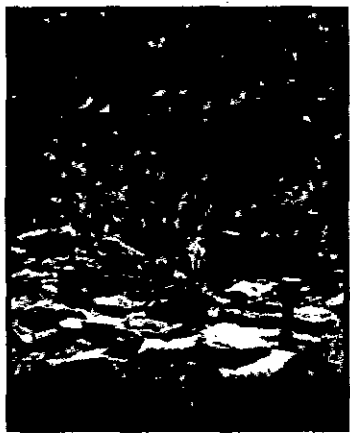

Setting an example



Good sportsmanship begins with parents

For many parents with children in sports, it can be hard to stay on the sidelines. Across the country, children, coaches and parents continue to look for a balance between competition and sportsmanship.

For parents and coaches, keeping the lines of communication open and having realistic expectations may be the way to keep the game positive, but it can sometimes be a struggle.

Many coaches believe the pressure some parents put on young athletes is a direct result of society's trend to push children at a younger age. Many children today are involved in organized sports as young as age 3. A lot of parents see it is a way to socialize and learn, but others hope it is the start of a successful athletic career.

Guilford youth soccer coach Tara Camardo said she fears that parents and children feel that if they

are not actively involved at a young age, they may never be able to catch up.

"Sports are supposed to be a great way for children to find a path for themselves, to be part of something, part of a team. I worry that some kids may be left behind because they were not on a team from an earliest age possible. It is important for coaches and organizations to make sure they give every child an opportunity, no matter what," said Camardo.

Camardo said it is important for parents to have realistic expectations of their child's abilities. She said she stresses to her youth soccer team that the whole idea behind a team is that each person is important and their contribution is what makes the team a success as a whole. She said that while she feels competition is healthy, it is important

School officials raise post-election concerns

Union campaign contributions and automated call tactics questioned

Two concerns regarding what could be seen as influence peddling have been raised

by a member of the Bethlehem school board and the superintendent after this week's district budget vote.

Although residents overwhelmingly approved the 2007-2008 school budget (see related story on page 22), outgoing board member Richard Svenson said he believes there is room for caution regarding the funding of future school elections, referring to events in a nearby district.

The teachers union in the Guilford school district endorsed two candidates and attempted to fund those candidates by giving each a \$500 contribution.

Svenson said he believed teachers unions should not be financially contributing to a school board candidate.

"It just bothered me somewhat that unions were going that far in a district not too far

GOP endorses investor

Jim Grady to challenge Jack Cunningham for supervisor post

Momentum is building for Jim Grady in his attempt to become the next Bethlehem supervisor.

The already-declared Independence Party candidate has now received the endorsement of the Bethlehem Republican Committee. The endorsement means Grady's name will appear on two lines this fall as he tries to unseat interim Supervisor Jack Cunningham, a Democrat, who took over following Theresa Egan's resignation in April.

"They contacted me and asked me if I was interested," said Grady, who interviewed in front of the committee last week.

Grady, who considers himself a fiscal conservative, said he would not run on a line that is not consistent with his own philosophy.

"Taxes are the biggest problem facing the town," said Grady, who is punctuating his campaign by attempting to donate 25,000 trees to residents this year.

"I started planting trees in 1976 and it's a way to keep me connected to trees and the importance of the environment."

Grady said he has already handed out up to 4,000 trees in the past month including free Colorado blue spruce, Norway spruce, and Serbian spruce trees.

"I would like to see Bethlehem become a National Arbor Foundation Tree City USA," Grady said.

Members of the town board including Cunningham, Kyle Kotary and Sam Messina have all received trees from Grady.

Delmar man charged on warrant

A Delmar resident is charged with criminal possession of stolen property and possession of a forged instrument following an arrest warrant issued by Bethlehem police.

Bouck was processed and

Bouck has a return court date set for later this month.

Buckle up blitz begins this week

New York State Police Troop G is holding a "Buckle Up New York" campaign from Monday, May 21, through Saturday, June 3.

The campaign is part of the state's "zero tolerance" seat belt enforcement blitz that will combine the efforts of more than 500 police agencies statewide. Troopers, deputies and local police across the state will staff safety restraint checkpoints and dedicated patrols in the ongoing "Click it or Ticket - Buckle Up New York" campaign.

The Memorial Day holiday weekend is considered the unofficial opening of the summer travel season.

"Buckling up clearly saves lives, and if you don't, you will be ticketed," said Major Patricia M. Groeber, Troop G commander. "Unfortunately,

too many New Yorkers still need a reminder, and we're going to provide it."

Recent statistics indicate that roughly 15 percent of motorists in New York still fail to wear safety restraints, and police believe the number is higher during nighttime hours.

"It's tragic and unnecessary, but someone we know will likely die or be unnecessarily injured for failing to take one simple step: buckling up," Groeber said. "It really is a matter of life and death."

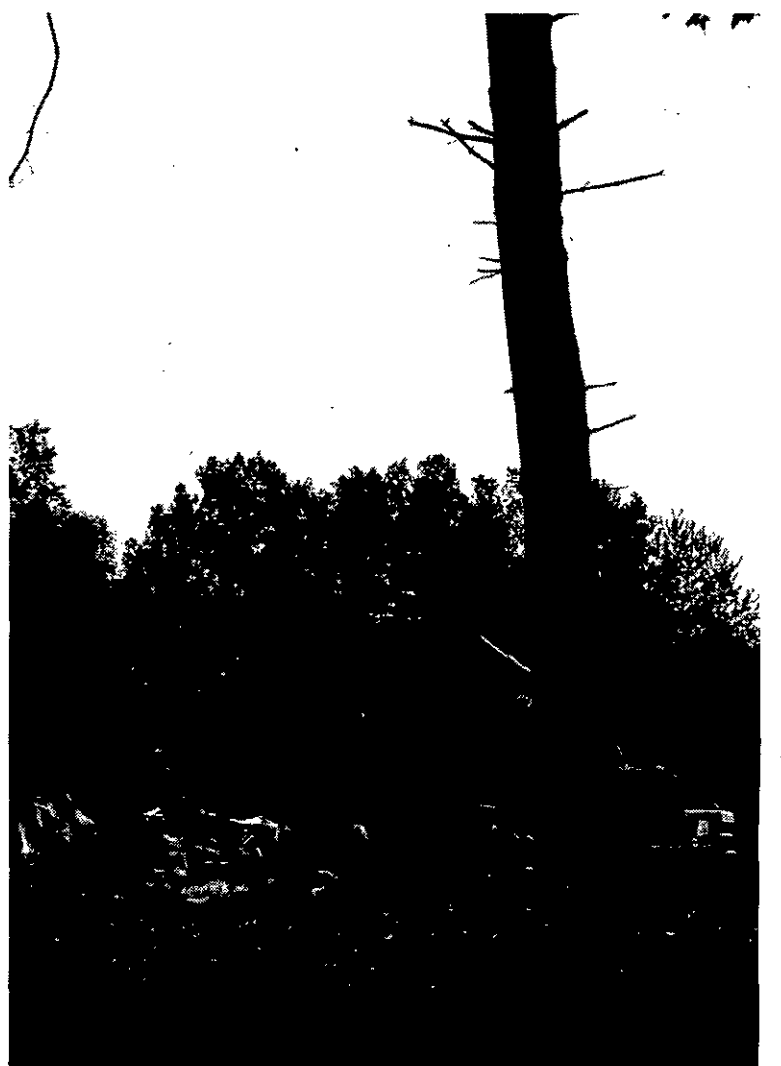
According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), highway crashes killed 33,329 motor vehicle occupants during 2006 and more than 55 percent of those victims were not wearing their safety restraints. Crashes also kill

more children between the ages of 2 and 14 than any other cause.

Last year during Buckle Up America Week, which included the Memorial Day holiday weekend, state police investigated six fatal crashes in New York that claimed nine lives. Authorities believe four of those killed would likely be alive today if they had been wearing seatbelts. During that same period, troopers issued 10,695 safety restraint citations, including 293 for child seat violations.

Law enforcement agencies in New York initiated the Buckle Up New York campaign in 1999. Highway safety advocates said they hope New York will ultimately surpass the 90 percent mark for seat belt use.

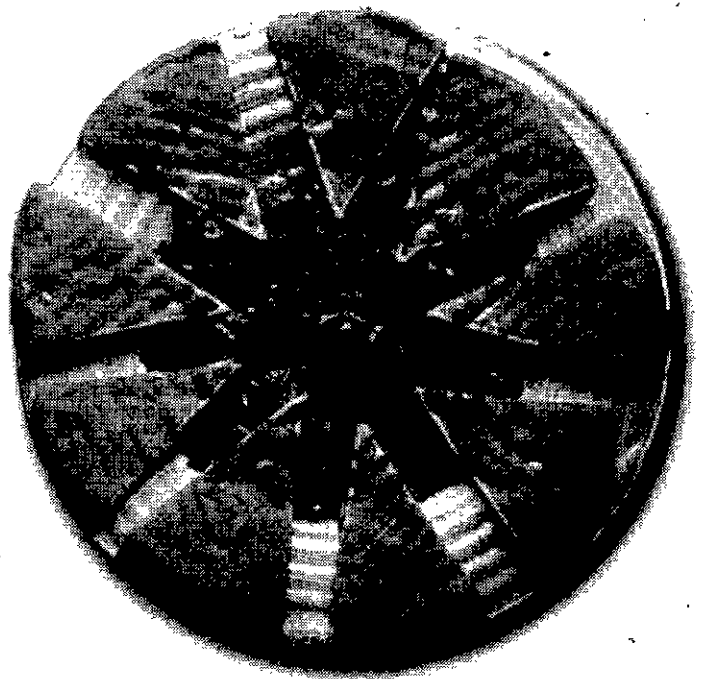

Couple makes room for wildlife

Glenmont backyard named a habitat area by National Wildlife Federation

Theresa and David Pillittere's backyard at 75 Henderson Road in Glenmont was named a Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation for attracting a variety of birds, butterflies and other wildlife that help add diversity the local environment.

"We're thrilled," said Theresa Pillittere. "We always thought of our backyard as a natural habitat."

For a site to be considered a Wildlife Habitat, certain criteria need to be met. "A site must provide food, water, cover and places to raise young," said Mary Burnette, spokeswoman for the NWF.

There are currently 75,000 certified habitats nationwide, with about 2,000 of those in New York.

"The number of people trying to receive certification has escalated the past few years because of habitat loss in communities," Burnette added.

Creating a wildlife habitat, according to the NWF, also reduces pollution that can lead to global warming. The average size of a habitat is between one-third to one-half acre and can be found on urban balconies and thousand-acre areas.

The Pillitteres said they

have been maintaining and adding to their habitat site since they purchased the Henderson Road property 13 years ago.

Recently spotted wildlife include a blue heron, the steady flow of blue jays, bluebirds and robins one can find in many backyards and woods throughout the Northeast.

"We have a robin's nest in one of our trees at eye level," said Pillittere.

There are two main areas to the Pillitteres' habitat: a large perennial garden on one side and a "forever wild" area on the other side of the property.

"It's always a work in progress. Like life, it's always a journey," Pillittere said.

Theresa Pillittere works on the garden when she comes home from work, and her husband, David, who recently retired, spends much of the day maintaining the site. At night, they sit out on their deck and watch the wildlife come and go.

"We are trying to give back and keep a part of this land forever wild," Pillittere said.

The Pillitteres will receive a one-year subscription to the award-winning National Wildlife magazine and receive an NWF special outdoor sign designating their yard or garden as wildlife-friendly.

Delmar man takes county legislative spot

Thomas Cotrofeld to fill seat left vacant by new town supervisor

The Albany County Legislature made official the appointment of Thomas J. Cotrofeld of Delmar to the 34th district seat on Monday, May 14.

Cotrofeld's appointment completes a series of resignations and appointments that began with the resignation of Theresa Egan as Bethlehem supervisor last month. Egan resigned to take a position as deputy commissioner in the state Department of Motor Vehicles.

The Bethlehem Town Board then replaced Egan with Jack

Cunningham, the 34th district legislator. Cunningham resigned his part-time county legislative seat to take the supervisor position on April 12. That move left his seat vacant until Cotrofeld's appointment last week.

"Tom is very well qualified, and I think he will do a great job," said Cunningham. Cotrofeld is a member of the Bethlehem planning board, having served in that position for the past three and a half years. He has announced he will resign from the town planning board.

"He brought strong, intellectual resources to the town planning board, and he was someone who always did his homework," said Parker Mathusa, town planning board chairman.

Cotrofeld, a Democrat, will complete the remaining seven and a half months of Cunningham's four-year term, which expires Dec. 31.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to serve the residents of the 34th district as an advocate and to voice their concerns," Cotrofeld said. "I believe that by leveraging any experience in the private and public sectors, it will enable me to contribute to the legislative process in a positive way."

Cotrofeld holds a degree in accounting and has been employed by General Electric since 1968. He has spent the past 16 years as government contract negotiator and administrator for GE Global Research.

"Mr. Cotrofeld is well qualified to serve the residents of the 34th district," said Albany County Majority Leader Frank Comisso, D-Albany.

Cotrofeld is also a treasurer for the Bethlehem Town Democratic Committee and a member of the Albany County Democratic Committee. Cotrofeld thanked the town planning board members he worked with and said he will be a candidate for the legislative seat in the November election.

