Fizzy logic

Paterson's pop proposal is meant to slim down New York, but will it work?

The familiar hiss of a soda bottle opening is primed to get a little more expensive in the Empire State if a proposal to enact an "obesity tax" of 18 percent on all regular sodas and "certain high caloric, low nutritional beverages" passes as part of Gov. David Paterson's 2009 budget.

"From the research I've seen ... it really does look like there's a real health effect."

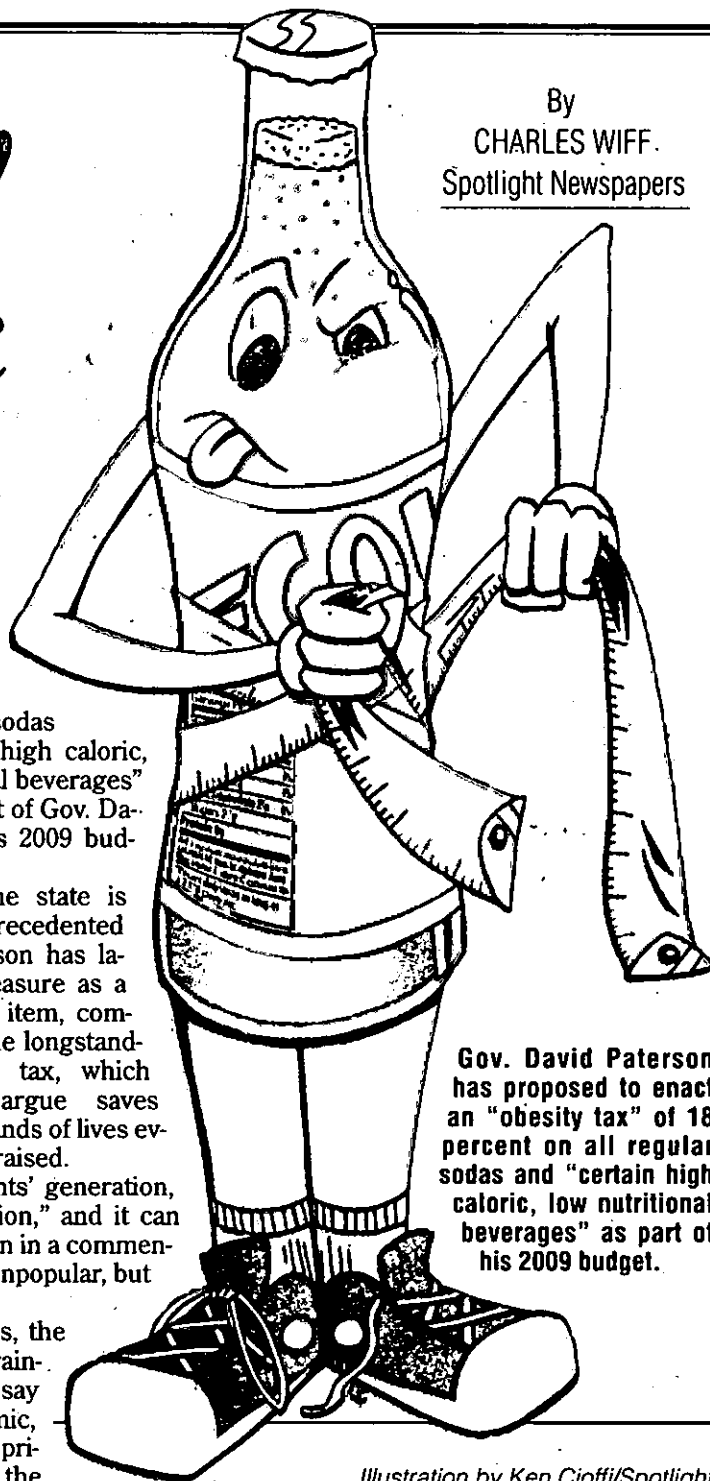

"What smoking was to my parents' generation, obesity is to my children's generation," and it can have a similar solution," said Paterson in a commentary for CNN. "These taxes may be unpopular, but their benefits are undeniable."

Like charges placed on cigarettes, the so-called soda tax is taking fire and gaining support from all corners. Some say it's necessary to combat an epidemic, while others feel it's an invasion of privacy or an ineffective way to battle the problem.

"One of the factors is how necessary an item is, whether it's considered a luxury or a necessity," said Drew Anderson, an associate professor in the department of psychology at SUNY Albany who studies weight and body image, including obesity research. "It's not clear to me how food fits into that ... From the research I've seen and looking at the studies, it really does look like

there's a real health effect."

Selkirk woman hits BC bus, charged with DWAI

A collision with a Bethlehem school bus in Delmar has led to a drug charge for one local woman.

Patricia A. Simonds, 52, of Selkirk, was arrested Friday, Jan. 9, on the misdemeanor charge of driving while ability impaired by drugs and following too close, an infraction.

Bethlehem police said they responded to a property-damage auto accident at the intersection of Cherry and Delaware avenues, and when they arrived on the scene, police discovered Simonds' vehicle had struck a Bethlehem Central school bus.

Lieutenant Thomas Heffernan said no children were on the bus at the time and that the bus driver was not injured in the crash.

Simonds was evaluated by Albany County and Delmar rescue EMS crews and was found to have been wearing her seatbelt at the time of the accident, according to the arrest report. Police said Simonds appeared to have no injuries or physical marks, and she made no complaints of injury to medical workers aside from comments about a pre-existing back injury.

Simonds is diabetic, but emergency workers reported her blood-sugar levels as normal, and the report states, although she did

not have alcohol on her breath, she "exhibited symptoms of physical impairment."

She told officers she took medication prior to driving, including muscle relaxers, oxycodone and three other prescription drugs, the report states. Simonds husband arrived on the scene "regarding his wife's condition," according to police, and during a medical evaluation, she "did physically continue downward to the point she was nodding off to sleep in the ambulance," according to the report.

Simonds was read her DWAI warning, agreed to take a chemical blood test and was transported to the St. Peter's Hospital emergency room for evaluation, where blood samples were secured, the report states.

Police said Simonds made several "disoriented statements" to nurses while at the ER, saying that she "believed today was Sunday," when in fact it was a Friday, and that "the crash was on Washington Avenue Extension" in Albany instead of in Delmar.

Her blood samples were sent to New York State Police for analysis, according to police, and she is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Feb. 18.

Glenmont Kmart to close, up to 90 jobs affected

The Sears Holding Corporation has announced that the Kmart department store in Glenmont will be closing March 22.

The owners of the Kmart chain made the announcement on Monday, Jan. 12, saying the store would not renew the lease at its Route 9W and Glenmont Road location. The company reported to state's Department of Labor that due to "economic" issues, the store would close, and up to 90 employees could lose their jobs.

