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FOIL opens doors to information

Law reinforces the public's right to know

In terms of behind-the-scenes political maneuvering, people often say that "sunlight is the best disinfectant," an expression made popular by former Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis. Supporters of New York's Freedom of Information Law might consider it the source of pure, glistening ultraviolet rays.

The law, known also as FOIL, allows anyone access to government documents for a number of purposes, and the person

requesting the documents does not need to provide an explanation.

The Committee on Open Government, an advisory organization that offers opinions regarding FOIL, states on its Web site at www.dos.state.ny.us/coog that "any New York state or municipal department, board, bureau, division, commission, committee, public authority, public corporation, council, office or other governmental entity performing a governmental or proprietary

Bethlehem GOP still at odds

Chairwoman and former committeeman deny bigotry allegations

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Republican Jared King says he's out of the town's party after he became dissatisfied with its leadership and an anonymous tipster aired the party's "dirty laundry" in public.

Former town supervisor candidate, Victor Rodriguez, 23, came

forward as the tipster recently after he forwarded to *Spotlight Newspapers* a series of e-mails between King and various other Republican Committee members.

Bethlehem Republican Chairwoman Melody Burns said King didn't take losing his Albany County Legislative race last year well and took losing to her for party chairmanship just as bad.

"I think he was a little stung after losing to Tom Cotrofeld," Burns said of King. "I guess it's just sour grapes."

King said his party didn't support him; Burns said he just didn't run an aggressive campaign.

"He just handed out these little magnets, that was his whole campaign," Burns said. "You've got to spend money and he wouldn't put up signs. ... I think that hurt him."

King disagreed with the analysis and said he didn't want to "air out the party's dirty laundry in the press" but wanted to set the record straight.

"I had no support from the party in my race for the County Legislature," he said.

Problems began after a committee vote in September to

Five Rivers project still in gridlock

Owner frustrated, neighbors afraid she may sell to developer

A 35-acre development deal that could ultimately result in nearly 25 acres of land donated to Five Rivers and bring the state preserve into the Town of Bethlehem is still stuck in the planning phase.

Property owner Carol Richards has said she has become increasingly frustrated with the lengthy process of completing the deal and is rumored to be considering pulling the proposal all together and selling the prime piece of property to a developer if it doesn't move forward.

The development snag is hung up on a 20-foot strip of land from Fisher Boulevard to the donated land which the town is requesting for an access road, but Richards has proposed having an access from New Scotland Road, where a paper road already exists.

Neighbors surrounding the property say they want Five Rivers to get the donated land and keep the current development proposal of seven units, as opposed to a new development coming in that could bring dozens of new homes to the site.

Town officials said they hope an agreement can be reached and the project can eventually move forward.

Michael Morelli, the town's assistant director of economic development and planning, said the Fisher Road access is consistent with the town's comprehensive plan in that it would connect recreational land by means of pedestrian pathways. He added that the New Scotland Road access would have to use a paper road, which

Man hospitalized in logging accident

Man blames girlfriend in DWI arrest

A Saratoga Springs man blamed the smell of alcohol inside his vehicle on his girlfriend, but later admitted to drinking and was arrested on DWI charges.

David A. Madore, 32, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Saturday, Oct. 25, for driving while intoxicated; driving with a blood alcohol content of 0.08 percent or greater; and failing to keep right.

Police said Madore was seen driving west on Delaware Avenue and officers saw him "crossing over [the road line] into the oncoming lane," and that he continued driving west and continued failing to keep right at the Four Corners in Delmar.

Madore was stopped near Village Drive.

Bethlehem Police said Madore gave them a driver's license but was unable to produce a registration or an insurance certificate, even though the vehicle was registered in his name.

While interviewing him, police said they could smell alcohol.

Madore told officers that he hadn't been drinking alcohol, and that the smell "was from the passenger, his girlfriend," the report states.

He was asked to exit the vehicle after officers observed Madore display signs of intoxication, according to police, and he "finally made admissions of drinking" when performing a field-sobriety test.

Madore tested positive for alcohol and was placed into police custody without incident, the report states, and his vehicle was towed from the scene.

Police said officers transported Madore's girlfriend home and that he consented to a chemical test, which revealed a BAC above the legal 0.08 percent limit.

According to the arrest report, Madore was released on appearance tickets and scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Nov. 18, and then police transported him to a home on Victoria Lane in Bethlehem.

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
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School district gears up for budget season

With a shaky economy and a spending freeze in place, district to seek public input

Beginning in January, the Bethlehem Central School District will be looking for feedback from the community on its budget as it gears up for a busy number-crunching season certain to contain several question marks during uncertain economic times.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said that he and the school board would meet with the citizen's budget group committee to help flesh out an agenda for the upcoming public meetings.

"We want to utilize that committee and get input on how we should go forward," Tebbano said.

The budget group met for two previous school budgets, and Tebbano said he wants to keep the committee together and active during this year's process.

In the midst of budget talks, the district announced in mid-October that it had enacted "non-essential spending guidelines" as a precautionary measure against a faltering economy and the very real possibility of state aid cuts to education.

"We just have to make people sensitive to the fact that essential programs will remain intact," Tebbano said. "However, we are also aware that state aid may be on table when the state Legislature meets in November."

Tebbano said the district has seen a 10 percent increase in costs over the year and wanted to put a proactive spending freeze in place in order to continue the current level of quality for the suburban district.

One of the cuts that caught the attention of parents and teachers was the discontinuation of school field trips, with certain exceptions such as Elementary Children's Theater, athletics, select Lab School field trips and previously scheduled and paid for trips.

Tebbano said the field trip freeze has already netted the district a savings of close to \$100,000.

"In the current economic crisis, business, families and governments at all levels are making difficult financial decisions. BC is no different,"

Tebbano said. "We must take proactive and precautionary measures to hold down spending and identify cost avoidances when possible."

The citizens budget group is expected to work with the district in coming up with topics and a format for the district's new public hearing approach. The public, however, according to Tebbano, will then help choose what will be on the next meeting's agenda.

"We just want to make this process as open and transparent as possible," Tebbano said in September when he announced the plan.


Bethlehem Board of Education President James Lytle said he supported the idea of holding public forums on the next school budget, as well as the spending

freeze.

"We support Dr. Tebbano's decision to take this difficult but important step," Lytle said. "Although the board fully expects that the governor and the Legislature will keep their promises to our students and to our taxpayers and will not consider any mid-year reductions in the state's commitment to our schools, the freeze is a prudent decision that will place the district in the best position to address whatever fiscal challenges lay ahead."

However, Gov. David Paterson did announce during a press conference that nothing would be left off the table when it comes to reducing the state's spending and warned that every state department will be asked to make cuts.

State tells Lafarge to limit emissions

Cement plant across from high school labeled as major mercury polluter

As it moves forward with multimillion-dollar upgrades to its cement plant in Ravena, Lafarge continues to be labeled as one of the largest emitters of mercury in the state.

Located directly across from the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk High School, the Lafarge Cement Plant caught the attention of environmentalists, lawmakers and residents when the Environmental Protection Agency released a report in March that showed the Ravena plant put out nearly three times as much mercury in the air in 2006 than the second-largest polluter, a coal-fired power plant near Buffalo. The plant is ranked eighth nationwide among mercury polluters.

President of the Lafarge United States East Cement Business Unit Joe Goss said the upgrades in Ravena would have "a significant impact" on reducing the emissions from the plant.

Goss said the proposed upgrades would give the plant state-of-the-art manufacturing technology and help ensure the firm's success in the community. The plans include a 525-foot smoke stake, which would be nearly 140 feet taller than the current one.

The state's Department of Environmental Conservation told Lafarge it would have to provide a draft environmental impact statement on its proposed upgrades, and the DEC hosted a public information meeting to discuss the issue Thursday, Oct. 29, at the RCS High School.

"Mercury is a very dangerous metal, which is changed into methyl mercury, the most dangerous form, which forms in sediments and concentrates in fish that people then eat," said Dr. David O. Carpenter, director of the Institute for Health and the

Environment at the University at Albany. "Methyl mercury causes loss of IQ and shortened attention span in children and increases risk of heart disease in adults."

Environmental groups such as Earthjustice are calling on the state to implement more regulations on mercury emissions.

"New York's cement kilns are the state's silent mercury polluters," said Earthjustice attorney Keri Powell. "For years, the Lafarge cement kiln has gotten a free pass from the federal government, which has neglected to set a national standard limiting mercury pollution from the cement industry. It's time for New York to step in and stop Lafarge from spewing this incredibly toxic poison into our air."

The DEC said the draft environmental impact statement (DEIS) required of Lafarge would document the emissions of the plant.

"Although the modernization of the plant likely will reduce the mercury emissions, the DEIS will describe the change in the level of air concentration associated with the modernized plant," the DEC report stated.

The state's DEC also wants Lafarge to disclose its carbon dioxide emissions, which is identified as a greenhouse gas.

Earthjustice, along with the New York Public Interest Research Group, reported that they delivered 3,100 postcards from New York residents to DEC Commissioner Pete Grannis and lobbied him to include mercury limits at the Lafarge Plant. The group also commissioned two billboards along Interstate 787 urging the DEC to adopt mercury standards for the plant.

HEAP application process open

Help filling out paperwork available for seniors

The temps are dropping, but help could be on the way.

Town residents can now start applying for the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), a

program that helps individuals on fixed or low incomes with their heating bills. To qualify a resident has to make \$1,876 per month or less for one individual or \$2,454 per month or less for two individuals.

The program is available to all Albany County residents, and for those 60 or older outreach worker Jane Sanders of Bethlehem Senior Services is available to help assist applicants at Town Hall. She can be reached at 439-4955, extension 1173.

