill going down nor should we accept blame for someone's bill going up 20 percent because of a 3.71 percent school tax rate increase," O'Shea added.

School tax bills for residents of New Scotland and Bethlehem residents will be sent out in September and October. If anyone has questions about the school district's new tax rates they can contact the business office during normal working hours.

Grab binoculars, net for nature walks

Early-birder guided bird walks for fall are scheduled for Thursdays, Sept. 7, 14, 21 and 28 at 7:30 a.m. The visitor center opens at 7 a.m. with informal refreshments and bird watching at the feeders; the outdoor walk begins at 7:30 a.m. Center naturalists will offer tips and tricks for bird identification with the beginning birder in mind. Participants will seek out migrants visiting the area, as well as species that live here throughout the year. The walks are free. Bring binoculars and bird identification books if you have them; the center also has equipment available for loan. In the event of severe weather, this walk may be cancelled.





Games, pipers, food and spirits highlight Scottish festival *By Marty Bannan*

Whether you take the high road or the low road isn't important as long as the road leads to Altamont and the 29th annual Capital District Scottish Games this weekend.

Much more than an athletic competition, the Scottish Games is a full Celtic festival of arts, music, dance, tartans, history, food and fun hosted by the Champion Schenectady Pipe Band, an

organization active in the Capital District since 1917.

"The games have been a part of the region since 1939, but it wasn't until 1977 that the Schenectady band took over the event, making it the success it's today," said event publicity chairman Bob Gordon, adding that the games are the largest Celtic festival of art and competition in the Northeast.

The festival takes place Saturday, Sept. 2, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and

Sunday, Sept. 3, from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m., at the Altamont Fairgrounds.

Heading up activities, the Northeastern U.S. Highland Athletics Championships take place Saturday with amateur athletics scheduled for Sunday. Participating athletes will compete in throwing the caber, a piece of timber resembling a utility pole, or the sheaf, a burlap bag filled with 16 pounds of hay that is tossed over a bar using a pitch fork. Other events include throwing hammers and large stones for both distance and height.

For piping fans, The Eastern United States Pipe Band Association's Grade two pipe and band competition highlights activities on Sunday. For traditional Celtic dance fans, the Capital District Country Dancers perform Saturday and the Braemar Highland dancers perform Sunday.

Featured musical performers this year include the traditional Brigadoons, as well as local favorites, the McKrells on Saturday and a taste of modern Celtic music by Mactalla Mor on Sunday. Canadian Celtic rock favorites Hunting McLeod and folk balladeer Colin Grant-Adams appear both days. In addition, writer and historian Rob Roy

McGregor will again present "History of the Sword," while the Scottish Military Association brings the past to life before your eyes both days.

For the wee ones, there are several activities including a chance to partake in a medieval fantasy defending castles against dragons and evil knights.

Other activities featured include a sheep dog competition, the bonniest knees contest, Celtic canine capers and exhibits by

until every piper is playing as one. Then the drums begin and finally another lone piper on the left finishes. It's a crescendo of music that never fails to bring tears to people's eyes."

As always, vendors selling anything and everything Scottish will set up shop during the festivities. Visitors may browse among an enormous assortment of merchandise including kilts, sweaters, woolens, T-shirts, Celtic jewelry, and much more ...

And of course there will be plenty of Scottish and American food and drink.

If all of this makes you want to go to Scotland, take notice. Raffle tickets to win a trip for two to Scotland will be on sale at the games. Also, the runner up in the raffle wins a trip for two to any Southwest Airlines



Scottish clans and societies.

In past years, massed bands performed only once at the conclusion of the festival. This year they will perform twice each day at noon and near closing.

"There is nothing quite like it," Gordon said. "One lone piper on the formation's right begins playing "Amazing Grace." Then from the right, each column joins in

"For the price of admission a family can't go wrong," Gordon said. "Everything is close together. Nothing is far from you, and something is always going on."

Tickets to the games are \$15 for Saturday and \$10 for Sunday. Advance tickets may be purchased at a reduced price at most Price Choppers.

Eagles open 2006 season at Schenectady

The class AA football landscape has been changed again.

With Queensbury moving up from class A, there are now 15 teams in class AA. That has precipitated a return to the three-division system following one season of two-division play.

"We would prefer a two-division system, but there were a lot of factors that went into going to a three-division format," said Section II commissioner Gary VanDerzee. "There were rivalries, the number of games in divisional play and geography.

"We'll revisit the divisional format after this year," he added.

Queensbury joins a division that includes last year's Section II runner-up Saratoga, Sectional semifinalist Shaker, Guilderland and Niskayuna. Shenendehowa, Colonie, Bethlehem, Ballston Spa and Columbia are in another division, while the five class AA Big 10 schools — Christian Brothers Academy, Albany, Schenectady, Troy and defending Sectional champion LaSalle — are in the third division.

"It's going to be different," said Queensbury head coach John Irion. "I think the double A teams — as compared to the single A

teams — have maybe fewer weaknesses and more depth."

"I have no problem with any of the teams in our division because we can play with any of them," said Saratoga coach Blase Iuliano.

With the three-division format comes a new system for determining playoff teams. The top two teams in each division earn automatic berths, and two at-large teams will be selected from the eight teams that finish either third or fourth in their divisions. Last year, the top four teams from each of the two divisions earned playoff berths.

Here is a look at this year's class AA field.

Albany Falcons

Head coach: Joe Burke

Outlook: The Falcons will be looking to improve on a 5-4 overall record from last season as they begin their season against Ballston Spa Saturday.

Jermain Schultz will quarterback the offense, while running backs Everett Tune, Craig VanAlstyne and Deon Wilson handle the ground game. Schultz will also have seven wide receivers and two tight ends on the roster to pass to.

Ballston Spa Scotties

Head coach: John Bowen

Key veterans: Dom Monaco (quarterback/free safety), Chris Adams (defensive end/fullback), Anthony Scarpetti (running back/outside linebacker), Steve Duncan (strong safety/running back)

Bowen said being placed in a division with perennial powers such as Shenendehowa and Colonie will make Ballston Spa's road to a Sectional berth tough. "You've got Shen, which is always good. They graduated a lot last year, but coach (Brent) Steuerwald always has a good team," said Bowen. "And based on what's on paper right now, Colonie has a good team."

Despite having to rebuild the offensive line, Smith is optimistic that his team can make the playoffs

again. "I think (our division) is pretty even," he said. "When you're looking at being in the top two to make the playoffs and you look at the teams, I think it's pretty even."

Bethlehem opens its season Friday at Schenectady.
