Senior care organizations urge families to have 'the talk' before it's too late

Half, if not more, of a person's life is directed by parental guidance, good or bad.

Don't put your finger in there; don't date that person; do what makes you happy; and stay clear of variable rate mortgages.

Now as baby boomers reach retirement age, they are finding their roles shifting, from dispensing the advice to taking it from their children.

Senior care providers and organizations that support senior caregivers are calling it the "40-70 Rule."

Stated simply, it's the time when 40-something children and 70-something parents sit down to discuss care options as they look to a future when parents will rely on their children's care and commitment to fulfill their final wishes. According to senior care providers, it is a conversation many people are not comfortable having.

"Initially, for some people it might be uncomfortable, but it's something that should happen. If these conversations were happening earlier, children may already know what their parents want," said Susan Walter, owner of the local Home Instead Senior Care franchise.

For 2008, the multinational

organization is pushing for children to sit down with parents and have those conversations. The need for dialogue is as great as ever as the country's senior population becomes one of the fastest growing demographics.

Town braces for the big 4-0-0

Quadricentennial events to celebrate early explorers and inventor

Nearly 400 years ago, two men made history on a winding river that has given life and distinction to the area we call home. The river was named after one of them; a lake to the north was named after the other.

And then, 200 years later, a new generation of explorers set sail on the same majestic river led by a man's invention, except not with the guidance of wind, but with the power of steam.

The historical nuances of Henry Hudson, Samuel de Champlain and Robert Fulton are well known to residents of the Hudson Valley and beyond. However, 2009 will be the year that New York and other neighboring states hold events in honor of these three men.

"We've been working on this for over a year," said Town of Bethlehem Historian Susan Leath. "We are very excited to commemorate Henry Hudson's September 1609

arrival in what was to become the town of Bethlehem."

Bethlehem will be a part of this historic quadricentennial celebration, with many events and plans currently in the works.

The Bethlehem Quadricentennial Planning Committee was formed last spring to help prepare for the commemoration. Albany County Legislator Tom Cotrofeld, a Democrat who represents the 34th District encompassing parts of Delmar, Elsmere and Slingerlands, chairs the committee.

Cotrofeld replaced current town Supervisor Jack Cunningham in the county legislature when Cunningham took office in Bethlehem.

The rest of the committee consists of representatives from the Bethlehem Historical Society, Bethlehem Public Library, Bethlehem Central School District, Historic Cherry Hill, First Reformed Church of Bethlehem, Delmar Reformed Church, Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce, The Mansion at Cedar Hill, and Leath.

The year 2009 commemorates the 400th anniversary of Hudson's and Champlain's voyages and the 200th anniversary of Fulton's suc-

Bethlehem Central budget talks continue

Having several budget workshops held by the Citizens Budget Group, the Bethlehem Board of Education is beginning work on its tentative 2008-2009 school budget.

This year's budget process began earlier than in the past, with the Citizens Budget Group starting work back on Jan. 22. Board of Education President James Lytle said the early start has been beneficial to the district.

"We are grateful for the Citizens Budget Group's valuable input into the process thus far, giving us a head-start on 2008-09 budget development," Lytle said in a release. "The group enhances the district's steadfast commitment to an open, transparent budget process inclusive of the community."

District Superintendent Dr. Leslie G. Loomis said the process is going well and that the head start has enabled the citizens group to ask some worthwhile questions during a year when a new elementary building is slated to open.

He added that the district will not have to hire additional teachers to open the new school, but that positions such as main office staffing, custodial, and a school nurse and librarian will have to be added to this year's budget.

Eagle Elementary is scheduled to open its doors in the fall.

The board will hold a public meeting on Wednesday, March 5, at the district offices at 90 Adams Place. It will begin at 7 p.m. and feature a presentation on the budget proposal related to operations and maintenance.

Beer found during DWI pat down

Bethlehem Police arrested Craig D. Foy, 34, of Albany, on Feb. 21, for felony DWI and felony operating a vehicle with a blood-alcohol content of 0.08 percent or greater.

He was also charged with reckless driving.

Foy, who had been arrested for DWI in February of 2003, was seen "operating in an erratic manner," on River Road, according to police.

An officer saw Foy "slow down to an almost stop and then when a dark-colored Blazer attempted to pass, [his] vehicle would speed up and not allow the dark Blazer to pass."

The arrest report states that Foy did this several times, causing a back up in traffic.

The driver of the dark Blazer was reporting the incident to 9-1-1 while Bethlehem Police pursued Foy, who was found turning onto Beaver Dam Road.

Police say Foy was stopped on Maple Avenue with a female passenger and that he displayed signs of intoxication when interviewed.

He was asked to exit the vehicle, and during a pat down, police discovered a closed can of Budweiser beer in his coat pocket, according to the report.

Foy told police he had two beers at a friend's house in Albany and that he was driving to another friend's house in Coeymans.

Police say he failed a

field-sobriety test and tested positive for alcohol, and his vehicle was towed.

The report also stated that his female passenger was given a "courtesy transport" to a Stewart's shop on Route 9W.

Police discovered that Foy was wanted on a parole warrant, and Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan sent him to Albany County Correctional Facility on \$10,000 bail.

In other arrests

• Anna D. Groper, 29, of Selkirk, was arrested on Monday, Feb. 26, for DWI, first offense, operating a vehicle with a blood-alcohol content of .08 percent or greater, and

speeding.

Police say they stopped Groper during a routine patrol on Delaware Avenue in Delmar after they saw her driving 50 miles an hour in a 40-mile zone.

An officer followed her vehicle and stopped her near 190 Delaware Ave. after she failed to keep right.

Police smelled alcohol and saw Groper display signs of intoxication when interviewing her, according to the arrest report, and she admitted to drinking "four beers at a club in Albany."

She failed a field-sobriety test and tested positive for alcohol.

Police say her vehicle was towed and she is scheduled to

appear at Bethlehem Justice Court on March 18.

• Jamieann Mabeus-Grant, 18, of Troy, was arrested by Bethlehem Police on Feb. 20 for fourth-degree grand larceny, a felony. Mabeus-Grant turned herself into police custody with her lawyer following an investigation into a stolen credit on Dec. 19.

Police say the credit card was reported missing from New Visions on Krumkill Road and Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan arraigned her.

She is scheduled to reappear in court on March 18, according to the arrest report.

Auto accident leads to DWI and marijuana charges

Dylan K. Wiojiono, 22, of Ravana, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Monday, Feb. 26, and charged with DWI and unlawful possession of marijuana.

Police responded to a property-damage auto accident on Route 144 and Wemple Road in Glenmont and discovered Wiojiono, who told officers "he just lost control of his car."

He admitted to police on the scene that he had "a couple of shots of Southern Comfort" at a bar in Albany prior to driving.

Wiojiono left the roadway and struck an embankment, according to the arrest report, and police smelled alcohol and burned marijuana when interviewing him.

When questioned, Wiojiono

told police, "I smoked a joint at lunch today."

After failing a field-sobriety test, Wiojiono tested positive for alcohol and he was taken to Bethlehem Police Department for processing and his vehicle was towed, the report states.

Police say they discovered a small marijuana cigarette inside of Wiojiono's vehicle.



Peace group: Change is at hand

Delmar resident won't give up her grandchildren for war

Dorothy Richards won't give up her grandchildren

Not for anything, and certainly not for war. She is a member of Grannies for Peace, an offshoot organization of Women Against War.

Their goal: to teach that peace and non-violent solutions are viable options for American diplomacy for their grandchildren's futures. In short, to keep their grandchildren safe.

Peace can be taught, and it can be learned, Richards said. Her first personal experience with the effects of war happened decades ago in Albany, after one of her former classmates didn't come home.

