Consumer choices abound for stimulus checks

Open space opens discussion

Residents share their visions for the future at public hearing on policy

Nearly 100 residents filled Town Hall Thursday, May 15, to get the first say on the town's ongoing endeavor to create an open space plan.

Landowners, businesspeople,

residents, park enthusiasts, planners, and developers, along with members of the town board and the Citizens Advisory Committee on Conservation, all sat down together and discussed the future of Bethlehem.

Residents were broken into smaller groups to brainstorm what they envisioned for the town and what "open space" meant to them.

They then presented their findings, which will be included in the current study, to the rest of the audience.

John Behan of Behan Planning Associates is working as a con-

sultant for the town to help shape the new land use policy. The town hired him strictly in an advisory capacity — not to draw up an open space plan himself, according to Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

"It's obviously a very individualist decision," Behan told residents at the beginning of the workshop. "What's important to you is important to us."

The town's open space plan will be a comprehensive land use plan that will give landowners more tools to protect their land or do

Town banks on creek access

Board vote a step closer to DEC agreement on fishing area

The Bethlehem Town Board unanimously decided Wednesday, May 14, to allow the supervisor to enter an agreement with the state Department of Environmental Conservation to grant fishing on town parcels along the Onesquethaw Creek.

Although the decision was unanimous, there was considerable residential concern over trespassing issues, and Councilwoman Joann Dawson said she felt "uncomfortable" voting on the measure and earlier asked the board to table it to look further into the matter.

The cooperative agreement was sought by the DEC to allow anglers onto town property to fish the creek. The DEC will pay to build a small parking area, access point and footpath to the creek, according to Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

"I'm told it's one of the greater fishing spots in the area," Cunningham said.

The town is giving the state a 33-foot easement from the center of the stream to allow people to fish along the banks of the Onesquethaw, which the DEC stocks each year with brown trout. In addition to accessing town property, which DEC is paying Beth-

ATV crash leads to DWI charges for Ravena man

Shawn K. Harris, 20, of Ravena, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Thursday, May 8, for DWI, a misdemeanor, and two infractions: failure to display license plates and not wearing a helmet.

Police said officers were called to the area of Rupert Road and Old Quarry Road following reports of an all-terrain vehicle accident, and, upon arrival, officers said they saw "Harris lying in the ditch on his back near an overturned ATV."

Harris was found in a "semi-conscious" state, and he complained of a head injury, according to the arrest report.

According to the investigation, officers reported that they smelled

alcohol on Harris' breath when interviewing him, and Emergency Medical Services workers were called to the scene to treat Harris. The police report states that Harris was driving west on Rupert Road when he failed to negotiate a curve and drove his ATV into an embankment.

"This caused the ATV to overturn and eject Harris from the ATV," according to the report.

Police said that "due to his injuries," Harris was given a field sobriety test and that he tested positive for alcohol on a prescreening device.

The ATV was towed and Harris was transported to Albany Medical Center Hospital for treatment, according to the arrest report.

Police said that while at the hospital, Harris declined to give a blood sample in order to test his blood-alcohol content, and he is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on June 3.


Other arrests



Hamagrael preschool teacher set to retire

Bausback is ready to step down after 29 years of teaching

After nearly 30 years, Peg Bausback is retiring from the Hamagrael Preschool.

Teaching 3-, 4-, and 5-year-olds at the preschool since 1979, Bausback has decided to step down, according to the school's president Florence McDonough. Hamagrael Preschool, a co-op school, is located at the Delmar Reformed Church in Delmar. It first opened its doors in the church in 1979 when Bausback began teaching there, said McDonough, and it was held inside of Norma Kirkman's home prior to that. Kirkman lived in the Hamagrael neighborhood, hence the preschool's name. It is not a part of Hamagrael Elementary School.

Bausback worked at the preschool at the University at Albany for two years before starting at Hamagrael, said McDonough.

A retirement open house will be held on Wednesday, May 28, in Bausback's honor from 6 to 9 p.m. It is being held at the church hall of the Delmar Reformed Church in Delmar. "I, myself, have seven children, and six of them went to the preschool. I have one who is too young and hasn't gone yet," McDonough said of knowing Bausback. "Anyone who feels a particular affection with the school or with Peg is welcome"

McDonough has been the president of the pre-school for eight of the 12 years she has been involved there; and said she has gotten to know Bausback fairly well over those years. She said that they are expecting close to 300 people to attend the retirement open house event.

"She touched a lot of lives," McDonough said, adding that the public is invited to come out and support Bausback on May 28.

Dems for 21st hold debate

Eight candidates weigh in on broad range of political topics

Lined up in front of the eight chairs placed side by side at the SEIU building in downtown Albany Wednesday, May 14, were the names of the Democrats vying for the 21st District Congressional seat, which will be vacated by Democrat Michael McNulty at the end of the year. Filling those eight seats were seven men and one woman, all in business suits except one.

Instead of a tie, candidate Arthur Welser wore a T-shirt that said "Arthur Welser for Congress: getting rid of the drugs and the thugs."

Wednesday's debate kicked off with some light humor by contender Darius Shahinfar, who after declaring his name to the crowd said, "It's a name for politics, don't ya think?" He later said that when his father stepped off the boat from Iran, the few words he knew included "yes, no" and "hamburger."

The joking quickly subsided as the eight candidates each tried to show voters they were the best choice to fill the vacancy in Congress in a way that would represent the American people.

During introductions, former Assemblyman and NYSEDA executive Paul Tonko, who had not announced his candidacy in the weeks leading up to the debate said, "I thought long and hard about entering this race," before advertising himself as the most qualified person for the job due to his many years as a legislator and commitment to tackling issues such as energy.

Also at the debate was John Aretakis, a trial attorney; Tracey Brooks, an attorney; Craig Burridge, executive director

and CEO of the Pharmacists Society of the State of New York; Lester Freeman, a member of the Albany County Legislature; Darius Shahinfar, former Capital District Representative for Congresswoman Kirsten Gillibrand; Phil Steck, Albany County legislator; and Welser.

The winner of the Democratic primary, to be held Sept. 9, will face either Republican Jim Buhrmaster or Steven Vasquez in the general election.

Welser admitted that he was probably the only candidate in the race with little-to-no political background, but, he said, "America needs someone from the private sector."

Topics of the debate varied throughout the night, from global warming and energy conservation to the war in Iraq — about which all candidates seemed to agree that U.S. troops should be brought home.

The one question that elicited different answers from among the candidates asked what piece of legislation would be the first the candidates sponsored if they were elected into Congress. Candidates had 60 seconds to answer

Brooks said her first action would be to lower gas prices, while Burridge said he would first work on a universal healthcare system, something Shahinfar also mentioned, along with energy legislation.

Freeman said his first initiative would be to change the allowance age for tobacco purchasing, online gambling, marriage, and drinking to 20 years old. He also said that people should be able to enter the military at 18 years old, but not actually be able to fight in combat until they are 20.

Steck said his first initiative would be to work on having an "immediate withdrawal from Iraq."

"Unless the war in Iraq has ended, all of this [universal healthcare, energy, etc.] is meaningless," he said.

Welser said his first piece of legislation would require all students who drop out of high school before age 16 to be drafted and create "remedial Saturdays" for students to attend school on

the weekends.

