Humans, critters collide over space

Man builds a big house in the hills. The birds continue to flock as they have always done. Man calls wildlife pathologists about noisy birds outside his window every morning.

It happens.

As do mice in kitchens, deer leaping across roadways to meet their maker at the business end of a sport utility vehicle, and a rabid fisher — a relative of the weasel — attacking a Glenville woman taking out the trash.

Other animals are looking down from the hills at the warm glow of predator-free, food-laden developments and are soon scratching a living in man's backyard. They are also moving into the green spaces and refuges many municipalities are setting aside as part of their comprehensive plans and development strategies.

The fact is, wildlife is growing accustomed to man, his machines, his homes and his sprawling neighborhoods, and as they do, they quickly get blacklisted as "vermin," despite the fact that they were there first.

"When I was a boy in Columbia County in the late 1950s, I did a lot of work on farms. The crows were scared to death of people. They got out of there when confronted. Agriculture became less and less, people stopped shooting at them, and

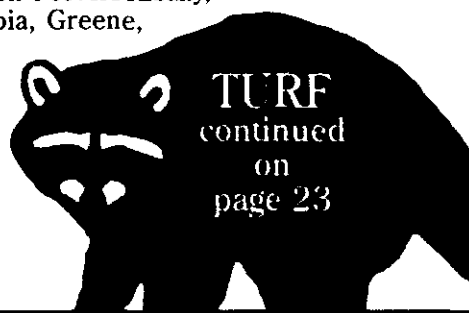
the crows went into areas inhabited by people," said Ward Stone, wildlife pathologist with the state Department of Environmental Conservation.

It's a trend that has taken place with many wildlife species, said Stone. Efforts to either control man's spread into open spaces or keep man out and the wildlife in, are repeatedly failing.

Spans of fields once used for farming or covered in dense forest are leveled and left partly paved and the rest sown with grass. Some species are driven from the habitats and some see the development as another, even better, habitat. And there are those animals that use the developed areas to pass through to untouched feeding or breeding grounds, said Stone.

"Coyotes, fishers, red fox and even deer, to a lesser degree, which were once absent from suburbia have become not common, but not rare," said Karl Parker, senior wildlife biologist with the state DEC Region 4 Bureau of Wildlife.

Board, budget group discuss hiring

A lengthy discussion about the hiring of three new middle school teachers in Bethlehem took up much of the Wednesday, March 14, combined meeting of the school board and citizens budget committee.

The proposal, brought forth by Superintendent Les Loomis,

asked the board to hire three new teachers at a proposed cost of \$175,800 based on a projected increase in enrollment of 41 new students at the middle school next year. The new teachers would help ease classroom overcrowding, with average class sizes decreasing from 22.6 students to 21.5 students.

Anti-war group keeps the peace

**Rain or shine, members
have staged weekly
protests for four years**

They are mothers, grandmothers, veterans and young adults. They gather at 5 p.m. at the Delmar Four Corners when others are driving home from work every Monday with signs and placards reading, "The war is a big mistake" and "No more blood for oil."

They are the Bethlehem Neighbors for Peace, and week after week since January 2003, these hardy souls continue to brave below-zero weather in winter and scorching heat in summer to wait for a honk of support or a thumbs up to confirm their belief that the war in Iraq is wrong on all fronts.

"This is the only way I know how to raise my voice against war," said Jane Streiff, a grandmother of 12 who has lived in Bethlehem since 1963 and attended her first protest in 1963 when she opposed the Vietnam War.

"I attended rallies in Washington back then," said Streiff. "We didn't have anything here like this."

The Bethlehem Neighbors for Peace meet for one hour after their weekly protest at A Perfect

Bethlehem police arrest 3 for DWI

A 42-year-old Selkirk man is being charged with criminal contempt and aggravated harassment by Bethlehem police.

James Lamert, of 48 Flemmings Trailer Park in Selkirk was released from the Ulster County jail, arrested and returned to the Bethlehem police department on an arrest warrant. Lamert was processed and arraigned and sent to Albany County jail pending a preliminary hearing scheduled for April 8 in Bethlehem Town Court.

• A Delmar man is being charged with DWI after allegedly driving erratically along Delaware Avenue, Wednesday, March 14.

Bethlehem police observed 23-year-old Justin Heinbuch driving on Delaware Avenue in the early

morning hours tailgating and abruptly passing motorists, according to police.

After he was pulled over, police said Heinbuch failed field sobriety tests and was subsequently charged with DWI-first offense, following too closely, and moving between lanes unsafely.

Heinbuch was placed into custody. His vehicle was towed and he will appear in Town Court on April 3.

• Michael Reynolds, 58, of 1341, State Route 9W in Selkirk, was arrested for DWI, driving with more than .08 percent blood alcohol content and failure to keep right.

The arrest occurred on Saturday, March 10, on Route 9W in Glenmont. Bethlehem police said that Reynolds vehicle was observed crossing the solid double

yellow line on several occasions. He was stopped, questioned and charged with DWI. He will appear in Bethlehem Town Court on April 3.

• Daniel Conophy, 22, of 9 Oakwood Road in Glenmont has been charged with DWI-first offense by Bethlehem police. Conophy was driving on Route 9W in Selkirk when police observed Conophy traveling 66 mph in a 55 mph zone. He was stopped and given field sobriety tests that he allegedly failed.

Conophy was additionally charged with speeding and operating a vehicle with more than .08 percent blood alcohol content. He will appear in Town Court on April 3.

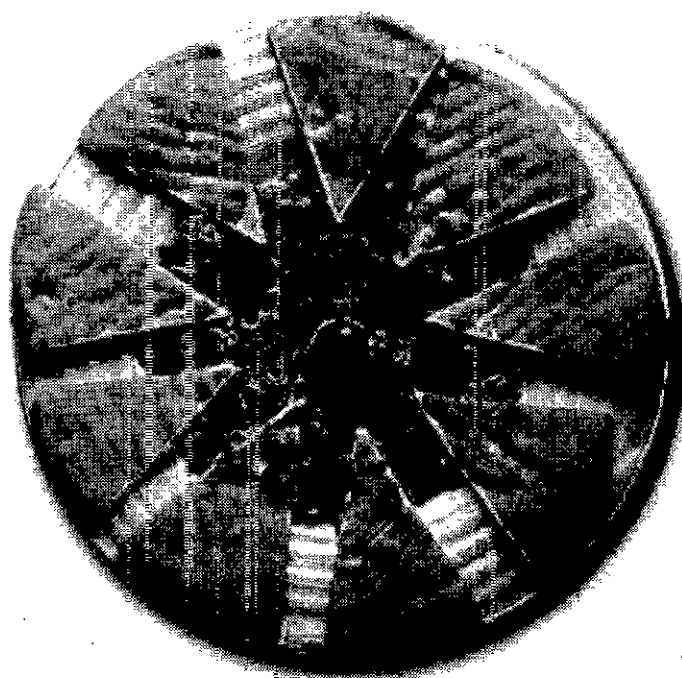

Town readies trio of bypass proposals

Residents along Route 9W in Bethlehem will see at least three different alternatives for a new Selkirk Bypass at the next workshop session scheduled for Thursday, March 22, at A.W. Becker Elementary School.

The 9W committee met earlier this month to review the findings of the first workshop with residents and to better define possible alternatives for a new bypass to alleviate truck traffic in the corridor along Maple Avenue.

One new option, called the "southern alignment," would begin south of Maple Avenue and extend to Selkirk. That option does not include a new Thruway interchange at Exit 22. The second option, known as the "middle alignment," will begin at Creble Road and extend east to the Thruway. The third option, or "northern alignment," begins at Jericho and continues to Wemple Road.

The middle and northern alignments require a new Thruway interchange as part of the project.

"The Wemple Road alternative is probably less expensive than the Creble Road

already in place for the project.

Officials estimated that about \$10 million in government funding would be made available for the project once the town makes a decision.

