

SCHOOLS REACH OUT TO BULLIES AND VICTIMS TO END CONFLICTS

Within the past decade or so, parents across the nation have been troubled by reports of school shootings, and many can't seem to shake the image of the bullied, isolated child that has been the perpetrator in many of the cases.

However, according to many local school administrators, bullying is becoming less common, and young students are learning ways to deal with social issues more effectively.

"You'll have conflict that will escalate to verbal, maybe physical, but nothing to a violent or life-threatening level," said Mark Lané, a social worker at Guilderland Elementary School.

"People tend to call any kind of conflict a bullying situation,"

2008 budget goes to public

Town dips into fund balances to offset tax increase

The 2008 Bethlehem town budget presented at the Wednesday, Sept. 26, town board meeting by Supervisor Jack Cunningham features a 2.5 percent tax increase. A public hearing on the budget, which was put together over a series of workshops starting in August, will be held Oct. 24.

"We will continue efforts to minimize tax increases while ensuring high-quality services, and we believe the 2008 budget best meets that goal," said Cunningham.

Fund balances had to be tapped into in order to keep the tax increase at 2.5 percent. The town appropriated \$875,000 out of the general fund; \$307,000 out of the highway fund; \$974,000 out of the water fund; and \$397,000 of fund balance from the sewer fund for a total of \$2.55 million. Each of the four unreserved fund balances for the town remain at levels of between 15 and 20 percent.

One of the reasons so much fund balance was used, according to Comptroller Judith Kehoe, was the overall economy.

"Unfortunately, the local economy cannot be characterized as strong for the moment," said Kehoe.

The fund balance deficit in 2007 is estimated at \$600,000, leaving a total of \$3.26 million. Revenue growth for next year is projected at only 2 percent.

"I am looking for good news in the economy and haven't found a lot lately," Kehoe said.

In prior years, the town supervisor would present a budget, and the town board would then schedule a series of budget workshops. A change this year under Cunningham was that

Power company holds forum

Sparks fly as residents confront National Grid with their concerns

Stormy fall weather on Thursday, Sept. 27, preceded an even stormier presentation that same evening in Bethlehem by National Grid inside town hall regarding the recent outages occurring in neighborhoods across town.

The major Upstate utility supplier was in town to discuss the many changes that will be implemented over the next year to control the persistent power outage problem.

"We're here tonight to put the cards on the table and to address these issues," said Bill Flaherty, vice president of business services for National Grid.

Residents representing Douglas Road, Carstead Drive, North Heldeberg, McGuffey Lane and other parts of Delmar and Bethlehem vented their years of frustration with having to sit

in the dark at home while their refrigerated food spoiled or having to drive to a mall or stay in a hotel to wait it out until service is restored after an outage.

"We put up with this for 35 years," said a McGuffey Lane resident. "We lose power when it's hot; we lose power when it rains."

Carol Dillon of Kenholm Gardens told the audience she had the same problems in her neighborhood, which inspired her to rally residents to get National Grid to correct the problem.

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

lane.


Both vehicles sustained extensive damage and had to be towed from the scene.

Beauty blooms in business zone

Flags and Flowers focuses on Four Corners area

It's amazing what a few flowers and a green thumb can do for a main street or, in this case, the Four Corners of Delmar and the Delaware Avenue business district.

Flags and Flowers, a beautification project for a mile-and-a-half section of Delaware Avenue has so enhanced the aesthetics of the neighborhood that not many people can remember what the area looked like before.

"It was not very nice before," said Anita Tipple, a local resident who said she now regularly drives by to enjoy what she sees on Delaware Avenue. "Now it's really impressive."

Flags and Flowers is paid for through fundraisers by the Bethlehem Chamber of

Commerce. Contributions from the community ensure the program will continue through the next – and third – year.

"It began as an outgrowth of a partnership between the chamber, the IDA and town highway department and Verstandig Florists, where the flowers come from," said Marty DeLaney, president of the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce.

DeLaney said it is the town highway department with Gregg Sagendorf and his staff that really keeps the flowers looking vibrant through any kind of weather from May to October.

"This project would have never happened without the highway department paying special attention to the soil and the pH," said DeLaney. "It's not just about watering the plants."

A total of \$5,000 is needed in donations to pay for both the flowers and the "Welcome" banners

up and down the avenue.

"We hope to be able to raise enough money to buy seasonal banners so we can change them four times a year," DeLaney said.

Kay Hendrick is another supporter of Flags and Flowers, and like Tipple, she said she is very impressed with what she sees along Delaware Avenue.

"They are absolutely beautiful," said Hendrick. "Whoever has taken care of them has put a lot of hard effort and work into it."

DeLaney said the effort is not only aesthetically pleasing, but it contributes to the pride of the community as well.

"It shows we care about our community," DeLaney said.

Local leaders pack Vista info session

Builder describes phases of tech park development

Bill Hebert of BBL Development was the featured speaker at the Thursday, Sept. 26, Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce breakfast with close to 100 business leaders and residents quizzing the Vista Park developer about the future of the 440-acre tech park to be built in Bethlehem.

Hebert told civic leaders what to expect in the first phase of development, which is slated to begin in just a few months.

"A collection of shops and retail near the roundabout will start the park," said Hebert, referring to the planned development just behind the Price Chopper Plaza in Slingerlands.

The first group of buildings will be what Hebert calls "low rise" buildings of no more than three stories with a mix of general office space, shops, restaurants and office buildings for rent.

"We are talking about having buildings under construction by next spring," said Hebert.

When asked who the first tenant in the park might be, Hebert said there are some tech-based and general office businesses that have shown a strong interest, including GE Medical.

"If we could land one or two of those in the near future, the rest should follow," Hebert said.

Vista Tech Park is in the towns of Bethlehem and New Scotland with 90 acres, or 1.4 million square feet, developable at full build-out.

The number of jobs expected to be generated by businesses at Vista is estimated in the thousands over several years, according to a study conducted by Camoin Associates, which was hired by BBL developers. There will be no new jobs until the

third year of development, when 395 direct jobs are anticipated. More than 3,950 direct jobs and 7,498 total jobs are anticipated by the 12th year, according to the report. Direct jobs are jobs brought by new development in the Vista Park. Total jobs is the number of jobs created, included spin-off jobs from the overall tech park development.

"There will be a substantial economic impact over 20 years," said Hebert.