Also at the debate, the crowd learned that not all candidates in the race have been Democrats all their lives. Brooks said she was raised in a Republican family, but that she had been a Democrat since 2002. Shahinfar said that for five years he was a Republican.

Aretakis said the issue of global warming is very important to him.

"I'm sure all of you in here are familiar with Al Gore's movie," he said, referring to the documentary "An Inconvenient Truth." "It actually drew a tear to my eye watching that movie."

Steck later said, "I, too, was impressed by Al Gore's movie, but in the end, I was left very hollow."

While many candidates acknowledged that America does have a global warming crisis at hand, Freeman argued, "This is not No. 1 on our plate," a spot, he said, belonged to low-income families.

"This is a sophisticated issue," he said. "It doesn't mean much to the poor families."

Prior to that question, the candidates were asked if they would consider using nuclear energy.

Welser said he is not 100 percent in favor of using nuclear energy, but that he would "definitely be in favor of looking at nuclear power as an alternative."

Aretakis said he would not be in favor of nuclear energy because it "causes harm to babies."

The issue of campaign finance reform also brought forth a variety of answers.

Aretakis said he would not approve such legislation considering how much his family has already given him toward his campaign — nearly \$300,000. Tonko said he agreed with campaign finance reform and that lawmakers shouldn't "allow our government to get away from the masses."

The debate lasted more than two hours, during which the candidates assured the crowd that this would not be the last debate of the 21st Congressional District.

Helping with math homework makes me cry

Remember those word problems from math class?

"Fred and Ginger have \$47 left over after paying the rent on their apartment, buying five candy bars, filing their tax returns, picking up groceries for four senior citizens, and making a donation to charity. The groceries cost one-sixth of the taxes owed and three times the amount given to the nonprofit. The nonprofit spends 15 percent on administrative costs and the remainder to fund math tutors for adolescents who won't listen to their parents' advice on homework. Create a chart showing the type and quantity of candy purchased and the rate of consumption, factoring in Ginger's insurance deductible for dental appointments and Fred's affinity for caramel and chocolate, but not in combination. Show all work."

Math homework makes me cry. Or to be more specific, helping with math homework makes me cry.

I don't know why my daughter and I have to argue about math. After all, math is math. It's not subjective. You don't have to theorize about how "X" is feeling. You just have to solve for "X."

I asked my sixth grader, "Why do we argue about math homework?"

She said, "Because we get frustrated with each other and that makes us upset."

"But why do we get frustrated?"

"Because we can't figure out the problems," she explained.

I waited a moment and then pressed on, "Uh, what about when I CAN figure out the problem. Why do we argue then?"

I thought for sure Rachel would just shrug her shoulders. I was wrong. She said, "It's because my brain is still going. It's trying to figure out the problem and so it can't listen to what you are saying."

Now that adds up. I knew better than to ask, "So, how do I get you to listen?"

Earlier this year I helped one of her friends with some math homework and everything went smoothly. Nobody got upset. Nobody yelled.

I simply encouraged the friend to slow down and carefully read each line of the problem. I also suggested that she jot down each category of expense and keep a running total. She was able to come up with the answer and understand how she got there. And she even said, "Thanks!"

A sixth grader let me help her with math homework and it was a pleasant exchange. There were no open displays of anger or refusal to accept tips.

I said to my daughter's friend: "So, you just let your parents help you? You don't yell at them when you don't understand?"

"No, I get frustrated and yell at my parents," was her honest reply.

I knew better than to ask, "So, why won't you just listen to your parents?"

But I did brag to my own daughter that I helped her friend and there was no yelling.

"That's nice," said Rachel, unimpressed.

What's with this lack of pride in parental math skills?

Maybe my daughter sees that I don't always know the answers. Sometimes I have to refer to the giant math textbook. And one time I even called a friend who teaches math.

Recently I worked on one of

her homework questions and the answer came out to "zero equals six." I knew this to be untrue.

"There must be a typo on the sheet" I told my daughter.

She said, "There can't be a typo, it's handwritten."

"Then there's a write-o," I said through gritted teeth.

"Mom's trying to say there's a mistake in the question," my husband chimed in.

In case I was wrong-o about the write-o, I jotted down the equation and asked an adult friend. She said she'd already talked to three other parents and they all confirmed that the problem could not be done.

I was relieved that I had not lost my ability to complete simple algebra. And I also recognized that math can be frustrating.

I was challenged in May by "determine the function" problems. You get a chart that lists values for "X" and corresponding values for "Y" and you have to figure out a single method that will turn X into Y for every pair on the list.

When I first looked at the problem I tried to figure out the trick or the formula. I even made a rough graph of the number pairs. And then I decided to use trial and error, which turned out to be the correct methodology.

One night my husband and I sent Rachel to bed and then stayed up another hour trying to solve two math problems. I was about to give up on the second question when Jeff announced, "I got it!" "What's the answer?" I asked wearily. "It is X squared minus 5." Ah, good old X squared.

So the next morning I told Rachel, "Try graphing the pairs and if the graph comes up shaped like the letter V, try squaring X."

I don't know if that tip is worth remembering, but I sure hope she heeds my advice to always check her work. It's all too easy to make simple

mistakes, like adding when you mean to subtract. Looking over your work can uncover these types of errors.

My daughter's writing can be neat, but is sometimes extremely tiny. I implore her to write larger.

"How can you go back and study these solutions? How do you expect the teacher to read this? Your homework is just one sheet out of 100. Give your teacher a break and write bigger."

"We're not going to hand this in," she says.

I breathe deeply and count to 10.

"How can you be sure that the teacher won't collect this?" I ask.

"She's not going to."

"Even if she doesn't collect it, she should still be able to read it if she walks past your desk." I say.



I hold back from adding, "Why did we put a desk in your room when you prefer using the family room couch as a homework station?"

I lean in over her shoulder and see that she has written the Pythagorean Theorem in the equivalent of a six-point font.

On the bright side, she's able to complete this assignment without any help. I ignore the fact that she's sitting hunched over using only the minimal natural light let in from a small opening in the curtains. I flip on the light switch as I leave the room.

I feel fortunate that my daughter likes math! She's already admitted that she tunes out my help because she just wants to figure out the answer on her own. I hope over time she grows more patient with herself. Patience is an asset when problem-solving, regardless of whether the problem involves math.

By the way, Fred and Ginger bought two Reese's Peanut Butter Cups, two Hershey Bars and a Nestle Crunch.



State tells drivers to buckle up

Law enforcement initiates a seat belt watch campaign

As motorists gear up for Memorial Day weekend road trips, they are being reminded to buckle up by local and state law enforcement officials.

A statewide "Buckle Up: Click it or Ticket" campaign kicked off in the Capital District Wednesday, May 14, with a press conference at the Capitol announcing that police will be on the lookout for un-belted drivers between May 19 and June 1.

Police around the state will be adding patrols looking for drivers without seat belts or improperly restrained children inside of vehicles. The west lawn of the Capitol building was filled with law enforcement vehicles, and there was also an inflated 30-foot gorilla wearing a seat belt.