Appointments are preferred but not required, according to town officials.

Residents need to provide all of the following: proof of all household income for the four

most recent weeks; rent receipt, or lease or mortgage or sewer bill; social security cards for all applicants and birth certificates for those under six; and the most recent fuel or utility bill or statement from the landlord if utilities are included.

Sanders said that applications are typically taken "first-come, first-serve" and that the HEAP fund is limited, so that when the funding runs out, the program has officially ended for the season. The earlier you apply, the better position you have on the list, she said.

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The reality of helping with homework

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Forget "Survivor," "American Idol" and "Who wants to be a millionaire?" For gut-wrenching suspense, just look inside the home of any school-age child and watch the family playing the scariest of all reality shows: "Who wants to help with the homework?"

In Round One, parents have to determine what the homework is and when it's due. To help with these tasks, you get a loaded backpack (contents vary) and your child (contents vary). Some teachers have Web sites that may contain eye-opening clues, but you get more points if you can obtain the same information from your child.

In Round Two, parents have to get the child to complete the homework. You get extra points if the child also has time to eat, bathe and sleep in the same week. You get double points if the parents get sufficient sleep in the same week. A gold medal is awarded if nobody in the family yells or cries.

Over the years I've become more skilled in the Round One activities. For example, don't waste too much time with questions like, "How much homework do you have?" Your child will most likely answer:

"two pounds worth," "none," "not much," "a lot," or "I don't know." None of those answers is correct.

When you ask, "How much homework?" what you really want to know is "How much time will it take you to complete your homework?" Don't waste a lot of time asking that question either. Your child will mostly likely underestimate the amount of time. One reason this happens is because your child doesn't include procrastination time in her estimate ("I can't find the worksheet," "I need to sharpen my pencil," "I need to tap my pencil and stare out the window"). Another reason is that your child will "forget" to include all assignments.

A better approach is to ask: "What homework do you have?" This challenges the child to remember something that the teachers said that day and relay the information to you. The answer should include something about the subject matter, such as the words "math" or "science." But it won't give you the full picture.

Round One begins in our house when I utter the command: "Bring me the Assignment Notebook." The Assignment Notebook isn't just any notebook. It's not a pocket calendar or a writing tablet stuck to a giant flip-flop or a sticky-note pad. The Assignment Notebook is a school-issued (parent bought) spiral notebook that serves as both a calendar and a place to record and track homework. It's divided into columns and has pre-labeled spots for the common subjects (math, science, social studies, language, etc.) and additional space to write reminders for any unique classes or activities.

Our daughter, now a seventh-grader, has been bringing home an Assignment Notebook since at least as far back as fourth grade. Prior to that time the teachers would generally send home a sheet describing homework. In other words, the schools have been teaching my child how to track and manage assignments. For that, I am grateful.

I'm also grateful that my husband also plays "Who wants to help with the homework?" It's a lot easier to play as a team. That way, one adult player can go foraging for dinner while the other attempts to assist the child. And yet, there are many nights when Jeff and I both try to vote ourselves off the homework island.

But back to Round One: Once the Assignment Notebook is in hand, the sleuthing work

Assignment Notebook. They told us that they not only write the assignment on the board, but they also give the students time to copy down the information. One teacher assured us that for at least a few weeks he would walk around the room and make sure the students record the words. Clearly though, at some point, the kids need to take on the responsibility themselves. I'm thinking that point may be called "college," but hopefully it happens sooner.

And so, knowing that some of the entries in the Assignment Notebook are written in invisible ink, I always inquire about each subject: "Any work for

begins. Sleuthing is involved because the notebook only contains what the child has discussed down. You need to discuss the contents with your sons and daughters.

I start by reading each item on the list and asking about what's NOT written down. Sometimes the whole assignment is written down, for example: "Math: Do problems 1-24, even." However, that only tells you the quantity of math problems assigned for homework. It doesn't tell you the type of problem (short calculation, word problem graphing, etc.) or whether or not your child feels comfortable with the material. To find that out you need to ask to see the actual assignment (worksheet or pages in the book) and ask your child, "Do you know how to do this?"

Other entries in the notebook will make no sense to anyone who wasn't in class that day. For those entries I ask, "What is this?" and "What does it mean?"

At Open House Night at school this year every one of my daughter's teachers told the parents to check the

English?" I'll ask, even though the space in the notebook is blank. And Rachel will say, "Just writer's notebook" and I'll say, "Then just write that down in this book."

Some of the entries may be written in code. I know that "WN" means "writer's notebook" and I know to ask, "How many pages do you need to write?"

An essential question to ask is, "Are there any tests coming up?" Sometimes your child will only write down assignments that are due the very next day. So, the teacher may announce an upcoming test a week in advance, but it doesn't get recorded in the notebook until the night before.

Another fun question to ask is, "When is the assignment due?" Your child will most likely answer, "Tomorrow," "I don't know," or "The teacher didn't tell us." Inevitably the homework is due sooner than later.

Well, I'd love to give some advice about surviving Round 2 of "Who wants to help with the homework?" but right now I have to arm wrestle Jeff to see whose turn it is to play the game today.



Kormos' lawyer: Charges are inadequate

Hearing of CZAC member postponed indefinitely

With the initial hearing for New Scotland advisory committee member Liz Kormos postponed indefinitely, her counsel is seeking to have the charges dropped for a number of reasons.

Kormos, a member of the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee, has been accused by Committee Chairwoman Roz Robinson of having a conflict of interest regarding her relationship with a potential buyer of the Bender melon farm, a key piece of property inside the commercial zone.

That developer was later outbid by Sphere Development LLC, who is planning to develop the farm with a 137,000-square-foot anchor store, pending the approval of zoning laws recommended by the committee and approved by the Town Board.

Kormos also is a member of advocacy group New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, which supports a 50,000-square-foot size cap on commercial retail stores.

Town Attorney Mike Mackey said town officials could remove Kormos without a hearing, since she is a political appointee, but she would still have the right to an ethics hearing.

In a letter dated Monday, Oct. 27, Kormos' attorney, Peter Lauricella, laid out his complaints with the proceedings thus far.

"I must respectfully disagree that the statement prepared by Ms. Robinson and the documents forwarded to me constitute a 'complaint.' We continue to believe the 'complaint' is defective, as Ms. Kormos still has not been notified what law she potentially has violated," he wrote.

Lauricella said that anytime a person is charged with violating a law that carries a penalty or punitive action, that person must receive a written notice of the specific charge in question.

He likened it to a traffic ticket issued to a driver speeding or running a stop sign. He said the officer hands you an "information," more commonly known as a ticket, that specifies which traffic law you are being charged with violating. He said the general claim that Kormos violated ethics law is inadequate.

As of this point, the town considers Robinson's statement legitimate.

"It is my understanding that the board considers the written statement prepared by Roz Robinson, together with the documents forwarded to [Lauricella] constitute the Complaint against [Kormos]," New Scotland Supervisor Tom

Dolin said in a Monday, Oct. 27, letter.

Further, Lauricella said in a letter dated Friday, Oct. 31, that general municipal law states in section 808 (3), that "the Town Board can not act as the Board of Ethics." He said the law states the ethics board must have at "least three members a majority of whom are not otherwise officers or employees of such municipality."

Mackey said in a letter to Dolin, also dated Oct. 31, that adopting a new local law could remedy the situation.

"As far as the current hearing goes, it can proceed before the County Ethics Board. The law gives that board jurisdiction in the event there is no local board," Mackey's letter states.

Lauricella also criticized the evidence the board has presented, and said the redacted documents sent to Kormos regarding the matter should have been sent unredacted.

"Ms. Kormos is entitled to see these documents unredacted. The town is not entitled to make redactions to evidence without court approval," he wrote.

"It's another reason that this

whole thing has been mishandled from day one," Lauricella said in a later interview. "I think that the whole thing should be dropped."

Lauricella also said he believes Peg Neri, a member of the Town Board, should recuse herself from the matter, since Lauricella believes prior comments Neri made about Kormos' alleged conflict of interest show she has a bias against her.

Neri did not respond to inquiries made by the *Spotlight Newspapers* seeking comment.

Lauricella is also asking the town to provide a list of witnesses it plans to call in the proceedings. Dolin said the town is still planning to hold a public hearing to determine if Kormos has violated the town's ethics code, but no date is set. A hearing was scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 29, but was postponed due to concerns from Lauricella about "general procedure

and due process." Dolin said that the town postponed the hearing to give Lauricella adequate time to prepare Kormos' defense.

"There was a question of filing procedure to be followed," he added.

Dolin said the town is still working out some of the details of the proceeding, and said that the board has decided to seek outside counsel to argue the charges against Kormos, opting not to use Mackey.

"It is still up in the air," Dolin said of the litigation. "We have to finalize the procedures."

A public hearing to extend the moratorium is set for Wednesday, Nov. 12. The Town Board can then vote on the extension. Without an extension, there would be no 50,000-square-foot cap on retail developments in the commercial zone.

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

Walker's heart was in the cause

A moment to remember: There I was on Saturday, Oct. 25, 2008, galloping across the finish line at the Saratoga Race Track. Oops; my ego went a little bit overboard on that one.

But I was there, and I did cross the finish line at the second annual American Heart Association North Country Heart Walk wearing my Spotlight T-shirt as a member of the Spotlight Team. As I approached the finish line, I was meandering along and waving at my teammates who had already finished and were anxiously waiting for me so we could wrap things up, take a group picture and get on with our lives.