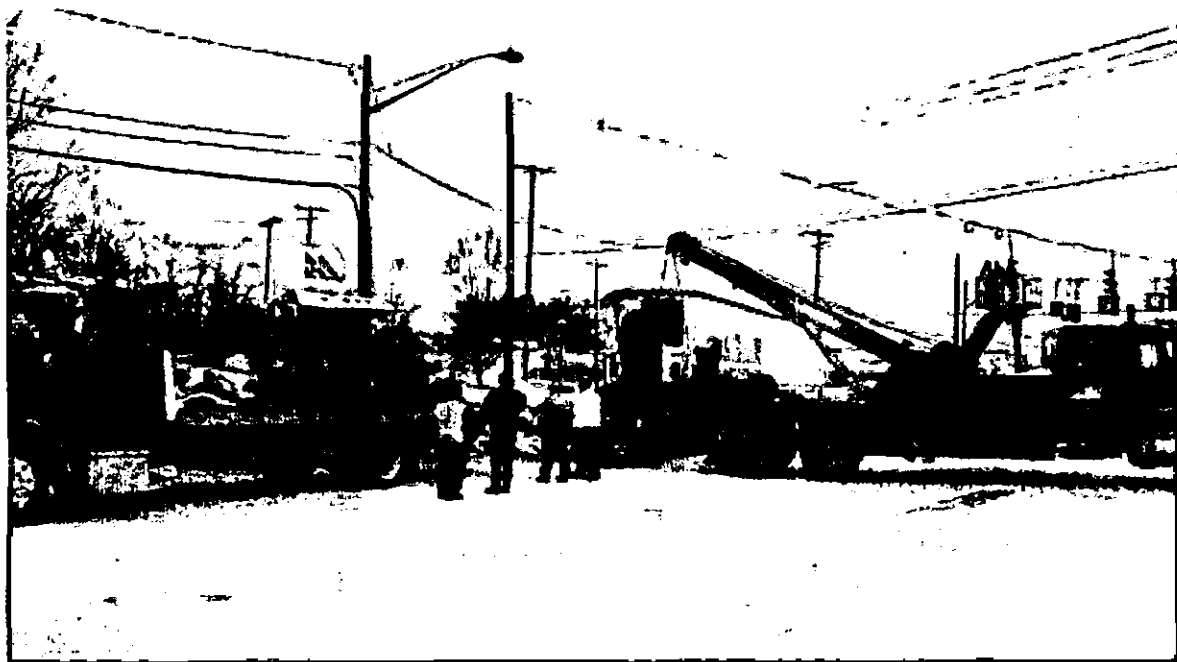
The company is reporting that 64 people currently work at the Glenmont location and that liquidation was to begin Jan. 18.

In the fall of 2008, Kmart announced that a series of "under-performing" stores were being considered for consolidation.

Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce President Marty DeLaney did not speculate if there was an area business interested in the Kmart site, but did say the store's closing is a definite sign of the times for businesses local and national.

"Kmart has been an anchor store in Glenmont for many, many years, and will be missed. These are difficult times, and Bethlehem isn't immune from the economic woes seen all over the country," DeLaney said. "This is a good time to again urge Bethlehem residents to support the local businesses that provide a vibrant tax base and help our community groups."

Crash closes 20 Mall intersection

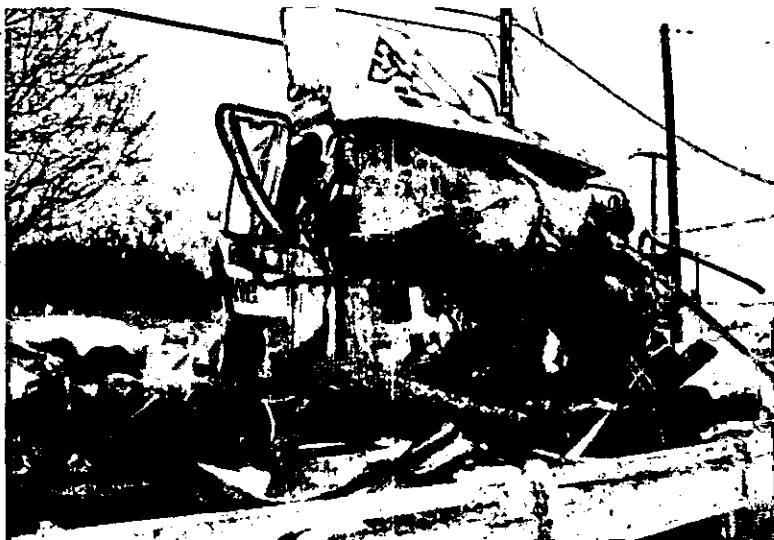
Two trucks collided near the intersection of routes 20 and 155, sending both drivers to Albany Medical Center with non-life-threatening emergencies.

At close to 1:55 a.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 14, a tractor-trailer operated by McLane Food Service and a pick-up truck operated by Global Industrial Services collided, resulting in the closing of the intersection and a two-hour delay for Guilderland schools.

Assistant Manager Steve Ricchiutti, at the CVS pharmacy at the intersection, said the store remained open, however, for much of the morning there were hardly any customers.

"We were open, just nobody could get in because they closed off all four directions," Ricchiutti said. "Until around 2 o'clock, no cars could get in."

Bethlehem could grant tax break to Cold War vets

Public hearing on adoption of local law to be held next month

There will be a public hearing Wednesday, Feb. 11, at 6 p.m. at Town Hall to discuss the possibility of an amendment to provide property tax relief for Cold War veterans living in the Town of Bethlehem.

Under the amendment, qualifying veterans will be exempt from 10 to 15 percent of property taxation for a period of 10 years, without exceeding \$12,000.

"I think it's an important exemption that we should pass on to our town residents who served the country," said Town Board member Kyle Kotary. "This tax relief is one of many types of tax relief opportunities through state tax law that the Town of Bethlehem has passed on to residents. I think this is a really good program."

Town Supervisor Jack Cunningham said there are currently no numbers available on how many Cold War veterans there are living in the Town of Bethlehem whom an amendment would affect.

Officials also said they aren't able to gauge the level of interest in the amendment and how many people will likely attend the public hearing.

A Cold War veteran is any person who served on active duty in the United States armed forces between Sept. 2, 1945, and Dec. 26, 1991, and was released or

discharged under honorable conditions.

Those armed forces include the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard, and "active duty" refers to full-time duty, not active duty for training.

Also eligible for the exemptions are spouses of Cold War veterans and surviving unremarried spouses of deceased Cold War veterans.

The local law was adopted by Albany County last summer to recognize

the veterans' sacrifices and services. Each municipality then has the option to implement the property tax exemption for Cold War veterans.

Since the law was passed by the county, neighboring Town of New Scotland has adopted the amendment.