"I graduated from high school right here in Albany. There were a lot of us, and the first Christmas after we graduated we all met. Some of the guys were going into college or getting jobs. ... One of them went into service in 1949," Richards said. "The next time we all met was at a funeral home. In his first encounter in Korea, he was killed."

Aside from knowing people in the Korean War, Richards had several cousins who served in World War II.

And even though her husband, Bill, and other family members have served, she never wanted her children or especially her grandchildren to have to fight in a war.


"My husband used to joke, even though he served in Korea, that he would drive our kids up to Canada himself if they were drafted," Richards said. "Fortunately my children were too young to serve in Vietnam."

Richards, a Delmar resident, has seven children and 12 grandchildren, who are her "gems."

"A grandmother never stops caring, never stops losing sleep and loving our grandchildren," said Richards. "We want to create a world less violent for them so they can raise their children, our great-grandchildren, in it."

Richards said she has seen the effects of war on young people firsthand, in all its forms—physically, emotionally, and mentally.

Working at Beverwyck Retirement Community part-time, she volunteers at Capital Area

Council of Churches, which runs an overflow homeless shelter on State Street in downtown Albany. She also has a daughter who works at the Albany VA Medical Center.

"Their minds are mangled and their bodies broken," Richards said of the soldiers returning from war. "And we don't take care of them when they come back. ... So many suffer from post-traumatic syndrome, drug and alcohol addictions, nightmares, and other issues on top of the physical problems."

Richards said she regularly sees homeless veterans.

Having lived through every war or "police action" since the World War II, Richards said the overriding themes have not changed in today's modern wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Class discrimination still remains, with the underprivileged of American society being sent to war, she said, as well as a lack of proper care once they return.

"They're being used and offered more and more money, and they're not supported when they come back," Richards said, referring to an increasing number of reservists being called to active duty. "We support more funding for those injured."

The group carries around broken hearts to symbolize their heartache.

"We want to let the community see that grandmothers have a stake in peace, too," said Richards. "And to tell our personal stories, which we feel is the most honest and needed to be heard."

Richards said that getting people to speak out is the most important thing, and credits groups like Bethlehem Neighbors for Peace for being so active in the community. She also participates in the Albany Friends Meeting, Quakers, which

has been holding a silent peace vigil every Wednesday afternoon in front of the Capitol since the Vietnam War.

Her group holds frequent rallies and makes their presence known to politicians and lawmakers, including senators Charles Schumer and Hillary Clinton. The group of grannies has even gone to the senators' offices in Albany on occasion to remind them they want their grandchildren back home.

Grannies for Peace organizer Maud Easter describes Richards as an active participant, and says she typifies many in the group.

"She's typical of some of the grannies, working full-time or part-time. Many of them are either retired and semi-retired so they make it to various events and are able to participate," Easter said.

"She's a wonderful woman and grandmother," she said of Richards.

The group meets once a month, and being a grandmother isn't a requirement, said Easter, as long as you are of the "grandmotherly age," and care about the protection of youth. Although she hopes she is not being naive, Richards remains optimistic about the future.

"I think we're at a moment in time that has been given to us," she said. "We don't trust our representatives and we don't trust the media, we don't trust the corporations, but there's something in the air that says we have to change the old and begin thinking new."

But until that happens, Richards remains vigilant knowing she has the love of her grandchildren safely at home.

Early RCS budget shows slight spike

School officials praise numbers; still plan tech upgrades

Figures from a preliminary proposed budget at Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School district show a projected spending increase of 1.9 percent for next year.

Out of a nearly \$41.9 million budget, the proposed spending plan would be an \$854,132 increase over this year's. School officials said it is too early to determine how the 1.9 percent increase would impact school taxes because there are no state aid figures available.

A release from the district referring to the proposed state budget stated, "The governor's proposal has too many question marks and will be changed."

Superintendent Vicki Wright told the school board of education that she was very pleased with the budget, adding that it was the lowest spending increase in recent years. Last year the district saw a spending increase of 3.5 percent.

"I think it is really wonderful news for the whole district," Wright said.

Even with the modest spending increase, the district is able to move

forward with a number of long-sought-after programs, according to the school's communication director, Michael McCagg.

"We had been waiting to upgrade our technology for the past two years but were unable to because of fiscal crunch," McCagg said, specifically naming computer upgrades and distance learning programs. "We've now got the ability to go forward on these things."

An inventory control system was also mandated by a state audit at the cost of \$20,000.

The new spending plan includes \$213,000 for the first year of a two-year computer replacement phase-in, which would include adaptive technology equipment for special education students.

McCagg said this spending plan would receive BOCES aid and begin a technology initiative that has been delayed for three years.

"If everything goes as planned, the new spending plan could be adopted by the board of education by April 21," said McCagg. "The superintendent and everyone seem pleased with the plan."

The Budget Advisory Committee is holding a budget workshop, which is open to the public, at RCS Tuesday, March 4, and the school's board of education will hold a budget meeting on Wednesday, March 5.

Make no mistake: Flying can be trying

My clock buzzer went off on schedule, but when I saw "3:30 a.m." on the display, I was confused. I thought I had made a mistake when setting the alarm.

Then I remembered that we were going on vacation and we had an early flight. I hit the snooze button anyway.

A mere 75 minutes later, our family was headed to the airport. We made good time. No traffic to contend with before dawn on Sunday.

Smooth sailing so far. We got in line to check our baggage. There were only four people ahead of us. We'd soon be sitting by the gate eating our bagels, getting ready to board the plane.

Not so fast. The lady at the head of the line had issues. She was unsure whether she wanted to take the flight.

"I can't guarantee your bag will make it," the indifferent airline worker was telling her.

The customer had lots more questions. The worker did not even acknowledge those of us in the growing line. He had become that woman's personal travel agent.

Nearly 30 minutes later, the lady received assorted paperwork, left the counter and got in line at another airline. Meanwhile the rest of us continued to wait and wait.

The indifferent airline worker didn't say, "Next!" Instead, he typed on his keyboard and then moved to the back wall to stand by a printer. He pulled out the printed sheets and began reading. There was no, "I'll be right with you." It's as if we were not even there.

Every so often a second, friendlier worker came out and took the bags of someone who had used the self-service kiosk. We waited and waited some more. We had printed our boarding passes at home, so we assumed we didn't need the self-service kiosk. That was Mistake No. 1.

Friendly Worker chatted

calmly with the passenger he was assisting. There was no sense of urgency. He didn't see the rest of us in line. Soon we didn't see him again either. He disappeared behind the wall.

The couple behind us started discussing the self-service kiosk. I thought maybe they were unfamiliar with how it worked. I considered offering to help them get their boarding passes.

Turns out they didn't need my help. The wife went over to the kiosk, swiped her passport through the reader, and then suddenly she and her hubby were jumping the line and checking their bags.

I thought the couple was confused. After all, at this point there was only a single worker at the counter, so I assumed that he would serve customers in order, from the regular line. That was Mistake No. 2.

"EXCUSE ME!" I called to the husband and wife. "There are people ahead of you in line." Indifferent Worker finally finished reading his print-out. He returned to the counter and was handling the line-jumpers' bags.

"EXCUSE ME, they were BEHIND us!" I called to the worker.

"They used the self-service kiosk," he said.

"Well, WE already have our boarding passes. We printed them at home," I replied, waiting for justice to be served.

"So did we," said the line-jumper husband, waving his boarding pass in the air. The line-jumper wife looked concerned, but the husband patted her on the shoulder and said, "Don't worry about it," as he put their bags on the scale.

We edged closer to the counter, but we were still third

in line. We could've walked to Florida in less time.

I walked to the self-service kiosk and discovered the "check baggage only" option on the screen. I saw that we could've used that option and maybe Friendly Worker would have come out to take our bags.

Friendly Worker was nowhere to be seen, of course.

"What if everyone behind us now steps up to the kiosk?" I said to my husband, "We will never get to check our bags. We will never get to the front of this line."

