School project funding up for vote

EXCEL money earmarked for facility improvements

A public referendum vote in the Bethlehem Central School District will be held Tuesday, Oct. 30 regarding \$4.9 million of state aid funding for additional capital projects.

The EXCEL (Expanding our

Children's Education and Learning) funding is earmarked for improvements to school infrastructure, health and safety initiatives and other areas.

"Any capital construction or capital equipment project where the district is looking to borrow money to fund it, is required to have a referendum," said Superintendent Les Loomis of the reason for the vote.

Enhancements to the district with EXCEL money, if approved by Bethlehem voters in October, include building an additional

eight classrooms at Eagle Elementary School at \$2.8 million, increasing the classroom space at Eagle to 24.

"We need to add the eight classrooms in order to move to a full-day kindergarten, which we believe will strengthen the program," Loomis said.

Replacing windows at the middle school and new bleachers at the high school along with the installation of new high school security cameras and radios are some of the health and safety measures the funding will

be used for.


"These are important projects that will improve district facilities, enhance school safety and save taxpayers money in the long run."

The financing from the state is a combination of EXCEL aid and traditional state building aid.

"We need to have a Bond Anticipation Note for \$1.6 million to allow for short-term borrowing where the district will

Group to discuss school boundaries

New elementary building one reason for redistricting

The Bethlehem Central School District may want to take some pointers from Shenendehowa's school district when it comes to redistricting.

Bethlehem's newly formed redistricting committee met Monday, Sept. 17, at the Education Services Center on Adams Place to discuss the upcoming changes.

VersaTrans Solutions, the same company hired by Bethlehem schools to oversee the redistricting process, was also hired by Shenendehowa in 2006 to assist in developing new boundaries.

"They did the boundaries and we gave the criteria," said Kelly DeFeciani, Shenendehowa public information officer.

"Doug Hamlin of VersaTrans said one of the first goals is to establish "neighborhood planning units" or "building blocks of how boundaries are formed."

"We try to frame the process for the committee and for parents who have likely not been through this process before,"

Senior Fleet receives check

Arrest made in Delmar bike heist

A 16-year-old Albany teen is charged with stealing a motorcycle from a Delmar family's garage.

Phillip DePercin, of 61 Summit Ave., Albany, is charged with burglary, second degree, and grand larceny, third degree, both felonies. DePercin was arrested at his home following a joint

investigation by Albany and Bethlehem police.

According to the investigation, during the overnight hours of Aug. 22, DePercin allegedly broke into a garage of a home on Hanover Street, stealing a motorcycle while the homeowners were asleep. The motorcycle was then located a short time later

in Albany on Summit Street with the parts stripped from it. DePercin was arrested at his home following a signed felony complaint based on the investigation. He was processed, arraigned and sent to Albany County jail on \$15,000 bail. He has a return court date of Oct. 2.

As completion nears, roundabouts a hot topic

Seniors hear presentation on safety and navigation of the traffic structures

Driving the new Bethlehem roundabouts is still several weeks away.

Town Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the Blessing Road roundabout is currently behind schedule, pushing the completion date for all three roundabouts back to the end of October.

The state has not given me a final date, and they are still working under the assumption it's the end of October," Cunningham said.

Roundabouts are under construction in Bethlehem on Blessing Road, Maher Road, and in front of the Price Chopper Plaza on New Scotland Road. Rob Cherry, director of transportation planning for DOT Region I, is overseeing the extensive Route 85 Slingerlands Bypass project. Construction began this past spring and will continue through 2008. The reason given for the delay in Blessing Road's construction is because sub-contractors have been hired to finish the project. Delaney Construction is the main contractor for the bypass project.

Meanwhile, the education process continues on how to properly negotiate roundabouts.

Cherry met with about 75 seniors on Thursday, Sept. 13, in town hall to show a video and slide presentation on the proper technique for driving along Route 85 when the roundabouts are completed.

"To yield is the single most important factor when approaching a roundabout," Cherry told seniors. "Slow down to about 20 miles per hour, and if it is a multi-lane roundabout you need to choose either the left or right lane."

Cherry reminded residents that roundabouts are safe and efficient.

"There is a major decrease in the severity of accidents with roundabouts," Cherry said.

There are 31 roundabouts in

New York with 70 more in the design stage. Nine roundabouts exist in the Capital District, with six more under construction. Cherry was asked the difference between a roundabout and a busy traffic circle like the one in Latham.

"A roundabout is significantly smaller in size and has a control island and truck apron," he said.

There is currently a one-lane roundabout in Voorheesville and five roundabouts off the Northway in Malta.

One senior asked about the safety of roundabouts in snowstorms. Cherry said road crews drive the roundabouts in a circular pattern to clear the snow from the lanes. Printed

material on roundabouts was also provided after the presentation.

Cunningham said the education process of roundabouts will continue for Bethlehem residents.

"There remains some concerns about the roundabouts," Cunningham said. "We will create a map of where each roundabout will be located to help people understand it a little better."

A fourth roundabout will be constructed at the entrance of the new Vista Technology Park that will be located behind the Price Chopper Plaza. The park, which encompasses 450 acres of land between Bethlehem and New Scotland, is expected to provide a major economic boost to the towns.

Panel to sound out rules governing noise

Task force will examine complaints and discuss possible ordinance

Complaints ranging from noisy neighbors, vulgar rap music, and loud house parties are prompting Bethlehem town officials to appoint a noise ordinance task force.

Sam Messina, town board member will chair the task force appointed by supervisor Jack Cunningham to review the feasibility of passing a noise ordinance local law.

"Since I have come into office, I have had residents come to me from time to time regarding a noise ordinance," said Cunningham.

A member of the Bethlehem police force, one member from the town's code enforcement department, and two members from the community will make up the noise ordinance task force.

Jennifer DeFranco, a resident of the town who said she has had problems with noisy neighbors, volunteered to serve on the task force.

"We are the only city or town with a population greater than 20,000 without a noise ordinance in the Capital District," said DeFranco.

Messina believes now is an appropriate time to revisit the issue that previous town boards

contemplated.

"This is at least worth looking at from my perspective," Messina said.

Last year, in the neighboring town of Guiderland there were 100 cases on file related to noise issues, Messina said.

"When they invoked the ordinance by sending out a letter, they had 100 percent compliance."

The town of Bethlehem had a total of 95 noise complaints in 2006 and 19 complaints of loud parties.

Board member Kyle Kotary said "full community participation" is the key to a successful noise ordinance.

"I think the idea of a task force is good," Kotary said. "It gives us the opportunity for further research."

Leath appointed town historian

Susan Leath has been named by the town board as the new historian in Bethlehem. Leath replaces Raymond C. Houghton Jr., who served as historian for the past three years before he died of cancer in the spring. Leath has been a resident of the town for the past 12 years and has served as a member of the Town Historical Association since 1995.

"I have a lot of enthusiasm about history, and I don't want it to get lost," said Leath.

Prior to her family's move to Bethlehem, Leath served as the director of the Florence Museum of Art, Science and History in Florence, S.C.

"History adds to the quality of our life," said Leath. "We should preserve it and promote it."

"She has excellent credentials, and I believe she will do an excellent job," Cunningham said.

The position of town historian pays \$2,600 annually.

