Public shares budget views

A variety of opinions were aired at a sparsely attended public hearing, Wednesday, Oct. 25, on Bethlehem's 2007 proposed budget. The town fiscal plan calls for a 2.79 percent increase to the tax levy with total expenditures up less than 1 percent.

Taxpayer Norm Morand said, although overall town taxes are up less than 3 percent, his individual town taxes are 14 percent higher than the previous year.

"Reassessment hurt the homeowners and not the businesses in town," said Morand.

"You just passed on more cost to the homeowner."

Will Veil, a senior outreach worker for the town said he believes long-range vision is what

is needed.

"I support a slow and gradual increase," said Veil. "We have

wonderful services in this town, and I want to see them stay."

Other speakers shared concerns that the town is deferring important projects for future years when the time to address these needs is today.

"Someone is going to pay the piper eventually," said John Smolinski. "I am in favor of belt tightening, but I certainly think there is a middle ground in what to fund."

Robert Jasinski warned the board that closing the Rupert Road landfill will be more costly than they may expect.

"What are you going to do with

construction waste still generated in town? What rate will you have with it, and where will the waste go?" asked Jasinski. "The operation is going to change."

Former town board member Ted Putney also said it is time the town board address capital projects.

"Don't defer capital costs for the sake of the short term," said Putney.

Highway department employee Matthew Goedeke spoke out for other employees afraid to

Paying the price

Instability rattles heating oil market

In recent years, home heating oil prices in the Capital District operated like a seesaw with the cost of filling a tank increasing as winter temperatures fell, and then consumers getting a break as the thermometer climbed. The prices of other fuels like gasoline did just the opposite, as good summer weather meant a strong driving season that pushed up demand for gas and prices along with it.

All that changed last year when Hurricane Katrina hit the energy market like a lightning bolt out of the blue, decimating much of the nation's refining capacity in late August and leaving local consumers with energy bills that took an extra large bite out of their wallets. Now, a full 14 months later, consumers are left trying to wend their way through an unsettled market that's being affected by

everything from the war in Iraq to the nearness of national elections, according to Greg Mihailovich, director of New York Public Interest Research Group's Fuel Buyers Group.

The changing market dynamics meant that the usual drop in oil prices after the Labor Day holiday didn't materialize this year, and it may have contributed to local consumers holding off on oil deliveries last month.

"Business has been good but we usually get a lot of orders from people who are topping off their tanks in August and September with 700 or 800 gallon deliveries before the season starts and we didn't get as many this year," said Judy Miller, the business manager with Delmar-area Helderberg Oil. "We've been in business for 10 years now, and it seems like customers may be changing their buying habits after everything that happened with Katrina."

Down the home stretch

As Election Day nears, local pols make final push


Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 7, and along with choosing a new governor to replace three-term Republican George Pataki, voters in Bethlehem will go to the polls to choose a new Assembly member in the 108th District along with selecting a town justice.

In the race for town justice, it's Democrat and Independent candidate Ryan Donovan running against Republican/Conservative Party nominee Brian Murphy. Donovan ran for the position two years ago and was defeated by current state Court of Claims Judge Frank Milano. Milano was appointed this past summer to serve on the state Court of Claims, and Donovan was then appointed to the town justice position by the Democratic-controlled town board.

Donovan who lives in Delmar with his wife, Brooke, and two children said his experience in the courtroom qualifies him for the job.

"I am a practicing lawyer and

Police charge Delmar man with DWI after pickup hits house

Countywide weekend patrol nets 36 for DWI Albany man charged with burglary

The 55th countywide DWI Blanket Patrol conducted throughout Albany County this weekend results in 36 people being charged with drunk driving.

Eleven municipal police departments including the Bethlehem Police Department

along with the Albany County Sheriff's department and the New York State Police all participated in the patrol held between the hours of 10 p.m., Friday, Oct. 27, and 5 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 29.

A total of 751 traffic stops were made by all patrols.

Along with the 36 DWI arrested, there were 11 people charged with aggravated unlicensed operation and a total of 54 designated drivers.

Bethlehem Police made 42 stops and arrested two for DWI. Twenty-two officers from the Bethlehem Police Department participated in the weekend patrol.

The countywide DWI Blanket Patrol is an ongoing effort by the Albany County Stop-DWI program to halt drunk driving.

Bethlehem Police arrested an Albany man for burglary after a routine traffic stop on Delaware Avenue.

Musa Kirnun, 32, of Lark Drive, Albany, was charged with assault 2nd degree and burglary first degree, both felonies.

Kirnun was stopped and charged with two traffic safety violations, as he was westbound on Delaware Avenue on October 21.

After a routine check police were made aware of an active

felony arrest warrant for Kirnun out of Troy for burglary and assault. He was taken into custody following the stop.

James Gallagher, 58, of 24 Woodlawn Ave., East Greenbush was charged with DWI by Bethlehem Police.

Gallagher was stopped at 9 Magee Drive on Oct. 23, when he was charged. He was additionally charged with failure to keep right and driving with more than .08 percent blood alcohol content. Gallagher will appear in Town Court on Nov. 8.



New voting machines on the horizon for area

Next year will be a year of change for county boards of elections throughout the state, beginning with the type of machines used to record votes.

New electronic voting machines will be in place, mandated by the federal Help America Vote Act, which was enacted in response to voting problems in Florida during the 2000 presidential election. What type of electronic machine will be used has yet to be decided.

On Nov. 7, 2006, the old lever-type voting machines that number more than 19,000 in more than 15,000 election districts statewide will make their final appearance.

"That's based on all the information coming to us from

the state Board of Elections," said Jim Clancy, Albany County election commissioner.

The new machines are designed to meet minimum standards, including handicap and alternative language accessibility.

"It's a huge undertaking with multiple things going on at the same time," said Lee Daghlian, public information officer for the Board of Elections. "Three or four consultants are working with us to make sure this is done on time."

The choices include optical-scan voting machines that let voters pick the candidate of their choice on a paper ballot that is scanned and recorded. Also up for review are DRE — or direct recording electronic — voting machines, which record votes by

means of a ballot display similar to the old lever voting machines. Currently, 13 different DRE and optical-scan machines from six different manufacturers are being tested.

Regardless of which machines are certified in December, Clancy said, election districts in Albany County will all use the same one.

Demonstrations at shopping malls, senior centers and other locations countywide will let voters test the new machines before they are used in the 2007 fall elections. Poll workers will also have to be trained to handle and operate the new voting machines.

"First and foremost, we have to educate ourselves with the new machines and then get these machines out to the public as soon as possible," Clancy said.

Clancy will not announce what machine will be selected for Albany County until the state certifies the choices in mid-December.

Counties will then have two weeks before announcing their choices by January 2007.

"We're being very cautious and doing our research on all the machines," said Clancy.

Election districts with more than 800 registered voters normally have a second machine, but Clancy said it is still unclear if a second machine will be needed at heavily populated election districts until all new machines are thoroughly tested.

"We will soon find out how many people these new machines can handle," said Clancy.

Each county in New York is now in charge of running elections, and, Clancy said, the transition has been a smooth one this year.

"A lot of thanks needs to be given to town and city clerks who have helped with the transition," said Daghlian.

The current lever machines have been in place for decades and are now owned by each individual county, which can decide what their fate will be.

"They can store them, use them for scrap or sell them to foreign countries," said Daghlian. State law mandates the old machines can no longer be used for any elections ever again in New York.

"They held up pretty well," said Daghlian.

Four new Court of Claims judges hail from Delmar

Delmar can count four of its own on the New York Court of Claims.

Early this summer, four appointees out of a total of 13 new judges nominated by Gov. George Pataki and confirmed before the state Senate Judiciary Committee hail from the Delmar area. They are Frank P. Milano, James H. Ferreira, Christopher J. McCarthy and Roger D. McDonough.

The four Delmar residents were sworn in along with the rest of the Class of 2006 Court of Claims judges at a ceremony in June.

"I was certainly delighted when these judges were appointed," said Richard E. Sise, presiding judge of the state Court of Claims. "They are highly qualified attorneys and have already hit the ground running."

Milano most recently served as Bethlehem town justice before being appointed to the Court of Claims. He also served as first deputy secretary of state at the Department of State and on two separate occasions served as acting secretary of state in New York. Milano is a graduate of Pennsylvania University and Albany Law School. He and his wife Ruth have two children.

McDonough served as senior assistant counsel to Pataki for the past three years. He is a graduate of the University

of Maryland School of Law and Washington and Lee University. McDonough was admitted to the bar in 1993 and is a veteran of the Army. He and his wife Florence have six children.

Ferreira served as deputy commissioner and general counsel for the state Department of Environmental Conservation prior to his appointment. Ferreira also worked as an associate at Harris Beach LLP, and served as a judicial law clerk for the state Supreme Court, Appellate Division, Fourth Department. Ferreira is a Cornell University graduate and a cum laude graduate of Syracuse University College of Law. He and his wife Abby have two children.

McCarthy served as senior assistant counsel to Pataki for the past six years. His past duties include serving as legislative counsel at the state Department of Insurance and at the state Department of Banking. McCarthy is a magna cum laude graduate of Harvard University and is a graduate of Columbia Law School. McCarthy and his wife Katherine have two sons.

There are currently 25 civil judges in the Court of Claims with two vacancies. Three of the four newly appointed judges from Delmar will be handling civil claims brought against the State. McDonough will be handling felony cases assigned to county court. McCarthy, Ferreira, and Milano will also be assigned cases in other parts of the state, including Manhattan, Long Island and Albany.

