Two teens die, one injured, in Glenmont crash

Speed believed to be a factor in Friday night accident

Two Bethlehem families are in mourning following a one-vehicle car accident that killed two teenagers and critically injured a third.

Jacqueline McHugh, 16, of Chrisken Drive, Glenmont, and Alexander Gould, 17, of Jacob Drive, Delmar, were killed when

the car they were in struck a tree off Meads Lane Friday evening, Nov. 23, after veering off the road. A third person in the 1992 Acura, Brian Wood, 16, of Beacon Road, Glenmont, who was in the back seat of the car at the time of the accident, is listed in critical condition at Albany Medical Center.

Bethlehem police believe speed was a contributing factor in the crash, which continues to be under investigation. The ac-

cident occurred around 9:30 p.m. Friday and has shocked many in the Bethlehem School District.

"Our entire school community is saddened and diminished by the loss of Jacqueline McHugh and Alexander Gould," said school Superintendent Les Loomis.

McHugh was a junior at Bethlehem High School who, according to Principal Chuck Abba, was very popular among

her peers and "very well respected."

"She just had a special warmth," said Loomis.

McHugh was a Votech student and studied computer applications. She was also employed at Delmar Place where she worked

Shoppers swarm local stores

Smaller stores typically see weekend surge after the big-box blitz

A mix of big-box retail stores along Route 9W and small mom-and-pop stores throughout town give Bethlehem shoppers a unique mix of Black Friday and holiday season shopping.

The Glenmont branch of Wal-Mart, the nation's largest discount retailer, moved Black Friday up one day to "Turkey Thursday" to catch early bird shoppers. The store also encouraged people to shop online for savings on Thanksgiving, with specials beginning at 5 a.m. Friday, Nov. 23.

"The 5 a.m. horn sounded and the gates released," said Jami Arms, a Wal-Mart spokeswoman out of the Benton, Ark., headquarters.

"Our strategy was to get shoppers shopping, even before the traditional Black Friday," said Arms.

Wal-Mart does not allow local store managers to comment on individual stores nor can any member of the media take pictures or interview customers inside. That policy also applies to many other corporate retail stores such as Marshall's, which opened in April in Glen-







Shoppers help store serve up meaningful meals

Supermarket campaign puts food on the tables of those in need

Hannaford Supermarkets in Delmar is ringing in the holiday season by helping others in need.

The store donated 350 pies and gallons of milk to Equinox for the annual Equinox Thanksgiving Community Dinner.

That food delivery came on the heels of Hannaford's recent

donation of 1,500 pounds of turkey and 2,000 individual cups of applesauce last week.

The 38th annual Equinox Thanksgiving Day Community Dinner fed more than 8,000 hungry, homeless or homebound people in the Capital District. More than 3,000 Equinox volunteers prepares, packages and home delivered traditional holiday meals from the Empire State Plaza and hosted a sit-down dinner at the First Presbyterian Church in Albany on Thanksgiving Day.

A typical Equinox feast serves up 8,000 pounds of turkey, 2,000

pounds of ham, 2,800 pounds of yams, 940 pies, 625 dozen dinner rolls, 48 gallons of cider and 19,500 pieces of fruit. The event is funded entirely by donated cash and food.

"Fund A Feast" is a new holiday food drive program that Shop 'n Save and Hannaford stores in New York started.

"This is a program where customers purchase preassembled bags that will be distributed to all area food pantries," said Bill Marinello, store manager.

More than 100 Fund A Feast bags of food were donated

by customers leading up to Thanksgiving. Items in the bag include stuffing, corn, vegetables and mashed potatoes. The Fund A Feast program is scheduled to run through Saturday, Dec. 22, or the remainder of the holiday season.

"To date, we have had phenomenal success with all our customers embracing it," said Marinello.

Linda Schuyler, executive director of Food Pantries for the Capital District, said the number of area people who go hungry is on the rise along with a changing face of those in need.

"The demographic of who we're seeing in our pantry has changed the last five or six years," said Schuyler, who said the working poor are more in need than ever before. Those are the individuals who pay rent, heat and light, gas in their car and do not have money left over at the end of the day for food on the table.

"We have two trucks on the road every day delivering tons of food," said Schuyler.

Food Pantries of the Capital District has already served 2 million meals to date this year.

Retired local chemist publishes first novel

Woman drew on trip to South America for inspiration

When you first meet newly published author Susan Panek-Coffey of Slingerlands, you think Danielle Steele and not a retired chemist.

But after years of full time work devoted to science, Panek-Coffey has turned her attention to the romance, intrigue and excitement of Colombia, almost a decade after she visited the South American country, for her first published book, "Adventures in Bogota."

"I have always loved literature," said Panek-Coffey, whose novel focuses on characters involved in the drug trade, including two innocent American tourists who get caught up in the mystery.

"I was in Colombia visiting a friend and got fascinated in the country," said Panek-Coffey, who sets her novel against the backdrop of the natural beauty of South America's rainforests, mountains and other geographical elements.

Jose Sanchez, the central character and the fictional drug lord of "Adventures in Bogota," has created a mini empire based on crime and violence. Stacey Taylor is the American tourist who innocently gets drawn into the local struggle, along with her hero Rudolph Mendoza, a aristocrat who tries to bring justice to Sanchez and his den of thieves.

Panek-Coffey has been writing

short stories for several years and came close to having her selections published in many major magazines.

"I was very encouraged," said Panek-Coffey, who once worked in the research institute at Sterling Winthrop in Rensselaer.