A more northerly new Selkirk Bypass would cost several million more than a new southern alignment, but George Leveille, economic development director for Bethlehem, said the positives of that option outweigh the negatives.

"The more northern you go, the better the chance for private dollars and more opportunity for economic development," Leveille said.

Other topics expected to be considered include new growth

along the corridor along with safety and truck traffic concerns.

"We are looking for an option to benefit all," said Leveille. "To alleviate traffic and make it flow safer along with better economic development and little impact to residents."

Supervisor Theresa Egan said she believes residents should see several new bypass alternatives at the next public workshop so they are a part of the decision-making process.

"We are trying to narrow this down to three feasible alternatives and then after the March 22 meeting, hopefully we will get down to one alternative," Egan told the committee.

James Donovan, representing the engineering firm of

Wilbur Smith Associates, gave an outline of each new alternative and some of the environmental constraints of each.

"Steep slopes, important agricultural soils, school and housing clusters along with other land-use issues are some of the constraints," Donovan said.

Residents who attended the first 9W workshop session listed traffic congestion, safety, and overall visual quality of the environment as some of the main hurdles that any new bypass alternative would have to clear.

The next 9W meeting is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. March 22 at Becker Elementary School.

One topic up for discussion at the next meeting will be the cost of a new Route 9W alignment, which is expected to have a price tag of anywhere from \$7 million to \$21 million.

Neighbors question group home

Neighborhood concerns over a Living Resources group home for four developmentally disabled women on Orchard Street forced the Bethlehem Town Board to table action on any decision until the next meeting.

"Group homes have high turnover rates, and we want assurances nothing will happen," said neighbor Marc Kleinhenz, who asked for the board to delay action.

Chris Lyon, an Orchard Street resident, asked for a no-cost contract from the agency guaranteeing the home will not cause any disturbance.

"We just heard about this 12 days ago," Lyons said. "Postpone a decision until we have a chance to have our questions answered."

Fred Erlich, chief executive officer of Living Resources said the home will be appealing and provide an opportunity for people to be accepted in the community.

"We serve people with disabilities in our home who are not mentally ill," said Erlich.

Residents said they have no problem with the four women who will be living in the home,

but they want guarantees that any future residents who move in will not cause any disturbance in the neighborhood.

"People stay in our homes for a long time," said Erlich. "We opened homes in the 1970s and many of the same people are still there," Erlich said.

Supervisor Theresa Egan reminded the board that approving the residence is a mere formality that cannot be

blocked.

"From a regulatory perspective, we do not have that authority," said Egan. "Our job is to listen to the proposal."

Town attorney James Potter said the only way the board can vote against the residential home is if there is a "neighborhood saturation." Officials agreed that is not the case, however board member Daniel Plummer said tabling the matter will allow the residents to have their questions answered.

"We want to make sure everybody has an opportunity to ask some questions," said

Plummer.

Board members agreed to table the vote, with Egan asking residents to reach out in the next few weeks to the agency so a decision can be reached. There are currently 10 group homes in Bethlehem serving about 81 people. All of the residents in the new home are currently living in the town, and the parents and grandparents of the four women along with other town residents spoke in support of the proposal.

"The concerns in my neighborhood dissipated several years ago," said Longmeadow Drive resident Ed Solomon, who lives on a street where a Living Resources group home was built several years ago. "I am proud of Living Resources. They are a good solid agency with a long track record."

Erlich said it's normal for people to have concerns, but the law supports the residential program alternative for people with disabilities.

"The law is very strong," said Erlich. "It's natural for people with disabilities to live in communities."

Neighbors continued their discussion with Living Resources officials out in the hall while the town meeting continued.

Town encourages use of special needs registry

The Albany County Sheriff's Department has a program designed to assist the special needs community during an emergency within Albany County whether manmade or natural. Registrants should be physically or mentally unable to evacuate themselves from their residence without assistance. Applicant information is entered into the County's E-911 system for retrieval during an emergency.

Local police departments will have the information, as well, and this information allows emergency responders to instantly identify the special needs of callers from their residences. In situations like this, prior medical knowledge of the needs of the caller enhances the response time and efficiency of medical care.

"Currently, we have about 1,000 people registered in the program," said Garry G. Horne, director of community and emergency services with the Albany County Sheriff's Department. "The unique thing about our registry is that it is the first in the state that incorporates information about people with

disabilities into the E911 system. Emergency workers will have valuable knowledge about the person before they arrive which could be life saving."

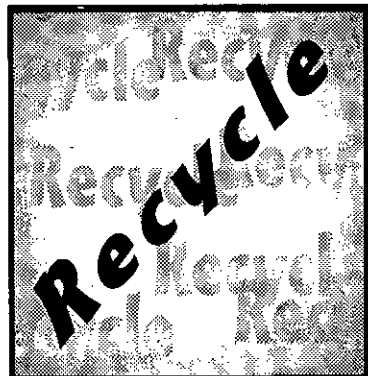

Parents become mad scientists over fair

I remember our first elementary school science fair quite well. My daughter was in third grade. The experiment she submitted was called "Electromagnets."

Any parent whose child has participated in a science fair knows that in addition to "learning about science," a secondary purpose of the fair is to measure the amount of strain a family will endure for this non-mandatory, extracurricular school assignment.

To that end, along with the information on electromagnets, Rachel might have also displayed a set of photographs with the following descriptions:

Photo 1: This is my mother before the experiment. See how she is all bubbly and excited to participate in the science fair. She says Dad is in charge of helping me.

Photo 2: Here's Mom a few weeks later. See how she is looking a bit stressed. There's Dad with bags under his eyes. He stays up real late trying to get the electromagnet to work. Plus Mom keeps reminding him he should be working on the tax returns.

Photo 3: Look at Mom a few days before the science fair. She is basically freaking out. She keeps running around screaming, "We need a hypothesis! We need a hypothesis!"

Photo 4: Finally, here is Mom the morning of the science fair. She is calm again, but has not really returned to her old bubbly self.

The PTA coordinates the science fair at our school. The chairpersons distribute a packet that explains how to document all the parts of the project, including the observation, the hypothesis, the experimental methods, the results, the conclusions and the next steps. It's an excellent guide, and the entire process is an invaluable lesson

for the students to learn.

For example, your child may pick a hypothesis such as "My mom will freak out over the science fair project." Then your child will "do the experiment" using the following methods: Pick a specific experiment, procrastinate doing it, forget that she needs distilled water until the last minute, complain that her hand is cramping when she needs to write up the results, and then argue about the arrangement on the display board.

Of course her hypothesis will be correct. The tricky part will be determining the "next steps," that is, what she can do differently the next time to reduce the amount that Mom yells.

Isn't science a wonderful thing?

In our house, trying to "prove" that Mom is a control freak is like trying to prove that the sun rises in the east. You just know from the start that your hypothesis is correct.

Not all experiments are this straightforward. So, when Rachel came home with the science fair packet in third grade, I asked my husband to work with her. I typically monitor the day-to-day homework assignments, so I thought it only fair that my husband oversee this "extracurricular" project.

Jeff poked around online and suggested that the project would involve building an electromagnet. He bought the supplies: a battery and some wires.

Although I had said that he was in charge, I began to add my two cents (OK, more like 50 dollars worth) as time went by.

"What exactly is the experiment? I asked him, 'Is the experiment, 'Can we build an electromagnet?'"

"What??" he replied.

I showed him the science fair packet and explained how Rachel needed to come up with a hypothesis and then determine if it was correct or incorrect. I asked him if the hypothesis was "We can build an

electromagnet."

"I already know we can build an electromagnet," he answered.

"Then what's the experiment? What's the electromagnet going to do?" I demanded.

We discussed and determined that the electromagnet would pick up a certain number of paperclips. Then Jeff spent time with Rachel building the electromagnet.

Yes, Rachel was also involved with the project.

Unfortunately, the electromagnet didn't pick up anything.