No galloping horses, just people walking together on behalf of an important and meaningful cause: maintaining healthy hearts and battling cardiovascular diseases. Our team and the others were there to support the cause and raise money toward fighting heart disease and stroke. Some of us, me included, were strolling along kind of slowly and chatting among ourselves as we wound our way to the finish line.

I might as well fess up now: I think I was the very last member of our team and probably even the whole walking group to cross the finish line. However, the irony for me, which did not register until just a few days before the walk, was the date of the event. Saturday, Oct. 25, was exactly — to the date and same day of the week — the 11th anniversary of the day I moved from the St. Peter's Hospital cardiac recovery unit to the physical rehabilitation unit in order to continue my incredible adventure through very serious, life-threatening, cardiac surgery to replace a failing aortic valve.

On that day 11 years ago, I could barely stand and needed a walker for my first tentative steps. Who knew that my life would return to

normal, much less that I would ever participate in this kind of event? Even before my illness I just was not into this kind of physical activity, but things do change — my illness had a profound effect on me and my view of the seriousness of healthy heart concerns.

During my recovery period, my wife was always there for me, and I probably would not be in whatever condition I am in today without her supportive encouragement and creative suggestions. Just as she was there on that day 11 years ago, she was with me at the Heart Walk. She began and finished the 3-mile distance a little quicker than I did, but that's just because she was trying to maintain a healthy pace, step by step.

Since my first day of working for *Spotlight Newspapers*, I have felt the sense of teamwork among the employees. While my role as a part-time courier (sometimes known as *Spotlight* delivery guy) is significantly different from the creative spirit of the reporters, production staff, advertising representatives and other support staff, I have always identified myself as a member of the *Spotlight* team.

The teamwork spirit really came alive on Saturday, as my teammates and I began our walk. The weather almost pulled a fast one on us. For days we had been hearing about possible rain or worse, and the morning of the walk definitely had rain in the air. The drive up the Northway to the Saratoga Flat track was filled with splashing, mist and gobs of water on the windshield. The trip took on even more adventure with a wrong turn and almost getting lost. After corrective action, I finally arrived at the track, found a parking spot, walked farther than I expected to the registration area and found the team.

My first thought: Where was everybody? Not too many *Spotlight* T-shirts were present yet. My concern about getting there late was unfounded. Everyone else had to contend with weather concerns, too. But, as the start time approached, more and more teammates began to surface, and the weather was working in our favor.

During the initial arrival time, people were milling around, connecting with their walking teams and getting ready to start walking. We all sort of stood around talking to friends and strangers, listening to the music and speeches from the stage and reflecting on our own personal reasons for being there.

Cardiac recovery patients were given red caps to signify their successful recovery stories. We were invited to gather in front of the stage and wave our caps in acknowledgement of the rest of the

walkers. As I looked out on the people facing us, I saw a variety of reactions, including smiles and what looked like some tears. That moment once again reminded me that people who suffer from cardiac disorders are not only patients, but family members and friends as well. Looking around at the group of people wearing red caps also reinforced the fact that heart issues have no age or gender boundaries.

Finally, after the initial welcome, introduction presentations and remarks, and a touching rendition of the national anthem by a group of young women, everyone began to line up for the starting gun. And then, "bang," we were off. The crowd began to move forward. A variety of groups forming different teams were walking interspersed with one another and setting their own pace.

Whether by intent or accident, the *Spotlight* team began the walk near the end of the line. As the walk progressed, some people moved ahead a little faster than others, and the crowd began to spread out more and more. It also became obvious some families were walking while other walkers were by themselves. There were children young enough to be pushed in strollers and even family dogs participating.

When I signed on to be a part of the team, I wasn't sure I could finish the 3 miles because it had been a long time since I've even attempted that kind of distance. But I was assured that there were shortcuts and cutoffs if necessary, and I knew there would be some slow walkers that I could join if I really felt the need. That part of my plan worked out perfectly since some of my teammates and other walkers were also leaning a little toward the drift and wander technique.

During the easy pace, take a step, stop and rest, look around, and talk to the closest walker, I got to know some of my fellow *Spotlight* teammates a little bit better. We all shared a few laughs, exchanged some interesting stories, and wondered: "Are we there yet?" and "How far have we gone so far?"

The reason for the walk was to show support and thank the American Heart Association for its effort to combat cardiovascular diseases and to raise funds for research, education and advocacy to help prevent, treat and defeat heart disease and stroke. The *Spotlight* team spirit was in bountiful supply that day, and we were all happy to participate in and contribute to this meaningful cause.

I definitely pledge to be part of the effort next year. I am sure the *Spotlight* team will be there too, and our loyal readers are welcome to walk with us in support of this noble effort. So come on, friends, next year saddle up (well, at least put on your walking shoes), and meet us at the 2009 starting gate. I promise you will have a "hearty" good time.

Town Republican Party lacks good leadership

reschedule the organizational meeting that she had scheduled on Yom Kippur, the holiest day in the Jewish religious calendar, after being informed of that fact by Mitch Goldstein, to a time that all committee people, regardless of religious affiliation, would be able to attend — I resigned my membership in the Bethlehem Republican Committee.

The fact that many of the longtime members of the Bethlehem Republican Committee were not troubled by this conduct of its leaders indicated to me that the differences in values between us were too great to reconcile.

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

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

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

Linkage study puts long-term plan in place

Guilderland and Princetown consider ways to develop land along Route 20

With most of the funding and execution regarding the inter-municipal Route 20 corridor project a good deal of time away, officials say that having a long-term plan in place will help secure funding and set both towns in the right direction.

The towns of Guilderland and Princetown have prepared a plan to guide development of a 4-mile stretch of Route 20 between Route 158 and Duanesburg, which made recommendations for land use and transportation upgrades, according to information provided by the towns. The plan is part of a linkage study conducted by the Capital District Transportation Committee.

A public meeting on Thursday, Oct. 30, at Princetown Town Hall featured a presentation of the recommendations.

John Behan, of Behan Planning Associates, said the meeting yielded a lot of success. Behan has been hired as a consultant for the project, and he emphasized the importance of mutually beneficial agreements between

localities.

"The towns can help reinforce the others' goals," he said.

He said Princetown is primarily looking to develop its end of the corridor commercially, while Guilderland is hoping to receive water from Princetown. The deal could result in revenue generated from Princetown's water supply, as well as the ability for Guilderland to more easily develop its end, since it does not have access to water from within the town.

"A policy point of view has been reached," Behan said. "That is an important step."

He also said safety enhancements for the roads are a priority in the area. The state Department of Transportation and the CDTC have made recommendations to perform highway and traffic safety improvements that could help consolidate and organize driveways and parking lots, be a positive step for real estate values and create "less of a chance for cars coming out onto the highway at the same time."

Chris O'Neill, a representative of the CDTC, said it's important to get local communities to talk about their vision cooperatively. He said there is strong support for the transportation recommendations of the corridor

project, specifically a traffic signal for the Route 20 and Route 397 intersection, along with sidewalks and pedestrian crossings along Route 20 and the potential construction of a roundabout where routes 158 and 20 intersect.

Discussions at the Oct. 30 meeting also included a path along Route 20 that could serve as a bike path or walking trail. "It could be a nice amenity for both towns," Behan added.

O'Neill said money is tight for state and federal government, but that does not mean the project cannot be funded.

"We want to get a plan that allows the towns to take advantage of opportunities as they arrive," O'Neill said. "It's a challenge but it's worth it."

Behan added that funding

could likely be done on a "project-specific basis," and added that both towns mutually endorsing the project could help attain state or federal grants in the future.

Donald Csaposs, a grant writer for the town of Guilderland, said a long-term plan for both communities would make development easier as residents begin pushing for it.

"When development pressure does come from the community, [we now] have the framework to begin the actual process," he said.

Csaposs also agrees that planning now will help with grant funding from the government, as well as getting private developers on board to helping pay for infrastructure expenses.

Paul Hasbrouck, a representative for Princetown

emphasized the importance of cooperation between the two towns. "Inter-municipal agreements need to be done," Hasbrouck said, "especially in rural areas."

He also said Princetown is in the process of updating its comprehensive plan and is considering using some of the recommendations for areas of Route 7 that are under similar circumstances.

Stephen Feeney, chair of the Guilderland Planning Board and County Planner for Schenectady, said the meeting was successful in laying out long-term plans and that "development is always going to happen incrementally."

"You need to have a goal in mind," Feeney said. "It's important to get out in front of these issues," he said.



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

"We see it used every day; information about how the government functions. It's important especially now, two weeks before the election," said Bob Freeman, the executive director for COOG, and one of the state's leading authorities on FOIL, in an Oct. 21 interview.

Freeman said the law can be used by citizens, reporters concerned with the activities of government officials and even government officials themselves.

In another example of the law's many uses, an advisory opinion penned by Freeman in December 2005, cited the ability of companies to use it for commercial purposes.

"It's a diverse law. Anyone can make a request regardless if you are from New Scotland or Timbuktu," Freeman said.

"There are records practically dealing with everything."

When used commercially, however, FOIL cannot be used to obtain lists of names and addresses for fundraising purposes, as it would constitute an "unwarranted invasion of property."

The law at work

When a FOIL request is made, the governing body must respond within five days to inform the person making the inquiry that they are looking into the request. The governing body has 20 days to either comply or provide a written response as to why the records could not be obtained.

The law does have some limitations that allow for the withholding documents that would "be an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy," would inhibit a criminal investigation, are protected by state or federal statute, or would endanger the life or safety of any person.

Also, the law does not require the information access officer fulfilling the request to compile or create a document. It only pertains to documents that already exist.

Freeman cited a few instances where FOIL had a tangible, direct impact on government

How to make a FOIL request

The following is based on the New York state committee on open government.