At the Bethlehem public hearing, a presentation will be made on what the tax exemption is and what the amendment would mean for town residents. The board will have the opportunity to ask questions about the amendment and the tax exemptions at that time. Afterward, the public will be invited to comment and ask questions. Those comments will help the town make a decision about whether or not to adopt the amendment.

Cunningham said he supports the amendment.

"I'm for it... I support the vets," he said.

Kotary said he believes board members will unanimously approve this amendment.

Forget fetch, teach your dog to shovel snow

My daughter keeps changing her mind about the kind of dog she wants. Most recently she expressed a desire in getting both a Shih Tzu (her Aunt Carol has one named Maya) and a dachshund. Not too long ago, beagle was the top dog, although there was also a very strong pug phase. Golden retrievers and black labs are also among her favorites, "but those shed a lot," she informed me, "So maybe I'll get a miniature Goldendoodle."

I was about 4 years old when my father brought home a puppy. There had been no discussion about breed. In fact, there had been no discussion with my mother about getting a dog. Luckily even she couldn't resist the little brown beagle mutt that dad and my brother picked from a litter at my Aunt Dotty's house.

Most kids lobby their parents for pets. All sorts of assurances are made: "Really, mom, I'll take care of the dog. I'll walk her and brush her and make sure she's fed. You won't have to do a thing."

I was the baby of the family, and I don't recall making any



promises about taking care of Cocoa. I did pet her and feed her table scraps and try to dress her up. You know, I did all the things you might do with a younger sibling.

I found out years later that when my mother had been hoping for a fourth baby she meant a human child, not a puppy. But from my point of view, Cocoa was an awesome little sister. She was very loyal. She saw and heard a lot, but never tattled on me. She never borrowed my clothes or annoyed me when I was doing homework. She didn't get jealous if I had friends over. She never asked me to drive her anywhere.

Cocoa wasn't a watchdog, but she did bark at the young lad who delivered the evening newspaper. She didn't bark when the doorbell rang. She couldn't be bothered. Her version of fetch worked as follows: We would throw a stick. She would dash over to pick up the stick and then just keep running. She didn't return the stick; she'd

just drop it wherever she pleased.

Our dog never went to obedience classes, but she did understand the words "sit" and "out." For the former, she sometimes responded by sitting down (if you used the right tone and she felt like it). For the latter she got excited and ran to the door. This would happen even if you spelled the word. This meant we couldn't say stuff like, "Does the dog need to go o-u-t?" without getting her expectations up.

I think the dog trained us more than we trained her. She got us in the habit of giving her a dog biscuit every time she went outside. I'm sure it was my mother who got the process started. Mom never wanted anyone to be hungry so she'd often toss a treat onto the front porch before the dog left the house. Eventually Cocoa would back away from the door and stay in the front hallway waiting for us to toss a biscuit. Sometimes I'd trick her. I'd put my hand in the biscuit box and pretend like I was picking up a treat. I'd make a throwing motion with my arm and out she'd run, quickly looking from side to side to see where that biscuit

landed. I didn't feel guilty because she used to hoard them. I'd tell her, "You have a whole bunch on the porch. Eat the ones that are out there."

Cocoa was a well-fed, well-loved dog. She didn't do tricks, but she was a good companion and could sense when a family member was under the weather or feeling

G'land schools face \$2.7 million cut

Forum offers residents a chance to share cost-cutting priorities

Guilderland residents offered ways to cut costs and prioritize services as an impending \$2.7 million reduction in state aid looms over the district.

The community forum, held Tuesday, Jan. 13, at Guilderland High School, featured remarks by Superintendent John McGuire and Assistant Superintendent of Business Neil Sanders followed by small group discussions with members of the community and Capital District BOCES communication specialists.

"[We will strive] to sustain excellence throughout what will no doubt be years of adverse economic times," said McGuire.

He said access to education is something the "American dream" was built on, and must be provided.

Gov. David Paterson's executive budget proposal includes aid reductions based on a district's affluence, and Guilderland falls at the maximum amount allowable at 13 percent. Three percent is the minimum, according to Sanders.

McGuire put the state aid reduction into perspective, listing the services that \$2.7 million represents. He said it is the cost of 30 school buses, 42 teaching jobs and is more than the sum of the art, music, athletics and extracurricular activities departments combined.

McGuire said that the community should not bear the brunt of the reduction.

"Clearly this is not a reduction in state aid that can be passed along to the local taxpayers," he said.

Sanders said if the district does not increase expenditures at all, and no services are cut, a 4.73 percent tax hike would be needed to make up the difference. A two percent hike in expenditures would require a 7.67 percent tax increase to cover state aid reduction.

McGuire also addressed the "myth" that America's schools are lagging on an international scale. He said the Guilderland Central School District, like many others, are shining examples of what U.S. public education has to offer.

He said New York State Commissioner of Education Richard Mills toured the district with a group of leading international scholars and commented that it is a "beacon of excellence for the region and the state."

In order to continue that excellence, the district has many decisions to make. One difficult one is how to allocate its reserve fund over the next few years.

Community members at the forum favored a spending plan that would not use all the reserves in one year, however that is still an option.

Sanders gave an overview of the 2008-2009 budget, totaling close to \$83 million, and said savings plans already in place could continue to save the district money.

He said cutting energy costs by reducing consumption saved \$1.7 million.

He also said the district cut costs in other areas, including transportation and health insurance.

The public was asked to comment on six topics, ranging from class size, professional development, facilities, athletics and extracurricular activities, non-mandated programs and fiscal planning.

Anne Mastro, a former school nurse, said each class is different, and adding or subtracting kids includes a lot of factors.

"It depends on the dynamics of the situation," she said.

Another resident, Donovan Kenney, commented that professional training is important and the results are all that count.

"I don't care how much training they have to go through, as long as my kid is getting the best possible

education," said Kenney.

Several community members agreed that professional development and class size go hand-in-hand, and training teachers how to deal with larger classes would be a necessity.

Several comments were made about cutting long-term facility projects, and focusing on short-term maintenance until state aid returns to normal.

Kenney said the money should be directed toward other services "as long as the building's not falling, it's warm and it's a safe environment."

He said he supports some "common-sense" initiatives like rust-proofing buses to keep them in service longer.

Mastro echoed the sentiment that short-term maintenance is vital, but long-term projects could wait.

"You have to keep the buses running," she said.

The group also questioned services related to counseling programs and agreed that they are too important to skimp on.

"There's just too much going on with families and homes," said Mastro. "That's just something they can't do without."

The group discussion led by BOCES communication specialists Matt Lean and Judy Frost also addressed cutting athletics across the board, or eliminating entire, less popular, activities.

Advocacy group supports supervisor's proposed limits

The New Scotland Town Board is planning a public hearing regarding a local law that would limit the size of retail developments in the town's commercial zone, according to Supervisor Tom Dolin's office.

