Girls today are growing up to be scientists, teachers, doctors, musicians, nurturing mothers, and sometimes a combination of these things. The spectrum of opportunity is broader than our great grandmothers could have ever imagined.

Along with those opportunities come additional pressures and expectations, often leading to cliques and increased competitiveness among young women. But many national organizations and local groups like Girls Incorporated and Girl Scouts of America help young women support and follow their dreams by providing focus, structure and, most importantly, confidence.

Girls Incorporated operates in more than 50 locations throughout the Capital District. Working together with schools, these organizations provide services to girls between the ages of 6 and 18.

One Girls Incorporated program called Operation Smart fosters girls' skills and interests in science, technology, engineering and math. Bordenave said the group recently worked with Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and the GE Women's Network to expose girls to careers and education in these historically male-dominated areas.

Leadership changes
eyed at middle,
high schools

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Hiring two new full-time administrators, three new custodians, and expanding the high-school alternative education program are all part of the initiatives the Bethlehem school district handed to the citizens budget committee for its review.

The 40-member committee, consisting of taxpayers, parents, teachers, school administrators and community leaders, met Tuesday, Jan. 27, and began to work its way through each proposal and pages of updated budget information in order to understand the school budget before a plan is presented to voters.

"We want our work with you to be totally transparent," said Superintendent Les Loomis, who provided the committee with baseline projections for the district's 2007-2008 budget. Among the list of priority items to be added to the existing budget were the addition of three middle school teachers, a payroll clerk, a technology specialist and new custodians, along with restoring funding for ice hockey, cheerleading, gymnastics and field trips.

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The town of Bethlehem recently completed a seven-month, \$15,000 study of the New Scotland Road area designed to come up with a plan for a future hamlet community.

Michael Morelli of the town's economic development department and Maher Road resident and landscape architect Ed

Kleinke presented the report at the Wednesday, Feb. 28, meeting of the town board. During the presentation, they outlined several issues that came out of public scoping sessions last fall.

"Developing a traditional town center for pedestrians, having the hamlet reflect the town's history and unique character, and allowing residents a final say in the hamlet design," were among

Crash claims 2 on bypass

Two Rensselaer women were killed Saturday, March 3, on the Delmar bypass when their car was struck by a pickup truck on Route 32.

Roseanne Whitford, 36, and Audrey Bensalah, 45, both died from injuries sustained in the accident.

Whitford was driving her Plymouth Acclaim with Bensalah in the front passenger seat.

The two women were wearing seat belts according

to reports.

Bensalah's grandson Joshua was in a child restraint seat in the back seat of the car next to Whitford's 9-year-old daughter Breanna, who was also wearing a seat belt.

The four were struck in the side of their vehicle according to Bethlehem police, after Whitford allegedly made an improper left hand turn on Route 32 into Bender Lane and failed

to stop for a red light.

Joseph Viscuso, 47, of Delmar was driving a pickup truck the same time on Route 32 when he struck Whitford's car.

Breanna Whitford sustained only minor injuries and three month old Joshua Bensalah, who was in a child restraint seat was uninjured.

Viscuso, the driver of the pickup truck was also uninjured.

Bethlehem police arrest 1 for DWI

A 25 year old Albany woman was charged with DWI by Bethlehem police after her car went off the road hitting a snow bank.

Heather M. Shepard, of 12 Roland Drive, Albany, was charged with DWI and driving with more than .08 percent blood alcohol content. Police patrols observed a vehicle off the road in Feura Bush on Sunday, Feb. 25. Shepard told authorities she lost control of her car because of snow covering the road. Officers allegedly detected an odor of alcohol and asked Shepard to perform field sobriety tests.

Reports indicate that

Shepard failed three of four field sobriety tests at the scene. She was charged with first offense DWI and the vehicle was towed from the scene. She will reappear in Town Court, March 6.

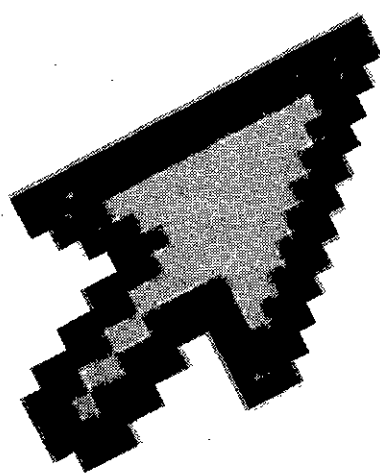
• An Albany man is charged with forgery second degree, a felony after police allege he tried to identify himself as his father.

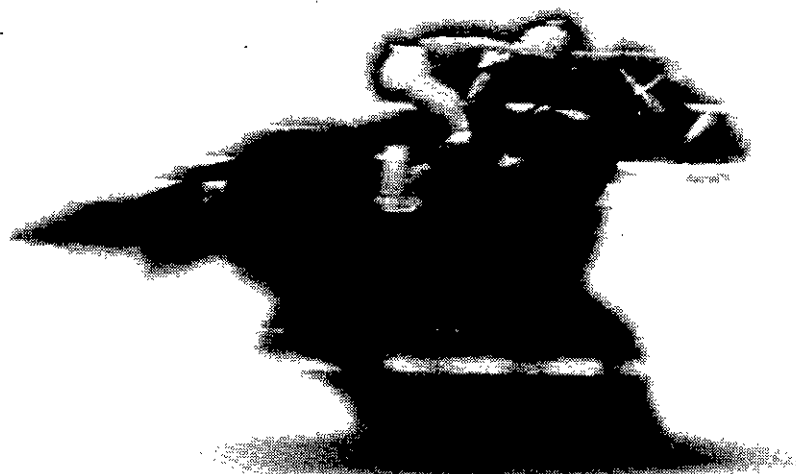

Bypass will come to pass

Work on Slingerlands route to pave the way for future development

A five decade discussion to build a new highway on State Route 85, known as the Slingerlands Bypass, has officially become a reality.

A \$15.2 million contract has been awarded to Delaney Construction of Mayfield, and a formal announcement was made Wednesday, Feb. 21, at Bethlehem Town Hall with several town, county and state officials on hand.

"We are here today to announce a milestone in the Slingerlands Bypass," said Thomas C. Werner, director of the Department of Transportation in the Capital District. "Congestion will be eased and mobility improved for the roughly 25,000 motorists who drive this highway every day."

The bypass project includes reconstructing 1.5 miles of Route 85 between Cherry Avenue Extension and Blessing Road to include four lanes. New Scotland Road will see new curbs and

sidewalks, and the existing three-lane bridge over the Normans Kill will be widened to five lanes.

"This project will allow for much-needed economic development activities in this town," said Bethlehem Supervisor Theresa Egan.

Vista Technology Park developer Bill Herbert of BBL was at the ceremony, along with several officials from consulting and engineering firms working on behalf of the town. With the bypass project under way, the groups can now turn their attention to work on Vista, which, if it comes to fruition, is expected to bring thousands of new jobs to Bethlehem.

"This is the key," said town board member Kyle Kotary. "Without this project, Vista could not move forward."

Ron Cherry, DOT project manager for the bypass construction, said this summer's work should have minimal impact on motorists.

"There will be an awful lot of earth work to be done on the back side of Price Chopper, and we have set up a construction sequencing plan for that work," said Cherry.

Work on the bridge over the Normans Kill will also begin this summer. Cherry said this project took on many shapes over the years beginning in the 1950s as an expressway.

"Over a period of time, the project length has been

diminished," said Cherry.

Even though the project is now known as the Slingerlands Bypass, Cherry said, "We don't bypass Slingerlands whatsoever."

Bethlehem Police Chief Lou Corsi will be meeting with DOT officials over the next several weeks to map out a traffic control strategy to lessen the impact on motorists.

"We'll work closely with DOT on certain days when they might bring in heavy equipment," said Corsi, who said he believes motorists may see temporary disruptions.

"I feel comfortable we are going to provide the necessary public safety," said Corsi.

Albany County Executive Michael Breslin, a Democrat and Bethlehem resident for 34 years said this project "works for everybody."

"This is a road improvement that has been needed for a very long time," said Breslin.

State Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Delmar, county Legislator Jack Cunningham, D-Delmar, and town board members Kotary and Joann Dawson were some of the other officials on hand for the announcement.

This project is the first of two that will eventually provide four travel lanes from Cherry Avenue Extension to the existing four-lane section on Route 85 south of Krumkill Road. The second project will not begin for at least another five years.

Board considers GED program

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An alternative education program aimed at helping students with failing grades at Bethlehem high school is currently being reviewed by members of the district's citizens budget advisory committee and the school board.

The program, which would be implemented for the 2007-2008

school year, would cost \$156,000 and would use funds from the district's off-campus intervention program and another \$88,000 from six BOCES alternative education slots.

"In recent years, we have been dealing with students who have been unsuccessful in the traditional education program at our high school," wrote high school principal Chuck Abba and assistant superintendent Michael Tebbano in a letter to the board and advisory committee.

"These students fall into a classification of behavior issues affecting their academic success, eventually failing or dropping out of school before the end of their high school experience," the letter continued.

The new plan offers several program changes, including the potential to earn a graduate equivalency diploma, or GED, for failing students.