Just as we started using the kiosk, Indifferent Worker called, "Next" and we stepped up to the counter. He told us that boarding would begin at 6:15, then added, "But no one is going anywhere until I get up there."

What the heck does that mean? I wondered. Was he now the only person working at the entire airline? Was this guy also going to load the luggage and fly the plane?

We got through security and hustled down to the departure gate, which of course was the farthest gate available. As promised, Indifferent Worker was at the gate. We arrived just in time to hear him explain that due to bad weather in other parts of the country our plane needed to take extra fuel in case we were unable to land and had to be diverted to another city. "Since we need extra fuel, we may not be able to put all the bags on the plane," he said, "But if you have a passport and are leaving the country, your bags will be loaded."

Upon hearing this news I began regretting singling out the line-jumpers at baggage check-in. I was sure that our bags would not make the flight since I had mouthed off in line. Also, Jeff's bag weighed 45 pounds, so I was certain that his suitcase would be sacrificed for fuel.

And yet, I remained perplexed. Were bags being left behind to make room for extra fuel or to avoid exceeding weight limits? How long would we be circling

the airport and/or how far might we be diverted if we couldn't land?

Jeff and I decided this "trading luggage for fuel" scenario must have happened to us before but the airlines had previously kept us in the dark about the details. It all seemed quite strange until we boarded the plane and saw how small it was.

Soon we were preparing for take off. The flight attendant announced that the flight time was two hours and nine minutes. We realized this meant that we would be arriving exactly when our connecting flight was departing.

We decided the flight attendant must have misspoken. She walked by and we said, "Did you mean the flight time is ONE hour and nine minutes?" "No, two hours," she said. "Is this because of weather?" I asked. "Yes," she said and walked on.

Jeff said to me, "We've missed our connecting flight." "Yes, I know" I answered. I was oddly calm. What could I do? We'd get to Florida eventually.

For the next two hours I mentally prepared myself for being stranded in Chicago. Maybe we'd get to meet Oprah. She and I would chat about the

latest books we've read. She'd buy Jeff, Rachel and I all new clothes to replace the contents of the suitcases that got left behind in Albany.

Finally the captain announced it was time to prepare the cabin for landing.

"We have a 9 o'clock connecting flight," we told the flight attendant, "And we are hoping it has been delayed."

She assured us we would have plenty of time to catch the flight. "We arrive in Chicago at 8 o'clock," she said.

"You mean 9 o'clock," we insisted.

But, no, she meant what she had said and she was correct.

Mistake No. 3 was forgetting about the one-hour time change from Albany to Chicago. Duh! Well, that explained why none of the airline staff was expressing any apologies for delays and missed connecting flights.

Perhaps if I'd gone to sleep earlier the night before I would have had the presence of mind to use the self-service kiosk and I would have remembered the time change. Then I could have avoided the mistake I repeat often: Worrying for nothing!



Discuss the future now

Neoteny is the retention, by adults in a species, of traits previously seen only in juveniles of that species. Greek scientists discussed this process thousands of years ago; and writer, broadcaster and ad hoc zoologist Desmond Morris brought the term into popular culture in his book "The Naked Ape," published some four decades ago.

While the term applies to physiological traits, more recently, the word has been used to describe those adults (in the mathematical sense) that simply won't grow up in some respects: the avuncular model train enthusiast, the 35-year-old "debutante" who carts around a pocket-sized poodle, even the rabid sports fan in your office is carrying over some juvenile traits from his past.

As we live longer, have more free time and more discretionary income, this has become commonplace. And as our parents live longer, we tend to forget that someday they will require our care, the care of a professional or a plan in place to have that care provided for them.

These days, it seems, for some of us experiencing a little of that neoteny, that the moment our parents stop caring for us, we have to worry about caring for them.

Enter the "40/70" rule. The rule says that if an adult child is 40 years old and one — or both — of his or her parents is 70, they should talk about a range of topics, ranging from finances to end-of-life issues.

When the time comes to put these plans in place, emotions will run high and communication won't be at its best. That isn't the time to make decisions about your parents' care.

Parents and children should start discussing the future now instead of waiting until it's here, particularly regarding what the parent's wishes are and what their children can do to meet those wishes and provide the best possible quality of life.

Somewhere out there, probably more ubiquitous than you'd like to think, is a 30-something son or daughter playing one of the next-generation gaming consoles and not thinking about how he will care for his parents when the time comes. At that same time, there is a parent entering his golden age who thinks his offspring will be able to take care of him when the time comes, and know exactly how to do it.

And meanwhile, the two have yet to talk to one another.

Put down the controller and have that discussion now. It's not something you can afford to put off.

Elevator job had ups and downs

When I was 15, I got my first part-time job through no fault of my own.

One day, my mom came home from work and told me she'd found a way for me to make some extra pocket money — I was going to be an elevator operator.

At the time, she was working as an interior designer in downtown Troy, and each morning we would pack a lunch together and take the family sedan down the Northway from Clifton Park to an old four-story furniture store in the Collar City.

While Mom showed fabric samples to her attentive clients, drew them elaborate floor plans and did her best to sell dining room sets, it was my job to navigate the building's outmoded Otis elevator. My passengers were the store's salespeople and its customers, who were mostly young families from the suburbs.

This might be a good time to set the record straight. I'm only 22 years old. This story did not take place in 1930, but somewhere around the turn of the millennium.

So my point here comes in the form of an SAT-style analogy: Daniel Day-Lewis is to the "Last of the Mohicans" as Ross Marvin is to the last of the elevator operators.

I remember that when I got the job, I grew curious about the new "old" occupation that had been thrust upon me. I was only 15, but I was nostalgic for a simpler America. I conjured up a world full of large department stores with servicemen like me operating their elevators. I imagined myself to be a refined gentleman, working at a posh Fifth Avenue department store in the 1940s.

"Going up?" I would ask.

"Yes sir, ladies lingerie," a woman dressed in fine mink would say.

"Sure thing, madam, fourth

floor it is," I'd say, pulling back on the levers of the elevator and stopping the rumbling machine at just the right instant. The elegant lady would slip me a \$10 bill, and her golden-haired daughters would smile, admiring my uniform.

I assumed the uniform was essential to the identity of an elevator operator, and I expected I'd have one for my new job. But I never got a uniform, and I never made a single tip, and never once did I stop the elevator at "just the right time."

The elevator seemed to have a mind of its own. I think the management at the furniture store thought that maybe a teenager, someone with some video-game experience, could figure out how to work it, so they called on me.

But I didn't have video-game experience. I was a bookish teen who studied too much and played baseball in what free time I had. I was also pretty clumsy. Machinery and the entire realm of the technical world was a great mystery to me. I'd never worked on cars. I avoided shop class. I tended to drop things.

My physical inferiorities quickly made it clear that even the seemingly simple ups and downs of elevator operation put me in way over my head.

The buttons I used to maneuver the Otis would frequently malfunction, so instead of a smooth ride, the elevator moved along its cable in short, herky-jerky bursts.

If I didn't use the precision of a surgeon to stop the elevator level with the floor, there would be a giant step up or down for the customer depending on the magnitude of my miscalculation. I can recall several occasions, many of them regarding somewhat elderly patrons, where customers tripped over the unexpectedly large step out onto the second floor showroom.

Lucky for me, actually operating the elevator probably accounted for less than 10 percent of my day.

For the most part, I'd sit in a chair outside the elevator, dressed not in the uniform of a New York City doorman, but in the sort of wrinkled dress shirts and mismatched ties that characterize a teenager's inability to be comfortable in the clothes of a grown man.

It was the staff that fascinated me most. I would pretend to read a paperback book when I was actually listening to the employees.

There was the manager, a blonde woman with hair that looked like it was sprayed on. I remember her always wearing the same blue pantsuit. There were also several nervous women whose identities have all blended together in my memory. They were never selling enough to make commission, and they were always on the brink of emotional breakdowns.