"We analyzed all the pharmaceutical drugs at Sterling before they went on the market," she said.

Her knowledge of chemistry helped her in the research of her book. She also conducted in-depth interviews with federal Drug Enforcement Agency operatives to better understand the Colombian drug trade and its connection to the United States.

"I've never had writer's block," Panek-Coffey said. "I just sit down, and it just keeps coming."

Panek-Coffey is working on two other books that are heavy in both violence and psychological conflict.

Delmar Publishers printed Panek-Coffey's most recent work, which has given her recognition in the Capital District and western New York as well.

"My friends think the book is great and that I write better than Mary Higgins Clark," said Panek-Coffey, who said "Adventures in Bogota" is selling like "hot cakes" at Borders and The Book House of Stuyvesant Plaza.

"People come in with copies of their book and check with our buyer to see if its something they want to stock," said Susan Taylor, who manages The Book House, which offers many books published by local authors.

Panek-Coffey's book is being read in Rochester and western New York near Elba, where she grew up.

Fortune is not the reason Panek-Coffey is writing; however, fame might be.

"Adventures in Bogota" has reached all the way to Indiana, where Panek-Coffey's son and grandson live.

"There was a store out there who wanted it, so at least I'm being read in Indiana," Panek-Coffey said.

Marine's family accepts Bronze Star

Ceremony honors Shawn Martin, who was killed in action over summer

Dawn Martin described her son Shawn as "living each day to the fullest," and someone "who always jumped in to help."

The 30-year-old former Elsmere firefighter and Marine sergeant, who was killed in Iraq over the summer, was honored Sunday, Nov. 18, in a solemn ceremony at the firehouse he knew so well.

Parents Dawn and Paul Martin accepted the Bronze Star, one of the military's highest awards for heroic achievement, on behalf of their son, with a group of 100 friends, family and firemen looking on.

"Today is about Shawn and how he stepped forward to serve his country," said Maj. Tommy Wright, of the Albany Military Entrance Processing Station, who, along with Martin's fellow Marines Staff Sgt. David C. Carroll and Sgt. Richard Pierone, presented the honor to his family.

Martin, a member of the 13th Marine Expedition Unit Force stationed in Camp Pendleton,

Calif., was in Iraq for just over five weeks when he was killed while conducting combat operations June 20, in Saqlawiyah. Martin and Staff Sgt. Stephen Wilson were conducting a visual sweep of an area where explosive devices were believed hidden. The two men were unable to use mechanical equipment in the rough terrain and had to move close to detonate one device. After inspecting the first blast site, a second device went off, killing both men.

"His zealous initiative and courageous action is keeping in the highest tradition of not only the Marine Corps but the U.S. Selected Service," read Carroll from a letter signed by President George W. Bush and written by Lt. Gen. James N. Mattis, commander of the Major Forces General Command of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Dawn Martin said her son was a "sweet little boy," who was stubborn and headstrong and very proud to be a Marine.

"Once he decided to become a Marine, he was truly driven," she said.

Many friends and past acquaintances of Martin's have contacted the family over the past several months recounting stories of kindness and compassion they never knew he was a part of. One such story came from a Bethlehem resident who used to receive the daily newspaper delivered by Shawn when he was a

boy. He said Shawn always shoveled the walk on snowy days and always left the paper inside the door.

"He believed you can all be heroes; you don't have to be on the battlefield to do it," said Dawn Martin.

Martin grew up in Bethlehem and was a 1995 graduate of Bethlehem Central High School, where he also played football. He followed in his father and grandfather's footsteps after high school and joined the Elsmere Fire Company, where he served for several years before heading off to join the Marines and leaving for Camp Pendleton.

"We bless his family who feels the pain of his loss more than anyone else," said the Rev. James Daley, Elsmere firehouse chaplain.

Rebecca Hoffman, president of the Capital District Gold Star Mothers, presented Dawn Martin with a Gold Star banner as a display of support for the loss of her son.

Martin is at least the third Bethlehem native killed in Iraq since the conflict began. Army Sgt. Thomas D. Robbins was killed in action in 2004 and Army Capt. Timothy Moshier died in 2006 when the Apache Helicopter he was piloting crashed outside of Baghdad.

Martin's wife, Marianne, was unable to attend the ceremony. She lives in Herkimer County where another Bronze Star ceremony for Martin will be





Residents hope to get water for homes

About 30 residents of Normanskill and Wormer roads were in full force at the New Scotland Town Board meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 14, demanding public water.

Addressed at the meeting was Albany County's beginning work in the design of County Route 203, for the Normanskill and Johnston Roads Reconstruction Project, rehabilitating the road with sidewalks, widening shoulders and travel lanes, renewing the road surface and reconstructing the drainage system.

Among the Normanskill Road residents at the meeting were Michael and Barbara Scher. Barbara Scher read a petition to the town board asking for help with their water problem.

"A fair number of residents living in the Normanskill/Wormer roads area expressed their desire for water sources to be sought and acted upon at the same time that all the facets of the above project are accomplished," Scher said. "Families in this location have a great need for an adequate and proper water supply for their usage."

Scher said that many residents along Normanskill and Wormer roads have been living in homes that are between 20 and 70 years old with obsolete water wells, the repairs on which individuals must pay when they break down.

"We are concerned that our water sources are substandard."

"None of us know when our current system will break down or whether our water supply will be depleted," Scher said. "We are concerned that our water sources are substandard."

New Scotland Supervisor Ed Clark said the town is always denied rural development grants because it lacks economic need.