Audience members asked if the development will be energy efficient and when the pedestrian trail will be built on the site.

Hebert responded that many buildings in Vista Tech Park would use modern energy savings technology, and discussion on a pedestrian trail inside Vista Park is in the very preliminary stage.

The town of Bethlehem is working with developers to extend water and sewer lines to the park. Developers are paying for the cost of those extensions and utility that is needed.

"We are spending money, and it's quite a considerable investment," Hebert said.

Vista Tech Park is located in an Empire Zone and is eligible for several tax incentives from the state. When asked what rent would be for new tenants, Hebert said it will be "competitive."

BBL is in the process of setting up a Web site for residents to review information on Vista Park progress. The Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce will have a link to the Vista site on its own Web site in the next few weeks. Chamber president Marty DeLaney said she was pleased with the turnout and the information Hebert provided.

"I was very encouraged, particularly by comments from people in the room," said DeLaney.

Vista has already received state environmental quality review approval. Media will be invited to tour the site in mid-October.

Local chimney business builds on its foundation

Company expands to offer more fireplace options as well as service



"Drooling Dog" is my favorite yoga position. It's so comfortable I don't even need a mat. I just curl up on my side, put my hands together as if in prayer, and rest my head on my hands. In no time, I am unconscious with a trickle of saliva running from my mouth. Very relaxing.

OK, I made that up. "Drooling Dog" is not a real yoga technique, but what does that matter if it helps me relax? My husband tells me I look so peaceful when I'm asleep, so relaxed, and well, slightly unattractive with the drool on my chin.

"You won't be able to do yoga," they tell me. "Yoga is quiet, contemplative."

Rachel took a yoga class at an after-school program when she was about 8. She enjoyed it, so I think I need to start with an actual in-person instructor before I move on to the "do it yourself" home videos.

That's right; I haven't given up on yoga. As much as I love "Drooling Dog," the relaxation ends when I wake up. I get the idea that yoga, like other forms of regular exercise, provides longer lasting benefits.

Turns out it's a good source of calcium. And once I found "strawberry-banana" yogurt, I actually started liking the stuff. Yes, I actually like yogurt. Not as much as I like pudding, mind you, but enough to try to eat a container daily.

Why, oh, why, you may be wondering, do I connect yoga and yogurt? Well, the words sound similar, for one thing. And they're both good for you, yet require some training to really enjoy.

I'm thinking there are other "Y" words out there waiting to improve my health if only I'd give them a chance.

I need to eat more yogurt, take a yoga class, learn to yodel, wear more yellow, cook with yeast, watch Yogi Bear cartoons, and join the YMCA.

I'm out of breath just thinking about all the "Y" activities waiting for me.

Which reminds me: I need to breathe more.

I breathe all the time, of course, but that's just the breathing that occurs without me having to think about it. Automatic breathing is necessary, but doesn't always give your body enough air.

Nearly every article about how to reduce stress includes a section on deep breathing.

Our lives are so busy and we breathe all day long, yet we're supposed to find time to fit in extra breathing!

Like my "to do" list isn't long

Why, oh, why, you may be wondering, do I connect yoga and yogurt? Well, the words sound similar, for one thing. And they're both good for you, yet require some training to really enjoy.

enough, now I have to include "breathe"?

My husband has been trying to get me to breathe for years. In the midst of my rants about clutter or homework or injustices in the world; my updates on family and work news; and my dream retelling, Jeff will interject, "Take a breath, will you!"

I'm trying to learn how to do this on my own.

Not only have I learned the benefits of deep breathing, I've also dabbled in meditation.

And it's helped me to relax!

That's right; I've found success in a peaceful, contemplative activity.

No one is more surprised than I.

I wouldn't say I've mastered the art of meditation; far from it. I've only attended a meditation class on a yearly basis for a handful of years. But I was able to take ideas from those few sessions and use them in everyday situations.

Take breathing, for instance. The cool thing about breathing is you can do it anywhere. I can do it at my desk at work. I can do it while driving, at a soccer game, at the movies, while doing laundry.

Even taking a mere three deep breaths can make me calmer. I don't even wait for stressful situations to practice deep breathing. I inhale slowly at random times - as a way to avoid getting stressed.

Try it right now, while you're reading, beginning with the next sentence. Inhale slowly through your nose for a count of four seconds. Now exhale slowly for a count of four seconds.

Wasn't that easy? That's just beginner deep breathing. Advanced deep breathers can inhale for longer than four seconds, but even a "quick" deep

breath can work wonders.

Fitting in a few deep breaths while you go about your regular business is quite simple. Setting aside a period of time just for deep breathing alone seems like a luxury.

I recently read an article that encouraged people to set aside an hour or a half hour or a quarter hour to just sit in quiet and do nothing. During that time you would be unavailable to take phone calls, watch television, read e-mails or answer questions.

I can tune out external input like the phone or the computer, but it's an incredible challenge for me to quiet the chatter of my own thoughts.

My mind is always racing with endless tasks, ideas, feelings: clean the house, do that project, oil change, school picture form, order a turkey, check the homework, call Mom and Dad, exercise, renew the magazine subscription, etc.

It's easier to relax by reading a book than by sitting quietly.

The words in the book serve as a distraction to my noisy thoughts.

But when I close the book, especially at night, the noisy thoughts return.

Stop thinking and just go to sleep, my spouse tells me. Easy for him to say, he falls asleep while lowering his head to the pillow.

My mind, on the other hand, is not so kind. No matter how tired my body, my mind takes advantage of the quiet of the night. My mind says, "Oh good, you're not busy anymore, I've got a few million issues to chat with you about."

And then the noisy thoughts fill my head: How am I going to get that work assignment done? Rachel needs new jeans. Did I close the garage door? And on and on the noise continues.

Quieting one's mind is a challenge. Sometimes, for very short periods, like five minutes, I can do it. I just breathe deeply, concentrating on the sound of my own breath, the feel of my feet on the floor, the sounds of the wind blowing, a plane flying overhead, the creak of a floorboard.

Other times, I read late into the night, until the book falls from my hand and I slip once more into the pose of "Drooling Dog."






Police seize drugs and weapons at Delmar residence

The Bethlehem Police Department arrested Matthew T. Schillinger, 21, of Snowden Avenue, Delmar on several drug charges on Thursday, Sept. 27.