Staff at the event handed out various promotional and informational materials to hundreds of people during the busy lunch hour. The press conference focused on the dangers of not wearing a seat belt and the number of lives saved each year by buckling up.

Municipal police departments

in Troy, Albany, Colonie and Bethlehem, and the Albany County Sheriff's Department, as well as New York State Police, were all on hand to tell people they will be on the lookout for seat belts over the next two weeks.

New York State Department of Motor Vehicles Commissioner David J. Swarts, Chief of Staff David Kelly of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and New York State Police Superintendent Harry J. Corbitt all reminded drivers and passengers to wear their seat belts.

"Wearing a seat belt is a simple thing motorists can do to help protect themselves in the event of a crash. Law enforcement, community leaders and traffic safety advocates across the state have worked hard to increase safety belt compliance and we should all be proud of their success. But more can be done," said Swarts. "Every life counts, that's why it is imperative that we continue to raise the safety belt compliance rate. The statistics prove that as seat belt usage increases, more lives are saved."

According to the state's DMV, motor vehicle crashes are one of the leading causes of death in the nation and the No. 1 cause of death for people between the ages of 2 and 34. Yet the department cites that 18 percent

of all drivers and passengers in the state — one in five — do not routinely wear their seat belts.

In 2006, there were 42,642 people killed on the nation's highways, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Among those killed, nearly 16,000 (37 percent) were not buckled up at the time of their accident.

Lt. Thomas Heffernan of the Bethlehem Police Department said municipalities are given grants by the state to add extra patrols to their jurisdictions until June 1.

"We normally try to do it around a holiday," Heffernan said of the 'Buckle Up' program. "This is in addition to our daily efforts, of course."

Police say that front-seat passengers over the age of 16 can be subject to a citation if the driver is pulled over, and that if the passenger is under 16, the driver will be issued the citation.

Motorists can expect routine roadblock stops, much like an inspection sticker stop or a DWI checkpoint, over the next two weeks as police look for seat belt violators. State police say last year's "Buckle-Up America Week" resulted in more than 10,000 tickets being issued to motorists who weren't wearing seat belts.



Debate offers little substance

There's an old movie-making adage that says if you go out of your way to show a telephone in the first act, it had better ring by the second.

In the race to succeed Mike McNulty, D-Green Island, in the 21st Congressional District, we've been shown nearly a dozen phones in the election's first act. Since then, some have been disconnected and some are seemingly off the hook, but none has yet rung with a clear message and resonance that connects with voters.

Democratic candidates John Aretakis, a trial attorney; Tracey Brooks, an attorney; Craig Burrige, executive director and CEO of the Pharmacists Society of the State of New York; Lester Freeman, a member of the Albany County Legislature; Darius Shahinfar, former Capital District Representative for Congresswoman Kirsten Gillibrand; Phil Steck, Albany County legislator; and Arthur Welsch — complete with self-promotional T-shirt — joined wait-and-see-candidate Paul Tonko for a debate hosted by the Service Employees International Union.

The debate was scheduled for only two hours, hardly enough time for eight people to give anything more than bumper-sticker slogans as answers to what were watered-down questions to begin with.

Candidates were asked about global warming, the war in Iraq and universal health care — issues that are hardly the most pertinent to the majority of their constituents.

But it gave the candidates an opportunity to give trite, safe statements on subjects that are easier to deal with than say, attracting forward-thinking businesses without selling out citizens, or addressing the exodus of intelligent, hard-working people from the state they represent.

Candidates should have opinions on serious national and global issues, but when they're given such a short timeframe as they were in their first debate, someone should have the sense to commandeer the podium and tell the voters what they want to know.

The argument can be made that this was only the first of many debates to be had before the Democratic Primary election on Sept. 9. But with the revolving door that has been put on this race, it may be the only debate for some.

So still, the phones aren't ringing, and so far, out of the eight would-be public servants that gathered for a debate on Wednesday, May 14, the candidate that has piqued the most interest has been Tonko, who waited until the debate to ambiguously throw his hat into the ring. And the interest doesn't come from his politics or anything he's done in the past or in this race so far.

It comes only because he was savvy enough to skip the first act.

Counting toes isn't enough

What does a mother do when she first looks at her newborn? Most will say: "Count every toe." Yet moms can do far more if they're concerned about the proper development of their children's feet, says Albany-based Dr. Mark Friedman, president of the Northeast division of the New York State Podiatric Medical Association. "Many people think of senior citizens when they think of podiatrists, but most podiatrists see as many children as they do adults as part of their everyday practices ... and they should be seeing more," he adds.

According to Friedman, some complications, such as flatfoot and ingrown toenails, can be inherited or caused in the womb. Others can occur as children begin their walk through life, from the occasional fall to an injury suffered playing a sport.

"No matter the cause or severity of the problem, the health of a child's feet should not be taken for granted," he advises. According to a recent survey by the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA) of parents with children under the age of 18, only 35 percent said that they would not be motivated to take their child to a doctor's office for foot or leg pain treatment. Furthermore, only 25 percent of those surveyed would take their child to see a podiatrist — a foot specialist.

Friedman has two theories that may explain these survey results. "Many people mistakenly believe that feet are supposed to hurt and therefore they don't take foot pain seriously. Others may not be aware that podiatrists are the specialists to see for foot pain."

To address these problems of perception, the New York State

Podiatric Medical Association has launched an educational initiative aimed at mothers-to-be and mothers now.

"Pregnant women should be aware that increased body weight can lead to painful foot conditions like over-pronation due to flat feet or plantar fasciitis which can be a cause of heel pain. Some can gain an entire foot size related to hormonal changes. It's common to experience leg cramps because of impeded circulation. Sometimes help can come from something as simple as a custom orthotic."

As for their babies' feet, Friedman provides the following answers to frequently-asked questions.

Is it normal for my baby's feet to look discolored, wrinkled or for his/her skin to peel when he/she is born?

Babies spend anywhere from nine to 10 months in a shelter of protective fluid. The feet need just as much time to fill out and turn a normal color as the rest of the body. Once you give birth, your obstetrician and then later your pediatrician will look for obvious abnormalities of your baby's feet and legs.

Are there certain things I can do to care for my baby's feet?

Caring for your baby's feet is no different than the care you provide to the rest of his/her body. Trim your child's toenails with baby nail clippers, making sure to cut straight across to prevent ingrown toenails. Also, be sure to thoroughly dry your baby's feet after a bath. Additionally, purchase items, such as an activity gym, which will allow your baby to move his/her legs and feet around. This will help him/her strengthen his/her muscles in preparation for walking.

At what age should my child take his/her first step?

When physically and emotionally ready, your child will walk. Comparisons with other children are misleading, since the age for independent walking

ranges from 10 to 18 months.

When should I put my baby in his/her first pair of shoes?

When your child first begins to walk, shoes are not necessary indoors. Allowing your youngster to go barefoot or to wear only socks helps the foot to grow normally and to develop its musculature and strength, as well as the grasping action of toes. Of course, when walking outside or on rough surfaces, babies' feet should be protected in lightweight, flexible footwear made of natural materials. Soft, hand-stitched shoes provide a safe environment for tiny toes while allowing plenty of room for foot growth and muscle development.

When is a child's foot fully developed, and why is this important?