"I have really enjoyed this," said Cotrofeld. "It was a difficult choice, but I would like to effect some change on the county level to the betterment of the town."

Cotrofeld said he believes one of his primary focuses will be to balance the tax base along with encouraging economic growth. He has already been appointed to the county's conservation and resources committee.

"I would like to maintain and preserve trails and green space throughout Delmar," said Cotrofeld.

Everyone wins when class is the name of game

The young boy stepped up to the window. He asked for a green Gatorade, a red Gatorade and sour Nerds. I repeated his order, stalling for time.

It was my first time staffing the concession stand at the softball field. I had no idea where any of those items were. Why didn't the kid just order a hot dog? Hot dogs are \$1.50, and I know where to find them.

The veteran concession stand workers had assured the newbies to not worry about locating the items. They said to just ask the kids.

I wanted to appear knowledgeable and professional. I figured I'd do a quick search first and only ask for help if necessary.

I turned around and faced the shelves of candy. Luckily, I immediately spotted the Nerds box. It was on the top row. I reached in and saw that there were different varieties. Please let there be the sour kind, I thought to myself. I found them.

Meanwhile my husband had retrieved the Gatorade bottles from the refrigerated drink unit. I checked the price board and did the math in my head: Two drinks at \$1.50 cents each plus 50 cents for the candy.

"That will be \$3.50," I told the customer. His little brother replied, "But he only has \$4."

Were they trying to trick me? "Four dollars is more," explained the older child to the younger one. I gave the 50 cents change and wondered if a parent would ever see those quarters.

I had felt a certain amount of pressure waiting for customers inside the concession stand. Would I be able to locate the foods? Would I charge the correct price? Would I calculate the correct change? What if I dropped something? What if a big crowd arrived at once?

I needn't have worried. The

volunteers supported one another. We worked as a team, assembling and providing the customers' orders.

I handled a total of about four transactions before leaving the concession stand in the able hands of my spouse and the other parent volunteer. Only two adults were needed, and since Jeff was willing to represent our family, I went to the bleachers for a better view of my daughter's softball game.

Four transactions may not seem like a lot, but I felt rather accomplished. After all, I found the sour Nerds and Rainbow Rice Krispies treats, I made proper change without a calculator, and I remembered to place the \$20 bill in the special compartment in the cash box. Maybe next time I'd have the opportunity and confidence to don the plastic gloves and serve the hot dogs or take the fresh-baked cookies out of the oven. After that, who knows, maybe I could open my own restaurant.

I like being at the softball games, more than I would have imagined. And it's not because I'm a big sports fan. In fact, I'm not much into sports at all.

A few weeks into softball season, my 10-year-old asked me to give her two reasons why I don't play sports.

First I wondered what precipitated the question and why she had requested "two reasons." Why didn't she just say, "What is the reason you don't play sports?" Did she assume there were multiple reasons, but that I'd only give one? Did she worry that I'd have a long list of reasons and just wanted a short answer?

Then I wondered if I'd have trouble falling asleep if I engaged in a discussion about my

shortcomings in athletics. Did I really want to dredge up those "picked last in gym class" stories so close to bedtime?

Well, she wanted two reasons and the best answers are honest answers.

I told my daughter that my reasons for not playing sports all blend together. First, since I'm not a competitive person, I don't like to worry about who is winning and who is losing. Generally speaking, most people who play sports are competitive.

Second, since I'm not particularly athletic, I have always shied away from sports for fear of letting down the team.

My sports experience is based in gym class. As a batter, I mostly struck out. I'm a lefty, and when I did hit the ball, it usually traveled toward first base. And I wasn't a fast runner, so the ball got to first before I did.

Perhaps I could have developed my athletic abilities, built up stamina and learned to run faster. I may have grown disinterested in being involved with sports because I lacked ability. In turn, by not being involved in sports, I limited my opportunity to improve my ability.

I told Rachel that I had wanted to play ball as a kid, but I was too afraid to try. And this, I explained, is why I am so proud of her for participating in softball, and also in soccer.

Elementary school age children have the opportunity to play in sports leagues, learn skills, and most importantly, be a part of a team.

I watch these games as an adult and I see that lots of kids strike out and lots of kids get called out at first. And at least at this point, in girls' softball, the kids don't get down on one another.

The girls actually cheer each other on. And they yell, "Good try," even when the batter strikes out. And so do the coaches. And so do the parents.

That doesn't mean these folks don't care about winning. They all want to win.

Well, perhaps all but me. I'd prefer all games be a tie. For me, the most important thing is for the kids to try their best and have lots of fun. In fact, when someone asks me if I know the score, I say, "It's fun to fun," even if the real score is "six to four." The other parents roll their eyes at me.

For me, the entire experience is about building self-confidence in our daughters.

I root for kids on both teams. Sometimes I get confused, like when this year's team plays last year's team. I'll suddenly realize: hey, that's the color and logo from last year; we're the maroon shirts now.

It makes me want to sing:
"Take me out to the ball game."

Take me out to the crowd.
The kids ask for hot dogs and Gatorade.

Nobody wants the nice sandwich I made.

We all root, root, root for our daughters:

The visitors AND home team.

Yes, we cheer for kids on both sides

And raise self-esteem."

The girls are dedicated to the sport. At one game, the pitcher on the opposing team got hit in the ankle with the ball. As luck would have it, her mom was doing concession stand duty at the time (no one wants to witness their kid getting hurt). Mom was notified and went for an ice pack, but her 10-year-old withstood the discomfort and never left the mound. She finished the inning!

Earlier in the same game, our batter scored a home run. And after she crossed home plate the catcher from the opposing team shook her hand. I thought, wow, these girls are classy. They give it their all and they also display good sportsmanship.

And for that, everyone comes out a winner.

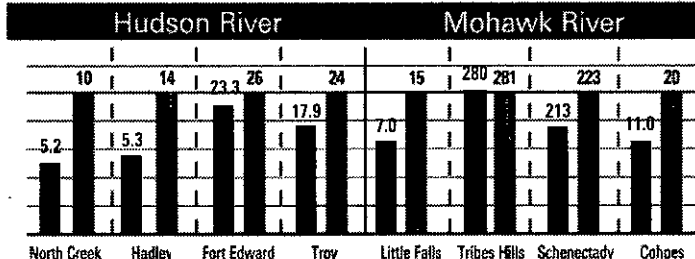

Voorheesville school, RCS residents OK budget

In what turned out to be the narrowest margin of approval since 2003, voters in the Voorheesville Central School District passed the approximately \$21 million dollar budget 592-to-512.

The budget represents an increase of \$974,601 for next year, a 4.85 percent increase over the current year's budget.

"We're very pleased about the confidence the community has shown and the support they have given to our programs, and we look forward to the upcoming school year," said Superintendent Linda Langevin.

Despite the fact that this year's margin was tight, with only 53 percent of votes in favor, it is in line with past votes. The current budget vote was approved by 55 percent, similar to 2005 (56.5 percent), 2004 (55.5 percent) and 2003 (50.39 percent).

This 2007-2008 budget added a second-grade teacher, a district social worker for at-risk students, and maintained the programs and services provided in 2006-2007. Other teaching staff changes addressed special education program requirements and two additional business classes.

"We were gratified to the voters that they chose to approve the budget," said school board president David

Gibson. "At the same time we understand that it is a burden, and we feel a responsibility to make sure that money is used carefully to benefit the students and the taxpayers."

In a vote of 676-to-414, residents approved the purchase of one 60-passenger bus and three Chevrolet Suburbans to replace current vehicles. The district expects

to receive a little more than 50 percent in state aid for the duration of the five-year bond. The maximum estimated cost of the proposition was \$207,470.

Timothy Blow won the one available seat on the

school board by more than 100 votes.

The Voorheesville Library's \$928,280 budget passed. It is a 5.5 percent increase from last year and will increase the library's materials budget to improve and expand the collection, enrichment programs, and to develop a building plan that meets the present and future needs of the district residents.

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk District residents on Tuesday, May 15, approved the \$41.08 million budget for the 2007-2008 school year by a vote of 847-to-687.

Residents also approved a bus proposition authorizing the purchase of four buses at a cost not to exceed \$360,000. The vote count for the proposition was 876-to-641.

In the school board elections, in which seven candidates vied for five seats on the board, the following candidates won seats: Jeffrey Sorensen with 894 votes; John Vadney with 891; Cynthia Elliott, an incumbent, with 886; Tracey Traver with 877; and Mike Varney, an incumbent, with 802.

Not elected were John Semenick, an incumbent, with 640 votes, and Keith Livengood, who received 532 votes.

The top three vote getters received three-year terms, the fourth won a two-year unexpired term and the fifth a one-year, unexpired term.

"I'd like to thank all of the voters for their support and encouragement. We are ecstatic that we are able to continue moving the district forward in a good way," said Superintendent Vicki Wright.

The budget will increase spending by 3.51 percent and the amount to be raised by taxes by 4.45 percent.

The tax increase is the lowest proposed in RCS in the past four years and would result - when combined with property reassessments taking place in Coeymans - in tax rate decreases in three of the district's four towns.

The proposed budget is also \$80,000 less than the district could have spent under a contingency

budget.

Passage of the budget adds another half-day of pre-kindergarten.

The budget restores after-school programs cut over the past two years; increases nursing coverage in the schools to meet increased student needs; restores foreign language classes to seventh grade; and provides funding for Project Lead the Way, which would institute a new technology curriculum starting in the seventh grade next year that would help students understand the real life implications of the technology, math and science skills they are learning.

The budget also provides funding to continue community access to the district's facilities, including the continuing education program and Aquatics Center.

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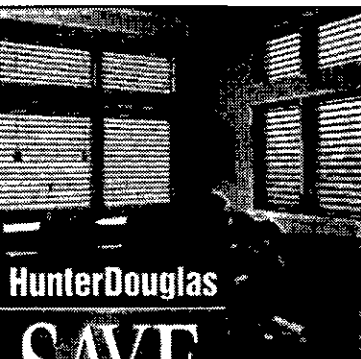

New Scotland plans debris pickup

Bagged lawn and yard debris, as well as brush and tree limbs will be picked up from the town's curb until May 25. Lawn and yard debris must be bagged in bio-degradable bags, which can be purchased from Town Hall Monday to Friday, 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Cost is 3 bags for \$1. Bags purchased at local grocery and department stores are also acceptable. Losers are winners, too

Nothing is harder than watching your own child experience disappointment, especially publicly.

Perhaps this is why some parents turn into brutes at sporting events, loudly coaching their own children from the sidelines, sometimes chastising them, and worst of all, berating players on the opposite team or questioning a coach or referee's motives.

With all sporting contests, there's a winner and a loser. Our Page 1 centerpiece this week addresses some issues about kids and sports.

Kids can learn early life lessons from sports. It's great when coaches of 4- and 5-year-olds tell them that the game was a tie. It's also good that every little one gets time on the field — even if they spend it picking daisies instead of staying with the play.

Pretty quickly, though, kids figure out that one team scores more than the other, and here's where coaches and parents really need to be the grown-ups. There's no crime in losing; it's the best opportunity for performance assessment, re-evaluation and figuring out how to do better next time.

Learning to accept losses gracefully and congratulating the better players are valuable lessons. If we teach our children to say, "I can do better next time," then study the person who did better in the game, we give them a great tool for parts of life that will involve things more important than a home run.

As they move through life, rather than envy the person who scored more points, got a better grade, got that promotion or bought a bigger house, they will learn from them rather than feel cheated.

Teaching kids to evaluate losses can also let kids find the places where they fit best. If baseball's not their sport, maybe soccer is. If no sport is their sport, they can look into things that really get them inspired and be successful there.

The greatest lesson to be learned from participating in sports is being part of the team, not just an individual.

Let's not cheat our children of a lesson they can use for the rest of their lives.

Weekdays with Harry

It began with a phone call on a day snow was falling. The call was from an old acquaintance, whom I'd written about years ago when she retired from teaching in Ballston Spa and her co-workers built a tree house in her backyard, where she could lounge and read. I don't think Marian did much lounging in the limbs of that willow tree, and perhaps not much reading.

Marian's husband, Harry, who is 85, had a long-term illness that I never concerned myself with. He rarely ventured outside; I don't remember seeing him watch any of the progress of that tree house. Harry was a writer, I knew that, but I didn't have time to take any interest in learning about his work.

Now six or so years later, Marian was calling me with a question: Did I have the time to help Harry with his writing, mostly typing but a bit of editing?

I really didn't have time. With three children, freelance writing work and a regular reporting beat with Spotlight Newspapers, I'm generally strung out. But something in Marian's voice made me agree to visit her and Harry later that week.

The snow subsided. Marian's driveway was glazed with ice as I slopped through the slush and tapped the Victorian knocker on their chipping yellow door.

Marian looked exactly the same. But as soon as I was inside the house, I was struck by a sharp odor and the steady sound of chugging machinery. Harry sat in a large leather recliner that took up much of the living room. The humming machine was his respirator.

Attached at his neck, it robbed him of speech, and three times while I was there, the tube clogged and he sputtered, removing the plastic tube to tap out the mucous. For those several seconds while the tube was out, Harry did not breathe.

A large stained sheet, dotted with faded flowers, was draped over Harry's lap, and I realized the strong smell was urine as he emptied his bladder through a funnel into a long-necked container.