Stylists raise money for breast cancer research

One woman in eight will develop breast cancer in her lifetime, and Debi Farley of Choices Hair Studio in Delmar said she realized one day that with 32 women employed at the salon, there was a very good chance one of them could eventually be diagnosed with the illness.

The odds proved true. In June, fellow employee Pam Schultz disclosed that she had been diagnosed with breast cancer. Schultz learned of her illness a little more than a year after finding out her husband had testicular cancer.

Farley, the educational director at Choices Hair Studio, and the staff held a

fundraiser in August to raise money for Schultz's husband, and following its success, decided to turn their attention to raising money for breast cancer research.

The latest fundraiser, coinciding with the breast cancer awareness month of October, was held Sunday, Oct. 29, at the salon at 180 Delaware Ave.

The Choices Hair Studio stylists donated three hours of their time from 3 to 6 p.m. to offer haircuts for donations of \$10 and \$15. All proceeds went to breast cancer research.

"Haircuts were given every 15 minutes with several girls at 20 different stations," said Farley. "We were very busy, and overall we raised over \$1,000."

Beauty supply items were auctioned off as well.

"We want to do everything we can to raise money," said

Farley.

Schultz has two children and continues to work at Choices Hair Studio while undergoing cancer treatment. Farley said the staff has donated time to help Schultz offset medical expenses.

"We all took money out of our paychecks to supplement her income," Farley said. "Employees also donated time off to her as well."

Every year, 182,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer and 43,300 women die from the disease, according to statistics from the American Cancer Society.

Leeanne Shade, owner of Choices Hair Studio, said the employees really pulled together for Schultz to let her know they all care.

"We are such a close staff," said Shade. "Everyone is like our second family."

My daughter was 2 years old the first time she went trick-or-treating. It was a time in her life when she was so unfamiliar with sweets that she preferred a piece of fruit to cookies.

We had to beg her to take a piece of Halloween candy from our neighbor.

"Go ahead, honey, put the candy in your pumpkin bucket," her dad and I told her.

Clearly, while my toddler enjoyed donning her Teletubbies costume, she was not too keen about all the holiday's rituals.

So, rather than continue down the street, we hopped in the car to visit my brother instead. Maybe she'd feel more comfortable taking candy from family.

On the way over we finally convinced her to try the Kit Kat bar.

"Take a bite," we encouraged, "It's yummy. You'll like it."

These days my daughter

cracks up when I tell her that story.

"And I would rather eat an apple than eat the candy," she laughs, filling in the details.

That's right, but her mommy and daddy introduced her to candy. We did this because . . . because . . .

Why did we do that?

Well, what decent parents don't parade their children through the streets to demand candy?

By the time I realized that I was doing the bidding of the Great Pumpkin, it was too late.

The Great Pumpkin puts a spell on all children. When children grow up and become parents, the spell activates. The parents become entranced with childhood Halloween memories. The parents want their children to experience the same sugar high.

And once the kids are exposed, the Great Pumpkin hooks another generation. That's right, your grandchildren and your great-grandchildren after them will be braving all kinds of weather for mini chocolate bars.

When I was little, Halloween

was only a one-day event, actually a one-evening event. It took place on Oct. 31.

My costume usually included a plastic mask held to my head by elastic string that was stapled to the sides of the mask. There was a thin slit over the mouth area.

I couldn't really see or breathe while wearing the mask. If I lifted the mask to get some air, inevitably the elastic string would break, rendering the mask useless. And chances are my winter coat was covering the rest of the costume.

None of that really mattered because I always brought home a big bag of goodies.

These days, Halloween is a multi-event, multi-day celebration for kids. There are parties during the day in the classrooms, parties in the before- and after-school programs, pumpkin carving parties with the neighbors, and PTA parties in the school at night.

Clearly, the Great Pumpkin is no longer working alone. He must have a whole society of gourds working to make Halloween a major ordeal.

Some of the celebrations are passed off as "harvest parties" and even offer healthy food choices such as vegetables and fruits. But alas, the power of the Great Pumpkin is quite strong. It steers children away from the carrots and cantaloupe and toward the doughnut holes and brownies, whetting their appetites for the trick-or-treating.

It's tough when Halloween falls on a weeknight. When it's a school night and a work night,

everyone needs to go to bed at a decent hour, which means you need to go out trick-or-treating at a fairly early hour. But you can't go out too early, because the kids want it to be dark.

Weeknight Halloween also means rushing home from work and attempting to feed your family dinner.

"You have to eat dinner or you're not going trick-or-treating," you tell your kids.

You can almost hear the Great Pumpkin laughing at you. Dinner? Your children don't want to fill up on dinner! Your children want to suit up and hit the pavement.

And once they are out, it's hard to get them back inside.

"C'mon, just one more house," the children plead, as the night wears on and the parent chaperones wear out.

As I did as a child, my daughter comes home and empties her collection on the floor for inspection.

When I was little, I'd separate out the stuff I didn't like, including anything with coconut and probably also Hershey's bars with almonds. I tried to protect my favorites from parental confiscation. My 10-year-old does the same.

These days I'm much less discriminating. I will accept virtually anything covered with chocolate. I'm not deterred by almonds, peanuts, coconut, caramel, mint, peanut butter, or crisped rice. I don't actually know what nougat is, but if the three musketeers like it, then it must be good.

Unfortunately, my daughter has also expanded her candy preferences. She used to

happily hand over all the Reese's peanut butter cups. Those days are gone.

The Great Pumpkin has instilled in her a sense of candy greed. She'll dole out a few M&Ms from a package or break off a piece of a Kit Kat bar, but she doesn't understand why mom and dad feel entitled to much more.

"Who took you around the neighborhood? Who pays for the costume?" we say, negotiating for some candy.

Advice to parents of young children: Delay trick-or-treating as long as possible, and when you start, let your child know in advance that they must share their collection. Think of it as a service fee or tax.

This year my daughter promised her Uncle Dave that she'd save him the Baby Ruth and Snickers bars.

"I don't like those anyway," she told me.

As for the peanut butter cups, she told me that if she got at least two, she'd give one to me.

"If I'm at a house and I get my choice and I see peanut butter cups and I know I only have one, then I'll get another one for you."

"That sounds complicated," I told her. I couldn't see how she'd keep a mental inventory of what she'd picked up.

"Don't worry about it. I can buy my own candy," I reassured her, although I was actually thinking, if you end up with only one peanut butter cup, couldn't you sacrifice and give it to your dear old mom?

Mostly what I want is for the chocolate Halloween candy to be gone as soon as possible, so I don't continue to give in to the temptation.

When all that's left are the sour balls, fruit chews, gummy worms, and jawbreakers, then the pressure is off. I'd rather have an apple!



V'ville considers making room for skate park

Voorheesville village trustees kicked around the idea of bringing a skate park to the village of Voorheesville at their Oct. 24 meeting.

Croton-on-Hudson, a village of about 7,000 that sits 30 miles north of New York City, is looking to unload five pieces of skateboard park equipment on any municipality that may want it.

"The skate park equipment is up for grabs," said Voorheesville Public Works Supervisor Will Smith.

Sue Snyder, Croton-on-Hudson's recreation and parks superintendent, said the town decided to provide the pressure-treated lumber to another municipality, because the park, which was constructed in 2002, had seen a drastic drop in attendance. Use of the skateboard facility was fee-based.

Snyder said the park is available to any municipality for a small fee, which "would have to

be worked out between the two parties."

The town that takes the skate park structures would be responsible for their transportation as well, said Snyder.

Snyder said she would like the area in which the park now sits to be used for something else this winter.

"We want it done this fall," Snyder said of the removal.

Along with Voorheesville, Snyder said she has been in contact with other interested parties — including the town of Bethlehem, which is having trouble finding a location to put the park.

"The town is still considering ideas trying to focus on a location," said Bethlehem Town Parks Administrator Nan Lahan. "If there is not a location, there is no point in pursuing it."

According to Smith, a possible Voorheesville location would be in Jim Nichols Memorial Park behind village hall.

"I'd love to have a spot for the

kids to use," said Smith. "But it's got to be done appropriately."

Due to the scale of work involved, Smith said, interest in the park would need to be further evaluated before any action was taken. Each piece would need to be disassembled and transported back to Voorheesville and then reassembled.

"That's a pretty fair task for us," said Smith.

"I would rather not grab the equipment for nothing or next to nothing, then set it up down in the park and have it not be used at all," said Smith.

At the meeting, Smith said that he thought having the skate park would probably not stop kids from skateboarding elsewhere in the village, but he hoped that it would cut down on the number of skateboarders along, busier roadways, such as Main Street.

"It's become a nuisance," said Smith. "It's bothersome to the people who live there."

The issue of liability still needs to be worked out if the park is to

become a reality, said Smith. But just like any park or playground equipment, the skate park would be open only during park hours and would have the appropriate signage designating proper and safe use of the equipment. Any one not skateboarding safely, said Smith, would be asked to leave.

Another possibility Smith entertained at the meeting was not necessarily taking all five pieces that are available and leaving some of the more dangerous equipment, like the half pipe — a skate ramp shaped like a flattened-letter U, with Croton-on-Hudson.

Snyder said allowing some, not all, of the equipment would "depend on how soon they would be able to remove it."

"We want as much of it as possible removed this fall," she said.

Let your voice be heard

Chances are this year's election will be yet another reaffirmation of voter apathy or dissatisfaction.

The major race for governor is already decided, according to the polls, and that means a lot of Democrats won't even bother to show up Nov. 7.