Full skeletal maturity takes place in most individuals between the ages of 18 to 23 years of age. Foot maturity continues while many children are active on their feet. It is important to have your child's feet checked regularly by a podiatrist.

What steps should be taken to make sure a child's feet are not at risk when participating in sports?

When your child participates in sports, make sure they wear sport-specific shoes that fit properly. They should also warm up and cool down before and after participating in a sport and avoid poor outside playing conditions, such as very wet grass.

When should I take my child to see a podiatrist?

The American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA) recommends having your child examined by an APMA member podiatrist once he/she begins to walk to make sure his/her feet are progressing normally, especially if there is a family history of foot problems. Many APMA member podiatrists specialize in pediatrics. You can search for a podiatrist in your area by visiting NYSPMA's Web site, www.nyfootspecialists.com, and clicking on "Find a Podiatrist." You will find a list of podiatrists who you can call to see if they specialize in pediatrics.

Family oriented Yanni's Too expands hours

Coeymans restaurant hovers above the Hudson

Whether you're boating on the Hudson or driving along it, a Yanni's restaurant can be on your radar for waterfront dining seven days a week.


With two locations along the Hudson River at the Coeymans Landing Marina and in Athens, Greene County, indoor and outdoor dining can be found year round — and so can the calamari.

Both restaurants sport two decks, live entertainment, an extensive beer and wine selection, and fresh seafood, literally right off the boat. Award-winning chef Marc Yanni owns the restaurants and runs them with his wife and two teenage daughters.

Yanni says he only wants to give back to the community that has given so much to him.

"We try to do as much for this community and for the waterfront," Yanni said Thursday, May 15, while standing on the expansive deck of Yanni's Too in Coeymans. "People can come here and feel good. Our food is great, the atmosphere is relaxed ... and now we've become a staple in the community."

The Yanni family sponsors local Little League and bowling teams, and they hold various fundraisers and charitable events at their restaurants throughout the

year.

Yanni's Too, located at 16 Marina Drive, just south of the Village of Ravena on Main Street, has helped revitalize a previously unkempt waterfront in Coeyman's Landing after opening its doors in 2000.

"When we first got here, there were no sidewalks here," Yanni said. "We're always improving on this place. We added the decks and the whole building had to be redone when we first started. ... Every year it just gets better."

The décor of Yanni's Too

has an unmistakable port flare and can accommodate large parties, for which Yanni recommends a reservation if there are six or more people. In a single weekend night the restaurant will serve between 300 and 500 meals.

"That entire deck will turn over at least two or three times," Yanni said pointing to two decks complete with outdoor heaters along the marina.

Graduating from the Culinary Institute of America, Yanni along with other seasoned chefs, prepare everything from steaks and

burgers, to lobsters and oysters.

However, it's the domestic Rhode Island squid that everyone seems to be after — roughly 1,000 pounds of calamari are served up each week between Yanni's Too in Coeymans and Yanni's III in Athens.

"Calamari's the big deal, but that's what so nice about this place," Yanni said. "You could be sitting at the bar eating chicken wings and I could be sitting here right next to you eating a lobster."

Family run isn't just a marketing term for the

Yannis, it's a way of life.

"My wife runs the front of the restaurant and my two daughters work here, too," Yanni said. "This is a hard business, because we're so busy for such a short time. ... If me and my wife didn't work together, I would never see her."

Yanni's Too just expanded to seven days a week on Monday, May 19, and will remain open all week long throughout the summer until Columbus Day weekend.

During the off season, the restaurants are closed on Mondays and Tuesdays.

The new summer menu just came out at Yanni's Too, including a kid's menu with complete entrées starting at \$5.99. Appetizers range from \$6.50 for fresh zucchini sticks to \$13.99 for a seafood sampler and \$12.99 for an appetizer sampler.

Yanni's Famous Calamari, with choice of original style (tossed in lemon garlic wine sauce); Rhode Island style (with banana peppers); Calamari Red (with light marinara sauce); or Chipotle style (with a smoky jalapeno sauce), all cost \$8.99.

Entrées range from \$14.99 for chicken parmigiana, to \$21.99 seafood Pot Pie (fresh lobster, shrimp, scallops and white fish in a sherry cream sauce topped with a puff pastry).

Yanni's Too also offers fried baskets, and nightly and daily specials on dinners and desserts.

"You can come here every night without getting the same thing twice," Yanni said pointing to two-sided specials sign on wheels that lists 20 dinner and lunch specials and 10 dessert specials.

A family of four can expect to pay somewhere in the neighborhood of between \$60 to \$70 for an evening that includes an appetizer, entrées and dessert.

"It's great here," said chef Rich Harris, who has worked with Yanni for nine years. "We're always cooking something different."

Yanni said that his talented chefs include Harris and Jack Armstrong at Yanni's Too, and Errol Farr and John Upstick at Yanni's III.

It's all about family and friends and enjoying the majestic Hudson River, according to Yanni, whose name is on the line when it comes to the quality of his restaurants.

"My last name is Yanni," he joked, "so it better be good."

price — \$101.77.

Fish said his company, Wood Grain Quality Furnishings, has been struggling to find new delivery routes that conserve on gas.

"We try to keep our deliveries within 150 miles, and we try to fill up down near Pennsylvania where the prices are cheaper," said Fish.

For Fish, the \$1,200 tax rebate due to him and his wife won't go for a big television or a shiny new diamond ring.

"I'll be putting it into my outstanding heating and fuel bill, which is almost exactly \$1,200," he said.

With rising fuel costs, an unsteady housing market and the price of necessities like food skyrocketing, most consumers in the state will be spending their rebate on bills or paying off debt, according to Douglas Lonnstrom at the Siena Research Institute.

Lonnstrom said studies have shown that roughly 50 percent of all consumers will pay down bills; another 20 percent will save; and 25 percent will spend.

"With high energy costs and with the costs of everything else being up, consumer confidence is down," said Lonnstrom who noted that consumer confidence in the

state is currently 22 points off the national average and that national consumer confidence has hit all-time lows.

"Much of it is due to the recession and inflation and the continued bad news consumers are seeing everyday in the media," he said.

Lannstrom said one of the few good signs coming out of the current economy is a slight rebound in the housing market.

"We're turning the corner," he said.

But Lonnstrom said that the

ly's refund to pay for her 23-year-old son's \$1,400 dental work.

"He has a job in Colorado, but he doesn't have any health insurance," said Spalding.

Senior citizen George Eagles works for Boscov's in Clifton Park Center. Eagles, 76, said he wouldn't be participating in his employer's gift card incentive program that gives a 10 percent bonus to consumers who spend their rebate checks at the store.

"I'm going to be paying my bills, not spending money," said Eagles.

Those that do spend their rebates are also looking more carefully at where and how they spend.

Thrift stores and second-hand boutiques like Plato's Closet, with locations in Albany and Rotterdam are seeing booming sales numbers.

"Our Albany store has seen a 25 percent increase in sales in this year alone because people are shopping with us instead of going to the mall," said owner Kellie Robertson. "And we're doing so well in Rotterdam we just hired another staff member."

Shoppers at Plato's Closet like that they can buy expensive designer label clothing for only a fraction of the price.

Stacy Morrison, 22, of Scotia said she once bought a shirt at Plato's for \$10.