A search warrant was executed at Schillinger's residence, which resulted in the seizure of a large quantity of marijuana, cocaine, heroin, hallucinogenic and other controlled substances.

Additionally, a 12-gauge shotgun with ammunition, body armor, machete, drug paraphernalia, a computer and

police scanner radio were also seized.

Schillinger has been charged with six counts of criminal possession of a controlled substance in the third degree, B-felonies; one count of criminal possession of a controlled substance in the fourth degree, a C-felony; one count of criminal possession of marijuana in the second degree, a D-felony; misdemeanor and violation charges consist of two counts of criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree,

two counts of criminally using drug paraphernalia in the second degree; one count of unlawful possession of radio devices and one count of unlawful possession of marijuana.

Schillinger was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court where he was remanded to the Albany County Jail without bail. A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 3, at 6 p.m.

This investigation continues to be active and ongoing. Anyone

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

Football brings back memories

Friday nights in fall are never quite the same after you leave high school.

When you're a student, your hectic school week ends, and the weekend begins, filled with the anticipation of spending time with classmates later on. Fireplaces are stoked, the air is crisp and leaves crackle when you take a step. There are pep rallies, homecoming weekends, fall dances and the usual Friday night football games. Cheerleaders help one another with their makeup and uniforms, the high school band warms up on the sidelines and the boys on the school football team put on their warriorlike helmets and pads to boldly step forward and become the Friday night hero.

Believe it or not, I was once one of those football warriors. I stood a firm 5 feet, 8 inches (on tiptoes) and weighed 170 pounds soaking wet. Pliable but not quite breakable. The year was 1978 – my senior year at Bishop Scully High School in Amsterdam.

What I do remember is my quest to make the team and be a part of the mystique of the high school football experience.

In my era, you were really something when you made the varsity football team. It was like being a "made" man in the "Goodfellas" or "Sopranos" sense. You wore a varsity football jacket that had tough leather sleeves and a large "V" on your pocket with your number running along the shoulder – mine was 32. You even received a green Bishop Scully duffel bag (which, of course, you had to pay for) that later became my travel bag in

college on the train to Niagara University and back. Girls would suddenly become your friend.

The football experience in my hometown of Amsterdam was truly an event to behold. Everyone came out for Friday night games, from the local town doctor who eagerly waited to be called to the field in the fourth quarter to assist an injured player, to the community leader rooting on his quarterback son, cheering each play.

Every once in a while a fan from the visiting side would "rough it" on the Scully side, cheering his team on in front of the local contingent. And those boys from Fonda-Fultonville – were they ever tough. Many worked on the family farm in the dawn, went to school during the day, and then practiced in late afternoons before doing more chores on the farm in the evening. A little city guy like me never stood a chance.

I remember plenty of nights when I was bowled over as a corner linebacker by an oncoming 265-pound offensive lineman who would mow me over as I tried to break up a sweep around the end. But if you didn't have a muddy uniform you were humiliated. It was better to be tossed into the thick wet muddy mulch of the Scully gridiron than it was to never play in the game and have to jog back up the hill into the locker room with a freshly pressed white uniform. Everyone knew that when your uniform was white you never saw time in the game.

I'll never forget one teammate who didn't play in a game. Afterward, he rushed over to a muddy patch of turf to toss some dirt on his uniform to protect himself from ridicule.

Our team coaches were Jim Martuscello and Dutch Howlan. Coach Martuscello was a high school running back superstar who became coach of the Mohawks a few years later. Dutch Howlan was an area legend. With his imposing tall frame, crew cut hair, large framed glasses, green Bishop Scully baseball cap, and very stinky cigar in his mouth, it wasn't like you could mistake him in a crowd or walking up and down the sidelines.

Practices were grueling, especially in the hot summer afternoons. You would jog up and down the field, doing Green Bays (the name comes from a sadistic Vince Lombardi Green Bay Packer drill) and shoulder rolls, or run through a patch of ravine just outside the school grounds called the "Scully Gully" that was impossible to navigate.

Many a Scully Gully run would end with the faster guys trampling you or running past you as you crawled and climbed your way down, and up and across the gully and back, legs screaming in pain. After about 90 minutes of this nonsense someone would bring a hose to the field, and we would all put warm water from

the hose into our grassy helmets and dump it over our heads to ease the torture.

Gosh, those were fun days!

Finally, after weeks of preparation, meetings, playbook memorization and a few initiations, we were ready for game night.

During my senior year, our first game was on a Saturday afternoon. Our team was on the road, facing the Middleburgh Knights. I was starting corner linebacker and the game was deadlocked at 0 going into the second half.

On one of the first plays of the second half, the quarterback for Middleburgh decided he would throw a pass my way to his wide receiver. Years later, I am guessing the receiver was wide open because I will not be going into any high school hall of fame as a corner linebacker. But miraculously, as the wobbly pigskin floated my way, I was able to muster up enough energy (and courage) to run in front of the receiver, grab the ball from his outstretched arms, and run as fast (or as I found out later as slow) as I could down the sidelines into the end zone for the one and only touchdown of the game, and the one and only touchdown of my high school football career.

A little while later, the referee gun went off and the game was over. Boy, was I the hometown hero that night. My best friend at the time, Jim Luksis, decided he wanted to pal around with me all night in town as we stayed out to watch another football game. Everybody shook my hand, congratulating me. Pretty girls smiled, and I was treated to as much free food as I wanted. It was priceless.

The next day's anticipation felt like Christmas Day when I woke to grab the newspapers and read all the high school sport headlines only to find that the sports reporter who covered the game spelled my name wrong.

"CUOZZO SCORES WINNING TD AS MOHAWKS WIN 8-0"

Gee, thanks!

Flash forward and it's 2007. High school is now a part of a distant Mark Twain storytelling dream. Did I really play for a school called Bishop Scully that has since closed, and did I score that one touchdown and win a game?

When each October rolls around and the Friday night football lights switch on in every community across the land, that feeling comes back. I may be sitting on a train rolling past an athletic field with the fans and players flashing by in a Glory Days dream, or hear the roar of the crowd down the road as I walk past a high school near my own neighborhood. The players are different and the parents and fans all new, but the feeling remains the same. This commonality of the mind and soul that you share with the millions of others across this land on a Friday night in a fall hometown.