Dolin said the board is hoping for a meeting sometime during in early April, but no date has officially been set.

"The [proposed] law adds restrictions in the current commercial district," Dolin said.

The law was sponsored by Dolin and board member Doug LaGrange and calls for a size cap of 50,000 square feet on retail buildings and 100,000 square feet for plazas.

Town board members, appointed officials and the public have debated retail building size caps since the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee was commissioned in spring of 2008 to recommend ways to align the comprehensive plan with the town's zoning laws following interest from one developer to construct a major retail development on

the former Bender melon farm property along routes 85 and 85A.

Dolin said the town Planning Board and the county must review the proposed local law. After the public discusses it, the board will have a chance to vote.

Mike Welti, a senior planner at Behan Planning Associates, recommended to the town a two-step plan. The first step will be "to plug the hole that exists as far as building size," Dolin said. Then the town will address other long-term solutions to zoning issues, such as exploring "mixed-use hamlet overlay zones."

These zones would have a "minimum percentage of commercial development, integrated with higher density forms of residential development," according to Welti's report.

Welti issued a report to the town board recommending a cap just below that in the proposed local law, at 45,000 and 90,000 square feet respectively.

He also recommended allowing special approval to increase the cap from 45,000 square feet to 60,000 square feet for buildings, and 90,000 square feet to 120,000 feet for plazas if the developer can provide an "amenity package" that would assist the town with other goals.

New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, an advocacy group supporting the local law, is urging residents to come to the public meeting to support the size-cap.

"The limitations incorporate the concepts and goals set forth in the Town's Comprehensive Land Use Plan and the Citizens' Zoning Advisory Committee Report. They prohibit large, regional-drawing, retail projects and instead encourage community-focused, economically viable development," said Daniel Mackay, spokesperson for New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development.

NS4SED cited the volume of traffic that would be generated, as well as the large parking lots needed to accommodate high-demand times, the expansion of roadways and need for law enforcement, as reasons to keep "big box" out of New Scotland.

According to the local law, the project would "present health and safety concerns" and "negatively impact the community character of the town and nearby Slingerlands area."

Sphere Development LLC, the Syracuse-based developer interested in building a Target retail store in the town's commercial zone, would be unable to proceed if the local law is passed. The proposed store would be close to 137,000 square feet.

Managing partner at Sphere Greg Widrick said the company would be "disappointed" if any cap was put in place, and said an unbiased feasibility study needs to be conducted.

"No one has looked at this yet on a non-emotional basis," Widrick said.

Mr. Sharma goes to Washington

Guilderland High School student witnesses history, works for change at home

At 5 a.m. on Monday, Jan. 19, Elijah Sharma sat in a bus, patiently waiting to make one of the biggest trips of his life.

Millions of Barack Obama supporters from all over the country were gathering in Washington, D.C., to watch Obama's inauguration, and Sharma was hoping to join them and witness firsthand that historic moment.

Sharma, a senior at Guilderland High School, is the Northeast regional director for the Young Democrats of America High School Caucus, and through that organization, he was invited to see the inauguration.

"The executive director and national committee chairman of the high school caucus contacted me shortly after the election and asked me if I was interested in going to the inauguration," Sharma said before he left. "I am very excited about going as we will also be touring some historical buildings and monuments thanks to some help from the office of Paul Tonko."

Beau Duffy, communication director for U.S. Rep. Paul Tonko, D-Amsterdam, said it is important to give young people the opportunity to see the political process in action.

"They get a sense that they can influence policy and can shape the events that influence their lives," said

"I have always had a passion for helping. Helping people, animals, the environment, it doesn't matter. I just can never sit idly by when things aren't right," he said.

Sharma is also a member of the Northeast Regional Organizing for the Student Peace Alliance, a group that focuses on finding non-violent solutions to domestic and international issues, and was awarded an outstanding activist award from People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals.

Sharma said one day he plans to run for political office and take his advocacy to the next level.

"I hope to pursue a life in politics because I see it as a place where real, lasting change is truly possible," Sharma said.

Sharma worked as a volunteer for Obama, handling phone calls and registering constituents, while also spending time at several rally events. Sharma said small jobs played a big role in the Obama campaign.

"I also did the effective yet simple task of talking to potential voters

Duffy. "It's important they have a say. They get to help shape the future."

Sharma said he has always been interested in helping others and has become an advocate for many hot-button issues.

about why they should vote for Barack Obama," he said.

Sharma has also been active locally since former teacher Matt Nelligan and teacher Ann Marie McManus were involuntarily transferred to Farnsworth Middle School from Guilderland High School. Sharma supported the teachers during the transfer and spoke out against the move to the school board during a rally to keep the teachers in the high school. Sharma said Nelligan and McManus elicited healthy discussion and debate about many political topics and were excellent teachers.

As a result, Sharma initially planned to protest the school's budget, but in light of recent economic issues, he said he is revisiting the issue.

"My hope ... is that we can have a budget that preserves the quality of education and the environment in our school district without putting

an undue burden on the taxpayers who are struggling during this difficult economy," Sharma said. "I do not think at this time it would be the most effective or appropriate means of addressing the district's inappropriate behavior."

Sharma said he will recommend that others do the same.

"I am going to recommend that United for McManus and Nelligan focus on the upcoming elections and endorse candidates that will serve our community and oppose candidates such as the current Guilderland Board of Education President Richard Weisz," Sharma said.

Sharma is a member of the Parent Teacher Student Organization, and is joining the Citizen's Budget Advisory Council, in the hopes students' voices are heard going forward. He also founded www.elijahsharma.com to help get his message out.

"It seems many people forget that students actually attend the schools that decisions are made for, and I want to be sure that students are never left out of the decision-making process," Sharma said.

He said one board member told him that no student has sat on the parent-teacher organization in recent memory.

"This horrified me because the sole purpose of the budget is to give the best educational experience to students. How anyone thinks this can be done without actually speaking with at least one student is beyond me," he said.

Sharma said he plans on advocating for art, music, smaller sports and organizations, anti-bullying efforts and full-day kindergarten.

He said the recent birth of his sister gives him more incentive to improve the school district.

Sharma said short-term plans include attending Hudson Valley Community College and then transferring to the University at Albany and studying political science.



FORT among trail groups to get grants

State funding allows local groups to pave the way for area recreational trails

Some local groups clamoring for more pedestrian pathways and bike paths recently got some needed funding in the form of state grants.

Friends of the Rail Trail (FORT), which was founded in Delmar and held its first meeting Dec. 16, and the Hoosick River Watershed Association, based in Hoosick Falls, are among eight organizations in the state to be awarded grants by Parks & Trails New York, a statewide not-for-profit organization.