To say Harry had a pallor is putting it mildly. He was ashen gray. His large hands were shaking. But his eyes were bright, and he winked at me to say hello. I realized I was speaking too loudly and too slowly to Harry, as people tend to do when conversing with any person challenged by a disability who nonetheless possesses perfect hearing.

Harry has chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, which is robbing him of his ability to breathe much as the way emphysema chokes people.

But that first Friday I saw him, and every day after that, Harry was writing. On yellow legal pads, note cards and squares of cardboard, in loopy handwriting, Harry was sketching out revisions to his previously published works. A former creative writing teacher, his short stories and non-fiction narratives received high acclaim in the 1970s.

"He lives to write," Marian told me simply.

I copied Harry's stories onto a CD and gathered the armfuls of notes to type up at home. Harry watched me closely, then scribbled a note to his wife to tell me I look like his former college girlfriend, Shirley. Shirley must have made him happy, because Harry had a glint in his eye when he talked about her.

I wanted to run away from the stark reality of Harry's illness. As I skittered over the ice back to my car, I couldn't imagine returning to the house with the yellow door.

I downloaded Harry's work and sat for hours deciphering his handwriting and inserting paragraphs of text into his published stories. It was then I realized that most of his sentences were senseless, wandering words strung together that formed no cohesive thought. He wrote about his wee little wife, who was named Gretchen, not Marian, and about Paul Newman and dreams of a man with a knife.

He wrote about speeding in a Miata to Chicago, where he turned onto the Henry Hudson Parkway. Harry wrote about a woman named Leslie

Gold Gold, living inside a Teflon womb, and being "beshrieved."

But page after page, Harry wrote about the multiple rejections of his novels and stories. Whether fact or fiction, Harry wrote about taking to his bed, downing shots of something he called cherry herring, only rising when his wee little wife roused him by leaving him notes with Emily Dickinson-style verses.

I do not edit Harry's work. I correct punctuation and make my best guesses about some of the scrawled words. But Harry's work held surprises: words I'd never heard sailed through my computer's spell check, their meaning unknown to me, a "solipstic" vacuum, "threnodies" and "velocities."

In Harry's work are moments of staggering beauty. He wrote about being on a dance floor with his son, and about writing being intoxicating, equivalent to love. He called himself the world's scarecrow, and someone else who moved in "Gothic waltzes."

I worried whether Harry's new pages would make sense to him, or whether he'd think I'd done a hatchet job with his words. But after I handed him the pages, and returned a few days later, I found he'd gone through his own work with a close eye, making small corrections like a sharp editor. Clearly, to Harry there was meaning to the Teflon womb and the character named Leslie Gold Gold.

I continue to be Harry's typist. I circle words with a green pencil that I can't decipher from his notes. I go to their house about once a week and have tea with Marian. We talk about the classic movies Harry and Marian watch in the middle of the night, because they rarely sleep. We talk about Shirley. I tell them about my children's school days and soccer seasons, and I squelch the urge to run in the face of Harry's illness.

I don't know how long Harry will live. Perhaps into the summer, when Marian can open the windows and let the smell of flowers into the room where Harry spends his days and nights. I don't know if he'll be hospitalized at the end. I think not. I think Harry will do as he's done for the last 70 years: revise his work, gaze lovingly at his wife's face, and dream of being published one more time. Anything I can do to help him achieve this, I will do, for they've given back to me far more than I could ever do for them. Harry is still, and will always be, a writer and a teacher. He and Marian, in those few hours inside their home, have something to teach me, and for the first time in more years than I care to count, I feel like someone's angel.

In addition, trees across the field on the side toward the Delmar Bypass are also scheduled to be cut down! According to the May issue,

As the result of the May 15 Bethlehem school district election there will be 15 new buses. More automobile fumes around the school due to less greenery to screen the fumes will dominate the air. Is shrinking green space what we really want for the town of Bethlehem? Pesticides aren't necessary

Editor, The Spotlight:

It is not necessary for the town of Bethlehem to spread potentially hazardous toxic chemicals on the athletic fields at Elm Avenue Park or Colonial Acres Golf Course to try to stop the spread of grubs in the turf.

Milky spore (*Bacillus popilliae*) is an environmentally friendly alternative that is easy to apply and does not pose any harmful threat to children or pets.

According to Cornell University, between 1939 and 1953, more than 100 tons of spore powder was applied to turf in more than 160,000 sites in the U.S. as part of a government program. Larval numbers in the turf decreased 10- to 20-fold and the population stabilized at this new low level with corresponding reductions in the levels of adult beetle damage. (www.nysaes.cornell.edu/ent/biocontrol/pathogens/bacillus_popilliae.html)

According to the U.S. EPA, spores of *Bacillus popilliae* infect larvae (grubs) of Japanese beetles, eventually killing the larvae and preventing their development into adult beetles. As a pesticide active ingredient, the spores of this bacterium are approved for use on lawns and ornamental plants around residential areas.

The spores also infect larvae of some closely related beetles, but do not infect other non-target organisms, such as other insects, birds, mammals, earthworms, and plants. No harm is expected to humans or the environment from use of pesticide products containing spores of *B. popilliae*. http://www.epa.gov/pesticides/biopesticides/ingredients/factsheets/factsheet_054502.htm

Before they jump to a potentially hazardous conclusion, I urge the town of Bethlehem to take a look at the Web site of the maker of Milky spore, St. Gabriel Laboratories at www.milkyspore.com/milkyspore.htm

and consider using this product.

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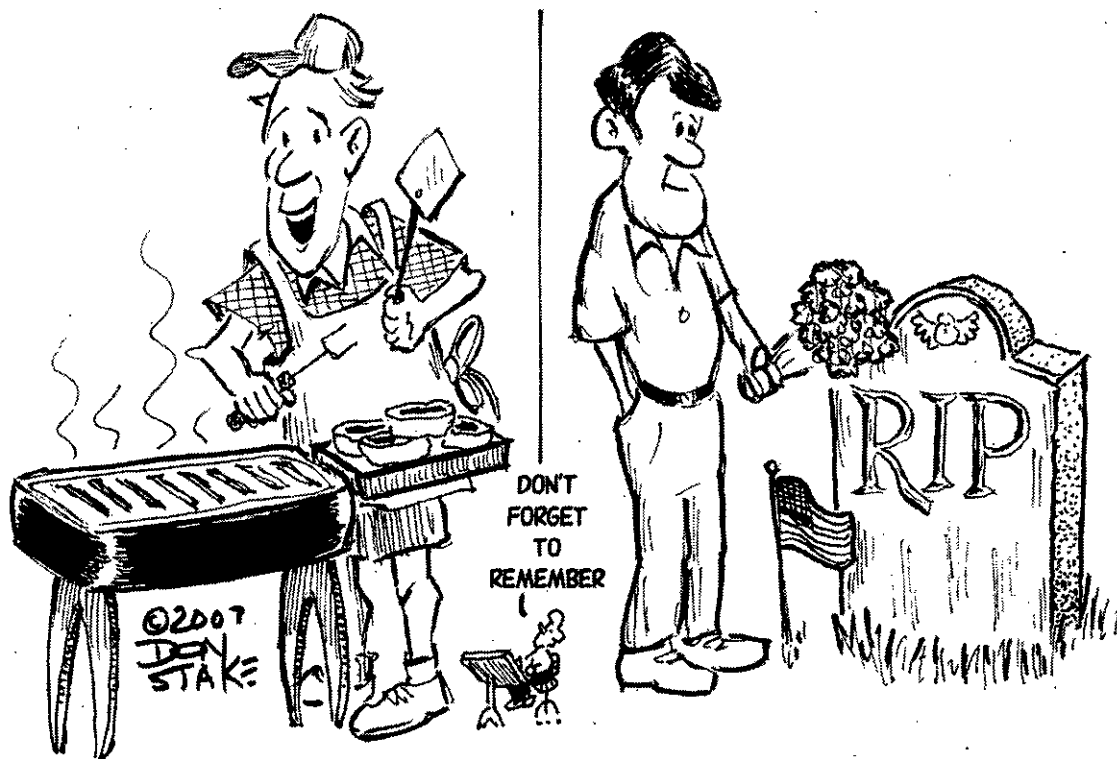

Town should stay with pesticide ban

Editor, The Spotlight:

I encourage the town of Bethlehem to stick with its decision not to use pesticides on town property and especially on the sports fields where children play. I didn't know until reading the article "Grubs A Gnawing Concern" (Spotlight, May 16) that Bethlehem had passed such a law. The city of Albany had the foresight to adopt a similar policy years ago, and within the next few years I expect many more townships will do the same. It's appalling to me that parents are calling for the use of pesticides where their children play. I would ask the parents who are concerned about possible "twisted ankles" on the fields to do a bit of research into the long-term, very serious effects pesticide exposure can have on children. Children are more susceptible to pesticide exposure. They take in

more of it relative to body weight than adults.

According to beyondpesticides.org, the U.S. EPA, National Academy of Sciences, and American Public Health Association, among others, have voiced concerns about the danger that pesticides pose to children. The body of evidence in scientific literature shows that pesticide exposure can adversely affect a child's neurological, respiratory, immune, and endocrine system, even at low levels. Several pesticides are also known to cause or exacerbate asthma symptoms. Pesticide residue last much longer than the 24-hour period listed on the little signs posted by the lawn care companies. It's my opinion that people who try to achieve perfect lawns are selfish and foolish. What a waste of time and money, not to mention the damage caused to our environment, and to human and pet health as well. Bethlehem residents should consider themselves very lucky they don't have to deal with pesticide exposure on town property. If you want "safe" playing fields for your children, stick with the no pesticide policy.

Planning board accepts Vista Tech Park draft

Next stop – town board

The Vista Technology Park master plan moved one step closer to the Bethlehem Town Board with the planning board accepting the draft master plan and MEDD, mixed economic development district.

Mike Morelli, assistant economic development director and Jeff Lipnicky, town planner, presented the Vista Park draft master plan at the Tuesday, May 15, meeting of the planning board.

Vista includes an initial phase one build-out of 250,000 square feet and the project will eventually encompass 1.4 million square feet when

complete. It is being built behind Price Chopper on Route 85.

The majority of the first development is considered primary use, or research and technology space. Developers Saratoga Associates said they

mix of retail and office space. A restaurant along with a four-story hotel is also expected to be built on site.

"The proposed hotel, once a part of phase one, is now a part of phase two in the draft master plan," said Morelli.

The reason for that change, according to developers, is that hotel construction is dependent on technology and office space occupants entering the Vista campus first.

Vista sits on four separate parcels of land in the towns of New Scotland and Bethlehem, with a majority of the project inside Bethlehem town boundaries. About one-third of the 450 total acres will be developed, and 4,000 new jobs are expected over a 10-year period.

are confident they will be able to attract enough technology-based companies that will allow for 80 percent of the project to fall into the primary use category. An additional 20 percent of the Vista campus, when developed, will be secondary use and include a

According to information in the final environmental impact statement, Vista will include a recreation and interpretive trail on site along with a secondary perimeter trail. There will be one roundabout on site and two bus stops. The state Department of Transportation is currently constructing a Slingerlands Bypass that will allow easy access to Vista. Developers are expected to install a 12-inch water main

on site. Expected sewer use capacity for the park at full site build-out will be 194 gallons per minute.

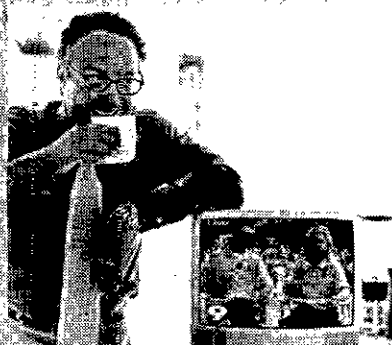

Everyone is welcome to play or to listen to live acoustic music. The Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy recently announced the winners of its Mohawk Valley Views contest.

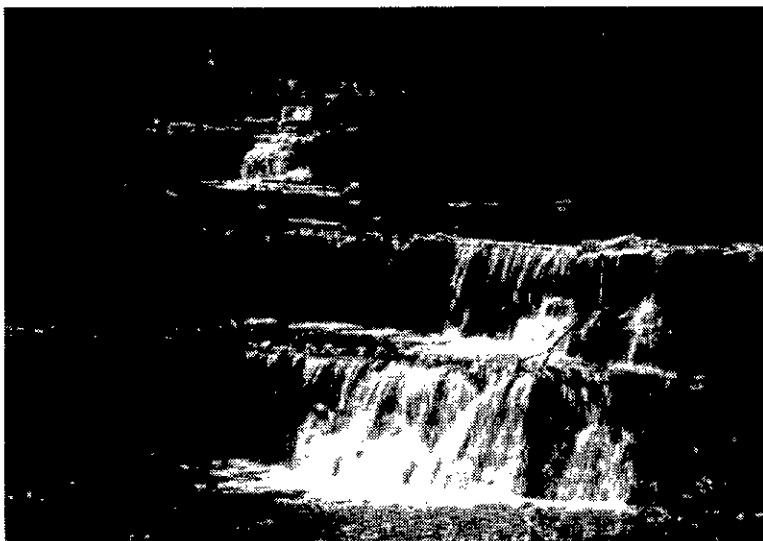
The contest, which began last June, was intended to encourage the public to share photos of their favorite views and allow the Conservancy to learn about some of the places residents are fond of.