Another contest appears to be more of a horse race with incumbent U.S. Rep. John Sweeney, R-Clifton Park, being challenged by Kirsten Gillibrand, D-Hudson. Both have drawn heavy-duty support, with Sweeney being touted by first lady Laura Bush and a visit to the Gillibrand camp from former President Bill Clinton.

Polls indicate that Gillibrand has closed the gap in her favor since the campaign began for the 20th Congressional seat. According to the Sweeney camp, he is still in the lead.

In a strange twist, state Comptroller Alan Hevesi, D-Queens, is now embroiled in a real contest, since he was charged \$80,000 plus for having his wife chauffeured in a state-owned car. He was cited in a report by the State Ethics Commission. This means former Saratoga County comptroller Chris Callaghan now has a greater shot at the state position.

In the local coverage area, there is little action, although there is a rather heated race for the Ballston town council between Mary Beth Hynes and Patti Southworth.

How it all plays out still remains to be seen.

We doubt that voter turnout will change much, with low attendance at the polls. Most candidates today are not being elected by a majority, since scores of eligible voters choose to opt out of the election process altogether.

Even though the situation is discouraging, we believe citizens should exercise their right to vote. Without demonstrating some sort of faith in the system (through voting), we are opening the door to mediocrity and giving free reign to people to manipulate the system in their favor.

In a country with nearly 300 million, we should be able to select and support qualified candidates for political office. If it's time for change, we should begin to work toward true reform.

In the meantime, we should let our voices be heard in the voting booth.

Make the effort, get out and vote Nov. 7.

Don't shortchange yourself: vote

Election Day 2006 is less than a week away and many of you are thinking, thank goodness, it's just about over. Soon the lawn signs will be gone, the nasty campaign ads that invade your TV screen every night during prime time will be gone and shortly, so will the incessant campaign materials that come into your home every day. What a relief! Now you can get back to your own life.

Why should you vote this year, anyway? It's not a presidential year; Eliot Spitzer is 50 points ahead in polling in the governor's race; Hillary Clinton is far ahead of her opponent in her U.S. Senate campaign. Because of "designer districts" created by redistricting, legislative seats, unless they are open seats, are seldom competitive. So all these folks will win anyway, right?

This is where I should quote from the civic books about the importance of voting in a vibrant democracy. In a participatory democracy, the governed must consent to be governed and that consent is given only through voting. Most people, however, do understand that. They honestly do think voting is important but vagaries of life get in the way, the day goes and voting just doesn't get done. So why should you make this year's election a top priority? Why should you really care?

Although much has been written about this election being a coronation of Spitzer as governor and Clinton as U.S. senator, they are not the only offices on the ballot. There is a very competitive Congressional race in the 20th District in the Capital District, and a competitive Assembly race in Albany/Rensselaer. As part of the 435 other Congressmen and women and the 212 state legislators, these candidates will have a vote on issues that impact your family for at least

the next two years. A new Congress will either pursue a new course on all the upcoming issues or continue the president's policy agenda.

Do you think the economy is just wonderful or are you worried about your job disappearing abroad? You can have a say. Do you think Social Security should be privatized or preserved? You get to vote. Whether you think the war on terror means tapping your phone lines, expanding the Patriot Act and lessening our civil rights, or whether you think all these are a product of keeping us safe from terrorists, tell them what you think. Should our country become a walled fortress with a fence along every border, allowing in only immigrants who can provide us with expertise and needed skills? Yes or no? Does the Statue of Liberty any longer have meaning? Think about it.

You get to decide whether you think Medicare Part D is the answer to your prescription needs or are a government fiasco, you get to decide. Whether health care for your family will be out of reach and whether your retirement will be secure, you can be part of that discussion. Whether you think the war in Iraq is the wrong war at the wrong time, or whether you think this is a necessary war and we must not leave until a stable Iraq has been realized, you get to say. If you want input into all the decisions of this new Congress, you must vote.

In some communities, who runs the sheriff's department and who presides in town court will be on the ballot. Judges who preside in divorce court or in the criminal courts are also up for election. In the state Legislature, legislators will decide what state taxes you will pay and how much you will pay. They will decide if Medicaid reform gets done, thereby possibly saving or stabilizing your property taxes. They will also decide how much your kids will get in state aid to education and whether that means your property taxes go up.

How do you feel about the hospital closures commission or if your parents get good nursing home care or even if they will be able to pay for that care is up to you. Can your family get access to quality health care if your employer can no longer provide that health benefit?

Have you thought about the environment in which you live, the price you pay for gasoline or whether you will be able to sell your home at the price you want or indeed buy a new one? Will your state government become more fiscally responsible, will this new Legislature be any better at accomplishing needed reforms on redistricting, campaign financing or ethics reform? You can demand that these issues be considered by your vote.

Think about it, if there were not an election next week, would candidates be trying to tell you what they intend to do to benefit your family, or would they be asking for your input? This is your opportunity to keep your elected employees accountable. Too often, citizens do not exercise that right.

Voter turnout in the 2004 presidential year was 60 percent of registered voters, a high for recent elections. Turnout in the 2002 midterm election was approximately 40 percent. Voter turnout in New York in the primary election last September was an abysmal 15 percent for Democrats and 11 percent for Republicans. This means that very few voters actually choose the people who lead them, and the surest way to have other people decide for you is not to vote at all. There are certainly many people who would hope that you don't vote because their vote counts more if you don't.

If all the above reasons don't make you think voting this year is absolutely essential, there is one more very good reason to consider. Think about my son and the thousands of other young men and women who have put on this country's uniform and gone off to a hot, bloody, war-torn country thousands of miles away to spill their blood or make the ultimate sacrifice to defend our freedom and our right to vote. To honor them this election year, please vote on Tuesday, Nov. 7.

Recently, two very troubling stories about senior citizens in Albany County made headlines.

John Barton, 82, wandered away from his residence and was missing for two days. Mr. Barton, reported to suffer from dementia, was fortunate. He was found by authorities unharmed. His case, however, underscores the need for better watchfulness and preparedness in protecting our growing population of elderly.

In Albany, Robert Taylor, an elderly man, was found slain in the DeWitt Clinton Hotel less than a block from the mayor's office. The *Times Union* noted that it "marked at least the seventh time in recent years someone over age 65 was brutally murdered in the region."

These two cases argue powerfully for the strongest and most coordinated efforts by the region's public safety agencies to pull together to protect the elderly.

The nation's premier public safety program addressing the

problem of crime against the elderly is called Triad (<http://www.nationaltriad.org/>). It was conceived in 1988 by the American Association of Retired Persons, the National Sheriffs' Association and the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

It brings together county and municipal law enforcement with agencies and organizations serving and representing the elderly.

In 1993, with a little publicity boost from Fred LeBrun of the *Times Union*, I succeeded in getting a law passed that gave the Division of Criminal Justice Services a mandate to promote Triad statewide. The last time I checked into it, Triad had been organized in about half the state's counties, Rensselaer and Schoharie among them.

In the years since I first encountered Triad, much of what people set out in 1988 to create has come to pass. The Baby Boomer generation has reached retirement age. Not only is the population of elderly increasing,

but the population of younger people has been decreasing markedly in upstate New York.

It is high time that all of our police agencies accepted their increasing responsibility for making the needs and concerns of the elderly a top priority. If all our chiefs and sheriffs can put on their uniforms and hold splashy press conferences presenting a united front to deal with guns, gangs and drugs, they can just as well do it for crime, fraud, abuse and exploitation of the elderly.

After last year's horrific homicide of John and Mary Elacqua in Albany, I started knocking on the doors of police agencies and seniors groups in the county to build support for organizing a Triad. District Attorney David Soares has been very supportive.

Unfortunately, I'm finding the county's police agencies considerably less than receptive to this program. There is no reason why a countywide Triad initiative cannot be organized and implemented at no cost or investment in manpower to our various police agencies.

I urge readers to contact Sheriff Jim Campbell by e-mail at jcampbell@albanycounty.com or jmahan@albanycounty.com and the municipal police agencies of Albany County at jtuffey@albanycounty.org to let them know that they know of this important program, and want to see it established in our county.



Restaurant's menu is as eclectic as its history

From a convent, to a restaurant run by nuns, to a belly dance studio, JJ Madden's, formerly L' Auberge Swiss restaurant, certainly has a history all its own.

The Route 85 establishment in the town of New Scotland has been open since the spring under the ownership of Voorheesville resident John Jeffers.

"My family owned O'Heaney's on Ontario Street for years," said Jeffers. "I moved out here about six years ago, and Smitty's (Smith's Tavern) is about the only place in town."

A great deal of work went into the restaurant, including the addition of an outdoor deck and a large bar inside with several large and small flat-screen televisions. The restaurant overlooks the hills of southern Albany County and the Helderburg Mountains, offering panoramic views either outside on the deck or in one of the window seats inside the restaurant.

The unique past of JJ Madden's begins with a convent operated by sisters of the Mill Hill missionaries in the mid-'60s. The Mill Hill nuns then started their own restaurant called The Heavenly Inn. The restaurant changed names again to the Herb Garden restaurant before being renamed L' Auberge Swiss restaurant under the prior owner, who maintained the business from 1984 until last fall.

JJ Madden's is open seven

days a week. Lunches are served from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., dinner from 3 to 10 p.m., and a pub menu is served until midnight every

Friday and Saturday.

Manager Nancy Potenza said the menu has both traditional dishes and meals you can only

find at JJ Madden's. "The shepherd's pie is very popular, along with our country fried chicken and smothered chicken," said Potenza.