Friends of the Rail Trail was awarded \$2,000 to help the new group pay for printing and mailing a membership/project information brochure to promote community financial and in-kind support for the group, which is advocating for the 9-mile rail trail between the Albany and Voorheesville.

"Parks and trails have a key role to play in the economic health and recovery of New York state, and grassroots groups have a key role to play in the development and promotion of parks and trails," said Robin Dropkin, executive director of Parks & Trails New York.

Dropkin said the grants will help strengthen the state's not-for-profit park and trail

organizations, which will in turn enable them to attract more private funding and recruit volunteers.

Parks & Trails New York received more than 75 applications from park and trail groups located in 41 counties throughout the state, according to Dropkin.

The Friends of the Rail Trail said this is good news for a good cause.

"We are grateful to Parks & Trails New York's support in helping our new friends group get a strong start," said Dan Rain, co-chair of FORT. "I feel honored that FORT was one of the few groups chosen to receive an award, and we are excited to now be able to move forward with this project."

County Executive Michael Breslin, D-Delmar, signed a contract on Thursday, Dec.

11, for the purchase of the yet unnamed Albany County rail trail from the Canadian Pacific Railway. The proposed rail trail project will convert a 9-mile stretch of the old Delaware and Hudson Railroad between the Port of Albany and Voorheesville into a public recreational trail.

Part of FORT's mission includes addressing concerns about trail safety, security, costs, etc.; helping establish proper signage for the trail, brochures, maps and trailside amenities like picnic tables or park benches; coordinating volunteer efforts such as garbage cleanup; encouraging bicycle awareness, safety and maintenance among community members; working toward linking the trail with other rail trails, pedestrian paths and community assets; partnering

with local governments, community groups and businesses; and helping to raise funds if needed.

Albany County Legislator Tom Cotrofelf, D-I-Delmar, has been a strong advocate of the local rail trail since he took office.

"All of these steps being taken by the county are milestones," Cotrofelf said. "This will be a jewel to the town."

Cotrofelf said many of details are very preliminary at this point until an environmental review can be performed, as well as bridge inspections. But the county has officially inked a deal to buy the property.

Kerri Battle, spokeswoman for the Albany County executive's office, said five out of eight bridges have been inspected so far and the county has 300 days of "due diligence" from Dec. 11 to complete all its reviews and inspections.

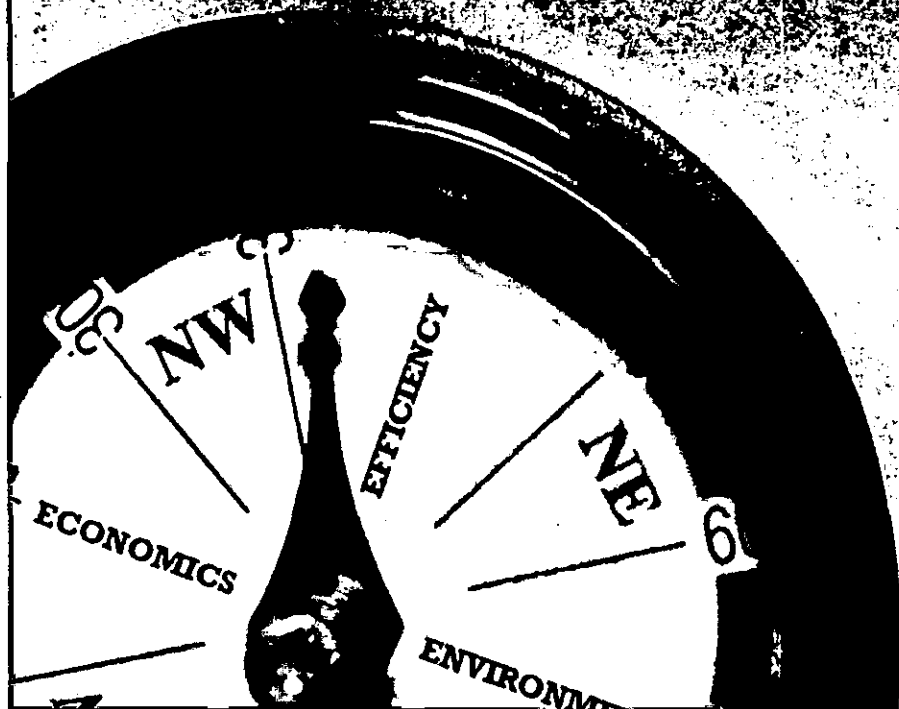

Other arrests

• Robin D. Police said a check revealed that Adams' license was suspended in November of 2007 and that officers secured her driver's license along with two license plates at the scene of her arrest.

Adams was placed under arrest and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department after conducting a field-sobriety test in the parking lot of a nearby convenience store, the report states.

A chemical test revealed that her BAC was nearly double the legal limit of 0.08 percent, according to police.

Officers discovered a "partially consumed" bottle of brandy in Adams' handbag, the report states, and she was released from custody to a

friend on appearance tickets to Bethlehem Town Court.

Details released on ex-Assembly candidate's arrest

'Exotic massage' incident leads to slew of charges

Bethlehem police said the robbery, menacing and other charges against Ken Preston stemmed from an incident at his Slingerlands home involving an exotic massage he ordered online from Craigslist, which ended when he allegedly pulled a gun on the woman.

Preston, 50, who is a former Assembly candidate and former Albany firefighter, was arrested on charges that included robbery, attempted criminal sexual act, reckless endangerment, criminal possession of a weapon and menacing.

Police Lt. Thomas Heffernan said more charges may come as the case is still under investigation. Preston was scheduled to appear at the Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, Jan. 20.

Police said that on Sunday, Dec. 28, Preston allegedly ordered an exotic body rub from the online classifieds site at www.craigslist.com. There are dozens of similar listings found pertaining to the Albany area.

Heffernan did reveal the masseuse's name but said she

went to Preston's home on Trumpeter Place around 9 p.m. and told him that the massage would cost \$150. After going to his bedroom, police said, Preston allegedly informed the woman that he had only \$100. Heffernan said it was then that Preston put his clothes back on and allegedly took the masseuse's cell phone and threatened to hit her with it.

According to the police report, the victim then told Preston she was nine months pregnant, and he allegedly took a handgun from his bedroom closet and pointed it into her face demanding oral sex.

Heffernan did not release the caliber or type of handgun used in the incident.

According to the report, he victim told Preston to shoot her after refusing his request and then tried to signal another person waiting outside in a vehicle by hitting the bedroom window.

Heffernan said that Preston then allegedly gave the woman back her cell phone, threw her out of the home and let her go.

No money was exchanged between Preston and the victim.

Police said the woman left with her friend and filed a report several hours later.

"She called us about the incident after going to the store," Heffernan said. "We have not been able to contact and interview the other person."