Airport Authority mulls historic home's move

Historians say house's rich heritage is worth saving

Plans to relocate the home of former town of Watervliet Supervisor Ebenezer Hills Jr. and the site where an Albany murderer shackled up for the night with his victim's wife are under way.

The Albany County Airport Authority sent out a request to bid recently on the relocation of the historic home that currently sits on airport property that is in the process of being cleared as a runway protection zone. The proposal is calling on engineering services to lift and move the home to another site on airport grounds or elsewhere in the town.

The relocation carries

an estimated price tag of \$500,000, a majority of which will be paid by the Federal Aviation Administration,

said airport spokesman Doug Myers. Money made available to seek consultation on the move has been set to not exceed \$45,000.

One of the oldest Dutch-design farmhouses still standing in Colonie, the Hills home, which was built in 1785, is far from inhabited, said Myers. But that is not to say that the large home surrounded by smaller barns isn't sturdy enough to be relocated and reused, he said.

"It's not about to fall down, but you wouldn't want to move into it," Myers said.

The airport has done several minor repairs in recent years. The work included roof repairs, painting and ridding the home of insect infestation.

The airport is exploring several options to brace and relocate the home. One option would be to give the home to an organization that would want to preserve it, he said. That plan could involve the organization paying for the relocation fees.

That proposal would be similar to the relocation of the Buhrmaster Barn that was donated by the airport to the Friends of Pruyn House in 1987 and relocated from the north side of Route 7, across the street from the Hills home, to the historic Pruyn House grounds on Old Niskayuna Road.

However the home is moved, local historians are hoping it is done with great care and that the home is placed upon a steady foundation as it waits to land a new location. The home is not only one of the oldest in the town, it is also rich in history.

"Unless they have something else up their sleeve for a permanent place, any time you move something that old and put it in a temporary location ... I don't know," said Kevin Franklin, town historian.

The Ebenezer Hills Jr. home served as the residence of the then supervisor of Watervliet. Before 1895, when the town of Colonie was formed, the area was the town of Watervliet. At the time, the supervisor's home often served as the gathering place for town meetings. As

roads were built up around the farmhouse, the home became a post office and tavern by 1820.

On May 7, 1827, Jesse Strang, a worker at the Cherry Hill mansion in Albany, shot and killed John Whipple, the husband of Elsie Whipple, a member of the Van Rensselaer family. Elsie Whipple had arranged for the murder. She and Strang, who were romantically involved, stayed at the Hills home after a rainstorm halted their short trek to neighboring Schenectady.

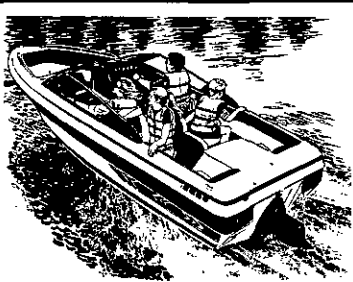
As many as 30,000 people attended the public hanging of Strang on August 24, 1827, after he was found guilty of the murder. It would be the last public execution in Albany County. Elsie Whipple was not convicted of any crimes.

"As a structure ... yes and no the home is important. It's one of the last farm houses of that era that's still standing in the town. It has just sat there for 200 years. But, it is the stories behind the house that are interesting," said Franklin.

In other news, the airport authority will make public the new draft environmental impact statement on the proposed relocation of the town water towers on Utica Avenue. The document will be available for viewing at the William K. Sanford Town Library or online at the airport's Web site at www.albanyairport.com.

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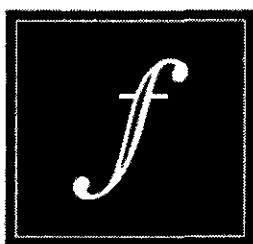

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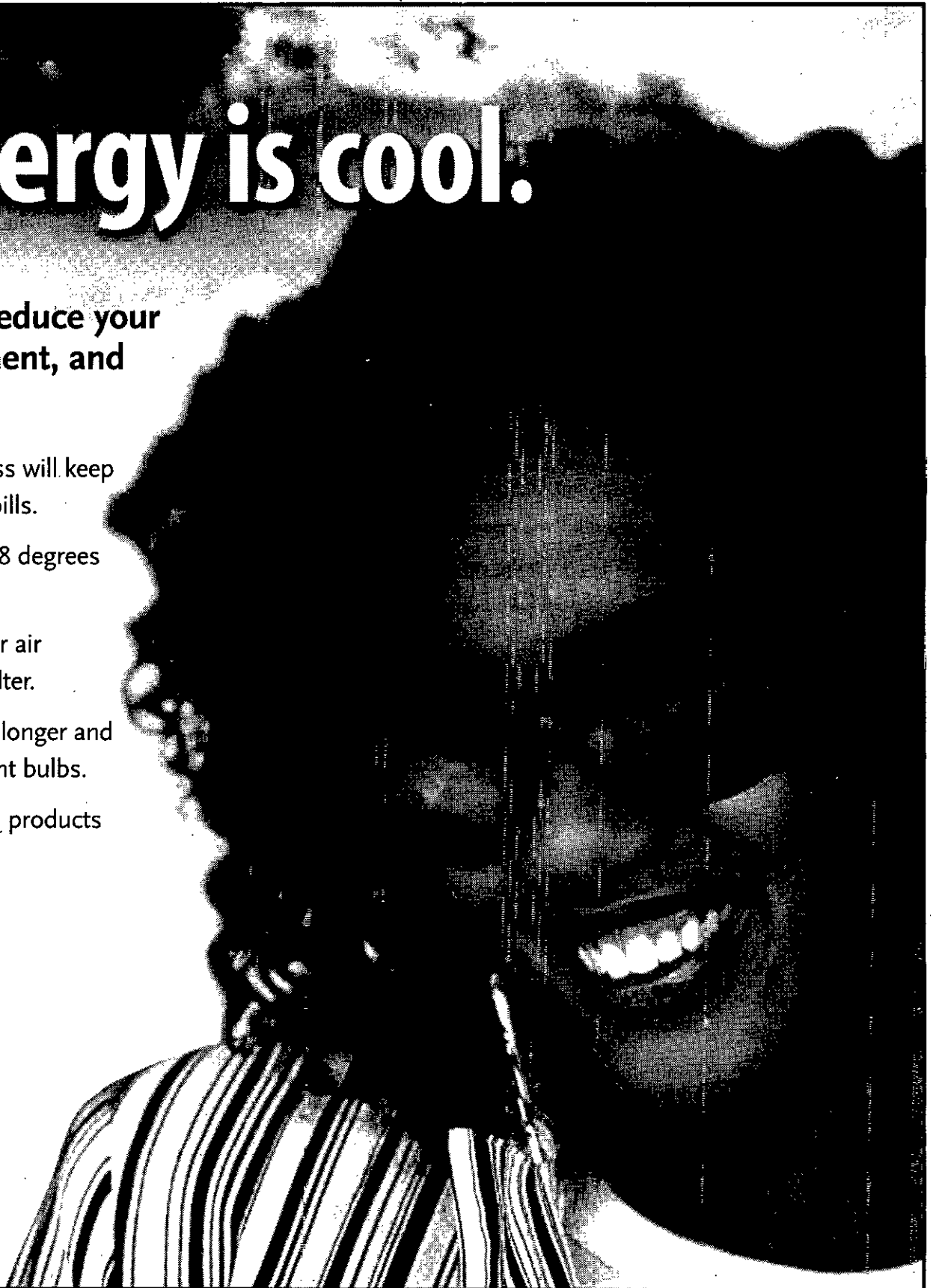

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Voters OK school budget

There was no town reassessment or new high tax for Bethlehem voters to kick around this year as they went to the polls in large numbers to easily approve a new \$77.2 million dollar school district budget. More than 5,000 residents turned out with 2,811 voting in favor of the budget and 2,226 voting no.

"I believe the organization skills of the PTA and parents recognizing it was in their best interest to come out and vote were the reasons it passed," said school board president Stuart Lyman.

After last year's first school budget defeat in 20 years, Lyman and the board worked diligently to increase communication between the district and residents.

School board member Richard Svenson said he was pleased with both the turnout and the vote, adding that the citizens budget committee assisted in spreading the word.

"It was a large group of people reaching out to others," said Svenson. "You have to give them credit for the time they put in."

Lyman said the new budget committee is a work in progress that will become even more effective in the years ahead.

"They will become a very viable committee in the future," Svenson said.

Lisa Allendorph and Diane Giacone Stever will replace Lyman and Svenson as the newest members of the school board in July. Allendorph received the most votes with 2,310 followed by Stever with 2,288. Laura Ladd Bierman received 2,036 votes and Duane Bowman 1,303.

"I feel great," said Allendorph after the results came in. "I am very excited about the next three years and look forward to making this district better than it is now."

Allendorph is currently the treasurer of the middle school PTA and had the support of the parent-teacher groups in her corner.

Stever, along with Allendorph, watched the results inside the middle school gym where the votes were tallied with a group of 50 people looking on.

"I'm overwhelmed," Stever said. "I have a lot of support from my friends and family, and my people came out."

The new school budget increases spending by \$4.7 million and carries a 3.98 percent tax increase to Bethlehem resi-

dents. The budget also restores spending for sports programs that saw a cut in funding after the budget was defeated in 2006. Several new teaching, custodial and administrative positions are part of the new budget, including two full-time high school deans and two full-time middle school house leaders.

Voters also approved a \$1.1 million dollar bus proposition that was defeated last year. The district will now be able to purchase 15 new buses. Some of the new fleet will be used for the soon-to-be-built Eagle Elementary School.

Bethlehem's public library budget was approved as expected, and Yolanda Caldwell defeated Michael Zalob to win a five-year term on the library board of trustees.

Superintendent Les Loomis thanked the community for supporting the budget at the polls.

"We are sensitive to the fact that taxpayers are stretched and will continue to return an outstanding investment," said Loomis.

Lyman and Svenson, who will be leaving the board at the end of June after serving for several years each, said the first year for a new board member is the learning curve year.

"Be patient and don't be shy, ask questions," said Svenson.

The two veteran school board members opted against running for re-election.

from home," Svenson said.

Svenson said his concern is that representatives of a teachers union might expect a school board member to favor a union position if that person received financial support for their candidacy.

"Candidates, after accepting this money, have to give a certain allegiance to those unions," speculated Svenson. "I just hope the future of school board elections in this community doesn't see school unions putting up money."

Incumbent Guilderland school board member Colleen O'Connell was one of two candidates approached by the teachers union in that district. O'Connell did not accept the funding, but did allow the teachers union to send out postcards supporting her candidacy.

"I don't believe it's a conflict," said O'Connell, who spent about \$1,500, mostly on campaign lawn signs to fund her campaign. O'Connell was re-elected Tuesday, May 15, to another three-year term.

"What's unfortunate is that it costs \$1,000 to run for an unpaid position," O'Connell added.

Richard Iannuzzi, president of New York State United Teachers (NYSUT), said local unions decide on the level of involvement in school elections.

"There is no questions that is

Five candidates were running for three open seats on the Guilderland school board. Newcomer Gloria Towle-Hilt, who will be retiring as a teacher in the Guilderland district, accepted the teacher's union money and also won.

identified automated phone call received by several residents urging them to vote against the budget. Loomis said he has never seen anything like it in Bethlehem in the past 20 years.

"No one stepped forward to say they funded the effort," said Loomis.

Loomis said he hopes this will be the first and last time something like this happens leading up to a school board race.

"The perception of influence peddling needs to stay out of the schools," said Bethlehem school board president Stuart Lyman.

Ninety-five percent of school district budgets statewide received voter approval. The Albany school district budget, however, was defeated.

Living the hive life

Many local beekeepers have yet to see a decline due to mystery ailment

In as many as 27 states, a strange disorder is crippling the honeybee population, posing a problem for the production of fruit and vegetable crops throughout the country. Locally, the disorder hasn't yet posed a problem.

Last weekend, Indian Ladder Farms received 26 hives to aid in its pollination process, all of which are healthy, said Anne Kelly, Indian Ladder hobbyist beekeeper.

Because of the thousands of apple blossoms on the farm, Kelly said, bees play an integral role in pollinating the apple trees. This is a task that Kelly speculated would be impossible to do by hand.

"We absolutely need

honeybees if we're going to have pollination here," said Kelly.

"On apple trees, each blossom on the tree has to be pollinated in order for an apple to grow," she said.

Other than apples, bees have a hand in the pollination of other crops, including watermelons, blueberries and cucumbers.

In respect to crops, Kelly said colony collapse disorder would be devastating.

"It would affect a lot of crops. It would be a huge problem," said Kelly.

Lloyd Spear, who operates Ross Rounds, a honey production company, said that he has not experienced the disorder. A beekeeper for 40 years, Spear's company maintains about 200 hives on Route 146 in Guilderland and Athens. In his time as a beekeeper, Spear said he has experienced only minimal losses.

Spear said the topic comes up in conversations with other local beekeepers who, like Spear,

haven't experienced the onset of the disorder.

"The symptoms are a rapid decline in population of adult worker bees," said Nicholas Calderone, associate professor at Cornell University's Dyce Laboratory for Honey Bee Studies. According to Calderone, about 25 percent of the colonies lost last winter exhibited symptoms that are not consistent with mite damage or any other known cause.

While the adult populations are declining, said Calderone, the immature bees left behind are not displaying characteristics of mites that usually would be associated with bee loss.