The Jack Daniel's sirloin is another mouthwatering favorite. Other menu items include the St. Louis ribs, shrimp scampi, grilled salmon and barbecue chicken pizza.

Every Monday will be Italian night; with chicken and biscuits on Tuesday; beef stroganoff every Wednesday; corned beef and cabbage on Thursday; and fish Fridays. Everything from pizza and wings to lobster tails can be found on the menu.

Entertainment is also a new attraction of JJ Madden's, with live music featured every Saturday night. Jeffers said that the atmosphere is relaxed and

families are welcome. "Don't be afraid to bring the whole family," said Jeffers.

Ted Yaas, the chef at JJ Madden's, comes highly recommended, according to Jeffers. "He is fantastic," said Jeffers.

Work is under way to expand the facility for large receptions, along with making it handicap accessible.

Porco murder story to air Saturday

Memory of Murder. It sounds more like a late night movie than a real life drama. It is, however, the actual title of the CBS 48 Hours Mystery one-hour program featuring the murder of Peter Porco and the brutal attack on Joan Porco. The Porcos' son Christopher was found guilty of the crime on Aug. 11.

The CBS show will air Saturday, Nov. 4 on CBS at 10 p.m. with CBS news correspondent Peter Van Zant reporting. Locally, it will be seen on

WRGB TV Channel 6.

The show will recreate the scene of the crime the night of Nov. 14 to 15, 2004 when Christopher Porco drove from the University of Rochester campus down the Thruway to Delmar, entering his family's 36 Brockley Drive home in the middle of the night, taking an ax from the garage and attacking his parents while they were asleep in bed.

"Cops say a mother implicated her son in a brutal murder," narrates host Van Zant in the upcoming CBS show promo that can be viewed online at www.cbsnews.com.

"She says they are dead wrong," Van Zant adds.

The show will feature interviews with both defense and prosecuting attorneys along with a jailhouse interview of Christopher Porco inside the Albany County jail.

Bethlehem Police and the Albany County District Attorney's office led the investigation into the murder of Peter Porco and attack on Joan Porco. That investigation lasted more than a year before an indictment was handed up against the Porcos' younger son Christopher. The case was sent to trial in June with Judge Jeffrey Berry presiding over an Orange County Supreme Court jury in Goshen. Berry moved the trial from Albany to Goshen after deciding intense media attention in the Capital District would make it difficult for Christopher Porco to receive a fair trial. After several hundred pieces of evidence and more than 70 witnesses covering an eight-week period, the jury handed down a guilty verdict on

both counts of second-degree murder and attempted murder. Christopher Porco faces a maximum sentence of 50 years to life. Sentencing had been scheduled for last week, but has since

been moved to Dec. 12 to accommodate the defense team of Terence Kindlon and Laurie Shanks, who are working on Porco's appeal.





Bethlehem budget still up in the air

It's anyone's guess what the final tax levy will be for the town of Bethlehem when the board adopts the 2007 budget at its Wednesday, Nov. 8, meeting.

The current proposal calls for a 2.79 percent tax levy increase. Several options were discussed after the public hearing on Wednesday, Oct. 25. They included everything from total elimination of any tax increase to raising the tax levy to provide better service.

"I don't want to support any tax increase this year," said board member Tim Gordon.

Gordon, along with members Kyle Kotary and Daniel Plummer, said he believes the town's fund balance is more than adequate.

"We do have a healthy fund balance, and that is not the town's money, it's the people's money," said Gordon.

Supervisor Theresa Egan reminded board members it wasn't so long ago when residents were hit with double-digit tax increases because of depleting fund balances.

"Fund balances are dwindling, and that's where the concern is," said Egan. "I hesitate to be so short-sighted that we want a very small or zero tax increase this year and then have to raise taxes 5 or 6 percent next year."

Board member Daniel Plummer said he believes town fund balances are plentiful.

"We have fund balances like I have not seen before," said Plummer, indicating the general fund has a fund balance of 28

percent.

Town comptroller Judith Kehoe said the general fund balance of \$3.5 million is a reduction from the past few

service against taxpayers' needs and ability to pay for the services.

"I feel pretty good about where we are at balancing these two extremes," said Kotary.

Sam Messina, another member of the town board, said he is concerned about the town's future, and so are many taxpayers.

"I would like to see a tax rate of less than 5 percent and generate another \$160,000 to invest in our community," Messina said.

Kehoe and Egan will present different options the board is requesting at the Nov. 8 budget meeting. They include using savings derived from Albany

County's changes in election costs charges to the town.

"I would like to see a scenario with the HAVA (Help America Vote Act) savings going to taxpayer relief," said Gordon.

Those HAVA savings total \$190,000. Plummer would like to use the partial savings from employee health insurance office visit co-pay coverage to go back to the taxpayer. The savings amounts to \$89,000, and Plummer's scenario calls for \$50,000 of those funds go to offset the 2.79 percent tax increase levy.

"There's clearly different views on the board here," said Plummer.

Egan said the town will pay tomorrow for any reductions made today.

"Projects we have deferred are not going away," Egan said.

ask the town board to keep the 3 percent cost of living increase for nonunionized workers.

"Voting 'no' on this 3 percent is like taking food out of their children's mouths," Goedeke said.

Comptroller Judith Kehoe updated the board with the latest budget information after two workshop sessions. Sales tax revenue estimates for 2006 are now projected at \$9.61 million.

"That's up \$250,000 from original budget estimates and ahead of what we budgeted," said Kehoe.

Mortgage tax revenues are slightly down but not as much as originally projected.

"Mortgage tax revenues will be coming in around \$1.4 million," said Kehoe.

That figure is \$100,000 short of budget estimates. The biggest impact to the 2007 proposed budget is the \$190,000 savings due to Albany County's restructuring of election costs to be charged back to the town.

"That was the best news we had in the entire budget process," said Kehoe.

Full time equivalent employees for the town in 2007 will total 243.5, down five full time people from 2006's work force. Most of the employee reduction is in the town Highway Department, which dropped from 60 to 56 employees.

"One of the reasons I gave up positions in my department was to ensure the existing staff received a raise," said highway department Director Gregg Sagendorph.

No other budget workshops are scheduled. Wednesday, Nov. 8, is the tentative date for the town budget adoption.

trial lawyer, and I know the courts well," said Donovan. Since being appointed to the justice position, Donovan said he has started a youth assistance program similar to Albany County's targeting rehabilitation for youthful DWI offenders, ages 15-22.

"I am the first town judge to adopt it in the state," Donovan said.

Brian Murphy has more than 35 years of experience practicing law and is currently the chief counsel in the bureau of professional conduct for the state Department of Health, managing an office 33 attorneys.

"Delmar is a special place," said Murphy. "I've enjoyed the last month meeting folks and talking with them. It's been

invigorating."

The 108th Assembly District race pits Independent/Democrat and Bethlehem board member Timothy Gordon against Republican/Conservative candidate Martin Reid, also a Rensselaer County legislator. Gordon defeated William Reinhardt, Ken Preston and Keith Hammond in the fall Democratic primary and also defeated Martin Reid for the Independence Party nod. Reid, who is the Republican Party's endorsed candidate, won a Conservative primary in September against Reinhardt. Hammond will also be on the ballot for the Assembly seat, representing the Working Families Party. The winner will replace Assemblyman Pat Casale, R-Speigletown, who decided against running for another term.

Congressman Michael McNulty, D-Green Island, will try for a 10th straight term as a member of Congress. McNulty easily defeated Thomas Raleigh in the Democratic primary and now faces Republican Warren Redlich for the 21st Congressional District seat encompassing Albany County. McNulty was first elected to Congress as a member of the 23rd District in 1988 before it became the 21st district in 1992. He has spent 37 years in public office.

New York voters will also be selecting their next governor, comptroller and attorney general. In the governors race it's Republican/Conservative candidate John Faso against Democrat/Independent and working families endorsed

party candidate Eliot Spitzer. Spitzer, the current state attorney general, is heavily favored in the polls. Faso was once a member of the State Assembly representing Bethlehem and ran unsuccessfully for comptroller in 2002.

In the race for state comptroller, Democrat Alan Hevesi is facing Republican J. Christopher Callaghan.

Callaghan, who has been steadily trailing in the polls, has gained ground in recent weeks due to the revelation that Hevesi's wife was reportedly being chauffeured by a state employee at taxpayers' expense. The State Ethics Commission last week criticized Hevesi's handling of the matter. Hevesi has since paid back more than \$80,000 to the state. Hevesi defeated John Faso in 2002 for the seat.

Jeanine Pirro will square off against Andrew Cuomo for state attorney general. Pirro is on the Republican/Conservative and Independent party lines. Cuomo is on both the Democratic and Working Family party lines.

Cuomo is the former secretary of Housing and Urban Development under the Clinton administration. He ran unsuccessfully for governor in 2002, losing a Democratic primary to H. Carl McCall. McCall lost to Gov. George Pataki in the November 2002 general election.

Pirro is a former Westchester County judge who also served 12 years as district attorney for the same county. Pirro initially announced she would run against U.S. Sen. Hillary Clinton but dropped out of the race late last year.

Incumbent Clinton is heavily favored to defeat Republican John Spencer in her re-election bid next week. The former first lady is considered a Democratic favorite to run for president in two years.

In one other local race, state Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Albany, is running unopposed for another term in the 46th Senate District.

Church's clothing charity relieves winter's chill

It began five years ago when, while volunteering at Grace and Holy Innocents soup kitchen in Albany, Feura Bush resident Jennifer King saw a need for clothing among its visitors.