"It still had the tag's on it for \$90," said Morrison.

Plato's Closet also allows people to sell lightly used designer clothes in exchange for store credit or cold hard cash.

Robertson said she's been buying more clothes since the economy took a turn for the worse earlier this year.

Kathy and her daughter Brittany Stahura, of Amsterdam, got about \$20 for a trash bag full of old clothes.

"This is fun money," said Kathy Stahura, "but my rebate check is going right into the gas tank."

federal government's plan to spur the economy with a rebate won't work.

"It will by and large hardly make a blip," he said.

Michael Zovistoski, the president of the northeast chapter of the state Society of Certified Public Accountants and an accountant with UHY in Albany, said he recommends that consumers invest their rebates since it is "essentially found money."

Zovistoski said the volatile stock market may actually lead to excellent buying opportunities.

He also suggested investing in Roth IRAs, popular retirement investments that are often viewed as safe.

For families with young children, Zovistoski suggests saving for their children's education in 529 plans, which are often matched with state grants and scholarships.

"If you have a child 10 years away from college, that money will double," said Zovistoski.

Still, many consumers have more urgent concerns.

Sue Spalding, of Clifton Park, said she plans to spend her fami-

Retailers look to capitalize on rebate shoppers

The toy store is empty except for owner Michael Richman, who stands by the doorway of the store playing with an "Invisible UFO," a spinning disk attached to his finger by a thin string. He's trying to attract shoppers who walk by in the parking lot, headed for one of the several restaurants on the strip or looking for a bargain at nearby Marshall's.

Richman controls the disk like a puppeteer, like someone who has spent more time playing with the disk lately than selling it.

That is not to say the locally owned boutique doesn't have cool items on its neatly stocked and brightly lit shelves — it does. But, like many retailers, Richman is feeling the pinch of a downturn in the economy.

"It's spelled like 'rich man,'" jokes Richman referring to his own last name. "I'm not there yet, but I'm working on it."

Richman opened his novelty store TaDa at Clifton Park Center in November. Though he admits the store isn't breaking any profit records, he said he doesn't worry about the economy so much.

"Cousin Suzie is still having a birthday and so is Uncle Joe," said Richman. "You can't stop birthdays, and with them come gifts."

He did say though, that his store has attempted to reasonably price gifts to attract families when they receive their tax rebates this spring.

Richman's store isn't the only one trying to attract rebate shoppers who, as part of the federal economic stimulus package will receive a rebate of \$600 for single taxpayers. For married

couples filing jointly, the cap is \$1,200.

There's also a \$300 rebate for every child who was under 17 at the end of last year.

So for example, a couple with three young children could expect a \$2,100 rebate.

At large retailers like Wal-Mart, Kmart and Sears, consumers are encouraged to cash their checks in the store and receive a store gift card. In exchange for receiving the business, these stores will tack an additional 10 percent on to the card.

So for that family of five, \$2,100 turns into \$2,310 in store credit.

"We're trying to make the dollar stretch," said Kristen Whipple, a spokeswoman for Sears, which also owns Kmart Stores. "We're not trying to encourage spending if a person isn't planning to spend, but for those wanting to get more energy efficient appliances or other needed items, the checks will go a little further."

Deborah Sturm Rausch, director of public information at the state Consumer Protection Board, said consumers should be wary of gift card offers that sound too good to be true and should only participate in programs at reliable stores. She said people should read the fine print when enrolling in such programs to ensure there aren't any hidden fees or service charges.

"There's also the possibility that a company goes out of business while your balance is still outstanding," said Rausch. "You should find out what happens if a store closes."

Rausch also said consumers would be better served if they paid down credit card debt.

"When you're paying high finance or interest fees, you're spending, even if you aren't realizing it," said Rausch. "We want to encourage consumers to make good decisions in the current fiscal climate."

Some recommended uses of the rebate check by the state CPB are:

- Pay down credit-card debt.
- Make a payment toward a hybrid or more-fuel efficient car to help reduce gasoline expenses.
- Purchase energy-efficient appliances and light bulbs that will reduce utility costs and result in long-term energy savings. Purchasing and installing home and pipe insulation will also accomplish this.
- Buy household items that have long shelf lives, like laundry detergent and toiletries, in bulk to reduce weekly shopping bills.
- Prepay membership and/or association fees if consumers belong to these groups, or make a payment to defray other monthly expenses. Some businesses, like gyms and delivery services, have discounts toward an annual fee compared to a monthly charge.
- By pre-paying the annual fee, people can take advantage of the long-term saving.
- Make a payment toward the principal on a mortgage.
- Prepay school tuition.
- Prepay for heating for next year.
- Purchase government bonds and CD's to save money and earn interest on which they can count.

what they want with it, according to Cunningham. But according to some landowners, the plan could do more harm than good by tying the hands of large landowners in town and actually taking options and opportunities away from them. Some residents previously criticized the board for not including enough farmers and large landowners in CACC.

The town's senior planner, Robert Leslie, stressed that landowners would get their say and would be a part of the planning process if they wanted to.

"We're making sure willing landowners are a part of the plan," Leslie said. "We're not taking a plan from another town and putting our name on it. We want to hear what Bethlehem wants."

Once adopted, the open space plan will be the overriding template or guideline the town uses for future growth.

Thursday's public hearing was meant as the "kicking off" of shaping the open spaces plan. Behan said that he and the town will continue to collect input from residents and CACC, which is acting as a lead advisory agency, until the holiday season, after which time a report will be issued to the Town Board.

Department of Economic Development Director George Leveille said the town was looking for initial feedback on what is to go into the plan and where residents rank their priorities over the matter.

"We're talking about concepts. ... Think about values that can

guide the community," Leveille told residents. "So at the end of the day, we'll find common ground on what's important to you."

Behan said that people are realizing "land is finite," citing that \$6.3 billion was approved by voters for local conservation spending in 2006. He added "New York state is the leader in open space planning."

Councilmen Mark Hennessey and Sam Messina were also on hand during the two-hour public workshop.

Messina said he sat in and listened to the residents in several different groups, and he was surprised by how different each group's perspective on open space was. He also noted that despite the big turnout overall, there was not a very large representation from residents of inner Delmar.

Several key components were reiterated by most of the groups when they reconvened shortly before 9 p.m. to report their findings to everyone left at the meeting.

Keeping land sustainable; protecting natural resources; tax relief for landowners maintaining open space; landowner respect; respect for the land; and keeping the open spaces plan "a living document," were some of the repeated concepts.

"The open space protection place is important to the community," Cunningham told residents at the end of the meeting, after thanking them for coming. "Your participation is integral to its success."

CACC holds a public meeting that focuses on the open space plan and other conservation issues on the second Monday of each month at Town Hall at 7 p.m.

Cemetery gets spruced up

Scouts honor veterans on Memorial Day with graveside flags

As buglers, bagpipe players and drummers prepare for the Memorial Day parade, Boy Scout Troop 58 and the Bethlehem Cemetery in Delmar prepared in a different way.

With the support of the Nathaniel Adams Blanchard American Legion Post 1040, scouts placed flags beside the graves of veterans at the Bethlehem Cemetery over the weekend of May 17 and 18. The cemetery itself has stepped up its cleaning and grooming efforts in honor of the big weekend.