A faculty member at the high school would teach the GED program on campus, and no more than 12 students would be in the program at any one time and could only be admitted through a parent and counselor recommendation with approval of the principal.

Another component of the

GED program is creating an incentive program for students who may be cutting class or have attendance and discipline problems. Students enrolling in the daily, three-and-a-half-hour program and leaving school grounds after dismissal would be given a chance to return to the main high school program as an "incentive" if they are successful in the alternative education program.

"We use the word incentive because we want to make it clear students will work to catch up to be successful in school and will leave the program to return to the regular high school program," Abba said.

A social worker and school aide would monitor

students' participation in the program and track their success returning to the high school environment.

The school would continue to offer the out-of-school suspension program at the Adams Street central administration building.

Charmaine Wijesinghe, a member of the advisory committee representing the Elsmere PTA, asked what the specific role of the parents and students would be.

"It is an interesting program I would support, but question also," said Wijesinghe.

Superintendent Les Loomis said student failures and behavioral problems are two areas that need more attention at the high school.

"We are determined to make those two things better," said Loomis.

The board will continue to discuss the program at upcoming meetings.

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When flying, you're all in it together

Last year was the first time I was bothered by a child on an airplane.

I don't normally care to sleep on planes, but on that particular trip, a 6:20 a.m. flight, I desperately wanted to snooze. Behind me was an energetic little boy, about age 3, sitting next to his father.

"Look, Daddy," the boy exclaimed, "Lookit, lookit this Daddy, lookit, lookit, lookit. DADDY! Watch, Daddy!" Then I felt the kick, kick, kick of his feet at the back of my seat, interspersed with the sound of his window shade banging shut, then opening and banging shut again.

The constant chatter continued.

"Are we going to land? Daddy? Watch this!" Kick, kick, kick. Next came the rattling noises from his toy, some sort of matchbox car that he was rolling up the side wall of the plane or whatever surfaces he could reach (perhaps the window shade?) "Vroom. Look, Daddy, look, Spiderman and Power Rangers."

I glanced across the aisle at my husband and daughter. They were both asleep. Seated behind them were the

little boy's mother and his quiet sister.

"Daddy, want to play?" chatter boy continued on. "Daddy, you can play with the motorcycle. No, Daddy, watch." The kid made a police siren noise and then he said, "Stop. Don't move." Rattle, rattle, rattle went the police car.

I could have slept through the rattling noises and even the repetitive rounds of "Daddy, lookit, lookit, lookit." But each time I started to nod off, the little darling would slam the window shade and my eyes would pop open.

I would never have guessed that such a loud sound could be made with an airplane window shade.

I considered turning around and asking the dad to please ask his kid to stop slamming the window shade and kicking the seat. But the kid was clearly excited. He'd never been on a plane before. He was so happy.

I like happy kids. Really, I

do. I flew just a few weeks ago and there was a kid a few rows behind me who was singing. She wasn't even singing real loud, but the mom kept shushing her. If I had been closer I would have urged the mom to let the kid sing.

Wouldn't we all be happier if we felt free enough to sing in public?

I remember taking a flight when my daughter was in preschool and she was singing a song from the Barney show: "Oh we're flying in an airplane, looking out the window, watching the clouds go by." OK, maybe I started singing first, but we were both happy.

My daughter is 10 now, and I did not attempt any in-flight vocal duets on our recent trip. I'm sure if I had started singing, Rachel would have just raised her eyebrows at me. It's also possible that she wouldn't have heard me since her ears tend to get quite clogged on planes.

Rachel has always been a great traveler. When she was very small I'd fill my carry-on bag with toys like stickers, paper, crayons and play dough. Yet most of the time she'd occupy herself by looking at the pictures in the complimentary airline magazine located in the pocket of the seatback in front of her.

Not all parents are as lucky. Oftentimes other kids on planes grow restless and cranky. Infants may wail from the increased pressure on their tiny eardrums. Young children cry because they are bored and don't understand why they can't run up and down the aisle.

If there's a cranky child in the row in front or behind me I will try to divert the child's attention.

I like interacting with kids, especially the really little ones who are amused by games like peek-a-boo and

will smile if you simply wave at them. Yes, I'm referring to kids who understand what you are saying but don't yet have the vocabulary to monopolize you with a running commentary of where they are headed and what they plan to do on vacation.

This year I had a supply of tiny finger puppets in my carry-on. I brought them for the express purpose of diverting upset children. Most people are annoyed at the sound of crying children, but I tend to feel a great sympathy for the helpless parents who are embarrassed at the disturbance caused by their offspring.

The finger puppets, fashioned out of Post-It note sheets, were made by my daughter last year. I had found a stack of them in her backpack and after scolding her for wasteful use of pricey school supplies I confiscated a bunch for my own use.

Unfortunately, or perhaps fortunately, I was not seated near any restless children, so I did not get to perform any impromptu puppet shows.

In fact, on one leg of the trip, I was sitting across the aisle from my family, next to a stranger. There are benefits to sitting with strangers. Strangers don't keep asking "Are we almost there?" or complain of being bored or refuse to blow their nose if their ears hurt.

On the other hand, it's awkward to fall asleep and wake up with your head on a stranger's shoulder. Also, there's always the possibility the stranger will fall asleep and block your passage to the restroom. Or the stranger might engage you in conversation when you are trying to read or write or perform a puppet show.

And what if the stranger declines the flight attendant's offer of a snack? Will you be brave enough to say, "Hey, I'll

take his pretzels?"

When my husband sees me struggling with my foil-packaged pretzels, he gives me his packet that he's already opened. A stranger would probably not be so kind.

In turn, I warn my husband when the drink cart is approaching so his aisle-side kneecap doesn't get injured. I don't know that I'd say, "Watch your leg" to a stranger. I certainly wouldn't wake up a stranger to deliver that message.

Most times my family doesn't have to worry about strangers since we are generally able to get three seats across in the same row. But a few years ago our three seats were in two different rows and none was an aisle seat. Jeff and Rachel were assigned the window and middle seats of one row and I had the middle seat in the row behind them.

Usually when we get separated I linger in the aisle waiting to negotiate a switch with the stranger assigned to sit with my family. But with only a middle seat to offer, I figured it was too much of a long shot. So we all took our assigned seats, me between two middle-aged female strangers, and Jeff and Rachel in front of me next to the empty aisle seat.

Soon after, a pretty, young woman stopped at that empty seat next to my handsome spouse. And I swear that I did not utter a word, but that woman and I made eye contact and she asked, "Is this your family?" "Yes, it is," I replied, in perhaps a slightly possessive tone. And then she graciously offered to switch seats. She didn't even mind taking the middle seat!

There were no rambunctious children on that flight, but I still wasn't able to fall asleep. But that didn't bother me, because I got to fly between my favorite travel companions.

Former IDA chairman takes top spot at CEG

The former chairman of the Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency is the new president and chief executive officer of the Center for Economic Growth.

Michael Tucker of Delmar, currently president of the Harriman Research and Technology Corporation, replaces Kelly Lovell at the CEG, who left to become the president and CEO of International Business Development.

"It's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," said Tucker who has held a variety of private and public sector jobs, including a recent role spearheading the state's effort to transform the Harriman State Office Campus into a high-tech research and development center.

"This is a natural evolution to take skills developed in both private development and public service to broaden my horizons,"

said Tucker.

The Center for Economic Growth is a private, nonprofit, member-supported regional economic and business development organization that works to promote high-tech companies to areas as far north as the Canadian border and downstate to Orange County.

As a former chairman of the town industrial development agency, Tucker said he is quite familiar with the Vista Technology Park, scheduled to be built in the towns of Bethlehem and New Scotland, and adds that it is a model of success the CEG can learn from.

"Certainly the type of planning that has occurred with Terri Egan and the Bethlehem Town Board the past several years is a good template or model to be used in other communities," Tucker said.

George Leveille, economic development director for the town of Bethlehem, said Tucker would undoubtedly assist in the

development of the Vista Tech Park.

Reinforce your Social Security safety net

Social Security is not what it used to be. Neither is paying for it.

While the future of Social Security will almost certainly be the No. 1 domestic issue of President George W. Bush's legacy, almost no one believes the system will go the way of the dinosaur. It will likely exist as a supplement in one form or another.

The real challenge lies with the American people's ability to plan and achieve the kind of retirement they've dreamed about.

From a financial planning point of view, Social Security should only be considered one part of a person's retirement needs, preferably a minimal part. Social Security was designed to be a supplement, not one's primary retirement-funding vehicle. Consider that in December 2004, the average monthly retirement benefit was \$954. That's less than \$12,000 a year.

The government is still collecting more money from workers than it is distributing. However, in approximately 13 years, the flow is expected to reverse, with outflows outpacing inflows. The Social Security Administration (SSA) notes that by 2042, the system will be bankrupt.

Consider that most of us can expect to live longer than previous generations. And as our population ages, there will one day be more retirees than workers in the United States, meaning fewer workers will need to support more retirees. Demographics and time are working against us, and one day this bill will have to be paid.