Clark said half the homes in New Scotland don't have a public water supply.

"We cannot speculate on future growth," Town Engineer Keith Menia said.

Scher said that Albany County Executive Michael Breslin wrote to Guiderland Town Supervisor Kenneth D. Runion Jr. that if New Scotland and Guiderland might design and fund the construction of new water lines, the county would include this in the project specifications.

Scher compared an intermunicipal project between Guiderland and New Scotland with one in nearby Fort Edward, Washington County, when that village arranged for its water line to be installed at the same time as a state Department of Transportation reconstruction project.

"This is done all the time," she said.

The town board promised to assess the fundability of the project and in the meantime asked for \$500 of seed money from each affected family to be placed in an escrow account.

A public meeting has been called for by Albany County Executive Michael Breslin's office seeking input for the Normanskill and Johnston Roads Highway Rehabilitation project, which is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 29, at 6:30 p.m. at the Westmere Elementary School's gymnasium.



Getting into character for Christmas

At the Delmar Reformed Church, where I serve as senior pastor, our Advent services this year will focus on "The Characters of Christmas." It will be quite a stretch for me, because I am going to try to "get into character" – that is, each Sunday I will present a first-person narrative of one of the key players in the Christmas drama. For example, I will try to make it seem as if one of the shepherds is actually speaking and sharing with the congregation what he experienced on that mysterious night when the savior Jesus Christ was born.

Even as I write this, I feel my anxiety level rise. This is way beyond my comfort zone. I am not an actor; I have never even aspired to be one. I can preach a sermon gladly. But play the part of a wise man? What was I thinking when I decided to try this? Did I even consider for a moment how silly I'd look dressed up like a shepherd? At the time I planned to do this it seemed like a great idea. I liked the fact that it would be a different take on the usual Advent sermons I preach. It sounded like an interesting challenge – "outside the box," as they say. But now as Advent looms closer, I feel so outside the box that I can't even see it any more! This is not what I typically do. I find myself suddenly caught up in the unusual. And that can be scary.

As I think about those key players in the Christmas narrative and imagine each of them telling their story, I hear them all sharing a common theme. For each of them, Christ's birth represents a major interruption. A break from the usual. Each of them traveled

literally and figuratively outside the boxes of their everyday routines and experienced something extraordinary.

Mary, Jesus' mother, and Joseph, the man who helped raise him, thought their wedding was going to be a typical one, following what was expected to be a long and uneventful engagement. Not so, said an angel. Pardon the interruption, but God has something else in store for you.

Shepherds were sleepily watching their flocks as they did every night, only to be jolted by an angelic chorus of incredible news. Pardon the interruption, the angels said, but we wanted you to know your savior is born! Leaving their routines, the shepherds went to experience the unique event of their lives. I wonder: as they awoke that day, could those shepherds even have imagined that they would travel later that night to a manger?

The wise men were observing the normal movement of heavenly bodies across the sky, when suddenly there was a break from the usual. A star unlike anything they had seen before led them away from their native land to a far away little town of Bethlehem. Pardon the interruption, the heavens seemed to say to them; there is an unplanned trip west for you to take. A trip to something you have never seen before.

It can be daunting when our lives are interrupted by the unexpected. Taking an unplanned trip to a far away manger is no easy task. We typically do not welcome the unusual; it's too daunting. No wonder the angels kept saying, "Fear not!" Don't be afraid, they said; the unexpected can be really quite wonderful!

Each year Christmas comes like an interruption. It breaks up our routines. We live differently during this holiday. The drudgery of work is broken up by office parties. We decorate our homes and trim our trees. For non-shoppers like me, it's apt to be the only time of the year you'll find us in a shopping mall. Radio stations set aside their "usual" music and play non-stop holiday music. Even armies at war have been known to lay down their arms on Christmas and give peace a try for a day. It is a season that is meant to be unusual, atypical of the rest of the year.

Or is it? Experiencing one Christmas after the other can make the holiday too familiar. A Christmas "routine" can settle in and get stuck in our lives. It can become the same thing each and every Christmas – same old patterns, same old customs. You know the routine: We fill our calendars with Christmas events; there's so much to do! Buy the presents;

go to the parties, buy some more presents, attend the kids' programs, buy even more presents. Don't forget to put up the lights, bake the cookies, mail the cards, tip the paperboy; oh, and are there more presents to buy?

After a while, the profound uniqueness of Christmas gets lost in the frantic routine that repeated year after year. I actually hear people say they dread the coming holiday! It's something they endure rather than joyfully celebrate. They know what's coming and they dread what they will have to do to make all happen.

Christmas feels to me like a pretty entrenched and predictable event rather than the joyful surprise it is meant to be. It's an interruption, all right, but one that we expect and welcome. And we don't always welcome it.

How might we experience Christmas a little different this year? What could we do to break its routine and actually be surprised by the joy of "Emmanuel" – which means "God is with us"? Each family would have to answer that in their own special way, for there are routines and family customs that are special, even if we repeat them year after year. But it would be a good exercise to at least once a year, we might travel like the characters did that first Christmas night, out of the ordinary and into the manger, where there is a most amazing surprise waiting for us?

For some it might mean volunteering as a family to one of the homeless shelters or food pantries. Other households could decide to cap their spending frenzy for too many presents and instead give to a charitable cause. An office staff might decide to refrain from giving each other presents at the annual Christmas party, and instead help a local family in need. It would make Christmas "something different" this year, an interruption of the usual Christmas routines we come to expect. That seems to me to be more like the genuine "spirit" of Christmas, which was, after all, God's major interruption of life as usual.

