Taxpayers balk at levy hike

Supervisor defends numbers as residents question police costs

After a lengthy budget presentation by Supervisor Jack Cunningham, the public got to weigh in on the proposed 6.87 percent tax increase, and the supervisor was chided into making a revela-

"None of you are up for re-election this year ... and I was wondering if the budget would be up this high if you were up for reelection?" asked Delmar resident William Stewart.

Cunningham responded, "I will tell you I run every two years for this office, I intend to run next year for this office, and if I didn't think this was the reasonablething to do in the best interest of this community I wouldn't be

sitting here doing it. I don't set my budget because I am or not running for office, I am doing it because it's the responsible thing to do."

Bethlehem unveiled its \$38.67 million spending plan for next year during the Wednesday, Sept. 24, board meeting.

Next year, Democratic board member Kyle Kotary and Independence board member Sam Messina are up for re-election, along with Cunningham, a Democrat.

The proposed budget constitutes a 2.8 percent spending increase over this year's \$37.63 million budget and an overall 6.89 tax rate increase for the town's combined general fund, highway department tax rate, and water

and sewer district tax rates.

The proposed tax rate increase would result in a \$17.45 increase per \$100,000 of assessed value. Cunningham said the average home assessment in Bethlehem is \$285,000 and during his presentation, he told residents that not all tax increases are equal.

Ravena woman charged with DWI, marijuana possession

Bethlehem police arrested a Ravena woman for driving while intoxicated in Selkirk and discovered she was carrying a bag of marijuana when they booked her at the police station.

Sandra L. Wilson, 35, was arrested on Thursday, Oct. 16, for DWI; driving with a bloodalcohol content of 0.08 percent or greater; unlawful possession of marijuana; and driving on the shoulder of the roadway.

Police said an officer on routine patrol saw Wilson driving south on Route 9W and observed her vehicle drive onto the shoulder of the road.

Fine Home Remodeling

Wilson was stopped by police and officers could smell alcohol on her breath while interviewing her and said they saw her display signs of intoxication, according to the arrest report.

When asked if she had been drinking, Wilson told police she had four drinks before driving home from an Albany bar on Delaware Avenue, according to the arrest report.

Police said Wilson failed three field-sobriety tests and tested positive for alcohol before being taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department for processing. There she submitted to a chemical test

that revealed a BAC above 0.08 percent, according to the report, and police discovered a clear plastic bag containing marijuana in Wilson's possession while processing her.

Wilson attempted to call her husband from the police station. but was unable to contact him, and her vehicle was towed from the scene, the report states.

She was arraigned before Town Justice Paul Dwver and scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Wednesday, Nov. 5, before being transported to her home by taxi.



Gordon cites experience and independence

Assemblyman says he's ready to tackle New Yorkers' problems

The state's only Independence Party Assembly member says this year's campaign against Conservative Steve

McLaughlin. may be a little different because he's used to being the underdog, but he's not resting on his laurels.

This will be my fourth campaign, and I was always an underdog," said Assemblyman

Tim Gordon. "So not being an underdog is different, but we're not taking anything for granted. ... We're taking it really seriously and doing the right things."

Gordon, I-Bethlehem, is finishing his first two-year term in the state Assembly after coming from the Bethlehem Town Board, and he is running for re-election on his record in office. He is Bethlehem's Independence Party chairman and is running on both the Independence and Democratic lines.

Gordon lost his first political race for Bethlehem town supervisor before being elected twice to the Bethlehem Town Board and then to the state Assembly. He said he wants to continue his platform of state reform and wants to help tackle the problems facing New York, such as rising energy costs, costs of living and a statewide population

"I've developed a lot of great working relationships with officials and businesses. Now I'm asking the people to recognize that it has been productive for the past two years," Gordon said. "With the challenges we are facing now, I would ask them to renew my lease and ask for their support because my No. 1 priority is represent them and be their voice in the New York State assembly.'

In his first term, Gordon has authored and sponsored 12 bills that passed both the Assembly and the Senate before being signed into law by the governor. He also penned five other bills that passed the Assembly but did not make it out of the Senate. Among those bills turned into law was a Jonathan's Law Amendment.

The assemblyman also netted \$3 million for the Vista Technology Campus in Bethlehem and an unrestricted \$500,000 for the Bethlehem School District.

Gordon is the founder of Albany Media Group, an advertising and public relations firm, and has been a community volunteer for many years. As a firefighter in North Bethlehem, he was awarded the Heroic Effort Award in 2004.

Gordon lives with his wife, Christine, and four children in Slingerlands and is a 1978 Shaker High School graduate and a 1982 SUNY Brockport graduate.

"I'm not a politician, I'm a businessman," said McLaughlin. "I've never voted to raise your taxes, and I never will if I have the honor of serving as the next Assemblyman for the 108th District.'

McLaughlin; C-Melrose, is a businessman and former airline pilot. He is an enrolled Conservative and will be on both the Conservative and Republican lines on Nov. 6.

D-Manhattan, and failing to reform a "dysfunctional Albany."

"My family is everything to me, and I know how difficult it is now for hardworking people who are struggling to fill up their gas tanks and pay their rising property tax bills," said McLaughlin. He earned his bachelor's degree from Empire State College and his master's degree from the University at Phoenix. McLaughlin is an active volunteer as a baseball coach for the Hoosic Valley Athletic Association and as a Catholic Youth Organization's basketball coach.

"We need a change in Albany that will: help ease this middle class squeeze by capping property taxes, cutting gasoline taxes, and making health care more affordable through tax deductions, reforms and credits," added McLaughlin. "As Assemblyman, I will work across party lines for common sense solutions to help regular folks and give them the peace of mind they need and deserve."

The fair will feature adoption agencies, attorneys, social workers, and adoptive parents who will share their stories.





reduce dependence on Middle East oil and protect the environment.

"Pressing issues right now clearly are the economy and the energy costs. This is true in our district and in Washington. We are losing jobs all around New York atate because of the cost of energy and the high taxes," said Buhrmaster.

Electing to make a difference at any age

You hear some seemingly crazy stuff from candidates running for office.

When I ran for student council in high school, one of my slogans was "The canned hamburgers have got to go." I was referring to the hamburgers served in the school's cafeteria.

Why did I think the hamburgers came out of a can? Like many politicians, I must now say, "I do not recall."

Did another student tell me that the burgers came from a can? Was it my idea or did a trusted advisor spark the notion? Did the burgers taste like they had been stored in a can? Was the slogan just a joke?

"I do not recall."

What I do remember is that I really wanted to be student council president. Not because I had a vendetta against canned meat or because I wanted something to put on a college resume, but because I truly wanted to make a difference. Some might also say I was a glutton for punishment, but I prefer to think I had drive. : You decide.

It all started in my

sophomore year. There was a big assembly in the gym. The school housed both a junior and senior high (grades seven through 12) and possibly the entire student population was present. During the assembly the current student council president gave a speech. What was his speech about? "I do not recall.'