Valerie Newell, administrator and secretary to the Bethlehem Cemetery's Board of Directors, said the cemetery relies on the hard work of Troop 58 each year.

"They come in annually, and they put the flags up on the graves. ... We have 16 acres of land, so that's quite a job," Newell said. "The flags stay up right until after the Fourth of July ... and we return them to the American Legion Post."

Newell said the scouts provide a service that might otherwise not be performed.

"We have a volunteer board of directors ... and it would be difficult for us to do," Newell said, adding that Bethlehem Cemetery is privately owned and not town owned. "It's nice to know they

are there for us. They're very responsible about it."

Memorial Day isn't strictly for honoring fallen soldiers in Newell's mind.

"Whether we're veterans or not," she said, "Memorial Day is celebrated by everyone and is a time to remember their loved ones ... and the cemetery is a special place to memorialize loved ones."

However, the cemetery is the final resting place to several, of what Newell described as, "very famous soldiers," and she said she is honored to be a local part of the national holiday.

The cemetery is currently in the middle of several new initiatives, according to Newell, and is looking to go more "green" in the future.

Incorporated in 1865, Newell said many people think the cemetery is filled up or reaching capacity, but that is not the case. The cemetery seems full if looking from the road, but the grounds extend quite a distance beyond what you can see from the road, she said.

A project the Bethlehem Cemetery Board of Directors hopes to see blossom is the creation of a flower-cutting garden. The garden could be filled with flowers given by businesses and private donations, said Newell, for visitors to pick and leave graveside rather than items that cannot be composted like Mylar balloons, flower wrappers and plastic containers.

Newell cited other memorialization projects in the works, such as a children's memorial area; a holiday tree to be decorated and

adorned with habitat-friendly items by family and friends; a letters to loved ones box; and even a remembrance blood drive.

"A cemetery is a very sacred place. ... I really do love the cemetery. I was surprised myself, but I do," said Newell. "It's really special, it's really the most special job. ... I try to make things better during a difficult time."

Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce President Marty DeLaney agreed saying the cemetery was an integral part of town. The chamber recently honored the cemetery at its annual award ceremony.

"During the Bethlehem Chamber's 50th anniversary year, we thought about chamber members in town who have been continuously operating for 100 years or more," said DeLaney. "Applebee Funeral Home came to mind, then the Bethlehem Cemetery and, of course, the many well known churches that are the mainstays of our community. Bethlehem's roots go back to its incorporation in 1793, giving us a rich history to teach our kids and grandkids about."

Newell said the cemetery will be ready for Memorial Day thanks to the flags, which were placed with donations of time, funds and materials by members of the community, family and friends, but especially to Pangburn Landscaping, Taylor Monument and Bennett Contracting.

"The flag dedication is really a wonderful thing," Newell said. "That's something the whole community can enjoy because the parade goes right by there."

lehem \$13,800 for the rights; the state agency is also approaching individual landowners along the stream about access.

The DEC has offered to pay landowners for the rights to a public easement along the Onesquethaw Creek on their property. The shallow stream runs from the border of New Scotland in South Bethlehem then across

and down into the town of Coeymans near Selkirk.

One property owner, Linda Jasinski, said she was offered \$2,000 by the DEC for an easement along 1,000 feet of her property bordering the Onesquethaw. She said she was told the offered \$2,000 was for life and that the easement would have been deeded to her land if she had accepted.

Jasinski said she had no intention of taking the offer and frequently has to tell trespassers to leave her property.

"For some piddly amount I can relinquish my fishing rights?" Jasinski rhetorically asked during the meeting. "I still have to kick people out every [fishing] season. ... I enjoy my peace and quiet."

Dawson said she wanted to wait to vote on the matter.

"What would be the downside of tabling this until the Open Space Committee can look at this?" asked Dawson. "I'm quite frankly uncomfortable passing this tonight."

Cunningham responded that it was not an open space matter and that entering an agreement with the DEC wouldn't affect the matter of trespassing along the banks of the Onesquethaw.

"It's an enforcement matter," he said.

Dawson quietly voted "yes" on the measure after all four other board members voted in favor of its passing. When asked about her vote after the meeting took place, Dawson confirmed that she did vote in favor of it.

Councilman Sam Messina, who said he is an avid fisherman, joked, "I may not be much

of a fisherman, but I do go fishing a lot." He said he was in favor of the DEC agreement.

Messina said he was skeptical of one resident's claim that opening town land to the public will result in a large number of anglers trespassing on private land.

"I respect that and certainly the rights of the homeowners," Messina said. "They (DEC sites) don't draw a lot of cars and they don't draw a lot of fishers."

Councilman Mark Hennessey asked if people were already fishing in the creek on town property to which Cunningham answered, "yes."

Councilman Kyle Kotary agreed with Cunningham that the trespassing problem is an enforcement issue, saying, "People shouldn't be trespassing regardless of whether we pass this."

Cunningham encouraged homeowners to report trespassing on private land along the Onesquethaw Creek to the Bethlehem Police Department or to the DEC, and he reminded residents to post signs on private property.

Jasinski described her experience of calling the DEC and town police about trespassers a waste of time, saying "Don't even bother with the DEC, it took them three hours to come to my house ... and the local police aren't much better."

Cunningham told residents "nothing's sold" at this point. An official agreement has yet to be signed between the town of Bethlehem and the state's DEC, but the supervisor now has the authority to do so.







Women should rule the world...beside men, not in place of them

When former White House press secretary Dee Dee Myers set out to write her recent book, she did so with the certainty of two things:

1. The title would be *Why Women Should Rule the World*.
2. The world would be a better place with more women leaders.

"The title was meant to be provocative, a bit tongue-in-cheek," said Myers, who at the age of 31 was asked by President Bill Clinton to become the first female press secretary in United States history. "Do I think that women are better than men and can do a better job at lead-

ing than men? No. And I don't think that men do a better job than women. What I'm saying is that women are different—and they bring different strengths to public life. We would all be better if women had their place beside men."

These differences—which can influence the decisions and actions of women, as well as how they are perceived by both themselves and others—will be the subject of Myers' keynote presentation at the Seventh Annual Key4Women Forum, to be held June 10, 8:30 a.m., at the Hall of Springs in Saratoga Springs.

Here she shares some of her thoughts about men, women and leadership.

In your book you talk a lot about the physiological differences between men and women. Can you discuss some of these differences and how they shape leadership styles?

If you have experience with young girls and boys, you can see that beginning at the earliest ages, there are differences in interests and attitudes. For example, girls tend to play more cooperatively; boys tend to engage more in the rough and tumble. Many of these dif-

ferences begin in the brain. Studies show that men and women react to stress differently. They approach relationships differently. They process information and make decisions differently. The fact is, men and women experience the world differently, and these experiences shape our priorities and values. And we need to acknowledge these differences, otherwise we'll just keep expecting women to act like men. And we'll never be as good at being men as men. Then, we need to start valuing the skills and strengths that women bring as much as we value those that men bring. And that's when things will really start to change.

