

Upstate's historic rivers are
creating a new kind of business

For decades, merchants and businesses primarily used the area's two major waterways to transport goods. Today, the Mohawk and Hudson rivers still provide an economic shot in the arm but in a far different way: They attract people from all over the globe with their beauty, their historical significance and the many attractions along the rivers' four banks.

The Schenectady County Mohawk River/Erie Canal Blueway Trail, an 18-mile stretch between Lock 9 in Albany and Railroad Station Park in Niskayuna, features 35 different attractions that include historic sites like the Mabee Farm and the Flint House, as well as a number of restaurants and retail shops catering to any appetite - whether it is for a cheeseburger and a soft ice cream cone served up at Jumpin' Jacks or a sit-down meal with a side salad at the Glen Sanders Mansion.

The round trip can be done in a day by paddling a canoe or kayak but the stretch of river also offers places to pitch a tent and camp out for a night, including the Arrowhead Marina and RV Park in Glenville.

It is difficult to gauge the number of people who use the Blueway Trail since tickets are not sold and it spans such a large area, with many

New board gets down to work

Redistricting and full-day kindergarten among the priorities

A new school board president and two newly elected board members began their first Bethlehem Central School District meeting tackling the issues of

redistricting and full-day kindergarten.

James Lytle was elected president of the Bethlehem school board with James Dering, vice-president. Lisa Allendorph and Diane Giacone Stever took their oaths of office, and within minutes, the board began to talk about redistricting, and hiring the firm of Versa Trans Solutions, Inc., to work with the district on the controversial project.

"The process in many ways is already under way here," said Doug Hamlin, representing Versa Trans. "You have changes going on all over the district."

Those changes include an expanded high school, a new elementary school, a move to full-day kindergarten and construction work at several different locations throughout the district.

"We have 52 contracts at nine

Female cop not promoted

Cocchiara says fourth pass is discrimination

The Bethlehem Town Board approved the hiring of two sergeants in the police department to the dismay of a nine-year veteran of the force who applied for the job.

Gina Cocchiara accused Bethlehem police Lt. Thomas Heffernan and Chief Lou Corsi of discriminating against her after she was passed over for the position even though she placed in the top three on the recent civil service test.

Cocchiara said Officer Francis Muller, who she said placed first in the exam, was asked by Heffernan to remove his name from consideration because he would not be selected. Cocchiara said she believes Muller was removed from the list so department administration could approve the fourth- and fifth-place finishers on the civil service test, Officers James Rexford and Christopher Shunk.

Heffernan referred questions to Corsi, who declined to comment on the matter, saying only that it's a personnel issue.

"It has become apparent through some very deep reflection and discussions with my peers that I have been unfairly discriminated against in this process," wrote Cocchiara to the town board.

Cocchiara said with 13 years of experience in patrol law enforcement, nine of those with the Bethlehem force, she has proven herself worthy to fill the position.

"I now have been passed over for promotion a total of four times at the Bethlehem Police Department," she wrote.

The "rule of three," according to the state Department of Civil Service, means candidates with lower exam scores can be considered for a position only when there are fewer than three candidates at higher scores. With Muller removed from consideration for the sergeant position, only two names remained under consideration, al-

Albany teens charged in Bethlehem burglary

Two Albany teens have been arrested by Bethlehem police in a joint investigation with Albany police in connection with a burglary earlier this month on Kenwood Avenue in Delmar.

Rasheem Robinson, 19, of 468 Second Ave. and Jamar King, 19, of 35 Jeanette St. were both charged with second-degree burglary and fourth degree grand larceny, each felonies.

According to Bethlehem police, the two were charged when detectives found a pawn shop receipt of a Rolex watch that matched the description of a stolen item from the first floor of a

residence at 533 Kenwood Ave.

Police said officers then secured the watch and contacted Robinson at his residence in Albany. Detectives searched the residence and found the pawn shop transaction for the Rolex watch in Robinson's possession. Police said Robinson then led police to a Menands Shop n Save parking lot where other items stolen from the burglary were found, according to police. Police charged King when both suspects admitted their involvement in the burglary to police.

Bail for Robinson and King was set at \$7,500 following arraignment in Bethlehem Town Court.

Accident yields DWI charge

Brozowski's vehicle received front-end damage in the accident, and he declined treatment from emergency personnel at the scene.

He was also ticketed for leaving the scene of an accident. He will appear in Bethlehem Town Court Aug. 7.



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Storm outages inspire innovations

Pool and drug store serve customers despite power woes

Bethlehem residents found some very resourceful people at the CVS drug store on Delaware Avenue and at the Elm Avenue Park after power went out throughout the town following the Monday, July 9, summer storm.

The pool at the Elm Avenue Park had to be closed Tuesday, July 10, because the filtration system used to chlorinate it was shut down until the power was restored. But that didn't stop several children from frolicking in a makeshift water park amounting to a hose connected to the hydrant next to the pool.


"The fire hose connected to the fire hydrant sprayed the water up into the air," said Nan Lanahan, town recreation administrator. "A couple of camps were here, and they used it, then word spread throughout the community and other kids stopped by."

Lanahan said the hydrant continued to cool off kids until 7 p.m. on one of the hottest days of the year with temperatures well into the '90s. Although power was restored at the park around 4 p.m. repairs to the pool filtration system delayed the opening until the next day.

At the Delaware Avenue CVS, employees waited outside the front of the store as customers one-by-one placed their orders to fill prescriptions. The store suffered power issues on Tuesday and Wednesday, July 10 and 11.

"We are trying to help the people in need," said one pharmacist as he popped open the electric doors and handed a filled prescription to a customer, while inside the store was dark.

"At the end of the day, people need their prescriptions,"



said Mike DeAngelis, CVS spokesman.

DeAngelis said the company is used to these kinds of emergency procedures in other states, due to severe weather in the past like four hurricanes in a six-week period in Florida and Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans. But this is a first for any CVS store in the Northeast.

"Our employees are doing a great job making sure customers are being taken care of," DeAngelis said.

Repairing a broken circuit was the main reason CVS was still without power after most other customers power was restored in the town.

Bethlehem waterfront along the Hudson River include a fishing pier, hiking and cross-country ski trails, and an amphitheater and educational facility.

Those were a few of the ideas reviewed by the local waterfront revitalization committee at its Tuesday, July 10, meeting.

Rob Holzman and Brit Basinger of Saratoga Associates, the firm hired by the town to create the local waterfront revitalization plan, reviewed the master plan for the Henry Hudson Park. Short and long-term goals include kayak portage, a ball field, and a picnic area along with boat launch and fishing pier.

"Putting in the park memorial

and installing a fishing pier is the first step," said Basinger.

Other goals for the park include land acquisition to create better access.

The committee reviewed drawings that include a concession stand next to the boat launch, a woodland pathway, new bathrooms, and an opportunity to build an outdoor theater. The idea behind having short and long term goals are to create a flexible vision for the waterfront that will allow for more funding opportunities.

"When you seek grant funding, this grant will allow you to match certain parts of the program to the grant," Basinger said.

The actual waterfront

revitalization area being considered for development is 10 miles long, extending from the Coeymans town line to the Albany city line. The area is being broken up into three distinct districts, with the north end considered the industrial district, the south end considered the preservation and conservation area, and the central district, which has the most potential for development.

"The town in their document (comprehensive plan) said, 'We want to encourage growth in this area,'" said George Leveille, town economic development director.

Committee member Lisa Evans suggested the revitalization area only be two districts, comprising the north and south ends.

"If we keep three districts, everything that is said about the south district should be said about the central district," said Evans.

Holman said the south district is mostly wetlands and the north district is clearly industrial.

"The central district offers wide open spaces that could one day be developable land," Holzman said.

Everyone working on the revitalization plan agreed the vision for Bethlehem's waterfront will be completed over a period of many decades.

"This is when we are allowed to do the creative thinking we want to do," said Holzman in terms of developing the plan for the town.


"It's a framework for future decision making and a framework for what will happen if projects are developed."

Leveille said the town is expected to approve the LWRP in the fall. From there, the state Department of State will review the plan to determine if it meets the policies and protections of the Hudson River.



Town roads drive board meeting

New Scotland discusses work on Krumkill, New Salem South

The New Scotland Town Board talked about the reconstruction and maintenance of Krumkill Road and other roads within the town at its meeting Wednesday, July 11.

In April, a storm damaged the subsoil of Krumkill Road, and there is now a large crack in an area east of the county bridge. The board has been working with the Federal Emergency Management Agency and State Emergency Management Office for about four months to get the funds for repairs, which are expected to cost about half a million dollars.

Krumkill is a high traffic road that connects Albany to New Scotland and Bethlehem, so the town is committed to getting it fixed.

"Cooperation between the town, county, state, and federal agencies is important to the town to make sure we fix this in an expeditious manner," said Mark Dempf, the town engineer.

The town is waiting on a report from a geologist who has to examine the road before it can go any further.

Though the road is currently maintained by New Scotland, town officials are looking to trade it with the county of Albany for Font Grove, a less traveled road within the town that would be easier to maintain.

"It's a very expensive road, and it isn't just a New Scotland road," Supervisor Edward Clark said of Krumkill. "That pretty much defines it as multi-jurisdictional, and we think the transportation network should be maintained systematically."

Also on the subject of roads, the town engineer handed the board a proposal that calls for reconfiguring a hazardous portion of New Salem South Road, where there have been

several accidents. The goal is to realign the road so that it's safer and has better visibility of oncoming traffic.

The town is also concerned about the possibility of a subdivision being built on New Salem South that could cause more traffic. The board agreed to review the paperwork over the next few weeks before making a decision.

The board also talked about having a skate park built in Nichols Park, an idea many parents in the community support. The town has committed to help construct the blacktop that will be the base of the park, but additional funds are needed for the equipment and for a fence that will surround it.