Eco Apples are picked fresh, close to home, and at the peak of flavor. The farmers who grow them are absolutely passionate about great-tasting fruit. Indian Ladder Farms has used ecologically-sound methods for many years and sees the program as one way to help educate consumers about the extra care that goes into raising fruit this way in the Northeast.

The northeastern region of the United States is tricky to grow apples in. The region's high humidity levels foster at least 60 different insect species that damage apple crops. Numerous fungus types and diseases also thrive

in the region's orchards. In fact Eastern fruit growers face two times as many problem diseases than growers in the western part of the country, including firelight, apple scab, black rot, and cedar apple rust.

Eco Apple is a project of Red Tomato, a non-profit based group in Canton, Massachusetts, which brings together research scientists from the University of Massachusetts and Cornell University, apple growers from seven northeast states and other advisors. The project, begun in 2003, develops and researches advanced Integrated Pest Management production methods, maintains a strict protocol followed by all participating orchards, and provides branding, marketing and consumer education to help promote regional apples.

Eco Apple orchards are third-party certified by the IPM Institute of North America. Eco Apple is supported in part by the USDA Crops at Risk program and the Cooperative State Research, Education

and Extension Service, and the EPA Agricultural Initiative Grant Program.

Tom Green, Director of the IPM Institute of North America, works with fruit growers all over the country and sees the need for a program such as Eco Apple to address the unique concerns of growers in this region. "These are some of the most knowledgeable apple growers around and I'm excited about their work and how it may benefit growers in other regions," Green notes.

Apple producers throughout the Northeast have faced difficult challenges in recent years due to the huge volumes of apples imported from western states, New Zealand, China and elsewhere. The Eco Apple program aims to help rebuild the once-thriving orchard sector here, at the same time helping to promote ecological production methods and a return of more regional apple varieties.

Slingerlands consignment store celebrates 10th anniversary

When both of their former jobs took turned sour, longtime friends Julie Hilland and Karen Moses decided there was no better time to start a business of their own.

"We always shopped at consignment stores and thought, 'Gee, that might be something we want to do,'" said Moses.

After researching the business, the two women from Slingerlands joined forces to start Something Olde, Something New, which celebrated its 10-year anniversary on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 28 and 29.

At the moderately sized shop located at Stonewall Plaza at the intersection of routes 85 and 85A, the pair sell high-quality used shoes, handbags and

Unlike thrift stores, consignment stores like Something Olde, Something New let customers sell their old goods for a percentage of the profits. Clothing, shoes, handbags and accessories are sold on a 60/40 percent basis, which means sellers receive 40 percent of the profits when their items are sold. Consigners of old furniture, linens or home accessories receive 50 percent of the profits.

Those interested in consigning at Something Olde, Something New have to make an appointment first.

"We set up appointments with all of our consigners so we can control the amount of inventory, otherwise the store will be too full. We want to turn things over so that we're always bringing new in," said Moses.

Moses and Hilland do research on the Internet to price some of their items, and they also rely on common sense and experience.

Many of their customers are regulars who have shopped there for years.

"You can get such good clothes at a great rate and price, to the point where I don't even look at clothes at another store because I know I can get it cheaper here," said Kathy Herrick of Rensselaer, who's been shopping at the store for about three years.

Paula Barthel of Guilderland is also a regular shopper at Something Olde, Something New. Barthel said she often avoids the mall and other shopping centers to spend some time at the shop, which she said is a much friendlier environment.

"I love the girls. they keep such a great store," she said of Moses and Hilland. "The clothes are easy to find and in great condition. I really prefer to shop here."

Barthel, who will be 60 in December, said she has a hard time finding clothes in other retail stores for her age group. Also a consigner, Barthel said she likes getting a little something back for giving up her stuff.

"The clothes you've outgrown, you can bring them here and get a little money to buy more. It's wonderful," she said.

Airport powder prompts flurry of activity

Substance ruled harmless; authorities called back in unrelated incident

Authorities were called twice to Albany International Airport last week.

Albany County sheriff's deputies first responded to a call of a mysterious white powder Tuesday, Sept. 25, at 6:45 p.m.

The substance was discovered at one of the airport's luggage carousels. Authorities later learned that the substance was only powdered soap, but not before portions of the airport had been closed off. In all, the impact on daily operations at the airport was minor, said Capt. John Layton of the county sheriff's department.

"It ended up being an excellent training exercise for us. We did everything per plan, and it worked the way it was supposed to," he said.

In all, a team of 25 first responders, including members of the Capital Region Forensic

Haz. Mat Team, worked the scene, he said.

The airport employee who contacted authorities reported less than 5 grams of the substance. No threats were made, and there were no complaints of illness, said Layton.

While crews quarantined the area and ran spectral tests on the substance, operations at the airport continued, said Layton. Portions of the airport, including the luggage claim area, rental car lots and the airport access road were closed off and reopened after three hours.

Sheriff's deputies, who maintain a constant presence at the airport, were called back to the airport two days later on Thursday, Sept. 27, to arrest an employee there on charges of eavesdropping on co-workers and superiors.

Deputies arrested Karl A. Schroeder, 38, of Old Route 66, Averill Park, on a felony charge of eavesdropping and a misdemeanor count of possession of an eavesdropping device.

According to authorities,

Schroeder allegedly hid a digital recorder in a staff lounge, recording approximately 30 minutes of conversation between other employees and management on several occasions.

Schroeder is an employee of AvPorts, an independent contractor that heads daily operations and maintenance at the airport.

"One of his co-workers found out about it, and we were able to confiscate the tape recorder he was using," said Sheriff James Campbell. "He admitted to it and doing it for personal reasons."

According to authorities, Schroeder allegedly placed himself within earshot of the conversation that he was recording.

The recordings were nothing more than conversation and did not pose a security concern at the airport or with coworkers there, said Campbell.

Schroeder was arrested and released on an appearance ticket to appear in Colonie town court Wednesday, Oct. 10.



but many times it's not," said Dianne Walshhampton, Guilderland Elementary School principal.

According to Walshhampton and Lane, student conflicts tend to be more common at the elementary school than bullying, which they describe as two very different things.

"Bullying tends to be characterized by a hierarchical relationship. It's an ongoing pattern of intimidation and harassment," Lane said, adding that bullying is more of a relationship between

Many teachers and administrators have even strayed away from using the term "bully" because they believe it's an unhealthy way for a child to be labeled and can cause self-esteem issues.