"I had clothes that someone had given me, as well as what my family had outgrown. So I took them there,

and it has grown into a huge ministry," King said of the clothes that Delmar's St. Stephen's Episcopal Church provides when members volunteer for their monthly soup kitchen stint.

"Word spread quickly that she took clothing to the homeless," Fay Lewis, King's mother, said. King's ambition was contagious, and her good idea has since grown.

"Her house was just getting so inundated. I thought, there's got to be room," Lewis said of the time when King ran the entire clothing drive from her own home.

St. Stephen's has since dedicated a small room of the church building to the clothing ministry.

"This little room is servicing many avenues," said Dianne Bormann, coordinator of the clothing collections.

The ministry isn't seeking throw-aways or worn-out pieces.

"Do not donate it if you would not put it on your own body, whether you are homeless or not. You must leave these people some dignity," said Bormann.

Fortunately, the collection has not been met with too many decisions between donations and the rag pile.

"Bethlehem is a very affluent community. There is little that we need to throw away," Bormann said.

"The reason we service so many areas outside of this community is because Bethlehem is so good about servicing its own community," Bormann said.

The "upper room," as the clothing storage area is affectionately called, provides clothing to organizations such as Jezreel International, Hats for the Homeless, The Mission House and two schools in the Adirondacks.

The clothing drive formed a connection with Jezreel International after Hurricane Katrina's devastation. Jezreel International delivers truckloads of materials to areas of need.

Hats for the Homeless is another program that King started.

"One day a man came in (to the soup kitchen) during the winter and asked if I had any gloves. I unfortunately had to say no, but I saw how cold and blue his hands were," King recalled.

Hats for the Homeless began with donations. Eventually, the parish's high school students became involved, conducting fundraisers such as bake sales to help purchase hats.

"We bought gloves, hats and socks, and gave them out each month during cold weather, as well as warm blankets for those who sleep

on the street," King said.

The charity approached Newberry Knitting in Schenectady, which gave hundreds of dollars worth of gloves, socks and hats to Hats for the Homeless for a \$100 fee.

"The money is like the loaves and the fishes, because what money we have always seems to be there when I need to buy all of these hats, gloves and socks," said King.

Another beneficiary of St. Stephen's clothing drive is downtown Albany's Mission House.

"We bring them beautiful clothing — suits and such for women of domestic violence and others who are looking for employment," Bormann said.

Perhaps the most rewarding recipients of goods from the upper room are the children who attend two schools in an impoverished area of the Adirondacks.

"We saw the need. Many of the people are farmers," Bormann said.

At Booneville High School, a clothing rack has been set up in the physical education facility containing sport jackets, suits, dress pants and more. Students may borrow what they need and return it when they are finished. The clothing is cleaned for the next user. The clothing rack has provided necessary attire for occasions such as dances, interviews and funerals.

At West Lyden Elementary School, more essential materials are dispersed.

"Our school is located on the Tug Hill Plateau," said West Lyden Principal Jackie Carll. The wind speed is fast and strong, and the snow falls deep. Carll said the people of the rural community are "very hard-working, independent people, who deserve the greatest respect."

Each day, Carll said she watches the children as they come and go to and from the school buses. She watches to see if any students have not been wearing winter boots or a winter coat for a few days. From that point she takes action, though quietly and casually.

"I am always conscious of how I offer something to someone. I don't want to be pushy if they hesitate," Carll said. "I call parents or take students aside and just say, 'I happen to have this. It is in great shape if you would like to have it.'"

A parent has never refused, she said.

"I want to make sure that they have boots on their feet, mittens on their hands, hats on their heads, and coats to cover their bodies," Carll said.

Carll related the story of a young boy who had just received a pair of sneakers that were in great shape. She said she told him he did not have to tell anyone where he got them from.

She said the boy returned to his classroom a few moments later, held up his new shoes and said excitedly, "Look at these! They're new and free. Aren't they cool?"

Lewis said the ministry is not at a standstill. "We haven't stopped looking for avenues," she said.

Donations must be made by appointment. Gifts of money, books and other materials are also accepted. Gifts may be specified to go toward a certain recipient. Seasonal clothing is preferred during the season. Call St. Stephen's at 439-3265 to schedule an appointment.

Seven arrested for lewd behavior in Macy's restroom

Colonie police are investigating why a number of men convened at a second floor department store restroom to allegedly engage in lewd activity

recently.

Police arrested seven men on charges of public lewdness, a class B misdemeanor, after a weeklong undercover operation at the Macy's store at Colonie Center in mid October.

According to police, the men had been masturbating in the store's second-floor men's room.

The investigation was spurred by a complaint from Macy's employees who reported increased traffic in the men's room as well as "uncleanly conditions," said police Lt. John Van Alstyne. Police met with Macy's officials, and the sting was set in motion.

"We are still looking into why this bathroom in particular. It's obvious to us that they were there for a reason," Van Alstyne said.

Police are looking to see if there are any lines of communication among the seven that would designate the Macy's bathroom as a meeting place for lewd activities.

Over the course of the three-day sting, undercover officers

observed any suspicious males in the area of the bathroom.

On Thursday, Oct. 12, police made two arrests. On Tuesday, Oct. 17, four were arrested, and the last to be arrested was on Friday, Oct. 20. The arrests were made at various times of day, ranging from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m., said Van Alstync.

The Enlarged City School District of Troy has confirmed that Anthony C. Mauriello, 38, a second-grade teacher at School 18, was one of the four men arrested on Tuesday, Oct. 17.

Mauriello has been placed on administrative leave with pay, said Caroline Boardman, on behalf of the school district.


"Mr. Mauriello has been an employee of The Enlarged City School District of Troy for 16 years. His tenure at Troy has been both positive and totally professional," said district Superintendent Lonnie Palmer in

a written statement. "There have never been any allegations of misconduct or inappropriate behavior that would result in any disciplinary action. He is well-liked and respected by both students and staff, and is very effective in the classroom."

Colonie police will continue to "aggressively patrol" the men's room until they feel that the situation is corrected, he said.

All seven men were arraigned in Town Court on misdemeanor charges and issued appearance tickets for a later date. If convicted, each could spend no more than a year in jail, said Van Alstyne.

Also arrested were: Franz Nicotina, 54, of Albany; Stephen D. Bellacqua, 63, of Selkirk; William R. Larue, 67, of Albany; James P. Hoopingarner, 36, of Albany; Christopher Owens, 47, of Troy; and Lawrence E. Moore, 38, of Albany.

Is a health savings plan right for you?

It's not just the leaves that typically pile up in the autumn. Millions of Americans also face mountains of paperwork each fall as they begin their employer's annual benefits open enrollment process, and ponder which health plan is best for them and their families.

While the increasing number and variety of plans may seem hard to navigate, one type of health plan actually puts consumers back in the driver's seat. Is your employer contributing to the HSA?

Six of every 10 employers who offer an HSA put money into the account for their employees, according to UnitedHealth Group data. This helps reduce the employees' overall out-of-pocket expenses and maximizes their tax free benefits under the plan.

Does the option of investing your health care dollars interest



you?

Unlike traditional flexible spending accounts, which require consumers to use all money set aside by the end of the year or lose it, HSAs let you rollover unused dollars from one year to the next. This enables you to invest some of that money in mutual funds or other opportunities for long-term growth.

Have all relevant costs for each plan been considered?

To ensure consumers are not comparing apples to oranges, it's important to consider all the cost elements associated with each plan option during open enrollment. Traditional plans may include higher monthly premiums, a smaller deductible, as well as copays and/or coinsurance. HSA plans often include lower monthly premi-

ums, a higher deductible and coinsurance after the deductible is reached. Depending on a person's health needs, a high-deductible plan might cost less overall than repeatedly paying a traditional plan's copays and coinsurance.

As consumers are asked to make more decisions about, and pay a greater share of, their health care, one thing remains clear: no one wants to compromise when it comes to health coverage. Educating yourself about the new consumer-driven plans helps ensure that you entertain all the options available and determine the type of health coverage that best fits your needs.

Health service launches local branch

Senior Whole Health of New York (SWH), a voluntary health care benefits plan for low-income seniors who are eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid, today announced it has received a conditional state Department of Health certificate of authority to enroll qualified senior citizens in its health care program beginning Jan. 1, 2007. The plan has also received conditional approval from The Center For Medicare and Medicaid Services as a Medicare Advantage Special Needs Plan.

SWH, which will begin by serving members living in Albany, Schenectady, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Ulster and Dutchess counties, combines health care with social support services so that seniors living in assisted living or other community housing can maintain their independence and freedom of choice when making health care decisions.

Members have a personal plan of care developed specifically for their individual needs and can choose their own primary care doctor. SWH nurse and service coordinators then work with members and their primary care physicians to determine what types of care and services members need and prefer, and help them obtain those services.

"Since 2004, SWH has proven its concept of care management for the poor and elderly in Massachusetts," said John Baackes, president and CEO of SWH and formerly CEO of Community Health Plan. "We are looking forward to bringing these same benefits to those who have been at the back of the line waiting for quality health care in New York."

SWH officials are hoping its Empire State launch will replicate the fast growth and success

of its first market - Boston. In its first two years of operation in the Bay State, SWH has enrolled 2,600 low-income seniors. In the Boston suburb of Brockton, the health care plan has enrolled more than 50 percent of all eligible enrollees.

SWH has already contracted with many of the largest physician groups and hospitals in the Capital District and Hudson Valley. With these contracts now in place, SWH believes joining the health care plan will be painless for seniors, since the large majority of them will not have to switch physicians.