Scary? Well, remember what the angels kept saying over and over again: "Fear not!"

How can we, as Magi did, set aside our plans and "ponder these things in our hearts," that is, actually slow down instead of getting busy and really ponder its goodness? How can we break away from our daily routine as the shepherds did and "and see this thing God has done," that is, really see it as a fresh and exciting new light? Can we take time out of the overbooked season and follow the star to the manger where we, with the Magi, can worship him – really worship him – our newborn king?

I would like to thank the 834 people in Albany County's 34th legislative District, a number of them Democrats, who rejected "same old, same old," and voted to start the revolution in New York for downtrodden and overtaxed ordinary citizens. Statements to me such as, "God bless you," and "I was praying for someone like you to come along," regarding my candidacy and hugs from strangers kept me going as the energizer Bunny, broken rib and all.

Remember that the reason why things are the way they are in this state is because there are those who want it to be that way because they benefit from the status quo. Ordinary New Yorkers face large economic challenges in the future: pressure on private-sector real wage growth caused

by world industrialization, higher commodity prices and an aging population, to name a few.

The revolution will only happen when you choose to make it happen. At a minimum, that will take elected officials who make policy decisions based on what helps the citizenry instead of what helps their re-election, the provision of information instead of obfuscation to citizens to create informed voters and the voters' rejection of the tribalism of party politics. Today's dreams, tomorrow's city

Young engineers use nanotech principles to compete in Future Cities

The seventh annual Future Cities Competition is under way, and this year, the competition, with the topic of nanotechnology and infrastructure monitoring, is being sponsored locally by the College of Nanoscale Science and Engineering of the University of Albany.

The proximity to this leader in the nanotechnology field could give Capital District competitors an edge.

"We are very fortunate to have the leading nanotechnology facility in the world located right here in the Capital District. The tutorial program planned by CNSE will provide the program's participants with a unique hands-on experience with the possibilities of nanotechnology," Jennifer Smith, Future City's regional coordinator said.

Each year, there is a new topic in the engineering field that students must tackle. In light of the bridge that collapsed recently in Minnesota, this year's focus is on monitoring a city's infrastructure using nanotechnology.

Participants first have to do research on their topic, then design a city using the computer program SimCity, write an essay describing their design and finally present their findings in competition at the close of the contest -- not an easy task for any seventh or eighth grader. Each team is granted a coach, usually a teacher or member of the school community, and an engineering mentor.

The coach for the Shenendehowa Middle School team is technology teacher Paul Whitley, who spent 35 years with GE prior to becoming a teacher. He said that it's his interest and past that drew him to the competition, but the kids are the key.

"These kids are the best of the best. They have strong math backgrounds, either in advanced math or doing very well in their regular math classes," he said.

Members of the Shen team, Tommy Trahn, Tejas Roysam, Bilal Salam and Timothy Saia, recently discussed their involvement and work on the project so far and what they expect in the coming months.

Trahn is following in family footsteps with this competition.

"My dad is an engineer, and my sister did this competition before," he said.

Roysam also comes from an engineering family.

Saia and Salam, although

not genetically inclined, have dedicated themselves to their team. Saia doing a lot of the research, and Salam working with Whitley to define their parameters and what an "infrastructure" actually was.

So far, team members said they are having fun working on the project.

The next piece of the project, an essay describing their city design, is due Dec. 11. The actual competition will take place Jan. 19 at Hudson Valley Community College at 8 a.m.







BCHS' first graduating class signs back on to campus

Contributes money toward lighted sign in front of high school

In 1954, when the seniors became the first class to graduate from the district's new high school, there was no sign on Delaware Avenue letting passersby know that the building there was, in fact, Bethlehem Central High School.

So, when the class gathered for its 50th reunion, it was fitting that the collection taken for a gift to the district went toward a high school sign on Delaware Avenue to complement the most extensive renovation in the school's 50 year history.

Thanks to the efforts of the Class of 1954, the Bethlehem Central Community Organization and the BCCHS Student Senate, when BCCHS opened its doors in September 2007, that lighted sign was in operation ready to inform everyone who passes by about school news, announcements and events such as games, concerts and achievements.

"It's beautiful," said Anita Umholtz, the chair of the Class of 1954 Reunion Committee who drives by the high school twice a day. Umholtz had a picture of the sign made into notepaper, which she uses to correspond with her classmates.

"Everyone was shocked when I sent them the thank-you note,"

she said.

In the early days of the districtwide building project that voters approved in 2003, the Bethlehem Central Community Organization (BCCHS' parent group) began thinking about erecting a sign outside the high school to complement the dramatic building improvements that were underway. At that time, the Class of 1954 was about to hold its 50th reunion, and was looking for a way to use the collection it would take up at the gathering.

Fred Eckel, a Class of 1954 member who was also involved in the BCCO, raised the idea of contributing toward the sign project, and class members agreed. The Student Senate also decided to contribute to the effort.

The combined contributions from the three organizations covered the cost of the sign, while the district covered its installation.

"The sign will help to unite the student body with the community, informing it of upcoming games and performances," said Benjamin Finkle, BCCHS Student Senate president at the time and now a Cornell student. "As the town continues to grow, it is important that we continue to nurture this

New recycling efforts sweep through state

Two new recycling efforts are taking place in communities across New York, including Delmar.