Thrown into this mix was this one old guy I'll call "Sam."

He was a longtime employee, but it looked like his best days were behind him. He frequently appeared to be drunk, was late nearly every day and he swore like a washed-up sailor.

One day Sam threw a temper tantrum in the middle of the store because he claimed that my mom had "stolen" one of his customers and stood to make a profit off her sales.

Several of the other employees, myself included, had watched the situation unfold, and we all concurred that no impropriety had been committed, but nothing assuaged old Sam. Finally, the store's owner, a man I always thought had a good deal of class, put Sam back in his place.

It was at that moment that I felt like a young boy, incapable of standing up to a man, to someone who was in the throes of anger, someone who was trying to intimidate a co-worker to show his machismo.

On our ride home, I told my mom that I had wanted to rush in, to do something. I had wanted to punch that 70-year-old man in the face, but I did nothing.

She reassured me that she was OK, that she was tough.

It was these rides that I realize were more important than the job itself, the rides in the morning and the rides home that I spent with my mom.

Soon the store was struggling financially and could barely afford to keep its staff. I left to concentrate on my schoolwork. Sam, the man I held a grudge against, had a heart attack. And even my mom, a dedicated salesperson, was forced to leave when the store's sales hit rock bottom.

The fact is I still call my mom to tell her about my day at work. She tells me about hers. We each share our own little occupational world — its characters, its lessons, its ups and downs.

Where I once saw the elevator operator as a nostalgic figure trapped in a simpler time, I now see the elevator operator contained by the realities of a low-paying, but surprisingly challenging job. Gone is the romanticism of the bell boy uniform and the golden-haired customers.

Instead I see myself in my mind's eye at the control panel of the old Otis. I send the machine up, making stops at each floor and instead of finding dinette sets, or dressers or even ladies lingerie, each floor contains the very different worlds of my part-time past.

Floor two is the family sporting goods store, with its cluttered store-room of shoes; floor three is the hot bagel bakery with its scents of garlic and onion and its sesame seeds that fall to the floor behind the counter and stick to the soles of your shoes.

And at the top, I see my life as it is today. There I am, a full-time reporter at *Spotlight Newspapers*, working my beat across Schenectady County, and while the experiences of my past may not have improved my writing or my skills as an interviewer, I can't help but think they were the foundation that put me where I am today.




Push-up fundraiser planned for foundation

Civil War scholar looks at Lincoln's life

Civil War scholar shows the personal side of a president

On March 3, 1865, in his second inaugural address, President Abraham Lincoln urged Americans struggling with the destruction and division of the Civil War to display "malice toward none and charity to all."

Civil War scholar Thomas Hoffman said he thought Lincoln's statement was also reflective of the man's humble roots, his patience and his kindness. Hoffman, who boasts a personal collection of more than 1,000 books written about Lincoln, gave a presentation on the 16th president Tuesday, Feb. 26, at the Dominican Retreat & Conference Center in Niskayuna.

Katie Rooney, coordinator of the Dominican Retreat's 12-Step program, said she thought Hoffman's presentation was timely considering Lincoln's birthday was celebrated earlier this month. She first heard Hoffman speak on faith-based issues in his native Green County.

"He's very eloquent and engages the crowd," said Rooney. "He's spoken at the retreat as part of our 12-Step program, and when I found out he was a Lincoln scholar, we asked him to come back to give a presentation to the public."

Richard Hughes, of Albany, was one of more than 25 people who attended Hoffman's presentation on Tuesday. He said he enjoys reading about the history of the Civil War and World War II.

"I thought the presentation covered a lot of ground," said Hughes, "I learned about Lincoln as a person rather than as a president"

Hoffman's talk focused on Lincoln's human characteristics instead of viewing him primarily as a politician. Hoffman said it's important to remember Lincoln as a man with flaws who overcame adversity to become one of

the great leaders in American history.

"The fundamental issue of the presentation is the notion of change, and that idea relates to the mission of this retreat," said Hoffman. "Lincoln's life is the study of a great individual who displayed honesty, decency and sensitivity."

According to Hoffman, Lincoln was faced with a number of challenges that might have broken a lesser man.

In his life, he was faced with the premature deaths of his mother, sister, a lover and two of his children.

The times in which Lincoln served as president were also undeniably turbulent. The country was divided over the issue of slavery, and Lincoln was faced with enormous pressures to end the Civil War, a war that resulted in the deaths of 600,000 Americans.

During his presidency, Lincoln also dealt with a clinical depression that was often crippling, a disease that also affected his wife, Mary Todd.

"It wasn't unusual for Lincoln to hold cabinet meetings in his bedroom because he was so depressed he couldn't get up in the morning," said Hoffman.

Hoffman said Lincoln's principles, his religion and his powerful skills as a writer and orator allowed him to overcome his shortcomings.

"He understood his own depression, and he also understood that

he was placed on Earth as an instrument, that life is short and that each moment has to be cherished," said Hoffman.

Thomas Hoffman is a practicing trial attorney and a Civil War and Lincoln Scholar. He lives with his wife on a farm in Green County.



Geocaching catches on with GPS users

Electronic treasure hunts appeal to adventurers of all ages

Mike Schwab doesn't go anywhere without his Garmin GPS device.

"I originally bought the GPS for my motorcycle, but now I use it in my car or even when I'm walking around a city," says Schwab.

But the Hudson native doesn't only use his electronic device to get from point A to point B. He's among hundreds of local adventurers and hobbyists who use GPS, or Global Positioning System, devices to find hidden stashes and treasures called geocaches.

Geocaching is essentially an electronic treasure hunt. Using an online network, geocachers like Schwab can find the coordinates of hidden caches all over the world.

Then, hunters use an electronic GPS device, a navigational tool that determines one's geographical location, to get within proximity of the caches. These devices can range in price from \$100 to \$1,000. The official geocaching Web site recommends the Garmin eTrex GPS or the Magellan GPS 315 as good basic units.

Some caches are hidden in plain sight and easily visible, while others can be hidden and the size of pillbox.

Though the prizes found in most caches are trinkets like McDonald's toys, maps, books or costume jewelry with little monetary value, the thrill, says Schwab, is in the hunt.

"It's a big deal to be the first to find a cache," says Schwab. "I recently was the first to find a survival-themed cache in the Catskill Peaks. Sometimes the first one to find a cache will win a bigger prize or will be congratulated in the online message boards."

Caches often have certain

themes. Schwab said some caches always contain Legos. Others are nature themed or contain survival materials for campers.

Schwab, who has taken his hobby overseas, finding caches across Europe, said he once found \$100 in a cache and has left such prizes as an iPod Shuffle in caches he maintains.

Theresa McCumber is a member of the Capital Region Geocachers organization. She remembers jumping out of bed at 10:30 p.m. one evening when her husband, Harold, saw that a new local cache had been established near their home in Troy.

"Being the first to find it is a big deal so we decided to go find it that night," said McCumber. "The cache was hidden in a ball field in Waterford, and we found it that night."

Local caches are generally found in public places like parks, baseball fields, roadsides and ski areas. For the more extreme hobbyists, caches can be found at mountaintops or even under water. McCumber said caches can only be placed in approved areas. She said caches aren't allowed in places like National Parks or on private property.

Each cache contains a logbook, which serves as the basic networking tool among geocachers. The logbook contains information from the cache's founder and notes from each person who finds the cache. Each visitor of a cache is required to leave a note in the logbook. Visitors are also asked to leave something behind.

"You make an even trade," said McCumber. "If you find a trinket you leave something of equal value behind for the next person who

finds the cache."

While Schwab and McCumber are serious hobbyists, they both agree that hunting for caches is fun for all ages.

"It's a great family activity," said McCumber. "It teaches kids how to use maps and how GPS technology works."