"There's no good explanation for these set of symptoms," said Calderone.

Several groups, including beekeepers, state regulatory personnel, and the USDA are working together to determine the actual cause of death. Possibilities being investigated

include new pathogens and possible pesticide poisoning.

Primarily, Calderone said, the beekeepers that are most affected are migratory beekeepers that are traveling to southern states like Florida, where they'll lose their populations. Many problems faced by beekeepers in New York are attributed to more common ailments like parasites, said Calderone.

According to information

provided by Calderone, honeybees are critical players in the production of many fruit, vegetable and seed crops grown throughout the country, adding between \$8 and \$12 billion worth of value to U.S. agriculture each year. Substantial losses pose a serious threat to crops that rely on bees for pollination and indicate diminished profits for growers and higher prices for consumers at the supermarket.

College, park form Revolutionary alliance

Siena and Saratoga Battlefield team up to explore site's historic impact

Siena College's history department and the Saratoga National Battlefield will join forces to further explore the historical significance of the Revolutionary War battle that lasted two months in the fall of 1777.

The Center for Revolutionary Era Studies has been formed to further promote programs both academic and available to the public.

It is the hope of both entities that the new center will mirror a joint program between Gettysburg College in Pennsylvania and the site of the historic Civil War battle fought nearby.

The Saratoga Battlefield is an epicenter of Revolutionary and pre-Revolutionary War landmarks, school and park officials said. It is an otherwise untapped resource that, until the announcement of the center, has been little more than the site of

one of the most important battles fought on American soil and in the world.

"This is a great opportunity. We've had a good relationship with Siena over the years and have always talked about expanding that," said Frank Dean, superintendent of the battlefield park.

The park and school decided last month to move on forming the center without any additional federal funding to the park in the pipeline, Dean said. The center has contacted U.S. Rep. Kirsten Gillibrand, D-Hudson in the hopes of landing more federal funding. The center and additional funding had been a mission of former Republican congressman John Sweeney, who Gillibrand defeated last year.

Part of the talks over the years has been to expand the park's resources at the battle site, said Dean. That would include a new building to house the center and serve as the foremost resource in the nation for the study of the Revolutionary War era, he said.

The new center will focus on the region's role in the fight for American independence and refocus the park's mission to

increase its historical visibility. The American success at the Battle of Saratoga was key in landing French support for the remainder of the war. And it helped foster not only American independence but also the fledgling country's place in the world, said Dean. In spite of its significance, the farm where that battle was fought garners less attention than Gettysburg, he said.

Through the center, the site will be opened to a new academic focus, one that has been certified by the state education department, and it is gaining the interest of area colleges and public and private schools.

In June, the center will offer its first program, a teacher's workshop that has been designed to help middle and high school social studies teachers create a new curriculum integrating the Revolutionary era.

That is something that is needed at both the grade school and college level, said Dean.

"The only thing that we've had that dealt with the Revolutionary War was courses. There was never a center," said Jim Harrison, head of Siena's history department.

Siena has sent history students to works as interns at the park in the past, he said. But they never had the opportunities that will come from the new center.

The college has created a Certificate for Revolutionary Era Studies in conjunction with the center, he said. The 18-credit-hour program delves into the history, literature and a number of aspects of that era, said Harrison. Next year, students in the program will be developing media content for the battlefield and offer new narratives on the battle and its impact on the war and area at large.

It's about tapping a new resource, said Harrison.

"You have everything in your backyard here, and the interesting thing is that no colleges try to mine that. The area is just so rich in Revolutionary era history and there are no college ties to these historic sites," Harrison said.

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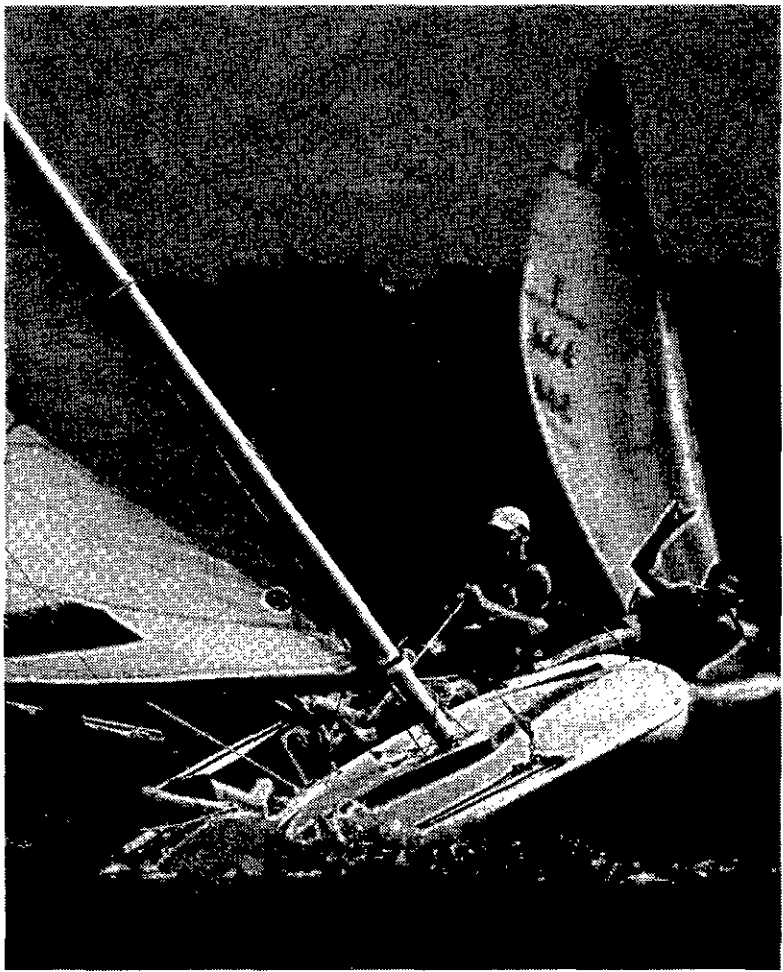

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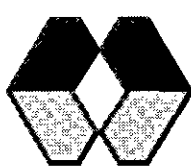

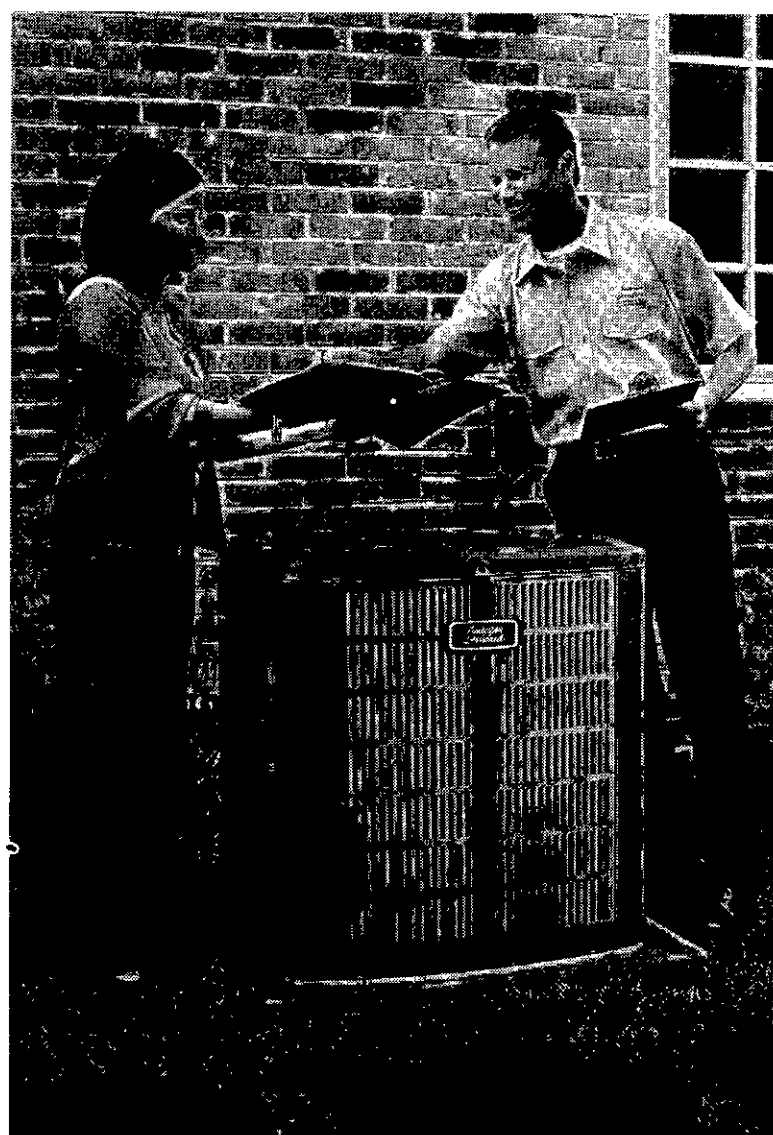

AAA predicts increase in holiday drivers

Nationally, 38.3 million Americans will travel more than 50 miles from home this Memorial Day, up 1.7 percent over last year. The Northeast will experience a 2.4 percent increase.

Approximately 6 million travelers in the Northeast expect to go by motor vehicle, a 3.3 percent increase from a year ago.

Some 500,000 travelers in the Northeast plan to travel by airplane, down 1.9 percent from last Memorial Day.

"High gas prices and increased vacation costs won't deter Northeast travelers from traveling this Memorial Day," said AAA Hudson Valley spokesperson Tammy Melo. "Families will travel closer to home, they will travel for fewer days and will save money by staying at less expensive hotels and eating in cheaper restaurants, but they will continue to take vacations and plan getaways."

Holiday auto travelers will find gas prices in the Capital District up 58 cents from the beginning of this year and more than 8 cents higher than this time last year.

Travelers will get a bit of a break this holiday weekend when making their way to their destination. AAA's Leisure Travel Index shows flights over the holiday weekend averaging 5

percent fewer this year than last year, with the average flight costing \$166. Car rental rates are expected to fall 16 percent from last year, with renters paying an average of \$31, almost \$6 less than last year. Hotel rates, however, will be up about 13 percent from a year ago, with travelers spending an average of \$174 per night at hotels.

Many American households will be traveling with their children. In fact, 54 percent of northeastern households with children under 18 will bring them along on their Memorial Day vacation this year. Some tips for families traveling with children:

- Take regular breaks for you child - occasionally stop at a rest area or a trinket shop to help break up the trip

- When possible, coordinate summer travel according your child's nap schedule - if your child sleeps well in the car.

- Pack some toys, books and games to keep your child busy in the car.

Research for Memorial Day travel is based on routing requests made at the AAA Hudson Valley Clubs as well as a national survey of 2,000 adults by the Travel Industry Association of American, which conducts special research for AAA.

Keep pets safe from heat

While warm weather is welcomed by most people, spring and summer can bring certain dangers to pets. A Kansas State University veterinarian says pet owners should be alert to seasonal health issues.

According to Dr. Susan Nelson, veterinarian and clinical assistant professor at K-State's College of Veterinary Medicine, heat exhaustion is a common ailment of pets during summer months.

"It's best to exercise pets during the morning or evening hours to avoid the direct sun," Nelson said. "It's also crucial to have plenty of fresh water available and shade for protection. Cats tend to handle heat better than dogs, but both should be given extra care."

The intense light from the summer sun can damage your pet's skin, including sunburn.

"Pets with lighter-colored coats, especially white or shaved animals, need to be kept out of intense light," Nelson said. "It's best to keep pets in the shade during peak hours and use sunscreen or a protective jacket. Repeated sun exposure often leads to a serious form of cancer in white cats. Owners should be aware of red patchy areas on the ears and nose."

Summer heat can be a danger to pets' food as well.



"Like people, pets naturally eat less during warm weather; however it's important to watch for pet food spoilage in the heat," Nelson said. "Canned food should not be left out after feeding because of the warm weather and the amount of insects it will attract."

Allergies are common in the spring, both for humans and pets.

"Cats and dogs can have seasonal allergies just like us, especially during the spring from pollen and grass," Nelson said. "While some do sneeze and have watery eyes, most pets show allergies through skin rashes and itching, sometimes making the animal miserable. If your pet is being bothered by allergies, you should contact your veterinarian for advice."

Fleas and ticks are health concerns year-round for pet owners, although summer

months intensify the problem.

"The best products to treat and prevent ticks and fleas are available from your veterinarian; other typically applied products aren't as effective," Nelson said. "There are numerous diseases that come from fleas and ticks that harm cats, dogs and people, so prevention is very important. Pet owners should also be aware of mosquito, chigger and fly bites which can be irritating and are especially common on outdoor animals."

Shaving their coats may be beneficial to some pets, Nelson said.

"There are some benefits from shaving your pet's hair," she said. "It prevents mats, which can be a hiding place for maggots, and it can make them more comfortable in the heat. It's easier to locate ticks and fleas if the coat is trimmed and it's more comfortable for the animal."

Rainy weather sometimes leads to standing water, which puts pets at more risk to contract the dangerous disease leptospirosis. Nelson said pet owners should be cautious of their pet's environment, including standing water in the animal's area.