In some 35 years, Social Security will be exhausted as the number of Americans 65 or older should have doubled and

there won't be enough younger people working to pay all their benefits. Only about 73 cents for each dollar of scheduled benefits will be able to be paid, according to government estimates. But Americans may not be too worried. According to a Pew Research Center survey, 49 percent of Americans believe Social Security has major problems but is not in crisis.

What about inflation? This is another great risk to long-term purchasing power, especially for anyone with limited income. Will today's dollars be worth the same tomorrow? Look at the prices of gasoline, postage stamps and housing. Almost nothing costs what it used to, which is why any financial-planning discussion should cover ways to fight inflation.

Privatization is the one-word answer offered to rescue the system. It will probably help, but if the concern is how to fund one's retirement, that also is only part of the answer.

Among other things, this country was built on the ideas of self-reliance and independence. Financial planning should be no different. While many of today's aging workers may be overwhelmed with fear and anxiety about how they will fund their Golden Years, the truth is there have never been more products and services to help one live a comfortable retirement.

Wall Street scandals have made Americans risk averse, but the prospect of a paltry retirement sounds even worse. While no one knows what direction the markets will take, the need for sensible, long-range financial planning has never been greater.

Therefore, while privatization has potential, the real way out of the retirement-funding jungle will be the action of individuals, many working with the help of independent financial professionals, to get the most out of their retirement years. Therefore, Americans need to invest wisely and early if they want to reach the Holy Grail — a safe and secure retirement.

According to Ken Dychtwald, author of bestseller, *Age Wave*, those who enjoy retirement are not necessarily the ones with the most money. It's those who've planned for the long term, who frequently get what they want. Being financially secure surely plays a key role in being able to enjoy retirement. However, it's the planning and goal setting that often helps one become financially secure enough to enjoy their Golden Years.

Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs), long-term care insurance and a much-improved line of annuities are just some of the products that are helping individuals live longer, more fulfilling lives than previous generations. Other concepts like estate planning and wealth transfer are being used more and more by middle- and upper-middle class families to protect for their children and grandchildren what they've often spent a lifetime earning.

No two of us are alike, and each of us has a variety of financial needs. And Social Security, not in its strongest day, could meet each of them. May Jonathan's death not be in vain

Jonathan Carey was a victim not once, but twice. The state's Office of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities is using HIPAA, the very regulation that is supposed to protect "patients rights" to hide behind.

If Jonathan's first case of neglect and abuse in 2004 while residing at the Anderson School in Dutchess County, also an OMRDD facility, had been stopped in an appropriate manner, and reported to the proper authorities as well as his parents, this second assault on Jonathan's dignity, and ultimately life, while residing at the O.D. Heck Center, might not have ended with such a tragic conclusion.

I have known Jonathan's father, Michael, since he was a

young boy. You would have to search far and wide before you would find a more caring and loving father who took his responsibilities as a parent and advocate for his child in a most serious and sensitive manner. OMRDD's spokespeople have said they are sensitive to the concerns of the parents, but how sensitive can they be when:

1. A 400-page document prepared by the same agency was sealed. If there were no wrongdoings documented in the report, why not release it? Put Jonathan's parents, as well as all other parents and families who depend on OMRDD for the health and safety of their loved ones at ease.

2. I also question the hiring policies of the agency. This most

recent deadly incident shows employees who obviously had no sensitivity or respect toward and innocent person who trusted them for his care. How really sensitive can these caregivers be when they acted in such an unethical manner?

3. What techniques and restraint training methods are taught to these employees?

How touching to read that the agency expressed "sadness over Jonathan's death." It is my hope that Jonathan's untimely passing will lead to changes not only in the rules and regulations of the

OMRDD guidelines, but that the implementation of sensitivity training be made mandatory for all employees caring for the health and safety of those who cannot care or speak for themselves.

Hopefully, Gov. Spitzer will take this tragic incident as his first clue that OMRDD is an agency in need of reform.

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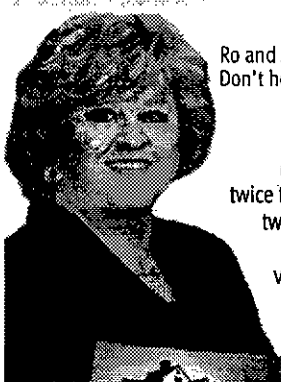

Town seal advocate changes his point of view

Editor, The Spotlight:

This letter explains why I changed my position that the town of Bethlehem's official seal remain as it is to a recommendation that the seal be changed to represent peace instead of war.

I do not want our school children to be proud of a so-called "historic peace treaty," the Treaty of Tawasentha, that led to the infamous Beaver Wars. In particular, I do not

want our children to be proud of a treaty that led to the massacre of 80 innocent Wappenger Indian men, women and children, by order of Dutch Gov. William Kieft at Pavonia, N.J. on Feb. 23, 1643. After carrying out the executions, Dutch soldiers played kickball with the severed heads of the victims.

In December 2006, town board member Tim Gordon asked questions about the fate of the Native

American depicted on the town's seal. I examined a throw in my home with historical sites in the town. The center of the throw has an oval-shaped version of the town seal.

The Indian on the throw's seal holds either a long peace pipe or a short ceremonial spear. There is a corn stalk growing out of the ground and what appears to be squash and bean blossoms on the ground. The friendly Mahican Indians who lived in the town in 1609 when it was discovered by Henry Hudson used islands in the Hudson River to grow corn, squash and beans. The throw's rendition of the seal prompted me to write to *The Spotlight* recommending that the seal remain as it is.

Upon closer examination, I recognized that there was a significant difference between the long ceremonial spear depicted on town trucks, and the short spear or long peace pipe depicted on the throw.

It is possible that instead of a long spear, the Mohawk-Iroquois Indian on the official seal is holding one end of a two-row wampum belt routinely used in treaties between the white man and the Iroquois. The seal on town trucks does not contain a corn stalk. I researched the reasons why there are differences between the two versions of the town's seal and eventually uncovered a 1975 town board resolution that created the town's official seal.

The town's official seal depicts the Treaty of Tawasentha whereby Native American tribes and Dutch fur traders agreed to trade for beaver pelts in a peaceful fashion. The seal depicts the confluence of the Normanskill, the Tawasentha, with the Hudson River, where a ceremony was held between the Mohawk-Iroquois, Mahican Indians, other Indian tribes and Dutch fur traders in 1617. A two-row wampum belt held by the Mohawk chief on one end and the Dutch fur traders on the other end was the climax to the ceremony. Lesser Indian tribes, including the Mahicans, squatted under the wampum belt, signifying their approval.

The first Beaver War, between the Mohawks and Mahicans, started six years after the ceremony and after six years of war the Mohawks finally defeated the Mahicans at the battle of Rodgers Island in the Hudson River between the village of Catskill and the city of Hudson.

Historians agree that the Treaty of Tawasentha led to the Beaver Wars that resulted in 175 years of

war, carnage and genocide. The infamous massacre at Pavonia was a direct result of the Treaty of Tawasentha. I would be glad to supply a more detailed report to explain the connection between the 1617 Treaty and the crime against humanity that occurred at Pavonia, N.J. in 1643.

Is this what we want our school children to be proud of because it will be too expensive to change the town seal?

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New curate ordained at St. Stephen's Church

Virginia Ogden's spiritual journey led her to answer the call to priesthood

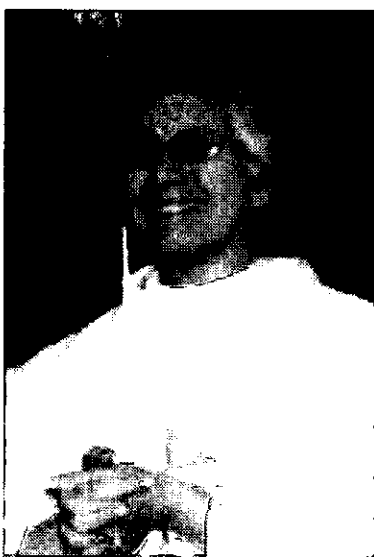
Do you remember that 71 degree day in January? It's one that the Rev. Virginia Ogden will never forget, since that was the day she was ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church.

"When I heard the weather report for the week, I felt myself relax," Ogden said. "I was able to really be there for the ceremony. I could really feel it."

The moment when she really started to feel things, she said, was when she came around the corner that led her into the sanctuary of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Delmar and saw 300 people ready to celebrate with her. The service took place on Epiphany, the day that the three wise men came to see the infant Jesus, and the official end of the Christmas season in the Christian religion.

"It was perfect," Ogden said. "That is a day of awakening; a gift of light."

It was a day of firsts for more than Ogden, since the Albany diocese's new bishop, the Rev. William Love, performed his first ordination.

"When the bishop anointed my hands with oil, it was a very powerful moment," Ogden said. "That's when I became a priest."

Becoming a priest is something that Ogden, 57, had dreamed about since she was a little girl, raised in the Roman Catholic Church.

"I wanted to be an altar boy," said the Bronx native who grew up in Yorktown Heights, Westchester County. "I went to Catholic school, and I always wanted to serve the Lord. Beyond prayer, though, there wasn't much for women to do."