So Jeff went out and bought a bigger battery. He stayed up late working on the project alone.

"This is supposed to be Rachel's project," I reminded him.

"It doesn't work," he said. He wanted the thing to work.

"It doesn't have to work," I told him, "It's an experiment. The experiment could be you tried to build an electromagnet and it didn't work. Try to figure out why and what you could do next time to make it work."

I needed to find a way to move the project along. I sought advice from a colleague at work. He brought in a construction

nail made completely out of iron. He theorized that our electromagnet was on the weak side and would pick up only pure iron.

I returned home feeling hopeful. However, our electromagnet did not pick up the nail and was only strong

color. "Yeah, OK, fine, but just PICK A COLOR NOW!"

We sure learned a lot from our first science fair, my husband and I. Each year our family gets better at surviving preparations for the science fair.

For example, last year Rachel's experiment involved making parachutes out of plastic bags. She attached rocks of various

sizes to the parachutes, tossed the parachutes into the air and timed how long it took for each rock to hit the ground.

I helped find the experiment, Jeff helped Rachel conduct the experiment, and then Rachel prepared the display board using handwritten signs she made herself. She used construction paper to give borders to her signs and she used different colored markers for the different sections. "Should I use red or blue for this part?" she asked.

"Just PICK A COLOR NOW," I replied.

This year our experiment involves Jell-O. In early March, Rachel went online by herself and found the experiment. Most of what she needed (household cleaners) we already had around the house. A week later, Jeff went to the store and bought the remaining supplies (Jell-O and distilled water). A day later she conducted the experiment (with minimal help from Dad). For a while I thought there'd be no need to nag, but the fair is approaching and she's still not finished.

I can picture the caption on the photograph: "Here's Mom freaking out because she's worried about the display board getting done."

We sure learned a lot from our first science fair, my husband and I. Each year our family gets better at surviving preparations for the science fair.

County Dems return to court to battle over commish vote

Albany Democrats are back in court again, and this time it has to do with a county committee vote for election commissioner.

Matthew Clyne's victory over Karen Shea in February's close, weighted vote is being challenged in state Supreme Court in Albany County.

Shea's attorney made an attempt Monday, March 13, to obtain a stay that would have blocked any vote for election commissioner by the Albany County Legislature that same night.

Judge Roger D. McDonough

ruled against the stay but did allow the party committee vote challenge to be heard in court, scheduled for April 9.

"The thrust of the argument is some proxies," said Clyne's attorney, L. Michael Mackey.

Shea is arguing the county committee vote to approve Clyne is invalid because some proxies handed in the night of the vote supporting Clyne were from committee persons who do not live in Albany County.

"I have looked at the petition, and based on a cursory review, it doesn't seem to me it has any merit," said Mackey.

Meanwhile, the Albany County Legislature approved the committee choice of Clyne by a

vote of 33 to 5. Four of those opposition votes came from the city of Albany, where Shea's support is based.

"I have supported Karen Shea for the position, and I think she is the most qualified," said 8th District legislator, Nancy Wiley.

Wiley is among those who supported a delay in any vote for Clyne until the court rules on Shea's challenge next month.

"Karen is working daily, taking care of Democratic business within the board of elections, and I didn't see any urgency or necessity to vote for Mr. Clyne last night," said Wiley the day after Clyne's formal approval by the legislature.

Shea is currently the deputy election commissioner, and Wiley said she has the support of many powerful county Democrats.

"Her name was put forth in February by three prominent members of the Democratic committee including Jack McNulty (father of Congressman Michael McNulty), Michael Breslin (county executive) and (Albany mayor) Gerald Jennings," said Wiley.

District 10 county legislator Daniel McCoy said he supported Shea and also opposed a vote for Clyne.

"I feel Karen Shea has been doing a good job for 31 years, and I didn't think it was time for a change," said McCoy.

Another aspect of Shea's

challenge is the weighted vote used to decide party matters. The county committee weighted vote is based on the number of registered Democrats in that election district who voted in the last gubernatorial election for the Democratic candidate.

McCoy believes another aspect of the court challenge is that the county weighted votes are inaccurate because many Republicans and Conservatives crossed party lines in the last election to vote for Democrat Eliot Spitzer. That would mean the true weighted vote for county committee Democrats in places like Colonie and Bethlehem are not accurately representative of the party.

"I don't see that as being a serious issue," said Mackey.

"Election law provides the committee a weighted vote based on election districts, and that has been challenged before in courts and upheld."

Legislator Jack Cunningham from Delmar said he doesn't believe the current county committee disputes over party chair and election commissioner will continue much longer.

"I'm hoping that the alliance between (Frank) Comisso and (David) Bosworth will, in the long run, make this committee more unified," said Cunningham, referring to the two county Democratic co-chairs.

Clyne will receive an \$80,000 annual salary with his appointment. He replaces James Clancy who left for a position in state government.

An honest government has nothing to hide

Public scrutiny and the public's right to know are related to what most of us think of as the fundamental right to free speech — a principle based on a free society that is supposed to give the American people the privilege of speaking their minds.

This means, for elected officials, that public business should not be conducted behind closed doors, but rather out in the open.

Editorial

When public officials drag their feet to prevent public access to information, it is a violation of one of the basic American rights. Elected public officials are supposed to be conducting the people's business, not addressing their own personal agendas.

This is one reason why political cynicism among Americans has become so prominent. Basically, many politicians have come to believe that lying is acceptable, even if it's a lie of omission.

One thing we often hear is, "We (public officials) cannot comment" regarding issues that are really issues the public should be aware of. This, in some cases, is simply a lie of omission, dodging an issue by refusing to speak about it.

This type of excuse is often used when an elected official's behavior is under question.

This type of behavior also often prompts people to file Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) requests to try to figure out what's going on. But up until last year, it was very difficult to circumvent an antiquated process to get information in a timely fashion or to get it at all.

We hope FOIL requests are managed in a way to really address "Your Right to Know."

Of course, there will likely always be those who try to foil a FOIL.

The message to public officials should be made loud and clear: Honor FOIL requests about public business. It's one way of trying to keep openness and honesty at the forefront of the public sector.

The public, after all, pays the salaries of public officials. We believe the public should know exactly what they are paying for.

From down here, everything looks big

The writer is a transplant from London, England, via a short spell in Florida. She lives in Guiderland with her family and is currently on a career break to raise two young children.

Have you ever thought about what the world looks like from the perspective of a short or vertically challenged person?

Speaking as someone who is 5-foot-nothing and who has shrunk half an inch according to her recent annual physical exam (I can blame that on the onset of middle age), at the current rate of shrinkage I will end up shorter than my son, and he is 3-1/2 years old.

From my perspective, the big, wide world is an obstacle course and a minefield. The average female height in the United States is 5-foot-4-inches, and, in my opinion, everything is geared toward average height or taller.

Am I being paranoid? I asked my pint-sized girlfriends for their take on this issue. I heard similar stories of how they have navigated the course of their lives as vertically challenged people.

Think of how your daily life is divided into different areas — from grocery shopping to doing laundry — and consider how each aspect can present a pitfall for a short person.

Without a doubt my biggest frustration when grocery shopping is trying to reach for something on the top shelf. (Why is the one item you need always on the top shelf?) Here I am looking semi-helpless with child in tow hoping to make some sort of eye contact before I have to ask directly for help. Male or female, I am not fussy; any kind soul will do who will save me from the perils of climbing the Mt. Everest shelves of Price Chopper or Hannaford and rappelling down.

You might think that the petite section of the department store would be my haven. The "petite" signs lull me into a false sense of security and welcomes me in like

a sanctuary. The moment I am drawn in, I feel betrayed because I am short *even* in the petite section. It's a sad day when petite Capri pants come down to one's ankle. For me, buying clothes

My vertically challenged girlfriends have told me they have their own approaches for compensating for their lack of height, whether through humor or by some other means. One of them revealed a great metaphor for her height — her shoes. She purchased a pair of chunky shoes in a size eight because she liked

the design. She felt comfortable wearing them, physically and psychologically, even though she is a size five. It wasn't until a coworker pointed

out the bulkiness of her shoe that she noticed they were too big for her.