What I do remember is that the student council president was a senior named Rick. Rick was someone I'd known since childhood. He lived up the road from me. He was a regular guy. And what I thought at this assembly was, "If Rick can be student council president and rally school spirit, then perhaps I could run for a school office and do the same.'

So, in the fall of my junior year I ran for class president. Each candidate gave a speech to the 100 or so kids in our 11th grade class.

What was my speech about? "I do not recall."

What I do remember is that it was nerve racking to address my classmates.

Also, I remember that in my speech I made reference to the various labels given to students. My goal must have been to promote the idea of inclusiveness, as in, "whether you're a jock or a preppy, we junior class carnival, a massive all need to work together..."

It was the '80s, so there were jocks and preppies. In my school, there was also a group known as the be-bops. I don't know if they existed elsewhere. And I don't recall whether the be-bops called themselves by that name or if outsiders applied the label. I think the be-bops might have been a subset of the preppies. Or vice versa.

In any case, I remember using the term "be-bops" in my speech. Oh, and I also remember that I lost the election. The winning team consisted of two girls who ran together as co-presidents. Moreover, one of girls on that co-president ticket had been class president since at least as far back as the fifth grade. So basically I was running against a team that included a longterm, well-liked, competent incumbent.

I knew from the get-go that I was a long-shot candidate. And although I only received about one-third of the votes, I considered that an admirable accomplishment since my opponent was actually two people. Still, losing the election was a disappointment. On the plus side, I didn't have to worry about organizing the

undertaking that involved lots of students and parents and was a major fundraiser to which the whole community was invited in the spring.

Instead, just months after my junior class election defeat, I put my hat in the ring again. This time it was for the position of high school student council president. And this time I was not a solo candidate, but a member of a team, including a vice president, a treasurer and a secretary. Between the four of us we represented honor students, athletes, cheerleaders, musicians, thespians, dancers, and more.

What were my campaign issues other than the line about the canned hamburgers? "I do not recall."

What I do remember is that my team won the election. and so during my senior year in high school I served as student council president for grades nine through 12.

There were no canned hamburgers in the lunchroom during my tenure. Of course, there were no canned hamburgers before I got elected either. So I guess I can't take credit for getting rid of them. I never even learned how the hamburgers were actually packaged or prepared.

What I did learn is that if you want to make a difference you can. I also learned that it takes a long time to make changes, and sometimes you. can only set the wheels in motion for changes that will come to fruition after you have moved on the control of the control

-Lworked on improvements to the school lunch program. I surveyed the students and discovered that what many of them wanted was a salad bar. And then I sought guidance from the school administration, including the assistant principal, Mr. B., who was the advisor to student

Looking back I see that I learned about preparing business meeting agendas, conducting meetings, presenting proposals, researching requirements and considering fiscal implications. I learned that offering a salad bar wasn't as simple as purchasing a large table with sneeze guards and spaces for canisters of lettuce. cucumbers and tomatoes. The components of the salad bar had to meet certain school lunch criteria, the likes of which "I do not recall."

Eventually students were able to select a salad bar option when buying lunch at school. I had hoped the salad bar would be in place before I graduated, but it wasn't implemented until after I'd gone off to college. The bulk of the credit goes to the school administrators who made my idea a reality. Without their know-how and support and actions, change would not have been possible.

When I campaigned for student council I knew I couldn't shorten the school day or eliminate homework, so I focused instead on areas where I could make a difference.

This year on Nov. 4, all eligible adults can and should exercise their right to make a difference: Don't get discouraged about all the seemingly crazy stuff you hear from candidates. Focus on the positive goals and maintain your hope for the future. Take an interest in local elections and: the 'individuals' who, may affect changes in your own community. Find out the plans of the candidates running for office in your town and county so that you cammake an informed choice. And if you have the opportunity, bring your children into the voting booth and teach them to cherish freedom and democracy. That will be an experience they will recall for years to come.



Open to ideas on open space

Residents discuss issues regarding recreation and agriculture

Bethlehem opened up the discussion on its proposed open space plan Thursday, Oct. 23.

Holding their third public hearing on the possible townwide comprehensive land use plan, town officials focused the meeting on three specific topics: recreation and pathways; natural systems and agriculture; and farming as it pertains to the proposal.

The meeting began at 7 p.m. at Town Hall, with attendance lighter than the May meeting but with a similar format. Residents were broken into smaller groups to brainstorm and discuss the topics.

Town Planner Jeffrey Lipnicky gave the initial presentation to residents, followed by information from Senior Planner Robert Leslie.

Lipnicky said safe routes and connectivity to nearby parks and recreation, farming and agriculture, and environmental protection were some of things residents identified as important in previous meetings. He said trespassing concerns have come up a number of times concerning the proposed open space plan.

"Some of the types of issues that came out [of the discussions] that we continuously hear were trespassing on private property; the issues of encroachment, liability concerns regarding trespass and things of that nature," Lipnicky said. "And these are issues that we will obviously need to address as we move on."

One focus of the meeting was asking residents to identify goals for the town that could be included in the open space plan, and Leslie discussed what types of land are in town.

"We have about 426 acres of public recreation land, and that represents roughly 1 percent of our town land area and this is made up of our town parks like Elm Avenue Park, the Henry Hudson Park and the smaller neighborhood parks like the North Bethlehem and South Bethlehem parks," Leslie said. "Colonial Acres is one of our latest recreational areas."

The town maintains Colonial Acres Golf Course, which is leased from the Open Space Institute for \$1 a year. According to town figures, the golf course has turned a profit in its first year of operation for the town.

Leslie also said that schools provide recreational areas throughout Bethlehem, and that the town recently opened up public fishing areas along the Onesquethaw Creek. He added that there are 788 acres of conservation land in Bethlehem that represents about 2 percent of the town's land area.

"We've come to think of pathways as those areas where you travel by foot or on bicycle," Leslie said. "Pathways can be sidewalks or multi-use paths." Albany County has recently approved a measure to purchase an old railway bed in town and has plans to convert it to the Helderberg-Hudson Rail Trail, which would run from Voorheesville to Albany.

Leslie said this pathway would be a part of the town's network of trail systems.

Behan Planning Associates is working as a consultant for the town to help shape the new land-use policy. The town hired the firm strictly in an advisory capacity — not to draw up an open space plan, according to Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

"It's obviously a very individualist decision (landuse options)," John Behan told residents at the May workshop. "What's important to you is important to us."





Town board just going through the motions

Editor, The Spotlight:

In the article titled "Town bans banners" on the front page of the Oct. 15 issue of The Spotlight, Supervisor Jack Cunningham and Councilman Mark Hennessey said they had not received written or verbal comments on these zoning changes. What were they doing during the public hearing on the zoning code?

On record in the minutes of this Town Board meeting of Sept. 24, I commented on a number of zoning issues. I specifically spoke against a ban on banning banners. It is a disservice to the small businesses in the community and the consumer. The small business, which the town often talks about wanting to encourage and keep, needs to have the flexibility to advertise. A banner could easily get the attention of a customer in an affordable way. As a consumer, I like to see advertisements that can save me money or note a useful product. I might be interested in patronizing shops that I otherwise would not consider at the time. I think both parties could benefit from the use of banners and other on-site advertisements.