Ogden came to college at the University at Albany, and stayed put. After college, she did some church shopping, and after attending a

service at the Episcopal Cathedral of All Saints in Albany, said she "clicked with the service."

"That was the late 1970s," she said. "I was formally accepted into the Episcopal Church in 1984, and came to St. Stephen's in 1990."

Ogden said she first felt the call to priesthood in 1993.

"The church had not yet ordained a woman, but I could see all the pieces falling into place," she said.

But the call had to be put on hold for a while.

"I was teaching and raising a family," Ogden, who with her husband, Ken, has two daughters in their 20s, Andrea and Alicia.

From 1996 to 2001, four close relatives died. "We also moved, and I had two job changes," Ogden said. "Seminary wasn't going on top of that. It wouldn't have been successful." When she was 55 and retired from her job as a math teacher at Berne-Knox-Westerlo High School, Ogden did go full-time to seminary.

"I remember standing at my bathroom sink, brushing my teeth and looking out at the cornfields. I burst into tears, and knew that this time, the answer was yes," Ogden said.

Ogden's ordination comes at a time of some difficulty for the American Episcopal Church. When the Rev. Gene Robinson

was elected bishop of the Diocese of New Hampshire in 2003, it provoked controversy about the role of homosexuals in the church, since Robinson is in a committed gay relationship. Conservative factions are considering a move away from the American church.

"It's important for a church to stand on doctrine," Ogden said. "But I don't think it's right to say, 'this is a gay church, this isn't a gay church.' What I like about the Episcopal Church is that we agree to disagree. We are brothers and sisters in Christ, and not cookie cutter molds. We're all different people, and God made us all."

People come to a church when they're hurting, Ogden said, and political issues don't drive that.

"Something brings people to church," she said. "I think it's the spirit of God."

Ogden noted that statistically, church attendance is down in the western world.

"People embrace a spiritual component, but struggle with an organized church," she said. "But you can really grow spiritually in a community. A community sustains us when we wax and wane spiritually."

"Mother Ginny will be a very pastoral, caring priest with a strong sense of vision," said the Rev. Darius Mojallali, rector of St. Stephen's. "Her sermons are biblical and animated."

Ogden said she feels particularly drawn to caring for the elderly, which Mojallali said is important. "She has a passion and a heart for

the vulnerable and the elderly," he said. "We need to make sure we don't undervalue our elderly as we support young families." Ogden's was the first ordination of a priest at St. Stephen's in a long time. In 2002, Bob Heighton was ordained a deacon at St. Stephen's. "Ginny's ordination is a reflection on the parish," Mojallali said. "There's a sense of pride that we've raised up this person. I'm proud that we're a church that supported a woman. Not one person said anything about the fact that she's a woman."

Annie Mellet, a St. Stephen's parishioner who serves on the church's vestry, said it was significant that a woman was ordained.

"It's always nice to have a woman in that position, with a woman's point of view," Mellet said. "It adds another facet to the ministry."

Ogden will serve as an unpaid curate, or assistant priest, for a year.

"Ginny has a real sense of leadership, and could easily stay for four or five years. But there's a lot of potential for her, and she'll be coveted by other parishes," Mojallali said.

"I wanted a mentorship for about a year," Ogden said. "The elderly, who I refer to as the 'young at hearts,' need an advocate. I also like the people at St. Stephen's. I never felt I had to put on a façade here. The feeling is genuine. People rejoice with you, they cry with you. You can be yourself."

"There's a deep joy," Ogden said of her new role. "I'm hoping to hold onto it."

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Past supervisor candidate will be elections commissioner

Matthew Clyne wins with a weighted vote majority

Bethlehem Democratic Chairman Matthew Clyne is slated to become the next Albany County Democratic elections commissioner after a vote of the county committee Wednesday, Feb. 28.

Clyne, the choice of the county committee members representing the suburbs, received a close weighted vote majority over current Deputy Election Commissioner Karen Shea of Slingerlands, the choice of many committee members from the city of Albany.

"I was banking on strong suburban backing and I give credit to the suburban leadership for getting me over the top," said Clyne, who only decided to run for the position about two weeks ago.

The selection will be final when it receives formal approval from the Albany County Legislature on Monday, March 12.

The actual weighted vote was 51 percent for Clyne to 49 percent for Shea, even though the individual vote of all committee

members showed Shea with 367 committee votes to Clyne's 218.

A weighted vote takes into account the number of registered Democrats who voted in the last gubernatorial election. Because voter turnout is higher in the suburbs, the votes from those areas have more weight in a vote of this kind.

According to county Legislator Jack Cunningham, D-Delmar, Clyne's victory over Shea validates the belief by many town committee members that the county committee weighted vote is a truer picture of where the Democratic Party strength exists now in Albany County.

"Shouldn't the party be reflective of where the support for Democrats is," said Cunningham, who tallied the votes the night Clyne was selected.

Cunningham cited as an example the first time Theresa Egan ran for supervisor in Bethlehem, in which more Democrats from the town turned out for that vote than they did for votes in city of Albany elections that same year. The population in

Albany is about 95,000 compared with roughly 33,000 residents in Bethlehem.

Cunningham was also part of a suburban slate that ran for county committee positions last fall with Guiderland Democratic Chairman David Bosworth. That slate was narrowly defeated 253-to-216 with Frank Comisso from Albany winning the chairmanship. Supporters of Bosworth challenged the

Comisso vote in State Supreme Court. A court decision earlier this year called for a revote, however a compromise was reached where Bosworth and Comisso would both serve as county co-chairs for the remainder of the term. Some election observers said they believe if the chairmanship vote was weighted like the vote for election commissioner, Bosworth may have won out over Comisso.

"The issue isn't about geography, but where the party control is," said Cunningham, who said he doesn't see the county legislature challenging the party vote for Clyne at the March 12

meeting.

"I don't think it's likely," said Cunningham. "I think we will continue to follow the prescribed process for this."

The county's vote is expected to be just a formality, selecting whoever the party choice for that position may be.

Clyne is currently the second vice-chair of the county Democratic Party. Clyne will replace James Clancy, who took a position with Gov. Eliot Spitzer's administration. The election commissioner salary is \$80,000 annually. Duties of the position include supporting and overseeing the election operations for the county, promoting voter

registration, and providing information and support to candidates running for office. The new commissioner will also have to acclimate himself to the federal and state mandates calling for new voting machines in each county in the state.

"I think I can significantly enhance the role that office plays in party affairs in Albany County," said Clyne.

All seats in the county legislature are up for election this year along with the position of county executive. Several information sessions with the public regarding the new voting machine process will occur this year.

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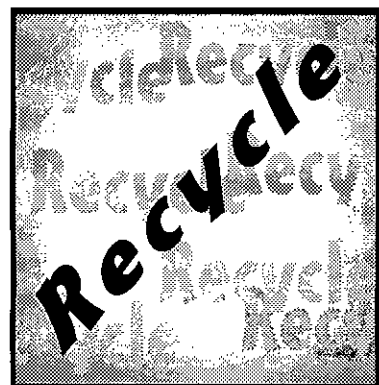
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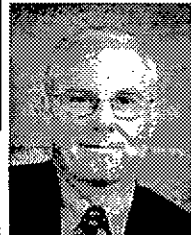
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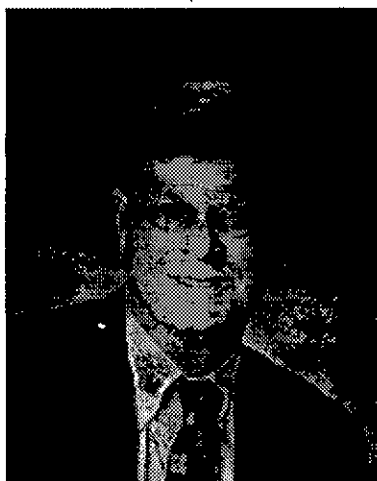

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'Taming of the Shrew' teaches more than acting

Hark now, Bethlehem middle schoolers doth think thou should'st come.

The students will present Shakespeare's "Taming of the Shrew" this weekend at Bethlehem Central Middle School.

It's a comedy about love in which a nobleman dictates that his beautiful daughter Bianca may not receive suitors until her sister, the unruly Katherine (the shrew), is married. Petruchio, an out-of-towner seeking fortune, accepts the father's challenge and tries to tame Kate by winning her love.

"It's perfect for middle schoolers, because it's not really about love, but about playing games," said teacher Tom Reardon. "It's all based on love at first sight."

The most difficult part about doing Shakespeare is the language, said seventh-grader Chloe DeAngelis, who had a lot of lines to memorize in playing the title role. As if volume wasn't enough, the lines are in verse and loaded with Elizabethan words.

"I had to go home after school and practice. I had to go over it and over it, again and again," said DeAngelis. "But you get the hang of it."

The kids wanted to do Shakespeare, Reardon said. After considering various adaptations, the theater group, called Staged Creations, chose to use The Bard's words as written. A few scenes were cut to keep

the play to a manageable length.

Shakespeare is a part of the middle school curriculum, said Reardon, who teaches eighth grade English. But participation in Staged Creations is extracurricular.

"It's a club," Reardon said, "a student-centered approach to theater."