• First, address the request to the "records access officer" of the public body you believe to be in possession of the requested documents. If the request is an e-mail, use the subject header, "FOIL request."

• In the request to the records access officer, include the following statements:

A) Please e-mail the following records if possible; include as much detail about the record as possible, as requests that are too broad can be denied.

B) Please advise me of the appropriate time during normal business hours for inspecting the following records prior to obtaining copies; include as much detail about the records as possible, including relevant dates, names and descriptions.

C) Please inform me of the cost of providing paper copies of the following records. (If the information can be e-mailed it must, by law, which has no charge; 25 cents per page is the most that can be charged)

D) If the requested records cannot be e-mailed to me due to the volume of records identified in response to my request, please advise me of the actual cost of copying all records onto a CD or floppy disk.

E) If my request is too broad or does not reasonably describe the records, please contact me via e-mail so that I may clarify my request.

F) Provide alternative contact information, such as a telephone number.

G) Please inform me of the reason, if any, for the denial of my request, and the contact information to whom an appeal can be directed.

and citizens, including "Troopergate," where state-funded surveillance was questioned regarding former Gov. Eliot Spitzer and former Senate Majority leader Joseph Bruno.

Freeman also cited a local attorney who was required to repay money for pension abuse, and school attorneys being paid on the books for full-time jobs in as many as five different school districts as results that came about following a FOIL search.

Beyond shedding light on graft or abuse of power, FOIL can be used by citizens trying to get access to documents that have a direct effect on them.

One such instance Freeman

people who dodge their E-ZPass bills. As a result of the information, the state hired a collection agency and collected millions of dollars in money owed.

Who's FOILING whom?

Freeman said that while all citizens are allowed equal access to FOIL documents, some should be expected to go out of their way to use the law to their advantage.

"The media has no special rights, but special responsibilities," he said. "They are the eyes and the ears of the public."

Freeman said some people even FOIL other FOIL requests. He said it is commonly done when reporters are trying to get a heads up on what other reporters are looking for.

"It's an old reporter's trick to see what everyone else is up to," he said.

Government officials can use the law the same way a citizen or reporter can, and in one case in October, the law was at the heart of a controversy involving a recent lawsuit by Albany County Minority Leader Christine Benedict, R-Albany, against District Attorney David Soares, alleging Soares failed to comply with a FOIL request.

The lawsuit charged that Soares didn't provide information requested by Benedict

each week, and are responsible for answering them and directing them to the appropriate party.

"We usually get about 90 to 100 requests per year," said Geoffrey Hall, the records information officer for Schenectady County.

He said those requests are often diverse, and it is usually the case that he will deflect the request to other departments.

"I'm kind of the clearing house," Hall said. "The county is a diverse enterprise."

Hall said almost all of the FOIL requests make their way to his office, even the ones sent directly to other departments, and he keeps a file of each of them.

Saratoga County public access officer Barbara Plummer said she often receives as many as 125 to 150 requests each year.

She said many requests come during lawsuits where people are concerned with contracts that the county has entered into. She also said a good deal are concerned with the sheriff's department and property value.

"There are lots of requests for lists of property owners who have not paid their taxes," Plummer said.

She also said people will ask for a list of 911 calls to see what crime has been responded to.

She said soon, though, almost everything will be available online and there will be no need for requests. The town's assessments records are already completely online, and more information is put online each day.

Freeman said the COOG is getting ready to make its annual recommendation to the legislature about improvements to the law. He said lately government officials have taken a closer look at those recommendations and have implemented some of them.

Recently the law put provisions in it that mandate any information that could reasonably be sent via e-mail must be sent electronically, thus sparing the recipient the 25-cent per page fee to reproduce the documents.

described involved a woman who called his office Monday, Oct. 20, and asked about using FOIL to check the certification of her daughter's special education teachers.

"These are critical issues," Freeman said.

The law, he said, has a variety of uses to save taxpayers money.

He cited a recent news story that used information gathered from a FOIL request to bolster the reporting about


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

Morelli said, would be disruptive to neighbors.

"Essentially you're walking down someone's driveway," Morelli said.

"The goal of the comprehensive plan is to have a network of trails and pathways when appropriate. ... We're looking at the big picture here," Morelli said. "We were hoping we could take a common sense approach to this to allow for the proposal to go forward."

However, neighbor John Mariconti said the town is being stubborn over access, and he is worried Richards will sell the parcel if an agreement can't be reached.

"It's gone nowhere, and it's such an unbelievable gift," Mariconti said. "I think the public would be flabbergasted to learn about this. All the neighbors that border this property just can't believe it."

In Richards' proposal, a 25-acre portion of the land in the subdivision would be sold to the Open Space Institute for \$60,000, according to Terresa Bakner, who represents Richards. If added to the preserve, that land would provide Five Rivers access from within the Town of Bethlehem. Currently, the preserve can only be reached through the town of New Scotland.

"It's taken us a while to get here ... and there are no subdivisions that we are aware of on the history of this property," Bakner told the board in April. "The land could have been divided into dozens of lots if they wanted to develop it. ... While the wetlands on the site are in several locations, it in no way inhibits the development."

The development plans call for transferring the donated acreage to the Open Space Institute and eventually the Delmar Wildlife Conservation, which is owned by the state.

Planning Board Chairman Parker Mathusa asked for a 20-

foot easement on both sides of a potential access point near one of the proposed lots.

"I want 20 feet on both sides," Mathusa told Bakner at a Sept. 16 planning board meeting. "I don't mean to be heavy on this, but I want to be sure."

Mathusa said at the meeting that there was some confusion over the donated land, and he was looking for adequate access to the property.

"I, maybe erroneously, believed we had another access ... because it's important to get to that park," Mathusa said at that meeting, calling the property "landlocked."

At the Oct. 7 planning board meeting, the topic once again came up. The ensuing stalemate has caused frustration for all parties involved, including town planners and Richards, who now lives in California, to the point where one neighbor offered to buy a piece of the land from Richards and deed it over to the town.


Bakner said in September that it was an "oddly shaped parcel," and that she was unsure if they could give the full 20-foot easement with the current plans. She has reminded the board on several occasions of what the property would be worth to a developer and, on behalf of Richards, expressed frustration over the delays in approval.

"She's quite frustrated with the process here, not with the board, but with the process," Bakner said at the time. "She's being given \$60,000 for 24 acres [the access land in question], and she could turn around tomorrow and get \$300,000. ... At some point, you hit a tipping point."

Another neighbor, Frank Crisafulli, offered to buy the land off of Fisher Boulevard, but Mariconti contends that there are federally protected wetlands near the site, and it may not even be a viable option.

Mariconti called on the supervisor to weigh in on the matter.

"This is prime land we're talking about. ... Mr. [Jack] Cun-

ningham, the town supervisor, campaigned on open spaces. Where is he now?" Mariconti asked. "I think the supervisor needs to comment on this, and I'm having difficulties getting a

hold of him."

Cunningham said he believes the Fisher Boulevard access would have the greatest benefit to the town, and he hopes the deal will be settled soon.

elect officers in which King and Republican Mitch Goldstein ran as officers and lost. A weighted vote was not used and Burns called a new vote.

However, the new vote was scheduled on Yom Kippur, something which King took issue with.

"There were short notices and postponements ... it started to become apparent they were playing games," King said of committee elections and meetings. "She scheduled it on Yom Kippur ... and we were the only two Jews on the committee."

King said he just assumed Burns didn't know when Yom Kippur was, but when it was brought to her attention she didn't move the meeting.

"We have to respect people's religious beliefs," King said. "Some could argue she's anti-Semitic."

Burns denied the charges.

"The only person who said anything about the date [Oct. 9] was Mitch Goldstein," Burns said. "I understand that Yom Kippur ends on sundown, so I didn't think there was a problem — and everyone was able to send proxies."

Burns said neither Goldstein nor King attended the meeting or sent in a proxy, which is a type of absentee vote.

On the flip side, former Republican committeeman Norman Morand, who also recently resigned, implied that Goldstein and King might have a problem with Burns besides her leadership.

"I don't think they like the fact there's a woman in charge," Morand said about King and Goldstein, "but she works hard and she deserves to be there."

When King was asked if he had a problem with a chairwoman running the party, he responded, "God, no."

"On the contrary, I actually like women as a candidate, they bring a softer side that's appealing to potential voters," King said.

King said he wasn't trying to take over the committee, but that he was only bringing in new members.

"When you have a rotten culture like we do there, you have to start fresh," King said. "It wasn't some kind of coup, it was just trying to recruit new people."

King said Burns knew what he was doing.

"I suspect Melody knew I was recruiting people," King said. "She wasn't recruiting people because frankly she doesn't inspire anyone."

King reached out for support from Morand, only to find he had retired.

"Hi Jared, I resigned as the 6th committee man on [Sept. 22]. I no longer want to be involved," Morand wrote in an e-mail response to King. "The committee is very small and if the Republican Party is ever to be successful in local politics everyone must work together. I suggest that if you and Mitch [Goldstein] can't work within the current organization, you both should resign for the better of the party."

In a later interview, when asked what he thought of the situation involving King, Morand

"We're encouraged with the whole development as it will add land to the state preserve. ... I think this will be a great development for the whole town," Cunningham said. "We're just trying to work with Ms. Richards to make this happen."

Morelli said the town's not trying to be difficult and has been moving the project forward as fast as it could.

With Richards living in California, he said, she has to go through an Albany-based lawyer (Bakner) who speaks with her and her lawyer and then has to work with the Town of Bethlehem.