Delmar loses some sparkle

Jeweler closes shop and thanks customers with final sale

A family-run jewelry shop with 48 years of business history in Delmar will close its doors for good in October.

Le-Wanda Jewelers at 246 Delaware Ave. is going out of business. The store opened in 1959 at what was once the Elsmere strip mall, now Delaware Plaza, before moving to its current location in 1998.

"My mother and father started the business, and we were one of the original tenants in Delaware Plaza," said owner Joseph Lewanda.

Lewanda said his parents, who have a family history in the jewelry business, moved to the United States from Europe after World War II. Other family relatives were also in the jewelry

business.

"Jewelry was in his blood," Lewanda said of his father. "My father passed away in 1988, and I took over the business."

Lewanda was joined by his wife in 1989 and Richard Bernard in 1992, who has been with the company ever since.

"Joe and I are more friends than we are boss and employee," said Bernard, who is the one person outside of family that has worked for Lewanda.

"It's trust," said Bernard. "This whole business is based on trust."

Lewanda said in the past 15 years Bernard has almost become a member of the family.

The store may be closing, but Lewanda said he will remain in the jewelry business in another capacity.

"I will continue in a situation that will afford me greater flexibility and freedom to pursue other outside interests," Lewanda said.

A line of customers and friends are stopping by to take advantage of the 40 to 70 percent off everything sale and to say their last goodbyes to someone they have become good friends with over the years.

"I will miss my customers, my friends and the friendships I have made over the past 25 years," said Lewanda.

Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce President Marty DeLaney said Le-Wanda Jewelers was one of the oldest family-operated businesses in town and has done a lot for the community.

"Joe and his family have really contributed to the community over the years," said DeLaney. "They have been a great small business."

The official store closing will be in mid- to late October. The Delaware Avenue property is also up for sale. Lewanda said his jewelry business wasn't just a store to many people.

"This was like visiting friends or relatives and catching up on what's new," Lewanda said. "As an extra bonus, it was a place to buy jewelry."

Lewanda thanked customers for their many years of patronage and for the "outpouring of concern and best wishes."

Store hours will be Monday through Saturday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. through October. The store will be closed Saturday, Sept. 22.



Missing the bus on the first day of school

The kindergarten bus never showed up at our house on the first morning of school. It's been six years, but I'm still traumatized.

We were all standing on the driveway. My sweet daughter was wearing a black corduroy jumper with pink roses. My husband had the video camera. I had the 30 mm camera.

The school buses often run late the first day of school, especially at the kindergarten stops where parents are taking photographs. I tried to be patient.

We took video footage down both sides of the street. We didn't know which direction the bus would approach from, so we made like we were in a mystery show.

"Will the bus approach from the right?" we wondered aloud, aiming the camera in said direction, "Or will it come from the left?" we proposed, re-directing the camera.

When my patience got thin, I called a neighbor around the corner and found that her kindergartner had already been picked up. Was it possible that Rachel was on a different route?

My daughter was fine. I tried to pretend I was fine too, saying things like, "Where is that silly old bus?"

When it got to be after 9 a.m. I ordered everyone into the car. School was starting in five minutes. I could wait for the bus no longer.

On the way to the school I assured my daughter that I would find out what happened to the bus. Luckily my husband was driving, because I was a crazed woman. I told my daughter, "We're driving you to school because we don't want you to be late just because that silly bus is late. Don't you worry, though, because Mommy is going to find out what happened to that bus, oh yes she is, Mommy is going to call those transportation people and get everything straightened out."

I was quite upset, but trying

to pretend it was no big deal. In my mind I was thinking: What happened here? Everything was supposed to run smoothly. The bus was supposed to stop in front of our house. I was supposed to blink back tears and take photographs of my child getting on the bus. I was supposed to stand on the driveway and smile and wave and watch the wheels on the bus go round and round off to the school. Why didn't the bus come?

What had I done wrong?

When we arrived at the school, all the kindergarten teachers were standing outside. Students were just coming off the buses.

Even though there were lots of parent paparazzi in the schoolyard, I felt I should be explaining that I hadn't planned to be there. I wanted the teacher to know that I was at the school with my daughter only because the bus failed to pick her up and I had been cheated out of the boarding-the-bus photo.

I felt like I needed an excuse to be there. Why did I feel that way? The other parents didn't look embarrassed. And those parents probably got to see their kids get on the bus. Those parents probably jumped right into their cars and followed the bus to the school. Those parents were the neurotic folks, not me. I was only at the school because I had been wronged.

Hell hath no fury like a first-time kindergarten mom scorned.

I had meticulously completed the transportation form. Unfortunately, the information I provided was superseded by separate information submitted by the wrap-around care program. The school assumed that Rachel was not taking the bus in the

morning. So, the bus wasn't late on the first day, it was never coming.

But I had written on the form that she would be riding the morning bus on Mondays! What more could I have done?

I live under the flawed logic that if I only try harder, plan better, get more organized and consider every conceivable possibility, I will be able to ensure positive outcomes in all undertakings.

Over the years I've become marginally less of a control freak, but I know I've got a long way to go toward accepting my human limitations.

The Jewish High Holy Days are a time of deep reflection, beginning with the celebration of Rosh Hashanah and ending with the solemn observance of Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. It is a time for contemplating how to be a better parent, spouse, child, neighbor, and friend. It is a time to consider our actions over the past year and to make amends with people whose feelings we have hurt, intentionally or unintentionally.

Yom Kippur begins this year in the late afternoon of Friday, Sept. 21, and will conclude after sundown the following day. It's a period of fasting, prayer and repentance.

I like the idea of making amends with others. I am willing to ask for forgiveness from those that I've hurt, and grant forgiveness to those who ask.

Forgiving myself, though, that's a harder task.

In general, I consider myself a good person. I recycle, turn off the lights when I leave a room, and donate money to charity.

But there are times I fail to meet my own expectations: Helping my parents at a doctor's appointment, but then forgetting to ask the doctor about a certain issue. Disappointing my child by not being able to attend a school event. Not making progress on a work assignment because of competing priorities.

And of course I should've

made sure the kindergarten bus came to our house.

Luckily, my daughter has no ill memories of that day. I asked if she remembered when the bus didn't come. She said she remembered waiting out on the driveway.

"How did you get to school?" I asked her. She guessed, "Daddy took me?" "Actually both Daddy and I took you over to the school," I clarified. "Oh," she said.

Phew, she doesn't remember nutty mommy ranting in the car about "getting to the bottom of the bus incident."

This year she started middle school.

On the first day of school she needed to take the early bus to attend orchestra. She arrived at the designated corner at 6:45 a.m., 10 minutes ahead of the listed pick-up time.

It was not only the first day of school, but also her first year of riding the bus. She attended a before-school program all through elementary school, so her dad and I had been driving her to school all those years.

Given the newness of going to a new school and taking the bus, I decided to accompany Rachel to the bus stop. My husband had

also planned to go, but I thought it might be embarrassing for Rachel to have both her parents waiting with her at the middle school bus stop.

"I'll stand across the street and pretend I'm a jogger," I told Rachel. I practiced trying to hide the camera inside my zippered sweatshirt.

"Daddy was going to come too, but I thought you might be embarrassed if other kids saw both daddy and I at the bus stop," I told her. She simply said, "Well, it is my first time going to middle school." It turned out that Rachel was not bothered at all by my presence and wouldn't have minded her dad being there also.