"When someone is accused of being a bully, it's not always helpful for that person because they start to see themselves in a negative way," said Lane.

Lane and Walshhampton both agree that the best way to deal with a child who is an antagonist is to first try to understand the situation and the child's point of view, and then talk to him or her about it. That way, the child can open up and take responsibility.

"It's a continual process. Discipline is always problem solving," said Walshhampton. "We identify what are we going to do so that this doesn't happen again."

When making the transition from elementary to middle school, according to administrators, student conflicts tend to become more sophisticated and less conspicuous.

Mike Mitchell, one of three principals at Shaker Junior High School in North Colonie, said the types of conflicts he sees between students are more gossipy, he-said-she-said arguments and exclusion, which, according to

studies, typically happens more often among teenage girls.

"The looks and 'you're not sitting with me' tend to be a female thing. The slamming somebody's locker, bumping into you in the hallway, grabbing your backpack tend to be some things that I see males do," he said.

Dawn Savery, one of the hall principals at Shaker Junior High, said one of the most difficult things about her job is identifying student conflicts before they escalate, since many students are reluctant to notify her of a conflict or, if they are being bullied, out of fear that the situation will only get worse if it's exposed.

"It's hard to address the bullying or harassing situation if we're not aware of it so we try to empower the kids to do something

about it, like you don't have to take that," she said.

Like Walshhampton and Lane, Savery said it's important to do a little investigating, talk to kids, and identify their situation and the conflict to get a sense of what's really going on with them.

Lane said every student at the junior high is assigned to a specific guidance counselor, who meets with the students regularly to talk about any social or psychological issues they might be facing.

Russell Moore, Shaker Junior High's head principal, said a lot of the conflicts that arise between students at the middle school level are the result of them being in a new, integrated environment where they are challenged to make new friends as their extracurricular and academic interests start to form.

"When you come to junior high school, you're going to meet people you never met before, and start this stuff because you're meeting new people with different interests," he said, adding that school administrators chose to split up kids into different halls years ago, so they are integrated with kids from different schools.

Moore said that mixing kids this way allows them to take more social risks and be more aware and accepting of kids they didn't grow up with. The goal is to get

them as involved and connected to school as possible, as many studies show that bullies tend to struggle academically or feel socially insecure and isolated.

"Since it may not always be their classes that connect kids to school, it might be computer club or rocket club after school. This gives kids the opportunity to mix with other kids beyond their cliques," he said.

As for the elementary school level, the Guilderland Central School District takes a proactive approach to student conflicts by getting kids to focus on how they should treat each other. In order to do this, the school district implements the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program, a widely used program that aims to reduce anti-social behaviors and bullying and improve peer relations at school.

"We try to teach kids, if you see something happening, if you see somebody treating a child unkindly or hurtfully, and it makes them feel uncomfortable, then you need to tell them that," Walshhampton said.

She said that if a bystander says, "Stop doing that, it's hurtful," a lot of times a bully will stop because they no longer have the power they were seeking to gain.

Walshhampton said the worst thing a parent can do when discussing bullying is dismiss it as simple, harmless child's play. She urges parents to contact her if they find out their child is involved in a conflict with another student or a victim of a bully.

"Nobody should say, 'That's just part of growing up and you have to get tough and handle it,'" she said. "Kids shouldn't have to handle it."

two students than an act, and often the child who is bullying is looking to gain some sort of power by persistently annoying or aggravating another child.

"If there's a child that wants that swing on the playground, and he's gong after that swing, that's not really bullying. It's just a kid wanting what he wants," Walshhampton said.

Moving up, fitting in

Middle school officials use a variety of tactics to help incoming students feel like they belong

When a sixth grader enters middle school, everything she faces is new and has the potential to make her feel uncomfortable and insecure. For the first time in her life, she's moving from class to class, and she's seeing unfamiliar faces in a much larger school.

Area schools put a lot of effort into easing the transition to middle school and to high school.

Niskayuna schools have "extensive orientation programs," said Brian McAllister, school counselor at Iroquois Middle School.

To wit, middle school administrators and counselors visit the elementary schools to meet fifth graders, and the fifth graders visit the middle schools to meet sixth graders - those who have most recently been there and done that.

There's a parent orientation and a program on the day before the first day of school.

Much of that effort involves introducing students and their parents to the academic side of things, like courses, homework and grades. Advice on navigating the building, managing time and organizing lockers is also dispensed.

More and more, though, schools are addressing a student's social adjustment. By taking a proactive stance in getting kids to feel like they belong, school administrators believe they can facilitate academic success and, perhaps more importantly, ward off feelings of isolation and indifference.

"It all goes hand in hand," said

McAllister. "Our goal is to have sixth graders come in feeling comfortable with themselves, with the other students and with the adults in the building."

Kids who are slow to adjust are more likely to have a "rocky start" academically, he said.

Iroquois Middle School implemented a new program this year in which eighth graders are leading small groups of incoming sixth graders. Called the WEB (Where Everyone Belongs), it's part of a national effort by the Boomerang Project (www.boomerangproject.com/) where McAllister attended a three-day training course earlier this year.

The first WEB activities took place the day before school started. McAllister led the assembly of new sixth graders through a variety of large group activities

"The eighth graders really enjoy it," said McAllister. "And they're developing leadership skills."

Moreover, McAllister sees the program as beneficial to the school climate. In addition to developing leadership skills, the eighth graders are taking ownership of the school. They're more likely to pick up a piece of trash or to intervene when someone's getting teased.

"It's like they think, 'Hey this is our school. Let's set the tone,'" he said.

Bethlehem Central Middle School puts a big emphasis on participating in clubs and sports teams apart from classes, said principal Jody Monroe.

"Our goal is to have every student involved in at least one extracurricular activity," she said.

The school recently revamped its activities guide "to make it look more attractive," Monroe said.

By mid-October, Monroe studies club rosters and identifies students who are not involved. The guidance counselors will reach out to help those kids find a group they might enjoy or pair them up with a friend in an activity. In addition, said Monroe, "Our teachers are very good at bringing kids to our attention."

If one club doesn't fit, students are encouraged to try another or to hook up with a teacher to start their own.

"For example, last year after the Virginia Tech shootings, a group of sixth graders wanted to do something," said Monroe. They formed a group and created a quilt to send to the victims of the tragedy.

Monroe has no doubts about the relationship between social acceptance and academic success.