Coming from London, a public transportation Mecca, I took to driving here reluctantly, not least because I was fearful of learning to drive on the wrong side of the road. When I was ready to buy a car, I wanted a smaller model than my compact 1998 Toyota Corolla (after all, I am from Europe, and we drive matchboxes on wheels), but my husband cautioned me not to drive anything less than compact size as I needed to be seen on the road. He was right, my car is small and I still feel dwarfed as I peer over my steering wheel, sitting on my cushion so I can peer over my steering wheel.

If money were no object, I would have my shelving custom-built to my short specifications. Currently, I own three footstools and two stepladders, and I live in a two-bedroom apartment. When I win the Lotto jackpot, I will contact you if you are a budding designer for the shorter person, predictably a niche market I predict. With my winnings, I will buy a front-loading washing machine because you would not believe the dangers presented by a top-loading one. I literally have to throw myself into the machine to reach for the pesky, small, white sock that is wedged at the bottom. Imagine one of those cartoons where the character ends up with their feet sticking up out of the machine. I wonder if the fire department has ever responded to such an emergency call, and I hope I never find out.

The message I want to send to the legions of average-sized or tall people out there is this: Walk in my shoes for a moment, and the next time you see a short, Asian woman scaling the shelves of your grocery store, please don't roll your eyes impatiently. Instead, think what a great gift you have in your height, something you take for granted. Consider the service you can give in helping a fellow human being get the last pack of apple juice boxes on sale from the top shelf, and I will thank you from the bottom of my heart.

necessitates a separate line item for tailoring. When I complain about this extra financial burden, jokes abound — "With your height you should be able to shop in the junior section and save some money." You obviously haven't looked closely at the clothes there; my right arm would not fit into one of those pant legs!

Social situations provide a wealth of comedic moments for a short person. At my last social function, I went to greet a good friend's husband. OK, you say, "What's amusing about that?" My friend's husband is 6-foot-4-inches tall. I believe I hugged and kissed his navel, and an awkward moment ensued. It reminded me of when I dated a 6-foot-2 guy in college. ... Well, that's another story. While we are on the topic of dating, one of my friends was dumped by a man because she was too short for him, a deal breaker in his mind, but in my mind a very lame excuse and extremely hurtful for my friend.

In my experience, going to a restaurant can be a source of frustration for a short person. Let me expand on this sweeping statement. I am Hong Kong Chinese by cultural origin and, let me tell you, we live to eat. I can see acquaintances' eyes glaze over with astonishment as plate upon plate is served, and I have asked for my third bowl of rice. I can hear their mental conversations: "How is this small woman packing in so much food?" You can blame the Asian genes for my ability to eat rice, but short does not equate to small appetite.

My love of food is part of my larger appetite for life. I am 6-foot tall mentally, and I want to make an impact. Projecting a big personality is compensation for my lack of height. Early on in my working life I learned to find my voice and speak up. I had to overcome two stereotypes: being Asian and being short, and their associated connotations of being docile and easily dominated. I watch for the look of surprise when I make a contradiction. I practice assertive behavior daily; hopefully, I don't exhibit the traits of short autocrats in history.

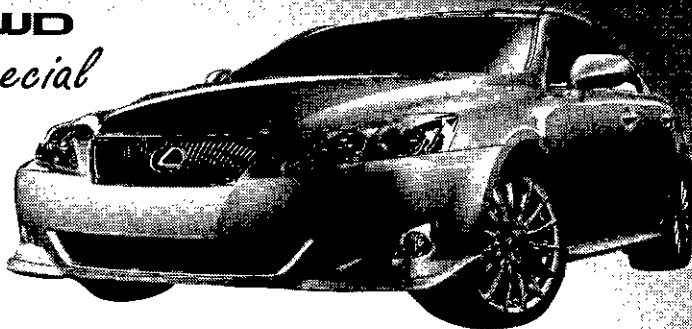

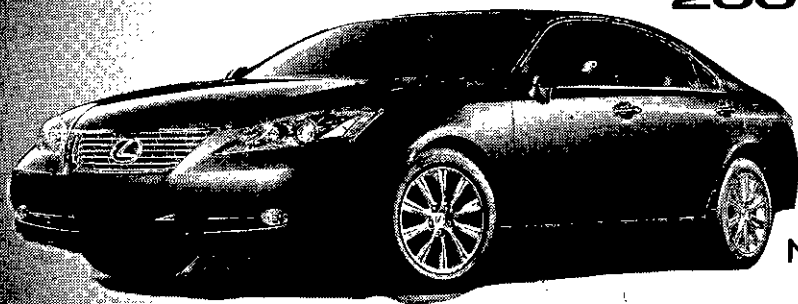

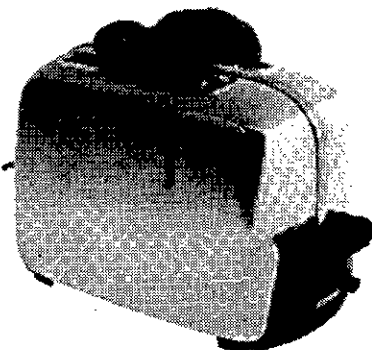

court functions out of town hall into a new facility near the town center.

"We are well beyond the life expectancy of this," said Bethlehem police Chief Lou Corsi, whose department has been at the current location since 1979.

The town's emergency 9-1-1 call center, which began with one

radio and one person, is now a room with three public safety answering points, a call taker station, a command center for fire and EMS and an area with a computer strictly to monitor homeland security developments.

"Our area has changed so many times," said Corsi. "Break rooms are now command rooms, and the command supervisor is now in a small cramped room."

The department has a small corridor in the basement that houses everything from old police records to an ammunition room with items spilling out into

the halls. The town would have to find 11 acres to accommodate a new public safety facility if the town board goes ahead with the report findings.

"It just makes good sense we should be in a facility that accommodates us," said Corsi.

Another part of the proposal calls for renovating the existing town hall for more office space and community programs. The plan calls for 32,000 square feet of existing town hall space to be renovated and the construction of another 2,000 square feet that would include a new public

entrance on the west side of the building. The total cost of the town hall renovations and construction would be \$5.65 million.

The third aspect of the needs analysis concerns locating the highway and public works department together at the existing 14-acre site at 74 Elm Ave. Renovating 30,000 square feet and constructing another 81,000 square feet at that location is part of the overall plan totaling \$7.75 million.

"We have to look at the recommendations and start reviewing options," said town board member Kyle Kotary.

Kotary said the needs analysis does not mean all or any of the findings would automatically be approved.

New town board member JoAnn Dawson said the town infrastructure is aging, and the board will have to seriously consider the needs analysis proposal.

"It's going to be difficult, but I think there are some fiscally smart ways to plan how we are going to do it," said Dawson. "Having the facility needs analysis

is an important first step."

Sam Messina, another member of the town board, said the job of a board member is to set the priorities for the town now and into the future.

"There is a lot of work to do, but it has to be done," Messina said.

The town currently has very little debt and has made only one capital improvement in the past 10 years.

"It has been an unattended concern for many years," said Supervisor Theresa Egan, referring to the lack of capital improvements. Egan said she envisions the town board working its way through the needs analysis, and by year's end, taking action.

Egan said she doesn't believe the town will be able to fund the total cost of all projects in the needs analysis.

"I think the police and justice court facilities are the ones that are the most pressed right now," Egan said.

"There is a lot of consider," said Corsi. "The safety of officers, the safety of the public, the day-to-day operations."

Another aspect of the proposal is to fill out four full teams in the middle school house structure.

Board members Richard Svenson and James Lytle questioned several aspects of the proposal.