So instead of preventing embarrassment, I prevented my husband from seeing his daughter get on the bus.

Also, I had Rachel standing at the wrong corner. She was at the "regular bus" corner, not the "early bus" corner. And I didn't take a photograph of her boarding the bus because I was still worried about embarrassing her. Turned out she was the first kid on the bus, but the windows were tinted so I couldn't see the bus was empty.





Family reunion is a colorful event

Last summer at my family reunion, while standing on the edge of a murky, carp-filled pond in the middle of Vermont, a teenager with shaggy brown hair wearing a black, heavy metal T-shirt approached me. Motioning to the gathering paddleboat relay crowd in front of us, he said, "So I think we're partners."

"If you say so," I said, realizing that the last time I'd probably seen this gangly, high-energy adolescent, he was wearing diapers.

Turning to me once again he said, "So, are we like, related?"

"Probably," I said smiling.

"Sweet," he said, matching his excitement with a spirited high-five in my direction.

That's when I realized just how much I appreciate my family reunion.

For years, I had a hard time understanding how I was related to all these people who gather each year for a weekend of camping, kitschy traditions and fun. For years, I asked my mom to explain to me the family tree. After nearly two decades of reunions, I knew enough to answer my cousin's question. After tracing his parents and grandparents, I figured out that my mother and his grandmother are first cousins, which makes us ... well, cousins. On a sunny July weekend, we were paddleboat partners, high-fiving our way across the lake like we'd known each other forever.

For as long as I can remember, summers in my family meant camping trips to Lake George, swimming in backyard pools and the family reunion. The basics of this reunion are pretty traditional: young and old get together, visit and gossip over communal

summer salads, hot dogs and hamburgers.

But for the Gamelins, a French-Canadian family with a strong Catholic faith founded in upstate Vermont, our annual reunion is no small affair. Our reunion group has become hundreds of people in tents and trailers. "Catch up and visit" means three days of organized events that include ceremonies, sports competitions and awards. And all those communal salads cover at least eight picnic tables.

The Gamelin Reunion has become an institution for a family that now stretches up and down the East Coast. This July, we celebrated our 25th reunion with more than 290 relatives attending from 13 states. The oldest family member was Aunt Dot, 83, and the youngest was Malakai, just 6 weeks old.

My mother, Ann (Patneau) Kulkus was born in Winöoski, Vt., the small town where many of my grandmother's siblings and their families also lived. My mother and her older brothers Camille, Charlie and Donald; and younger sister Colette fondly recall playing with handfuls of cousins who lived just down the street.

In 1950, the Patneau clan moved to Rotterdam Junction, but made regular trips back to Winöoski.

One visit back to Vermont in the early 1980s changed the face of my family forever.

I never knew Michelle Leary, but I've seen her picture. She resembles her mother, Katie, the bubbly woman with an infectious giggle I have looked forward to seeing every summer since I was 4. I always knew Katie was the heart of our family reunion, but it wasn't until I was a teenager that I found out why.

Our reunion was born at the wake for Katie's only daughter Michelle. The 22-year-old with a soft smile was found dead in her Boston apartment in 1983; the cause of her death was never determined. At her wake, many of those childhood friends – Michelle's mother and my mother included – decided they didn't want to only see each other at wakes and funerals. And so the Gamelin Family Reunion was born.

Forty-four people attended that first reunion in the summer of 1983. Clans from Vermont and the Capital District met for the weekend at Rogers Rock state campground on Lake George. I was just 3 and my sister 2. Rogers Rock remains a very special place to me. It was there I climbed Rogers Rock with my Uncle Donald for the first time; got conned by older cousins to fetch them ice cream; convinced relatives I was being attacked by bears by screaming my head off in fear of a Daddy Long Legs in the bathroom; and it was there we learned the power of blue tarps, for one reunion weekend it rained from start to finish and we spent the entire time under a sea of taped, tied and clothes-pinned coverings from one camper to the next.

Most of all, I remember meeting lots of new friends. I can't even tell you how exciting it was to learn they were my cousins. Those same kids I played hide-and-seek with and shared sticky red, white and blue bomb pops with, came back this year – this time with their own little ones in tow.

After seven years we needed someplace bigger, so we returned to the state where the clan started. Now we go to Horseshoe Acres in Andover, Vt. Most of our tents and pop-ups have been traded for rented trailers with hot water and air-conditioning, but for many, it's the most "roughing it" they do all year.

I often wonder what the first-timers think of our reunion traditions.

Do they laugh at our opening ceremonies and parade as family members of all ages help carry in their family banners and flags? Do they step back in fear when someone throws a little too much lighter fluid on the 8-foot-tall teepee of wood that is the weekend's constant campfire flame?

Most people I tell about our reunion would love to see it in action. Friday night kicks off with the men vs. women at Trivial Pursuit, followed by Saturday, a jam-packed, nonstop schedule of fun. The kids are busy with sack races, tug of war and volleyball, while adults and older kids participate in a highly competitive paddleboat race. A traditional highlight of the weekend is the awards ceremony, where family members are recognized for bringing the most kids, traveling the farthest, being the oldest, having the newest tent, wearing the "sexiest" bathing suit (it usually goes to a little one in pigtails and frills) or being the "brat of the year." There's also mini-golf, horseshoes (the guys brought their own sand this year), bocce (Uncle Donald doesn't play without a tape measure), and a whole lot of hanging out with a couple hundred people who just happen to be related to you. Plus, we keep an eye out for the cousin with the best arm – critical to any sort of success in the annual egg toss Saturday.

There's also The Gamelin Gazette to flip through, and more than 100 pages of our family tree and directory, tended to by one very patient relative.

Living members of the family tree can be identified by their T-shirt colors during reunion weekend. My clan, the Patneaudes, wears navy blue. Visitors get pink.

Not many people can say they have a few hundred cousins, much less be able to recognize and name them, but I can. For that, I am grateful to my relatives who decided a reunion was an important tradition to create and maintain. It's been a fun, memorable 25 years getting to know several generations of Gamelin descendants. I've watched as our grandparents got older, our children grew taller and our family got bigger. But no matter how big we get, or how far we may roam, we can always look back on one weekend a summer when all that matters is the fact that we're together.





Gala marks discovery of oldest wine cellar

Priceless treasure or dust? That was the question posed by Alexander McNally, Hueblein Wines expert, when he first laid eyes on the bottles found in the Olcott wine cellar at Albany's Ten Broeck mansion. They turned out to be priceless.

The 1977 discovery yielded a trove of rare 19th century wines in the original packing cases. Some of those wines, when auctioned in 1978, fetched prices per ounce that were nearly as high as the price of gold. The funds were used for much needed repairs to the mansion.

On Thursday, Sept. 20, from 6 to 9 p.m. at Normanside Country Club in Delmar, the Albany County Historical Association celebrates the 30th anniversary of the discovery of what is believed to be the country's oldest wine cellar still in use, with a wine gala: Ten Broeck Uncorked.

The celebration includes:

- An auction, featuring 30-year-old wines that were placed in the Olcott wine cellar to restock it after the 1977 discovery
- A silent auction of quality wines and merchandise donated by local businesses

• Dinner stations, prepared by award-winning chef Timothy Vennard, paired with wines by the Joseph Carr Winery

• A talk by *Times Union* columnist and long-time wine judge Fred LeBrun, who will discuss today's wines and the 1977 wine discovery.