The county has requested a proposal for community youth investment grant money. If the town gets the money, it hopes to use it to build a fence around the park. Contributions from the community are being encouraged to help raise money for the equipment, and those interested in doing so can call 765-4027.

Series shows magic of reading

There will be a concentrated silence worldwide this weekend, broken only by the sound of turning pages as people pore over "Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows."

Scholastic has already printed 12 million copies of the 784-page book by J.K. Rowling, the seventh and final book in the Harry Potter series.

Heated discussions about whether or not Harry will live have dominated conversation at public pools, on playgrounds and in offices for a few weeks now.

So what's so great about this series that started out as a children's book?

It takes us to a place we could never get to ourselves, which is perhaps the No. 1 reason to read.

It is engaging and clever. You may read at a regular pace for about two-thirds of the book; after that, plan to do nothing for a few hours because the only thing that will matter will be finding out what happens.

The language is rich beyond measure. Rowling takes alliteration to a new high. You will reach for your dictionary more than once, and if you read all the way through the definitions, you will find the Latin roots that have named some of the characters.

"Ludo," the first name of the famous former Quidditch player is Latin for "I play." The character who can turn into a werewolf is named Remus Lupin - Canis lupus, the scientific name for a wolf. The meanest boy at Hogwarts is named Draco, Latin for dragon.

And Sirius Black, Harry's protector, turns into a dog. What's the name of the star referred to as the dog star? Sirius.

Detractors complain that the Harry Potter books have gone from something magical to sinister as the characters have moved into their teen years. Of course they did - what's darker than the teen years? It's part of what makes the books so engaging, and for kids who read the first Harry Potter book when they were 8 or 9 and are now the same age as Harry, this last book is especially poignant.

We hope that Harry Potter lives; that he conquers the evil that his enemy Lord Voldemort embodies. It would empower young adults to see one of their own triumph over evil.

Although, perhaps there's already a kind of triumph in the turning of each page of the final book in a series that has enchanted millions.

Help Squash Hunger this year

Capital District Community Gardens, a local nonprofit organization, is hoping you will help to feed the hungry within our communities by donating fresh produce to its Squash Hunger program.

The Squash Hunger program has been helping to bring food to the hungry throughout the Capital District for the past four years. Last year, the Squash Hunger project collected and distributed almost 12,000 pounds of produce to local pantries. We're aiming to exceed that amount this year.

The program has grown to include distribution to area emergency shelters in addition to area food pantries. With fresh produce having a short shelf life, it seemed only natural to distribute food to shelters, where produce would be consumed almost immediately and is both in short supply and greatly in need.

Squash Hunger has eight convenient drop-off locations. Produce is then distributed to more than a dozen locations throughout the Capital District.

Squash Hunger encourages local gardeners and farmers to "grow an extra row for the hungry" or just give whatever excess produce they have in their gardens or fields. However, it is not necessary to be a gardener to participate. Everyone is welcome to contribute, either by growing their own produce or purchasing a little extra from their grocer and leaving it in one of the collection bins. Some participants have even generously gone apple and berry picking on behalf of the Squash Hunger Program. Program volunteers check the bins numerous times each week to ensure that produce is being

picked up and distributed in a timely manner.

By contributing to Squash Hunger, you can know that you've helped out a neighbor in need. Consider these facts about hunger in New York state:

- Fifty percent of households receiving emergency food assistance include at least one employed adult.
- America's Second Harvest estimates that more than 900,000 New Yorkers rely on emergency food programs or soup kitchens and food pantries each week.
- According to the state Department of Health, the total number of meals provided by soup kitchens increased by 3.9 million pounds (61 percent) from 1987 to 1996.
- An estimated 340,080 children in the state are hungry, according to the Nutrition Consortium of New York state. The problem is more acute during the summer months when children, who are most affected by hunger, don't have access to school-based meals.

How can you help to Squash Hunger? Look for one of Capital District Community Gardens' Squash Hunger drop-off bins in any of the following locations from now through the end of October:

Do not refrigerate your produce prior to dropping it off - this reduces its shelf life. Please remember to put heavier produce on the bottom of the bin and more delicate items on top.

In operation since 1972, Capital District Community Gardens manages 45 community gardens in Albany, Rensselaer and Schenectady counties, plants hundreds of city street trees each year and works with community groups to improve the overall appeal of our cities and the quality of life for residents. Since April, we have been operating The Veggie Mobile, which brings fresh produce at an affordable price into low-income, inner-city neighborhoods in our community. Squash Hunger is one of the numerous programs run by Capital District Community Gardens.

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
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New flower shop takes root in Delmar

Longtime local florist opens her own shop

Working in a flower shop is nothing new for Barbara Ostroff. Owning one, however, is.

Ostroff, who recently opened Delmar Florist, worked for 10 years at Verstandig's before she made the decision after Mother's Day weekend to try to make it on her own in the florist business. The revelation came shortly after her parents passed away. As she looked for potential locations, she found the corner of Delaware Avenue and Groesbeck Place in Delmar the perfect place to begin the transition.

After a few hectic weeks of gathering inventory and purchasing the proper equipment, Ostroff was on her way.

"I came and saw the place, and in two minutes I said, 'I'll take it,'" said Ostroff.

According to Ostroff, Delmar Florist will have an assortment of gifts that a person can purchase in the \$5 to \$10 range and the store's motto is "affordable, quality plants and flowers."

"I got my animals, my chocolates, my cooler for the flowers and my computer; everything just fell into place," she said.

Deliveries and FTD Worldwide orders can both be accommodated at Delmar Florists. A weekly shipment of organically grown

flowers from Florverde will be available each week.

"I discovered the program through an organic article I read," said Ostroff. The Florverde products come from Colombia and are shipped to a Latham distributor where Ostroff purchases them for her shop. They are grown and harvested meeting specific social and environmental standards.

"They train the farmers how to apply pesticides properly and use the proper equipment for cleanup," Ostroff said.

Another environmentally friendly feature of Delmar Florist will be the recycled products for sale, including tin collectibles. A line of Gund bears and dogs are available along with fair trade chocolates from Lake Champlain Chocolates.

Delmar Florist is open seven days a week with hours on Sunday from noon to 4 p.m.

"We have only been open two Sundays, but it is definitely worth opening on Sundays," Ostroff said.


Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce president Marty DeLaney said the Delaware Avenue location for Delmar Florists is a good one for customers, and she believes the store will be another Bethlehem success story.

"Barbara has many years of experience in the floral business, she knows many people, and she has the drive and stamina to make it happen," DeLaney said.

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Bethlehem teen hits a high note

Recent BC grad attends opera program

Like many teenagers, Bethany Karpowitz loves Broadway musicals. She saw her first show at age 4, and since then, on regular family visits to New York City, they always see a show.

In high school, Karpowitz started voice lessons with two goals in mind. Her long-term goal was to sing on Broadway and her short-term goal was to land good parts in the musicals at Bethlehem Central High School.

Through family friends, Karpowitz started working with professional singer Carol Yahr in her Manhattan voice studio. Within a few months, Karpowitz learned her voice was more suited to classical singing.

"Within a short period of time, we discovered that she has an unusual talent," said Yahr, who typically coaches professional singers. Turns out that Karpowitz can sing very high notes.

"It's dog whistle range," quipped Karpowitz.

"She was very excited," Yahr said. "She started listening to a whole new landscape of music."

Switching her focus from Broadway to the Metropolitan Opera may be atypical, but Karpowitz has embraced the change.

"The repertoire I sing is so much fun," she said.

With three years of voice lessons and high school theater experience, Karpowitz earned one of 28 slots at the Washington National Opera's

Institute for Young Singers, selected from more than 100 applicants.

The main activity at the three-week intensive program was the rehearsal and performance of an opera scene, said stage director Cindy Oxberry.

"I stage direct [students], make them use props, and show them how to interact as characters," Oxberry said.

In addition to rehearsals and voice lessons, students had workshops in ear training, sight singing, music history, audition practice, vocal health, and resume writing.

Karpowitz performed a scene from Mozart's "The Magic Flute," as one of three ladies who sing in harmony. Oxberry said it's difficult for young singers to hold their line without the support of a chorus, but the trio did very well.

The scenes were performed July 6 in the recital hall at Catholic University of America in Washington, DC, less than two weeks after students arrived at the institute.

"To learn 10 minutes of music in that time is not easy," said Karpowitz.

One of the biggest challenges for Karpowitz was time management. At the institute, scheduled items took up only a few hours and the remainder of each day was open.

Oxberry said Karpowitz made good use of her free time, as she was always prepared with homework assignments.

"Bethany was very studious," Oxberry said. "She really wants to get it right."

Yahr wasn't surprised at this testimony to Karpowitz's work ethic. "Bethany has tremendous discipline and motivation for a kid her age," she said. It's clear she

practices every day, said Yahr. "Her parents didn't push her - it was unsolicited."

"She's a good musician with a vocal gift," Yahr. "She also has a very good ear and she's good with languages." Yahr said that's helpful as much classical singing is in other languages.

"Overall, she's ideally suited for this," Yahr said, adding that Karpowitz is "just a terrific teenager, very affectionate, and she sparkles with enthusiasm."

Karpowitz plans to pursue classical singing as she heads to college. This fall she will be a voice major at Syracuse University. She hopes to benefit from the advantages of a small music program with more individual attention in a big university setting.

In addition to her teachers, Karpowitz credits her family and friends for helping her get this far.

Of her parents driving her to weekly lessons without complaint, she said, "Driving two and a half hours each direction is a ridiculous thing to ask."

And she is very grateful for her grandparents, who fund her voice lessons.

Oxberry said Karpowitz's commitment reflects her upbringing in a community that is very supportive of the arts.