"What is the value that really results from an academic investment of \$175,000 in the middle school?" asked Lytle.

Principal Jody Monroe said the benefit of hiring three new teachers would be a stronger team approach in the middle school.

"Teachers working together collaboratively so that students don't fall through the cracks," Monroe said.

Another concern addressed was whether the high school would eventually need more teachers because the increased enrollment at the middle school would ultimately affect the high school enrollment, which is currently in a slight decline.

"In 2010, when the high school enrollment goes up 50 students, you would have to add two or

three teachers at the high school," Loomis said.

A third concern was whether the board would actually be hiring three new teachers or 1.4 full time equivalent new teachers, due to a proposed administrative change in the middle school house structure. That change involves the hiring of two full-time administrators who would replace teachers working part-time as house leaders at the middle school.

"I would just suggest that whatever you decide on be consistent," said budget committee member Karen Kissinger. "For the public to hear three positions and 1.6 positions is a very different perception."

Following discussion, the tentative decision was to hire two new teachers at the middle school instead of three but continue to review the proposal after the 2007-2008 school budget is released. That would mean an additional cost of \$116,000, instead of the originally proposed cost of \$175,000 for three new teachers.

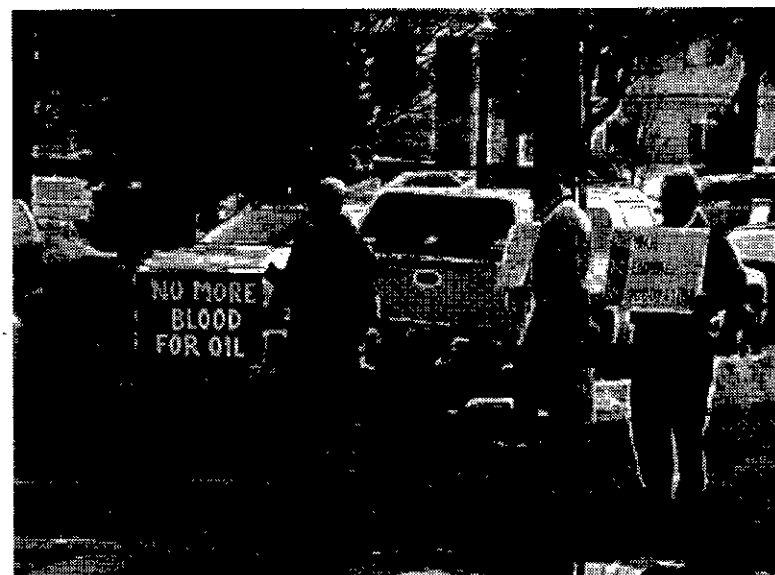
A new approach to fund field trips, arts and other educational programs in the district was also reviewed by the combined budget

committee and school board. The new proposal would restore \$14,000 of field trip funding and combine that with an additional \$36,000 of funding reallocated from standardized testing and from Arts in Education. The \$50,000 total would be called the BCSD School Enrichment Account, and money would be distributed to the elementary and secondary schools. Six different elementary schools would share \$37,500, and \$12,500 would be shared between the middle school and high school.

"The entire enrichment account would be allocated by committees and clubs from each school," said superintendent Loomis.

"We discussed it with the principals, and they liked the idea," said Loomis.

The board is also considering restoring \$6,000 for non-league athletic trips in the district. The proposal would provide opportunities for more team members to participate in games. The citizens budget committee and the school board will continue to meet until a budget is approved in early April.

Blend to further discuss how they feel about the war and what they can do to raise awareness to others.

"There is a difference of opinion within the group," said Richard Jeroloman.

"Some protestors oppose only this war, others protest all violence against other people.

The way I see it, you are not justified to go in the Army and murder people in Iraq, but that is a debatable question within the group."

This past weekend marked the fourth anniversary of the war in Iraq, and a Walk for Peace was held in Albany. More than 3,200 Americans have died in Iraq since the war began.

"It has been averaging 17 guys a week that have been killed," said Jim McLean, a Vietnam Veteran who holds his own signs with a weekly tally of those Americans who are killed in the war.

"We do have support from soldiers," said McLean, who recently braved sub-zero weather

to display his anti-war signs.

"It was really cold last week, but in cold weather, people appreciate your efforts more," said McLean.

When the peace group first began protesting the war, they assumed it would last a few weeks, maybe a few months, and the war would be over and they would be back home. Not many believed they would still be out every Monday looking for support four years later.

"I am out here 50 out of 52 weeks," said Trudy Quaif, a mother of two sons, one of them who encouraged her to go out and protest.

"He said if you are going to complain about the war, why don't you go out there and stand out with them," said Quaif.

She said she was nervous the first week she joined the group.

"People are much more likely to be hostile when there is only one or two of you," Quaif said.

The group has expanded to 750 members and most now believe the support to send the troops home continues to grow every week.

"Over the years, public opinion has changed, even in Delmar," said protestor Gus Cadieux.

Delmar chef smokes the competition

Cooking event raises money for visiting nurse group

Do you consider presentation, proper technique, teamwork, and identical dishes when you are preparing your dinner for friends and family nightly?

You do if you are executive chef Paul Rother of Delmar, the recent winner of the Gold Medal at the annual Cuisine Magic culinary competition in Albany, which raises money for the Eddy Visiting Nurse Association home care project.

The competition, held at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Albany, is similar in format to the "Iron Chef" TV show and involved 11 other competitors from restaurants and food service operations across the region, including Union College, the Marriott, Crowne Plaza, and Normanside Country Club among others.

Each chef had a total of 45 minute to prepare four entrees from scratch. Master chefs from the Culinary Institute of America as well as judges from SUNY Delhi selected the gold-medal-winning meals.

"What makes it nerve-racking is they walk around with clipboards as you are cooking and taste what you are making," said Rother, who by day teaches culinary classes at the Capital Region BOCES and by night is the chef at Blue Water Bistro in Cocksackie.

Rother's winning dish was a

Moroccan-style escalar fillet marinated in a Moroccan salsa with pan-seared toasted pine nuts and couscous with a Moroccan medley of roasted fennel and vegetable sauce. The kitchen judge watches for sanitation and proper technique, and all four entrée plates need to look the same.

"They are not looking for one good dish; they are looking for four," said Rother. "They are really particular."

Rother has a shoebox full of bronze and silver medals from previous competitions, but never a gold medal until Sunday, March 14, when he was awarded the top prize, along with Mike Morgan of Sodexho.

"It was good," said Rother, who had help from some of his students.

"I tell my students, 'You have to love it or you're in the wrong business,'" said Rother.

Cuisine Magic 2007 was the 14th annual culinary benefit and competition. This year's event was hosted by Liz Bishop, news anchor at WRGB, CBS 6, and raised more than \$48,000 for the Eddy Visiting Nurse Association.

"The chefs work so hard, and the event is fun, fun, fun," said Michelle Mazzaco, director. The association's Volunteer Care Team program is one area that receives funding from the Cuisine Magic benefit.

Executive chef Timothy Vennard of the Normanside Country Club of Delmar was a bronze medal winner in the event.

New Scotland extends building halt

New Scotland town board members voted unanimously last week to extend a moratorium on development six more months to further review zoning changes and to clarify language in the zoning laws.

Councilman Richard Reilly said the board originally intended to review certain zoning laws, and as they were evaluated, he said, the need arose to make some of the language and details of the law more clear.

"As a result, it has taken longer than we originally thought," said Reilly. Initially it was thought all the recommended changes could have been made within the original six months.

"Instead, it's just taken me longer to come up with these recommendations than I had anticipated," said Reilly.

The town board first passed a six-month moratorium in September, citing unprecedented development, to suspend building in the northeast quadrant of town while the area's R-2 and MDR zoning, both of which support large-scale development, was reevaluated.

The original moratorium was passed in response to a residential petition that stated the current zoning didn't sufficiently protect the petitioners' area from development.