Agencies remind motorists to be alert

With thousands of area students back in school, AAA Hudson Valley reminds motorists to slow down and watch out for school-age pedestrians.

One-fifth of all children 14 years of age and younger who die in motor vehicle crashes are pedestrians, according to the national Highway Traffic Safety Administration. These pedestrian fatalities are more likely to happen in the afternoon hours, when school is letting out.

AAA's "School's Open — Drive Carefully" campaign encourages motorists to stay alert in areas where children are present, paying special

attention during the morning and afternoon hours while children are coming to and from school. Drivers should look out for children who may dart out into the street near school zones, playgrounds, bus stops and in neighborhoods. School-age children can be especially vulnerable in areas with heavy traffic volume, parked vehicles on the street, higher posted speed limits, and few pedestrian-control devices.

As part of the "School's Open — Drive Carefully" campaign, AAA Hudson Valley offers drivers tips to keep school children safe:

- Do not "roll through" intersections with a stop sign. Slow down in or near school and residential areas, and be sure to come to a complete stop in all intersections.
- Drive with your headlights on even during the day so children and other drivers can see you.
- Look for crossing guards, bicycles, and playgrounds, which indicate children could be in the area.
- Scan between parked cars and other objects for signs that children could dart into the road.

• Practice extra caution in adverse weather conditions.

• Pay particular attention near schools during the morning and afternoon hours.

• Always stop for school buses that are loading and unloading students.

Farms to Restaurant Week promotes locally raised food

Albany County embarked on a weeklong initiative in continued efforts to boost a working relationship between Albany farmers and restaurants.

The Farms to Restaurant Week ran from Monday, Sept. 10, through Sunday, Sept. 16, at eight establishments throughout the county.

Across the county, hors d'oeuvres, main dishes and buffets were all created using area produce, dairy and meats.

"It's promoting Albany County, to let it be known that Albany County is more than a place with restaurants, it's a place where the foods are produced as well," said Richard Toth, head chef at the Schuyler Inn in Menands. The inn prepares large meals for banquets, weddings and events.

It joined the Albany Pump Station, Café Capriccio, Riverfront Bar and Grill, The Rusty Anchor, The Victory Café, Java Jazz Café and Marche at 74 State.

Toth took the opportunity to employ the local goods in the inn's Italian buffet held every Wednesday. From pork to tomatoes, squash to cheese and even fish, Toth cooked up a meal expected to serve hundreds.

Throughout the county and Capital District, chefs are turning to seasonal produce and meats,

grown and raised in the area. The products are fresher and they help to sustain the area, said Toth.


Earlier in the summer, county legislators passed new laws protecting the right to farm in the county. The latest joint initiative through the county Farm and Agricultural Land Protection Board, Cornell Cooperative Extension, Albany County Department of Economic Development, Conservation and Planning and state and federal agricultural and market departments is two-pronged; helping give the farmers a market while sustaining their operations and open areas.

The plan is to eventually help distribute the local wares to restaurants, said Tom Gallagher, livestock specialist with Albany County Cooperative Extension.

"We are trying to provide items that the restaurants need and how farms can help. In mid-winter we will be holding a meeting to bring in the farmers and restaurant owners to try to put a system in place and to work on a delivery system," Gallagher said.

The extension is pleased with the support and the week seems to have caught on, he said.

To get the message across, chefs informed their clientele that the food they would be eating was locally grown, produced or raised. A free wine glass was given to customers who selected menu items incorporating or made fully from local ingredients.

Money may not grow on trees, but sometimes it comes in bunches: Tips for handling a financial waterfall

When I was a kid, my parents liked to say: "money doesn't grow on trees." For today's children, the fact that money doesn't grow on trees is obvious. They know where money comes from—the mouth of ATMs!

Either way, the basic principle applies: children have a difficult time understanding that, under most circumstances, money has to be earned. They can't make the connection between work and bills, and they are just too young to comprehend limitation, that mom and dad's spending power is in direct correlation with the jobs they hold.

However, kids grow up. Time and experience teach them the value of

money. Adulthood is a role they grow into. But what happens when these adults, who have developed a clearly defined and preconceived notion of the economics of wealth, suddenly come into an unexpected large sum of money? What happens when, after years of being told and telling others that money does not grow on trees, money comes in bunches?

Relearning the value of money

Kids struggle with money because they are unfamiliar with the mechanics of money. Adults who struggle with money typically lack discipline and spend more than they

earn. However, when an adult experiences a financial windfall, whether it is from an inheritance, lottery winnings or life insurance benefits, they become like a child again. Their struggles have more to do with an inability to understand the mechanics of wealth than an inability to develop or stick to a budget. In essence, they have to relearn the value of money.

Considering a financial windfall can happen overnight, relearning the value of money can be a tall

order. There is no transition period. You can't draw from experience. To complicate matters further, the new money could be the result of

losing a loved one as in the case of an inheritance. That's why the first thing an individual who comes into money should do with their money is nothing. Instead, they should:

1. Wait several months before making any substantial financial decisions.
2. Consult with a financial planner.
3. Get tax advice.

According to the National Endowment for Financial Education (NEFE), an "estimated 70 percent of all people who suddenly receive large amounts of money will lose that money within a few years." While it's easy to attribute this high rate to impulse spending, as NEFE does, this high occurrence of squandering wealth is generally rooted in bad habits that are developed prior to coming into money. Such bad habits include:

- Not creating a budget.
- Negative savings.
- Lack of a financial plan.

These three things—budget, savings and planning—form the core of financial responsibility. Incorporate them into your life and you will be financially healthy and independent, regardless of your income level. Ignore them and you can spend and lose even the greatest of fortunes.

Becoming financially responsible

As stated above, the most responsible decision you can make if you come into money is to forgo making any decisions. In fact, it is often the early decisions people make with their new money that end up being the costliest, because early expenditures can greatly diminish the resources needed to build a portfolio that can generate wealth for the remainder of your life.

The next responsible thing to do is to get professional advice. The tax implications of a financial windfall are significant, and how you invest your money will determine how long it lasts and how much you enjoy it. So before you do anything you should have a long-term financial plan that aligns with your goals and values. It is even more important that you take your time and gather the advice of your financial planner or advisor before making any decisions related to finances.

There are a number of ways you can find qualified advisors. The best-case scenario is that you have pre-established relationships with financial planners or advisors who you trust and can serve your increased needs. If you do not know anyone, ask friends, family and/or other trusted professionals for recommendations, or go to a professional association and ask for references. Certified financial planners (CFP) can be found via the web (<http://www.cfp.net>). Other professional qualified advisors include CPAs, private bank financial advisors, investment advisors etc.

Even if you have a pre-existing relationship with a trusted certified financial planner or advisor, you should ask the following questions to make sure that they are able to help you achieve your goals:

- What are your credentials? The CFP designation is difficult to earn, so CFPs are technically skilled in all aspects of financial planning.
- What is your track record and who is your typical client? This includes their performance history and overall experience. Can you provide referrals?
- How will you address my particu-

How to spend your financial windfall

When it comes to a financial windfall, the options for spending your money may seem limitless. But before you begin buying or, more advisable, paying off, you need to understand the tax implications of your windfall. lar needs? You'll want to understand if the advisor will prepare a written plan for you or if it is not their practice to do so, as well as the ease with which you can reach them with questions and concerns.