"Bethany has obviously been sparked by something in her school or her town," she said.

Karpowitz illustrates her motivation with a story from the institute, a teacher singing a famous aria.

"It was so beautiful. There was one note that almost floated," she said. "I just want to be able to move people with my voice."

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Board OKs Vista master plan

Project will create jobs, increase tax base

The Bethlehem Town Board approved Vista Technology Park's master after 18 months of work by many town officials.

The official declaration occurred at the Wednesday, July 11 meeting of the Bethlehem Town Board, where members unanimously approved the project.

"It is a wonderful project and I fully support it," board member Kyle Kotary said just prior to the vote.

The Vista Technology Campus is a sprawling 450-acre site stretching across Bethlehem and New Scotland. BBL Developers hope to build out one-third of the site over a 10-to-15-year period, creating several thousand jobs and increasing the town's property tax base.

"Tonight we believe is the culmination of 18 months of

review," said Michael Morelli, assistant economic development director. "This project has been subject to environmental impact statements, public comment and public hearings and review by the town planning board."

Kotary believes Vista is consistent with the town's comprehensive plan because it brings in new development while adhering to the town's overall character.

"Rarely do we have an opportunity to support a project that assists the tax base and keeps 219 acres

undeveloped as open space," Kotary said.

The project will be located just off Route 85 behind the Slingerlands Price Chopper complex. New roads and roundabouts are being constructed now by the state Department of Transportation to accommodate the many motorists who will be traveling to and from Vista Tech Park.

Saratoga Associates is working with the developers and the town on the Vista project.

BBL is no stranger to large development projects. It is the developer of record for more than 26 projects in the state and in Florida including the 12 story downtown Albany building at 677 Broadway and the MVP Capital Region headquarters in Schenectady. The first tenants of Vista are expected to be in place at the end of 2008.

The Bethlehem Town Board is lead agent for the project. The town planning board will review individual site plans for each Vista tenant.

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

Music Studio shapes future maestros

Events, both the momentous and the millions so small they've been forgotten, shape us in ways we cannot foresee.

For instance, Cindy Mashuta, like many parents, knew she wanted her son Michael to take music lessons. When he was very young, about 2, they'd tried one course, but it hadn't really stuck.

At The Music Studio, things changed. "Within a year, he was playing simple songs and able to play a song on his own in front of a group, without being afraid. It made a difference for him all through school. He wasn't afraid to talk in front of people or try out for a play. It changed everything," says Mashuta.

The Music Studio's director and founder, Noel Liberty, believes that little milestones, like learning a simple song and playing for parents, propel younger children as far, if not further, than older children.

"Young children learn so quickly, they don't even know they're learning. It's the perfect time for them to become involved with music. Plus, they're so proud of what they can accomplish; they want to show their parents," Liberty said. "Small performances and little milestones throughout the year make wonderful sense and an incredible difference."

Mashuta said there is an added value to performing. "Music brought our family together. My parents loved coming to my kids' recitals. Plus, I thought it was great that parents stayed and were involved in the classes with the kids. You really learned what they were doing."

Liberty concurs that parent involvement in the classroom is important.

"Parents can reinforce what they learned when they're outside the

classroom, plus it gives the child someone to share music with, for years," said Liberty. "Music then becomes a shared experience for the entire family. Parents, to paraphrase, can truly be the difference they want to see in their children. Parental involvement is incredibly important."

Liberty thinks the relationships students make with other students are also important. "When Dr. Amy Guzik, a former student

now doing her neurology residency, came back this spring to our 30th birthday concert, one of the things she said in a talk with parents was that doing things with other students made the piano fun in a completely different way." Mashuta said she feels


the same.

"For Michael and Nicholas (Michael's brother), it's been the group things that have kept them going: The classes for private students, performing with other students, the concerts, duets, the seminars on different music, an entire environment that's supported them," said Mashuta.

And when Michael Mashuta and Rebecca Lewis performed as piano soloists while high school seniors with the Albany Symphony Orchestra at The Music Studio's 30th Birthday Concert, although there were countless photographs, one of the most special for Mashuta was a photo from her own family album. It was a picture taken 12 years ago of Michael and Rebecca in their first class at The Music Studio when they were in kindergarten.

"It was amazing to me how much they'd learned and how fast it had all been!" said Mrs. Mashuta.

"They were ready," says Liberty. "They'd taken it one milestone at a time."

Top 10 tips for dog owners

1. A dog is a dog. The greatest misconception many dog owners have is to assume their dogs communicate the way humans do. Dogs live by the same pack rules and exhibit many of the same behavioral patterns as their wild ancestors. To effectively train your dog, you must first understand its instinctual pack behavior.

2. All dogs think in terms of the pack. Dogs instinctively know that living with others, under the leadership of a dominant pack member, enhances their chances for survival. As a dog owner, one of your responsibilities is to model a leader's strong and consistent characteristics so that you will be accepted as the pack leader and your dog will learn to respect and obey you. Your leadership will make your dog feel safe and eliminate many behavior problems.

3. Dogs don't understand English. In addition to barking, growling and other guttural sounds, dogs rely heavily on body language. And yet, your body language can easily be misinterpreted. By understanding how dogs communicate, you will avoid the mistake of telling your dog one thing while your body language and voice pitch tell it something completely different.

4. Dogs are neither spiteful nor deliberately naughty. There are three reasons why a dog misbehaves or disobeys: a. It does not understand what you want, b. It does not consider you its leader, or c. It is suffering from some kind of stress or fear. Understanding this will help

you address your dog's problems and behaviors.

5. Aggression is instinctual in every breed. Whether Chihuahua or German shepherd, a dog's breed has nothing to do with aggression. Instead, aggression is instinctual and caused most often by fear of the unknown — that is, whatever the dog cannot understand or does not recognize as normal. When a dog becomes frightened, it will do one of two things: fight or take flight. By reinforcing leadership over your dog, you can avoid unacceptable or uncontrollable aggression.

6. You can teach an old dog new tricks. Dogs are continuous learners and have good memories. The three things that primarily influence a dog's behavior are association, instinct and experience. By conditioning your dog and effectively showing it what you consider good and bad behavior, you can help any dog change its behavior.

7. Bad behaviors may be natural, but they do not have to be normal. Most people consider digging, chewing and jumping as unacceptable dog behavior — but to dogs, these actions are natural. A dog owner needs to associate a dog's bad behavior with a negative experience, such as a harsh voice tone, and good behavior with a positive experience such as high-pitched praise.

8. It's illogical to get angry at your dog. Dogs only do what comes naturally or what they've learned through association, so getting angry — or using physical force — with a dog is both inappropriate

and counterproductive. Moreover, never use your hands for disciplining, because dogs find this provocative and threatening. For this reason, you should use your hands as little as possible when training, and when you do, make sure your dog always associates your hands with gentleness and pleasure.

9. Correct your dog on the spot. Because dogs learn from association, they will comprehend your message only if it is delivered in a timely manner. A correction must be issued at the precise moment the dog is either contemplating or actually doing something wrong. Because it can be difficult to catch your dog in the act, you can find ways to create situations that will cause your dog to misbehave so you can then correct it immediately.

10. Dogs experience the world differently than humans. With 25 times more olfactory reception than humans, dog can sense odors at concentrations millions of times lower than humans can. In addition dogs' sight has been described to be like that of a color-blind human. Dogs use other cues (such as smell, texture, brightness, and position) rather than rely on color. With acutely developed hearing, dogs can hear sounds four times farther away than humans — but dogs also hear selectively. They can sleep beside a blaring television, but wake up as soon as they hear something unrelated to that.

sites currently in the district," said Rudley Lewis, construction manager for SanoRubin, overseeing the district's many renovations and upgrades.

A committee will be picked by the school board to oversee the redistricting process with a completion deadline in January.

"At the end of the day, you want to have your facilities populated to the best of your ability," Hamlin said.

Several steps are involved in the redistricting process including geographic data, current and future student database, developing neighborhood planning units, and program and staff considerations.

Versa Trans will supply the district with about five different options for redistricting that will be narrowed down to one or two before a final decision is made. Everyone agreed communication is the key component to ensure a smooth transition.

"There will be a very robust communication plan from start to finish," said Superintendent Les Loomis.

The district has hired Matt Leon as new communications director to replace both Jessica Shekton and Audrey Hughes in the district communications office. Leon's last job was with the Albany City School District and

one of his first duties will be updating the school's Web site on the redistricting process.

School board member Lynne Lenhardt recalled the last time Bethlehem discussed redistricting and recalled some of the more tense moments at school board meetings.

"I remember someone wanting to throw a shoe at the board," Lenhardt said. "It's very emotional."

Hamlin, a Delmar resident said Versa Trans has worked on redistricting in the Shenendohowa school district three times over the last 10 years.

"At the end of the day, this is a process that doesn't make everyone happy," said Hamlin.

The school board tentatively scheduled Oct. 30 as the date for a public referendum vote on Excel Aid. There is \$3.5 million available to the district for projects that fit the state's criteria for funding.

"Physical expansion, handicap accessibility, health and safety issues, energy savings, and technical infrastructure, are the state's five categories," said Richard Peckham of Collins/Scoville architects, designers of overall district construction.

The funding, if approved by the community, will pay for eight new classrooms at Eagle Elementary and to help maintain balanced classroom sizes throughout the district for the expanded full-day kindergarten.

Town rallies after storm

Crews remove debris, restore power following summer squall

It wasn't a tornado, and it wasn't even a straight line thunderstorm that ripped through Albany, Rensselaer and Schenectady counties on Monday, July 9, knocking out power to more than 36,000 homes and businesses.

But don't tell that to the residents of Bethlehem who watched the late-evening thunderstorm barrel through their yards and neighborhoods, ripping trees from their roots, toppling limbs and branches on power lines and roads, from Kenwood and Delaware avenues to state Route 9W.