"My feeling is this will be a more ambitious six months," said Councilman Doug LaGrange, regarding the moratorium extension.

LaGrange, who voted against the original moratorium, voted in favor of the extension because the reviews during the second moratorium are going to be larger in scope and it has a more concrete focus than its predecessor, including a look at revisions to the town's comprehensive plan, which was adopted in 1994.

"Now it seems like it's the time to take that step and really go after something and get something done," said LaGrange.

Reilly said the changes to the comprehensive plan would not be substantive, but rather done in response to changes that have occurred in the town over the past 13 years.

"We're not proposing turning anything on its head," said Reilly. "It's got a decade under its belt, and it's time to look at it again."

At a public hearing held before the town board meeting, resident Edie Abrams thanked Reilly for his work, but said that she would like to see specific goals and a deadline included in the language of the law.

"In order to accomplish what we need to do, we need to lay out a specific plan," said Abrams.

Abrams, and others in attendance, said they felt the public had been left in the dark throughout the process.

Reilly responded that the process is taken in phases, alternating public information and comment sessions with the actual work being done. Reilly said the work being done on the zoning laws is detailed, especially in regard to the language, and many minor changes are made before the public is informed of the final results of the work.

"Once you have a firm proposal, I think the public process broadens and includes more people," said Reilly.

Abrams also said she would like to see a more "conceptual idea" of the changes, including diagrams of potential build-out.

"If you tell people, 'Between here and here we're going to zone it like this, and between here and here, we're going to zone it is like that,' they're not going to have a concept of what

it's like," said Abrams.

Reilly responded that there are too many variables in the results that zoning changes could have, and the important part is ensuring that the details of the document are accurate to set the parameters of how development in the town occurs.

"You can't draw a picture; this is an RA zone. You can't draw a picture; this is the MDR zone," said Reilly. "The reality is it's a 90-page document, and the devil is in the details." Exempt from the moratorium's restrictions are the maintenance, repair, replacement, and modification of existing commercial or industrial structures as long as the structure doesn't increase more than 50 percent. Any applications or permits pending before the passage of the law are exempt, as well as any residential subdivision involving the creation of not more than 10 lots.

Grants to help implement HAVA process in Albany

Albany County recently received three grants totaling more than \$300,000 to help assist the implementation of the federally mandated Help America Vote Act, or HAVA.

These grant applications, totaling \$318,000, were submitted in July 2006 and approved by the state board of elections in December. They received final approval by the county Legislature on Monday, March 12.

"These grants will help fund some of the startup costs of the county takeover of the election process. Without it, the cost to municipalities could be much greater," said Albany County's Republican Elections Commissioner John Graziano. "This will save local taxpayers a significant amount of money."

HAVA was established to protect voting rights and improve the electoral process following the 2000 presidential election, which hinged on a count of Florida

ballots from antiquated voting machines. As a result of HAVA guidelines, the state mandated the purchase of new voting equipment and required counties to oversee the election process.

Originally, Albany County intended to charge back the election costs to the

assist in securing a central storage facility, which will allow the board of elections to oversee all operations from a single location.

"We're going to be rolling out as many improvements to what we're improving as soon as possible," said Graziano.

According to Graziano, two of the grants were from the state and the other was a federal grant. One of the grants requires a 5 percent match, which is slightly less

than \$9,000.

Graziano said that the county was fortunate to receive the grants.

"The way things are going, we're lucky we submitted are grant applications when we did," said Graziano. "It frees up a significant amount of money."

The county has until this time next year to use the grant money, said Graziano, but could request an extension if the money has not been used by then.

municipalities, which in the past had been responsible for running their own elections. After municipal leaders voiced concerns regarding the high cost of the charge backs, a compromise was reached to share the burden, at a much lower cost than the \$1.6 million originally proposed. Much of the cost involves the purchase, transportation and storage of new machines.

Once a new voting system is selected for Albany County, part of the grant funding will be spent educating voters and poll inspectors on the use of the new technology. It will also

In addition to the centralized facility, the money could be used to transport the machines, develop public relations strategies, and develop a DVD and other training devices.

Funding will also be used to improve accessibility for the handicap at polling locations by the next election.

"Although new voting technology will not be in place for this year's elections, we can spend this money to ensure polling sites are able to accommodate voters with disabilities," Deputy Democratic Commissioner

Though rare, rabies is a real threat

A true stand-off of between man versus wild took place in Glenville this month, sending a chill down the collective spines of all local residents since, rare though they may be, attacks by rabid animals aren't just found in the movies.

Louise Scheuerman, 60, lives on Sanders Avenue in Scotia, a neighborhood that's a far cry from a wilderness location.

"The funny thing is, we just moved here in January, and where we used to live in Oswego County, it was very rural and there were miles of woods around," said Scheuerman. "There are woods behind my house here, but an animal attack was the last thing I ever thought about."

Scheuerman was taking out the garbage on a Monday evening when she heard vicious growling, and out of nowhere, something launched itself at her, knocking her over.

"When you're being attacked by a dog, you think to yourself, 'OK, this is a dog,'" said Scheuerman. "But this was making a horrible noise, and I didn't recognize what it was—it was like something from a Stephen King book."

"It was a fisher, a member of the weasel family, about 10 to 12 pounds with sharp fanged teeth. The frothing animal bit into her foot and refused to let go."

"The survival instinct kicked in, and although my first thought was to grab the animal with my hands, the rational part of my brain warned me not to," said Scheuerman. "I reached around and grabbed a fire extinguisher, thinking I could spray it, but I didn't have time to read the directions."

Instead, she whacked at the animal several times before it unlatched from her foot and ran away. Dazed and in shock, she limped inside and called her husband.

"He asked me if I'd called 9-1-1, but I hadn't even thought of that," Scheuerman admitted. "The whole incident probably lasted less than a minute, but it seemed like forever."

The fisher was tracked, located and killed, and then Scheuerman received what most people would say was the worst of news: The animal tested positive for rabies. Doctors at St. Claire's Hospital prepared her for the grueling series of rabies shots, the first of which had to be administered directly into the wound itself.

"One of the hardest things about the injection was I had to lie on my back, and I was all bruised and banged up from the fall," said Scheuerman. "But I didn't cry. I've had three children so I know pain. Honestly, the biting hurt far worse than the shot."

After the initial treatment, Scheuerman received another injection two days later, and will continue the course weekly until the end of the month. The remainder of the shots are given in the arm.

Remarkably composed about the ghastly incident, Scheuerman said she was glad it happened to an adult rather than a child.

"The animal would have mauled a child, and the shots would be very traumatic," she said. "It had been chasing around my neighbor's dog, so it was out there behaving aggressively for a while. People need to be aware and on the lookout for animals behaving strangely."

Rabies. The very word brings to mind strange animals frothing at the mouth, ravaging victims who then spend weeks undergoing painful injections, which at one time went directly into the stomach.

Although both of these images are myths (animals infected may have difficulty swallowing, and therefore may drool slightly; people receive injections now in the arm), the rabies virus is rare but still occurs around the Capital District.

"At any given time, we have a handful of people undergoing rabies treatments," said Marcia Fabiano, epidemiologist for the Albany County Health Department. "We do see many more cases during the summer because the bat population is higher and

many animals hibernate during the winter and come out in the spring."

Last year, 85 people received rabies treatments in the state, most from contact with bats in bedrooms. Last year the health department tested 252 bats and found just six to be infected. However, if someone is bitten and the bat can't be located, they will undergo treatments on the assumption they've been exposed.

"That's why we tell everyone to trap the bat safely, with a coffee can or something, to be tested," said Fabiano.

Instances of infection by wild creatures such as a fox, weasel, porcupine or woodchuck are unusual, Fabiano said.

"The vast majority of the cases are from scratches or bites by stray cats," said Fabiano. "Any mammal, even cows or deer, can contract rabies, but last year in New York state, we found 29 rabid cats and one rabid dog."