Every aspect of the theatrical production is student run. Students direct the play, build the set, and manage the light and sound, said Reardon, who regards his role as more of an overseer.

Last Saturday's rehearsal was a complete run-through with lights and set, but not costumes. Reardon watched from the fourth row and occasionally hollered out positive comments: a nice pause, an effective gesture, and good eye contact.

Sometimes the actors do better when he keeps mum, said Reardon. Students will correct each other, reminding someone to move or to face another actor. "They don't need an adult to point out what they're doing wrong,

because they want to do it right."

That conscientiousness evolves from the students' own empowerment. After tryouts in December, rehearsals began in January. The first one was "a full informational meeting," said Reardon, where he talked with students about taking responsibility for the production.

The group also talked a lot about Elizabethan language, which Reardon called the slang of the time, even though it sounds formal to students' 21st century ears. And the word order is different, adding another layer of obscurity.

"It's not so hard. You have to work on it," said Brooke Herzog, a seventh grader who plays Bianca, the shrew's sister.

By now the students know their lines. Once memorization is largely accomplished, the goal is to try to own it, and "not recite it like pi," Reardon said.

"Once you figure out what it means, you can add movement and facial expressions," says Herzog. Both she and DeAngelis remarked how the language and

their lines invaded their regular lives. For Herzog, everyday events often triggered her to spout lines. DeAngelis said that she found herself substituting Elizabethan vocabulary and phrases in conversation.

Reardon said Shakespeare

doesn't give any stage direction, so characters' movements, everything from facial expressions to gestures to moving around the stage, has to come from the actors as they develop their characters.

For Reardon, the rewards come when a student comes to him and says, "I was thinking about that line." "When they ask 'can I do this?' I say 'of course you can,'" he said.

Twenty-three students are in the cast and another 20 work behind the scenes. Some are motivated by a love of theater, like Allie Doherty, a sixth grader in her first play, who said, "It's fun to pretend to be someone you're not." But many students said Staged Creations was also a great way to make new friends at school.

Performances are Thursday, March 8 through Saturday, March 10 at 7 p.m. in the BCMS Auditorium. Tickets are \$4 and will be available at the door.

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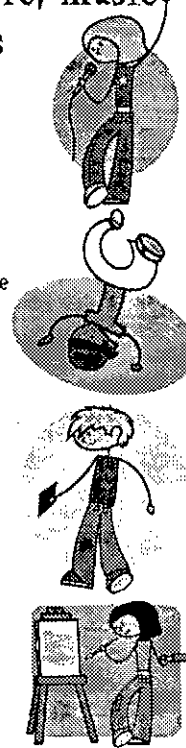

the priorities, said Kleinke.

A 30-page report detailing the New Scotland Road Hamlet Community Charette design study revealed how several conceptual plans for the corridor from Price Chopper to the Route 85 extension came out of community workshop sessions, including construction of a central pedestrian concourse, amphitheater, sub-level parking, multi-family residential housing, and commercial space, along with plenty of green space and paths for bikers and pedestrians. Consultants Burt Woolf of QL Consulting and James Segedi of Program Planning Design worked to bring the ideas together in one comprehensive plan.

"The design detail is environmentally friendly," said Kleinke. "Development would occur between streets and highways."

Consultants painted a picture of a pedestrian-friendly environment where people can live, work, shop, and even go to dinner and the theater in the same region of New Scotland Road.

"A lot of effort went into this, and as a resident of the area, I appreciated the opportunity to participate," said Kleinke.

Bethlehem Supervisor Theresa Egan reminded residents that construction of the Route 85 Slingerlands bypass extension begins in March, and the \$15 million dollar project will assist the residents with the idea of a hamlet community.

"The Route 85 extension is enabling something like this to happen," Egan said.

Most of the land under review in the hamlet design process is owned privately or by local developers. Economic Develop-

ment Director George Leveille reminded residents that the key to the hamlet plan's success is for the private sector to buy into the idea.

"We had four meetings with property owners and residents of that area," said Leveille. "Our hope is, as development advances projects in this area, we will use this as a guideline to move forward."

Town board member Kyle Kotary, who participated in the hamlet collaborative workshops last September, said the concept residents came up with for their community is "fascinating."

"People wanted to build some-

thing new but in a tasteful way," Kotary said.

Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce president Marty DeLaney said the town is growing and so is the traffic congestion, and the hamlet design could help bring back the neighborhood concept.

"By encouraging mixed use development in different hamlets, more services will be closer to people's neighborhoods," DeLaney said.

The New Scotland Road Hamlet Community Charette design study is available for the public to review at town hall or on the town's Web site www.townofbethlehem.org.

even though access was gained.

The subject was arraigned before Ravena Village Justice Kevin Reilly and sent to Albany County jail in lieu of \$3,500 bail. Police expected additional charges in the ongoing investigation. Meanwhile, the RCS school district is taking the necessary actions to stop anyone else from trying this same crime in the future.

The actions, said Superintendent Vicki Wright, are designed "to ensure that the district's sensitive personnel, student and financial information are secured to the highest possible degree."

The changes include new as well as routine steps, such as requiring immediate password changes, frequent and routine password changes in the future, improved filtering of Web sites and the securing at all times of district computers, thereby denying access to anyone not permitted to use the computer station.

Technology Director Jeff Clemens said RCS' technology protection programs are extensive and — as the attack proved — successful in repelling extensive and intensive "attacks."

New security programs have also been installed to increase the frequency of the audits of the district server's activities. It was during an audit of server activity on Friday, Feb. 16 that the "attack" by the student was uncovered. The student could have gained access to grades, personal information on employees, district financial information, and other important data.

"What's important for everyone — parents, students, faculty, staff, retirees and taxpayers — to know is that this episode has allowed us to focus on, and improve, our technological protocols and programs to further ensure the security of vital and important records," Wright said.

"What occurred should never happen again, and we, all of us who use a district computer, are committed to making sure that it does not occur," she added.

alternative education program were also among the proposals.

The estimated cost of all these moves totals more than \$520,000.

Three new teachers at the middle school would address the increasing enrollment and allow the school to complete four full teams of teachers at each grade level.

"The high school has grown from 1,100 students to 1,750 students, and the middle school has grown from 800 students to 1,300 students," said Loomis.

Other proposed changes include converting four part-time dean positions at the high school to two full-time grade level leaders, and converting three part-time house leaders at the middle school to two full-time leaders.

"We have a lot of new programs and intervention services," said Jody Monroe, middle school principal. "Two additional full-time people over part-time people, I think, would be a huge advantage."

Committee member Laura Bierman asked what benefit her son or daughter might receive from these new administrative positions.

"Who do parents call, what is the chain of command?" asked Bierman. "If people can understand it and get concrete answers, I think it can sell."

Board president Stuart Lyman said one of the challenges the board faces is distilling the in-depth information and passing it on to the community.

"Our problem is how to share that information with the community in an effective way, and I am hoping this group can do that," Lyman said.

How to approach the senior community and voters without

children enrolled in the district are other areas the citizens committee grapples with.

"Is there ever going to be a time when you propose a budget with no increase?" asked Mary Degroff, a senior citizen representative.

Officials said basic annual increases in cost of living, employee contracts, health insurance and energy costs would most likely prohibit any budget from ever staying the same.

Loomis said the town of Bethlehem has been very active in trying to expand the tax base into the future.

"I have never seen a community more active in attracting development," said Loomis.

Town Comptroller Judith Kehoe, who represents the town on the committee, fielded questions regarding town assessments and why the school district did not receive a financial benefit from the latest reassessments.

Kehoe said that when reassessments were completed, some assessments may have gone up, but the overall school tax rate went down.

"In the fall of 2005, the Bethlehem school tax rate was \$27.74 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. In the fall of 2006 after reassessments, the Bethlehem school tax rate dropped to \$17.40 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation," Kehoe said.

tion III (Syracuse). Having 10 state champions between the two divisions certainly helped.

Section II had its best finish since placing second in division 1 at the 2004 state tournament. The hometown team finished third in the division 1 team standings with 225 points — thanks in large part to Shenendehowa's contingent (one state champion, two runners-up and a fifth-place finisher). And the best news is that several team members should have a chance to return to states next year, including all four of Shen's state representatives.

Wrestling fans will put up with a lot to watch their children — bad weather, price gouging at the concession stand (\$6 for a personal pizza?) and at the parking lot (one outdoor lot near the TU Center charged \$10) — but Friday's fiber-long line to get into the arena would have been too much for them to take had the action begun at its scheduled time of 10 a.m. When half of the wres-

tlers' chances of winning a state title end in the morning session, it's important that the parents are there to not only watch them but be there to console them after they lose.

Fortunately, event organizers delayed the start of action for nearly 90 minutes to let as many people in as possible. It may have thrown a monkey wrench into the schedule, but at least people could see the first round. Now, if only event organizers could control concession stand prices ...

Overall attendance was down from 2005, when Albany first hosted the state tournament, but not significantly down. Most of the lower level was filled through much of the two-day event, and some of the upper deck sections were filled during Saturday night's finals.