"The October '87 storm was definitely worse," said Bethlehem Town Highway Superintendent Gregg Sagendorph, who has worked through 35 years of bad weather.

"I was surprised with this storm how one area could get hit and one or two streets over it looked like nothing happened," said Sagendorph.

The three main Bethlehem thoroughfares were closed in many areas for almost 24 hours as National Grid worked to safely remove the trees dangling dan-

gerously on top of leaning power lines and cables. At various times over a three-day period from Monday evening, July 9, through early Wednesday, July 11, nearly 6,500 Bethlehem homes were without power.

"The heat and humidity made working conditions difficult," said Albert Bianchetti, a spokesman for National Grid.

National Grid has come under fire recently for what many people believe was a slow response to the major power outages.

"The lightning and heavy rains wreaked havoc on our system," said Bianchetti.

Bethlehem Supervisor Jack Cunningham watched the storm inside town hall as it tore through the area between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. He immediately drove through town with the police and highway departments assessing the damage and helping to remove debris from the road.

"We're very fortunate," said Cunningham.

Bethlehem Town Hall was made into a makeshift cooling station for people to rest and receive refreshments and shelter while waiting for the power to be turned back on.

Kimberly Sutkevich of the National Weather Service in Albany said the highest wind gusts were around 50 miles per hour with quarter size hail through Loudonville and Latham.

"This thunderstorm cell definitely had more cloud-to-ground lightning than we're used to seeing," said Sutkevich.

Areas hardest hit included

Kenwood and Elsmere avenues, and a portion of 9W near Wemple Road and McGinty Drive in South Bethlehem where several trees were uprooted outside a few homes.

"It ripped the tops of trees right off and the road was completely blocked," Cunningham said of McGinty Drive.

Ten people worked through the night in the highway department clearing roads and removing debris.

"Our crews are tireless and the people of the town are very gracious," Sagendorph said. "We received many compliments."

A section of road on Delaware Avenue near Bennet Terrace was closed when a tree fell across the road on top of power lines. A large Oak tree believed to be hundreds of years old came down on North Street. Several trees off Kenwood Avenue on property owned by the Kleinke family were toppled. Delaware Avenue was without power throughout the evening as people walked the streets after the storm looking at the damage and trying to cool off.

"This road (Delaware Avenue) was total darkness all the way into Albany," said Cunningham.

Police and fire departments also worked through the night assisting residents in need.

"Emergency service really responded," said Sagendorph.

Highway department crews worked through the past weekend continuing to clean up debris left from the storm.

Champlain along what was then America's frontier, the canal began as the controversial brainchild of DeWitt Clinton, a forceful and ambitious leader in state political history who took center stage in the early 1800s and tried to use New York's prominent role in national affairs as a springboard to the presidency.

Clinton, who eventually became governor of the state, envisioned the canal as a water highway that would give New York City, soon to be the largest city in the country, easy access to expensive furs for merchants and cheap grains to feed a growing population. It would also help develop the Upstate economy by encouraging settlers to move north and west. His plans stirred controversy when political opponents spoke out against them and Martin Van Buren, a Columbia County resident and future president, expressed skepticism about the project.

An early breakthrough in the waterway's history occurred in 1816 when the semi-retired Clinton was appointed to a position on the canal commission. The appointment came after months of public lobbying during which a lengthy report from Clinton was used to provide an economic justification for the unprecedented project. In that document, Clinton laid out the case for building a canal waterway linking much of Upstate through a network of feeder canals that would be paid for by a system of tolls on shippers and provide even small hamlets with access to major rivers in the eastern part of New York. A year later, construction of the Erie Canal was approved by the state legislature with Van Buren's acquiescence.

By proposing such an expansive project, and supporting its promotion at public rallies in New York City, Clinton built a coalition that garnered state-wide backing for the project. He propelled construction of a canal system that is part of one of the largest waterways in the country outside of the Mississippi River. And by 1825, construction of the Erie Canal — Clinton's Ditch — was largely complete.

In the 182 years since navigation began on the canal, Clinton's spirit of promotion has proven crucial to encouraging greater use of the system. While most state officials have been united in their approach, some local leaders are calling for more to be done to promote area waterways as a tourist destination.

"New York's historic canal system offers more than 524 miles of scenic waterways to explore and is fast becoming one of the nation's premier boating destinations," state Canal Corporation Director Carmella Mantello said at a press conference held to take note of the annual opening of boating season.

"While the Capital Region is at the confluence of two great rivers, the Mohawk and the Hudson, there aren't a lot of people who know about it," said Schenectady County Legislator Joseph Suhrada, R-Rotterdam. "We have the canal coming through here, and the rivers are truly a gem. But we don't always use the resources we have at the county level to make the most of what we have.

"We could do more to promote these waterways and draw more tourism dollars to our area," Suhrada. "That could really make a difference when it comes to economic development."

places to launch a boat, canoe or kayak, said Jim Kalohn, a planner for the Schenectady County Economic and Planning Department.

Two seasons ago the Schenectady County Chamber of Commerce created a map and brochure with a legend of the sites, and the miles between the attractions, with grants from the state Department of State and the state Canal Corporation. Last season, the chamber distributed more than 1,000 brochures and the state Thruway Authority distributed another 2,000 at rest areas east and west of the Capital District.

"We are trying to promote the historic sites in particular because they represent the biggest potential attractions to draw people to the area," said Kalohn, noting the Mabee Farm and the Stockade section of Schenectady.

At the same time, merchants are taking advantage of the increasing interest in the rivers and are adding to their allure.

"I think it is one of the biggest assets in America right now, definitely," said Pat Popolizio, owner of the two-year-old Water's Edge Lighthouse Restaurant, located on the Mohawk River off Freeman's Bridge Road in Glenville, of the rivers. "I was on the river today, and I have a place on Lake George, and I see as many boats on the river as up there. When you are on the river, you can go places, whereas when you are on a lake you are landlocked. Within the next 10 years it will be a main attraction."

The Blueway Trail in Schenectady County is part of a concentrated effort to promote a 534-mile canal system crisscrossing upstate that includes 57 locks and 16 lift bridges. It links the Hudson and Mohawk rivers to Lake Champlain, Lake

Ontario, the Finger Lakes, the Niagara River and Lake Erie. It passes through 25 counties and 200 villages, hamlets and towns, according to the Canal Corporation. In 2001, it was named the nation's 23rd National Heritage Corridor.

"It appeals not only to the

landscape, on any given river excursion, a person can see hawks, heron, ducks, osprey, an occasional bald eagle and a variety of mammals living along their banks.

As an example, she said this year's seventh Great Hudson River Paddle, a 156-mile, 11-day paddle from Albany to New York City attracted enthusiasts from as far away as Quebec and New Zealand.

In 2005 there were 27 Heritage Corridors, now there are 10 more, and one study found they generated a collective \$8.5 billion in

direct and indirect sales that year, Mangione said. While it is difficult to put a number on how many people visit the Hudson Valley because of the Greenway or the Heritage Corridor — there is a study under way in an attempt to pinpoint that number — she said more than 1 million people have visited the Web site and not just hitting on it haphazardly, she added, but by users who explore the site looking for what the Hudson Valley has to offer.

people in the area but nationally and internationally," said Mary Mangione, executive director of the Hudson Valley Greenway and director of the Hudson River National Heritage Area, of the historic allure and beauty of the Hudson Valley. From Lake Erie to the Hudson ...

- In 1800, Gov. Morris wrote that ships should be able to sail from the Hudson to Lake Erie.
- Between 1807 and 1808, Jesse Hawley, a miller from Geneva, penned 14 essays regarding the construction of a canal from Lake Erie to the Hudson. Thomas Jefferson found the prospect "a little short of madness," while then-Mayor of New York De Witt Clinton embraced the idea.
- In 1817, Gov. De Witt Clinton encouraged the legislature to appropriate funds for the Canal's construction. Construction started in Rome on July 4.
- On Oct. 26, 1825, construction was completed. De Witt Clinton and several officials make the nine-day trek to New York City, where he emptied two barrels of water from Lake Erie into the Atlantic Ocean.
- Starting in 1832, renovations were made to the canal, widening it from 40 to 70 feet, and increasing the depth from 4 feet to 7 feet. The project was completed in 1862.
- In 1895, the canal was made 9 feet deep.
- In 1899, Gov. Theodore Roosevelt appointed a Committee of Canals to develop a new policy after major changes are deemed necessary.
- The Barge Canal System developed from that policy. A large portion of the original channel was abandoned, and the resulting construction remains today, with the canal averaging 125 feet wide, 12 feet deep, and consisting of a system of 35 locks.

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





Plan now for nursing home costs

What is the Deficit Reduction Act and why do I need to know about it?

In February 2006, the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005 was enacted. It was the most significant change in the Medicaid Law since 1993 and dramatically altered the way a person can gift assets prior to applying for Medicaid to pay for nursing home costs. Anyone who is concerned about the staggering cost of nursing home care, whether for themselves or their family, needs to understand the importance of careful planning to comply with the new rules.

How did it change the prior law?

Anyone who applies for Medicaid to pay for the cost of his or her nursing home care must now disclose any gift they made within five years of the Medicaid application. The burden, which the new law imposes upon Medicaid applicants, is that any gift they made after Feb. 8, 2006 and which was made within five years of applying for Medicaid, is treated as if it is still available for the cost of nursing home care. This means that the Medicaid applicant will be denied Medicaid benefits for a period of time equal to the number of months of nursing home care which the gift could have paid

for if the Medicaid applicant still had the gift. The problem, which the new law creates but does not solve, is that the gift is usually not available and the person in the nursing home has no money left to pay the nursing home bill. This dire situation can be prevented however with proper advanced Medicaid and estate planning provided by skilled Elder Law attorneys such as those at the Herzog Law Firm in Albany.