Schwab frequently takes his two sons, Garrit, 6, and Ethan, 4, on geocaching expeditions. On Saturday, Feb. 23, the Schwabs hunted for hidden treasure at Maple Ski Ridge as part of Schenectady County's Winter Carnival.

Garrit used a Garmin Legend device to find an army surplus container hidden inside a tire just beyond the ski ridge's parking lot.

Participants at the Winter Carnival found winning tickets

inside each cache that they could trade for hats, stickers, bracelets and other prizes.

The Schwabs are also members of the New York Capital Region Geocachers, which currently has more than 150 members.

The group meets monthly at a local diner to discuss the hobby over hot coffee and breakfast.

"We're a pretty informal group locally," said McCumber, "but this is a worldwide hobby with thousands of enthusiasts who correspond in the logbooks and online at the cache Web pages."

Syracuse Center of Excellence is a leader in its field

Syracuse is a leader in the field of indoor air quality research, green building and energy efficiency, and it's thanks in part to the Syracuse Center of Excellence in Environmental and Energy Systems. Led by Syracuse University and the Syracuse CoE Office for Industry Collaboration, the Syracuse CoE was created in 2002 to provide a link between commercial and academic expertise in indoor environmental quality, water resource management and renewable energy.

"Our job is to help create jobs in the region and across the state with a focus on environmental sustainability," said Edward Bogucz, the Syracuse CoE's executive director. "We look to find areas in which our partners have a competitive advantage and to learn how to use that advantage to their benefit."

In order to accomplish that mission, the center has received some \$54 million in state grants, as well as \$31 million in federal money.

The Syracuse CoE was first conceived of in 2000, when the Metropolitan Development Association of Syracuse and Central New York formed the New York Indoor Environmental Quality (NYIEQ) Center, a nonprofit organization focused on research and job creation. The NYIEQ Center's work complemented an effort launched by SU in 1998 to improve its own indoor environmental quality program. In 2001, with a \$15.9 million state grant, SU and 11 partners created the Environmental Qual-

ity Systems STAR Center. Finally, in 2002, when the Syracuse CoE was created as part of a state-wide Centers of Excellence program, the prior entities joined forces under that heading.

Since that time, the Syracuse CoE's research and development programs have created more than 180 jobs. It has also sponsored more than 70 research and development projects, from a DNA chip to detect fungi in the air to a marketing program for new wind turbines.


But creating and financing new technology is the easy part. Bogucz said the challenge is making people aware of the true breadth of the organization.

"We're like an entire ecosystem, with many different parts, each with its own function," he said. "We're a community of nearly 200 partners. Our purpose is to make sure all of the parts of that ecosystem work together."

Members of the Syracuse CoE range from businesses to economic development agencies to academic institutions. The most recognizable endeavors are those involved with indoor air and environmental quality.

"People in the community are familiar with our work in indoor air quality," Bogucz said. "But we have three areas of focus – indoor environmental quality, clean and renewable energy and water resource management. A lot of people don't recognize the full breadth of what our members are doing."

Bogucz hopes that the full scope of the Syracuse CoE's operations will

be recognized once its new headquarters in downtown Syracuse is finished next year. The \$35.6 million building is under construction at the corner of Almond and Water streets. In keeping with the Syracuse CoE's mission, the building will be constructed using green technology, utilizing 46 percent


less energy than standard construction.

Giving the organization a central location, Bogucz said, will hopefully bring more attention to the scale of the Syracuse CoE's mission.

"We are on the threshold of international leadership in the field of in-

door air quality," Bogucz said. "With the completion of our new headquarters next year, we'll have a place to showcase that, as well as our work in water resource management and renewable energy research. That will propel us into a position of leadership in those areas, as well."



National Grid offers safety tips for winter

With the winter heating season still under way, National Grid reminds customers what to do if they suspect a natural gas leak and how to avoid potentially deadly carbon monoxide.

Like any fuel, natural gas is safe when used properly. To help ensure customers' safety, National Grid crews continually test, repair and improve the underground system that delivers natural gas.

Despite their best efforts, however, the possibility does exist for a gas leak in or near your home. National Grid adds a harmless substance called mercaptan that has a strong rotten egg odor to natural gas so you can tell if there's a gas leak in or near your home.

National Grid advises that you take immediate action anytime you suspect a natural gas leak:

- **Get out:** All occupants should leave the house immediately. Do not open windows to ventilate or use the telephone or light switches for any reason.

- **Make the call:** After leaving the house and reaching a safe environment, call the National Grid 24-hour gas emergency number at 1-800-892-2345.

- **Stay out:** Do not return to your home until National Grid tells you it is safe.

Carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless gas that can be deadly if left undetected. It's the byproduct of the incomplete burning of fuels such as natural gas, butane, propane, wood,

coal, heating oil, kerosene and gasoline.

Common sources include malfunctioning forced-air furnaces, kerosene space heaters and natural gas ranges. Other sources include wood stoves, charcoal grills, motor vehicle engines, and fireplaces.

During the heating season when windows and doors are tightly shut, fresh air is sealed out, allowing any carbon monoxide that may be present to build up over time.

The symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are similar to those of the flu. Depending upon the amount of carbon monoxide in the air and length of exposure, symptoms may include headaches, weakness, confusion, chest tightness, skin redness, dizziness, nausea, sleepiness, fluttering of the heart or loss of muscle control.

If you suspect carbon

monoxide is present in your home, go outside immediately and breathe deeply; then call 911. If symptoms are severe, get medical attention right away.

Here are some tips to protect your family:

- Install a UL-listed home carbon monoxide detector.
- Check chimneys or flues for debris, bird nests or other blockages, and have them cleaned periodically.
- If your furnace vents close to the ground make sure that the vent is clear leaves, other debris, and snow and ice.
- Be sure space heaters and wood stoves are in good condition, have adequate ventilation and are used in strict compliance with manufacturer's instructions.
- Never use a gas range for heating, burn coal or charcoal in an enclosed space, or leave a car idling in a closed garage.






live in their own homes. It helps offset the dwindling number of available beds at private and public live-in and nursing facilities, said Walter.

Staying at home is often a parent's first choice when children ask the question: "What would you like to do?" Unfortunately, that question typically isn't asked until later in a person's retirement, and the solutions often strain relations between children and parents, and, in some cases, siblings. It can also complicate plans for doing what is best for parents.

"Some people are chronic callers, looking for assistance as parents age. A majority are 40-plus, adult children. More often than not, it is a crisis situation when they call. Typically something has triggered the call — a trip to the ER or a shut-off notice from National Grid," said Christine Cary, director of Colonie Senior Services department.

The department answers questions for these 40-somethings, and, in some cases, acts as mediators to the 40-70 conversation.

The conversation always varies and depends on the individuals, both parent and child. It can touch upon issues such as staying at home or how to pay bills.

The conversation, by nature, is difficult, said Walter.

It can involve sensitive issues such as driving, finances, independence and even romance.

A recent independent study done by Home Instead Senior Care found that one-third of the adults in the United States are at a roadblock when it comes to the 40-70 conversation. Many have raised the concern that their parents are too independent to have such a dialogue, and sometimes, adult children do not want to give up their role in the parent-child relationship.

The organization is looking to help families in the transition from a "parent-child" relationship to a "peer-to-peer" relationship.

For too long, the fate of the elderly has come down to a response rather than a proactive approach, Walter said. In some cases siblings find themselves fighting over how to best care for their parents, which often complicates the process.

"Right after the holidays, we got calls after people came to visit their parents," Walter said.

After being out of the home, or away from their parents for so long, children are often overwhelmed to find that the roles of parent and child have all of the sudden shifted, she said. And when confronted, parents may resist the conversation for fear that their individuality and self-dependence is at risk.

"In the old days, families took care of aging relatives. Today there are a lot of services to do that ... but caregivers aren't aware of the services out there. And, they can be very affordable," said Carey.