Given the rotten weather Friday morning, drawing more than 15,000 for the tournament was a nice accomplishment. Hopefully, it will be enough to make Albany a viable host site in the future.

opened the third period with another reversal to take a 4-3 lead. Only a McDonald escape with 34 seconds left prevented Graham from winning the state title in regulation.

"The last time I wrestled him, I reversed him, so I knew I could do it again," said Graham, who lost to McDonald in two previous bouts.

After a scoreless one-minute overtime period, Graham and McDonald went to two 30-second overtime periods. Graham won the coin flip and elected to start in the defensive position, but he didn't stay there long as he scored his third reversal to take a 6-4 lead.

"The (overtime) reversal was outstanding," said R-C-S coach Henry Mormile III. "How many times do you see kids settle for one point (for an escape), and he kept working until he got the reversal."

McDonald, who won the last two 152-pound division titles, barely had enough energy to fight back. He scored an escape early in the second 30-second overtime period to pull within a point, but his last-ditch takedown attempt turned into a two-point takedown for Graham that sealed the state title.

"He's been training hard since September, working five days a week and working harder than anyone else," said Mormile. "You could see it in this tournament."

Christian Brothers Academy's Michael Chaires also needed overtime to win a state title. The University of Virginia-bound senior battled Spencerport's Bryan Bourne for more than six minutes before scoring a takedown and two back points to pull out a 5-1

victory.

Chaires controlled the action against Bourne, but had a hard time recording a takedown in regulation. Every time Chaires took a shot, Bourne either slipped out of Chaires' grip or dragged him out of bounds.

"He's a defensive wrestler, and I knew that from the beginning," said Chaires. "I just stuck to my game plan."

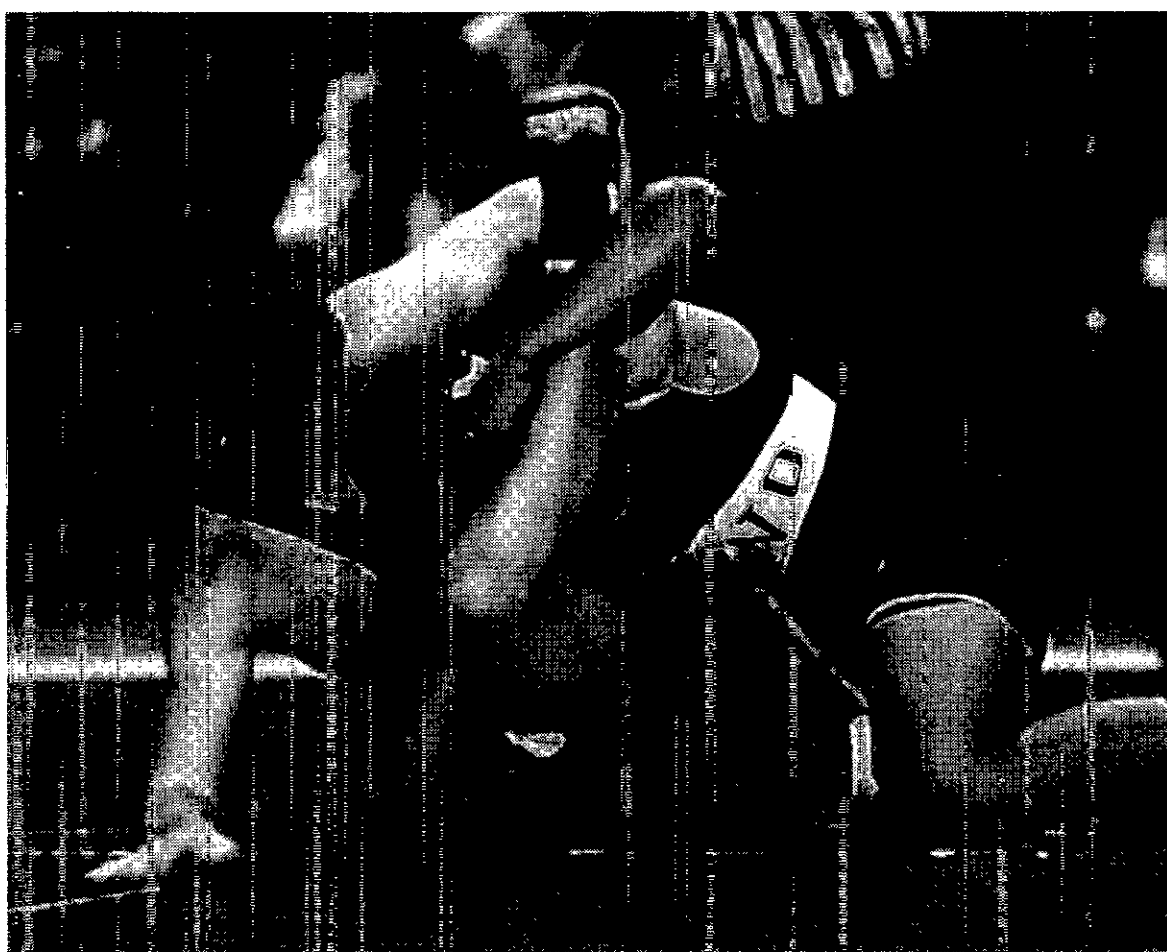
Escapes by Chaires and Bourne sent the bout into overtime, where Chaires finally tripped up Bourne and got him on his back for the takedown and two back points.

"I got in about four or five shots (during regulation), so I knew I could get in on him. I just had to finish," said Chaires.

The victory made Chaires only the eighth Section II wrestler to win at least two state titles. That list also includes Voorheesville's Jeff Clark (1983-84), Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake's Jason Morris (1984-85), Salem's Carl Fronhofer (1997-98), LaSalle's Matt Herrington (2001-02) and Duaneburg's Jim Almy (2005-06). BH-BL's Joe Cardy (1981-83) and Salem's Frank Fronhofer (1987-89) won three state titles.

"I'm just happy to win two," said Chaires. "To win two is a great accomplishment for me, and I'm glad I did it here in Albany."

The state titles won by Meys, Graham and Chaires highlighted a successful weekend for Section II wrestlers. The division 1 team placed third to state powers Section V (Rochester) and Section XI (Suffolk County), and eight wrestlers placed second through sixth. The division 2 team placed fifth, and six wrestlers finished anywhere from third to sixth place including R-C-S's Donnie McBride, who placed fifth in the 275-pound division.

The cost is \$60 per swimmer.

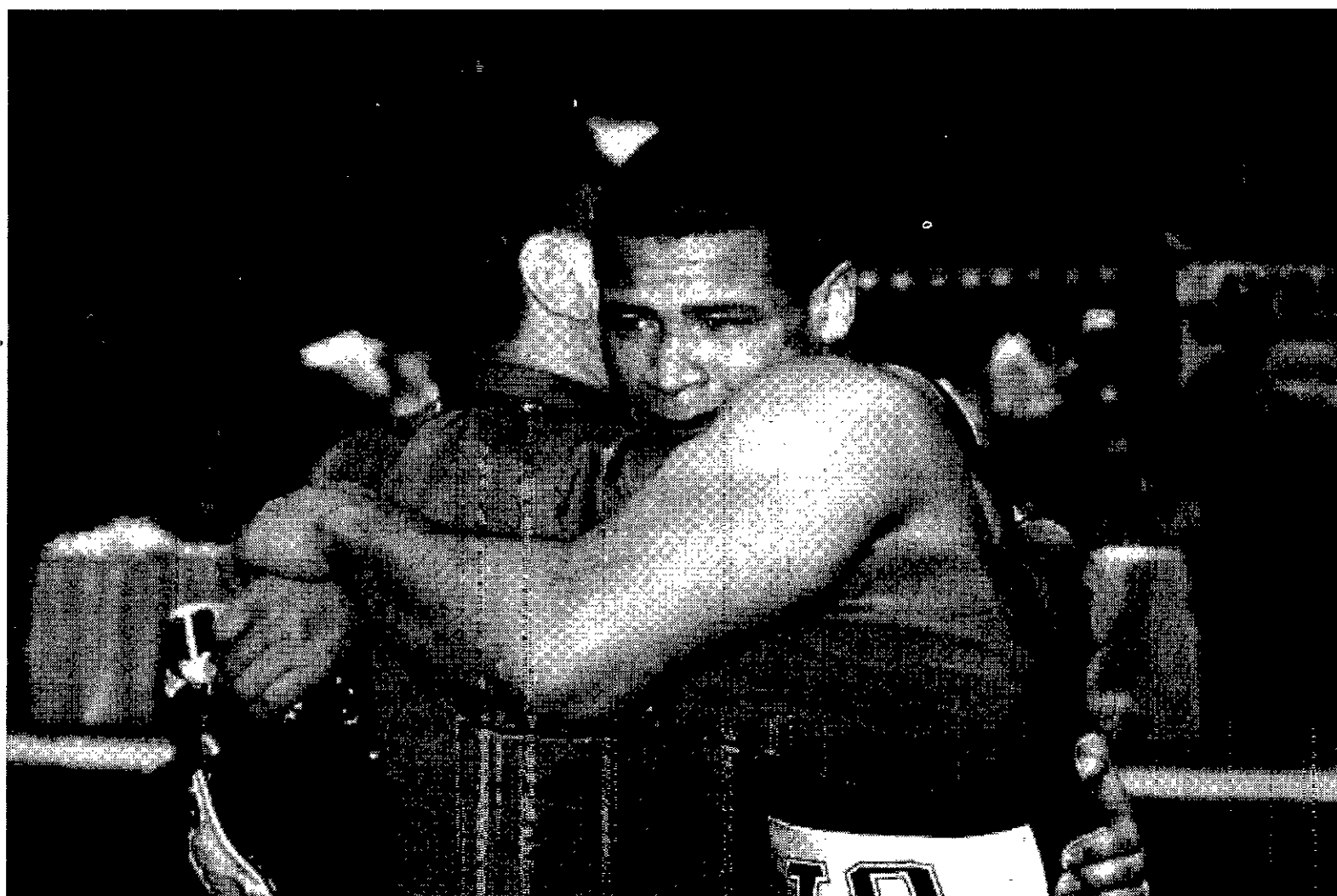

Graham, Meys sweep titles

R-C-S middleweight claims school's first state wrestling crown

No one owned the mat like Hunter Meys.