What planning opportunities exist after the new rules?

For anyone who does not have long-term care insurance, the best planning tool is an irrevocable Medicaid Trust. This form of a trust allows the creator to protect assets from Medicaid eligibility while retaining indirect control of the trust assets, including their home. The assets are, after the five-year waiting period, fully protected from nursing home costs. In addition, if the assets are ever sold, the proceeds of sale are protected as well. The creator of the trust is entitled to all income from trust assets and can withdraw and use the trust assets if needed or desired with the consent of their beneficiaries. However, the requirement for consent of the beneficiaries is not a burdensome

restriction because the creator retains the power to change the beneficiaries.

Nursing Home costs now average approximately \$100,000 a year in the Capital District. You can do something now to deal with this financial crisis before it arises. You should consult an experienced Medicaid and estate planning law firm such as the Herzog Law Firm and find out how to make an irrevocable Medicaid Trust an integral part of the estate plan for yourself and your family members before its too late. Sooner is always better than later.

Short-term rehab gets seniors active again

"It was wonderful," Mildred Cooperman said, speaking in a vigorous voice, about the physical and occupational therapy she received as a short-term rehabilitation patient in the Rehabilitation Center at Daughters of Sarah Senior Community.

"I can't praise them enough. The nursing care, the physical therapy, and the occupational therapy was wonderful," said Cooperman, of Albany, who returned home after short-term rehabilitation to heal a crushed bone in her leg.

Well over 50 percent of the center's short-term rehabilitation "graduates" are living testimony that time spent at Daughters of Sarah can be key to a beginning of life newly appreciated, and a return

to independence. With an average stay of 20 to 45 days, going home is not an unattainable dream for many older men and women.

It is possible even during the course of therapy for some, as Daughters of Sarah Rehabilitation has been certified by the state Department of Health for outpatient services.

Daughters of Sarah Nursing Center's short-term rehabilitation program welcomes seniors recovering from limitations resulting from injury or illness. These may include, but are not limited to, stroke, amputation, hip or knee surgery, arthritis and any other condition that impairs mobility or limits independence in activities of daily living. Rehabilitation candidates may be referred to Daughters of Sarah by other healthcare professionals, hos-

pital discharge planners and home healthcare providers. Each resident receiving treatment is offered an individualized treatment program designed to restore his or her highest level of functioning.

The available rehabilitation disciplines consist of physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech language pathology. The therapists work closely together, recognizing that teamwork and a multidisciplinary approach maximize healing.

Rehabilitation services are appropriate after stroke, knee or hip surgery to retrain an individual to walk; to train a person how to use a brace or prosthesis after amputation; to introduce strategies for performing normal routines when injuries or illness interfere with activities of daily living; to improve strength and endurance for individuals compromised by illness or injury; and to enhance communication when injury or illness interferes with speech and language skills.

Rehabilitation of the geriatric population may require a longer


period of time than for younger individuals, according to Joan Healey, administrator of Daughters of Sarah Nursing Center and COO of Daughters of Sarah Senior Community. "No matter what the age, the benefits of rehabilitation are the same. These may include increased energy and self esteem, improved muscle tone and greater function of bones and joints."

Nancy Simon, staff registered occupational therapist, said, "We deal with each individual person at their pace, what they can tolerate, and we allow time for them to achieve what they need to accomplish. This allows for other medical conditions, which may impact a person's rate of progress."

Short-term rehabilitation enables individuals to return to living in the community as soon as it is safely possible. Before discharging a resi-

dent to his or her life in the community, members of the rehabilitation team visit the proposed home environment to assess its readiness to accommodate the person's needs. Suggestions are outlined for any necessary modifications that will enhance the individual's quality of life and safety.



The enrollment may be a little less than at other Capital District schools, but Christian Brothers Academy students are high achievers.

Christian Brothers Academy in Albany is celebrating its 10th anniversary at its new 126-acre campus near Albany International Airport, as well as the 150th anniversary of its founding by the De La Salle Christian Brothers.

"We have close to 500 boys here in grades 6 through 12. McGuire.

"Ours is a strong academic program with a long, proud tradition going back to 1859," said McGuire.


No matter where the school principal travels, he finds CBA alumni across the globe.

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Colonie senior center adds to its programs

On July 26, Colonie Senior Service Center will host a newly launched national vehicle fit check program to help keep senior drivers safe.

"Although seniors are often the safest drivers in that they are more likely to wear their seatbelts, and less likely to speed or drink and drive, age-related fragility makes them more likely to be injured when a crash does occur," said Roger Dames, traffic safety services coordinator for AAA Hudson Valley. "Older Americans need to take extra care to ensure their cars are properly adjusted for them."

Created by the American Society on Aging, in collaboration with AAA, AARP, and the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA), the program, called CarFit, is designed to ensure older Americans have properly adjusted their vehicles to help reduce crashes and the death and injuries that result. While many driver safety programs are directed toward improving senior safety by addressing the senior's cognitive abilities and skills,

CarFit is the first program that determines a senior's proper fit in the vehicle.

A trial version of the program was administered last year with more than 300 senior citizens. Results found that 37 percent of participating seniors had at least one "red flag" issue; 10 percent did not have the right spacing between their steering wheel and chest; and almost 20 percent did not have the right sight line over their steering wheel.

Specially trained volunteers, including Jim Hummel, CSSC transportation director, and health professionals such as occupational therapists administer the evaluation. "(Occupational therapists) help people improve their ability to perform tasks in their living and working environments," said AOTA President Penelope Moyers. "A senior who is safer behind the wheel can stay mobile and keep participating in their community, and participation is vital to maintaining good health." Go to www.aaa.com/carfit to learn more.

Each CarFit evaluation takes about 15 minutes, and ensures a

proper "fit" based on the following 12-Point Checklist: safety belt use, steering wheel tilt, head restraint setting, positioning to air bag, line of sight over steering wheel, positioning to gas pedal, positioning of brake pedals, mirror adjustment, neck mobility, operation of parking brake, operation of ignition key, and operation of other vehicle controls.


Easy steps to lower your cooling bills

Even with hot summer weather here, it's not too late to give your home a "check-up." Here are six tips from the Comfort Institute to make sure your air conditioning bills don't blow your cool.

1. Have your duct system tested for air leaks. Many assume that windows and doors are the major cause of a home's energy wasting air leaks. But according to recent research by the Department of Energy (DOE), gaps, joints and disconnections in the typical home's duct system are much more significant. The DOE states that the typical duct system loses 25 to 40 percent of the energy put out by the central heat pump or air conditioner. Authorities recommend having an AC contractor test for leaks and then seal them with a brushed on fiber-reinforced elastomeric sealant. Duct tape usually dries out and fails. It turns out duct tape is great for many things, but sealing ducts isn't one of them.

2. Ask your AC contractor to perform an Infiltrometer "blower door" test. The blower door is a computerized instrument originally invented by the Department of Energy. It pinpoints where your home's worst air leaks are, such as duct leaks, and also measures how leaky the overall house is. Many homes have significant air leaks into the attic: hot dusty air often gets drawn in through recessed can lights and pulled down stairs. New sealing products are available to fix these significant leaks. Many AC contractors offer an Infiltrometer test as part of a "Whole House Health & Comfort Checkup" that also checks insulation levels and overall duct performance.

3. Close your fireplace damper. Did you remember to close it last time you used the fireplace? Shut it now or waste precious cool air all



summer long.

4. Replace your air conditioner or heat pump air filter. Most systems need this done every month to ensure safe and efficient operation. Keep forgetting to do it? Ask your AC contractor for information on an extended surface area whole-house air filter that only needs to be replaced once a year. It also does a far better job of keeping your equipment and the air in your home clean.

5. Have your air conditioner cleaned and tuned. A pre-season tune-up is a great investment. It reduces the chances of breakdowns in the middle of summer and more than pays for itself through more energy efficient operation. Make sure the AC contractor cleans both the indoor and outdoor heat transfer coils, and checks refrigerant gas charge by measuring "superheat" or "subcooling."

6. Consider replacing your old air conditioner or heat pump. Just

like a car, central cooling equipment doesn't last forever. Is your system more than 12 years old? Planning to stay in your home more than a few years? Many authorities recommend replacing it before it fails permanently. A new system improves comfort, is more dependable and creates less air pollution. New units are up to twice as energy efficient, which saves money on your monthly electric bills.

However, government and utility research has found that more than 90 percent of newly installed high efficiency systems have energy wasting mistakes. Do some homework before talking to contractors. Lexington focuses on service

How does a small business survive and grow in a world of big-box retail stores? Mark Garzia, the owner of Lexington Vacuum on Central Ave. in Albany, has the answer.

"The reason we've grown with all these other retail options is because we give personal service to the customer," Garzia said. "If they're buying a machine, we ask them what their needs are and tailor a machine to their needs."

Garzia, of Latham, has owned the business with his wife, Jan, since 1980. It was originally on Lexington Avenue in Albany and was founded by Cliff

Kingsbury and George Haughton.

The founders met in the Navy in World War II and began the business in 1946.

Lexington Vacuum has been at its current location at 997 Central Ave. for almost two years. A fire destroyed the previous location, which was also on Central.

Garzia stocks eight different lines of equipment and boasts an inventory of more than 150 types of vacuum bags.

The business earned a 100 percent service satisfaction award for three years from General Electric service from 1999-2001. Garzia said that about half of the company's business is service, while the other half is sales.

"We're industry-certified for all of our repairs. We stock and sell quality parts. Our repairs turn around in a couple of business days," he said. "Most of the vacuums we sell are in the \$200, \$300, \$400 range, and we expect them to last 15 or 20 years, many with warranties to seven years."