Schools and other community groups are being challenged to start collecting used yogurt containers and used drink pouches as part of a statewide program that allows schools to fundraise while teaching their students about recycling and the environment.

Schools and other community groups can sign up for free, pay no shipping costs, and will earn one cent for every drink pouch or two cents for Honest Kids Drink Pouches.

In the "Yogurt Brigade," schools will earn two cents for six-ounce yogurt containers, and five cents for 32-ounce yogurt containers. All yogurt containers must be cleaned. To sign up visit: www.terracycle.net/brigades


According to the Container Recycling Institute, 3.6 billion drink pouches are produced each year. Because the material used to make these pouches is non-recyclable, virtually every single one is sent to a landfill.

Similarly, more than 10 billion yogurt containers are consumed a year in America.


A study by the Center for Sustainable Systems determined that Polypropylene Plastic No. 5 was the most environmentally preferable choice of plastics available. Stonyfield Farm yogurt uses this plastic, because it allows for the cups to use a minimal amount of plastic. However, since many recycling centers are not equipped to handle #5 cups, Stonyfield Farm has teamed with TerraCycle to save these containers from the landfill.

To help combat this huge loss of resources, TerraCycle has teamed with Honest Tea and Stonyfield Farms to create two programs called the Drink Pouch Brigade and the Yogurt Brigade. These programs allow schools, houses of worship, and other community groups to collect these previously non-recyclable or hard-to-recycle items in return for cash.





Five Rivers development back on table

Phillipin Kill Manor proposal calls for 94 homes on 129-acre parcel

A local developer is reviving the 11-year-old Phillipin Kill Manor project proposed for Fisher Boulevard and Orchard Street near Five Rivers.

Attorney Donald Zee and Richard Tice of Brewer Engineering presented the new concept at a Tuesday, Nov. 20, meeting of the town planning board that calls for 94 homes to be built along a 129-acre parcel of land that will now include estate lot single-family homes, traditional single-family homes and attached homes.

"The modified plan complies with the town's comprehensive plan," Zee said.

Six single-family homes are being proposed on 2.5- and 3.5-acre lots with frontage on Orchard Street. Fifty-six single-family homes are planned with an additional 32 twin homes. Along with the housing development is a plan to donate 5 acres of land to Five Rivers.

The Phillipin Kill project dates back to 1996 when de-

veloper William Cade first proposed 42 lots to be carved out of 23 acres of land. Many residents at that time expressed concern about wetland impact, asking for a detailed analysis. The developer then changed the scope of the plan to 130 single-family homes, before reducing the project to 109 homes in 2003.

Several nearby homeowners came out again last week to hear how the new plan has changed since the project sat dormant, while the town hammered out its comprehensive plan.

"I'm a Cedar Ridge resident, and we do have a neighborhood group who are following this development," said Tom Davidson, who was among 10 nearby homeowners who attended the meeting.

Because of the residents' past concerns over the Phillipin Kill Manor proposal, assistant economic developer Mike Morelli suggested a public in-

formation meeting be held by the developers.

"I think we have had an opportunity to hear what residents have had to say with all these meetings since 1990," Zee responded, adding that the project has had a wetlands study, traffic and archeological study, along with a soil study.

Planning board chairman Parker Mathusa reinforced the idea of a public meeting for the residents.

"It's your decision, and we respect that, but it may be worthwhile to have a meeting at some point," said Mathusa.

Tice said project managers have been working with residents to resolve any past issues and will continue to do so as the project progresses.

"We would love to work with the neighbors to make sure they are somewhat satisfied," said Tice.

Prices for homes in the development will start at \$300,000. Tice compared parts of the Phillipin Kill project to the Walden Field development in Feura Bush. The planning board will wait to hear back from the Army Corp of Engineers on any changes to the acreage's wetlands. An updated traffic study will also be performed.

part-time serving residents in the dining room.

"Jackie was a fabulous employee," said Donna Sickler, executive director of Delmar Place. "She had a fun, gentle way about her and she really epitomized living life to its fullest. We are deeply saddened by the loss to our residents."

School officials called Gould a real "success story" and someone who was able to complete his GED exam through his determination and hard work.

"He loved art and had a special ability as an artist," said Loomis. "He was always straightforward and respectful to everyone around him."

Gould loved music and art and was almost never without his very close friend, McHugh.

The high school crisis intervention team is being made available to students in need of support. Bethlehem police Lt. Thomas Heffernan said both McHugh and Gould, the front seat passengers, were wearing seat belts at the time of the ac-

cident. Officials could not determine if Wood was wearing his. Toxicology reports will not be back for several weeks.

"The accident reconstruction could take several days to determine if there were other contributing factors," said Heffernan.

Meads Lane, a long country road where sheep and cows graze in open meadows on farms that stretch out towards the peaceful hills beyond, was closed to traffic for several hours after the accident.

Gould is survived by his mother, Cindy, father Keith, twin sisters Katie and Aimee, his sister Alicia and his younger brother Jacob, grandparents and extended family.

McHugh is survived by her parents, Bernie and Kim McHugh, a brother, Brendan, a sister, Heather, and grandparents.

Funeral arrangements for both McHugh and Gould will be conducted by The Applebee Funeral Home of Delmar. AServices for McHugh were held at St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Delmar on Tuesday. A funeral for Gould is scheduled for Wednesday, November 28.

Stars Intergen Corp. receives grants

Stars Intergen Corp., a non-profit organization based in Glenmont, recently received two grants through the Community Foundation for the Capital Region to support intergenerational programming that benefits retirees in the Towns of Bethlehem and Coeymans and students in the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District.