The hope is that by starting the conversation earlier, the elderly can have a plan in

place, a plan that they helped devise that works within the family's financial range and provides the elderly with the services they want and expect, she said.

"When people think they are making their own decisions it's easier to swallow," said Walter.

At age 70, parents are well enough to make and plan these decisions, said Carey.

Home caregiver services like Home Instead Senior Care are taking a bigger role in addressing the elderly care issue. Many organizations are expanding to include licensed nurses and, in some parts of the country, such as Massachusetts, the services are falling under health insurance coverage. New York has a long way to go on that route, said Walter.

In the meantime, calls continue to come into Colonie Senior Service Centers and Home Instead Senior Care, and they, along with other public and private care facilities, are seeing that seniors get the care they need and want.

More and more are staying at home with the help of caregivers who help prepare meals, make sure they get to their medical appointments, and provide other services as simple as fetching items from the basement to seeing that the elderly remember to take their medications. More often than not, all it took was a conversation and a phone call.

"You want to make sure that everyone is working together and that you are planning with, not for, your loved ones," Carey said.





RCS teacher sues colleagues

Educator claims his civil rights were violated

A social studies teacher in the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District is suing three of his colleagues for \$11 million.

Teacher Daniel Pickett claims that school officials and a teacher conspired to get him fired and have ruined his reputation in the community. In doing so, Pickett's lawyer Brendan Baynes says his civil rights under the First, Fourth and 14th amendments were violated. The suit alleges that the three infringed upon Pickett's rights to free speech, due process, and equal protection of the law.

Pickett names RCS Superintendent Vicki Wright, former school board of education president and current member John Bonafide, and middle school teacher Robert Lammlly in the suit.

During a telephone interview on Friday, Feb. 29, Baynes said of the defendants, "They're being served literally as we speak."

Wright and Bonafide did not return calls for comment on the lawsuit and Lammlly declined to comment.

When asked if he were a teacher at RCS, Lammlly responded, "It depends on what you're calling about." After confirming he was the teacher named in Pickett's suit and asked for a comment, Lammlly said, "I don't have one at this time. Thank you for calling."

Pickett's lawsuit focuses on the three individuals, not the school district. He says he was falsely accused of having an inappropriate relationship with a student, his performance reviews were negatively altered, and he was continually investigated — all in attempts to have him fired for speaking out against the school.

Pickett was hired by RCS in

1989 and is a tenured teacher. He currently teaches at the district's middle school, where he has worked since 2005.

His suit claims he was demoted to teaching the seventh grade, and, after he was cleared of any wrongdoing in several investigations against him, his request to be reinstated in the high school was denied by the school board, which at the time was chaired by Bonafide.

The demotion was classified as "punitive" by the school because of a poor performance review and was the impetus of his case against his colleagues, according to Pickett's lawyer, who said the demotion was unwarranted.

Lammlly chairs the social studies department in the mid-

dent later publicly denied any relationship occurred, according to Pickett's lawyer.

Pickett and another teacher chaperoned 31 students to Rome in February of 2005.

Baynes said Pickett was docked pay due to being absent from the school during the Rome trip and failing to properly sign out of school, but he currently retains his same salary. He has also lost his certification to award college credits as an adjunct professor through the University at Albany, as a result of his demotion to the middle school.

Bonafide's wife, Ann Marie, was given the adjunct professor status and the additional salary that accompanies it, according to Baynes.

"Although his (Pickett's) economic losses were not huge," Baynes said, "his reputation has suffered substantially."

At least one parent asked to have her child removed from Pickett's classroom due to his rumored relationship with a female student, Baynes said.

Under the unequal protection of the law portion of the lawsuit, Pickett claims other "similarly situated teachers at RCS" were not the subject of prosecution.

The suit specifically cites other teachers in the district who had "an inappropriate sexual relationship with a student; been found to have child pornography on a RCS computer; asked a student to show her breasts to the teacher; downloaded music on RCS computers; failed to sign in and out of school; chaperoned the trip to Rome in February of 2005; failed to wear ID tags; missed schools trips with students but was not docked pay; and missed meetings without penalty."

These other teachers were not subjected to investigations and psychiatric evaluations like Pickett, said Baynes.

A discovery conference date is set for June in federal court, Baynes said, describing the legal process as "really slow-moving at first."

dle school where Pickett now works.

Baynes contends that Wright either personally revised or instructed Principal Hakim Jones to alter Pickett's performance review "in order to support ... Wright and Bonafide's unconstitutional motives for terminating or constructively terminating Pickett."

Baynes has advised Pickett not to comment while the litigation is pending.

Pickett contends he was originally targeted when he spoke out against decisions made by the school's board of education during public meetings. He disagreed with the board's decision to discontinue its student exchange program in Rome, Italy, and eliminate the position of vice principal in the high school and middle school, according to Baynes.

Subsequently, the lawsuit states, Wright and Bonafide prompted an investigation into an improper relationship between Pickett and a female student that allegedly happened during a 2005 school-sponsored trip to Rome. The female stu-

successful steamboat voyage. With eight miles of Hudson River shoreline, the town's history has been particularly influenced by Hudson and Fulton, said Leath.

Leath, along with town Planning Board Chairman Parker Mathusa, are spearheading many of the events that the committee is putting together.

"There is a lot of interest in this," Mathusa said. "According to my calculations, the children in the town of Bethlehem go to 40 different schools. ... They should all be a part of this celebration."

Mathusa said students not only from Bethlehem Central would be invited to participate, but also town residents who attend Guilderland, Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk, Voorheesville, the Albany Academies, Christian Brother's Academy and other area schools.

Some of the events planned include the dedication of a new memorial at Henry Hudson Park; exhibits about steamboats, ice harvesting and Native Americans at the Bethlehem Historical Association Museum; a religious heritage day; and a display of historic photographs at the town library.

The new memorial will cost around \$80,000, according to Mathusa.

Social studies teachers at Bethlehem Central are also planning events, and the quadricentennial committee is working on additional plans, such as history-themed floats at the Memorial Day Parade, and boat and bicycle rides.

The committee holds meetings open to the public on the third Wednesday of every month, and people interested in volunteering or donating money toward the celebration should contact Leath at 439-7470 or sleath@townofbethlehem.org.

clude transportation and the bus replacement plan, fringe benefits and insurance, debt service, BOCES, the baseline budget and proposed additions, and the budget to establish Eagle Elementary, according to the district's communication director Matt Leon.

Leon said the citizens' group would unfold four-weeks worth of meetings during this Wednesday's board meeting, adding that the group undertook a line-by-line analysis of a detailed baseline budget.

A finalized state budget has yet to be adopted, so the board has been working with the budget proposal put forth by Gov. Eliot Spitzer, said Loomis.

"We've analyzed how it would affect the school's budget," he said.

Loomis believes the budget will represent the best for area students.

"There are always difficult choices facing school districts at budget time," he said. "But we enter this budget season, as always, with a commitment to providing

the best education possible for students at a value that we believe the community can support."

The board is scheduled to continue its budget discussions on Wednesday, March 12, with a presentation on the K-12 instructional programs, athletics and revenues. Its March 19 meeting is reserved for additional discussion.

The board could potentially adopt a budget as early as March 26, but has reserved an April 2 budget meeting if it is necessary.

A statewide vote on district budgets will be put to voters on Tuesday, May 20, according to Loomis, and, even though they are separate entities, voters will also decide on local library budgets and library board members on that date.

Last year, Bethlehem voters approved a \$77.2 million budget for the 2007-08 school year. It called for a 3.98-percent tax increase for area homeowners over the previous year. There was a \$1.5 million amended increase to that budget in Jan. 2008 to accommodate unexpected special education costs.