"It's huge," she said. "Academics, social skills, cooperativeness, all those things are paramount in students' success in life."

and then smaller group games to break the ice. Then the WEB teams were formed, each with two eighth-grade leaders and eight to 10 sixth graders. Teams spent the rest of the time together, touring the building, talking and doing team-building activities.

Once school starts, the WEB teams eat lunch together at least once a month. Informal connections are encouraged, like tutoring sessions or friendly notes tucked into lockers.

Forty eighth-graders at Iroquois are leaders this year, selected from 55 applicants. McAllister was impressed that so many students wanted to participate at the expense of two summer days (one for training, one for the before-school program).

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
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Drawing the line

Redistricting committee continues to define new school boundaries

Neighborhood boundaries were further defined at the Tuesday, Sept. 25, meeting of the Bethlehem Central School District redistricting committee.

"We have a lot to do tonight," said Doug Hamlin of VersaTrans Solutions, the company hired to guide the town through the redistricting process.

Sixty-nine neighborhoods were identified by boundary lines after the first meeting.

"The goal tonight is to lock down those neighborhood units," said Hamlin.

The goal of the redistricting committee, which is made up of PTA members from each of the elementary schools, is to define boundaries that will provide the criteria for establishing maps that will achieve a more balanced school enrollment across six elementary schools, including the new Eagle Elementary School expected to open in 2008.

Carol Quinn, a resident of the Haswell Farms development, said three quarters of the children in her neighborhood go to Hamagrael and the others are enrolled in Elsmere. She suggested that children who live in her neighborhood be allowed to go to one school.

"I implore upon the board and everyone in the room to keep us together," said Quinn.

Suzy Sodergren, a resident of Eileen Lane in Glenmont,

suggested that Wemple Road and Eileen Lane should not be split by a boundary line.

"Right now we would be split with our neighbors across the street," said Sodergren.

A resident of Milltown Plaza suggested the children in her neighborhood all go to the same school.

Hamlin said there is one neighborhood boundary that will likely see a change in the redistricting process.

"Some Glenmont people are going to Clarksville, and it's a

situation we will be correcting," Hamlin said.

Redistricting criteria were again discussed by the committee, and those were: establishing a balanced school enrollment, achieving more rational boundaries, addressing transportation efficiency, and affecting the fewest families possible. Committee members urged the board to consider socio-economic conditions as other possible criteria.

"We need diversity," shouted one parent in the crowd when the issue was brought up.

Another resident suggested a public hearing be held at some point in the process allowing everyone an opportunity to express his or her views.

"There is no formal public hearing," said Superintendent Les Loomis, adding that each redistricting meeting is set up to allow for public input at least once every session.

"I would consider this, in effect, a public hearing," Loomis said.

Future meetings are scheduled for Oct. 16, Nov. 6 and Nov. 13 before the committee selects two or three final scenarios for the school board to consider at the Nov. 27 meeting.

"I am here to say to you tonight it will get better," said Dillon, adding it took National Grid about six months to rectify the problem in Kenholm Gardens.

One of the main reasons for outages in Bethlehem, according to National Grid, is because of the many trees throughout town. Information provided by National Grid at the meeting showed that downed trees caused 37 percent of all outages in town in 2007.

"We need to do significant tree trimming and tree removal in Bethlehem," said Flaherty.

National Grid expects to spend \$1.2 million over the next year on tree cutting and trimming, with even more money to be spent on upgrading equipment.

"We're going to spend \$3 million in Bethlehem, and that's a lot of money," said Flaherty.

James Murphy, superintendent of transmission and distribution for National Grid, walked residents through the process the company follows after a power outage.

"Public safety is the first priority," said Murphy.

He said that trees that have fallen on power lines or lines

that may be arcing or on fire would be a main priority, as well as restoring power to customers with critical care needs.

"We start from the top and work our way down," from transmission line to substation to feeders and main lines, said Murphy. "The timeframe depends on the magnitude of the storm."

But residents continued to

press for quicker action.

"Four days in a hotel is hard to take," said one resident.

Others threatened to go to the Public Service Commission with their woes and file a claim with the company's claims department.

"We have got problem areas, and we're going to address those problem areas," Murphy said.

Planned upgrades for Delmar over the next year include replacing several power poles, fuses, insulators and removing trees from several neighborhoods.

The tree-trimming program will begin this November.

budget workshops were held in August with department heads and the town board involved.

"We all participated in the budget development process," said town board member Joann Dawson. "Now we will wait and hear the town residents on what they feel strongly about."

The Wednesday, Oct. 24, public hearing on the budget is scheduled for 6:15 p.m. at town hall. If there are no other meetings or changes made, the budget is then expected to be adopted at the town's Nov. 14 meeting.

Some of the highlights in the 2008 budget include the addition of a full-time staffer in senior services and a full-time consultant to address the town's stormwater management issues.

The 2008 budget totals \$37,625,000, up 3.8 percent from the previous year.

Town employees will receive a 3 percent across-the-board cost-of-living increase. They will also be asked to contribute slightly more in health insurance costs. A town employee covered under an individual health insurance plan will now pay 5 percent. Employees under the town's health insurance family plan will now contribute 16 percent,

up 1 percent from last year.

Cunningham highlighted several initiatives under way, including the Route 85 Slingerlands Bypass project, the town operation of Colonial Acres Golf Course, the implementation of a new central call system and the groundbreaking for Vista Technology Park this fall.

A new automated parks program registration and a DPW asset management program are a few of the new programs

planned for 2008.

"The parks department will incorporate new technology designed to improve customer service through a major software upgrade that will make recreation program registration more efficient and user-friendly," Cunningham said.


Modest user fee increases are expected in the water and sewer funds. The October public hearing will also establish the set salaries for elected positions. The town supervisor salary is proposed at \$102,779, the town board at \$13,561 each, the town clerk at \$66,466, superintendent of highways at \$91,786 and receiver of taxes at \$59,743.

Students to tackle infrastructure safety in future competition

When an interstate bridge collapses during rush hour or broken levees destroy a major city, Americans are again reminded of the nation's crumbling infrastructure, but few people feel empowered to do anything about it.

Beginning this fall, hundreds of Capital District students join thousands of middle school students from around the country to tackle the issue of safety for the country's vast network of utilities, transportation, structures, and communications systems in the 2008 National Engineers Week Future City Competition.