This fall, following final approvals from state and federal regulators SWH will begin promoting and educating senior citizens living in the six-county service area about its comprehensive, personalized health care plan in anticipation of its January kick-off enrollment date. SWH will work to establish a regional network of resources by working with community-based organizations serving the senior citizen population.

"Many organizations in our New York service area already offer a variety of services to the low-income, over 65 population," said SWH executive director Margaret Wallingford. "We look forward to working with these organizations as our health care service becomes another piece of the puzzle in caring for this growing population."

After rolling out its program in these preliminary New York counties, SWH plans to extend its services beyond the Capital District and Hudson Valley in an effort to enroll a large percentage of the 480,000 eligible elderly, low-income seniors presently living in New York state.

Ways to ease the burden of caring for ailing loved ones

When Carl Pearson's ailing mother could no longer live alone safely, he and his wife Rita brought her to their home in Dallas so they could care for her. Wanting to preserve his mother's independence and protect the couple's privacy, Pearson converted a billiard room in the remodeled garage into a spacious bedroom suite.

Initially, he thought the arrangement would work well, but soon the walking distance to use the bathroom inside the house became difficult and too risky.

"My mother had dementia," said Pearson, explaining she could get lost easily, even in a small area.

The billiards room had been plumbed for a sink, but installation of a conventional bathroom was impossible due to plumbing restrictions. Out of concern for his mother's welfare, Pearson put in a portable toilet, assuming it was his only option.

"For four months, I cleaned and emptied a porta-potty two or three times daily," he recalled.

Then Pearson learned about a Saniflo macerating toilet while do-

ing research on the Internet.

"I knew someone had the solution to our problem," he said.

Macerating technology is relatively new to the United States, introduced in the late 1990s. But the French parent company of SFA Saniflo actually developed its line of macerating systems in Europe more than 50 years ago. The technology is changing the way Americans renovate their homes.

A macerating toilet can be positioned virtually anywhere, because the system is installed directly on top of any finished floor. That means there is no need for costly excavation to put in a drain line, even in a basement or a garage. The above-floor technology uses a rotating cutting blade to convert waste and toilet paper into a slurry that is flushed through narrow-diameter piping into the sewer or septic system.

Without the need to dig up floors or tear out walls, a homeowner can add a spare bathroom quickly and cost-effectively: A new bathroom can be up and running in about half a day. With this kind of installation

flexibility, the choice of location is up to the homeowner, not the plumber.

"It fit the bill perfectly, and gave us the ability to put a toilet where we never could have one otherwise," Pearson said of the Saniflo unit he installed in the garage suite. Placing a bathroom right inside his mother's bedroom greatly improved her safety and quality of life.

"She had her privacy, and we never had any problems with the toilet," Pearson said. He was happy to leave the days of emptying the portable toilet by hand behind him.

The simplified installation can make removal a snap too, if desired. After his mother passed away several years later, Pearson decided to restore the bedroom suite to the original billiards getaway, and no longer needed a spare bathroom. He removed the Saniflo toilet and ended up giving it to a neighbor who happened to be looking for a solution to a similar plumbing problem for his own mother's living area. "It was easy to install and easy to remove," Pearson said.

Ask the Pharmacist

Should my family get the flu shot?

What is the flu?

The flu is respiratory illness caused by the influenza virus. The flu season can start as early as October and last until May. It generally peaks in January. Symptoms of the flu are fever, headache, runny nose, muscle aches, dry cough, sore throat, extreme fatigue, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Often the illness is mild, however, it can be severe and lead to hospitalization if complications such as dehydration or pneumonia occur. Each year, roughly 36,000 people die from the flu. Many of these deaths can be avoided if we prevent the spread of the flu and ensure that people who are the highest risk for severe illness get the flu vaccine each year.

How can we avoid getting the flu?

The flu is spread through droplets that are coughed or sneezed out of our bodies. The flu can be spread to others one day before you are sick and up to five days after you are sick. Therefore, you can pass the flu virus before you even know you are sick. Frequent hand washing and keeping away from others when you are sick is the best way to prevent the spread of the virus. Making sure your loved

ones at risk get vaccinated is the best way to prevent the flu and its complications.

What vaccinations are available and are they safe?

There are two types of vaccination – the flu shot and the nasal spray flu vaccine. Two weeks after the vaccination, your body has the antibodies developed that it needs to fight the flu. These vaccinations are safe and need to pass the FDA tests for safety and effectiveness before they are used in the United States (see www.fda.gov/cder/vaccine/vaccapr.htm).



Who is at the highest risk for severe cases of the flu?

Those at highest risk for serious complications from the flu in-

cludes people age 65 and over, residents of long term care facilities, people age 2 to 64 with chronic health conditions (such as asthma, diabetes, heart disease, kidney disease, cancer, HIV/AIDS), children age 6 to 23 months old, pregnant women and health care workers. Household contacts and caregivers of children less than 6 months of age should also get the vaccine. That would include moms, dads and grandparents of these infants.

Who else should get vaccinated?

Anyone who wants to reduce their risk of getting the flu should get vaccinated. You should especially consider it if you live with or care for someone who is in the priority group. In addition, any health person age 5 to 49 years of age who is not pregnant can get the nasal spray flu vaccine this season.

Who should NOT get vaccinated?

People allergic to eggs, children less than 6 months of age and those who have had a severe reaction to the vaccine in the past should not get vaccinated. If you have a moderate or severe illness with a fever, you should wait until those symptoms go away before you get vaccinated.

Talk with your doctor and health care providers about the flu vaccine for you and your family this fall. Even if given later in the season, the vaccination can still protect you and those you care about.

Closing the retirement gap

Though most women admit they are concerned about their financial futures, many continue to lag behind when it comes to preparing for retirement. And they know it. According to a recently released study by Prudential Financial, Inc., entitled *Financial Experience and Behaviors Among Women*, a whopping 62 percent of women gave themselves a grade of "C" or lower when it came to their knowledge of financial products and services.

Women remain clear about their financial goals, but many are not taking action. A lack of confidence and knowledge - along with the interference of more immediate responsibilities - are combining to sidetrack even those with the best of intentions.

- If you're single don't count on someone else to help you - look out for No. 1.

- If you're married, take an active part in household money matters. And be sure to establish a credit history in your own name.

- Ensure that your assets will be distributed according to your wishes with a will or trust.

- Review your insurance needs including life, disability and long-term care. Longer life spans. Increased responsibilities in retirement. Fewer Social Security benefits. Smaller pensions. Whatever the reason, as a woman the reality is that in all likelihood you will need more retirement income than you think - and you and you alone are the one who must make sure it is there when the time comes. Taking even small steps in the right direction now will boost both your financial planning confidence and your bottom line.

Winter safety tips for seniors

With the winter and holiday season right around the corner, inclement weather conditions that result in melted snow and ice can cause potentially dangerous and hazardous conditions for senior citizens and the elderly.

According to the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, one-third of all adults over age 65 fall each year. In 2003 alone, 1.8 million seniors were treated in emergency rooms for fall-related injuries. Winter conditions are

easily the most hazardous time of the year for this occurrence. An orthopedic surgeon in New York City specializing in fracture care of the elderly, James D. Capozzi, a member of the Department of Orthopaedics at Mount Sinai School of Medicine treats large numbers of serious injuries among our senior population. Roughly 400,000 fall-related fractures occur every year in the US. "The winter season can be very dangerous for the elderly if the right precautions are not taken," said Capozzi. "Most hip fractures

occur from falls. Ice and other wintry conditions can definitely increase the chance of serious falls happening."

To help prevent such accidents, Capozzi offers the following winter safety tips for seniors:

- Keep all walkways and driveways free from snow and ice.

- Modify canes with metal grips on the bottom for additional stability on slippery surfaces.

- Improve lighting in high traffic areas both inside and outside the home.

- Use a well-secured floor mat by the entrance door to catch any falling snow or ice from shoes or clothing. Wipe all puddles immediately. Also, caution seniors to be aware of any newly placed mats or rugs.

- In case of severe weather or storms, make sure seniors have plenty of food, pet food and medication supplies during the winter months. Cancel all non-emergency appointments during these times.

- Exercise whenever possible to maintain muscle strength, coordination and balance.

- Keep all eyeglass prescriptions up to date.

MammoSite targets When it's time to take the keys away

early-stage cancer

For all women, the diagnosis of breast cancer can be an overwhelming experience. Even when the cancer is discovered in an early stage, the patient may have to face months of prolonged treatments once surgery has been completed. Choices need to be made regarding various treatment options. Women in the Albany area may be pleased to know that a less invasive and time-consuming trend in breast cancer treatment is widely available for eligible patients.

The MammoSite Radiation Therapy System (RTS), a form of partial breast irradiation (PBI), allows many patients with early-stage breast cancer who are candidates for a lumpectomy (surgical removal of a breast tumor) to receive a full course of targeted radiation in just five days.

This is a remarkable advance, as traditional radiation may require six weeks of daily treatment to complete. In addition to its short treatment time, the MammoSite treatment targets radiation to the area where tumors are most likely to recur, while minimizing exposure to healthy tissue. To date, more than 20,000 patients have received MammoSite and thanks to early detection, some doctors believe up to 100,000 women a year could benefit from the procedure.

Many women prefer breast conservation therapy (BCT) instead of mastectomy (the surgical removal of the entire breast). Before the availability of MammoSite, however, women choosing BCT had to undergo six to seven weeks of daily radiation treatment after lumpectomy. The travel expenses and time commitment for these patients could be an enormous burden,

especially for those coming from great distances to a center for treatment.