It is also interesting to note that these zoning changes were only solicited from the town departments that are involved in the implementation and enforcement of the zoning code. Only after the government decided what was best, did they hold a mandatory public hearing. Even then, they did not have the documents easily accessible for review. Did they even notify the Chamber of Commerce in a timely manner that this was taking place, so they could notify their members ahead of this hearing?

Unfortunately, I have seen many times when the public speaks; the town board gets that glassy eyed, bored look, where they look like they aren't even listening. Questions by the public are even ignored. I have often thought they are just going through the motions of letting the public vent, since they have made up their minds already. Their comments in this article show that they can't even remember that someone spoke at all, never mind what was said.

Lunchroom efforts not on a trial basis

Editor, The Spotlight:

As the principal of Eagle Elementary School, it's important to address the suggestion in a letter last week that our school is engaged in some type of trial effort to use completely disposable lunchroom gear. This is not true.

Eagle opened as a brand new school this fall, and, as one might imagine, getting every single supply, material and piece of equipment into place is a massive effort. Plastic, reusable trays were on back-order at that time, so the children did unfortunately have to use Styrofoam trays when school opened. I'm happy to report that the reusable trays arrived in early October, and we made a seamless transition to them. Children put their food right on the tray -- no disposable plates are used.

Napkins made from recycled paper and disposable plastic utensils are used. Washing reusable silverware takes manpower, and would further cost taxpayers in the utensils that were lost regularly when the district did have such a system. In my conversations with our Food Service Department, I learned that napkins and utensils challenge school districts across the country trying to be both cost effective and environmentally friendly, and that we continue to investigate ways to be both.

I could not agree with the letter writer more that adults should be setting an example for children by conserving energy and protecting the environment. Here at Eagle Elementary, among initiatives such as recycling, we are also investigating the possibility of establishing some nature trails throughout "our backyard" in the future that will give students valuable, real-world learning experiences in the natural environment. Principals recently learned that last winter,

less energy was used for heating across the district. This is thanks to the community's investment in more modern and efficient heating systems as part of the capital construction project and efforts to maintain temperatures at pre-established set points. Schools are looking at avenues to most effectively promote recycling efforts.

If anyone has questions or ideas — about energy usage or environmental practices, I encourage them to contact their school principal or the superintendent's office. At Eagle, and across the district, we approach the energy and environment from a simple premise: The planet belongs to our students. What we teach them today will determine their stewardship of it in the future.

District mourns local school official

Steven O'Shea loses battle with cancer, community ioses leader

Steven O'Shea, a man known throughout the Capital District for making the business of area

schools his business, died Thursday, Oct. 23, at his Guilderland home surrounded by his family. He was

Born in Canton, he Steven O'Shea was the son

of Elmer O'Shea and the late Harriet O'Shea. He graduated with his master's degree from the University at Albany and worked tirelessly as an assistant superintendent of business for

the Corinth, Scotia-Glenville and Bethlehem school districts.

"It is with great sadness that the district announces the death of Assistant Superintendent for Business Steven O'Shea after a lengthy battle with cancer," the district said in a statement.

O'Shea had worked for the Bethlehem Central School District for the past 11 years and handled the financial reins of the suburban school district during a time of considerable growth and transformation.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said O'Shea's presence will be missed.

"Anvone who knows Steve knows that the district is not the same without him," Tebbano said. "Steve was an excellent financial steward for Bethlehem Central and its taxpayers. He was also a great friend. I know I speak for many in the district who worked closely with Steve when I say that it's hard to imagine BC without Steve's sense of humor, his calm

presence and his leadership and knowledge of school finance."

O'Shea joined the district in 1997 after serving as a school business administrator for the Scotia-Glenville Central School District, where he helped implement several substantial technology improvements and. capital construction projects.

He used his experience at Scotia-Glenville to help serve the Bethlehem district as well.

"He will be remembered as a smiling, steady presence who did great work for Bethlehem Central for more than a decade, according to the statement released by the district. "Mr. O'Shea's leadership and expertise were invaluable, particularly with the historic 2003 capital project that has done so much to improve the district's technological and physical infrastructure for students."

The New York State Association of School Business Officials awarded a \$1,000 scholarship in O'Shea's name at last year's Bethlehem Central High School awards evening. The scholarship went to a graduating senior who planned to pursue a degree in business, finance or education.

According to the award description, O'Shea's peers across the state did this to recognize him as a member of their organization "who exemplifies honor, commitment and dedication," in their profession.

District officials said the Bethlehem Board of Education will decide on who will take over the helm of the district's business office in the coming weeks. In the meantime, its operations will remain under new school business administrator and former town comptroller Judi Kehoe and with the assistance of a retired school business official.

"He will be dearly and wholeheartedly missed" by the survivors he leaves behind, his family wrote in a tribute. "We would also like to thank more than words can say for the care and support given Steve and us by the staff at Ellis ICU 1 and from Albany County Hospice."

Survivors include his wife, Paula O'Shea; a son, Shawn (Heather French) O'Shea, a daughter, Tamara (Matthew) Hanzalik: three grandchildren, Connor O'Shea, Aiden and Liam Hanzalik; eight brothers, Charles (Claudia), Robert (Sue), Bruce (Betty), Gerald (Kelly), Clarence (Adair), Marvin (Janet), Brian (Maria) and Robin (Shelly); two sisters, Dorothy (Robert) Powers and Linda (Tyge) Clyde; and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. O'Shea's daughter, Shelly Ann O'Shea, died before him.

Arrangements were by the Catricala Funeral Home Inc., in Clifton Park, and a funeral Mass was held Monday, Oct. 27, at the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Scotia. Burial was in St. Anthony's Cemetery in Glenville.



What is the best way to help the state recover from the slumping economy?

As a basic premise, it is essential to focus on budget reductions, and NOT tax increases. However, it is imperative that any further reductions do not adversely impact programs that support the health and safety of any New Yorkers. Furthermore, state employee layoffs must be resisted. In fact, it has been has been shown that layoffs can be very counterproductive and eventually do not generate cost savings anywhere near the amount originally estimated.

NYC records official visits school

The eighth-grade students at St. Thomas the Apostle School in Delmar got the history lesson of their lives on Monday, Oct. 20, when the commissioner of the New York City Department of Records and Information Services (DORIS) visited.

Commissioner Brian Andersson, a member of Mayor Michael Bloomberg's staff and a well-known genealogist, was invited to come to St. Thomas to speak to the school's upperclassman, who are preparing for a trip to Washington, D.C., in May.

The commissioner talked about ancestry, shared photos of old New York and gave a slide presentation that included the original marriage certificate of Eleanor and Franklin Roosevelt as well as the birth certificates of a number of distinguished New Yorkers. Empowered by charter mandate with managing New York City's records, the Department of Records, through its unique library, is the provider

of information concerning the government of the city.