- When dealing with an investment advisor, you should ask: how does your firm conduct, or obtain, research on the markets?
- What are your fees? Some financial planners charge a fee for preparing a plan. In the case of investment advisors, ask about their fee structure? Three of the most common practices are commission-only, fee-only and management fee. Each has its pros and cons.

Transitioning to financial freedom

Being a recipient of a financial windfall can be life changing. Even small amounts, if leveraged properly, can help you build a foundation for financial freedom. The key is to recognize that should you be fortunate enough to come into money, even if under unfortunate circumstances, you probably do not have the skills and experience to effectively manage your newfound wealth on your own. A trusted advisor can keep you grounded and, like your parents, remind you that even though your money might have come in a bunch, it does not grow on trees.

Environmental series gets started this weekend

Earth, Ltd., our new series on current environmental issues, will address some of the challenges ahead. The Nature Conservancy is a nonprofit organization dedicated to preserving the diversity of plants, animals and ecosystems on the planet. A Delmar resident, VanLuven has been working on the ecology and policy of environmental conservation for more than 15 years.

The series continues next month, on Tuesday, Oct. 23, at 7 p.m. with "Human-Induced Climate Change: What can we do about it?"

John Delano will discuss the magnitude of efforts that will be required to stabilize greenhouse gases. Delano is distinguished teaching professor at the University at Albany's department of earth and atmospheric sciences. He has served on advisory panels for NASA and the National Science Foundation. In 2004, he was invited to give testimony at a presidential commission to examine NASA's plans for lunar and Martian exploration.

Delano and his family have taken measures to reduce their carbon footprint, including the

installation of solar panels that generate a significant portion of their home's electricity. But much more has to be done, Delano said: "Leadership is sorely needed at all levels."

Job fair links seniors with the workforce

If you think the young and the restless are the ones employers are looking to hire these days, think again. On Thursday, Sept. 27, dozens of the area's best companies will be looking to attract the young at heart at the Albany Senior Adult and Volunteer and Employment Fair at the Italian American Community Center on Washington Avenue Extension in Albany.

In addition to hiring seniors, many companies will also offer various volunteer opportunities, from greeting guests at events to performing general administrative tasks.





first of three rounds of best two-out-of-three matches. After that, Belskis pairs the players based on performance to try to keep the tournament as competitive as possible.

HeroClix, based on WizKids' first miniatures game, Mage Knight, was created five years ago. Since then, more than 20 sets and a thousand figures have been released. Booster boxes containing five random figures cost \$9.99, and some individual miniatures are worth as much as \$100.

"My best analogy for this game is that it's chess with su-

Jacob, 8, said that HeroClix is more fun than playing video games or watching television.

"I like all of the powers and just playing it and the strategy," Jacob said. "I like to collect them and read their stories."

He said he spends about half of his money on HeroClix figures.

"I have them on a box and I

put them up on my shelf, and when I want to play with them I bring them down," Jacob said.

Belskis said that miniatures games help Jacob develop important skills.

"It's opening up a world of reading for him as far as comic books are concerned," Belskis said. "To learn all the strategies in the game you have to comprehend and read well. There's a lot of addition and subtraction involved in the dice rolls and the numbers and stats that are on the pieces."

Block said that his son devotes significant time to creating different rules and ways to play the game.

"You can kind of play the game within the game and he's picking up on it. For Jake, it's real neat because it's not just a set game, which still has a lot of strategy, but every time they alter it he has to learn something new and figure out how to use it," Block said. "He's always thinking about it."

Game faces

Collectible miniatures matches mix superheroes and social skills

Meals used to bring people to tables for social discourse and contact, but these days some are finding that type of interaction at tables serving up cosmic battles involving super-powered heroes and villains.

Card games like Magic: The Gathering, Pokemon, and collectible miniature games like HeroClix offer more than entertainment and fantastic escapism, they offer a social interaction that isn't found in a lot of kids and young-adults' non-sports recreation.

With HeroClix, players construct a "team" of heroes and villains with certain abilities, skills and weaknesses. Each player takes turns to use those abilities and skills to knock out other players' characters. The game is played on a gridiron that is overlaid on a landscape. Players are allowed only so many moves per turn and are limited as to their characters' various abilities: speed, power and range, among others.

Charlene Ivers recently brought her son, Ryan, to buy his first HeroClix "brick," a rectangular box with four miniatures inside. She's encouraging her son's involvement in the game not only because he thinks the characters are cool, but also because it promotes trading and sharing.

"They can use their imagination more than they would in an average video game," she said. "I definitely like that he's able to play the game and share and trade with his friends as part of the game."

Ryan, who plays soccer, basketball and is an avid baseball fan, has less complex enthusiasm for the game: "The figures are really neat," he said.

Whether they realize it or not, players of miniature and card games are learning and honing skills, said Matt Belskis, manager of Excellent Adventures in Ballston Spa.

"To understand every aspect of these games, and HeroClix in particular, you have to have very adept math and reading skills," said Belskis. "Because each character has different attributes, and action is limited by turn, you have to develop a good strategy, but be able to think on your feet as well."

Richard W. Lachmann is a professor in the University at Albany's department of sociology. He is one of the university's experts in the sociology of culture and popular culture. He said card and miniature gaming may not promote any more skill-sets than a video game would, but does say there is a social quality to the experience that most video-gamers don't enjoy.

"I'm not sure if these games necessarily require any more physical skill or mental thought than the complex video games that people are playing these days," he said. "But certainly,


these games draw people together — that's the biggest difference. In a lot of respects, these games are not unlike the board games that brought me and my friends together when I was young."

Maria Perry hosts a HeroClix tournament every Thursday night. The people who come in to her Loudonville book store, Flights of Fantasy, to play have become a network of friends, she says.

"One of the attractions of this game is that you have to play with other people," she said. "I know it sounds weird, but these days you can plug in your computer and play a video game

"Certainly for the younger kids, there is lots of research that shows that the more time they spend with older people, the better they develop intellectually because they are learning from someone who is ahead, and for the older people, they gain something too because they're reinforcing what they know because they are teaching younger kids."

"Obviously, if you have someone who's 18 hanging out with 13-year-olds, it could potentially be a sign of a problem, but not necessarily. In most cases it isn't, and I would think that if they're coming together for this specific purpose of gaming, I wouldn't

against someone in the Philippines. This is something you have to do face to face."

And that promotes better game play and sportsmanship, she said.

"I think it's harder for someone to be a sore loser when they're looking at their opponent. I've spoken to younger kids who play video games with people over the Internet. If they get mad, they turn off the computer," she said.

While Perry said she sees mostly 20- to 30-year-olds at her tournaments, Belskis says it's not unusual to see a 13-year-old junior high student square off against a post-grad working man at his Sunday afternoon tournaments.

Lachmann said this isn't a bad thing.

think so," Lachmann said.

Lachmann said that in a consumer market that must tout every child's toy as being "educational," it's all right if kids just want to pick up these miniatures and have fun with them.