Smaller animals such as mice, rats and squirrels generally don't carry the disease, because they would die during the attack by another rabid animal.

"I get frequent calls from people with squirrel bites, but squirrels are by nature territorial and people try to feed them, which is a big mistake," said Fabiano. "Wildlife in any form isn't meant to be a pet."

Left untreated, the rabies virus attacks the central nervous system. By the time humans become symptomatic, it's too late.

"Symptoms range from tingling in the limbs to difficulty walking to changes in mental cognition," said Fabiano. "They can take months to appear, but once they do, rabies is fatal."

The National Center for Infectious Diseases recommends that post-exposure prophylaxis regimens be administered as quickly as possible following infection.

The treatment is a regimen of one dose of immune globulin and five doses of rabies vaccine over a 28-day period, starting as soon as possible after exposure. Additional doses of the vaccine are given on days three, seven, 14 and 28 after

the first vaccination. Current vaccines are relatively painless and are given in the arm.

If you are exposed to a potentially rabid animal, wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water, and seek medical attention immediately to have your risk for rabies exposure assessed. Having the following information will help: geographic location of the incident; type of animal involved, whether the exposure was provoked or unprovoked, the vaccination status of animal and whether the animal can be safely captured and tested for rabies.

Health care will depend on the circumstances of the bite. Health care practitioner generally consult with state or local health departments, veterinarians, or animal control officers to make an informed assessment of the incident and to request assistance.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) urges people to beware of outdoor animals, and never handle, feed, or unintentionally attract wild animals with open garbage cans or litter. Never adopting wild animals or try to nurse them to health. Call animal control or an animal rescue agency for assistance.

According to the CDC, bats are the most common source of rabies infection. Prevent bats from entering living quarters or occupied spaces where they might come in contact with people and pets.

When traveling abroad, avoid direct contact with wild animals and be especially careful around dogs in developing countries.

Before traveling abroad, consult with a health care provider, travel clinic, or your health department about the risk of exposure to rabies.

Scheuerman said her experience with the rabid fisher has given her a new perspective she hopes will be a lesson for other homeowners in the area.

"Rabies is something to be aware of," she said. "When I'm in St. Claire's, there are a bunch of other people in there getting rabies treatments, so it's out there, it does exist."

Determined not to let the attack change her way of thinking, Scheuerman has made it a point to get back outside, although it's difficult for her to look at the spot where the fisher threw itself at her.

"I cringed when I saw where he sat growling," she said. "I have to say, I can't go outside without giving a double take. I'm putting it all behind me; I've told myself to go back out with that damn bag of garbage. But, it will be a long time before I go to a zoo. And, I put that fire extinguisher right back where it was."

Scheuerman said she hopes the incident will remind people that wild animals are exactly that, not something cute or something to be unaware of.

"We all have to live together, but people have to be very watchful and very concerned," she said. "Rabies is out there. I'm just glad I got help quickly, and that good treatment is available. We don't need a mass panic, but we do need to be constantly watchful."

Montgomery, Rensselaer, Delaware, Otsego, Schoharie and Schoharie counties.

Throughout Region 4 and the state, the trend over the last decade has been to cut wildlife a break, and set aside small areas of lands slated for development. The key to the strategy has been to plan these areas so that they connect with neighboring wildlife spaces, said Parker.

But it doesn't always happen. Even if it does, many people don't like the thought of nature taking its course as packs of coyotes track deer and other mammals through these green highways in people's backyards.

In some instances, these wildlife refuges get overrun with higher-breeding mammals. Animals like squirrels breed and thrive in alarming numbers in suburban areas. The same can happen with deer. Those populations are out of reach of natural predators and licensed hunters.

Any attempt to exit these

"refugias," as Parker calls them, usually results in direct confrontation with humans. Birds fly into windows, deer jump in front of cars and competition drives some animals into people's backyards and sometimes their homes, said Stone.

"The real threat is not the wildlife. The real threat is us. We import exotic bushes, bring in invasive (plant) species and change the habitat," said Stone.

We make the ideal habitat for these animals, he said. The problem will get worse before it gets better.

If you build wildlife habitat, wildlife will come, said Parker. They are not just green areas to look at. The problem with people, he said, is that they think they understand nature.

"They have this image of Disney (World), that when you set land aside, everyone will live happily ever after," he said.

Both Stone and Parker recommend, although they have different takes on them, a management plan for people as they look to begin actively co-existing with nature again.

Stone has repeatedly pushed for the redevelopment of existing structures rather than tearing down and building new, or letting other properties sit in squalor while the empty lot down the street is cleared for development.

Parker has personally put his experience into the development of such areas, although some by law came before his agency for review and approval, as towns, cities and suburbs look to reconnect with wildlife.

He looks to each area in particular to gauge what it can sustain and what could come of it.

It's not always best practice to set aside a patch of wetland in accordance with regulation and then surround it by pavement, he said. And it is not always best practice to take 100 acres, build on 50 of them and leave the rest to wildlife. It simply depends.

"The bottom line is there is no easy answer. Get tolerant of the animals as much as you can," said Stone. "Be selective of how you deal with wildlife."

It's proactive ecology, said Stone.

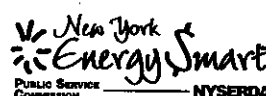

American Tunes

Symphony honors American music this month

Come see the Albany Symphony Orchestra take the "classic" out of classical music. If "classic" refers to traditional, old, and European, that is.

With three events in the next 10 days, which are the conclusion of the month-long American Music Festival sponsored by Key Bank, the symphony will perform no less than eight world premieres of American music with such nontraditional accoutrements as poetry, video and amplification.

The first, on Thursday, March 22, is called "Composing from the Inside Out" and is a chance to meet two composers, Peter Childs and George Tsontakis, whose music will be

played by the symphony in a concert two days later.

"It's for anyone who's ever been interested in how composers compose," said ASO's Musical Director David Alan Miller. "This is a really neat chance to climb inside the head of a living composer."

Through a question-and-answer session with the audience, Childs and Tsontakis will talk about their process and the compositions to be performed, said Miller. After the discussion, the symphony will rehearse the pieces, during which conductor and composers will wear microphones so that the audience can watch and hear as they bring the pieces to life.

"We try to feature composers who want to and need to and believe in communicating," said Miller. "This is a way to break down the barriers between

composers and audiences even more than usual."

"Composing from the Inside Out" will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Arts Center for the Capital Region in Troy. The rehearsal will take place at the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall. Tickets are \$20 from ASO (465-4755, www.albanysymphony.com).

Saturday, March 24, will bring "Casual Night at the Symphony," which opens with two melodramas by celebrated film composer, Bernard Hermann. Miller said the melodramas, which are spoken word with music, represent "a really old form that's rarely explored." The program will close with an excerpt from Hermann's film score for the Hitchcock film "North by Northwest."

Another narrated piece will be the world premiere of

Childs' "Down-Adown-Derry: A Fairy Suite for Orchestra and Narrator," which was inspired by early 20th century children's book illustrations by Albany native Dorothy Lathrop (and exhibited at the Albany Institute of History and Art).

"Peter was very touched by these drawings because they reminded him of the books he'd read as a child," said Miller. "He created this really charming set of miniature pieces for

orchestra inspired by the poems that went along with the illustrations."

Also on the program is Tsontakis' "Violin Concerto No. 1" featuring violinist Cho Liang Lin. Both Tsontakis and Lin hail from the Hudson Valley. The symphony will perform at 8 pm at the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall. Tickets are \$21 to \$42 (273-0038, www.troymusichall.org).

The following week, Miller and the symphony's new music ensemble, called Dogs of Desire, will be cramming to learn seven new pieces by young and emerging composers to get ready for a Friday, March 30, performance.

"The pieces have just begun coming in, so they're all brand-new, out-of-the-box," said Miller. "It's seven really great composers writing really original and unusual pieces."