Among its collection of data and information, the department also houses vital records including birth, death and marriage certificates.

The students had the unique opportunity to view old tax photos, as well as photographs of original immigration manifests, and had the honor of viewing and touching the only U.S. flag to survive the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center towers.

Found amongst the rubble, a torn and fragile flag was delivered to the New York fire commissioner, who handed it over to Andersson and his staff. The flag was hermetically sealed and accompanied the astronauts on the Endeavour space shuttle, which traveled over 14 million miles before returning to Earth.

Brought out on every Sept. 11 anniversary by the commissioner, the flag is flown at Ground Zero in Manhattan.





Whether it's at Town Hall meetings, candidate forums for the upcoming election or the opinion page, the same three-letter subject seems to be on the lips of residents across the Capital District; AMD.

That's especially true for those who call Saratoga County home. Since the announcement just over three weeks ago that the California-based microchip maker has committed to building a \$4.5 billion factory at the Luther Forest Technology Campus in Malta, the

proposed project has drawn more scrutiny and questions than ever before.

Business pundits the world over are analyzing AMD's deal with two Abu Dhabi investment companies, one of which will be splitting the responsibility of building and running the Malta facility – named Fab 4x – under the banner of the Foundry Company.

Closer to home, residents of the towns of Malta and Stillwater are wondering what a \$5 million grant from AMD will mean. That story

was covered in the Thursday, Oct. 16, Spotlight in our Saratoga County editions.

But dollars and cents are only one measure of what is a pivotal moment in the area's history. According to AMD's figures, Fab 4x will bring 6,500 new jobs to the area, if you count all the ancillary industries that will be fueled by its arrival. It's fair to say that many of those workers don't already live in Malta or the surrounding area.

In the spirit of investigating the arrival of the Foundry Company

to its fullest, *Spotlight Newspapers* will be publishing a weekly feature focusing on the different aspects of our communities that will feel the impact as the area changes.

Next week, look for coverage of how the area's schools are adjusting to the idea of the Capital District becoming New York's "nanotech valley," from the college level on down.

Local school districts are adding to their curricula and offering students options for hands-on nanotech learning. At the same time, some



Rosenbaum to sign book, talk politics

Richard Rosenbaum will be at the Book House of Stuyvesant Plaza to sign his new book, "No Room for Democracy: The Triumph of Ego Over Common Sense" and discuss the 2008 presidential race Thursday, Oct. 30, at 7 p.m.

Beginning with a foreword by Henry A. Kissinger, "No Room For Democracy" walks readers through Rosenbaum's life. Born in 1931, he was a Jewish boy growing up in a predominately gentile community in Oswego County and suffered from aalopecia, which results in a premature loss of hair. He became a college boxing star and later Nelson Rockefeller's right hand man.

"No Room For Democracy" details events that Rosenbaum both witnessed and affected:

•The campaign he successfully orchestrated on behalf of Rockefeller to be named Gerald Ford's vice president after Spiro Agnew's resignation preceded Richard Nixon's from the presidency. When Ford replaced Nixon as president and had to appoint a new VP, George H.W. Bush was actively pursuing the job. Many insiders were surprised when he did not get it - and credited Rosenbaum for the coup.

• The story behind the \$35,000 mink lined bed, designed by artist Max Ernst, which Rockefeller had installed in the vice president's residence.

 His campaign to deny Ronald Reagan the Republican presidential nomination in 1976 and gain the nomination for



The intra-party fighting seems to have led to a few resignations as well as several threats of resignation, and centers around King's assertions that the party's leadership was playing "town politics" and only looking out for it own political future and not the party's.

After the party's first election, Burns said King had suggested scheduling a new election using a weighted vote after he spoke with Tom Marcelle, the Albany County GOP attorney.

"Jared ran against me. ... He pretty much had it all arranged," Burns said. When asked if King was still in the committee, Burns said, "Nobody really knows, he was involved in the elections mously, but when asked to in January when I was elected and nobody saw him again ... until May or June.'

Burn did say King "is a good worker" and that "lared is a political animal; he loves this stuff. He lives and breathes politics.

King wrote an e-mail to fellow party members laying out his vision for the party.

"I've got a plan for Bethlehem that builds Republican community, introduces candidates, provides value to people, recruits volunteers, attracts NOP and Democrats, and makes your job as a committeeman much less labor intensive," King wrote. "Are you willing to help? In the words of Martin Luther King, 'I am more concerned by the apathy of the good people than the hate of the bad people."

King also in wrote in one email that he only asked Marcelle for confirmation that a weighted vote should have been used and not for an actual re-vote. He wrote that Albany County Republican Chairman John Graziano told him he could ask for another vote if he wanted.

'I asked Tom Marcelle t

confirm what I thought to be true, namely that because the current leadership conducted an election that violated Rule 7 of the county committee's bylaws, the election was void," King wrote. "County Chairman Graziano also told me at the county organizational meeting that I would not have to sue the county party to force the Bethlehem general committee to comply with the whenever you want."

When reaching out to other members for support, King received an e-mail response from Norman Morand, who told him he had left the committee and suggested to King that if he cannot get along with other party members for the good of the party then he should resign, too.

Rodriquez originally forwarded the e-mails anony-

Cusick gives Soares second challenge

On newly formed Integrity line, Cusick running 'by the book'

Roger Cusick is running his campaign for Albany County district attorney on "integrity" — literally.

A former Republican candidate for the post in 2004, Cusick is running on the newly formed Integrity Party line.

"Our campaign has focused its effort on reducing street crime and violence in Albany County," said Cusick who has been openly critical of incumbent District Attorney David Soares. "I look forward to making a positive change in the direction of the DA's office. I will always put the safety of the people of Albany County above politics and selfpromotion, and rest assured change is coming."

Cusick is currently licensed to practice law in both New York and Massachusetts, as well as the Federal Courts of New York. He received his law degree from Albany Law School in 1975 and a doctorate of philosophy from the University of Albany in 2006.

University of Albany in 2006.
Since 2000, Cusick has taught at various colleges and universities, including the University at Albany, the University of Richmond Virginia, Union College

in Schenectady and the College at Oneonta. He taught courses related to public law and the administration of justice, including constitutional law, the American criminal courts, the American legal system, and civil rights and liberties.

He has also taught in the fields of political theory and American politics and has served on various committees of the state's Bar Association including the Committee on Professional Ethics and the Model Code of Ethics Committees.

Cusick served in the New York Army National Guard from 1971 until 1977:

During his one debate with Soares at Albany Law School, Cusick said he plans to run the district attorney's office "by the book." He said he does not believe a district attorney should legislate or carry agendas into the office with them.

Cusick lives with his wife, Karlene, in Colonie with their two sons and in the community. He

is active in the community. He has volunteered with the Westland Hills Little League, Latham Circle Soccer, and the North Colonie School District.

Cusick has been endorsed by several large labor unions such as Council 82, which represents area police departments, the Civil Service Employees Association (CSEA), and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees.