Recently, the American Society of Breast Surgeons (ASBS) expanded their patient selection criteria for women eligible to receive partial breast irradiation (PBI) and MammoSite. By including younger women, age 45 and older, and those with larger tumor sizes, up to 3 centimeters, the ASBS enables more women to benefit from this procedure and underscores the efficacy of the treatment.

Safety and performance of the MammoSite device were evaluated in a multicenter study in 2000-2001, which involved women with early-stage breast cancer. The study results led to the United States FDA approval of the device in May 2002.

More recently, published study results have found the treatment to be an effective method to deliver radiation to appropriately selected patients. The first four-year data on MammoSite presented at a meeting of the American Society for Therapeutic Radiology and Oncology demonstrated that out of 48 patients involved in the initial clinical trial, none experienced a recurrence after treatment with MammoSite. In addition, a five-year follow-up study published in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute found that partial breast irradiation (PBI), using a similar technique to MammoSite RTS, produces comparable results to conventional whole breast radiation therapy in preventing breast cancer recurrence in appropriately selected women treated with breast conservation therapy (BCT).

How would you react if you were sitting in the back seat, one of your parents was driving, and he or she became slightly confused when it came time to take an exit? Or if he or she brushed a curb while driving down the road?

Fortunately, she remembered her home phone number and was able to call her husband for help. When he arrived, he hugged her and with tears in his eyes told her it was time to take away the keys.

As the baby boomers age, tak-

ing away the keys is a decision more and more of their children and spouses are going to have to make. Safe driving is no longer possible once a person's vision, hearing and/or reaction time have become impaired by old age; or once diseases like Alzheimer's and dementia have robbed them of such cognitive abilities as memory, judgment and understanding.

"In Mary's case, it wasn't the first time she had taken a wrong turn. Fortunately, her husband found the strength to take away the keys, but a lot of people are reluctant to do so because they fear their loved one will see it as a loss of their freedom and dignity. We make sure that is not the case," says Pat Drea, vice president of Visiting Angels, the agency hired to help Mary just days after she lost her keys.

Some days the Visiting Angels would play cards with Mary or help her do housework and

make dinner; other days she'd drive Mary to doctors' appointments or the store, or just take her to the park for an afternoon stroll.

"Our Visiting Angels did everything possible to make life seem normal that year before Mary entered the nursing home which I'm sure both she and her husband appreciated," said Drea.

In addition to helping out at home, Visiting Angels can also be hired as companions for people in nursing homes and assisted living facilities. Their services are covered by most long-term care insurance plans.

Seniors benefit from natural light

According to the Center of Design For An Aging Society in Portland, Ore., older people need more light (about three to five times more than younger people) for both vision and maintaining health.

Seniors are well aware that as they age, their eye lenses thicken and their pupils shrink. This causes their eyes to adapt more slowly to changing light conditions and increases the need for more light, and not just for vision and safety.

Many seniors don't get outside enough, so there are many reasons to consider bringing more natural light in. They need vitamin D for calcium to be absorbed by the body to strengthen teeth, bones and tissue to maintain a healthy skeleton throughout life. Two sources of vitamin D are diet and sunlight. In healthy human bodies, 80 percent of vitamin D is produced in the skin when it is exposed to natural light. A vitamin D deficiency can contribute to the brittle-bone disease osteoporosis, a major issue of aging, particularly for women.

And the benefits of having abundant daylight in our homes aren't just physical. Studies show that Seasonal Affective Disorder



ings and be balanced through the use of windows, doors and skylights. According to Joe Patrick, senior product manager with VELUX America, skylights admit 30 percent more light than vertical windows in dormers, and provide the drama of a sky view that can't be achieved with vertical windows.

"Skylights also offer much more privacy than vertical windows without taking up valuable wall space that can be used for decorating or storage, which is a real benefit as seniors downsize living spaces," Patrick says.

They also offer economic benefits - a way to stretch fixed-income dollars with a one-time purchase that pays benefits over time by reducing energy costs. Venting skylights transform living areas into bright, safer spaces by admitting light from above; and they provide a dose of the medicine that daylight and fresh air offer.

Politics, profit prevail

Our reporter caught up with consumers at the gas pump this weekend, and asked what they thought about the cost of gas.

Through most of the summer, the cost of a gallon of regular unleaded gas hovered around \$3, and while prices have since come down on average 25 percent, some consumers remain skeptical of why and what will happen after Election Day.

A September Gallup poll found that 42 percent of Americans believe the Bush administration is manipulating the prices to help Republicans get through what most predict to be a tough mid-term election, where Democrats are poised to take over the House.

Locally, many consumers said they feel the same way, but have mixed opinions about the relationship between politics and gas prices.

"I think they (prices) are going down because of the election," said Bernard Smith as he was filling up at the Stewart's on Delaware Avenue in Delmar. "I do think they will go back up (after the election), but they will go up slowly."

"You watch. The day after the election they will start going back up," said his wife, Carol.

While industry analysts scoff at the idea that politics plays a role in gas prices — saying that the speculative nature of the busi-

ness and extraneous variables like Hurricane Katrina and increased demand in foreign countries are what have an impact on the supply of crude oil and drive the price at the pump—

randomly sampled consumers believe that oil companies are making record profits.

"Why did Exxon Mobil make \$10 billion ... in profit ... in one quarter alone?" said Paul Kot, a principal at Loudon Locksmith, who was filling up at a Mobil station on Route 7 in Latham. "It does not seem right. It is almost like a monopoly because everyone needs fuel, and where else are you going to go?"

Kot said he too thinks prices will head back up after the Nov. 7 election, and that politics plays a role in why they are on a downward trend.

"It is too much of a coincidence," he said of the timing. "I hope they surprise me, but I do think they will start to go back up. It is just too coincidental."

Like Kot, Christine Hurlbert, of Ballston Spa, said she thinks the government should step in and impose regulations on big oil companies in an effort to control gas prices because it is a commodity everyone needs and because of that, the companies are exploiting consumers.

"Everybody needs it, and it should be socialized. The prices should be controlled in some way," she said. "I don't buy the whole supply-and-demand thing, and I don't buy the reasons they (oil companies) give for the prices going up."

She said she thinks oil companies are driving prices down before the mid-term elections so they will keep the status quo in Washington, rather than Washington putting pressure on the oil companies.

The Democrats' talking points headed into the election include taxing windfall oil profits and investigating a possible collusion between a handful of oil companies to control supply and drive prices up. Republicans say more needs to be done to decrease our reliance on foreign oil, including an expansion of domestic drilling.

Many think the high gas prices will help foster alternatives, and both Democrats and Republicans say a long-term solution includes doing more to promote alternative sources of energy like solar, hydro, fuel cells and hybrid vehicles.

In mid-October, customers who held off may have benefited from a more than 20 percent drop in world oil prices. That temporarily pushed the cost for a barrel of crude oil below \$58 on world markets and led to lower prices at area gas stations. But it came too early in the season for a major impact on heating oil and on Friday the good news appeared to be ending when the New York futures market closed with that same barrel of oil going for \$60.75.

"Looking at the winter heating season this year, it's really a head-scratcher because it is so unclear which way prices are going to go," Mihailovich said. "We used to have a dip in prices once we made it past Labor Day and the driving season ended, but a drop like this in October is very unusual. I'm sure it's not completely unrelated to the political campaigns because we're coming up on Election Day, but it still leaves things quite unpredictable."

"Oil isn't really a simple supply and demand commodity any-

more," said Mihailovich. "Prices are largely being driven by speculators who are reacting to world events and trying to anticipate what the next trend is going to be. They are not bidding prices up based on what it cost them to buy the oil they have, but what it will cost to buy the oil they are going to get in the future."

Customers who locked in prices during the summer have the advantage of avoiding the wild price fluctuations that have plagued consumers in previous winters. But many decided not to sign up because world oil prices were then near their highest levels in history, and it didn't look like such a bargain.

The seasonal dynamic in world markets has made it tougher for local dealers to offer long-term contracts which lock-in prices for an entire season. "We are a strictly cash on delivery company," said Helderberg's Miller of his small, family-run firm. "We don't want to be responsible for managing a customer's family budget. They can do that better for themselves. We just give them the best deal we can whenever they need oil."

"Right now we are at \$2.32 a gallon, but that could change any day," Miller added.

Bethlehem science series touches on timely topics

Winter may be a way off, but winter's biggest illness, the flu, drew

more than 60 students and a few teachers to Bethlehem's high school auditorium to hear a local virologist discuss the flu.

The speaker was Dave Wentworth, Ph.D., of the Wadsworth Center, a research facility affiliated with both the state Department of Health and the University at Albany. The talk is one of a monthly series at Bethlehem Central High School called "Science Today," hosted by science teacher Paul O'Reilly and parent Arlene Ramsingh.

As avian flu makes its way across Asia and into Europe, scientists worry about a potential health crisis.

In his talk, Wentworth provided a historical context to illuminate why scientists are so concerned about this new version of an old disease: In 1918, the flu virus morphed into a no-

toriously potent form, known as the Spanish flu, and killed approximately 675,000 Americans.

Characterizing the flu as a "war between our immune system and the influenza virus," Wentworth described how viruses change to keep one step ahead of a person's ability to fight them. Scientists have detected certain mutation tendencies, which inform the design of annual vaccines.

Throughout his presentation, Wentworth used a teacher-like approach of interrupting himself to pose questions. For instance, he said, several components that make up a virus end with the suffix "ase."

"What does that mean?" Wentworth asked.