The E. Eileen Rea Fund donated \$1,000 to support the Seniors Teaching and Reaching Out to Students (STARS) program, which recruits local retirees to tutor students at the A.W. Becker Elementary School in Selkirk or the P.B. Coeymans Elementary School in Coeymans. STARS volunteers work directly in the classroom setting where they give children individualized attention and support to help them master reading and other academic subjects. Schedules are flexible depending on the volunteer's availability and a \$5 hourly sti-





Tried and true: Avon sales

One of the longest running self-employment gigs is selling Avon, a job that's become a bit of Americana, bringing a vision of a doorbell-ringing cosmetic maven applying products on her friends.

But Denise Leader of Niskayuna has proved being an Avon rep is a serious job that challenges all her strengths, and in return, brings in a solid income.

Leader has been a rep for more than 20 years, starting when her children were young and she needed a non-traditional workday.

"It has fit into my schedule extremely well because I set my own hours," said Leader. "When my kids were small, I planned my work around their nap schedules, school vacations and snow days. You just have to make sure the work is done the next day to catch up."

Leader said she even employed her children as co-workers, giving them a nickel for every Avon catalog they helped hang from mailboxes in local neighborhoods.

Discipline, structure, and most of all, organization, are the prerequisites for a successful home-based business.

"You have to set up a separate place to work, otherwise it can take over your whole house," said Leader. "You lose an order slip or an invoice, and it will take a long time to recreate it."

Besides flexible hours, her work requires different tasks every day, from making deliveries to canvassing for new clients.

"I never do the same thing every day," said Leader. "I could never report to a desk and have a boss looking over my work. I like the freedom."

Along with being highly motivated, as a self-employed sales person, Leader has to plan ahead for a salary that's a bit of a roller coaster.

"The money does vary, and there is no regular paycheck," said Leader, who sold the highest volume in her district this year. "During the holidays, sales go way up, but it's slow over the summer. You couldn't depend on this if you were a sole provider."

But the added income has allowed Leader to take the family on vacations, make her own car payments, and pay for a travel trailer.

"This is the life for me," said Leader.

Taking the job on the road

As the spouse of a Navy officer, Joanne McFadden sought a career that she could accomplish from home, wherever her home was located. Proving that patience and determination are the two key elements in being self-employed, McFadden took a class on how to survive as a freelance writer, even though her resume didn't include published clips.

"I wrote an article in college, but despite my lack of experience, when we moved to Hawaii, I wrote an article on the 50th anniversary of Pearl Harbor as a volunteer," said McFadden, who now lives in Charlton. "It was a slow start, to say the least."

McFadden began the laborious task of sending out query letters looking for work.

"You absolutely have to be persistent; it's a very difficult market to break into," said McFadden. "Even if you have a family, you live by your deadlines. You need to meet every deadline or you won't work for that client again. This isn't a hobby you take lightly."

After the family moved to Virginia, McFadden looked for work as aggressively as another person would job hunt for a traditional office position.

"I had to network, so I told everyone I was a writer," said McFadden. "One of the moms in my kid's play group knew about a newspaper that needed stringers, so I pursued that vigorously."

McFadden now writes for various publications in the local area, and keeps her home office scrupulously organized.

"I have a study where I can shut the door and a huge desk with tons of folders and colored tabs," said McFadden. "There are the tax write-offs for using your home, but on the flip side, there aren't taxes taken out of what you earn, and I've had to

set aside \$46 out of every \$100 I make."

McFadden has also had to set up her own 401K retirement account. Her kids are teenagers, and she has now found a new calling for her future career.

"I'm going to graduate school for the ministry," said McFadden. "It's a real shift, but I've written about so many topics and met so many people; I wouldn't have changed a thing."

Designing her own business

After studying graphic design and earning a BFA from Alfred University, Christianne Smith took New York City by storm, working as a senior designer for heavy hitters in the graphic design game. She developed campaigns for Lincoln Center, Alvin Ailey Dance Company, Mobil Oil and the International Society for Performing Arts. In 2000, Smith returned to the local area and hung out her own shingle in Ballston Lake, opening Designsmith Studio, working with clients ranging from Skidmore College to Proctors. Her innate talents and hard work have paid off; last week she was named the Best of Albany graphic designer by *Metroland* newspaper.

Smith said being your own boss means always having to live up to your own high expectations. "I am a perfectionist, and I know I'm a workaholic, but I never forget the fact that everything I finish has my name on it, and all my work is by word-of-mouth," said Smith. "You can't let one single project slide. I don't stop working until my clients are at least 100 percent satisfied." Smith has been known to work through the night, but in general works 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. "The beauty of working for myself is that if I want to, I can work 7 p.m. to 7 a.m.," said Smith. "It's all about managing your time. If I want to go to the gym in the middle of the day, I can." The one drawback about solo work is that it can be isolating, particularly for gregarious people.

"As a one-person studio, there's no physical interaction; it's mostly by telephone," said Smith. "I miss the camaraderie of yelling over the cubicle about a funny e-mail or joining officemates for lunch. But it's worth it to never have to punch a clock, or take a sick day to take the dog to the vet. I know for certain I could never go to work at a desk job now." Being the CEO of a company, regardless of its size, means handling every aspect, includ-

ing the less creative business of book keeping and paperwork. "Billing and archiving jobs are my least favorite things about owning the studio," said Smith. "But in return, I don't have a job where I don't want to start the day. I love what I do, and I think that energy is evident to my clients and in my work. The clients I have are fun and exciting and definitely make my job rewarding; I have many clients who have become amazing friends. I guess it's the personal nature of a smaller studio - understanding and listening to their needs, that ultimately creates a bond of respect and admiration. It's a great challenge to help them get their name out there, whether they're an international company, or someone just starting out."