District Attorney says crime down on his watch, more needs to be done

After fighting his way through the 2004 Democratic primary and eventually to the district attorney's office, P. David Soares is asking voters for another four years.

As Albany County District Attorney, Soares said he has made good on his promise to voters

four years ago, but that more still needs to be

"Four years ago I promised the folks of Albany County that I would be tough on crime," Soares said. "And we've proved that."

Soares said that his campaign this year is just as aggressive as his first one when he was an assistant district attorney and beat

out his old boss, former District Attorney Matthew Clyne.

He also won against Roger Cusick on the Republican line, who is running against Soares again this year on the newly formed Integrity Party line.

"There's several challenges ahead of us in the next term. The first challenge, of course, is reducing the amount of gun violence," Soares said. "There's going to be budget cuts, and that's going to be a challenge. We're going to have to do more with less."

But that is exactly what Soares said he intends to do.

The first-term district attorney said that gun violence in the inner city of Albany is of particular concern and that he wants to continue programs to help prevent violent crime before it occurs.

Soares, 39, was born to Lucas and Lidia Soares in Brava, Cape Verde, an island off the coast of West Africa. His family moved to the United States and settled in Pawtucket, R.I. He is the youngest of five children.

Soares received a bachelor's degree in communications from Cornell University and then attended

Albany Law School before receiving his law degree in 1999. He later became an assistant district attorney under Sol Greenberg after working at the district attorney's office.

Some of his top priorities for the next term, in addition to targeting gun violence, include getting tough on DWI's, and continuing initiatives to curb domestic violence. Soares said law enforcement

needs to take the lead of the private sector when it comes to technology, and he wants to set up an interactive network where anonymous tipsters can contact police and residents can receive mug shots and other information.

"I think deep down in all of us there's a crime fighter in there," Soares said about community involvement in law enforcement.

Soares lives with his wife, Tina Pantuso, and their two sons in Bethlehem.

The supervisor argued that a much smaller tax increase in other municipalities resulted in a much higher actual dollar amount than what is paid in Bethlehem. Cunningham said town residents enjoy a high level of service for a fairly low dollar amount.

Most of the criticism over the budget was targeted at the size of the actual increase in the face of a potential global economic meltdown. There were a handful of comments directed at the budget and size of the town's police department.

"In my mind, at this time, tax increases should be need-based only, not on want-based," resident Robert Miller said.

He said information in the presentation that suggested some things in the budget are necessary because of the potential to affect public safety reflected more of a "want" than a "need."

"But if I don't see a crime, then I don't see a need to increase the police staff, for example, and to increase my taxes," Miller said.

He argued that the town's police force constitutes 1.4 officers per 1,000 residents and that number was "much higher" than other towns its size. He said

the same number of officers is where." often found in a city of 600,000 Mo

or more.

Robert Jasinski, a former supervisor candidate in town, said he thought the tax increase was much higher then in neighboring municipalities and that more could be done to cut down on departmental expenditures.

"We've increased almost every department, I think we should go back and ask the departments what can be cut, and you may find you can still cut some of it," said Jasinski.

Referring to an interest the town has shown in purchasing a Creble Road property for the public works department, Jasinski suggested the town put that idea on hold until the economy gets better.

"Whatdo we need a \$1 million, or \$800,000 or \$900,000 property on Creble Road for, I can't see at this time," said Jasinski.

Cunningham has repeatedly said that the town's infrastructure needs to be maintained and upgraded in order to prevent situations like what happened earlier this year when aging water meters at the water facility needed to be replaced because they were leaking mercury.

"My income's not going up 7 percent," Norman Morand told the board. "Everyone else is taking dramatic steps to keep their budgets down. ... I don't see the same dramatic steps being taken

Morand, who is a former Bethlehem Republican Committee member, concluded by saying, "I don't put faith in these budgets."

"People are just getting drowned," Stewart said. "I have a mortgage, and taxes just keep going up and up. ... The big issue is just trying to keep it down."

Councilwoman Joann Dawson told residents, "Our responsibility doesn't end in two weeks," referring to when the town is expected to vote on the budget proposal.

She said the budget is an ongoing process and could be revisited in the future.

According to Judi Kehoe, the town's outgoing comptroller who now works full-time with the Bethlehem Central School District, the 6.89 percent tax levy proposal combined with the expanded assessment base will result in an increase of 7.3 percent in revenues to the town from property taxes, she said.

"As we continue to invest in this community, the community continues to be a great investment," Cunningham concluded at his presentation. "I've realized that people don't come to this town because the taxes are high or low, they come to this town because it's a great place to live, and it's well managed and I think a lot of you are here because of those reasons."







The grandfather-cardigan presents you with an abundance of options for creative dressing and will keep you warm not only through the fall season, but winter, too.

In terms of color, blacks and grays continue to be popular, as well as classic hues. Neon colors add a refreshing twist to the mix.

'Jewel tones are really in right now — so you have your purples and your emerald greens, and your traditional black and grays. ... You're [also] seeing the bright, bold, neon colors — in the shows we went to we saw a lot of the bold colors, like the cobalt blues," says Beth Jameson, owner of Frivolous Boutique in Saratoga

'I think that you're seeing a mid-length coat between the knee and the waist, and if a woman's wearing a skirt you're seeing the definition there that you can wear skirts or pants with a mid-length

Three-quarter coats continue to be popular when worn with long gloves for warmth, as well as capelets (hooded or unhooded). Blazers remain sought after in all sorts of materials and colors, ranging from velvet to wool to tweed.

They can really dress up a jean outfit. We're selling jackets that you can put with jeans or with a nice pant so that you can stretch your wardrobe," says Fenno.

You can also stretch what you've already been wearing by layering and adding scarves. Instead of wearing one T-shirt, wear two, and you can always throw a sweater or blazer over whatever you're wearing, not only to add a little warmth, but a little pizzazz, too.

ew York State Theater Institute founder Patricia Snyder had a question for John Romeo.

After more than 25 years with the theater, were there any roles Romeo still yearned to play?

Actually, he said, there was. He had always wanted to be Lennie in "Of Mice and Men."

"It's one of the best roles in contemporary theater," he said.

Romeo gets his wish Friday, Oct. 31, when the curtain rises on NYSTI's production of "Of Mice and Men," John Steinbeck's Pulitzer Prize-winning story of friendship set in Depression-era California. Romeo's character is a simple-minded gentle giant; David Bunce plays George, a fellow ranch hand who acts as Lennie's de facto caretaker.

There are plenty of laughs in the beginning, director Ed Lange said. But at its core, he said, "Of Mice and Men" is a tragedy: Lenny accidentally kills a woman while trying to stroke her hair, and George, wanting to spare Lenny from a vengeful lynch mob, shoots him in the back of the head.

In most roles, actors get to_ show how smart they are. Romeo said. In this one, though, his job is to give an understated performance, without reducing Lennie to a "caricature."

"It works so against your natural actor instincts," he said.

That challenge was one of the reasons he'd always wanted to tackle the role of Lennie. Another was his respect for Steinbeck's story.