Many pet owners travel during the summer and are faced with deciding what to

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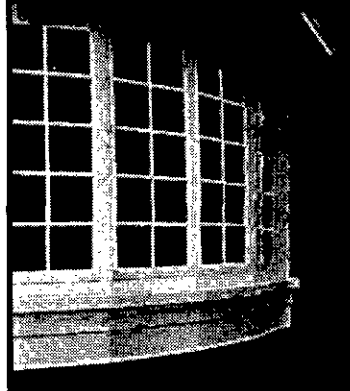

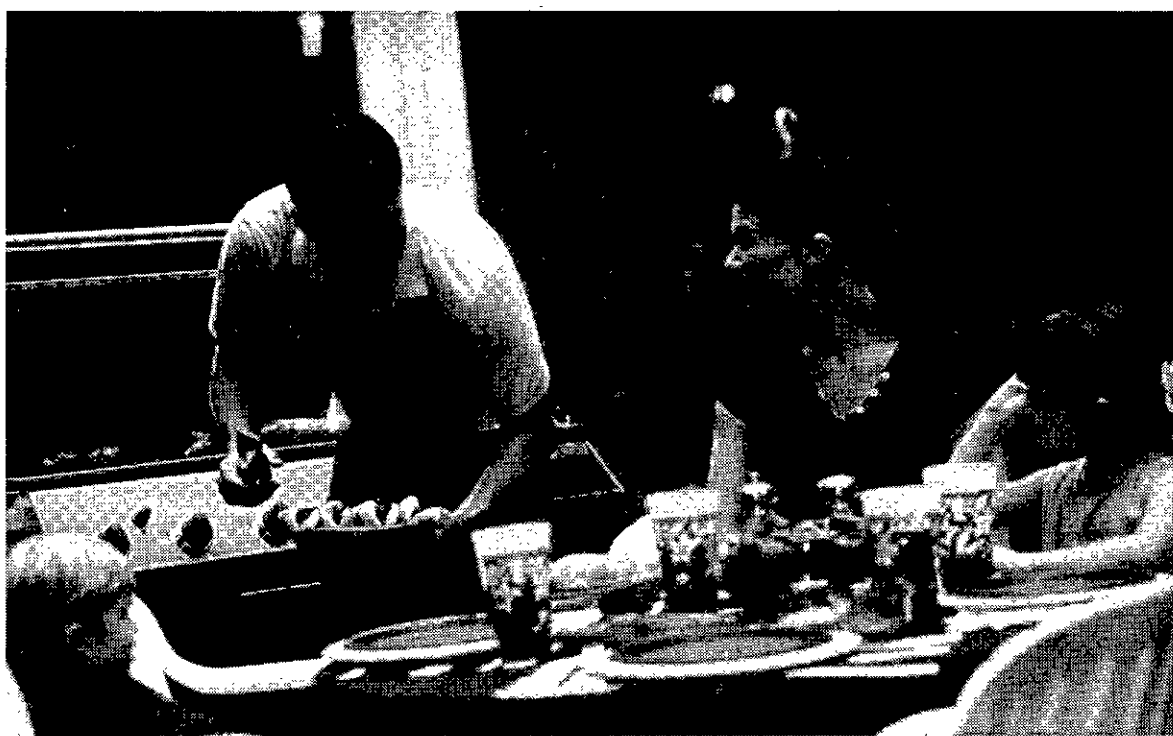

do with pets. Nelson suggests making summer travel enjoyable for owners and pets alike.

As you head outdoors to take advantage of the warmer weather, there are a number of easy ways to jump-start a healthy, active lifestyle and kick the couch potato routine.

While it's great that you're getting more exercise, don't forget to incorporate smart eating habits with increased activity. Fueling your body with healthy snack choices helps keep energy levels high. But many snacks we consider as sources of energy and nutrition are actually loaded with sugar and preservatives. snacks can be challenging, especially when you're hungry or on the go. She shares five easy tips to carry through your next trip or outdoor adventure.

•Plan ahead. Before you head to the lake for the weekend or a family road trip, plan on a variety of snacking options to satisfy everyone. Burton recommends fresh fruit, a mixture of nuts and dried fruit, low-fat string cheese, and plenty of bottled water.

•Snack small and snack often. Whether you're going to the gym, on a walk, or to the amusement park or beach, throw some treats in the car or your backpack. All-natural products like SOYJOY, a baked nutrition bar made with whole soy and real fruit, are great because they are just the right size, taste great and provide even sustained energy. Keep a variety of flavors on-hand since more options will keep you more likely

•Try turkey: Many barbecue favorites now have turkey substitutes providing a leaner, lower-calorie option. Try making hamburgers with ground turkey instead of ground beef or grill up a seasoned turkey bratwurst, like Jennie-O Beer 'N Turkey Bratwurst.

•Keep it cool: To prevent bacteria growth, keep perishable foods, like potato salad, in the refrigerator or a cooler until just before serving. Also, always thaw meat in the refrigerator or cooler, never at room temperature or in the sun.

•Trust the temp: Bring your meat thermometer; cook hamburger and pork to 160 degrees F and chicken and turkey to 165 degrees F. Here's a good rule: if the juices do not run clear, keep cooking.

•When in doubt, throw it out: After the meal, throw away any leftovers that have become wet or have been left out for one hour on hot days.

State archives holds contest for students

To encourage students to use historical records, the state archives, a program of the state Department of Education, is sponsoring the 17th annual Student Research Awards. The 2007 contest is open to all New York students in grades 4 to 12 who use historical records in their research projects.

The awards are presented to: grades 4 to 5, grades 6 to 8, and grades 9 to 12. The awards consist of a framed certificate; a check for \$100 from an endowment established by Regent Emerita Laura Chodos and her husband Robert Chodos; an invitation to have lunch with the Regents in Albany; and a behind-the-scenes tour of the state archives.

Eligible projects are computer-based entries, such as Web sites or PowerPoint presentations; exhibits; documentaries; performances; research for a historical marker, property or district; and traditional research papers.

Julie Daniels, coordinator of the awards program, explained that in order for an entry to be competitive, a substantial portion of the research should be based on historical records from archives, museums, historical societies, libraries, local governments, or other organizations. She offered some examples of historical records: original letters, diaries, and photographs; meeting minutes; police and court records; ledgers, census records; and wills.

Although the deadline for entry is June 1, Daniels explained that the most successful projects usually take the students months to develop. For information about this year's program, click on Education at www.archives.nysed.gov/aindex.

List highlights historic sites and structures in Milton

Included are local buildings, schools and cemeteries

What's old is new with a recently compiled list of more than 80 historic structures and sites in Milton that has been pulled together by town historian Royann Blodgett.

"The list includes geographical sites, buildings, cemeteries, schools and homes," said Blodgett. "There are some references to early Milton residents listed as well. But this is very much a work-in-process."

Listings of the historic locations have long been available, but the new compilation, while not definitive, pulls together information from many resources. The list is available to view at Milton Town Hall.

The listing is an open-ended document from the settlement period of the mid-1700s through the mid-1900s.

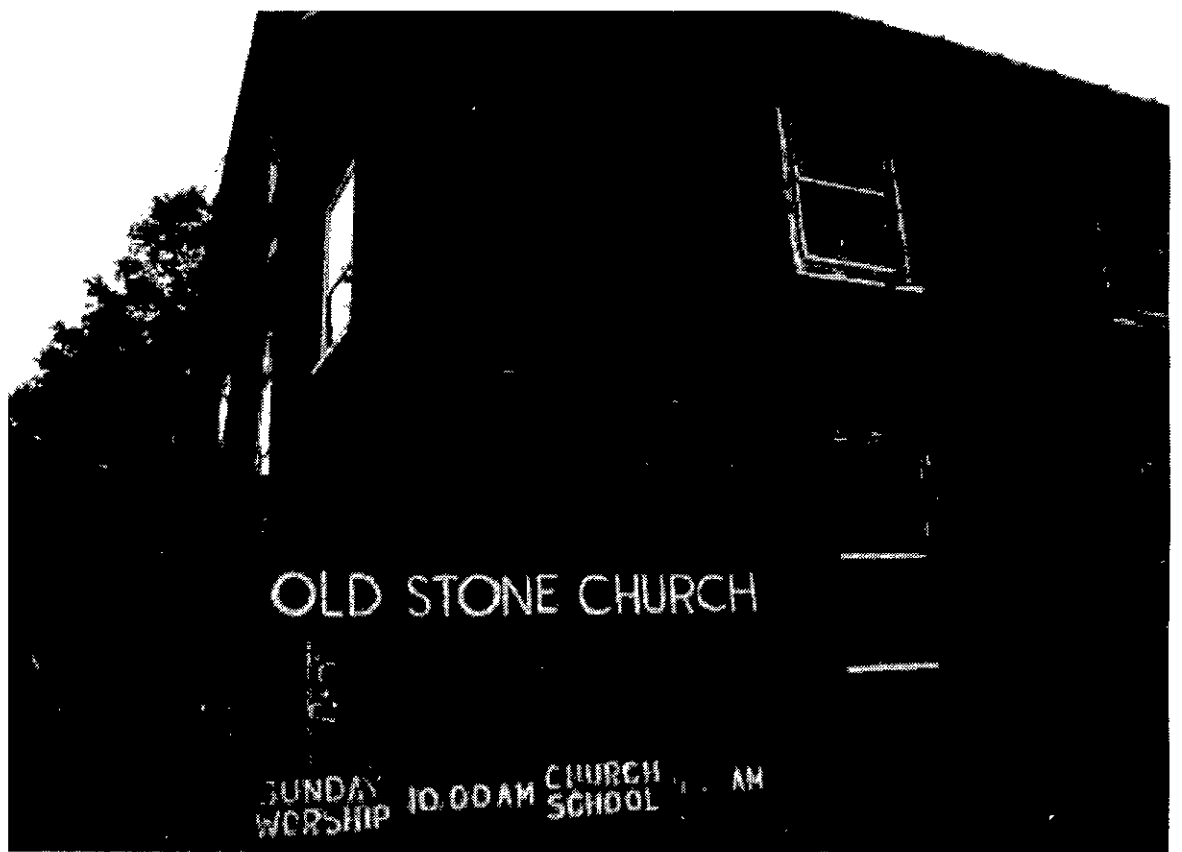
The list breaks up the town into the Middle Line Road

area along Route 67 to Route 29; the northwest quadrant in the Rock City Falls area; the northeast quadrant in North Milton and the Rowland Hollow areas; the southeast quadrant encompassing Craneville, Factory Village and the Bloodville areas; and the southwest quadrant of West Milton, Clute's Corners and Spier's Corners.

"The finished document should not be considered as an absolutely complete or finished document," said Blodgett. "As time progresses and more recent significant historic places reach the 50-year mark, they will be added to the inventory."

In the Middle Line Road area, sites included are the Patchin home and family cemetery on the west side of the road, and Winterwood Farm on the east side of Middle Line Road. The farm was the location for the 1990s filming of the Robert Redford movie "The Horse Whisperer."

In the Rock City Falls area, the list includes the Grenell/Hoyt Cemetery, which has monuments dating from 1798 to 1932, and the Hatch Mill located

on Route 29 and Creek Road, once used as a trolley line stop and saw and grist mills.

The North Milton listing features the First Baptist Church founded on June 22, 1793, and the Stone Arch Bridge built over the Rowland Hollow Creek in 1830.

In the Craneville and Bloodville areas, the listing includes the Alliance Church on Rowland Street, established in 1917, and the law offices of Isaiah Blood on Maple Avenue, which he used from 1835

until his death in 1870.

The list includes sites in the West Milton area such as the Pioneer Paper Mill, built before 1853, but abandoned in the 1930s, and the Kesselring site, established in 1948.

Blodgett said she plans to soon have the inventory accessible to town residents wanting to brush up on their local history.

"It's been done before in different resource forms, but now we have it on one list for

quick reference," said Blodgett. "We hope to eventually have it all online."

A peek at town history

Along the Kayaderosseras Creek, the town was crossed by Native American trails used for hunting and fishing in the rich lands of the "Crooked Stream." These trails became the footpaths and horse/oxen wagon trails that brought settlers to the area. The David Wood family is credited as being the first family in the area, arriving around 1772, about 20 years before the town was officially established. Settlement continued with homesteads, grist and saw mills, and blacksmiths setting up shop in close proximity to forests and a plentiful source for water power along the Kayaderosseras and the Glowgee, Gordon and Rowland's Hollow creeks.

Early pioneers were largely self-sufficient farming families who quickly established houses of worship.

The Old Stone Church was one of the earliest. The area, known as Mill Town, was established as Milton in 1792. In 1812, the Milton Union School was formed in the Village of Ballston Spa. In 1952, the schools became part of the Ballston Spa Central School District,

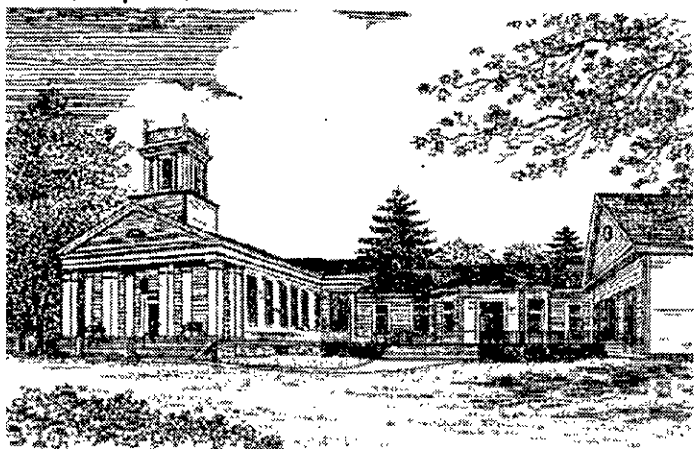
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The Milton Hill Farm, circa 1772, on Middleline Road is on the registry of historic sites in Milton.

encompassing much of the towns of Malta, Milton, Ballston, and the Village of Ballston Spa.