"Part of being a kid is that you spend a lot of time on things that, as an adult, you think are foolish," he said. "Kids have the right to have fun and also research shows that kids' brains develop no matter what they do."

As for the adults:

"You hope as people grow up, they spend less time playing games and more time doing other things, but people do it at different paces and some people never do."

Sidewalk safety takes small steps forward

Stretch of road from high school to YMCA deemed dangerous for pedestrians

The beginning of the school year at Bethlehem Central High School brings a renewed call for sidewalk safety along Delaware Avenue.

School officials at the Wednesday, Sept. 5, meeting of the Bethlehem school board discussed concerns for the safety of high school students who walk to the YMCA from the high school down Delaware Avenue. Currently, an area about a quarter-mile long, from Fisher Boulevard to the YMCA, has no sidewalks, and students are walking along the side of the road with traffic coming and going both ways and a deep ravine on one side.

"Can the district provide transportation?" asked school board president James Lytle, who expressed concerns over the safety issue.

Superintendent Les Loomis surprised the idea.

"If we were to begin transporting to the Y, we would have to transport elementary students to any baby-sitting activity or after-school workshop district-wide," Loomis said. "We can't selectively help some students out without helping up the policy."

Lytle then asked if the YMCA could pick up students at the

high school if they provide the transportation.

"We would have no objection," said Loomis.

YMCA officials said they don't have the resources, and added that the ideal solution would be to complete the sidewalks along Delaware Avenue from Fisher Boulevard to the YMCA entrance just up the road.

"We don't have buses," said Maureen Miszewski, vice president of the Capital District YMCA. "In other communities we have a great relationship with

school districts, and they do bus kids from the middle school and high school."

Supervisor Jack Cunningham

said two issues needed to be addressed in relation to the YMCA. The first is the sidewalks and the second is a proposed left-hand

turn lane into the facility.

He said \$550,000 has been set aside to deal with the two projects, but he believes the total cost will be about \$800,000.

According to Cunningham, initial discussions with YMCA officials concluded with the town agreeing to pay for the sidewalks and the YMCA covering the cost of the left-hand turn. However, according to Cunningham, membership levels are not yet at a point where YMCA officials feel a left-hand turn is needed.

"Enrollment never reached the point they thought it would when the new facility was built," Cunningham said.

The town is moving ahead with construction of the sidewalks, which will most likely occur in the spring of 2008.

The difficulty of the terrain along the road is expected to bring added construction costs.

"There is no shoulder there from the corner of Fisher Boulevard and Delaware Avenue going up and we need to build out to build the sidewalk," said Cunningham.

expend the money first and then apply for the grant," said Steve O'Shea, assistant superintendent in charge of finance.

The remainder of the money will come to the district annually and will be paid off with long-term bonds over 20 years. The local cost to the school district is projected at \$4,750 a year over

20 years.

Four voting machines will be set up at the Bethlehem Middle School for voters to decide on the EXCEL funding for Bethlehem.

"This is a straightforward vote from a financial standpoint, and I see no reason to vote 'no' on this one," O'Shea said.

Other areas in the district the EXCEL money will be used for include replacing terrazzo stair treads at the high school

and replacing asbestos tile flooring districtwide. The district is also expected to replace the roof at Clarksville school, renovate restrooms at the middle school and upgrade the pool at the middle school.

"The project is good for the district and good for the taxpayers," said Loomis.

One reason for an October vote is so bids can go out this winter and work can begin in the spring of 2008.

said Hamlin.

Shenendehowa went from seven elementary schools to eight to ease the overcrowding of 4,600 students that averages 560 to 774 students per school. It first held a public referendum in 2000 approving the new Shatekon elementary school. Then a redistricting committee was formed with focus groups deciding the proper criteria for going from seven to eight schools.

"Keeping neighborhoods together, keeping siblings together and bus route efficiency were the three main criteria," said DeFeciani.

The redistricting process in Shenendehowa lasted several months with the new district boundaries being previewed for the first time in June of 2006.


"We had about 300 to 400 people at that meeting," said DeFeciani. "We wound up redistricting about one-third of our elementary population."

More than 1,300 students out of the 4,600 elementary students were affected by Shenendehowa's new boundaries.

"Every school was affected," said DeFeciani.

By the time the public information meetings ended about seven months later, only a handful of residents turned out. DeFeciani said the key to redistricting success in the Shenendehowa school district was effective communication with parents and students.

"We did a lot of communi-

cation, and we won a national award for our redistricting communication," DeFeciani said.

Holding several meetings with focus groups, reaching out to the PTAs and holding community conversations with the school superintendent were all a part of Shenendehowa's process.

"We wrote about it in our newsletter and dedicated a whole Web page to redistricting," DeFeciani said.

In Bethlehem, the new Eagle Elementary School currently under construction is the reason for the redistricting. Hamlin said Bethlehem's goal is also to encourage open communication at all times during the process.

At the first meeting, the school board and new redistricting committee discussed the guiding principles for the process, which is expected to last through January 2008.

Bethlehem is going from five to six elementary schools with the addition of Eagle Elementary. Bean scene: Crowds flock to retailer's grand opening

The masses started lining up at 9 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 13.

They wanted to be the first into New York's first and only L.L. Bean store.

Some had traveled more than 150 miles to be there and were glad to fall in with the more than 1,000 people who waited outside for the sporting goods retailer at Colonie Center to open at 9 a.m. Friday, Sept. 14.

"By the time we opened the doors at 9 a.m., we counted about 1,200 people. We were not expecting this," said Laurie Brooks, company spokeswoman.

L.L. Bean executives had made the trek from the company's headquarters in Maine last week. They have been to eight grand openings, Colonie Center was the second one this year. It was by far and away one of the most anticipated and well-received openings, they said.

Earlier in the week, company officials wined and dined local business people, environmental advocates and town officials. It was the first opportunity to catch a glimpse of the finished store.

"I couldn't be prouder. For L.L. Bean to come here to Colonie Center, to the town of Colonie is a dream come true," said Supervisor Mary Brizzell.

She stated that her winter catalog had recently arrived in the mail, but she would not need it now that the company has set roots in the Capital

District. It set those roots quickly and deeply.

Ken Kacere, senior vice president and general manger of retail for L.L. Bean, presented Albany Pine Bush Preservation Commission Executive Director Chris Hawver with a commemorative paddle. The company donated \$30,000 to the commission as well as equipment to be used at its newly opened Discovery Center.

It's the 95th anniversary of the outdoor living retail giant. The company admittedly went out on a limb to become one of the handful of new restaurants and retailers that have made Colonie Center their home as a multi-million dollar renovation wraps up.

Mall owner, Feldman Malls was adamant about landing the company.

"It was a very big decision for us. This is our 95th anniversary. That's one of the reasons we chose New York as our 11th store," said Kacere.

The new store is the first of a new "green" design the company will be using. It incorporates recycled building materials, including wood from pickle barrels, recycled steel and glass. It is currently in the process of becoming certified by the U.S. Green Building Council, said Kacere.

The new store features many L.L. Bean items including an array of camping and fishing gear and the signature "Bean boots."

The store employs 200 people.



Apple picking time has come around again. The orchards at Indian Ladder Farms will open to the public on Saturday, September 1st at 9 am. The variety ready to be picked is Jonamac, a cross between the Jonathon and the Macintosh apple. It is sweet and tart and good for eating and baking.