"The ideas are complex," Romeo said. "It's very deep and very complex. It says so much about society, men, and life in the '20s and '30s."

For Bunce, what sticks out most about the story is the relationship between George and Lennie.

"It's such an incredible story of friendship," he said. It might seem that Lennie is a burden; but "I think George gets as much out

of it as Lennie does. I think it's a very symbiotic relationship."

Bunce actually played the role of George once before, but only briefly. In college, he and a classmate acted out the first and final scenes of "Of Mice and Men" for another student's directing project.

He loved the part, and getting to reprise it alongside Romeo holds special significance for Bunce because the two are longtime friends themselves.

"We've been doing plays together for 25 years," Bunce said. "It's very comfortable working together. With just a nod, we can translate what we need to do."

Lange, the director, shares that sense of familiarity. Lange retired as NYSTI's associate artistic director in 2006; before that, he had called Bunce and Romeo co-workers for more than two decades.

"There's really something

special about working with people panicked. you know so well," he said. "We have a way of communicating with each other. We just understand."

The ease with which the trio works together has helped them overcome the unusual production schedule for "Of Mice and Men." The cast had its first rehearsals in August, then had to break for more than six weeks while NYSTI staged "Twelve Angry Jurors."

Romeo said that he could concentrate on only one show at a time, so he had to put "Of Mice and Men" on the back burner while he worked on "Twelve Angry Jurors." That proved frustrating, because when the "Of Mice and Men" cast reconvened on Monday, Oct. 20, things weren't quite clicking the way they had in August.

'We were in a groove," Romeo said. "We've had to do a lot of catching up.

In fact, on the first day rehearsals resumed, Lange

"I thought, oh my gosh. We're never going to be able to get this thing back on track," he said.

But by mid-week, the cast was right back where it needed to be.

"It kind of all came together," Bunce said.

Lange, who credits the actors' professionalism for the quick turnaround, comes back to NYSTI once a year to serve as guest director and is thrilled to be at the helm of "Of Mice and Men." When Snyder gave him a list of titles to choose from and he saw 'Of Mice and Men" on the list, "I jumped at it," he said.

Like Romeo, he cited the depth

of the story as one of its main attractions.


"The characters are extremely simple. They're trying to make the best out of their lives," Lange said. "And what comes out is this enormous complexity about human nature. You get this wonderful rainbow of people and experiences."

"Of Mice and Men" runs from Friday, Oct. 31, to Sunday, Nov. 9, in the Schacht Fine Arts Center at Russell Sage College, 5 Division St., Troy. Tickets are \$20 for adults, \$16 for senior citizens and students and \$10 for children 12 and younger. 

Last year, vehicle inspection events held during AAA Car Care Month uncovered various maintenance issues that were well on their way to becoming real problems. Following your car's recommended maintenance schedule ensures your vehicle operates safely, uses fuel more efficiently, lasts longer and retains its value for resale.

Tire pressure

Over-inflated tires ride roughly and wear prematurely at the center of their tread. Under-inflated tires decrease fuel economy, cause imprecise handling, wear prematurely at the edges of their tread, and can overheat and

fail at highway speeds. Tires lose about one pound of pressure per month through normal seepage. As seasons change, tires lose or gain another pound of inflation pressure with every 10-degree change in temperature.

Check tire pressure (including the spare) at least once a month when the tires are cold. Always follow the inflation pressure recommendations in your owner's manual, or those on the tire information label in the

the engine and operate other systems.

Inspect battery cables, clamps, and connections at every oil change. If there are signs of corrosion, slow engine cranking or dimming headlights at idle, have your repair shop test the charging and starting system, and clean and tighten the battery connections.

Windshield washer fluid

Rain, insects, grime and other debris on your windshield compromise your vision. A supply of washer fluid will help your wipers remove them.

Check your washer fluid reservoir often. During winter, use a solution with antifreeze protection. Test the washer spray nozzles for proper operation and aim.

Engine oil

Oil is the lifeblood of your engine. Without adequate clean oil, your engine will wear more rapidly, and could seize and be destroyed. Oil doesn't freeze, but its viscosity (thickness) increases as the mercury drops. Lighter grade oils reduce the load on your car's battery and starter, allowing more rapid cranking and starting. They also reach critical engine lubrication areas quickly, greatly reducing

Change your engine's oil and oil filter at specified intervals. Always use the weight of oil recommended by the manufacturer for existing temperature conditions.

Preventative car care is the best way to protect your safety and your investment. To locate a quality service facility, visit AAA.

glove box, on a door jamb, or on the underside of the trunk lid. Don't use the inflation pressure molded into the tire sidewall; it may or may not be the correct pressure for your particular car.


Engine air filter

Your vehicle's air filter prevents dust and dirt from entering the engine. A dirty or clogged air filter restricts airflow and will reduce engine performance and fuel economy while increasing exhaust emissions.

Check the air filter every six months or 7,500 miles. Typically, your repair shop will inspect the filter at each oil change. You can check it by holding it up to a 60-watt light bulb. If you can see light through much of the filter, it is still clean enough to work effectively. If the light is blocked, replace it.

Battery cables/ clamps/terminals

Power from the battery flows to the rest of your vehicle's electrical system through cables, clamps, and terminals. If these become corroded or loose, your car won't have the power to start



Get your vehicle ready for the change of season





Bringing a pet along on a road trip involves adapting your routine to the road — all of the things you take into consideration at home should be addressed when traveling with your pet.

Tips for road trips with pets

Bringing the family pet along on a road trip may seem like a good idea - you don't have to ask friends or family to look after your pet and you can avoid the costs and concerns that go with boarding and kennels. But traveling with pets in the car also brings special challenges that, fortunately, can be met with a bit of forethought and careful preparation of both the vehicle and pet.

According to information from the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), which recently teamed with Subaru of America to produce a brochure on pet travel tips, bringing a pet along on a road trip simply involves adapting your routine to the road. All of the things you take into consideration at homeyour pet's health, happiness and safety - should be thoughtfully addressed when traveling with your pet.

Here are 10 helpful tips for road-tripping with pets from the AVMA and Subaru:

- If your pet is not accustomed to car travel, take it for a few short rides before your trip so it will feel confident that a car outing does not necessarily mean a trip to the veterinarian or an unpleasant destination.
- Cats should always be confined to a cage or in a cat carrier to allow them to feel secure and prevent them from crawling under your feet while you are driving.
- Dogs riding in a car should not ride in the passenger seat if it is equipped with an airbag, and should never be allowed to sit on the driver's lap.
- See your automotive dealer for pet accessories designed specifically to fit your vehicle, such as compartment dividers that separate pets and cargo from the passenger area. Several automobile manufacturers, including Subaru, offer a dog guard/compartment divider that keeps pets safely in the rear cargo area of station wagons, "crossover" vehicles and SUVs.