Ken Eberhardt, who writes music for daytime TV, created a piece about karaoke and RPI professor Neil Rolnick wrote a piece that involves video.

The Dogs of Desire includes 16 members of the orchestra and two local female vocalists.

"The Dogs' concerts are a lot of fun, with wildly alternative music experiences," said Miller, who conducts the group.

The Dogs of Desire concert will be at 8 p.m. at the WMHT Television Studio in East Greenbush. Tickets are \$25 and available from the Palace Theatre (465-4663, www.palacealbany.com) or Ticketmaster (476-1000, www.ticketmaster.com).

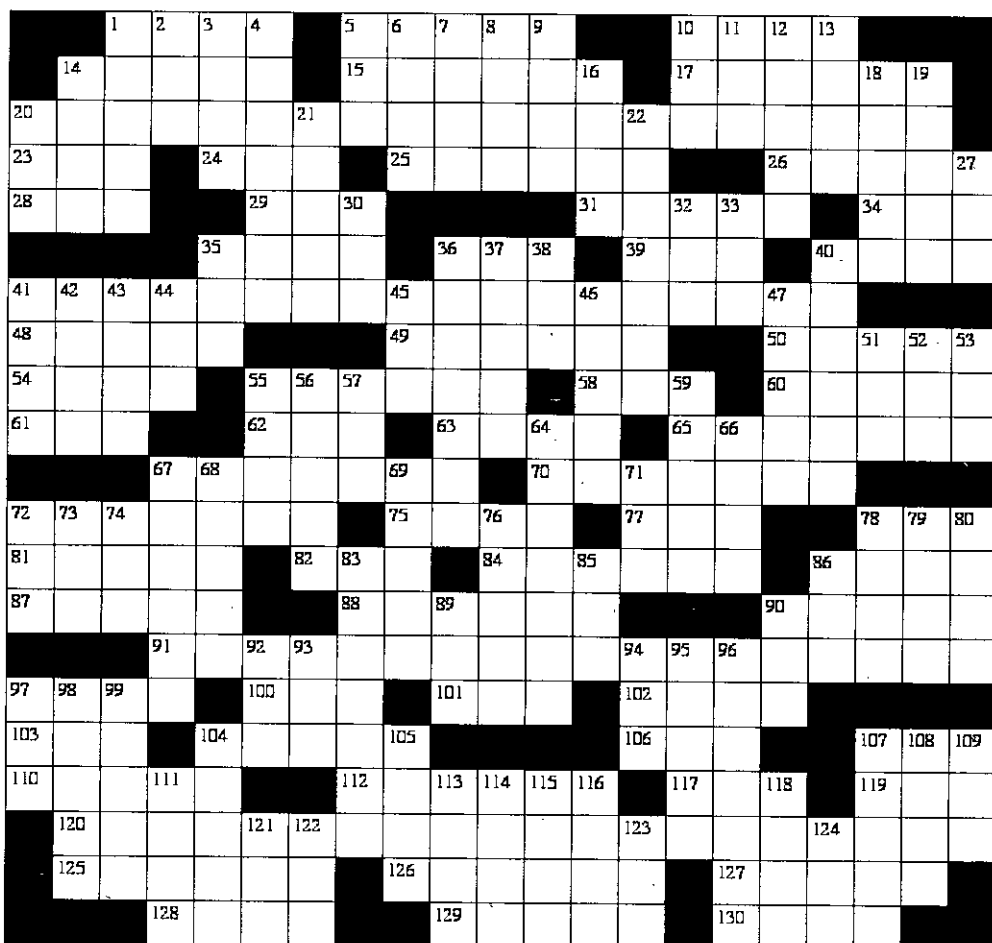

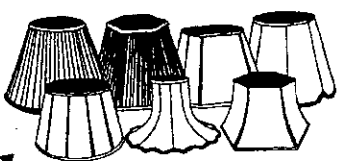

Basic swimming ability (a 25-yard front crawl with good breathing to the side without stopping) is needed to participate in the clinic.

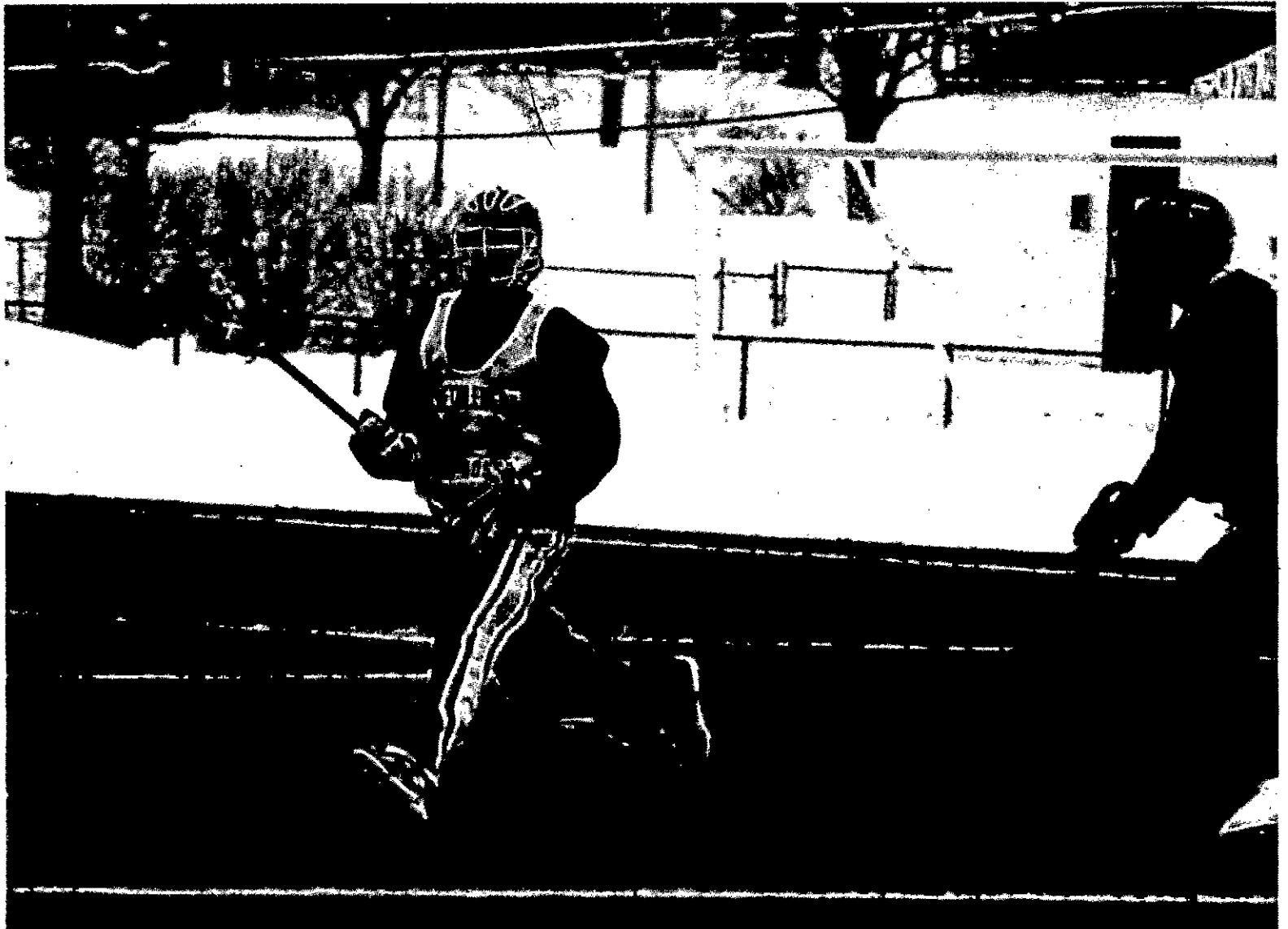