Fruit is at the height of its nutritional value when it is just picked and apples are no exception. Apples are the perfect snack. They are delicious, satisfying and low in calories. One medium-sized apple has only 80 calories and no fat. To sweeten the deal apples are packed with nutrients essential to human health. Apples contain vitamin C, an important antioxidant and vitamin A which is good for eyesight and helps build strong bones and teeth. Apples also have potassium which helps keep blood pressure down and prevents strokes. Boron, a mineral found in apples, helps the human body absorb calcium, which strengthens bones. Boron also helps women maintain their estrogen levels during menopause. Retaining estrogen reduces the hormone-induced symptoms of menopause and protects against osteoporosis and heart disease.

Not only are apples completely free of cholesterol, eating apples can actually help lower your cholesterol level. The combination of plant chemicals found in apples makes the fruit a powerful antioxidant that absorbs low density lipoproteins (LDL), the bad cholesterol that clogs arteries. In addition to lowering our LDL level, apples improve the ratio between your bad cholesterol and beneficial high-density lipoproteins (HDL), known as good cholesterol. Apples also contain D-glucaric acid. Early research has indicated that D-glucaric acid may be a natural regulator of cholesterol. A diet rich in D-glucaric acid can help reduce your LDL cholesterol by up to 35 percent. In addition apples are loaded with pectin, a soluble fiber found in most fruits and vegetables. Pectin helps reduce your cholesterol level. Pectin also aids digestion, promotes weight loss and helps manage diabetes.

Apples have been proven to help prevent cancer. Several years ago researchers at Cornell University discovered that a special combination of plant chemicals, called phytochemicals, including flavonoids and polyphenols, found in the flesh and skin of apples are responsible for the fruit's cancer fighting abilities. Molecules of certain substances, such as fats, that break up in the body, are

called free radicals. These free radicals attach themselves to other molecules such as blood vessels causing cancer. This is part of a process called oxidation. The molecules of phytochemicals found in apples have many sites for free radicals to attach to. This allows them to absorb the dangerous free radicals, allowing them to pass through the body. This cleansing ability makes the apple an extremely effective antioxidant. The National Cancer Institute has reported that food containing flavonoids such as those found in apples may reduce the risk of lung cancer by as much as 50 percent. Apples have the highest concentration of flavonoids of any fruit. The unique combination of chemicals found in apples also prevents other forms of cancer including colon, breast, liver, skin and prostate cancer.

New research at Cornell has revealed that apples control the occurrence and growth of tumors in rats. Researchers have identified about twelve compounds, called triterpenoids, in apple skin that inhibit the growth of cancer cells. So gather up the family and head out to the apple orchards this weekend. In addition to all the nutritional and disease prevention qualities of apples enjoy the added benefits of exercise, fresh air and sunshine.

Applications available for State Trooper written exams

New York state police announce that applications are now available for a series of statewide written examinations for the position of New York State Trooper to be held in January and February at numerous locations throughout the state. All qualified individuals interested in becoming a State Trooper are invited to complete an application to take the exam.

To apply, the state police offers the convenience of filling out and submitting the application through the online application available at www.nytrooper.com.

The examinations will result in the establishment of an eligibility list, which may remain in effect for a maximum of four years. The examination dates are scheduled for Jan. 9 and 26, and Feb. 2 and 9.

Online applications must be submitted prior to midnight, Dec. 1. However, in order to guarantee a seat at a desired date and location, interested individuals should apply as soon as possible.

Currently, a trooper's starting salary is \$50,374 during academy training. The salary reaches \$61,225 upon completion of 26 weeks of training at the Basic School.

The following are requirements for the position:

- Must be 20 years of age by Dec. 1 to take the exam
- Must be at least 21 years of age by date of appointment
- Must not have reached 30th birthday prior to Dec. 1; however the maximum age may be extended up to six years for active military service.
- Must have graduated from senior high school or possess a NYS High School Equivalency Diploma or military GED at the time of application.
- Must have 60 credit hours from an accredited college at time of appointment; 30 credit hours may be waived for candidates with at least two full years active duty in the United States Military and an Honorable discharge; or who have completed a certified Basic Police Officer Training Course approved by the New York State Municipal Police Training Council or its equivalent
- Must be in excellent physical condition

Tennessee Williams' classic tale of a southern American family is on stage at Curtain Call Theater.

"The Glass Menagerie" opened on Friday, Sept. 7, and actor Barbara Richards and director Cindy Brizzell-Bates said the show has gotten off to a great start.

"Audiences are really enjoying it and are responding to it," said Richards, who is playing Amanda, the mother of two adult children living in St. Louis, Mo., during the Depression.

"Amanda is an iconic role," Richards said of the character who, having been left by her husband, reverts back to her past, when "gentlemen callers" were the mark of success among southern belles. "She's a southern belle imposing a way of life on her children."

Richards said that the character of Amanda has been ridiculed, but she is working to make her a real character, not a caricature.

"I've gotten fond of her," Richards said. "Age (Richards described herself as "50ish") and having children helps with Amanda. Hopefully, I'm not that kind of mother!"

"Amanda nags her children to a point where it can be funny," Brizzell-Bates said. "It will seem familiar to most people - when you love the kids so much you drive them crazy."

Amanda is bent on finding a gentleman caller for her painfully shy daughter, Laura, who has a slight limp, and is happy to spend time with her collection of glass animal figurines. Laura's brother Tom is enlisted to find a suitor at the shoe factory where he works, and

inadvertently brings home a past unrequited love of his sister's.

"Amanda has the hope that most of us do, that everything will work out in the end, but life doesn't always end up that way," Brizzell-Bates said.

Brizzell-Bates, a graduate of Yale Drama School who teaches drama at Siena College and the University at Albany, said she has stuck with a traditional interpretation of "The Glass Menagerie."

"We tried to stay faithful to what the text meant," Brizzell-Bates said. "We explored the script for what it gave us."

"This play is lyrical and

has a lot to say," Richards, who is an assistant curator of the Empire State Plaza Art Collection, said. "The story still resonates. It's about a family and relationships, and loss."

"It's a beautiful portrait of a struggling family in the 1930s," Brizzell-Bates said. "It's about people trying to connect, not doing it, and misfiring. Tom is trying to salvage some of his passion, to find his soul, but his sister's life is connected to that soul."

Although it sounds like heavy going, Brizzell-Bates and Richards said there are light moments in the play that

was Williams' first successful play.

"We were surprised at how much humor there was in it," Brizzell-Bates said.

Richards and Brizzell-Bates are regulars at Curtain Call Theater.

"It's an intimate theater and a great place to work," Richards, who worked in New York City theater before moving to Albany 20 years ago, said. "The producers give us great opportunities with the shows."

What will audiences like about "The Glass Menagerie?"

"It's about hopes and dreams, and what we are willing to give to get our

hopes and dreams," Brizzell-Bates said.

"It will take people to another world," Richards said. "We've got a nice, long run, and the play will get better and deeper."

"The Glass Menagerie" will run until Saturday, Oct. 6. Performances are Wednesday and Thursday at 7:30 p.m., Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m. Curtain Call Theatre is located at 210 Old Loudon Road in Latham.





Fenner's foot lifts Blackbirds past Watervliet

When the chips were down, the Voorheesville football team found a way to win.