- Pets should not be allowed to ride with their heads outside car windows. Particles of dirt or other debris can enter the eyes, ears and nose, causing injury or infection.
- Give small portions of food and water. Plan to stop every two hours for exercise. Remember to include a leash with your pet's traveling supplies.
- If your dog has a problem with carsickness, your veterinarian can prescribe medication that will help the dog feel comfortable during a long car trip.
- Pack a simple pet firstaid kit that includes assorted bandages, antiseptic cream, an anti-diarrheal medication that is safe for pets (ask your veterinarian to suggest a product), gauze squares, phone numbers for your veterinarian, and a 24-hour emergency veterinary hospital at your destination, as well as a national poison control hotline.
- In addition to a standard identification tag (which should be labeled with your name, home address, and phone number), your pet's collar should include a travel tag with information on where you are staying while away from home. Should your pet become lost, this will allow you to be contacted locally.

Air in tires: A political and money issue

Who knew that inflating tires would be such an issue between the presidential candidates? However, when Republican John McCain criticized his Democratic challenger Barack Obama, stating that proper tire inflation wasn't enough for energy independence, it touched off a firestorm of controversy.

Research has shown that a properly inflated tire is a way to help manage fuel consumption. This would save millions of oil barrels per year and would mean more money in people's pockets rather than money at the gas pumps.

For the consumers who are trying to save, properly inflated tires do seem the way to go. With gas prices having a national average of \$3.59 a gallon, savvy consumers are seeking to increase fuel economy and the life of their wheels by paying more attention to their tires.

"Tires that are underinflated by just six to seven pounds per square inch can reduce vehicle fuel economy by as much as 2 percent and tire tread wear can also be reduced by as much as 10 percent," says Mark Chung of Yokohama Tire Corporation, which manufactures tires for passenger cars, SUVs, buses, trucks and airplanes. "Correct tire inflation pressure also reduces tire fatigue which maximizes the tire's ser-

vice life.' National Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports 66 million vehicles have underinflated tires, which literally means more rubber is hitting the road and, accordingly, miles per gallon is lessened. "With an average of 12,000 miles driven annually on tires that are underinflated by five to eight psi, and a vehicle average of 22 miles per gallon, tire experts speculate that about 726 million gallons of gas are wasted annually by U.S. drivers simply because they're driving on underinflated tires," says Chung.

At today's gas prices of as much as \$3.65 per gallon (in California), 726 million gallons of gas translates to a staggering \$2.6 billion lost by consumers for having underinflated tires.

"In addition, those 726 million wasted gallons result into 14,520,000,000 pounds of carbon dioxide released into the environment," Chung says. "We can all help prevent this by

making sure our tires are properly inflated."

People can find the tire's proper inflation level on the vehicle placard located in the driver-side-door jamb, in the glove box or in the owner's manual. While there are about 3,500 sizes and types of tires on the market, Chung has some simple tips to aid proper tire wear:

and vehicle alignment should be checked once a year. Misalignment can cause the tire tread to slip and abrade, which lowers fuel mileage and causes unnecessary tire wear.

• An overinflated tire changes and increases wear on the center of the tread, whereas an underinflated tire increases shoulder wear. A tire is designed to run with the vehicle's

weight spread correctly in the road contact zone.



• Once a month, when the tires are cold – at least 3 to 4 hours after the vehicle has been driven – check tire pressure with a reliable tire gauge. Normal driving causes tires to heat, which raises air pressure. Be sure that the valve stems have a plastic or metal cap to keep out dirt and seal against leakage.

• Tires should be rotated at least every 6,000 to 8,000 miles

"With escalating fuel prices, drivers are going to focus on simple things like proper tire pressure to maximize tire performance, increase fuel economy, help the environment and boost tread wear," says Chung. "Keep your tires properly inflated and you'll prevent your wallet from being deflated."

Looking for the fuel of the future

Throughout the presidential campaign this year, candidates from both parties have spoken of the urgent need to develop alternative fuels. American interest in alternative fuel technologies stems from concerns about the environment and also from this country's dependence on foreign oil.

With more than 2 billion vehicles expected to be on the roads worldwide by the middle of the century, a little anxiety is understandable. To meet this growing global demand for energy, scientists are developing alternative transport fuels that you may pump into the tank of your car some day.

"Shell has more than 100 years of experience in developing transport fuel technology," says Dan Little, fuels manager for Shell Oil Products US. "We have technology centers around the world that are driving advancements in fuels. While our research with alternative fuels will have tremendous long-term benefits, it's also impacting the fuel technology that's found at Shell retail locations today."

But what exactly are alternative fuels, and how will new technology affect daily commutes in the decades to come? The future fuels that scientists are working on could come from a variety of sources. They may be blended with conventional gasoline, or could be 100 percent pure. Some offer reductions in carbon dioxide emissions.

To better understand the wide range of different "alternative" fuels that are being developed, here's an overview of what may some day fill your gas tank:

1. Gas-to-Liquids (GTL) - Made from natural gas, GTL fuel is a cleaner-burning diesel fuel that's clear, odorless, sulfur-free and compatible with today's diesel engine. GTL can be used on its own or blended with diesel and has been cited by the California Energy Commission as the most cost-effective "alternative fuel" in reducing tail pipe emissions and

our dependence on petroleum.

- 2. Conventional or "First Generation" Biofuels Currently, available biofuels are made from food crops (e.g. corn, vegetable oil). Today's most common biofuel, ethanol, is usually made from sugar cane, corn or wheat. While these biofuels can be blended into gasoline and diesel at low concentrations, high concentrations of biofuels require fuel tank and injection system modifications.
- 3. "Second Generation" Biofuels Made with non-food plant materials, such as wood chips, straw and algae, these fuels have the potential to be produced in high volumes. Currently they are expensive to research and develop, and it may be difficult to convince people to pay for their key environmental benefit, carbon dioxide reduction. However, they show real promise as an alternative fuel. For example:
- Cellulosic ethanol-Cellulosic ethanol has the same properties as ethanol that is already being blended with gasoline in many regions of the United States, but is made from non-food crops like wheat straw and corn stalks.
- Biomass-to-Liquid (BTL)
 This second generation biofuel takes a woody feedstock, gasifies it and converts the gas into a high quality diesel fuel. The product has potential to be a low-carbon transportation fuel and is produced from a renewable source of energy.
- 4. Hydrogen Hydrogen is the most plentiful element in the universe. Hydrogen fuel is a new form of transport fuel that can be used in modified combustion engines, but the best results are achieved through the use of "fuel cell vehicles." These engines generate electricity through an electrochemical reaction that produces just water and heat as by-products. Since hydrogen is

not commonly found in its pure form, it must be produced from different energy sources, usually fossil fuels. If the full environmental benefits of hydrogen-powered vehicles are to be realized, a critical challenge is to produce, and



make widely available, hydrogen fuel with a low, or potentially zero carbon dioxide footprint.

What are the benefits of bio-

fuels?

A key advantage of biofuels compared with conventional gasoline and diesel is that they generally produce less carbon dioxide on a life-cycle basis. This is because plants used in biofuels


have absorbed carbon dioxide from the air while growing, which is then released when the biofuel is burnt. In theory, this leaves the balance neutral. However, energy is required to grow and harvest the plants, convert them into biofuel and

distribute them, and this all produces carbon dioxide. Since the amount and sources of energy used in production vary considerably, the carbon dioxide emis-

sions of different fuels need to be compared on a life-cycle basis.