The Shenendehowa junior needed less than seven minutes to pin all four of his opponents on his way to winning the division 1 171-pound title at last weekend's New York State High School Wrestling Championships at Albany's TU Center.

"He's pinned everybody since Eastern States," said Shen coach Rob Weeks. "He's ferocious."

Meys not only left with his first

state title in three tries, but he also earned Most Outstanding Wrestler honors in division 1 (large schools).

"This is a great honor," said Meys, who placed third at 112 pounds in 2004 and fifth at 130 pounds in 2005. "My goal coming in was to win (the state title). I didn't expect this to happen."

It's a safe bet Meys' competitors didn't expect to be pinned so quickly. Canandaigua Academy's Ryan Macomber fell in 1:16 in the opening round. In the quarter-finals, MacArthur's Dan Mahoney was on his back in 3:09. Niskayuna's Jake Newcomb actually had Meys on his back for a split second during their semifinal match before Meys reversed him and pinned the junior in 1:07.

Then came Saturday's championship bout with last year's runner-up, Niagara Wheatfield's Jake Koshinski. It took Meys 49 seconds to take down Koshinski and another 34 seconds to get the senior's shoulders on the mat, mainly because Koshinski battled every moment.

"It was tough for a while before that (takedown)," said Meys. "He's got good technique, and that usually eliminates moves that other wrestlers like to make."

Meys' four pins raises his career total to 174 — the second highest number of career falls in state high school wrestling history. More importantly, it gives him what his grandfather, his father and his brother Austin already have — a state title.

"It's a great feeling," said Meys. "I've been working at this for a few years now, and it's nice to have it finally pay off."

Meys wasn't the only Section II wrestler celebrating his first state title. Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk's Nate Graham claimed the division 2 171-pound title with a thrilling 8-5 overtime victory over two-time state champion Colin McDonald of Waverly.

"It feels good," said Graham, who became R-C-S's first state wrestling champion. "I get my name on the mat."

Graham's ability to score reversals helped him in the finals. He used one toward the end of the second period to pull within a point of McDonald, and then he

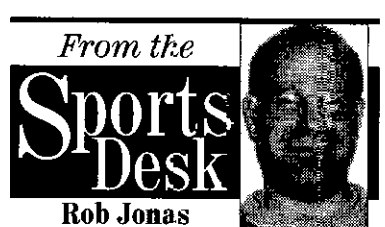
McBride proud to place fifth at states

Some observations from a weekend spent watching the New York State High School Wrestling Championships in Albany:

• There may have been no happier fifth-place finisher at the tournament than Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk heavyweight Donnie McBride.

After an injury-plagued junior season, McBride showed what he was capable of this season. The senior reached the 275-pound semifinals, where he lost to Holley's Demetrius Mendes 3-2 in sudden-death overtime. Then after a consolation semifinal loss to Bath Haverling's Bryant Madigan, McBride bounced back by beating Addison's Loran Hively 7-5 to take fifth place.

"I came here, and I wrestled as



hard as I could," a beaming McBride said after his fifth-place bout. "I wanted to win the title, but when I lost, I just wrestled as hard as I could."

The bonus for McBride — besides taking the awards podium Saturday night — was he got to stick around and watch teammate Nate Graham bring R-C-S its first state wrestling title after he beat Waverly's Colin McDonald 8-5 in overtime. That historic win was also witnessed by a large R-C-S

wrestling contingent that occupied several rows of seats and a luxury box.

• Fast fact: Graham's win took eight minutes. Shenendehowa's Hunter Meys needed slightly less than seven minutes to record his four pins. If you blinked, you missed most of Meys' matches.

• Thanks to the new at-large bid system that helped fill out all the weight classes, there were several bouts where Sectional rivals met, including the division 1 189-pound championship match between Section V's Ryan Lamagra (Webster Thomas) and Eric Schuth (Brockport).

Two bouts featured rematches from the Section II championships. Hunter Meys pinned Niskayuna's Jake Newcomb in

the 171-pound semifinals, and Christian Brothers Academy's Michael Chaires earned a 5-1 decision over Ballston Spa's Alex Steciuk in the 160-pound quarterfinals.

At least, the Sectional championships held serve this time, but with the mercurial nature of wrestling, we may one day see an at-large kid reach the state finals and beat the person that beat him at their Sectional tournament.

• It was only a matter of time before one section dominated both divisions of the state tournament. Section V turned the trick by fending off Section XI (Suffolk County) for the division 1 title and running away with the division 2 title by nearly 200 points over Sec-

"In fourth and fifth grades, girls tend to outscore boys in areas such as math and science. By middle school, those scores tend to dwindle when you add in hormones and the emotional changes of being pre-teens," said Bordenave.

Bordenave said Girls Incorporated receives referrals from parents, teachers, and sometimes the Department of Social Services.

At Girls Incorporated, girls have the opportunity to take part in workshops that extend from FBI training to pharmacy technician clinics.

"It really gets the girls excited about learning, and the results are astonishing. They feel empowered and confident knowing they can do anything," said Bordenave.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistic, the number of science and engineering jobs will increase 24 percent by 2014, particularly in the Capital District. For this reason, groups that encourage girls to be excited

about math and science are crucial.

Another organization that focuses on young women, Girl Scouts of America, provides a sense of community in an attempt to foster a responsible, prosperous future.

The logic of such groups is that by giving girls a strong foundation, the only place to go from there is up.

The Mohawk Pathways Council of Schenectady, a local Girl Scouts branch, works to show girls that engaging in community awareness and experiences will help them

maximize their potential while contributing to the world around them.

Locally, the group gets involved with causes that promote environmental awareness, charities and even support groups like the Gilda Group of Latham, which provides emotional support to cancer victims and their families.

"My daughter Katina has been involved since she was 5, and she is now 10. My grandmother is still active in Girls Scouts, and we have my 4-year-old daughter Adrianna all ready to be enrolled. She can't wait, it's been such a great experience for us," said Marcy Wilday of Schenectady.

Wilday said the experiences will benefit her girls throughout their lives. She said the group meets once a week, and it's a time she and her girls look forward to.

Other, locally based groups cater to girls as well, including the Albany Girls Club, Inc., or AGC. Many of the organizations work together and provide support and direction for different needs; AGC is part of the United Way and provides after-school programs and summer camps for girls between the ages of 6 and 14. Like

the bigger groups, AGC provides opportunities through education and recreation. AGC focuses on life skills, self-esteem and positive attitudes.

Some parents say one of the most positive aspects of getting girls involved in such clubs is spending time with their daughters. At Girls Incorporated in Ballston Spa, there's a mother-daughter program that reaches out to 10 to 13-year-olds.

"At this age, programs like this one give moms and daughters an excellent opportunity to spend time together," said Bordenave.

The numbers of girls enrolling is growing, and according to Girl Scouts Northeastern New York president Jean B. Rogers, in the Capital District there are 15,785 girls involved and 5,853 adult volunteers.

Parents can often learn about such groups through their schools or religious organizations.

The bottom line for these groups is the future is full of endless possibilities for girls today, and they want to offer young women a chance to explore, have the confidence to take risks and evolve.

Month highlights women through the ages

Take some time today to acknowledge the women in your life. Valentine's Day has passed, Mother's Day is around the corner, but this month — March — is dedicated to acknowledging and appreciating women's history.

When you are done thanking the women you know for the impact they have had in your life, give some thought to the women who went before them. Learn about them, celebrate them, and pass on the information you know to others.

"This is an important opportunity for the general public to recognize women's legacies and contributions," said Janell Hobson, an assistant professor of women's studies at the University at Albany.

"What does it mean to have to highlight it?" said Hobson. "Women's History Month brings recognition and highlights what has been done, but it also recognizes and highlights our marginalization."

The creation of the monthlong observance of women's history began in 1980 with the foundation of the National Women's History Project. According to the organization's Web site, www.nwhp.org, the foundation began when five southern California women noticed that mention of women's contributions through history was conspicuously absent from school textbooks, with less than 3 percent of the material devoted to women.