Asked if the victim was facing any charges at this time, Heffernan said, "No, but the case is under investigation."

Heffernan added that Preston was sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility following the incident, but quickly posted a \$15,000 cash bond and was released to appear in Bethlehem Town Court.

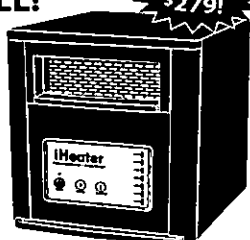

up to his resignation.

"Everybody in town should know about it," Grimm said. "Where was the oversight? I think we need, at the very least, a full hearing."

Murley pleaded guilty to misdemeanor official misconduct on Friday, Jan. 9, for visiting an upstate casino at least 53 times while on the clock, according to information provided by the Albany County district attorney's office.

Grimm is alleging town officials, including Supervisor Ken Runion, Lawlor and Lt. Curtis Cox, who worked directly under Murley, knew about Murley's gambling habit and of claims he sexually harassed his secretary, and yet they did not take action.

Grimm said his next move will be to find out how to go about getting a hearing on the matter.

Runion said he was unaware of Murley's activities, but he said Grimm is too eager to act without knowing all the facts.

"Mr. Grimm didn't even live in the town during the events," Runion said. "Mr. Grimm likes to act on rumors and innuendo. ... When you pull away his hair plugs and take away his makeup, all you have is the hair between his ears."

Runion added that much of the information regarding Murley's gambling did not come up until after investigations into sexual harassment claims began.

Grimm said Dygert's court deposition, taken Sept. 28, 2007, brings into question how Lawlor and now Capt. Cox handled claims from Dygert.

"Lt. Cox was definitely aware of this situation because I had spoken with him about this," Dygert said in the sworn statement. "I also definitely spoke with Carol Lawlor about this, but she was no help in stopping the constant sexual harassment."

"This is a sworn statement under the threat of perjury," Grimm said. "I think she's the voice of millions of women in that position."

Lawlor said the matter has been closed by the New York State Police.

"I am confident that the state police handled the investigation adequately, and I am not going to reopen this," Lawlor said.

She said she was speaking on behalf of the entire Guilfordland Police Department.

Cox said he became aware of Dygert's complaints only after the investigation began, and said Dygert did not approach him about the issue beforehand.

"Not to my knowledge. I don't believe she came to me," Cox said.

He also said he is available for any hearing the town might have.

"I'm available for anybody at any time," Cox said, adding he also believed the state police handled the investigation thoroughly.

In the deposition, Dygert claimed Murley had made advances, inviting her to vacation in Martha's Vineyard with him, as well as inappropriate gestures and comments to her about her appearance.

"He would constantly stare at me and many other females from head to toe and literally drool while looking directly at women's breasts," Dygert said in the statement.

Dygert claimed she was afraid to confront him for fear of retribution toward her or her husband.

She also wrote in the deposition that Murley often spoke about gambling at the Turning Stone Casino in the Oneida Nation and one time even asked to borrow money from Lawlor. She claims he took extended weekends, often not showing up for work for days at a time.

Grimm also said he wants to find out how the restitution amount was derived and why the investigation only covered up to 2004, as Murley resigned as chief in 2007.

District officials are calling this year "the most difficult budget season in recent memory."

The next public meeting, which Superintendent Michael Tebbano described as a "round-table format," will take place at the middle school on Monday, Jan. 26, at 7 p.m.

Tebbano said the community forums came about through an interest to build upon the work of the Citizens Budget Group during the last two years by opening up the budget process to a "broader community dialogue." The district said it expects to use feedback from the meeting to help frame the board of education's budget development work in February and March. Local residents will get their say on the district's proposed budget when they vote on it, along with area library budgets, in May.

During discussions with *Spotlight Newspapers*, Tebbano said he plans to implement some of the ideas from the meetings.

"We have a crisis on our hands," Tebbano said of the current economic climate. "We are going to be posting the budget online, and we are going to have our contracts online, too. ... We are really trying to be transparent, and we have talked to union leaders and they thought it was a good idea."

Several attendees of the first budget meeting raised the topic of teachers' salaries and contracts. It was a somewhat con-

troversial topic that was hashed out last year when a member of Citizens Budget Group said members were not privy to the nearly 80 percent of the school budget that is consumed by employee salary and contracts.

Bethlehem faces a roughly \$2.2 million cut in state aid under Gov. David Paterson's proposed budget that is currently cutting \$698 million in aid to schools statewide.

Tebbano said district officials came up with the community forum concept on their own, but he believes other school districts are now holding similar forums in response to the "economic reality."

"We thought about this at length. ... The reality is that we have to get ideas," he said. "People on the front line are constantly e-mailing me ideas on what kind of things can we do to save money."

In his welcoming remarks of the community forum, Board President James Lytle noted that community participation is essential to the way the district functions.

"We are now facing probably the most challenging budget process that this district has encountered in a long time," he said. "What we learned from our experiences last year though was to engage the community at the earliest possible time and engage them as directly and as transparently as we can through the process."

While the district first announced the forums in late summer, the backdrop is now the continued economic turmoil and New York's fiscal woes, which has districts across the state bracing for a potential cut in state aid.

Prior to the community's turn to ask questions and give input, Tebbano explained how the possibility of substantial state aid cuts could lead to tough choices as the district and community shape the 2009-10 budget.

State aid is one of the district's three main revenue sources, along with property taxes and federal funding.

When state aid goes down dramatically, "we lose ground but the cost of running a school district continues to escalate," he said. "In order to control costs, we have to figure out how to make up the ground we're losing. Do we cut programs? Do we cut faculty? Do we raise taxes?"

The bulk of this first budget forum was devoted to an oppor-

tunity for community members to ask questions and provide suggestions. The school's new financial officer, Judi Kehoe, gave a brief 10-minute presentation explaining some of the technicalities involved with the district's budget.

Michael Cooper, a Delmar resident who is active with the school's booster clubs, told of schools not to count out the academic benefits of the athletic programs if cuts are necessary.

"The benefits to our kids from athletics are immeasurable. Many kids who may fall by the wayside continue academically because of their love of sports," he said. "I would like to ask that the district take that into consideration ... for many kids this is their lifeblood."

Peter Shawn, a Bethlehem resident who described himself as having two children "go through the system" grades kindergarten through 12, said there needs to be a balance of all programs during the budget, but that academics should be the "highest priority."

"I think it's important to approach this in a balanced way, but having said that, I would recommend that the highest priority be placed on preserving the academic quality and the strength of the academic programs. That's the core of what school district does," said Shawn.

He added that the district should continue its programs for "highly enabled" students by providing advanced courses and an array of AP classes.

John Giordano, a member of the Citizens Budget Group who spoke out about making teacher salaries and contracts more readily available last year, commented that he hopes a more open dialogue on the "real cost" associated with teachers' salaries will be achieved this year.