By the mid-1800s, industrial entrepreneurs had established mills along the Kayaderosseras Creek and its tributaries all the way through Milton and the Village of Ballston Spa. Paper mills dominated, but there were also cotton mills, foundries, tanneries and leather factories, wheel shops, lumber and cabinetry mills, and limestone quarries and kilns in addition to the saw mills, grist mills, and blacksmith shops set up when the settlers first came. Communities including Rock City Falls, West Milton, Milton Center, Craneville, Factory Village, Bloodville and Rowland's Hollow were clustered in the mill areas where churches, schools, stores, hotels and boarding houses were situated. In 1896, mills and communities along the Kayaderosseras were joined by an electric railway running from Ballston Spa to Middle Grove, bringing freight and passenger service connecting with to other rail lines in the

Village of Ballston Spa.

Kesselring

In 1948, major change happened in West Milton when the Knolls Atomic Power Laboratory (KAPL) was established. KAPL is a government-owned, contractor-operated research and development facility that supports the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program. The Naval Nuclear Propulsion Program is a joint Navy/Department of Energy program responsible for the research, design, construction, operation and maintenance of U.S. nuclear-powered warships. Opening the site meant relocating farm families that had first resided on 1,433 acres of Milton, but the KAPL site quickly became a major employer of local people and out-of-towners.

The love of history

Regardless of whether they read through the inventory of historic places, Blodgett said she hopes to have more people roll down their windows and take a look at what's out there.

"We're all driving around past these places every day and not appreciating them for what they are," said Blodgett. "I've always been fascinated by local history, and I want other people to know about it."

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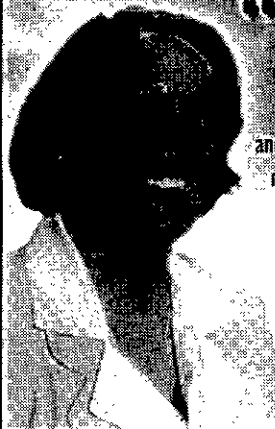
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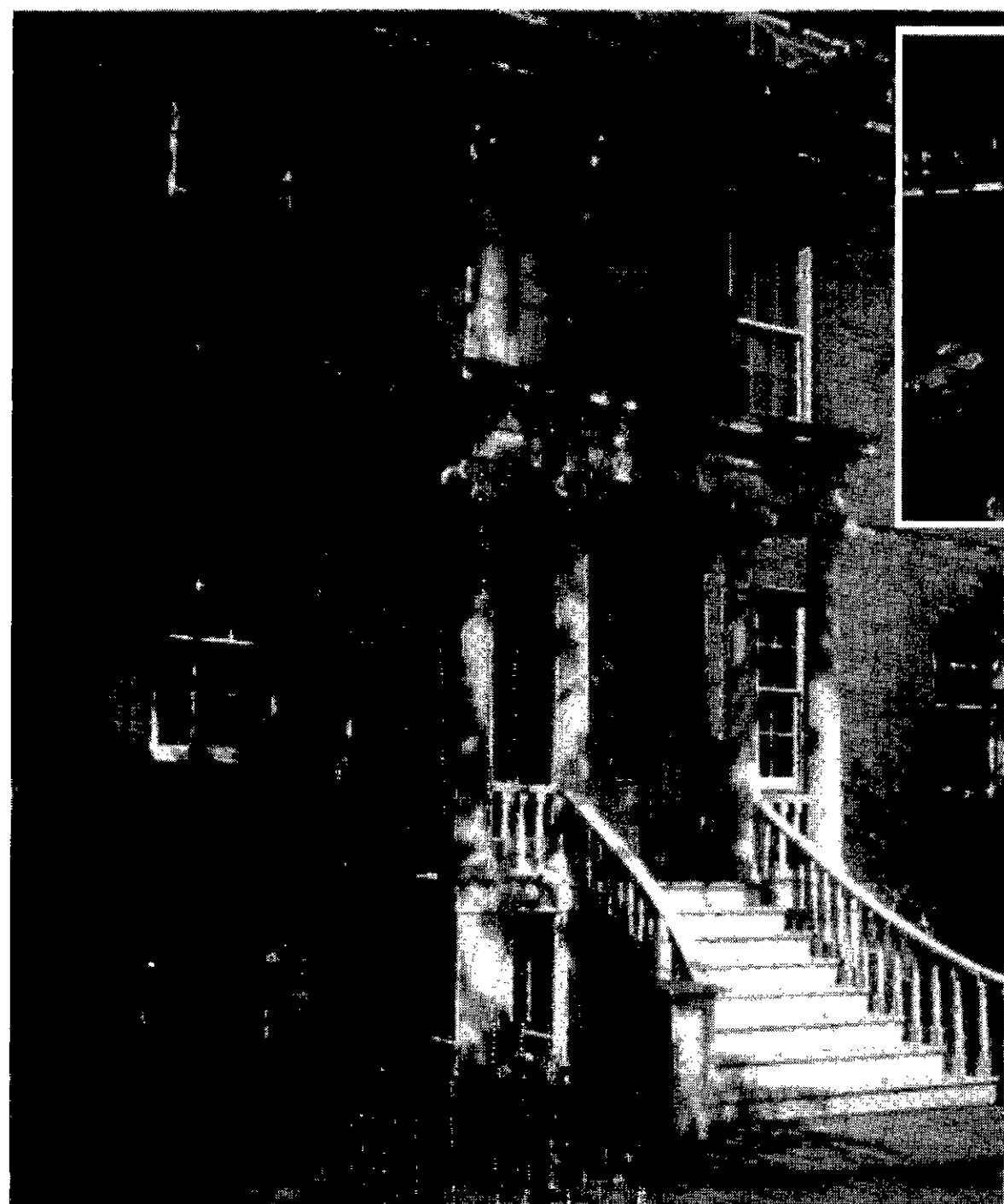

Vintage bottle means vintage house stays

A bottle of wine discovered in 1970 by archaeologists in Albany's Ten Broeck Mansion and later sold at an auction generated sufficient funds to preserve the structure for future generations, according to Sue Kastan, executive director of the Albany County Historical Association (ACHA), owner of the historical dwelling.

Today, the Ten Broeck Mansion in Albany offers visitors a view of a home representing the elegant lifestyle of a rich Dutch clan in the late 1700 to 1800s.

It was built in 1798 and called "Prospect" because of its commanding view of the Hudson River. It was built as a retirement home for the Ten Broecks, a prominent family of the era. Abraham Ten Broeck served the

city, state and country in various roles during Albany's Colonial years. He was a military commander during the Revolutionary War; Albany's mayor from 1779 to 1798; a state senator; judge; and first president of the Bank of Albany and the city's public library.

Prior to his marriage in 1763, Abraham was an apprentice in business with his brother-in-

law, Robert Livingston, famous in his own right.

"He married Elizabeth, nee Van Rensselaer," said Kastan, "and in 1748, they built the house on 5 acres of land outside the city leased from his wife's family who were patroons."

Elizabeth's parents lived in the Van Rensselaer Manor House located north of Albany along today's Broadway.

The couple had two daughters and one son. One of the women married and moved to Stillwater, and her sister remained a spinster.

By the 1800s, said Kastan, in addition to the couple and their children, 10 black slaves also lived in the house. By 1810, Elizabeth had released six. Ten Broeck died in 1810 and Elizabeth, three years later. There were several owners of the mansion after that.

Originally, the mansion was constructed in the Federal style, rectangular

and unadorned. In the 1830s, when James King became the new owner, he converted the exterior to the Greek revival design by adding columns in the front and rear entrances.

After the opening of the Erie Canal in 1825, the entire Albany/Arbor Hill area grew rapidly, thanks to a thriving lumbering business at the terminus of the canal.

In 1848, Thomas Worth Olcott purchased the mansion and his descendants resided there until 1948 when they deeded the structure to the ACHA to insure its preservation as a historic house/museum open to the public.

The Olcotts — father and son — collected wines, which included a rare variety of French Bordeaux wines plus varietals from extinct grapes, lost to blight. In 1970, one valuable wine bottle was discovered — the one that provided sufficient funds to repair the roof and the 18th-century brickwork.

On a tour, visitors can observe 13 rooms on three

floors, plus three bathrooms and granite fixtures.

Kastan said the mansion's fine furnishings reflect the style and the best of local craftsmanship that would have been found in homes of wealthy families in mid-19th century.

In a sense, viewing portraits of some members of the Ten Broeck clan and other notables of the time period done by local artists of the era, provides a dose of realistic ambience to any visit.

A tour of the mansion enables a visitor to sense the life and furniture of a prosperous family during the city's Colonial period.

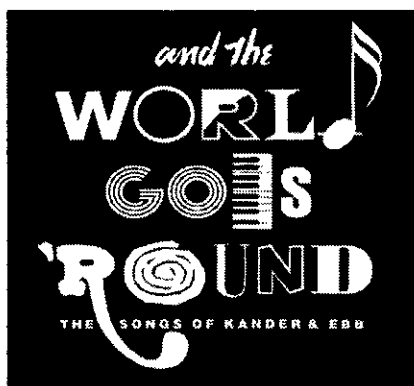

Eagles qualify for Sectionals

For once, the Bethlehem baseball team didn't collapse when a Section II playoff berth was on the line.

The Eagles defeated Ballston Spa 14-6 last Monday to assure themselves a .500 Suburban Council record and a spot in the class AA playoffs, which begin Thursday.

"I have everybody ready to go Thursday," said Bethlehem coach Rob Helm. "We'll get the pitching. We just have to play defense and score some runs."

The Eagles will find out Wednesday who their first-round opponent will be, though they have been working the phones to get an idea which team they will face.

"We don't know yet because we have to see where Queensbury fits in," said Helm. "We think they will take one of the Big 10 spots, so depending on which spot they take, we'll have to see where everyone else falls in."

Bethlehem (7-7 league, 9-9 overall) had been in similar

positions two of the previous three seasons, only to come up short by one win. In 2004 and 2006, the Eagles lost their final two league games to finish 6-8.

Bethlehem made certain there would be no suspense this year. The Eagles had one of their best offensive games in last Monday's win, with Matt Nash and Randy Bowers leading the way with two hits apiece.

Things fell apart for Bethlehem in last Tuesday's 8-3 loss to Averill Park. The Eagles committed five errors and didn't have much pop at the plate, other than a solo home run from Nash.

"Averill Park went out there and beat us," said Helm.

Bethlehem finished the regular season with a pair of non-league games against Ballston Spa Monday and Troy Tuesday. Helm said he's using the games to get his team warmed up for what he perceives as a wide-open Sectional field.

"There's one team that has stood out, and that's Guilderland. And to tell you the truth, anyone can beat Guilderland," said Helm.

Having played the game, Gait had a unique perspective on what worked on the field.

"It allowed me to understand the features of the products and the performance benefits associated," he said. "That's something we use everyday and we incorporate into the way we develop the product. I'm not about cosmetics, I'm not about 'me too' products. I'm about trying to develop unique performance benefits that are new for the consumer or uniquely different from my competition."

The innovations Gait and his company have come up with — deBeer has eight patents and 20 patents pending — are generally subtle. One of his most recent innovations is a palmless glove that improves a player's hold on the lacrosse stick.

"Most players would wear gloves on the field, but they'd take them off as soon as they got off the field or started tossing the ball around in the backyard," Gait said.

Gait was nearly born with a lacrosse stick in his hands. Growing up in Victoria, British Columbia, he and his twin brother Gary picked up the sport when they were young. By the time they reached Syracuse University in 1987, they had already developed an on-field rapport unlike any seen in the United States.

"We actually developed a lot of our skills together practicing with each other, and a lot of our creative ideas were developed by us putting our heads together and trying to be deceptive," said Gait. "The nice thing was we could try out our ideas on each other. You can't prove that something works when you're practicing alone. By having each other, we could prove our ideas because one of us would be able to play defense on the other."

The twins continued playing together off and on after

graduating Syracuse. The final go-around came in 2005 when Paul joined Gary for the National Lacrosse League's Colorado Mammoth's final five games.

"It made playing easier because it would be like playing on the same team for 30 years. You're going to know your fellow player's habits, and I certainly knew Gary's tendencies and habits," said Gait.

Since settling down in upstate New York, Gait has tracked lacrosse's growth in the United States and is pleased with its progress.

"The last 20 years, the average growth in participation is 10 percent," said Gait. "It's also spread out regionally. The Northeast now represents 70 percent of participation, with the other 30 percent spread out across the rest of the country. But (Northeast participation) was a lot closer to 80 percent 20 years ago."

With more American children picking up lacrosse

sticks, Gait said it's important that his company pursues that demographic.

"We gear our equipment really toward the 8- to 15-year-old lacrosse player. That's the time in a kid's lacrosse career that you can sway his mind on what brand he's going to continue to play with, especially at the varsity level," he said.