Garzia said the vacuums the company sells range in price from \$69 to \$1,000, and that 97 percent

of customers who come in looking for a vacuum or part get what they want that day.

"We may not sell that vacuum to somebody today, but we've demonstrated to them that we're on top of the industry when they're ready to come," Garzia said. "I have a lot of familiar faces, hundreds and hundreds of familiar faces."

Lexington Vacuum has six employees including Jan and Mark Garzia.

"Most people buy their vacuum cleaners at the chain stores, but how do you think a business like this survives employing six people? It's because we do a really good job," Garzia said. "Our rookie has probably been with me eight years. We try to run it as a family business."

Garzia emphasized a high standard of customer service.

"We don't just hand people a box," he said. "We'll get it out of the box, we'll put it together for them, and we'll orient them to the machine. We're here tomorrow when they have a question or two years [from now] if they have a problem."

Albany OBGYN gets to root of endometriosis

Nearly every day in my practice, I see women whom I clinically suspect have a condition called endometriosis.

Unfortunately, a large percentage of these women have been in pain for many years and have been treated with various pain medications without treating the underlying disease.

Endometriosis is strictly defined as uterine lining (endometrium) that grows outside of the uterus. The most common site for endometriosis is the pelvic cavity that includes the outer wall of the uterus, ovaries, fallopian tubes and peritoneum that lines the abdominal cavity. However, it can also occur on the bowel, bladder and other, more distant places.

The treatment of endometriosis with pain medication only allows it to continue growing and potentially results in scar tissue in the pelvis.

This may result in severe pelvic pain, infertility, damage to organs or in rarer cases, bowel obstruction. The endometrial glands that have attached to tissues outside the uterus essentially have no idea they are no longer in the uterus. Thus, the bleeding from endometriosis is the same as it is for a menstrual period. It is this chronic tissue irritation that we believe causes the scar tissue and its consequences.

The most important aspect is early and accurate diagnosis so that treatment can be instituted to minimize any damage to internal organs.

The gold standard for diagnosis still remains laparoscopy. This

is a procedure in which a telescope-like instrument is surgically inserted into the belly button and the pelvis is visualized on a TV monitor by a camera attached to the laparoscope. If endometriosis is seen, then any areas can be destroyed during the surgery.

This also allows assessment of the reproductive organs for those women with infertility or who wish to become pregnant in the future.

Medical treatments are available for the treatment of suspected or recurrent endometriosis. The birth control pill has long been used to minimize the recurrence of endometriosis to keep active disease stable.


Lupron is an injectable medicine that shuts the ovaries down to take away the production of estrogen and, thus, allow the endometriosis to regress. This is the most effective medical treatment available.

In summary, endometriosis is probably more widespread than originally suspected and certainly underdiagnosed. Early detection, accurate diagnosis and aggressive treatment are what will minimize the complications of this disease.

I strongly encourage women to seek the advice of their gynecologist if they are concerned regarding their potential to have this disease.

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Technology filters background noise

Devices can adjust to environment

Hearing aids have evolved over the years and are now utilizing little computers to help people hear in the most difficult environments, according to Toni Tiberi, vice president of the Advanced Hearing Aid Center, which has been located at 1540 Central Ave. in Albany for more than 10 years.

"The new hearing aids are night and day from before," said the SUNY Plattsburgh speech and hearing graduate with more than 20 years of experience in the business.

The latest hearing aid, Rhapsody, produced by NU EAR Electronics, uses nanotechnology science to deliver a "clearer, crisper, more natural sound," Tiberi said.

Utilizing a directional speech detector, Rhapsody constantly monitors noise levels, and as background noise increases, the technology will slowly shut down the rear-facing port, allowing the wearers to better hear the conversation taking place either in front of them or to their side. "We are making great strides in allowing people to hear when there's background noise," Tiberi said. Rhapsody, constructed with active feedback intercept, nearly eliminates annoying feedback, the whistling sound that is a common complaint of hearing aid wearers.

To give the wearer a consistently clear, natural sound, Rhapsody includes the acoustic signature, a feature that categorizes sounds and tells the hearing aid which changes

to make.

"I've been helping people hear better for over 20 years. This is the biggest breakthrough for people with hearing loss," Tiberi said. "Rhapsody makes it so easy for our patients to hear clearly in different settings, including a noisy restaurant or church. Our patients are absolutely amazed with the clarity and natural sound." NU EAR also utilizes sophisticated fitting software that more accurately matches the hearing aid to the hearing loss, resulting in fittings that are more accurate and mean fewer office visits for the patient.

Another advance in hearing aid technology works with a wearer's cell phone. Anyone with a cell phone using Bluetooth technology can attach a device called an ELI to a behind-the-ear hearing aid that allows the hearer to converse on a cell phone without ever touching the cell phone. Both sides of the conversation are piped through the ELI.

The wireless technology, featured in *Time* magazine as one of the most innovative products of the year, does not include a headpiece or mouthpiece. The user simply pushes a button and the conversation is transmitted through the hearing aid.

"For people who wear hearing aids, cellular phone technology has been inadequate, preventing them from understanding the conversation," Tiberi said. "Many people have opted not to use a cell phone because of the poor sound quality and compatibility with their hearing aid, and were unable to have the mobility and freedom that today's cell phones provide."

People without hearing aids can be custom-fitted with a custom ear mold that is equipped with an ELI - which can also answer incoming calls and hang up completed calls, all hands-free.

BEFF's serves up dining in hometown atmosphere

After more than 15 years in the restaurant business, BEFF's continues to serve up great food in a comfortable atmosphere.

BEFF's first opened its doors on Sept. 11, 1991, in Albany, and opened a second location at the Four Corners in Delmar in 1997.

Hometown dining and a sense of kinship are the backbone of the BEFF's dining experience.

"We support the communities we're in, and the people support us," said owner Mickey Blanchfield.

Blanchfield points out that 95 percent of his employees at the Delmar BEFF's are from Delmar — two of them have been with him since the restaurant first opened at the Four Corners.

Blanchfield said the concept for BEFF's was simple: create a restaurant where everyone felt comfortable, where the heads of state or a family of five would feel right at home, where anyone from 1 to 92 would be welcome.

After selling a pizza place (Spinner's Pizza) that he later found out shared the same name as a Texas Restaurant chain, Blanchfield said he wanted a name he'd be sure no one else would have. BEFF'S is an acronym for "Big Ed Fat Field," a high school nickname of Blanchfield's father, Pete, a big guy to say the least, said Blanchfield.

And if you're going to name a restaurant after a big guy, then you want to offer hearty meals. BEFF's offers mouth watering treats like half-pound burgers, Buffalo wings, and their now famous Irish nachos and chicken toes. Let's not forget about BEFF'S award winning pizzas (the largest selection of specialty pizzas in the Capital District, said Blanchfield). Along with homemade soups, salads, wraps and Ruebens, BEFF'S also boasts an impressive variety of draft beers.

But it's not all pub fare, said Blanchfield.

"If people perceive us as a burger and wing joint, then they're sorely underestimating us," said Blanchfield. He touts the culinary expertise of General Manager and Chef John

Poole, who puts unique fare on the menu such as the Vermonter, a New England-style baked ham sandwich on multigrain bread covered with apple butter, Vermont cheddar cheese and topped with fresh apple slices.

For those with more meat and potatoes sensibilities, Poole offers up four types of fries to accompany any dish: thin-cut Irish fries, waffle-cut zesty fries, hand-cut sweet potato fries and homemade French fries.

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

"People always know they can come back because it's free," he said. "Of all of the arts associations in the Capital District, this is the most accessible because of that."


Smith said the evolution of Park Playhouse is a proud testimony to the founders, leaders and sponsors whose vision of free theater in Washington Park inspires people today.





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
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Community service key to tavern's success



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Mall thrives under local ownership

Clifton Park Center features indoor and 'downtown' shopping areas

"A new way to shop." That's the motto of the Clifton Park Center, following a makeover by new owner Don Greene.

Greene, a Clifton Park resident, bought the property in April 2006 and has since torn down 120,000 square feet to make room for an outdoor "downtown" shopping experience to go with the typical indoor mall.

"This is very different in the mall business," said Jeff Townsend, the mall's marketing director. "This is not a property owned by a company out of state, we don't own 20 malls around the country; it's not that kind of thing. This is local ownership by a local entrepreneur."

Townsend said that a key to the mall's success is the direct access to many of its 55 stores.

Other marquee features include heated sidewalks in the downtown shopping area, which General Manager Susan Keegan said makes the mall unique in the area.

The mall also offers free wireless Internet service in the food court.

"We're signing new tenants right and left. It's very exciting both inside and outside. People like the concept," Keegan said. "The open-air, down-

town kind of feel where people can just meander into stores and walk on the sidewalks."

The mall recently hosted a concert by the Jonas Brothers, which drew more than 1,200 fans from eight states. The band rose to fame on Disney Radio and contributed to the soundtrack of the recent Disney hit movie "Meet the Robinsons."

Townsend said word of the concert spread on Internet Web sites frequented by teens.

"It was a MySpace driven event," Townsend said. "It made such a big deal on MySpace and that's why we had people from so many states. The first person through the door drove from the western border of Pennsylvania."

The Clifton Park Center started in 1980, but Keegan said that the previous owners allowed it to decay in recent years.

"Mr. Greene saw an incredible opportunity here," Keegan said. "The demographics are spectacular. It had been successful in the past, it just was neglected and managed by people who lived way out of town."

"He lives in the town, it's his property and he wants to be proud of it

in every way possible," Townsend added. "He wants to make sure the tenants are successful, he wants to make sure it's appealing to the eye."

Keegan said that the local ownership allows mall management to think of creative ways to bring customers to the mall and create interest in the community.