He added that the Open Space Institute has offered to buy the 20-foot access and any other property "at fair market value," and that the access would not impact the proposed seven lots.

"This is actually a minor hang-up but it's kind of blown up into a major issue," Morelli concluded.

responded, "He's a smart guy, Jared's a very smart person but if he only put that toward good."

Another point of contention is the fact that even though Albany County and the Bethlehem committee endorsed James Buhrmaster in the 21st Congressional primary, King carried petition for Republican challenger Steven Vasquez as well.

"Jared didn't carry Jim's petition, he carried Steve's and never told us," Burns said. "I didn't know about any of that until after the fact, and I was like, 'What's going on?'"

King said he carried Vasquez's petition only after getting "a significant number of signatures" for Buhrmaster, and only to give people a choice. He also said his committee wasn't given a choice.

"The party endorsed Jim Buhrmaster, but we were never asked who we would like to endorse," King said. "I gave people a choice, that's our job as elected committee people." King said choice is the most important process in a primary and said he and his supporters within the committee did not like Buhrmaster's ties to former Senate Majority Leader Joe Bruno. "We don't like special interest politicians. We don't like Joe Bruno," he said.

Buhrmaster was only one of a number of various local, county and state Republicans and committee members named in King's e-mails. Others include Albany County Commissioner and County Republican Party Chairman John Graziano; Albany County GOP attorney Tom Marcelle; and Albany County District Attorney candidate and attorney Roger Cusick.

Calls to Graziano regarding the Bethlehem Republican Committee infighting were unreturned as of press time.

"They just sit there and say 'We're losing because of George Bush,' which is partly true, but they're just not doing their job as committee people," King said. "The only real difference between the Democrats and Republicans is that the Democrats fight for real power and Republicans fight over nothing."

King said his next step is to ask the committee members who support him if they want to form their own party or move forward within in the committee.

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



Environmental technology company opens global HQ in Slingerlands

Enjoy the outdoors, but be prepared

Smart hikers are ready for whatever Mother Nature throws their way

Outside, natural beauty abounds. Enjoying it on a full day hike, or a casual walk through the woods can make for a great time. Before setting off, though, there are a few basic safety rules to keep in mind. Although simple and straightforward, these tips can save you a lot of potential headache from trying to treat such nasties as poison ivy or a severe sunburn.

The following information is not meant to be a complete guide to outdoor safety, but it will get you in tune with some necessary precautions to better avoid unpleasant circumstances that may spoil your fun.

So get ready to set out and commune with Mother Nature. She has a lot to say if you listen carefully.

First, decide on an area that is appropriate. Older adults and small children may do best where slopes and long distances are not issues. Most hiking trails labeled easy to moderate are best suited for these age groups. Also, bring a topographic map of the general area, as well as picking up a map of the specific trails when available. And stay on the marked trails. Even experienced hikers can get off track and lose their sense of direction.

Travel in a group or have a buddy system especially when hiking with children. At the very least, let a friend or family member know where you are off to and when you expect to return. You may also be able to sign into a registration kiosk or building depending upon the area or facilities available. Registration areas are often found in the parking lot or at the main trailhead. Even though you're not off to extreme and wild areas, having somebody aware of your location isn't a bad idea.

Bring a watch, cell phone or two-way radio so you can be in contact with fellow hikers or home if needed. Of course you can't talk on the watch, but it will give you the time by which to synchronize accurate meeting times with your fellow hikers. Noon can be vague in conversation, but 12 p.m. on a watch - that's real time.

Bring a compass and know how to use it. Make a note - mental or otherwise - of the trailhead or a landmark, and what direction you are facing. Know what direction north is in relation to the direction you will be walking.

Take along water and a snack. You may get so caught up in something that time eludes you. Water will keep you hydrated and a little snack never hurt, especially if you spot a great log to take a rest on. Chocolate bars will give almost instant, but not long-lived energy, while proteins and complex carbohydrates will keep you going a little longer. Think peanut butter, bananas, apples etc.

Also, pay attention to your body and watch for signs of heat stress in the warmer months (not sweating, feeling clammy). Likewise, in the colder months be aware of frostbite and hypothermia. Of course, seek immediate

medical attention if you're unsure or symptoms are severe.

Know the weather forecast. It won't hurt to check live Doppler radar on the Internet before you leave the house. With the crazy pop up thunder boomer's this past summer and cooler weather now settling in, you can never be too sure. Keep an eye on the weather while you're out also. Lightening can be fast and furious. Avoid hiking in extreme weather conditions, such as very high or low temperatures, or extremely windy days.


Dress appropriately for conditions. Cotton clothing may be comfortable but tends to stay wet if you work up a sweat. Poly-synthetic blends breathe better and dry quickly. Also, dress in layers, this way you can edit your attire according to the elements.

In both warmer and colder months, apply sunscreen 30 minutes before getting out into the sun. In higher temperatures, a hat will keep sun exposure to a minimum, and also protect from bugs and spiders getting on your head and in your hair. Additionally, a hat will retain a lot of your body heat in colder weather. And remember that sunscreen should be applied to your face even in winter.

Use bug spray to repel-ticks and mosquitos. Ticks can carry Lyme disease, and mosquitos can carry West Nile virus. Do a tick check at the end of your adventure. Although they can attach to you anywhere, a favorite spot for ticks to bite/attach is at the base of the hairline on the back of your neck. Check with your doctor for identification of ticks and symptoms of Lyme disease and West Nile virus if you suspect either one.

Be able to identify poison ivy and poison oak. It helps to remember that "leaves of three, let it be" for poison ivy. Use guide books and Internet sites to help you with identification. Depending on the area you are in, venomous snakes may be present. Timber rattlesnakes may be present in the mountains near Lake George and in southern parts of the state. Seek medical attention if you suspect you have been bitten by a venomous snake. Again, field guides offer a wealth of information on identification here.

Check with regional Department of Environmental Conservation offices about what hunting seasons are open. Many hiking areas may be near or surrounded by land that is hunted. Many public lands are multi-use areas and do allow hunting. Many others - but not all

- public lands or state parks do not allow hunting. During hunting seasons, you should wear an orange hat or vest when hiking to make your presence known to hunters.

Make note of the natural landmarks before and during your outing. Aside from leaving a trail of breadcrumbs, your best bet is to spot a large tree or stand of trees, a boulder or open field to help orient you. High vertical landmarks work best since you can see them from a distance. But anything that will help orient you is a great advantage. Used with your compass, landmarks will serve to guide you.

If time and/or weather are interfering with you getting your fix of nature, an alternative is to run through safety tips and do some Internet research on things like poison ivy. On the inclement days, you can also get the family involved in an indoor or backyard "imagination hike" or scavenger hunt. Little kids love being able to turn a living room into a forest (group houseplants, make fake logs by covering low furniture in blankets), or uncovering clues that lead to a "treasure." The treasure could be a box of stickers, craft items or include a favorite snack. You're only as limited as your imagination on this one.

Outdoor ventures can be as simple as knocking around the backyard or as involved as an all day hike. The most important part is to have fun and be safe with mother nature. She's a great playmate and she loves to share her toys.

Fairy tale for the ages

Steamer No. 10's version of 'Snow White' is not just for the kids

Richard Chesser was getting ready to hold auditions for his latest play at Steamer No. 10 Theater when he ran into Matthew MacArevey.

Chesser asked MacArevey to try out for his production, and MacArevey did, winning a role.

Nine of them, in fact.

MacArevey stars as Prince Charming, the talking mirror and all seven dwarves in Steamer No. 10's production of "Snow White," which runs Nov. 8, 9 and 11 at the playhouse, 500 Western Ave., Albany.

"I didn't even know what the play was, let alone that I was going to play all seven dwarves," MacArevey said with a laugh.

MacArevey's multiple roles are just one of the twists in this production of "Snow White." Chesser wrote the play intent on keeping true to the Brothers Grimm's original version, which means that Snow White's evil stepmother is not her stepmother at all, but her birth mother. And when Snow White is poisoned by the apple, it's a good smack in the back of the head from a servant that jolts her awake.

Finances, Cress acknowledged, played a part in the decision to have MacArevey play so many parts. But beyond

that, Cress made the changes to the script because he was intrigued by the challenge of finding new ways to look at a story and bring it to life — a challenge the actors have embraced.

"It's this great story that isn't what people think of," MacArevey said. "It's done in a different way. It's done in a truer way. People will hopefully remember our version."

MacArevey credits good writing and his fellow actors with enabling him to pull off his assorted roles. More than one dwarf appears on stage at a time; MacArevey distinguishes between them with "plenty of turns."

"It's the first time I've ever had to change characters on stage," he said. "It's a challenge, but I think I've grown into it."

Rebecca Boswell, a veteran Steamer 10 actress, was almost expecting that challenge to be hers. After playing "an old, bald man" in the theater's production of "Sleeping Beauty," she didn't get her hopes up for a glamorous part in "Snow White."

So she was thrilled when she was tapped to play the title role.

Boswell said she enjoys character roles and pushing the limits. For Snow White, she strived to make her character's naiveté more endearing instead of annoying.

"We get to have a little fun with her," Boswell said. "There's a lot of comedy at her expense."

That comedy, she believes, will cut across generations, which is important for children's productions.

"It has to be a good show on two levels," Boswell said. "You have to entertain the parents, too."

That was a message Agnes E. Kapusta Skiff tried to convey to her friends when inviting them to the production. Don't be turned off by the fact "Snow White" is part of Steamer 10's "Kids' Fare,"

fairy tale.

"With many Disney tales, it's all about being happy," he said. "What's fascinating is this is a real exploration of how people treat each other."