Philip Carter, a local business man who was also vocal about last year's school budget and attended the meeting, wrote an e-mail to *Spotlight Newspapers* saying more residents need to be involved in the process.

"It is important that as many people as we can get attend or parents will find that programs that affect their children have been abolished or taxes have been raised," Carter wrote. "Last year only 20 percent of the registered voters took part in the school budget election, which means that the budget was passed by 11 percent of the voters."

Lytle joked at the meeting that "if you know of any new ideas" about getting more people to vote, to let the school district know.

District officials have stressed that all community members are encouraged to come to the Monday, Jan. 26, forum to participate in round-table conversations about budget issues and community priorities. The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. in the Bethlehem Central Middle School Library. For residents who cannot make the community budget forums, they will be televised on channel 18, Bethlehem. They will air on Saturdays at 5 p.m., Sundays at 4 p.m. and Tuesdays at 2 p.m.

out pounds of sugar and fake fat, arguing that the consumption of sugary drinks has increased in line with American obesity.

"We are in the midst of an obesity epidemic," said Daines. "It's become clear that one important factor contributing to this problem is a remarkable change in the amounts of different beverages that we all drink."

Daines noted that since 1970, our consumption of milk-to-soda has basically reversed, with the average American drinking 11 cans of soda per week instead of five, and six glasses of milk instead of 10.

"Back then, overweight and obesity were not nearly the problem they are now," said Daines. If the comments posted to Daines' video — more than 900 as of press time—are any indication, many don't see the issue his way and feel strongly about it.

A more formal poll finds the same. A Quinnipiac University poll released near the end of December showed that New Yorkers disapprove of the obesity tax, 60 to 37 percent. Nearly all agree with Paterson that the state is facing a budget crisis of a serious nature, though.

The same poll found that the state's citizenry would greatly prefer a millionaire's tax, at 84 to 13 percent, or tax hikes on cigarettes or alcoholic beverages.

Opponents of the tax argue that any assumed health benefits are just a distraction tactic to sneak in another revenue source in a budget that is already laden with tax-and-fee hikes (Paterson has said the funds will go toward health programs and nutrition education). The deficit aside, whether or not New Yorkers can withstand another tax while a recession grips the nation is a hotly debated question.

"Gov. Paterson is bemoaning the loss of jobs in New York state, and this single swipe of the pen could do just that," said Craig Stevens, a spokesman for the American Beverage Association, a trade group for makers of non-alcoholic drinks such as soda. Stevens said that 160,000 New Yorkers rely on the beverage trade, from bottlers to distributors to retailers.

"This is simply a money grab," continued Stevens. "It's not supported by science, and it's not supported by common sense. ... The argument that taxing one single product would have an effect on obesity rates is overly simplistic."

Others feel that the tax, while admirable, does not effectively target the problem as it extends to beverages with less than 70 percent natural fruit juice. Liz Morrill, founder and CEO of the Manhattan-based Fizzy Lizzy brand of sparkling juices, recently came out against the tax, arguing that it would apply to her half juice, half seltzer beverages that contain far fewer calories and less sugar than straight juice.

"Because the legislation basically wraps the entire category in an umbrella, it ends up including drinks like ours, which are designed to provide a less caloric, healthy alternative to soda," said Morrill. "If its aim is to get children to drink

less caloric beverages, then it seems to me that the criteria should be something extremely objective."

She pointed out that a 12-ounce bottle of Tropicana Pure Premium Orange — with 165 calories and 33 grams of sugar — would be exempt from the obesity tax, while her tangerine drink—with 100 calories and 24 grams of sugar—would be subject to it. Along with sales tax (also imposed based on juice content), consumers would be charged a 26 percent tax on her product.

Morrill will testify to the Ways and Means Committee on Feb. 2, when it examines the health and Medicare portion of the budget.

Though the obesity tax may seem unusual, New York isn't the first state to dabble in a sin tax of this nature. In April of 2008, Maine adopted a tax on soda, beer and wine aimed at funding affordable state health care. Soda was hit with a 42-cent-per-gallon charge, and the syrup used to make soda at fountains was taxed at \$4 per gallon.

Maine's tax was overturned by voter referendum in the November election.

Other states, like Arkansas, Virginia and Washington, have either levied soda taxes or are considering them. In some states the law extends to diet soda as well as their calorie-packed counterparts. The proceeds are often used to fight litter rather than health problems.

And according to some, the hundreds of empty calories found in regular soda versus zero-calorie diet drinks don't make much of a difference when it comes to obesity.

A 2005 study from the San Antonio Heart Study, located at the University of Texas Health Science Center, indicated that those who drink diet soda are actually more likely to become overweight or obese than those who stick with regular — a reason was not readily apparent, however.

A 2007 University of Alberta in Canada study on rats found that young rats that used diet foods tended to overeat at regular-calorie meals. Researchers speculated that the rats failed to associate certain foods with caloric content, making them eat more to feel full. The results were not duplicated in older animals, however.

To plot the effect of the obesity tax will take time.

"We'll have to wait several years to see the outcome," said Anderson. "I do think if we're going to work on obesity prevention, we're going to have to think about public policy and big changes. ... Individual treatment isn't going to cut it, with two-thirds of Americans at least overweight. ... We'll have to have the political and social will to see it through."

Of course, if the obesity tax does go into effect, one way New Yorkers can avoid it is by changing their drinking habits. As Daines argued on YouTube, switching to non-taxed milk or juice would save the average American family \$100 per year.

"Our health will be better, our health care will cost less and every family will have more to spend on whatever they want," he argued.

A graduate of Deerfield Academy, he attended Colgate University. He was an active participant in the Central New York business and political community for his entire life. He was a newspaperman, a husband and the father of five children.

Mr. Hancock began his newspaper career as a summer intern at the Syracuse Herald-Journal in the mid-1960s and then worked as a reporter at the Brattleboro Reformer in Vermont. After working as an advertising executive in the Syracuse area, he became publisher of Manlius Publishing Corporation in 1986. In 1992, Mr. Hancock led the successful merger of the Baldwinsville-based Brown Newspapers and Manlius Publishing to form Eagle Newspapers, which continued to grow during his 11-year tenure as publisher. The company now has 14 weeklies in the Syracuse area and 12 weeklies in the Albany market. Under Mr. Hancock's leadership, the company won dozens of New York Press Association awards.

"Stew was a very intelligent, energetic and dynamic individual with an unrivaled knowledge of political spheres and the publishing world," said Richard Keene, president and CEO of Eagle Newspapers, who worked alongside Mr. Hancock for nearly two decades. "He was a friend and a mentor and will be missed."