The increase brought this year's total school budget to \$78.7 million.



confess: I don't know my Wii from my Wi-Fi. I am what Urban Dictionary calls a "Digital Immigrant," someone who grew up before the digital age and is fairly new to the Internet – basically, anyone who is over the age of 28. To compensate, I've worked to get competent with technology so I don't feel like a stranger in the modern world.

Technologically speaking, it's a completely different world from when I was growing up in the 1970s and 1980s. I remember being in rapture over the latest Casio fx-350 scientific calculator, which my father brought back from Hong Kong in the late 1970s. I happily studied the operating small print and showed off my gadget to envious school friends. Now my circa late-1970s prize is considered "vintage," the domain of collectors and buffs and on sale on eBay for mere pennies, when it cost my father a substantial sum brand new.

I can imagine it's the same for kids today who drool over Wii video-game consoles or long for an iPod Touch portable media player or wait impatiently for their copy of the "Guitar Hero III" video game. The only difference is the media environment.

I never thought I'd be the person who said, "In my day..." but, here goes: In my day, growing up in England, I had four television channels to choose from. We didn't have a home computer, and a cell phone – "mobile phone" in England – was a big block held to the ear by some character on a TV show. I didn't learn to use a computer until I was in high school, and then we learned basic programming.

Now kids are at ease with the proliferation of technology and multitask with different types of media, sometimes texting or uploading photos while watching television.

I've grown to love my computer; I have e-mail accounts, Google everything, read the news, shop and bank online, and write and chat on blogs.

For a digital immigrant like me YouTube, the video-sharing Web site, is a new discovery. My husband calls it his "new best friend" or his "jukebox," but we haven't even ventured into social networking Web sites like Facebook or MySpace. I don't text on my cell phone; I rarely use IM (instant messaging – real time communication via the computer) to chat with friends, and I don't own a PDA (personal digital assistant).

A quick survey of friends confirms their older children use IM and text messaging in their daily lives. From what I've read in recent articles, young people text or use IM because of the efficiency and immediacy of response, and convenience of use during situations that require quiet. E-mail is described in such articles as "snail mail" or "so last millennium," full

of spam and only used with parents or for school/college communication with people in authority.

Researchers argue that text messaging is a young person's way to respond to their environment with no evidence to show that it makes them introverted or unsociable. Although, other commentators think that use of text is an excuse to avoid personal communication – how convenient to end a relationship with a text message.

When it comes to text messaging, I'm like a child learning a new language, no different from my 4-year-old son, Marcus, who loves to play with the mouse and keyboard. Marcus has no qualms about playing with new things while text messaging overwhelms me. I'm sure in a few years I'll be asking Marcus for technical advice.

Trying to decipher "text-speak" is a bit like that TV game show "Name That Tune" (The British version I watched in the 1980s). Name this text in one go: ROTFLOL. The translation is "Rolling on

the floor laughing out loud."

While I understand the reasons for short text messaging from cell phones, "text-speak" irritates me when it appears in e-mails and written communication unnecessarily or is inappropriate for the communication. However, from what I've read, it doesn't bother young people; they prefer expediency to proper grammar and spelling. A friend who is a professor gets text messages in e-mails from her undergraduate students and "text-speak" appears in their papers. As far as she's concerned, these are professional communication channels and gives her a bad impression.

As a parent, I realize I need to be in touch

with today's multimedia environment, even if it's not second nature to me. I don't want my children to accuse me of being ever so 20th Century.

Of course, I can see the advantages of text messaging; I'm not arguing that we should return solely to pen and paper (although my fanciful imagination sees me sitting at a desk in a long white muslin gown writing missives to friends – think Jane Austen), but I do want young people to understand and connect to their rich written and spoken cultures when they use the new media.

An understanding and connection to written and spoken cultures lie in young people's knowledge of the basics – to be able to write a proper letter with pen and paper, and on the computer with good spelling and grammar before they rely on text message shorthand and to be able to have a real one-on-one conversation in the flesh before they use texting or IM as their primary modes of communication.

When I first met my husband, he was already living in the United States so we started with a long-distance relationship. Although we were computer literate, we actually wrote letters to each other with pen and paper. There was something exciting about receiving an envelope every few days with a handwritten address on the front and an overseas stamp, and within it a beautiful gift of words. Letters signify the writer had taken the time and energy to think about the words and meanings – unique in today's "I want it yesterday" world. And I treasure those letters; a legacy I can hand down to my children.

Under-28s could argue that I don't understand their world and the mental abilities needed to use this new media. Perhaps they have a point. Certainly, I realize young people can multitask well with different media, but I question whether they lose depth of context in favor of a superficial overview.

Young people could say my issues come from a digital divide that separates the different generations. Thus, while the older generations grapple with new technology and value personal conversation and professional, properly written communication, the under-28s dive straight into media multitasking and value expediency over correctness.

I certainly don't want to go back to the Dark Ages, but I think I make some valid points about the pros and cons of our technological reality.

Am I the only one to feel like this? I would love to hear from you if you have similar concerns and, especially, if you're a young people reading this article and think I've got it totally wrong.

About 50 years ago, CarolLynn Langley saw a woman on television playing the mountain dulcimer. Langley was captivated by the instrument's sound and vowed to own one herself someday.

That day didn't come for many years, as Langley was busy raising a family, working on her farm and volunteering with 4-H. But finally, in the mid-1990s, Langley went to a dulcimer festival in Binghamton and bought her very own dulcimer.

Today, Langley, of Averill Park, is the president of the Dulcimer Association of Albany. On Friday and Saturday, March 7 and 8, the group will host its 20th annual festival at Calvary United Methodist Church in Latham, where Langley looks forward to sharing the magic of the mountain dulcimer with others.

"I just can't say enough about the instrument," she said. "It can sound like it's bubbling over with laughter, or it can move you to tears."

The mountain dulcimer is a traditional American folk instrument. Langley credits Jean Ritchie, the Kentucky woman she saw playing on television all those years ago, with "taking the dulcimer out of the hills and introducing it to the rest of the country."

Similar in size and shape to a violin, dulcimers typically have three or four strings. People lay the instrument across their laps and finger pick the strings with their right hands.

"It can be played very easily in its most basic form," Langley said.

"It's deceptively simple," agreed Lori Keddell, another member of the Dulcimer

Association of Albany.

Those who have never played a dulcimer can find out for themselves how easy it is at one of festival's workshops for beginners. Participants will learn how to hold and strum the dulcimer, as well as play a tune by ear.

Langley noted that people don't have to worry about bringing their own instrument. Dulcimers will be available to rent for the duration of the festival.

More advanced dulcimer players can take advantage of other weekend workshops. There will be lessons on waltzes, Appalachian fiddle tunes, hymn, medieval and early music.

"There's so much more you can do with it," Keddell said.

Upcoming festival highlights the beauty of traditional fold instrument

"You can play all different styles of music."

A jam session on Friday night and an open stage concert on Saturday will give festivalgoers a chance to showcase those different styles. On Friday night, the workshop leaders will put on a concert, and on Saturday night, the festival's three featured performers will take the stage for a closing concert.

One of those performers, Susan Carpenter, helped to start the Dulcimer Association of Albany back in 1985. She lives in Texas now and is making a special trip back to the area for the festival's 20th anniversary. She'll be joined by Susan Trump, a nationally known dulcimer player who was also

instrumental in launching the association, and Steve Eulberg, an acclaimed musician from Colorado.

Keddell and Langley said the concerts would make good entertainment for families.

"The concerts are wonderful," Langley said. "It's rare that people have heard of this kind of instrument. It's just a lot of fun."

"We get really good responses from everybody," Keddell added. "They really seem to have a good time."

If families get hooked on the sound of dulcimers like Keddell and Langley both did, they can check out the vendors at the show who will be selling the instruments. Festivals are generally a good place to buy

dulcimers since they're not widely available in music stores, Langley said.