For MacArevey, "Snow White" is a terrific play with which to make his Steamer 10 debut. A graduate of Columbia High School in East Greenbush, he's been acting for about 12 years, taking parts in faraway places like North Dakota and London.

Many of those parts were small, he said, so it was hard to ask anyone to make the trip to see him on stage.

"It's great to be able to have people come that haven't seen me do a show since high school," he said.

Like MacArevey, Boswell jokes that she is on a "boomerang tour," returning to the Capital District after acting in Mexico and Hawaii. The Albany High graduate has done some local commercials with SEFCU and the United Way, but said theater is her first love, and Steamer 10 is an ideal place to indulge that love.

"Doing the work here is really cool,"

she said. "You get to explore emotions. You get to be silly. It's really a lot of fun."

"Snow White" will be presented Saturday, Sunday and Tuesday, Nov. 8, 9 and 11 at the playhouse, 500 Western Ave., Albany. Tickets are \$12 general admission. For information, call 438-5503.

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

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



final that ended with Niskayuna advancing to the regionals on penalty kicks.

"I think it's going to be a close game ... a lot closer than the last one (a 3-0 Bethlehem win Sept. 11)," said Niskayuna coach Bryce Colby. "One thing that an artificial surface does is it narrows the gap."

"We've gone to penalty kicks the last two times we've faced them (in the playoffs); so hopefully we'll win in regulation this time," said Bethlehem coach Tom Rogan.

Both teams needed overtime to advance to the Sectional final. Bethlehem (20-0-0) edged Shenendehowa 1-0 last Saturday in Glens Falls on Kaitlyn Martin's goal in the second overtime period, while Niskayuna (14-4-

2) got past Shaker 3-2 in triple overtime.

"They were the seventh seed, but they were a better team than that," Colby said of Shaker (9-11-1), which brought up the rear in the hyper-tough Suburban Council North Division. "Their sophomore goaltender (Emily Johnson) was fantastic - really a big impact player for them."

Bethlehem had a hard time getting its offense going against Shen (13-6-2). The Eagles only had a handful of quality scoring chances in regulation and the first overtime period before Martin struck for her 17th goal of the season.

"They did a tremendous job on us defensively, and their goalie (Kim Elsworth) played the best I've ever seen her play," said Rogan.

Bethlehem's defense did an equally good job of shutting down Shen's attack. The Eagles allowed only one shot on goal the entire game, which Kiersten Swete easily handled.

"Our defense hasn't allowed a lot of quality (scoring) chances for anybody, and that continued Saturday," said Rogan.

There weren't a lot of quality chances for Niskayuna or Shaker in regulation time during Saturday's other semifinal, but that changed in overtime. Caitlin Cahalan tallied twice during the first two 10-minute overtime periods, but the Silver Warriors responded each time to force a sudden-victory overtime period. Whitney Frary ended the game with her team-leading 24th goal of the season.

"She's a real competitor," Colby said of Frary.

Wednesday's Bethlehem-Niskayuna showdown starts at 6 p.m., with the winner advancing to Saturday's regional final in Syracuse against the Section III champion.

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk has already punched its ticket to the regional level after beating Greenville 3-2 in last Friday's Class B Sectional final at Broadalbin-Perth.

The Indians scored three goals in a 17-minute span of the second half to win their first title in three decades. Chrissy Shepard had the first goal to erase a 1-0 deficit. Emily Scott then gave R-C-S the lead with a goal, and Ashley Wilson added an insurance goal a short time later.

It was the Indians' second consecutive trip to the Sectional final.

Another Super Bowl for R-C-S

Indians get rematch with Hudson Falls in Class B final

Two traditional powers will clash for the Section II, Class B football title Saturday in Amsterdam.

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk advanced to its ninth Super Bowl in the last 12 years with last Friday's 34-7 victory over Hudson, while Hudson Falls defeated previously

unbeaten Cohoes 28-21 Saturday to earn its second trip to the finals in the last six years.

"We've been blessed with a lot of good athletes, and our staff has stayed together for a long time," said R-C-S coach Gary VanDerzee.

"We played better (Friday)," said VanDerzee. "I don't know if it

was our best game of the season, but we played better."

Quarterback Keith Hoyt had a strong all-around game for R-C-S. Hoyt rushed for 78 yards and a touchdown, and he completed five of his seven passes for 66 yards including scoring strikes of 32 and seven yards.

Tailback C.J. Murray also came up big for the Indians. He gained 102 yards on 13 carries including a 65-yard touchdown run to open the third quarter and give R-C-S a 21-0 lead.

Saturday's Class B Super Bowl kicks off at 3 p.m.

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Protecting assets in a volatile market

The recent market volatility has made us think twice about a number of things in our financial lives, including how we invest, how and when we borrow money and, certainly, whether we have the appropriate risk management plans in place to see us into and through retirement.

One area garnering more attention lately is long term care planning – both having the right plan in place and having those plans adequately funded and protected. For many NY residents, long term care insurance (LTCi) can be an effective and efficient way to transfer all or part of that risk (which can be substantial) of a long term care event to a third party, thus protecting the plans we've made to ensure that what we want to happen will happen if we need care later. With the challenges the financial markets have experienced recently, some residents who previously were planning to rely on their own funds to pay for long term care, if needed (i.e. "self-insuring") are finding that those

earmarked funds now amount to far less than they once did. Thus, funds earmarked for other uses may then need to be liquidated to pay for needed care.

Many New Yorkers have chosen to protect their retirement incomes and/or nest eggs by purchasing LTCi under the New York State Partnership for Long Term Care. With some recent changes at the federal and state level (largely brought about by the Deficit Reduction Act (DRA) of 2005), the ability of NY residents



(as well as residents of other states) to give away their assets and hope to qualify for Medicaid financed long term care has been significantly restricted. The effect of that restriction has been, in part, to shine a more favorable light than ever on the adequacy of LTCi as a payment mechanism for LTC costs.

Brought about by DRA 2005 was to expand the availability of LTC "Partnership" programs throughout the country, NY has, in fact, had a Partnership plan in place since the early 1990's. NY was one of 4 states that were, in essence,

"grandfathered" because of various legislative actions.

Partnership plans are so named because they are a "partnership" between the resident of the state in question (NY, in our instance), the state Medicaid system and the respective participating LTCi insurance carriers. The NYS Partnership allows eligible residents to protect (i.e. keep) all or a portion of their assets, while allowing Medicaid to pay for needed LTC costs. In short, they work as follows:

NYS resident purchases an approved NYS Partnership LTCi policy

Upon needing care and qualifying for policy benefits, the Partnership policy holder uses policy benefits as a "first pay" option and [usually] exhausts the policy benefits available

Partnership policyholder may then apply for "Medicaid Extended Coverage" and is afforded asset protection not afforded similar residents who do not have such a Partnership plan

Ongoing costs of care from

that point forward are picked up by Medicaid under the aforementioned Medicaid Extended Coverage.

There are a number of things to consider when deciding whether a Partnership policy makes sense for us. They include:

- Whether we will continue to live in the state of NY upon needing care and subsequently applying for Medicaid benefits – while LTCi policy benefits are portable, the asset protection afforded under the Partnership is not. The NY resident must reside in NY to access those benefits

- Preference for location of care – once policy benefits have been exhausted, care is delivered in the manner Medicaid would otherwise typically allow; for example, if the resident would like to receive care at home, those benefits will likely be much less available under Medicaid financed care. The more prevalent location for care while on Medicaid is typically in a nursing care facility.

Income is not protected under

the NYS Partnership – generally, the same rules regarding how income is treated by Medicaid apply to the Partnership-qualified applicant as to a Medicaid applicant without a Partnership policy

The NYS Partnership is a great option for certain NY residents (though not for everyone) to consider when making plans for long term care and, as is often the case, the best time to start planning is "sooner rather than later." The younger a resident is, the lower her LTCi premium will be (if insurance is an appropriate option) and the more likely she will be to qualify for the coverage (one does need to qualify medically to get the coverage). The decision about which LTCi policy is the best fit for a particular resident is best approached with the help of a financial professional (Agent or Broker, Financial Planner, CPA, Attorney) who is conversant in long term care planning, as well as with long term care insurance.

As we reflect on the current financial challenges, ensuring our plans are well protected becomes obvious. So, too, does the need to recognize that our ability to "self-insure" for such risks may be seriously impacted by market downturns. Many of our affiliated advisors' clients take the attitude that they would be better off "using pennies now to protect dollars later" and sleep better at night knowing they have transferred a majority of the LTC risk to an insurer, rather than retaining that risk themselves, thus preserving their retirement goals and dreams.



Cholesterol matters to your heart

Everyone knows they should watch their cholesterol, but do you know why? If you have high cholesterol, you may have twice the risk for heart disease — the number one health problem for both women and men in the United States.

High levels of cholesterol can lead to heart disease, heart attacks and strokes. Bad cholesterol, known as LDL, floats through your bloodstream, occasionally catching on the inside walls of the blood vessels. If enough cholesterol accumulates in one spot, the buildup — known as a plaque — can block the passage of blood. The resulting restriction of blood flow to the heart can cause a heart attack, while restriction of blood to the brain can lead to a stroke.

Luckily, you may be able to reduce your risk of suffering one of these life-threatening events by lowering your bad cholesterol levels. You can check your cholesterol level through a simple blood test. The National

Cholesterol Education Program (NCEP) recommends LDL cholesterol levels below 130 mg/dL for people without heart disease but at moderate risk for developing heart disease. For those people with heart disease or a disease that puts them at high risk (such as diabetes), the recommended LDL cholesterol levels are below 100 mg/dL. Further reductions to 70 mg/dL are optimal and may be beneficial for those at particularly high risk.