Doing my home work

Reporter's Notebook



For the better part of 15 years, I worked as a freelance reporter and copy writer from my home. Writers are innately solitary souls, but working at home brought the demands on my time to a frenetic warp speed because there was never a day that I turned off my work mode and became a parent again. I did both at all times. It was like being in the eye of a tornado with paperwork, meeting agendas, nap time, sick kids, bored kids, all jumbled together and funneled through small cracks under my front door. In other words, it was challenging.

Until my three kids hopped on that big yellow school bus, they were my co-workers, but while my job entailed research, interviewing and writing on deadline, their work duties consisted of throwing around Legos, refusing to tie their own shoes, poking each other in the eyes, and wailing for macaroni and cheese. Children were by far the biggest occupational hazard of all. More times than I can count, I took phone calls from inside a closet, doled out lollipops to keep my sons from hollering, and told people on the phone, "My kids

are home sick today." In actuality, they were home every day because they were 4 years old.

You need a sense of humor and an ability to function in organized chaos to work from home. I rarely lost a sheet of notes, but chances were good it was next to a pile of socks waiting to be sorted, a half-eaten bag of Gummi Bears, and a wad of paper towels soaked with something vaguely purple.

There were grim days. My son Ryan once stood on his tip-toes to turn off my computer before the new technology of auto-restoring lost documents. Another day Ryan and his brother Nick were quiet for about 15 minutes as I dashed off a press release, but when I went downstairs, they had emptied out the fireplace with their soot-covered fists. The ashes covered everything from the carpet to their heads with a fine dust that took weeks to clean up.

I still feel guilty about the amount of preschool television they watched, and the number of times I said, "I'll be right there, just give me one more minute," and then ignored them for an

hour. There were many days we all stayed in our pajamas. I had very little grown-up conversation, since most of the people I called for interviews didn't have time to discuss who was voted off "Survivor." I didn't "do lunch," unless you count Chef Boyardee.


But I was there in person for all the early years of all my kids' lives; they slept at my feet with a pillow under my desk while I worked, waited up for me to get home from nighttime meetings, and, most importantly, they saw firsthand what it was like to be a happy mom and a successful writer.

In third grade, Sasha made a papier mâché bird with newspaper that had my articles in it.

"Your name is inside this bird forever," she told me.

Time has swallowed the years, and the kids are gone all day. Sasha starts college next year. I still do a good amount of work from my laptop at my dining room table, and now a small dog is my office mate. She stands at my feet with her favorite chew toy, a winter glove, and yips at me until I stop working to wrestle it from her paws.

"I want a job I like as much as you like yours," Nickolas told me recently. "And I want to wear slippers all day instead of shoes."



Lady Eagles enter season as league favorites

The days when the Bethlehem girls basketball team could sneak up on opponents are officially over.

With most of last year's Section II, Class AA semifinalist squad intact, the Lady Eagles are a preseason favorite to win the Suburban Council and Sectional titles.

"The girls worked very hard, so I'm happy they're getting some recognition for that hard work," said Bethlehem coach Mark Nealon.

Whether the Lady Eagles can live up to those lofty expectations depends on how they handle their

role as favorites. They haven't been in this position since they won the 2003 Section II, Class A championship, when many of the current varsity players were still in middle school.

"We have to work harder because other teams are looking at us and wanting to raise their level of play when they face us," said Nealon.

Like the 2003 team, the 2007 Bethlehem Lady Eagles has a group of talented veterans to rely on led by forward Alex McCullough and guards Kiersten Swete and Meg Olsen. McCullough was Bethlehem's leading scorer last year, while Swete and Olsen helped out on the perimeter.

"Last year, we had balance (in scoring), and we should have more balance this year," said Nealon. "We have two good post players (McCullough and Sarah Thompson) who should open things up for our outside shooters."

Defensively, Bethlehem will be as tenacious as ever in pursuing the ball and forcing turnovers.

"The one nice thing about them is they know each other very well from other sports, and they know they have to work hard (defensively) because they don't want to let each other down," said Nealon.

The Lady Eagles will have to


be relentless defensively if they want to win the league title. Even though the Suburban Council isn't as strong as it was last year due to the graduation of numerous seniors including Colonie's top nine players, the other 11 teams are also well schooled in playing tough defense. Still, last year's trip to the Sectional semifinals gives Bethlehem some confidence.

"These girls got a chance to experience winning last year," said Nealon. "We're still young compared to other teams. We have a group of juniors who were only sophomores (when they played) last year, so they got some valuable experience."

Bethlehem will test itself right away by hosting its annual Tip-off Tournament Friday and Saturday. The Lady Eagles meet the defending Sectional champion Colonie Garnet Raiders Friday and Big 10 power Catholic Central Saturday. Guilderland — last year's Sectional runners-up — is also in the field for the round-robin tournament.

"Colonie is not one of the predicted upper-tier teams, but they're going to be tough," said Nealon.

The Bethlehem boys basketball team is also in action this weekend, as it plays in the Niskayuna Invitational Tournament.



accentuates the fact.