Whether it is in the community, a business or government, women bring a new perspective. I like to tell the story of Kay Bailey Hutchison, the first woman from Texas to be elected to the United States Senate. Early in her career, she was working and contributing to her IRA. But after she got married, she temporarily stopped working and found she could no longer contribute to it. So as soon as she arrived in the senate, she authored a bill that gave women who stay at home the same opportunity to contribute to IRAs as women who work. It's not that men were out to get women or wanted to exclude them; rather, it was a life experience none of the men had ever bumped up against.

What is the value of these differences?

This diverse perspective is why expanding the pool is so important. Catalyst, an organization that tracks women in business, looked at a number of different companies, across a range of sectors. And they found that companies with the most women on their boards and in senior management positions were substantially more profitable than those with the fewest.

Similarly, more women in elected and appointed positions would make government more representative. And empowering women around the world would make societies fairer—and help us resolve conflicts and sustain peace. In other words, it's not the politically correct thing to do; it's the smart thing to do.

There is a difference between bringing in a new perspective and having your voice heard, and you provide several examples in your book of women, including yourself, struggling to be heard. What have you learned from these experiences; and do you have advice for other women who might face similar circumstances?

During my years in the White House, I found myself in a situation that I know a lot of other women have faced: a job with more responsibility than authority. And as a result, I struggled.

When other women find themselves in similar predicaments, the first thing they need to do is recognize the problem—and work hard to change it at the outset. Like me, most probably have more power than they realize.

Second, women need to ask for tools they need to do their jobs; too often, we don't. And finally, women

should reach out to other women. That's one of the things I should have done more of during my White House years. We women can draw strengths from each other, and there is more support available than we sometimes realize.

In one example in your book, referencing U.S. secretary of labor Alexis Herman's role in the UPS labor strike, you say she snuck up on people not because she was tougher than expected but rather because she was better than expected. Can you discuss this a little more?

The secret to Secretary Herman's success was her ability to earn the trust of both labor and management, to bring them together around their shared interests—and to keep them

talking, even when things got difficult. She was plenty tough when she had to be. But more often, she helped the two sides see how they could both get what they needed, how they could make it a win-win outcome. Those are qualities that I think women often bring to their jobs.

And part of this is changing the workplace and the expectations of women in the workplace?

Yes. Companies are learning that to attract the best pool of workers, they need to become more flexible. And they need to view flexibility not as a "favor" to women, but as an investment in the bottom line. Keeping people employed who understand and contribute to a business' success is not just a benefit. It is in the best long-term interest of the company.

Studies show that many professional women looking for this flexibility are starting their own businesses. After leaving the White House you made that transition. You even work from home. Any tips for other women business owners, or women who want to start their own business?

The changing economy is creating even more opportunity for this. If you're going to start at home, like me, my one piece of advice is to be disciplined enough to get the work done. In the beginning, this was a little difficult for me, but it has gotten a lot easier. My experience has been great.

And what about goals? You once used the White House as the return address on a letter you mailed to a friend, before you even joined the Clinton campaign. Was working at the White House a goal?

I never even imagined it. I worked on a lot of losing campaigns. So it just kind of happened. But I do think goals are important. For me, this book was important, and having it written and published is rewarding. Still, people need to remember that there is not one path to success. When we share our stories, our setbacks are as important as any of our accomplishments. Success, like life, doesn't always go according to plan.

Making connections in Iraq

Local soldier aids police with communication

Radio communications can be the difference between life and death for Iraqi security forces.

Whether it be reinforcements or medical aid arriving at the scene of an incident in time to save a life, it can come down to a simple transmission of radio communications between an Iraqi policeman on patrol and his patrol station monitoring the radio network to provide necessary assistance if and when required.

The Iraqi police force's effectiveness in helping its citizens comes down to whether or not it can respond quickly to problems in its area of operations.

"Iraqi police have grown in numbers - now their systems need to grow to match those numbers," said 1st Lt. David DeLong, a native of Delmar, who is a communications officer with the Multi-National Division-Baghdad's 18th Military Police Brigade.

A function of the brigade's police transition team mission in Baghdad is to assess and develop police force systems. The brigade has developed the enhanced police transition team in an effort to focus on improving the systems of the Iraqi police organization.

"People will die if communications aren't working," said 18th Brigade 1st Lt. Christopher Gehri, a transition team officer. "Communications is one of the primary systems you need to be a successful police force. Without an effective communications system in place, you won't be able to address

people's problems."

DeLong is part of the brigade that visits Iraqi police stations' higher headquarters in Baghdad to examine the communication systems as part of a program to assess and determine the requirements needed to develop a legitimate police force.

"The Iraqi police were very happy to have someone who knows communications to talk with them and lend some additional advice," said DeLong. "I was impressed with the knowledge of their communications systems that they have and that they knew where they wanted to get to in the future with their systems."

Internet communication is important and vital for the passing of information between the police stations and headquarters in Baghdad, DeLong added.

"The hardest part of this mission

is getting the [system] automated," said DeLong. "Once we have accomplished that, we will be one step closer to getting the job done."

The job DeLong is referring to is improving the systems in Baghdad so they can independently move toward a rule of law in Baghdad, he said.

After visiting different stations in the organization, DeLong went to the Baghdad Patrol headquarters communications center Wednesday, April 30, to further examine the communications system in place. During his visit, DeLong observed areas related to the Internet connectivity between the stations that could be improved.

"They have shortfalls with Internet connectivity, and their staff is now trying to fix these shortfalls with our assistance," said DeLong.







Swedish actress Cicilia Sedvall plays a range of characters inspired by Astrid Lindgren's writings including "Pippi Longstocking" in this world premiere co-production with Sweden's Theater Västmanland.

When Cicilia Sedvall first came to the United States from Sweden to take part in a cultural exchange with the New York State Theatre Institute, she was able to lean on other actors to help overcome her unfamiliarity with English. "There were people all around me," she said. "My lines were in answer to something."

There's no such safety net now, as Sedvall is alone on stage for NYSTI's latest production, "Letters from a Window in the Sky."

"It's very much fun, but the thing that is difficult is that it is not my language," she said.

The play by NYSTI guest artist Mary Jane Hansen is about a young girl named Cicilia - written with Sedvall in mind - who is home bored one day and is inspired by a Pippi Longstocking book. The show coincides with the 100th anniversary of the birth of "Pippi" author Astrid Lindgren, who is something of a hero to Sedvall and fellow Swedes.

"She's like holy in Sweden," Sedvall said.

"She's thrilled to be taking part in a show commemorating Lindgren's birth, but even more so to be doing it outside her own country."

"I'm so proud to be doing it here," she said. "You know 'Pippi,' but you don't necessarily know all the other books. I'm so proud to have the opportunity to spread her name out."

Sedvall, whose favorite Lindgren book is probably "The Children of Noisy Village" and not any of the books about the orphaned, pig-tailed Pippi, said the attraction in Lindgren's books is that she treats children like "small-sized people."

"She doesn't look at children and see children," she said. "She tells us, 'Don't forget about the kid in you.'"

That theme resonates in "Letters from a Window in the Sky." Restless on a rainy day, Cicilia pulls out a Pippi Longstocking book, but she soon puts it aside, thinking she's too old for it. She's feeling trapped and friendless.

"She's different, and she doesn't want to be," Sedvall said.