Gait's strategy has worked well. His company is No. 1 in the United States for women's lacrosse equipment sales and No. 3 in men's lacrosse equipment sales.

"We're probably the fastest growing of all the manufacturers, except for maybe some of the upstarts," said Gait.

And with lacrosse's continued growth — both in the Capital District and nationally — Gait's company has the chance to continue growing.

"Lacrosse has grown steadily, and I don't see it slowing down," he said.

When you look at it, that's an impressive list, especially given the fact that it was rare when a Section II lacrosse player would even be looked at by a Division I school only a decade ago, let alone be a team leader. And more area high school players are going Division I with each passing year. UAlbany is bringing in five

current Section II stars to its men's and women's lacrosse teams next year including Guilderland's Nikki Branchini and Bethlehem's Matt Johnson and Tee Ladouceur. That's the most Section II seniors I can remember committing to one Division I school.

Our region still lags far behind central New York, Long Island, northern New Jersey and Maryland in producing Division I talent, but the gap is beginning to narrow. And as more Section II players step into starring roles, you can bet more college lacrosse coaches are going to spend time recruiting around here.

At least, we have some area players to keep an eye on this weekend at the NCAA championships in Baltimore. That's something we haven't always had, but it's something that could become a trend in the future.

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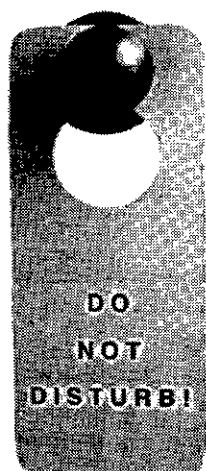

The success story continues

One half of famous lacrosse duo guides local company

Paul Gait made a career out of being an innovative lacrosse player. Now, he's making a living as an innovative lacrosse equipment manufacturer.

Gait is in his third year as president of J. deBeer and Son in Guilderland, where his Gait line of lacrosse equipment is created.

"It's something I've always wanted to do, and when I finished (playing) at Syracuse University, I kind of set that as my goal," said Gait. "I had always tinkered with my lacrosse equipment

— my lacrosse (stick) heads and gloves — so I knew I enjoyed to do that."

Gait is no newcomer to the industry. He started selling lacrosse equipment the day he graduated from Syracuse in 1990, and he's been designing sticks, pads and other gear for deBeer since 1996.

All the while, Gait played professionally in the indoor National Lacrosse League, as well as helping the Canadian national team win outdoor world championships in 1990, 1994, 1998 and 2002. He retired from professional lacrosse in 2005.

"I don't miss it like a lot of people think I would because I get to work with it every day," said Gait, a United States Lacrosse Hall of Famer. "Plus, I played a lot. I played more than 95 percent of

lacrosse players out there. I kind of got it out of my system."

Gait's first introduction to deBeer was when he met former president Jim Muhlfelder in 1994, shortly after leaving STX and starting his own lacrosse equipment store in Syracuse.

"He was just starting up a product line," Gait said. "He was explaining his business — he was a baseball/softball company, and they were moving away from baseball/softball and just getting started in this lacrosse thing. They started by producing the first high-strength lacrosse handle, which was really popular at the time. And in some of our conversations, he had expressed about how he was looking to expand the line and develop protective equipment and lacrosse heads along the way."

"That got me to thinking, here he was looking for someone with lacrosse expertise, and given my playing expertise and my desire to get involved in the R&D (research and development) side, it just worked out."

Gait worked out of his home in Syracuse for the first eight years of his relationship with deBeer, but moved to the Capital District when he succeeded Muhlfelder in 2004.

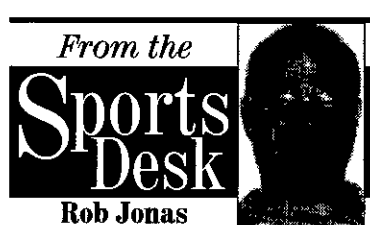
"I enjoy working with the people here," said Gait. "Working with a group that challenges themselves, I'm a big believer in that. We tend to be understaffed for the amount of business we do, which I like. It puts a lot of pressure on our employees, and they usually step up and answer the call."

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Youth programs teach more than sports skills

As the weather warms, schools have begun their spring athletic programs and many area towns have started their own youth programs designed to introduce kids to a variety of sports. Participation in sports has long been regarded as an easy way for children to stay active and fit, and there are benefits that extend beyond the physical exertion.

"Sports are wonderful life-building kinds of experiences," said Bruce Svare, a psychology professor with the University at Albany as well as the director of the National Institute for Sports Reform. "They can be a very positive outlet for kids."

Experts say the key to reaping that valuable experience lies with the coaches and parents who must ensure that a child is participating in an environment designed to bring out his or her best.

Svare said sometimes involving kids in sports can actually occur too early.

"Four years old is a time for kids to be exploring," he said.

"A time for kids to be kids."

There is also a distinction between youth programs, typically sponsored by municipalities or other nonprofit groups, and interscholastic athletic programs offered by area school districts.

New York State Public High School Athletic Association Executive Director Nina Van Erk said schools included in the association provide an emphasis on what she calls the "four Cs."

"Character, civility, citizenship and competence," said Van Erk. "I would add a fifth ... commitment."

The association is focused on children in grades seven through 12, and, Van Erk said, students are competing under the guidance of school administrators and certified coaches.

"We don't try to promote a positive atmosphere. We do promote a positive atmosphere," she said. "Our programs should not be to win at all costs."

Like Svare, Van Erk encourages a focus on teaching the fundamentals.

"Kids should not be taught to esteem themselves based on the scoreboard," said Randy

Cale, a Clifton Park psychologist who hosts the Web site www.terrificparenting.com. "Only a small percent are going to be superstars."

"Kids can have a great experience to the extent that we are clear about the value of effort over outcome," added Cale.

Indeed, Van Erk suggests that while student athletes will build leadership skills, those skills translate into team-building skills.

"A child may not be the best, but might be the most integral part of the team," said Van Erk.

In basketball, the child who scores the basket would not be able to do so without the help of a child who makes the assist.

In addition to leadership and

team-building skills, children learn ethics, sportsmanship, fair play and how to be a good winner, said Svare.

"Sports is about having fun, about play, about socializing and learning some skills," said Svare.

Cale and Svare said developing a positive experience for children in sports falls to the parents. Both encourage parents to really examine the organization that they are considering involving their child in and make sure the focus is placed on the appropriate values.

"It is important when parents begin to participate, they choose carefully the atmosphere," said Cale.

Experts say parents should

encourage children to participate in a wide variety of sports as well as different positions within the same sport. Too often, said Svare, children appear to excel at a particular sport and are encouraged to take on that sport as a specialty. He said that often children reach puberty and are able to excel at athletic skills they once did not.

"Kids at an early age should be sampling lots of different sports," said Svare. "Up to the age of 13, kids should be getting involved in a lot of different activities including those that are not sports related. ... Sports at the youth level are really about building better people."

to put it into perspective.

Camardo said she makes it a point to have the children learn that sometimes you win and sometimes you lose, but either way you do it together as a team.

"Children need to see their parents feel proud of them no matter what their role is on the team," said Camardo.

Among parents with kids in sports a common theme seems to be, "enjoy it while they are still young."

Smiles and laughter are usually dominant on any given T-ball field, and mothers, like Christina Carras of Guilderland, say at that level you do not see too much competitiveness in parents, but, Carras said, it does creep up quickly. She also said it is important for parents to remember that many coaches are simply volunteers. They are often parents with full-time jobs and families, in addition to coaching.

"When I hear parents complain about how a coach is doing his or her job, I get frustrated. Parents need to remember these are just people helping out, doing their best," said Carras.

Carras also said she makes it a point to remind her son Andrew, who is on his first year of all-star Little League baseball team, that he is part of an entire team.

"I tell my son that they win as a team and lose as a team, everyone is in it together," said Carras.

Teaching by example

There are plenty of stories about parents who show a lack of sportsmanship themselves, like the hockey dad in Worcester, Mass., who in 2000, beat up the coach after a dispute over a son's play time. It sounds almost too absurd to be true, but it is an example of

how an athlete's parent can go from being supportive to being a bully.

In theory, being on an athletic team, in a club, or in the marching band are all supposed to be facets of a child's life, a way to make them feel part of something.

Mohonasen School Athletic Director Joseph Scalice said the school tries to be clear about expectations by holding a meeting for parents and athletes at the beginning of each season. At that time, they discuss rules and procedures.

"One area that I do talk about is sportsmanship. I will meet with a spectator or athlete if I feel their actions are unsportsmanlike and are a negative reflection of our school. We discuss what is expected of them as a spectator or an athlete," said Scalice.

Taking turns

Gregg Dort, of Ballston Spa, has coached T-ball, youth soccer and Pop Warner football. Having been involved with sports his entire life, he said his philosophy is all kids share equal playing time and all kids play every position. He said his stance is sometimes unpopular with other coaches and some parents.

"I take great pride in showing my players that they all deserve a chance to play, regardless of opinions from other teams and coaches. I spend time during the off-hours making charts and tracking players' time and positions to insure that all my players have played in every position and have shared the game time equally," said Dort.

Dort said he has had parents ask questions like, "Why did you put little Johnnie in as quarterback, we think he is too small." His answer is always, "He deserves to play, and if that child gets excited about playing this year and wants to play again next year, then I will have done my job."

"Smiles are always better

than wins," said Dort.

Dort said the greatest compliment to him as a coach is when parents thank him for helping to get their child excited about being part of a team, and even more, about being excited to share in something with their parents. "I want the kids to get some exercise, experience competition, teamwork, sportsmanship, confidence, learn athletic skills, want to learn more about the sport and play at home with their parents, guardians, or siblings. I want the parents to know that it is OK for their child to laugh, cry, get pushed, score a goal, hit a home run, drop a ball, make a mistake, learn how to kick, throw, pass, catch, want to play at home, experience childhood again, support their child's effort whether good or bad," said Dort.

Sportsmanlike conduct

The Capital District Youth Soccer League has a code of conduct that they hand out to parents at the start of each season. The parents code of conduct asks them to serve as role models for their children and to place the emotional and physical well-being of their child ahead of their personal desire to win. It asks that parents show good sportsmanship and set an example for their child.

Many organizations try to communicate with parents on what is acceptable and what is

not before it is too late.

Athletic director for Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake schools Robert McGuire echoed the importance of sportsmanship.

McGuire said the best thing parents can remember is that being a good sport starts at a young age, as soon as their children are able to interact with others. McGuire said the main theme in his district is to

support one another, whether it's the members of their own teams or athletes on other teams.

"One of the top priorities in running teams is the whole idea of sportsmanship. The direct line of communication for sportsmanship comes from coaches and administrators to our students and student athletes," said McGuire.

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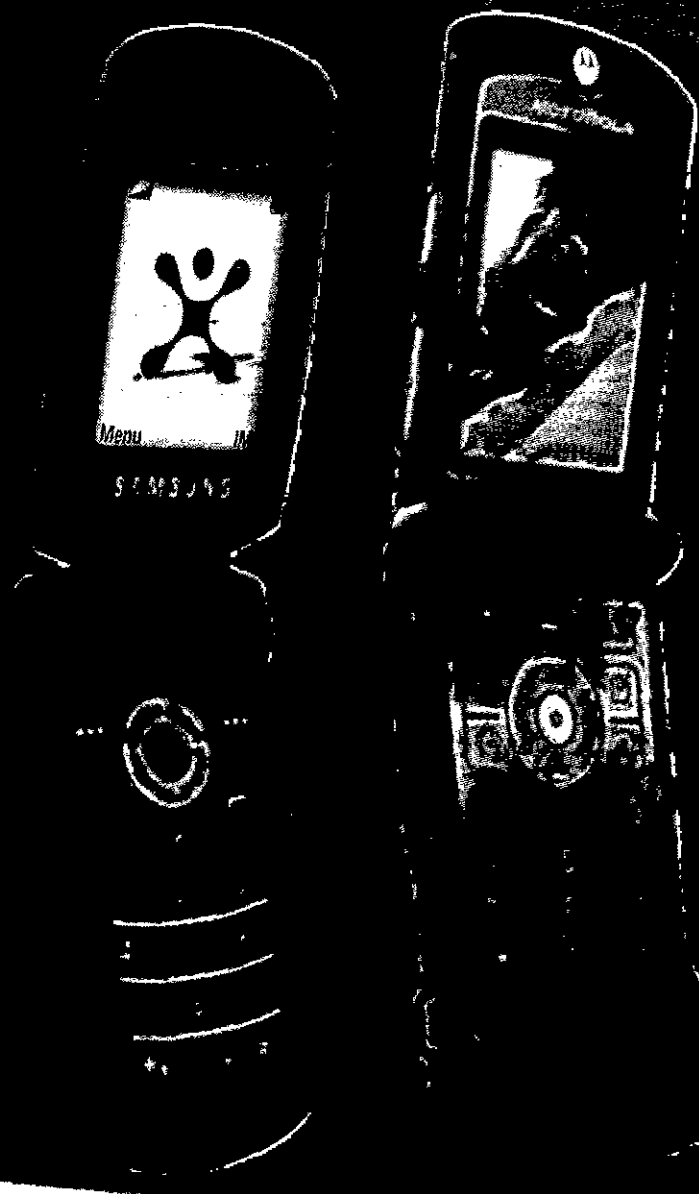
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