Using 1,000 as a figure isn't just a number I pulled out of the air, either. I honestly believe that will be the average attendance for an indoor soccer team in Albany. This region may be rich in soccer talent, but it's not a region that will go see professional soccer games, either indoors or outdoors. Look at the list of failed soccer franchises in this region — the Albany Alleycats, the Albany Capitals and the New York Kick just to name three in the last 20 years. Not a good track record.

Of course, one of the nice things about indoor soccer is that the scores are much higher than in the outdoor game. Most MISL games have scores like 12-10, 16-12 and 20-18, but those scores are deceptive because each goal is worth two points, and there's a three-point arc. Still, you're guaranteed more goals than a typical outdoor game.

The boards are also a nice addition to soccer games. Now a shot that goes wide of the net caroms off the back boards instead of sailing out of play. A goaltender can never take his eyes off the action in an indoor game because a missed shot can quickly turn into another shot.


But all of the increased action and scoring in the indoor soccer game won't mean a thing if the casual Capital District sports fan sees a MISL team in the Washington Avenue Armory as nothing

more than a joke. To that end, if Jim Coyne is able to convince the MISL to put an expansion team here, he's also going to have to convince area sports fans to come out and see the team play.

That won't be easy, especially since selling people on coming to the Armory for a sporting event these days is harder than back in the heyday of the Albany Patroons two decades ago. And people were flocking to the Armory back then despite how cold and uncomfortable it was.

The Armory is hardly as bad now as it was in the 1980s, with padded seats replacing the metal chairs and better lighting and heating systems. But it's still difficult to imagine the ancient castle-like building as an indoor soccer venue.



Eagles win Thanksgiving tourney

Dolfi's OT goal lifts Bethlehem past North Rockland

The Bethlehem hockey team showed its resiliency in Saturday's Thanksgiving Tournament championship game against North Rockland.

Tom Dolfi's overtime goal helped the Eagles defeat the Raiders 6-5 at the Bethlehem Area YMCA.

Bethlehem (2-0) overcame a 4-2 deficit in the second period to take a 5-4 lead, only to have that erased on Craig Meany's second goal of the game early in the third period. Then in overtime, the Eagles withstood some offensive pressure from North Rockland during a Raider power play before Dolfi tallied the game-winning goal.

"We showed a lot of heart and character as a team," said Bethlehem coach Dick Hughes. "We're working really hard to become a team."

Sean O'Connor put Bethlehem in a hole in the first period. The senior forward tallied 42 seconds

into the game off a pass from Meany and scored again less than five minutes later to give North

Rockland (1-1) a 2-0 lead.

Matt Bub gave Bethlehem fans something to cheer about with

a goal at 7:51 of the first period, but O'Connor – who was named the tournament's most valuable

player – struck again less than three minutes later to give North Rockland a 3-1 lead heading into the first intermission.



Hughes saw enough out of O'Connor in the first period to make a tactical change. Whenever O'Connor was on the ice, a Bethlehem defender was near him. That was enough to keep O'Connor from getting on the score sheet again.

"Once I got into the fact that this kid was the only one who was scoring for them, I took one kid each shift and had him shadow him," Hughes said.

Bethlehem still had to dig itself out of a two-goal deficit – a process that took the better part of the second period. Dolfi opened the scoring 23 seconds into the period with a shot in traffic, but Meany tallied on a power play to give North Rockland a 4-2 lead. That didn't last long, though, as Tony Weeks and Stephen Russo scored during a 1:35 span to tie the game at 4. Eric Halek then scored with 3:18 left in the second period to put Bethlehem ahead 5-4.

Meany tied the game 4:18 into the third period when he stuffed home a rebound, but that was the last good scoring

Soccer at Armory doesn't seem right

Sometimes you see a small blurb in a newspaper that makes you wonder if somebody has lost his or her mind.

Such was the case Sunday when I read in the *Times Union* that the Major Indoor Soccer League is talking with Jim Coyne about bringing a franchise to Albany. More specifically to the Washington Avenue Armory.

Huh?

It's not that I object to the MISL trying the Albany sports market. I'm all for any second-tier sports league that wants to plop an expansion team in the Capital District, as long as they understand what they're getting into – namely, a region that follows the professional teams in New York City, Boston and Buffalo more closely than the professional teams we have here.

The part I'm having a hard time digesting is that the MISL would consider having an expansion team play its home games in the Washington Avenue Armory, a facility that isn't designed for indoor soccer despite being redesigned three years ago.

Certainly, the 4,000-seat Armory doesn't fit the model of the other arenas in the nine-team MISL. Teams such as the Philadelphia Kixx, the Orlando Sharks and the Milwaukee Wave (great nicknames, huh?) play their home games in large, multi-purpose arenas. The Armory isn't large, and it isn't multi-purpose.



It has a removable basketball court over a wooden floor. No sideboards for indoor soccer, indoor football or indoor lacrosse built in.

Now I suppose sideboards and an artificial surface can be brought in, but how weird is that going to look inside the Armory? Casual Capital District sports fans know it as a basketball venue only thanks to the CBA's Albany Patroons. It's going to take some convincing to get people to buy into the concept of the Armory as an indoor soccer venue, even though there was a brief period in the 1990s when it was used as an indoor soccer venue for youth teams.

Still, I suppose there is an advantage to putting a MISL team in the Armory. If a crowd of 1,000 shows up for a home game, it won't look nearly as bad in the Armory as it would in the 14,000-seat Times Union Center. You'd still see a sea of empty seats, but there wouldn't be any tarps covering entire sections of the building. Believe me when I say that tarps can't mask the fact that there are empty seats. It just