Lee Fenner's 20-yard field goal with 1:51 left in the fourth quarter lifted the Blackbirds to a 19-18 victory over Watervliet in Saturday's class C South Division showdown of undefeated teams.

"We played a little sloppy — maybe a little impatiently — offensively, but the defense kept us in the game," said Voorheesville coach Joe Sapienza. "If you can win games like this, it speaks a lot to your character. This was a gutsy win."

Fenner played goal earlier in the day for the Voorheesville boys soccer team, and just like his performance in the Blackbirds' 3-1 victory over Mayfield, he came through when called upon to perform. Besides his game-winning field goal, Fenner also nailed a 39-yard field goal in the first quarter and was perfect in his only extra point attempt for the Blackbirds (3-0).

"That was his first (game-

winning) field goal of his career, and to have it be under those circumstances and drill it like that, it's tremendous," said Sapienza. "He was the difference in this game."

The Cannoneers (2-1) scored first when Mike Cooney hooked up with Chris Hughes for a 38-yard touchdown reception. The two point conversion failed, giving Watervliet an early 6-0 lead. Fenner's 39-yard field goal cut the deficit in half, but Cooney connected with Dan Bolt in the second quarter from 11 yards out to give Watervliet a 12-3 lead.

"We've seen them a couple of different times, and we know they're very good, they're balanced and physical," said Sapienza. "I think their aggressive nature took us out of our game a little bit, but we settled in and didn't get beat."

It looked as if the Cannoneers would head into halftime with their nine-point lead, but the Blackbirds had other ideas. Jay Conde orchestrated a late drive, capping it was a 40-yard touchdown pass to Evan Christner with 13 seconds left in the second

quarter. Fenner's extra point made the score 12-10.

Watervliet regained some momentum when Cooney engineered a long drive that ended with a five-yard touchdown run by Matt Kodadar in the third quarter. The two-point conversion failed, though, which left the Cannoneers with an 18-10 lead entering the fourth quarter.

Voorheesville got back into the game with a drive that ended with a nine-yard touchdown pass from Conde to Jordan Murphy. A failed two-point try left the Blackbirds with an 18-16 deficit.

The Cannoneers failed to move the ball on their next series, which forced them to punt with under six minutes left. The Blackbirds moved the ball deep into Watervliet territory, where Fenner hit his second field goal of the game to give Voorheesville its first lead.

Watervliet tried to get a drive going in the final two minutes, but Adam Duncan sacked Cooney to seal the victory.

"We put our defense in terrible position all game with the mistakes we made. We really put them behind the eight ball, and they did a nice job," said Sapienza. "We were worried that they would wear down, but they never did."

Voorheesville returns to action Saturday when it travels to Mechanicville.

In other weekend football action, Bethlehem suffered a 10-7 loss to Guilderland in a class AA Empire Division game, while Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk ran past Taconic Hills 46-6 in a class


B Reinfurt Division contest.

After allowing 10 first half points to Guilderland, Bethlehem (0-3) shut the Dutchmen down, but couldn't muster anything other than a Sean Murphy touchdown run in the fourth quarter.



of 51. They were designed by the players Tapler once coached before moving up to the varsity level.

"This was a young man, and to have cancer take away his life is so unfair," said varsity coach Dennis Bender. "But these are the paths that are made for us."

Shaker varsity basketball coach Jeff Holmes has been down this path before. He's lost several people to cancer, starting with his father in 1991. It's the primary reason why he started the annual Coaches vs. Cancer night, which all Suburban Council schools participate in.

"It hit home, and it hit hard again," said Holmes, who worked with Tapler at Shaker Junior High School. "As far as at school, it hasn't completely sunk in just yet. We lost a good man, a good coach and a good teacher."

It's hard because it happened so quickly. After initially thinking he had a case of bronchitis that he couldn't shake, Bender said Tapler went into the hospital late last year. As doctors searched for a cause of his fever and coughing, they discovered he had stage four non-Hodgkins lymphoma.

Normally, stage four would be a death sentence for a cancer patient. But doctors started giving Tapler chemotherapy, and by June he was well enough to go home and resume his life.

"When Russ was diagnosed with stage four non-Hodgkins lymphoma, it was a shock, but we all thought he could conquer it because he was a fighter," said Holmes.

Unfortunately for Tapler, the cancer made a comeback only weeks after being given a clean

bill of health. This time it took his life, leaving a wife, two teenage children, his parents, his relatives, a football program and his colleagues left to mourn his loss.

"Every day, we do a little salute to coach Tapler," said Bender. "Game night, these kids wear the T-shirts they designed."

Those T-shirts are more than a symbol of the program's loss, though. They are a rallying point for a team and a school that is smarting from Tapler's death. When the \$10 T-shirts went on sale at Shaker's first home game

Aug. 31, all 100 sold out. Another 100 went on sale at Friday's Shaker-Niskayuna game.

The proceeds from the T-shirt sale go directly to help the Tapler family, as will other fundraisers Bender has planned including a golf tournament he hopes to start next year.

"We'll always do something for their family and take care of them," said Bender.

That's what being part of the family means — never forgetting those who are no longer around.

"The kids won't forget him," said Bender.







It will be underneath their jerseys. It will be over the cheerleaders' uniforms. It will be in the stands.



Eagles take flight

Strong start has BC thinking about Section II title

The Bethlehem girls soccer team isn't wasting time in establishing itself as a serious Section II, Class AA title contender.

The Lady Eagles raised their record to 5-0 by winning last weekend's Hall of Fame Tournament in Oneonta with victories over Baldwinsville and Vestal.

"It's nice to get outside of the section and have some success outside the section," said Bethlehem coach Tom Rogan. "It's always good to play against out-of-section teams and see what kind of competition is out there."

The 2-1 victory over Baldwinsville Saturday and Sunday's 2-0 win against Vestal are the latest in a string of impressive performances for a Bethlehem team that is overcoming the graduation of several key players from last year's class AA finalists.

"It's a pretty confident group, and our goal is to get to and win the Section II title," said Rogan. "We feel we have the talent and the experience to do it."

The key for the Lady Eagles will be continuing to get the balanced scoring that they've had in winning their first five games. Players such as Kristina Maksuti, Becca Lee, Megan Olsen, Kate Halvorsen and Kaitlyn Martin have been taking up the slack left by the graduation of Laura Boucher and Tee Ladouceur.

"We put a lot of pressure on the other team (offensively)," said Rogan. "We moved Kristina Maksuti up to forward, and she and Kaitlyn Martin do a very good job of applying pressure. Then we have Becca Lee and Megan Olsen in the midfield, and they've played exceptionally well."

It helps that Bethlehem has an experienced goaltender in Kiersten Swete, who has allowed three goals in the first five games.

"She never makes mistakes, and she makes all the saves she needs to make," said Rogan.

Swete and the rest of the Lady Eagles were put to their biggest test to date Tuesday when they hosted undefeated Shenendehowa — itself looking to win Sectionals following last year's semifinal loss to Niskayuna.

"It will be a good opportunity to see where we are as a team," said Rogan.

There will be more tests for Bethlehem as the Suburban Council season continues. Following Thursday's game at Mohonasen, the Lady Eagles host Shaker next Monday before visiting Niskayuna next Wednesday.