Sponsored by the nation's professional engineering community, Future City aims to stir interest in science, technology, math and engineering among young people. Starting with the new school year, the competition asks students to work in teams under the guidance of a teacher and a volunteer engineer mentor to design and build a city of tomorrow. They must also conduct research for an essay on a pressing social need. This year, the essay centers on an issue straight from the headlines: How to monitor safety for the structures and systems that affect virtually every part of every person's life.

The Capital Region Future City Competition will be held 9Jan. 19 at Hudson Valley Community College. First-place winners there will join teams from 39 other regions for an all-expense-paid trip to the 16th annual Future City National Finals in Washington, D.C., Feb. 18 to 20, during Engineers Week. National grand prize is a trip to U.S. Space Camp in Huntsville, Ala. More than 30,000 students from 1,100 middle schools are expected to participate nationwide.

In Future City, the nation's largest engineering education program and among the most popular, students first create cities on computers using SimCity 3000 software and then build three-dimensional, tabletop models to scale. To ensure a level playing field, models must use recycled materials and can cost no more than \$100. Students also write

brief abstracts describing their city and must present and defend their designs at the competition before a panel of engineer judges who test the depth of the teams' knowledge.

That knowledge is often astonishingly evidenced by the essays which require seventh and eighth graders to explore complex challenges that most adults would consider out of their league. This year's topic, "Keeping Our City Infrastructure Healthy: Using Nanotechnology to Monitor City Structures and Systems," should prove particularly fruitful.

Engineers and researchers contend that nanotechnology, generally described as technology and devices operating at the molecular level, offers limitless potential. The essays must describe how built-in nanotechnology within a single component of their city's infrastructure, such as a tunnel or the water supply, monitors for safety. Further, the monitoring system should include ways to resolve problems with a minimum of human intervention. The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) is this year's Future City essay sponsor.

Registration deadline for the 2008 Future City Competition is Friday, Oct. 26.

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Hispanic Heritage Month focuses on a vibrant group

In 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week. In 1988, this commemoration was expanded to a monthlong observance.

Hispanic Heritage Month (Sept. 15-Oct. 15) honors the culture and traditions of U.S. residents with roots in Spain, Mexico and the Spanish-speaking countries of Central and South America and the Caribbean. Sept. 15 was chosen as the start date because it marks anniversaries of independence for Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. Independence Day in Mexico is Sept. 16; Chile celebrates its independence on Sept. 18. U.S. census statistics for 2004 revealed the following facts:

- New York is among the 13 states with at least half a million Hispanic residents.
- The estimated Hispanic population in the U.S. as of July 1, 2004 was 41.3 million,



or 14 percent, making people of Hispanic origin the nation's largest ethnic minority.

- The projected Hispanic population of the U.S. as of July 1, 2050, is 102.6 million, or about a quarter of the projected total.
- In 2004, 31 million U.S. residents age 5 and older spoke Spanish at home.
- 7.6 million Hispanic citizens voted in the 2004 presidential election, up from 5.9 million four years earlier.
- In 2004, 18 percent of the nation's elementary and high school students were Hispanic, triple the 1970 percentage. In 2004, 2.7 million Hispanics held bachelor's degrees, double the number of 10 years earlier. Also in 2004, 714,000 Hispanics held advanced degrees.

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
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



Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

Estelle Kessler Yarinsky works out of a studio at Delmar's Four Corners. Colorful pieces of cloth cover the shelves; labeled bins are on the floor and on the wall, there's a work-in-progress, its key elements hidden by pinned-on bits of – what else? – fabric.

Twenty of her large fabric wall hangings are currently on display at the Albany Institute of History and Art, in an exhibit titled "Fabrica: Fiber Constructs by Estelle Kessler Yarinsky."

"They're portraits of little-known women who did well-known things," Kessler Yarinsky said. "They're very large pieces that I worked on for 12 years. I think of this project as rescuing exceptional people from anonymity."

Some of the women depicted are Emily Warren Roebling, wife of the chief engineer of the Brooklyn Bridge. After her


husband became ill, Roebling, who had been schooled in science and math, tucked the plans under her arm and oversaw the completion of the project. Rosalind Franklin, instrumental in the discovery of DNA, and the now well-known Zora Neale Hurston are some of the other women.

Kessler Yarinsky's work involves as much research as art work. She learned about most of her subjects in her daily life – at the library, on the radio, at museums – and does some reading and research about them.


"I have to decide that it's a person I'd like to live with for a long time," she said. "I do library research; I contact biographers."

Kessler Yarinsky, 75, starts sketches, does a fabric sketch, and eventually makes a full-sized sketch before completing works that are as large as 45" wide and 80" long.

The fabric portraits began with some of the women in Kessler Yarinsky's family.

"I started with my mother and her four sisters," Kessler Yarinsky said. "They were first-generation Americans, and their parents could send the boys to college, but not the women. Still, they accomplished so much."



A second exhibit is also on display now at the Institute, and while it's not by a local artist, it's about a local place now at its most beautiful.

"Indian Ladder, A Lyric Journey: Photographs by John Yang" showcases photographs that New York City-based Yang has taken of the Indian Ladder trail at the John Boyd Thacher State Park in the course of six years.

The 38 photos were taken by a view camera, which takes 11-by-14 inch photos.

"It's an old-fashioned camera," Yang, who's 74, said. "It has a hood, a bellows, and brown glass. You see the image upside down. The large camera



enables you to compose the picture very carefully and see the picture you're taking." Yang makes a contact print from the full-size film.

"I got a lot of queries along the trail about why I didn't use

a smaller camera and make enlargements," Yang said. "A contact print contains clarity and detail you can't get with an enlargement."

How did a New York City boy end up shooting photographs of Thacher Park? By reading a guide book by Bradford VanDiver, a geologist.

"The whole field of geology is quite fascinating," Yang said. "I found a reference to Thacher State Park and was Mine Lot Falls."

The notion of 1000-foot cliffs caught Yang's fancy, and he made repeated trips to the area to take pictures between 2001 and 2006.

"A place has to touch you," he said. "You have to go to it, then go back and then go back again. You see more, and you get some good pictures. Stick around and continue to photograph and good pictures will come again."

Yang's exhibit will be accompanied by "The Helderberg Escarpment: A History of Tourism and Science," which will showcase paintings, prints, postcards and geological samples.