"Enzymes," was the correct reply from several students.

"Science Today" grew out of O'Reilly's efforts to connect his students to scientists in the community. As former director of the independent research program at the

high school, his task was to get kids involved in scientific investigations outside of the classroom.

People "who actually do science" can reach students in a way that differs from even the best teachers, O'Reilly said.

"I started inviting scientists in to talk to my class," he said.

One of those speakers was Ramsingh, a virologist at the Wadsworth Center and mother of Bethlehem senior Katherine Duceman. Ramsingh is also a member of Parents for Excellence, a volunteer educational group that works to enhance educational opportunities in the district. Her many interests made her the perfect partner to launch Science Today with O'Reilly.

Realizing the value of having professional scientists talk directly to students, O'Reilly wanted to make the talks available to the whole school. In addition to securing the auditorium for an after-school time slot, he got approval to open the event to the community.

Ramsingh recruited scientists, beginning with friends and colleagues. Her husband, Barry Duceman with the State Police, was the first speaker last year. Other speakers have come from the Wadsworth Center, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Albany Medical College, The Nature Conservancy, General Electric and Albany Molecular Research.

For this year's schedule, Ramsingh and O'Reilly polled teachers and students for topic ideas. Ramsingh is still in charge of recruitment, but this year she said she's reaching beyond her familiars — with success.

Bruce Tulloch, the district's science supervisor, noted the importance of exposing students to cutting-edge research.

"In class, we study about science," he said, but the talks show "science in the process of being made."

Students had plenty of questions for Wentworth, which left him telling the students they should all be scientists.

"I'm impressed that many [students] stayed after school for this," said Wentworth.

"Science Today" talks are open to the public. The next talk will be Thursday, Nov. 16, at 2:15 p.m. in the BCHS auditorium. Susan Nye, Ph.D., of GE Silicones in Waterford will discuss solving real world problems with chemistry.

The Mystery of Irma Vep no mystery for a night of laughs

Curtain Call Theatre in Latham has hit another home run with its current production of "The Mystery of Irma Vep." The Gothic spoof is a side-splitting evening of theater due primarily to Kris Anderson and Aaron S. Holbriiter, who perform all eight roles. Anderson and Holbriiter, neither one strangers to the Curtain Call stage, return in what are two of their most enjoyable performances. Enjoyable not only from the audience perspective, but also evident from the onstage antics as well.

It seems likely that more than a bit of adlibbing occurred during Saturday evening's performance, since both men broke up in laughter on stage. Several missed lighting cues and costume snags only helped to get the laughs flowing from both sides of the footlights.

"Irma Vep" combines bits of slapstick, vaudeville, farce, melodrama and satire to bring together an evening of guffaws, chuckles and wide-grinned, knee-slapping laughs. The show borrows broadly from some of the classics of stage and screen including "Curse of the Mummy," "Wuthering Heights" and Shakespeare himself.

The play is about murder, werewolves, an English manor house, the lady of the house, the lady's servant, the lord of the manse (an Egyptologist), the

caretaker and lots of other assorted and sundry goings-on. Wigs and costumes go flying with fast-paced entrances and exits. Particularly funny are the off-stage dialogues contrived to allow the actors to make those changes. Often times, the off-stage speeches are by the same actor posing as more than one character.

Dee Mulford has done an outstanding job, proving once again that one need not have a Broadway-sized stage in order to create a wonderful, movable set. The second act opens inside a crypt in Egypt and in relatively short order returns to the manor house. That being said, the only flaw in the evening was the lack of a sufficient stage crew to make the scene changes go a bit more speedily.

John Miller's lighting, Lori Baringer's sound design and Lisa

Hiles' costumes all come together under the deft hand of director Cindy Brizzell-Bates for an evening that is pure escapism.



"We have all the major retailers. If you want it, come to the show. You won't have to travel, it's one-stop shopping," said Cate Masterson, director of this year's expo.


The expo is the longest running consumer expo in the nation, said Masterson. And the deals this year can't be missed, she said.

items with savings as much as \$100 lower than competing retailers, said Danny Canton, assistant manager of ski sales.







Bill (Russell) was another story. I had to do some serious wheeling and dealing to make certain I got him (in 1956). Luckily, the two teams ahead of us in the draft were Rochester and St. Louis. A couple of phone calls and a trade later, I got Bill, and the rest is history.

R.J. You mentioned Larry Bird a moment ago. Bird wasn't a flashy player, but he was the kind of player who you could count on to make the key basket or find the

open man when he was covered. That type of player seems to be scarce in today's NBA. What do you make of it?

R.A. Too many highlights of dunks on TV, that's what happened. So many young players were influenced by guys like Michael Jordan, Dominique Wilkins and the like that they spent more time working on their moves than on their shots. What they didn't realize was that on top of his dunking ability, Jordan also developed a great jump shot, and he learned to trust his teammates. That's what helped him win six NBA titles later in his career.

R.J. Is there an NBA player

today that — if you had the chance — you'd build a team around?

R.A. (Phoenix's) Steve Nash reminds me a lot of Larry Bird with his team-first mentality. He can hurt you so many ways — his ability to see the floor, his ball-handling skills and his jump shot. He'd be someone you could build a really good team around.

(Miami's) Dwayne Wade is another one I'd love to have as a centerpiece. He reminds me a lot of Magic (Johnson).

R.J. Before this séance ends, I've got to know if you've met any other coaching legends up there in Heaven.

R.A. The first person I met when I got here was Vince Lombardi. He was the one who broke the news to me that I wouldn't be able to smoke cigars

anymore. I asked him if there was someone I could protest to, but Vince told me, "It won't do you any good. Besides, you don't want to ruffle any feathers up here. You could wind up somewhere else."

By the way, Casey Stengel is my next door neighbor. Nice guy,

but I don't understand how he ever managed the New York Yankees to all those world championships. Too many metaphors in his speech. He probably confused his players more than he helped them. I always tried to keep my messages simple.





Denzel Ogunyase's two goals and one assist led Albany Academy past RCS. Cory David had several saves for the Indians.


League slates awards dinner

No swan song for VanDerzee

Long-time RCS coach decides to stay for another year

Gary VanDerzee intended this to be his final season as Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk's varsity football coach when it began last month.

But after talking things over with his assistant coaches following the Indians' class B quarterfinal loss to Broadalbin-Perth Oct. 20, VanDerzee decided to stay on.

"I told them I was thinking about coming back as a volunteer assistant, and they said, 'Why not come back as our head coach?' I asked them if they'd be OK with that, and they said yes," said VanDerzee.

VanDerzee's players gave their own collective version of a thank you with a 21-7 crossover victory over Fonda-Fultonville last Thursday.

Pat Filkins carried the ball 26 times for 182 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Indians to a 6-3 final record.

"Patrick is a tough runner," said VanDerzee. "He makes good

cuts in the hole, and he has the ability to make people miss."

Filkins helped RCS build a 14-0 lead on a pair of 4-yard touchdown runs in the first quarter. Fonda made a defensive stand in the second quarter by stopping an Indians' drive inside the Braves' 20-yard line and then made things interesting when Josh Nethaway connected with Joe Callane on a 49-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter. But, Filkins capped a long RCS series with a 1-yard scoring run in the fourth quarter to seal the victory.

Jared Fortier contributed 123 yards on 17 carries for the Indi-

ans, who missed the class B Super Bowl for the first time in four years.

How to get an interview with a legend


I never had the chance to interview Red Auerbach before his death last Saturday, but I still had some questions I wanted to ask him. So, I went to a psychic on Halloween to conduct an interview with the late Boston Celtic coaching legend through a séance. What follows is the actual conversation:

R.J. How are you doing, coach?

R.A. (Laughs) I've been better. I miss my cigars. You know, they don't allow smoking here in Heaven?

R.J. That's a shame, coach. You'd think they'd allow at least one Earthly pleasure for everyone up there. So, what's it like otherwise?

R.A. It's not bad. At least, I won't have to watch the Celtics play this year. They'll be lucky to



win 30 games. In my day, the rest of the NBA would be lucky if we lost 30 games.

R.J. Yeah, I was wondering about that. What happened to the team that won 16 NBA titles?

R.A. I really don't know. After Lenny Bias died, it seemed like anything that could do wrong did. I don't have an explanation. All I know is this franchise wasn't the same.

By the way, I met up with Lenny after I got settled in here. He gave me a big hug and kept

saying, "I'm sorry." I told him it's all right, we all make mistakes. To this day, Bias' death was one of the biggest tragedies in sports history, in my opinion.

R.J. How different would the Celtics have been in the 1980s with a lineup that included (Larry) Bird, (Kevin) McHale, (Danny) Ainge and Bias?

R.A. You know, we could speculate all we want to about how good we would have been in those years with this guy or that guy, but the bottom line is the games are won or lost on the court, not on paper. We might have won more NBA titles, or we might have been knocked out by Chicago or Detroit in the first round. I'd like to think that with a talent like Lenny (Bias), we would have been right up there with the

best of them, but the bottom line is we never had him.

R.J. You certainly had your share of top-notch players over the years, though. How did you manage to acquire guys like Bird, Bill Russell, Bob Cousy and John Havlicek on a consistent basis?

R.A. You have to be both lucky and good. You have to be lucky enough to find someone with that kind of talent before anyone else does, and you have to be good enough to seal the deal. How many general managers would take a chance on a skinny, white guy from Indiana State and draft him one year before he was even going to leave college? But I loved the way he (Bird) played, and I wasn't about to let anyone else grab him. So I drafted him know-