Then Cicilia's guitar starts to talk to her, urging her to go to a nearby lake. There, Cicilia rescues a duck, marking the only time Sedvall shares the stage (a robotic duck is voiced by NYSTI company member David Bunce). The duck rescue, incidentally, was based on a real Sedvall experience.

The duck, dubbed Mr. Magnus Nilsson, takes Cicilia on a fantastic journey, during

which her self-esteem gets a big boost.

"She discovers she doesn't want to be anyone else," Sedvall said. "She wants to be herself. That's good enough."

The play has plenty of silliness for kids - it opens with Sedvall hanging upside down on a jungle gym - but Sedvall and NYSTI publicist Sarah Howes said it will appeal to grown-ups as well.

"There are a lot of things that address adults," Sedvall said. "The kids will be laughing, and the adults will be laughing, too, but in a different way."

Howes, who noted the audience can sing along with plenty of musical numbers, said NYSTI has done

a couple of other one-person plays and is excited for this one to kick off.

"It's fun to see how it all comes together," she said.

heads in disbelief.

For instance, there is a chance that Bethlehem's baseball team could finish with the best record in the Suburban Council Gold Division; but Guilderland could get a higher seed because it has the same number of Sectional points and owns a tiebreaker over the Eagles. That would be contingent on Guilderland winning its final two league games including Thursday's contest against Bethlehem.

It's not as if Guilderland hasn't seen the same thing happen to it in other sports. In recent years,

its boys basketball and boys lacrosse teams were seeded lower than teams with worse records because they didn't have more Sectional points. And other schools have had the same thing happen to their teams. It's a byproduct of the points system.

One might wonder if it would be better just to seed teams based on their records, but it's not that simple. If a class A Patroon Conference team finishes with an undefeated league record and has only one non-league loss, does that mean it's better than a class A Suburban Council team that finished with three league losses and was undefeated against non-league class A competition? The strength of schedule vs. resulting record argument would likely go

around in circles.

Look, no playoff-determining system is perfect. Think about all the ways the Section II football committee has tinkered with arranging its teams to make determining playoff teams more cut and dry, only to have a three-way tie develop for the final playoff spot. Then, it has to fall back on the quarter points system to determine which team gets in, and it turns out to be the one that lost to the other two. It's happened more often than I think the committee would like to see it happen.

Unfortunately, most high school sports seasons don't last long enough to allow the cream to fully rise to the top. Football, soccer, baseball, softball and lacrosse only get six to eight weeks to wrap up their regular seasons. If a team does well in games against opponents that are worth only one point but loses a game that's worth two points, it could become the difference between a No. 2 and a No. 3 seed, and there isn't enough time to make up for that one loss.

Still, not having a points system would create headaches for Section II playoff seeding committees which then have to take into account how the teams accumulated their records.

So the Section II points system can be cruel, but it's the only thing that prevents gridlock at Sectional playoff committee meetings.

It still drives me crazy, though, and I don't think I'm the only one who feels that way.

Monday.

"We were fortunate to get some close wins this season and to get good pitching and timely hitting," said Dorrance.

R-C-S now waits to see where it will be seeded for the Section II, Class B playoffs. The Indians are in competition with Ichabod Crane and Chatham from the Patroon Conference for the top seed.

"That would be great if that happened," said Dorrance of earning the No. 1 seed, "but it's out of my control. We had a non-league win against Chatham earlier this season, but we also had a non-league loss against Hudson. So, we'll have to wait and see."

R-C-S will warm up for Sectionals with some non-league games. After playing Big 10 leader LaSalle Tuesday, the Indians meet Watervliet Wednesday.

"We're going to try to pick up another game later this week," said Dorrance.

While R-C-S is in line for a top-two seed, Bethlehem has to win

its final two Suburban Council Gold Division games or have Guilderland lose once to lock up at least a No. 2 seed for the class AA Sectionals. The Eagles (9-3, 14-5) entered Tuesday's game against Ballston Spa with 14 standings points, one point ahead of the Dutchmen. The two teams meet in Thursday's regular season finale.

"Right now, I think my team is ready to go," said Bethlehem coach Rob Helm. "We're playing good baseball."

The Eagles flexed their muscles Saturday with an 18-6 non-league win against Amsterdam. Bethlehem hit three home runs including a shot by Craig Wilcox, who finished a triple shy of the cycle.

"That's really great because he hasn't played a lot this season," Helm said of Wilcox, who also hit a double and a single. "I root for guys like that."

Will DeRuve and Matt Branigan also homered for Bethlehem, which possesses one of the top offenses in the Suburban Council with a team batting average of .350.

"When you have a team batting average of .350, you know you're scoring some runs," said Helm.

Mooney earns draw at Armory

Liz Mooney walked into the Washington Avenue Armory ring May 17 with an opportunity to move up in the world women's welterweight boxing rankings.

She walked out of the ring no better or no worse than where she had started.

Mooney - the third-ranked woman welterweight - fought No. 2 ranked Miriam Brakache to an eight-round draw in the featured bout of Saturday's seven-bout card at the Armory.

"I think it was a warranted decision. I didn't do enough to win," said Mooney, a 38-year-old fighter from Feura Bush.

Brakache got in some good shots at Mooney during the first four rounds, but Mooney came back with a strong effort in the final half of the bout to earn the draw.

"She definitely got her punches off first, and she was throwing them from an awkward position," said Mooney. "I had to adjust to her style, and I was able to get some punches off later on."

Though she missed her opportunity to move past Brakache and become the No. 1 contender for the world welterweight title, Mooney was happy with her effort.

"Every time I get in that ring, I'm proud of myself - win, lose or draw," said Mooney, who has a professional record of 5-3-1. "I can pat myself on the back."

Several more local boxers had a chance to shine at Saturday's fight card, which was put together by Delmar gym owner Rick Sweeney. The bout with the most buzz in the two-thirds-filled arena was between Guilderland's Mike Farragon and Los Angeles native Khadaphi Proctor. Farragon - who signed a professional contract with legendary promoter Shelly Finkel and Oscar De La Hoya's Golden Boy Productions company last

One area baseball team wrapped up a title, while another is closing in on one.

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk won its first Colonial Council crown


Costello helped his own cause in the bottom of the third inning when he followed Tommy Ganley's single with a two-run home run over the left-center field wall.

Point system isn't perfect

I've always thought of myself as a person who likes working with numbers. I mean, 75 percent of my job is dealing with statistics (the other 25 percent is divided between dealing with coaches,

players and irate parents).

But I have to admit I hate dealing with points systems. It seems simple enough on the surface (one point for a divisional win, two points for a non-divisional win - simple), but there's a complication when points trump won-loss records.


Section II committee members would point out that without a points system, seeding playoff teams in several sports would be a laborious process. Imagine if the Section II baseball committee didn't have a points system to help it determine how to seed the class A playoffs - a class that includes teams from five leagues. The odds of having more than three teams from different leagues with the same record are pretty good, especially for a

short season. Without a points system, the debates for who gets the higher seed would likely go on for hours.

Still, the points system can create controversy when you have a team with a better record seeded lower than another team from the same league just because the other team has more Sectional points. That can make the first team feel slighted and make outside observers scratch their