"You can get them online on eBay, but the problem is, you can't hear them," she said.

When Keddell made her first purchase, she drove to a store in Connecticut, where she spent two hours trying out dulcimers. Since then, she's purchased about 10 more.

"It's addictive," she said.

Registration for the festival, which includes all events, is \$45 at the door. The two concerts are \$12 for visitors with \$5 admission for those 12 and younger at Saturday's featured performers concert.



early in the fourth quarter before the Plainsmen shut the Lady Eagles down with a stifling full-court press that forced several turnovers. Shen especially focused on Bethlehem's Alex McCullough, who scored 12 first-half points. The Plainsmen contested McCullough's shots, which limited her to two second-half points.

"We picked up our defense in the second half and tried to keep a hand in her face for the entire game," said Shen guard Carey Turner.

"McCullough did a great job in the first half," added Strube.

Meanwhile, Shen's offense did just enough to take the lead. Turner's lone basket of the fourth quarter put the Plainsmen ahead 31-29 midway through the period. Barb Shea contributed a field goal, and Kim Woodward hit two clutch free throws to seal the victory.

"This group of kids, in particular the seniors, they're phenomenal," said Strube. "They huddled up a few times and said to each other, 'We are not going home without a win.'"

Turner finished with 11 points, while Shea – the tournament's most valuable player – contributed eight points for Shen, which won its first Sectional title since 2004.

Meg Olsen scored all four of Bethlehem's fourth-quarter points to finish with six points in support of McCullough's 14-point,

10-rebound night. Taylor Teal added five points.

It was the third time Shen had beaten Bethlehem this season, but also the closest game between the Suburban Council rivals. The Plainsmen won by margins of 52-32 and 44-33 earlier this season.

"Mark Nealon does a great job. I saw obvious improvements from our last game against them," said Strube. "They have a strong, young team, so they're going to be tough over the next few years."

"The whole idea is to believe in what you're doing, and they absolutely did," said Nealon. "When you go in there and you believe that you can win a basketball game and you don't win, it stings a little bit. But the girls are going to come out of the locker room with their heads high. It was a special year for us."

Besides reaching the finals, the highlight for Bethlehem was beating Amsterdam in the class AA semifinals with a dominating performance against the state's No. 1 ranked team.

The Lady Eagles built 10-point leads in the second and third quarters by relentlessly driving to the basket and shutting down Amsterdam's high-powered attack. The Running Rams closed the gap to one point late in the third quarter before Bethlehem pulled away for good.

Olsen had 21 points, 10 of which came from the free throw line, to lead the Lady Eagles. Megan Power scored 13 points, while Megan Gaugler and Michelle Ottati each added 11 points for Amsterdam.

loss. If you pitted those same teams against each other 10 times to reach the finals, you'd probably still get an Academy-Gibbons match-up at least 70 percent of the time.

Would things be different if some of the public schools had retained their top players? Would Guilderland have reached the class AA finals if it had Gibbons' Zach O'Brien or CBA's Andrew Stire? Would Albany have more wins if it still had

Maginn's Shimeek Johnson? For that matter, would Niskayuna have made a deeper Sectional playoff run had Josh Duell never left? Those questions aren't easy to answer, but it certainly would have helped those teams to have those hometown players on their side.

So, what can be done to level the playing field? Outside of creating a separate private school classification in Section II (which would be dreadfully unfair to the smaller private schools), I think the best approach is to create a harsher penalty for a player who transfers to a private school after playing at least one

varsity season at his hometown high school. Unless the player and his family can prove that a hardship is involved (i.e. moving to a new community, death of a parent/guardian, poor relations with a coach that extend beyond verbal abuse), any varsity player who transfers to a private school should sit for the entire season unless he is a senior. In that case, the senior would have to sit out the first two months of the season.

I realize this is fairly severe and could damage a student's chance to sign with a college program. But given all the other opportunities basketball players have these days to showcase their talents to college coaches, be it AAU basketball or a plethora of elite summer camps, sitting out an entire high school season would not be as damaging as it would have been a couple of decades ago. Besides, if the player is attending the private school for its educational programs, where's the harm?

Perhaps if such a penalty were in place, more players and their parents would think twice before helping private schools dominate the Section II boys basketball landscape.

Zone D fails BC in finals

Shen scores last 10 points to pull out win

Saturday's Section II, Class AA girls basketball final was hardly beautiful, but Shenendehowa will take the result.

The Plainsmen scored the last 10 points of the game to defeat Bethlehem 36-29 for the Sectional title at Hudson Valley Community College.


"Both groups, I thought, left everything on the floor," said Shen coach Ken Strube. "Both teams were awful on offense ... both teams played phenomenal defense."

"We didn't want to run with Shen because we knew they were deep and athletic, so we were in a zone defense," said Bethlehem coach Mark Nealon. "I thought (playing) zone actually hurt us because it limited our aggressiveness."

Indeed, the same aggressiveness that propelled Bethlehem to a 51-45 semifinal victory over previously unbeaten Amsterdam four days earlier was eerily absent in Saturday's final. The Lady Eagles settled for outside shots far more frequently than they drove to the basket like they did against the Running Rams.

Still, Bethlehem traded blows with Shen and built a 29-26 lead


Private schools are taking over boys hoops

The time has come to do something about the imbalance in Section II boys basketball.

I don't mean the imbalance between the Big 10 and the Suburban Council in class AA or the imbalance between the Colonial Council and several smaller leagues. I mean the imbalance between the public schools and some of the largest private schools.

Look at this year's class AA and class A finals. Bishop Maginn vs. Christian Brothers Academy (for the second year in a row). Albany Academy vs. Bishop Gibbons. Not a public school among them, although it could be argued that some of the top area public school players are playing in the finals for those private schools.

Ordinarily, you could chalk it up to the cyclical nature of boys basketball, especially in Bishop Gibbons' case since the Golden Knights are only a couple of years removed from being in the Big 10's basement. But CBA has been

to six consecutive class AA finals. That's rare in a sport where many programs experience highs and lows over six years.

But here's the dirty little secret that helps these private schools reach the finals - they can recruit players. Well, maybe not recruit like a college program recruits high school players with scholarships, but they do land top-notch talent on a yearly basis.

Just look at how CBA has been able to maintain its status as a Section II power for six years. There has been a steady stream of talented players coming through its program including Josh Duell, Brian Monahan, Luke Weaver, Greg Holle, Deandre Kennedy-Ebron and Malcolm Austin, just

to name a few. But unlike a public school where students come from one or two communities, the CBA players I just mentioned hail from several cities and towns including Albany, Scotia, Colonie and (in Monahan's case) Kinderhook.

Granted, a lot of the larger private schools have students from diverse backgrounds. But when you start seeing talented athletes from different communities arriving at the same private school, it makes you wonder how they all came to choose that school. Certainly, academics come into play, especially with so many inner city public schools having a problem with their images as quality educational centers. But there's also the attraction of playing in a tougher league (sorry Suburban Council, but the Big 10 is still a tougher league when it comes to boys basketball) - not to mention the opportunity to play a more creative style of basketball.

Unfortunately, what this all

leads to is a wider disparity between the public schools and the private schools on the boys basketball court. Yes, Guilderland lost to CBA by only one point in the class AA semifinals, and Colonie had a 10-point halftime lead on Bishop Maginn in the other semifinal before losing by 10 points. But those were the only Suburban Council schools that had enough offensive weapons to challenge CBA and Maginn. If it was Shenendehowa, Shaker, Niskayuna or Bethlehem, the final scores wouldn't have been as close as they were with Guilderland and Colonie.

The semifinal scores weren't much closer in class A, despite the presence of two competitive Suburban Council teams in Mohonasen and Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake. Mohonasen couldn't contend with Albany Academy's multi-pronged attack in a 77-43 loss, and BH-BL couldn't contain Bishop Gibbons in a 65-56