"Fabrica: Fiber Constructs by Estelle Kessler Yarinsky" and "Indian Ladder: A Lyric Journey: Photographs by John Yang" will run until the end of the year.

The Albany Institute of History and Art is located at 125 Washington Ave. in Albany. Admission is \$8 for adults; \$6 for seniors and students; \$4 for children 6 to 12 years old; and free for children under 5.







About the only thing that could prevent the Bethlehem girls tennis team from winning the Suburban Council title is a major upset.



but disappeared. Same thing with Orlando Hernandez - though, in his defense, "El Duque" was dealing with an injured foot. John Maine, Oliver Perez and Mike Pelfrey showed too much inconsistency. Shockingly, so did Tom Glavine, especially in Sunday's 8-1 loss to Florida that sealed the Mets' fate.

So as we enter October, the Yankees are in their familiar role as an American League playoff team. They also have a favorable match-up with Cleveland, which they swept in both of their regular season series. Still, I'm not willing to anoint the Yankees as the best team in the American League. Alex Rodriguez has to prove he can hit in the playoffs, and those young pitchers will have to prove that they can handle the postseason atmosphere before I do that.

As for the Mets, they are in the familiar role of having to restructure themselves to remain competitive. The only question for general manager Omar Minaya is which direction does he go in - turn the pitching staff over to his supposed young guns like Pelfrey and Phil Humber, or trade away prospects for veteran hurlers to make another run at a playoff

spot? Personally, I'd try trading for Dontrelle Willis (now that his value has been diminished a little by a sub-par 2007 season in Florida) and then start scooping up any pitching prospects I could steal from other organizations to build up some organizational depth. It's less risky than betting on Pelfrey, Humber, Perez and Maine to be consistently good.

Certainly, the Mets weren't consistently good this season, and it cost them the National League East title and a playoff berth.

As for the Yankees, they weren't consistently good the entire season, but they were good when it counted and they got into the playoffs.

Man, I am sorry I didn't see this coming.



Panthers ground Blackbirds

Chatham quarterback Zach Kraham picked apart Voorheesville's defense with his arm and his feet.

Kraham threw for three touchdowns and ran for two more to lead the Panthers to a 42-21 victory over the Blackbirds in Saturday's class C South Division game at Thomas Buckley Sr. Memorial Field in Voorheesville.

Kraham capped Chatham's first series with a 6-yard touchdown run. Then, he connected with Drew Doty for a 14-yard scoring pass later in the first quarter to give the Panthers (4-1) a 14-0 lead.

Kraham continued his assault

on Voorheesville's defense in the second quarter with a 19-yard touchdown pass to Parker Niles, but the Blackbirds (4-1) made that the last touchdown Chatham scored in the first half. Voorheesville engineered a long scoring drive later in the second quarter, capped by Jay Conde's 4-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Murphy. Then, the Blackbirds forced a Chatham turnover with less than two minutes left, but Conde threw an interception to give the ball back to the Panthers.

Voorheesville appeared to get back in the game late in the third quarter when Pat Jones rushed for a 9-yard touchdown to make the score 21-14. But Kraham hit John Kinnicut with a 35-yard

scoring strike, and Alex Kennard-Ashe intercepted Conde and returned it 30 yards for another touchdown to put Chatham in command again.

Kraham added a 1-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter to complete a solid all-around performance. The reigning state class C player of the year completed 8 of 14 passes for 150 yards and rushed 16 times for 49 yards.

By comparison, Conde struggled for Voorheesville. The senior threw for 159 yards, but he completed only 11 of his 34 attempts and was intercepted three times. Jones also had a tough time against Chatham's defense, gaining 68 yards on 18 carries.

The Blackbirds fell into a five-way tie with Chatham, Coxsackie-Athens, Watervliet and Mechanicville for first place in the South Division, but they still have hope for a divisional title. They wrap up the regular season with games against Catholic, Central and Coxsackie-Athens, while Watervliet, Mechanicville and Chatham all face each other in the last two weeks.

In other football action last weekend, Bethlehem kept its class AA playoff hopes alive with a 20-18 Empire Division victory at Albany, while Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk did all of its scoring in the first half on its way to a 21-0 class B Reinfort Division victory over Cohoes.


Never should have buried the Yankees

I feel an apology is in order to all New York Yankee fans.

I was wrong to write 14 weeks ago that the Yankees wouldn't make the playoffs ... and even more wrong to say that the Mets would.

Not only did the Yankees make the playoffs for the 13th consecutive year, they did so by playing their best baseball when it counted - the period between the All Star break and the end of September. They got contributions from nearly every player Joe Torre put on the field. Even their pitching staff got going, thanks to an infusion of young talent such as Ian Kennedy and Joba Chamberlain.

The irony is while the Yankees were playing their best baseball, the Mets were playing their worst, especially in September.

The bullpen, which was such a strength for the Queens boys last year, fell completely apart in the last four weeks. The starters, who seemed shaky through the first five months, were basket cases. For every good start they had, they'd have three bad starts. There was only so much that David Wright, Carlos Beltran and Moises Alou could do at the plate to help bail out the pitchers.

Still, the Mets could have avoided the ignominy of blowing a seven-game lead with three weeks left in the regular season

if they could have beaten the two National League East bottom feeders, Washington and Florida. Even at their worst, the Mets should have had a chance to beat those teams. Instead, they went 1-5 against Washington and lost two of their three home games against Florida. What's worse is that they were blown out in several of those games.

At least the Yankees beat the teams that they should have beaten, and they had plenty of opportunities in September. I swear they spent the last two weeks playing only Tampa Bay and Baltimore, which is like playing triple A clubs. Then again, that should have been the case for the Mets against Washington and Florida.

How much credit should be given to Torre for managing the

Yankees to a wild card berth? A lot. He took chances by handing the ball to his young pitchers during key series against Detroit and Boston, and it worked out well nearly every time. Kennedy and Phil Hughes had quality starts, and Chamberlain was the best set-up reliever in the majors over the last two months. Torre didn't have to give them the ball, but he did and it allowed the Yankees to surge past the Tigers and Seattle for the wild card spot.

Conversely, how much blame should Randolph shoulder for the Mets' collapse? Certainly some blame, but not all of it. The blame has to be shared by every Met player for not coming through in the clutch. Jose Reyes batted .197 in September. Shawn Green all