"With Mr. Greene being local, if we want to do something and he thinks it's a cool idea, we do it,"

Keegan said. "You never know what to anticipate from us."

The mall's anchor stores include Best Buy, J.C. Penney, and Marshalls. The J.C. Penney is located in one of the areas that Greene disconnected from the main indoor mall to provide customers more direct access.

"It's not necessarily about the shopping, it's about the experience of it," Keegan said.

Stewart's supports local farms

In the Capital District, Stewart's Shops seem to be located on almost every corner. For many it is the morning coffee stop, a place to grab lottery tickets while filling the gas tank or where people stop to purchase the last item needed for dinner. Stewart's Shops are all these things — close, convenient and quick — but often customers forget that they are also a local business supporting local people.

"A lot of people don't realize we bottle our own milk and make our own ice cream," said Gary Dake, president of Stewart's Shops. Stewart's works with about 50 local farms, said Dake, all within 50 miles of Saratoga Springs.

The milk is pasteurized and bottled the same day it is picked up from the dairies and is on store shelves within 48 hours. The company employs its own field inspector, who visits the farms regularly. The inspector is licensed by the state and fosters the relationship between Stewart's Shops and area farmers.

"We are known for being very picky for what farms we pick up," said Dake. The company's attention to quality and high standards has not gone unnoticed. Cornell University's department of food science named Stewart's Shops the Best Milk of 2005. The company found itself in the top five in 2006 and Dake anticipates another high placement in the 2007 contest later this summer.

Stewart's eggs come from a Schuylerville farm while all ice cream is made at the company's manufacturing plant in Greenfield. The Greenfield site also includes the company warehouse while corporate offices are located in Malta. The first Stewart's Shop was located on Route 50 in Ballston Spa. The company now boasts 325 shops, 10 in Vermont, that run to the Canadian border, south to Poughkeepsie and west to Watertown and Oneonta.

Dake said 85 percent of the stock in the stores is delivered by Stewart's own trucks, coming from the Greenfield warehouse. Deliveries are, on average, made about every three days to each store. This ensures that the products available to the customer are fresh.

Dake believes part of the company's tremendous success rests on the shoulders of its employees. While the company was founded by Dake's own

grandfather and great-uncle in 1921 and has remained a family business, the company has established a profit-sharing program that results in employees owning about a third of the business.

"We believe that sharing ownership creates involvement for a stronger, more profitable company," said

Dake. "The employees are really dedicated and really care about the product because it is their product and they believe in it."

The company also believes in giving back to the communities in which the Stewart's shops are located. Each year a portion of the company's annual profits are donated to a variety of charities. 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Evergreen keeps seniors active

The cozy aroma of bread baking greets you long before you open the door. On the other side of it, tucked into space in the heart of The Wesley Community, you find Wesley Evergreen Adult Day Services in Saratoga Springs. It is a home away from home for seniors who are partly dependent on others for assistance with tasks of daily living. While these men and women spend weekdays here in the company of the experienced Evergreen staff, their usual caregivers can rest, go to work or fulfill other obligations.

The earliest arrivals drift in shortly after 7:15 a.m., gathering at tables to have a cup of coffee, read the newspaper and ease into the rest of their day. Others arrive throughout the morning.

There are plenty of things to do at Evergreen. Jigsaw puzzles, cards and games are on hand, as well as supplies for arts and crafts projects. A couple of times a week, staff members treat the ladies to manicures. Planned group activities like Bingo are available. Large-print books and classic movies are delivered to the program by the local library.

Mabel G., with dancing eyes and an engaging smile, has attended Evergreen for nine years.

"I come Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. It's a lot better than staring at four walls at home," says Mabel. Her favorite part of the day is playing cards with her friends. She also enjoys the visits from the piano player.

In Evergreen's kitchen, baby pictures taped to the refrigerator door bring smiles and inspire memories of long-ago children or thoughts of great-grandchildren far away and seldom seen. The lively 3- and 4-year-olds who attend the nursery school in another of Wesley's spaces visit once a month, and help to satisfy that sometimes infrequently filled space in the

elders' lives.

Chair exercises keep aging joints and muscles strong and flexible while the staff sets up for the hot lunch the program provides daily. Entertainment and other planned activities take place in the afternoon.

During the day clients may make use of the on-site physical, occupational, and speech therapies, blood-draw station, or other Wesley services. This saves time and extra miles in the car for clients and their caregivers.

Preparations are under way for this year's vegetable garden in the program's private outdoor space. Last summer the garden produced a bumper crop of lemon cucumbers. After eating cucumbers for days, the program participants finally put a basket of them in the hall with a sign that said: "Free - take one!"

Last autumn's potato and bacon soup - made with potatoes from the Evergreen garden - was a huge success and prepared more than once. The clients and staff look forward to the new kitchen that is planned, with more cabinets and better appliances.

By late afternoon, the program winds down for the day. One or two late-staying clients might be found catching a couple of winks in the recliners while waiting for their rides. The last of them leaves Evergreen about 6 p.m.

"It's not the age. It's the attitude." That's what a framed needlework project proclaims from its spot on the wall by the windows.

With a little help from the staff, the seniors who attend Wesley Evergreen have something to look forward to. The opportunity to spend time with friends and engage in the active and fulfilling pursuits that Wesley Evergreen offers, gives purpose and meaning to these seniors' everyday lives.

Retirement community has inviting atmosphere

Avila offers a variety of on-site activities for seniors

One of the area's most popular adult residential communities, Avila Retirement Community, is designed with a friendly country club atmosphere featuring a contemporary Adirondack lodge as its center hub.

Now about three years old, Avila features a town center structure with two connected neighborhoods for a total of 128 spacious apartments on White Pine Drive in Albany. There are 24 cottages, 40 garages, open parking and lush, landscaped courtyards to encourage outside activities.

Perhaps the most inviting part of Avila isn't the physical design, but the people.

"Our staff and our residents are all so positive, and we form a very strong team here," said Dawn Collins, program coordinator. "In a sense, we form our own extended family. I've seen people pull together to support each other in times of need in the same way families do for one another."

Banish the thought of bland, cafeteria-style dining. Avila features formal, casual and private

dining rooms, including a bistro café and a courtyard terrace. Apartment residents are served 21 meals per person, per month; cottage residents receive 14 meals per person, per month.

Affiliated with the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany, Avila is not a retirement home or a nursing facility, but it does offer many services on-site. The community includes an interfaith chapel, as well as a wide array of recreational venues, such as an art and hobby studio, a card and game room, an entertainment complex, a library with computer stations, fitness and aerobic center, and an indoor aquatic center with a pool, spa and locker rooms.

Fitness, nutrition and wellness consultations are also offered, along with access to an extensive healthcare network.

If you're thinking activities might end at oil painting and Bingo, think again.

"We just started a new slate of therapeutic and expressive art and music programs," said Collins. "We have a writing group, sing-alongs, drum circles and a vocalizing for wellness program. I've taken a positive approach to bringing in holistic programs. We've had outside speakers come in to talk about the powers of healing touch."

There is an extensive calendar of recreational, social and educational activities reaching across the Capital District.

"We have transportation shuttles to the theater, museums and other cultural events," said Collins. "Our residents are very highly educated, and they want to go out for a variety of experiences, and we need to meet those expecta-

tions."

Residents choosing not to drive can use Avila shuttles instead for complimentary scheduled transportation to shopping, medical appointments and social events.

Guest rooms are available, and there are small conversation areas for visiting with family and friends. Outside on the carefully maintained grounds, there are walking paths, a greenhouse, a nature preserve and garden planters.

"Our residents are extremely active, and are out and about constantly," said Collins.

There is a resident business center, a mailroom, and available garages.

At Avila, all utilities are included with rent, including local telephone use. Cable television is standard, interior and exterior maintenance are part of the package, as is trash removal. Bi-weekly linen changes and housekeeping services are offered. For residents with physical needs, 24-hour staffing is available.

Floor plans for the various apartments and cottages are laid out for luxury of style and for convenience and practicality. With names like Arlington, Bolton and Blair, many have sunrooms or three-season balconies; some have two bedrooms and two baths.

There is a lengthy waiting list to move into the community, but once there, Avila residents immediately feel at home, Collins said.

"Many people move in not knowing anyone," said Collins. "We have a hospitality committee, but even beyond that, everyone who moves in feels immediately right at home."



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No child left unhappy

As the seasons change and summer comes around in full force, our minds often begin to wander back to the months that just passed. While summer is still a busy time for most educators, it's also a time to reflect on the past school year, to think about the lessons we've learned and the changes we want to make to improve learning for our students in the coming year. Summertime is also an interesting time for parents. It is time filled with meeting their children's needs — all day long.

As an elementary school teacher for 34 years, and as a father and a grandfather, I spend a lot of time observing human behavior — at the mall, the beach and on the streets of our towns. In these situations, I am always fascinated by the interactions I observe between the children we educate and their parents.

As an education leader, I have

very real concerns about the problems caused for our students, families and schools by the tricks and traps of the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) act, currently up for reauthorization. And, while for the most part I am filled with awe at the love and respect evident in families, I sometimes wonder how Washington's disengaged ideologues and bureaucrats would see fit to impose their will on children when they are outside the classroom with their families.

I fear that the bureaucratic response might be a new era of federal futility pouring down on the parent-child relationship, like a thick blanket of stifling humidity or a drenching summer storm.

What will happen if a parent has children who aren't reaching their full potential for summer enjoyment? How would these D.C. bureaucrats flex their muscles and, in their skewed view, correct the situation?

Perhaps they'd dream up new legislation, likely to be called N-C-L-U: No Child Left Unhappy.