To control your cholesterol levels, you should limit your intake of foods that are high in saturated fats and cholesterol, such as fatty meats and whole milk. Eat plenty of fruits, vegetables and other high-fiber foods, and be sure to exercise as recommended by your doctor.

In some cases, however, lifestyle changes alone are not enough. In those instances, medications including statins might be prescribed to lower cholesterol levels further. Thanks in part to the availability of these medications, the average pa-

tient today is considerably more likely to reach their LDL cholesterol goals than they were just 10 years ago.

Because high cholesterol doesn't cause day-to-day symptoms, it can easily go undetected. Many people don't know they have high cholesterol until they develop symptoms of heart

Care links announces expansion

The Care Links Interfaith Community Caregivers Program, a nationally recognized all-volunteer program providing essential services to seniors who need just a little assistance to remain safe and secure in their own homes and neighborhoods, has expanded their services to Mechanicville.

Established in 1996 by a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the Care Links program has received national recognition for the no-cost services provided to seniors in Clifton Park, Halfmoon, Malta, and now, Mechanicville.

Presently, Care Links has 150 volunteers assisting over 200 receivers as young as 60 years of age. Many are women, and over 30% of receivers have annual incomes of under \$25,000. Volunteers provide a variety of services, such as transportation for medical appointments, shopping and errands, meal preparation, light house-keeping, small home repair, information and referral, telephone assurance and regular friendly visits.

A large and growing component of the Care Links program is providing respite services to caregivers. This service is particularly important in view of the fact that many caregivers are still in the workforce, raising

their own families, living with multiple stresses or may be elderly themselves.

A secondary aspect of their respite service is the organization and facilitation of an ongoing Alzheimer's Support Group for caregivers of those suffering from Alzheimer's.

Care Links' expansion into Mechanicville will offer over 2,000 seniors the opportunity to receive essential services, at no-cost, which may assist them in their daily activities.

With the anticipated growth in the number of people 60 years of age and older, it is becoming evident, and more urgent, that community services create supportive and flexible options for seniors who have the desire to maintain an independent lifestyle and remain safe, secure

and happy in their own homes and neighborhoods. In many cases proprietary, home based healthcare services may be financially unavailable to a majority of middle to low income seniors, and the goal to age at home, with support, becomes harder to achieve for a vast number of people 60 years of age and older. If not for many "grass roots" community-based programs, like Care Links, the number of seniors living less than optimum lives in institutions, of one description or another, would likely swell.

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Embury Apartments to see major updates

Saratoga Springs senior living facility will get safety and cosmetic enhancements

Embury Apartments in Saratoga Springs will undergo a two-year, \$13 million revitalization, which will include major renovation of its residential areas, beginning this fall.

Embury, independent housing for seniors with limited incomes, was conceptualized and designed by the Troy Conference of the United Methodist Church in the 1960s. Construction was completed in 1972.

Planned improvements will enhance comfort, safety, and accessibility for residents. Apartment bathrooms and kitchens will have a complete overhaul. A number of handicapped accessible and adaptable bathrooms and kitchens will be included in the project. Other upgrades will maximize energy efficiency and address environmental concerns.

Aesthetic and other changes will ensure Embury's future marketability. Due to an anticipated demand for apartments with more space, some reconfiguration of apartment types is planned. After the project is complete, there will be more

one-bedroom apartments, fewer studio apartments, and new two-bedroom apartments. Embury's new financial structure will enable people with a broader range of incomes to apply.

When Embury accepted its first residents, there were features in place like emergency pull cords, security coverage, and grab bars in the bathrooms to make life safer and more comfortable for older, but still independent adults. Renovation projects during the past half dozen years were designed to modernize shared spaces

and meet residents' increasing needs. New elevators with hand-capped accessible features were installed and the original generator was replaced. Resident lounges on the ground floor were refurbished.

A total rehab of the Embury Commons, the congregate dining room, made resident meals, meetings, entertainment programs and the occasional public event more pleasant and efficient.

In preparation for the project, regular apartment vacancies at Embury will not be filled, making empty apartments available for the residents whose floor is under construction. Residents can expect to be out of their apartments for about six weeks. There will be no cost to residents

for the moves.

Funding for Embury's revitalization project will be provided by the New York State Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program, the Federal Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Program, Community Preservation Corporation, and Embury Apart-

ments Inc. Sale of the Federal and State tax credits along with a modest mortgage will produce an equity contribution for the project of approximately \$13 million.

Omni Housing Development, LLC and Embury Apartments, Inc. are co-developers for the

project, with Embury Apartments, Inc. as the managing agent.

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Simple lifestyle changes can boost your memory

Memory loss and Alzheimer's disease rank high on the list of senior fears. Alzheimer's was the No. 1 fear of aging, according to research conducted by Bankers Life and Casualty Company, a national life and health insurer that focuses on serving the retirement needs of the middle market. Similarly, a national poll by Research!America and PARADE magazine showed that adults were more than twice as likely to fear losing their mental capacity as their physical ability.

Stay in touch

Loneliness is linked to depression, a risk factor for memory loss.

Try to keep your social network strong by volunteering or simply helping a neighbor. Make a conscious effort to stay connected with friends and relatives by visiting with them or keeping in touch by phone or e-mail.

Eat healthy

Maintaining a balanced diet, low in saturated fats is said to be better for cognitive functioning. In addition, the Alzheimer's Association notes growing evidence that a diet rich in dark vegetables and fruits - which contain antioxidants - may help protect brain cells.

Stay active

Regular exercise can increase oxygen to the brain. It can also

lower the risk for diseases that can lead to memory loss, such as diabetes and cardiovascular disease. Your doctor can help you develop an exercise regime that's best for you.

When to seek help

"It's important to know the difference between normal forgetting and something more serious," says Scott Perry, president of Bankers Life and Casualty Company, who serves on the board of directors of his local Alzheimer's Association chapter.

Serious memory problems, according to the National Institute on Aging, are those that affect a person's ability to perform everyday activities. For example:

- Asking the same questions over and over.
- Becoming lost in familiar places.
- Not being able to follow directions.
- Getting very confused about time, people and places.
- Losing interest in daily activities such as grooming and eating.

If you have concerns about your memory, talk to your doctor right away.

Stroke: Save yourself by knowing the five signs and acting quickly

When a stroke strikes, every minute counts in saving the person's life. Speedy treatment depends on the person afflicted or someone near them recognizing the five signs that a stroke is occurring and getting emergency help fast. You can remember the five signs of stroke with these five words: walk, talk, reach, see, and feel.

Stroke is the third-leading cause of death in the United States and a leading cause of disability. About 5.3 million Americans suffer from strokes annually, which means you or someone you care about could be affected.

Dr. Diana Fite, an emergency physician from Houston, experienced a stroke in 2006 while driving her car. She was 53 at the time. Thanks to her quick reaction and prompt medical attention, she made a full recovery.

"Because I am an emergency physician, I knew to call 9-1-1 to get help immediately, which is why I recovered quickly," Fite says. "But I know from my experience as a doctor that too many people ignore stroke symptoms or wait for them to go away, with tragic results."

Fite is the spokesperson for "Give Me 5 for Stroke: Walk, Talk,

Reach, See, Feel," a campaign aimed at educating Americans about the five warning signs of a stroke. The campaign is made up of three organizations: the American Academy of Neurology, the American College of Emergency Physicians and the American Stroke Association. The group came up with five words to help people remember the warning symptoms of stroke more easily: walk, talk, reach, see and feel. By paying attention to how a person walks, talks, reaches, sees and feels, individuals and family

disease such as chest pain. As a result, it is important to monitor your cholesterol levels regularly. And if your doctor has prescribed a cholesterol-lowering drug, be sure to stay on your medication.

If you have high cholesterol, or if you do not know your cholesterol levels, here are some important questions to ask your doctor:

- Why should I keep track of my cholesterol levels?
- Am I at risk for a heart attack or stroke?
- What puts me at risk?
- What are my current cho-

lesterol levels?

- What are my cholesterol goals?
- How often should I check my cholesterol?
- How can I lower my cholesterol through diet? Exercise? Medication?
- What are the possible side effects of cholesterol-lowering medications?
- How should I take my medication?

Talk to your doctor to see if you should be doing more to lower your cholesterol levels. Not all cholesterol-lowering medications are the same, so be sure you and your doctor choose the one that's best for you.

members can recognize when a stroke is happening and react immediately.

"Walk" is to recognize if a person's balance is off-kilter, "talk" identifies if a person's speech is slurred or their face is droopy, "reach" points out if the person feels numb on one side, "see" pin points if the person has partially or completely lost their vision and "feel" discovers if the person has a severe headache. If any of these stroke symptoms occur suddenly, call 9-1-1 immediately.

Actress Morgan Fairchild, who recently played Sophia Blakely in "Fashion House" and is remembered as Jordan Roberts in the '80s TV drama "Falcon Crest," has teamed up with the organizations in promoting "Give Me 5 for Stroke." They are also recognizing World Stroke Day on Oct. 29, highlighting the importance of identifying, treating and preventing strokes.

"I witnessed first-hand the devastating effects of stroke on my mother," says Fairchild, the primary caregiver for her mother, who suffered a series of debilitating strokes until her death in 1999. "Stroke is a killer, but for too many people, it doesn't need to be. If you know the warning signs and get medical help right away,


you have an excellent chance of making a good recovery.

"Women especially need to know the warning signs, because they account for over 60 percent of the deaths from stroke," Fairchild adds. "We are also the health information keepers for our families and must spread the

word to our siblings, spouses, parents and friends about how to recognize a stroke."