It will take some time to develop "Second Generation" biofuels in significant commercial quantities. Until that time, companies should work to ensure the raw materials and conversion processes used today result in genuinely beneficial, low-carbon biofuels. That means accelerating the pace of international sustainability and carbon dioxide certification systems for the supply chain for "First Generation" biofuels.



Your vehicle's coolant system works hard to keep the engine cool and running smoothly, regardless of the weather.

Ten cool weather coolant tips

aby, it may be cold outside. but inside your car's engine it's hot as blazes. Even when temperatures dip, your vehicle's coolant system works hard to keep the engine cool and running smoothly. It's important to take care of your cooling system, whatever the weather.

Antifreeze helps keep a car engine running smoothly, despite the temperature outside. When a car engine starts, coolant is pumped around the engine to either warm it up or cool it down. In addition to keeping the car at the ideal temperature, many antifreeze products on the market today also have extra additives to help prevent corrosion and expensive engine breakdowns.

Because it's an important part to keeping your engine running smoothly, it's essential to take care of your antifreeze. It's not too difficult a task and you can even save a few bucks by doing it yourself. Here are 10 easy steps to get you started.

1. Clean the radiator. As you drive, the cooling system of your car sucks in air, bugs, dirt, leaves and other debris along with it.

It's important to clean the radiator so air can easily pass through

2. Place a drip pan under the car. Antifreeze is not meant for ingestion, either by humans or animals. Using a drip pan will allow for easy disposal and keep the environment safe.

3. Remove the radiator pressure cap. When the engine has cooled, place a rag on the radiator cap and twist off. You'll need to press down firmly with the heel of your hand, and perform could save you up to \$50. two quarter turns to the left one to unlock it, and another to remove the cap. ...

4. Inspect the pressure cap and hoses. The radiator cap helps keep the coolant properly pressurized. If the cap is rusting or dried out, replace it with a new one. Also look at the radiator hoses and check for leaks, cracks or soft and mushy conditions. Replace if necessary.

5. Drain the radiator. On the bottom of radiator, release the valve and let the fluid spill into the pre-placed drip pan. Pour the drained antifreeze into a container, that meets disposal regulations for your area.

6. Flush the radiator and cooling system. This may be the easiest and most fun step of the process. Simply take out the garden hose and flush out the system. For the first "flush," collect the rinse and dispose of it with the used antifreeze. Continue rinsing until the drained water is clear.

7. Add the coolant and water mixture. The ideal mix is 50 percent antifreeze and 50 percent distilled water. You can either mix them by filling the radiator half way with one and topping it off with the other, or pre-mix the two together in a separate con-

Bleed the system. Replacing the coolant often creates air pockets in the fluids that should be removed before going out for a drive. To even out the levels, run the engine for about 15 minutes. At the same time, turn the heat on high to help circulate the coolant. Upon completion, carefully check the coolant levels and top them off if needed.

9 Replace the pressure cap. Line up the tabs on the cap with the cutouts of the fill spout and press down firmly. Twist the cap to the right to secure it.

10. Clean up. Coolant is essentially a toxic chemical, so it is important to clean up appropriately. Use a hose to dilute any spills and dispose of the old antifreeze according to your area's EPA guidelines.

When all is said and done, changing your own antifreeze should take a couple hours and

Is your car ready for winter?

hat's the last thing you want to happen when heading off to school or that mountain getaway you've been looking forward to? If you're driving to your destination, the worst case scenario would be for the flashing "check engine" warning light to come on, leading to your car breaking down.

Prevent that road trip from turning into a nightmare by doing a little preventative maintenance. Whether you take your car to a mechanic, or do the maintenance yourself, here's a checklist to follow before you pack up and head out:

1. Check your engine oil.

Most people get their oil changed every 3,000 miles. Before leaving on a long trip, it's a good idea to do it again, just to make sure levels are adequate and your vehicle is running clean.

2. Check your antifreeze.

Lowering your engine's freezing point with antifreeze is an essential part of your car's winter protection. Make sure the fluid level is full with a mixture as close as possible to 50 percent water, 50 percent antifreeze.

3. Clean your battery posts.

If you want your car to start quickly and easily, don't allow dirt and grime to build up on your battery terminals. Keep them as clean as possible.

4. Inspect your spark plug

wires.

Cracked and/or frayed plug wires can impact your vehicle's performance, gas mileage and overall reliability. Make sure yours are in top shape.

5. Inspect your tires.

Tires lose pressure when they get cold, so be sure to check them and add air if necessary. You should also check your tire's tread to make sure they are ready for winter driving. An easy way to check is to take a Lincoln-head penny and insert it head-first into the most worn part of your tire tread. If you can see Abe's head, he may be telling you to get a new set of tires. Don't forget a full-size spare tire and snow chains, especially if your trip involves snowy or icy terrain.



6. Inspect your brakes.

Your safety and well being rest on your car's brakes. Never cut corners. Be sure yours have adequate padding left to get you through the season.

7. Replace your wipers.

A good working set of wipers is critical especially when driving in rain, sleet and snow. With such moisture coming from the air, and salt, dirt and grime be-

ing kicked up from the road, it takes wipers that are in tip-top shape to keep your windshield clean and you safe.

8. Check your windshield washer fluid.

You'll be using a lot of fluid as you try to keep your windows clean. Fill the reservoir before leaving on your trip, and bring along an extra bottle just in case.


In addition to such preventative maintenance, put together an emergency kit that includes jumper cables, a flashlight, basic tools - such as such as a pocket knife, wrench and screwdriver, an ice scraper and brush, a fully charged cell phone, first aid supplies, warm clothing, blankets, hats for everyone, water and

non-perishable food. Also include some carpet strips or kitty litter for traction in case your vehicle gets stuck in the snow, and a nifty glovebox mechanic that will help you figure out what to do if the "check engine" light comes

"check engine" light comes on when you're thousands of miles from home.

Think the chances of that happening are slim? It happens more often than you may think – and not just in the winter. According to a recent Harris Interactive survey, an estimated 10 percent of the drivers on the road right now have a vehicle with a "check engine" light on.

If the light has been on for a while, it probably doesn't mean the vehicle is in imminent dan-

ger of failure. But it could mean that a sensor has failed, the catalytic converter is going bad, the vehicle has a loose gas cap, which reduces gas mileage, or the vehicle recently underwent service and failed to reset itself. But how do you know for sure? By using CarMD, the only consumer electronics device and software system designed to help drivers monitor their vehicle's health and emissions output.

Simply plug the easy-to-use handheld device into the vehicle's computer (there's usually a port under the steering wheel) and wait a few second for it to beep. A green light indicates nothing is wrong, which is a positive indication before taking a road trip. A yellow light signals a possible problem and a red light means there is a current problem and service is required - particularly before you head out on a long trip.