"We convinced Congress and the White House of the need for our nation to celebrate and recognize women's role in history on an annual basis," notes the site. "As a result of our efforts, the week of March 8 (International Women's Day) was officially designated as National Women's History Week. In 1987, we led the successful campaign to have the entire month of March declared National Women's History Month."

The NWHP has grown into a nationwide organization that has created a "national clearinghouse to provide multicultural women's history information, materials, referrals and strategies. This service also provides easy access to women's history performers, organizations, museums and historic sites."

It also establishes the theme of the annual observance each

March. This year it is "Generations of Women Moving History Forward."

"In teaching women's studies, we don't do enough history," said Hobson. "We tend to focus on more contemporary issues. We don't always put our contemporary scenario into a larger historical context. It is very cliché, but if we don't know where we have been, it's hard to project where we should be."

The reality is women have made great strides in all facets of life.

"I think people forget it has only been 82 years since women got the right to vote," said Christine Moulton, acting director of the National Women's Hall of Fame, located in Seneca Falls.

"It is a terrific idea to have women's history month, but really we should be celebrating women's history and accomplishments all year round," said Moulton. "Everyone has a mother, sister, daughter or aunt. They need to understand the heritage in that."

Women's History Month is not just for women celebrating other women. Men should take note too, said Hanlon.

"I hope they're paying attention to what forces of strength we've been," she said. "We are half the equation."

Hanlon and Moulton said that New Yorkers are particularly fortunate to live in a state so rich with women's history.

Although many recognize the names of Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony and relate them to the women's suffrage movement, few know the women began their struggle for equality in Seneca Falls.

"Especially living in New York it is important for each of us to recognize and celebrate the history that took place in our own areas," said Moulton. "New York state was ripe with the women's movement and women's reform. We need to be more in touch with women's history."

The National Women's Hall of Fame boasts more than 200 inductees who have influenced the world through their "contributions to the arts, athletics, business, education, government, the humanities, or philanthropy and science."

The museum displays exhibits and artifacts as well as maintains a research library. Its Web site, www.greatwomen.org, offers

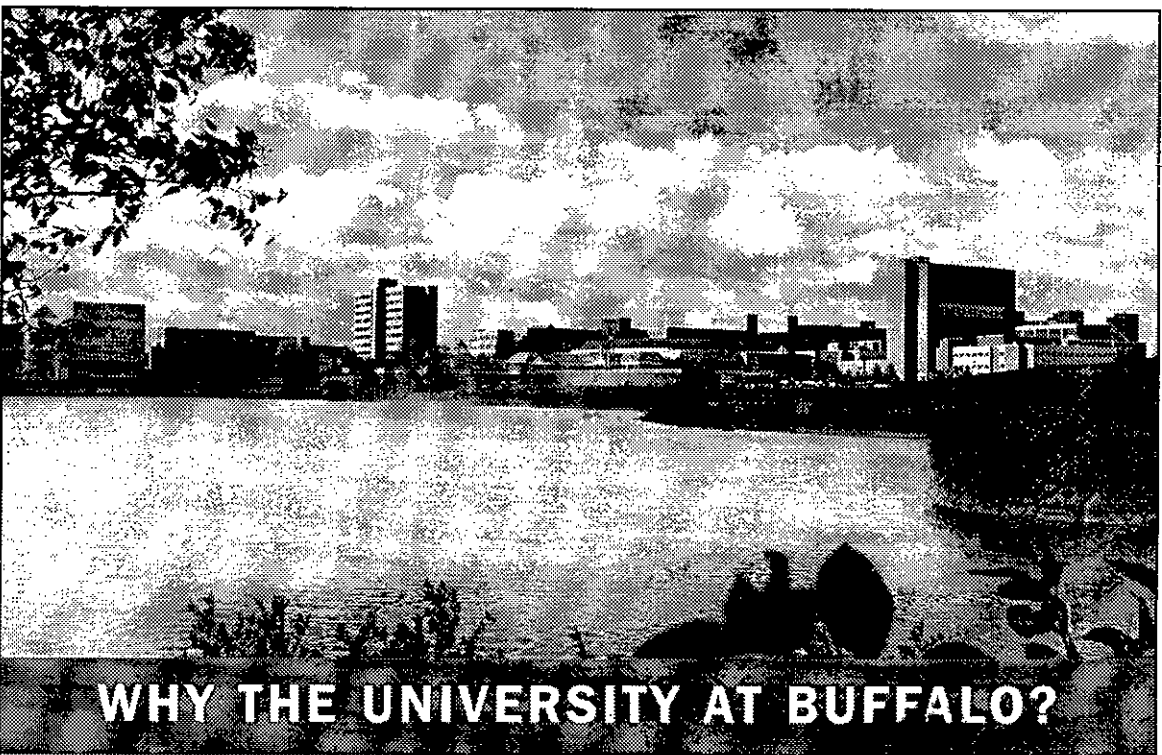
detailed biographies of the inductees, as well as a list of additional resources.

Capital District residents do not have to go very far to enjoy a glimpse of women's history with a number of local historical sites available. The National Register of Historic Places has created a travel itinerary for the New York and Massachusetts area called "Places Where Women Made History."

Five area sites are listed, including the Emma Willard School in Troy, the Watervliet Shaker Historic District in Colonie, and the Scotia Station Post Office. Two other places in the local area are privately owned and not open to the public. A little further north, in Lake George, is the Wawaka Holiday House. A handful of historic sites in western Massachusetts are located within reasonable driving distance.

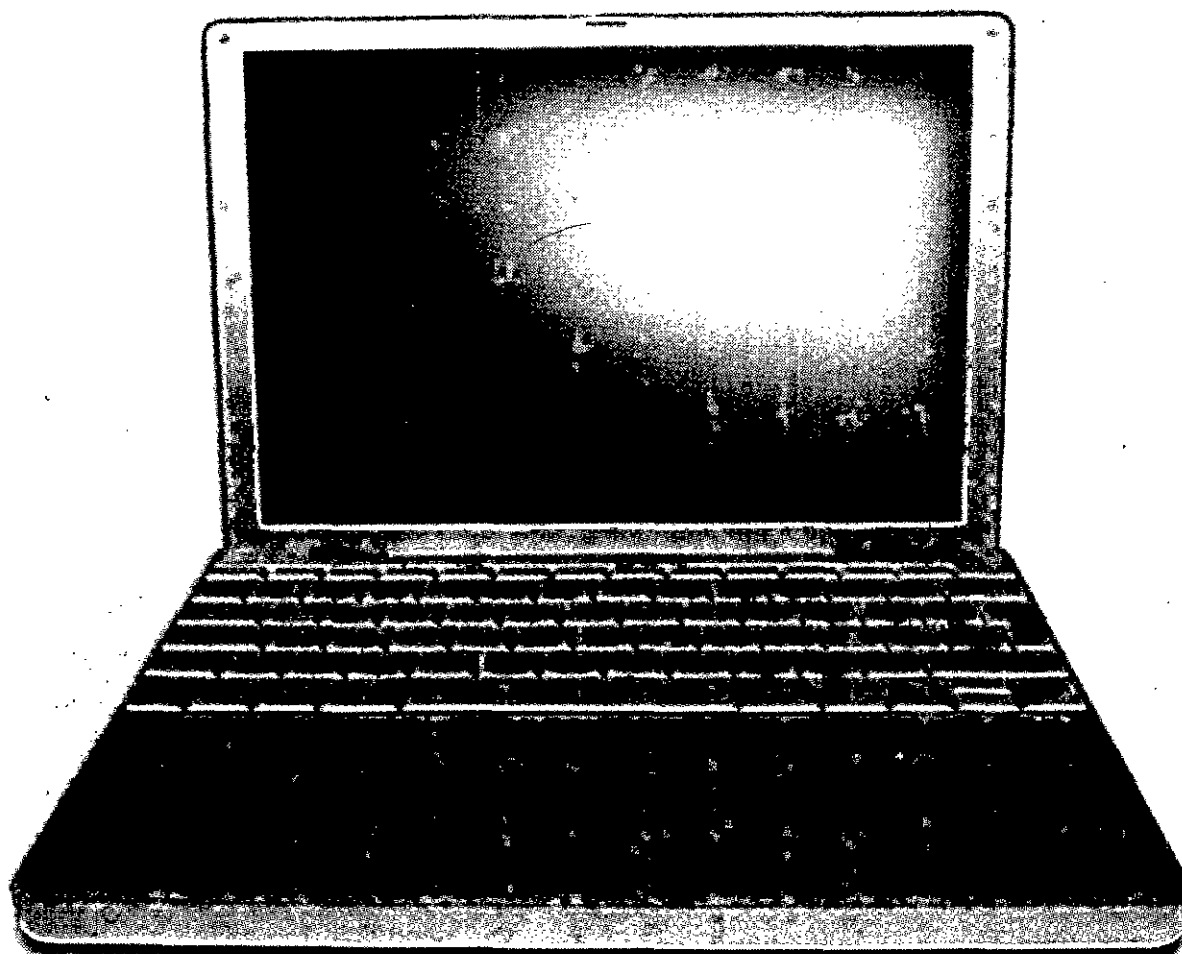


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