Are you clear about what you want? Do you have a vision of what you want in your second adolescence - your retirement?


The problem with most ad-

Alison Gardner, in her guidebook, "Travel Unlimited: Uncommon Adventures for the Mature Traveler", contends that older people generally sign up for volunteer service for at least one of three reasons:

1. A strong interest in a particular cause, project, or subject area, often related to a longtime hobby or an earlier career.

2. A desire to visit a region in a "grassroots" way not easily accomplished by just passing through as a stranger, either on an organized tour or as an independent traveler.

3. A wish to give back something significant to a world that has been, by and large, economically kind and physically comfortable to them in earlier years.

These are, indeed, solid reasons for joining such a volunteer team. But another equally valid reason may be the relative affordability of such trips. And what makes them less expensive?

- Room and board costs are generally low - volunteer teams usually do not stay in fancy resorts and sometimes enjoy meals cooked by area residents.

- Team members can often fundraise among friends and family to help offset costs.

- Air travel is sometimes purchased as a group, with special group rates.

- In-country travel is frequently done as a group, thus cutting costs.

- And while they can no longer look for employer support, retirees can look to organizations to which they belong to help support their trip.

One such organization that offers its nearly 3 million members the opportunity to take a vacation with a purpose at a reduced cost is Minneapolis-based Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. The Thrivent Builds Worldwide program, which operates in alliance with Habitat for Humanity's Global Village program, sends teams of volunteers to locations in the United States and abroad to help build homes for families in need. While non-members can also join these teams, Thrivent members enjoy even lower costs per trip because of their Thrivent membership.

"While each Thrivent Builds Worldwide trip is different, all include work, rest and free time," says Alison Jones, a team coordinator with the program. "No one is expected to do more than they are able on the work site and all teams spend a few

days touring local historic areas and attractions."

"It was really a great experience and I would do it again in a heartbeat," says Wisconsin retiree and Thrivent member Fred Ebbesen. "And Thrivent's support helped so that both my wife and I could go to New Orleans [with Thrivent Builds Worldwide]."

Retirees should definitely study the potential for "vacations with a purpose" before cutting travel completely from their budgets. Cynthia Cromie

Health and human Services

Long-time Capital District resident Cynthia Cromie was instrumental in the creation of the Mayor's Championship Team and it is for the success of this program that Cynthia is being recognized.

Cynthia's love and devotion to children is instantly recognizable to all who know her. However, it is her love for children in our community and her dedication to volunteerism that make her a cornerstone in the City of Albany, selflessly offering her time and talent to improve the lives of others.

Each year, more and more children arrive to kindergarten with a limited exposure to books, and many parents are not aware of the enormous impact this can have on their children's success. With this in mind, Cynthia embarked on a journey to form the Mayors Championship Team, an innovative program that introduces new teen mothers in the City of Albany to a literacy program designed to prepare their children to succeed in school by promoting good reading habits early in life. The program improves the quality of life for all involved by promoting intellectual development and academic success. Cynthia is the driving force behind the development and implementation of this program, donating time, funds, and determination.

This unique program, sponsored by Mayor Jennings and the City of Albany in partnership with the Albany City Schools, was recently recognized as an Honorable Mention in the United States Conference of Mayors 2008 City Livability Awards.

Cynthia's passion for helping children is also reflected in her work with the Ronald McDonald House Charities of the Capital Region Inc. The mission of the RMHC organization is to create, find and support programs that directly improve the health and well being of children by creating innovative,

effective programs that address targeted needs. Cynthia helped to carry out this mission by assisting in the creation and circulation of their newsletter as well as helping to establish the "Caroling for Kids" program. Cynthia was also involved in the formation of the "Assisi In Albany" program which serves the unemployed, elderly and homeless by providing job counseling, job leads, and spiritual support.

Manoj Ajmera

Volunteerism

Manoj Ajmera is a retired environmental engineer, but it's hard to consider him retired at all. A native of Bombay, India, Manoj has lived in the Capital District for more than four decades and during that time; he has been involved in numerous volunteer endeavors that have touched thousands of lives.

Manoj is best known as chairman of the Festival of Nations, a post he has held for 23 years. The festival, attended by thousands yearly, is an extravaganza of music, dance, arts and food. Manoj is the driving force behind the event, now in its 37th year.

While the festival is his passion, it's not his only endeavor. He is involved with the Tri-City India Association (TRICIA), which he helped found. He is currently chairman of the board and has served as its president. His desire to see the organization succeed has led to its growth from 20 families to more than 1,000 today.

Manoj also serves on the Hindu Temple Board of Governors and is one of the major supporters of the newly built Hindu Cultural Center in Albany. He's a member of the Albany Rotary and has twice led teams of young professionals to India under the Rotary's group study exchange program.

Manoj started the popular "Best Tasting Drinking Water in New York State" contest 23 years ago and still volunteers his time conducting contests statewide. For

his efforts, he received the State Health Commissioner's recognition award.

He has also served the American Water Works Association, an international organization for people in the water industry, in various roles and received the association's highest award for member recruiting.

Manoj received the prestigious Jefferson Award for Public Service in 2005 and was recognized by the Town of Clifton Park during its 175th anniversary celebration. He also serves on the Albany Tulip Queen Selection Committee and is a member of the board of the International Center of the Capital Region.

Volunteerism is a way of life for Manoj and his energy and endeavors have positively affected the lives of many Capital District residents.

Robert S. Herman

Arts and Culture

Robert (Bob) Herman, Ph.D., has a long professional history in economics, public policy and public administration. He began his career in the 1950s in the New York State Division of the Budget, and went on to serve as Director of Planning and Development and Director of Research and Fiscal Policy. He's been a consultant to the Majority Leader and Speaker of the Assembly, and spent almost 20 years as the Director of the Institute for Traffic Safety Management and Research.

His international experience is also extensive. He's been an advisor to the governments of India and Greece, Nigeria, Venezuela, Turkey and Iran; and a consultant to the finance ministers of Denmark, Sweden and Finland. He has taught at Russell Sage College, Syracuse University and SUNY, and he's an Adjunct Professor of Economics at City University of New York, SUNY, and Union College. He's a sought after speaker, an author, a poet and a humorist.

It is not for these many accomplishments that Bob is receiving a 3rd Age Achievement Award, but because in addition to these roles, Bob has also made an impact in the local arts community, finding time to serve on the boards of SPAC, Albany Symphony Orchestra, Albany International Center, Institute on Man and Science, and Traveler's Aid Society.

However, the most surprising endeavor of them all is his most recent. Although this 89-year-old resident of Slingerlands has never been to China, and does not speak the language, he has become the author of an immensely popular advice column published in two monthly Chinese magazines with thousands of readers. Since it began in 2002, his columns have become so popular that they have been turned into a book, *Wit and Wisdom with Bob*.

This literary adventure was initiated over a ping pong table. Bob's opponent was the editor of a popular Chinese-English magazine, *English Salon*. She had read some of Robert's poetry, and asked him to write a column about his philosophy of life. Now, he has a devoted following and often receives emails from readers. He writes in a straightforward style, and focuses on these concepts; learn, laugh, enjoy and share. He doesn't write about politics or religion, and he's never been censored or edited. His wife of 62 years, Beatrice, lends an occasional female perspective to Bob's work.

Bob himself is amazed at the success he's had; an advice columnist in a country he's never seen within a culture he has not experienced. It's a testimony to the relevance of his philosophy, his humor and his positive outlook on life.

Shirley Curtis

Shirley Curtis teaches piano to 26 children and adults every week during the school year, and to a slightly smaller number over the summer. She also organizes two recitals every year in which her students perform at UAlbany's Performing Arts Center. That's a busy schedule, but 92-year-old Shirley enjoys the time she spends with her younger students. She has been teaching piano for more than 50 years, and remains enthusiastic about sharing the gift of music with others.

Shirley started playing piano at age 5 in Montreal, Canada, and has played nearly every day of her life since then. Her students range in age from 6 to 18, and she's taken many from an early start all the way through high school graduation. Many of her students keep in touch with her and visit.

Shirley's teaching career began in the 1950s during her first mar-

riage. In 1954, her husband, George Gillett, died. She then met and married Dr. Stanley Curtis, and in 1955, they moved to Youngstown, Ohio, where she studied piano at the Dana Hall School of Music and with Arthur Loesser in Cleveland.

Shirley moved to Albany in 1970 and began teaching piano full time and kept her own skills sharp by studying with Findlay Cockrell and Stanley Hummel.

Shirley remains an active student of music and is currently studying jazz piano. She is also an accomplished gardener, volunteers at Albany Med, and knits for her 11 great-grandchildren. She has lived a life dedicated to educating others and sharing her passion for music.

Mary V. Ryan has been a constant presence at W.F. Ryan Produce Inc., the well-known Albany wholesale and retail fruit and produce business, since 1955, when she married William F. Ryan Jr. and became part of a family business that had its beginnings in 1910. Mary and William were married for 38 years before he passed away in 1992.

Even before her marriage, Mary was a working woman. She was a bookkeeper for the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers, and was also employed by the NY State Department of Unemployment Insurance and the Federal Government Department of Roads and Bridges.

After her marriage, she was able to transfer her business skills to the running of the produce business. She stayed involved while raising her three children, keeping the company's books. She was tenacious at collections because as a child, she was taught not to be envious of what others had, but to always get what belonged to her. "I was taught this by my mother, and this advice has served me well," she said.

In addition to work and family, Mary finds time to serve her community. She was on the board of the Italian and American Community Center and organizes fundraisers at Ryan's Produces, among them a Big Easy Bailout that raised \$3,000 for Hurricane Katrina victims.