Testing would begin immediately, with hundreds of questions, bubble sheet answers and No. 2 pencils for everyone. Assessments would be made of every child's indoor and outdoor happiness to measure their AYP — Adequate Yearly Pleasure. No doubt, these tests would become a database used to label some children as unhappy and some families as failing. Of course, no one wants to leave an unhappy

child behind, so Amusement Intervention Services (AIS) would be established for remedial "cheering up."

No doubt, some parents and families under this scheme would be labeled as failures. Their names would be published in area newspapers and in regional Parenting Report Cards. If their children continue to display below-average happiness, these children might be required to attend alternative parenting settings.

The madness probably wouldn't stop there — the bureaucrats just couldn't keep themselves from proposing even more far-reaching "reforms."

Some in Congress would call for private for-profit "charter families" to take over so-called failing families. Some localities would set up tax credits to put children in "happier" family settings. In other cases, whole families would be required to restructure their days to improve children's satisfaction.

Despite a parent's "biological quasi-tenure," some bureaucrats will begin discussions about removing parents from the home, without due process or a fair hearing, based solely on speculation.

Gone far enough? It has.

As the summer ends and school resumes, expect to hear more unworkable schemes. There will be more of what we don't need: a government that turns its unrealistic and unworkable philosophies into laws that harm parents and their children. What we do need are real solutions to real problems, and the support to make things happen.

Soon, you will hear and read more of these same words — in commentaries like this one — except, self-ordained experts on public education will substitute the word "teacher" for the word "parent." And the same lack of logic, compassion and common sense will apply.





Kidney stones and treatment options

Kidney stone disease (nephrolithiasis) currently affects up to 5 percent of the United States population.

In the past, kidney stones could be treated only through painful incisions. Technological advances now allow stones to be treated in a minimally invasive fashion, with open stone surgery used in only 1 percent of cases today.

There are many minimally invasive options to treat kidney stones. One alternative is shock wave lithotripsy (SWL), in which stones are broken apart with sound waves that are passed through the body. The fragments are then gradually cleared from the kidney with the natural flow of urine.

Another option is ureteroscopy, in which a small telescope is used to enter the kidneys. Stones are then either extracted or fragmented with laser energy. Both SWL and ureteroscopy are done without incisions, and patients usually go home

the day of surgery. In select cases, the percutaneous approach can be used, where a small passage is created directly into the kidney through the patient's back. In this manner, very large kidney stones can be efficiently and safely removed with a short hospital stay.

Once kidney stones have been surgically treated, it is important to determine the reasons why the stones formed. Through sophisticated urine and blood tests, the underlying factors contributing to stone formation can be defined in up to 97 percent of cases. This allows your urologist to provide active preventative measures to help greatly reduce the chances of future kidney stones.

Music lineup woos crowd at 2007 Countryfest

Event arrests increase, traffic found easier

"I think all in all everything was kept under control and the crowd was great. We saw many people having fun, enjoying country music in a great venue, which is what this festival is all about," said WGNA Marketing Director Selena Dutcher.

According to both Salerno and Dutcher, about 25,000 people attended the event held at Altamont Fairgrounds for the second year. Salerno said one problem with the event is that people tend to overindulge in alcohol before the event begins at 9 a.m. The beer tents at the event have long lines of "rowdy" men and women, according to some attendees at the event. Last year many Altamont residents complained of the empty beer cans and bottles left behind on village streets after the event was over. One major improvement this year was the new traffic procedures that dealt with getting the traffic in and around the village.

"We have 10 officers on staff, so last year we had a lot to learn about dealing with crowds of tens of thousand of people. It's a work in

progress," said Salerno.

According to Salerno, about a dozen arrests were made because of "brawls" among the festival patrons.

Fans, though, said that for the most Countryfest was a day of good country entertainment. American Idol fans were able to hear Bucky Covington on stage. Covington seemed to receive rave reviews from

the crowds.

"He's a really good entertainer. He sounds even better than on his CD. It was worth standing lines, and making my way through the crowd to hear him," said Jon Laird of Clifton Park.

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

Never before has a labor dispute been so much fun.

The Not So Common Players of Clifton Park are performing their annual summer show, "The Pajama Game" based on the 1953 book "7 1/2 cents" by Richard Bissell.

The performances are over two weekends, with four shows remaining at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday through Sunday, July 19 to 22. Attendance is free at the Clifton Park Commons stage on Vischer Ferry Road.

The musical, which won Tony Awards in 1955 and 2006, is based on a labor dispute between pajama factory workers, who demand a raise, and the factory's owner.


Babe, the spunky factory worker, supports her union's efforts to slow work at the factory until the raise is given, but Sid, the factory's superintendent, demands an honest day's work.

The love interest that develops between the two is tested when they find themselves on opposite sides of the issue.

Chuck Conroy, who is making his first appearance with the Not So Common Players, plays Sid.

"No matter what goes on between two people, as long as you care about each other, there's a way to figure out it," Conroy said. "One of the things Sid talks about in the show is compromise, and that's what relationships are all about."

Tara Treffiletti, also making her first performance with the group, plays the other lead character, Babe.

The Not So Common Players were founded in 2001 by Jennifer Bullington, who plays Mabel in "The Pajama Game," and Yvonne Masse. The group's funding comes entirely from the town of Clifton Park.

"They are 100 percent supportive of everything we do, and it's virtually unheard of," said Sally Burke, a member of the group's board. "You just don't hear of towns supporting an art like that. We're eternally grateful."

Burke said the annual budget for the group ranges between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

The mostly volunteer group performs shows in the spring,

summer, and fall. The fall and spring shows are indoors in the Shenendehowa school district, while the summer show is outdoors at the commons.

Burke said the average attendance across the seven performances of the summer show is 2,200.

Debbie May, who has directed "South Pacific," "Annie Get Your Gun," and "Guys and Dolls" for the Not So Common Players in the past said the musical was good for a summer audience.

"There's absolutely no hidden meaning. It's good, wholesome entertainment," May said. "The music is peppy; it takes you back to the 50s."

Many families volunteer with the Not So Common Players, including Robin and Jeff Patnode and their children, Kellie, 12, and Thomas, 15.

The family works on the technical aspects of the musical,

with Kellie and Thomas on the spotlight and Robin and Jeff on audio. They have been with the Not So Common Players for three years.

Jeff said the musical had special meaning for him and his wife. They met at a paper mill where Robin's father was a blue-collar worker and Jeff's father was white collar.

Kellie said she learned a lot from working on the musical. "I know that girls get a lot more equal pay than they did 50 years ago and they're allowed to wear casual things to work and not dresses," she said.

Although the characters in the play are straightforward, Bullington said the play has an important message.

"Two people who you don't think are perfect for each other can actually be the perfect couple," she said.



garner attention from promoters, though. Several including Finkel were in contact with him as he rose to the top of the amateur ranks.

It's Faragon's pro style that should also help him make a quick adjustment from the amateur ranks.

"We've spent a lot of time working on his defense, so he's not just a guy taking shots and giving shots," said Andy. "You're always going to have to work on it. Mike has a tendency to turn (a bout) into a war at times, and he's going to have to control that."

Faragon will get some outside help as he gets ready for his first pro bout. He is going to spar with former world champion "Sugar" Shane Mosley for eight weeks.

"That's what I've waited for. That's only going to bring out the best in me," said Faragon of sparring with Mosley, who has won championships as a lightweight, a welterweight and a junior middleweight.

Whether Faragon will have a career as long or as successful

as Mosley's career remains to be seen. The important thing, said Andy, is that boxing gives him the financial security he needs.

"When Mike was younger and we talked about his career, we said we wanted him to be financially set and retire by the age of 35," said Andy.

In the interim, Faragon said he's considering continuing his education to have something to fall back on after his career is over.

"I've been thinking about

taking some classes, and after boxing, the opportunities will open up for me," he said. "I'd like to own my own gym someday."

First, though, Michael Faragon would like to own a world championship.

"Some boxers drag out their careers too long, but I want to be in it long enough to win a world title and be around to defend it," he said.

Taking it to the next level

Faragon signs with promoter, enters pro ranks

Michael Faragon is entering the major league of boxing.

The Guilderland resident signed an agreement last week to join Shelly Finkel's agency and will sign another contract this week with Oscar De La Hoya's promotional group, Golden Boy Promotions.

Not bad for an amateur fighter who turns 20 years old this week.

"It's really not that much of

a surprise," said Faragon, who concluded his amateur career with an 87-15 record and a No. 1 ranking among all light welterweights. "I worked very hard, and I knew it would pay off."

"He's in a great position," said Andy Faragon, Michael's father, manager and trainer. "He's working with the two biggest people in boxing."

Signing with Finkel and De La Hoya gives Faragon the opportunity to fight on prominent cards, but Andy said he won't be rushed into the ring.

"We're looking at a four- to five-year window to give him his experience," said Andy. "Hopefully if Shelly Finkel does his job, I do

my job and Mike does his job, he'll be fighting for a world title in four to five years."

"The first couple of years will probably be kind of slow," said Michael. "We'll have to pick our bouts carefully. You have to fight your way up the ranks."

The agreement will also give Faragon some local bouts to 'cut his professional teeth with. Andy said his son is supposed to be part of a future fight night sponsored by local promoter Lisa Elovich. And if he gains a large Capital District following, Faragon could bring some big fight cards to the region.

"Shelly told us that if his following continues to grow, he could have a shot at fighting

something big at the TU Center," Andy said.

The decision to turn pro came after Faragon missed qualifying for the United States Olympic team trials earlier this year.

"That's what we've been training for since I was 10 years old," said Faragon. "I had a pro style, and I thought that would help me. But I guess it didn't work out."

"There's people who thought I should have turned Mike pro last year," added Andy. "The Olympics was Mike's dream, and it was his chance to fight against the best in the world."

Faragon's pro style helped him