Those in the Eagle Newspapers family will remember him as the ultimate ideas man. Most days, he could be found behind his large wooden desk in a tattered golf shirt, old V-neck sweater and Eagle Newspapers baseball cap, poring over Eagle papers and dozens of other local publications, searching for news and advertising ideas for his company to pursue.

"The creation of Eagle was his brainchild," said John McIntyre, vice president and COO of Eagle Newspapers. "Stew was probably the person with the most ideas I've ever met. He had an idea for everything. And a lot of them came true. He was always thinking way ahead of everyone else — bigger and more complex than the rest of us."

Everywhere he went, Mr. Hancock was armed with a red felt-tipped pen and piece of yellow legal paper for his notes. When reporters wrote an article he particularly liked, they were rewarded with a "Stew Star" — a copy of the story with a red star on the top.

He was omnipresent at community events across Eagle's two-county coverage area. It was ordinary for him to leave his Highbridge Street office in Fayetteville for a meeting downtown, then head up to a chamber gathering in Baldwinsville before reversing fields for a community event in Cazenovia or Canastota. During his brief appearances at these events, he would constantly jot down notes and line up the movers and shakers for a photograph for the newspapers. Then he would be off to the next event, his day not ending until well after the sun went down.

Mr. Hancock's contacts were too many to count, and his persistent but affable nature allowed his newspapers to gain access that other, larger media agencies couldn't. When Eagle Newspapers launched Empire Media, a series of statewide publications, he called the often-elusive Gov. George Pa-

taki, who reserved an hour and a half for an interview. Whether it was a news source or a possible advertiser, Mr. Hancock never hesitated to introduce himself and let it be known what he wanted. Some may have considered him pushy, but his friendliness and familiarity with so many people made it an endearing kind of pushiness that usually left people with a smile on their faces.

His philosophy of newspapering was "if it's local, it's news," and he put that concept to work each day in his work. His gauge of a good newspaper was the number of names and faces in the publication, and he would often count the names of local people in his hometown *Eagle Bulletin* to determine whether the editor's job was being done to his satisfaction.

He took pride in being the first into the office each day, including weekends. Editors and managers alike often dreaded the phone calls they would receive from Stew on Saturday and Sunday mornings, telling them to come in to the office to meet him, sometimes before 7 a.m. When bleary-eyed editors arrived at the office, he usually greeted them with bagels or doughnuts, as well as a wire bin full of ideas for their newspapers.

"When I was just a sports editor for Manlius Publishing, I used to meet Stew in the Fayetteville office and he would tell me all about the local sports — what was going on," McIntyre said. "He had a knack in

the world of sports and probably a bigger knack for politics. He knew how everything was connected."

He felt that as the smaller print journalism entity in the Syracuse area, the employees of Eagle Newspapers would succeed by outworking and outsmarting the competition. He was a demanding boss, but one who welcomed his employees into his life and his home.

Throughout his life, Mr. Hancock was active in local Republican politics. He started as a youth volunteer working on congressional campaigns, advised several local political campaigns, was a Republican delegate and ran for Syracuse Common Council president.

After leaving Eagle Newspapers in 2003, he started Hancock Public Relations and was a registered lobbyist, representing several businesses in Albany and Washington. His firm specialized in renewable and alternative energy sources, which often caused longtime friends to chuckle at the lifelong Republican going "green."

Mr. Hancock was an avid golfer, tennis player and jogger and spent many summers in Cazenovia, Madison County, honing those skills. One of his favorite claims to fame was having won the Cazenovia Golf Club Member-Member twice and the same club's Member-Guest three times. A lifelong New York Yankees fan, he for many years proudly displayed in his office his three seats from the pre-renovation Yankee Stadium.

Stew was a past member of a variety of community organizations, having served on the boards at Manlius Pebble Hill School, the New York State Open Government Committee and the National Kidney Foundation. He was also a member of the Metropolitan Development Association. He was awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Syracuse Press Club in 2003.

He is survived by his wife, Kimberly; his daughters, Kolbe, Annie, Torrey and Mary; his son, Stewart IV; his parents, Judge Stewart F. Hancock Jr. and Ruth Pass Hancock, of Cazenovia; his brothers, R. James of Hopkins, Minn., Christopher of Sugarland, Texas, Nathaniel of Slingerlands, and Jonathan, of Lebanon, N.H.; his sister, Marion Hancock Fish, of DeWitt; and several nieces and nephews.

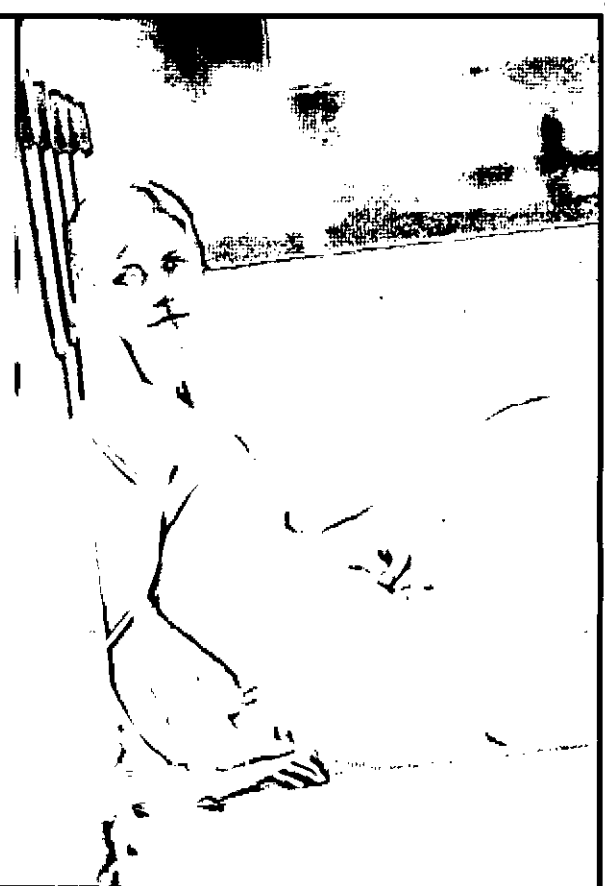

Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

A guy just wasn't going to work, Ric Chesser thought.

He was casting for Steamer 10's production of "Treasure Island," and he needed someone to play the main character, 12-year-old Jim Hawkins. Having one of the men in the company fill the role would be a tough sell, what with their facial hair and physiques, Chesser said.

Now, a woman, on the other hand ... clothes could hide her figure, and her hair could be fashioned into a ponytail like men wore in Colonial times. That was perfect, since "Treasure Island" is set in 18th century England.

And so, Agnes Kapusta Skiff landed the role of Jim in "Treasure Island," which will be staged at Steamer No. 10 in Albany on Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 24 and 25, and at The Arts Center in Saratoga Springs on Saturday, Jan. 31.

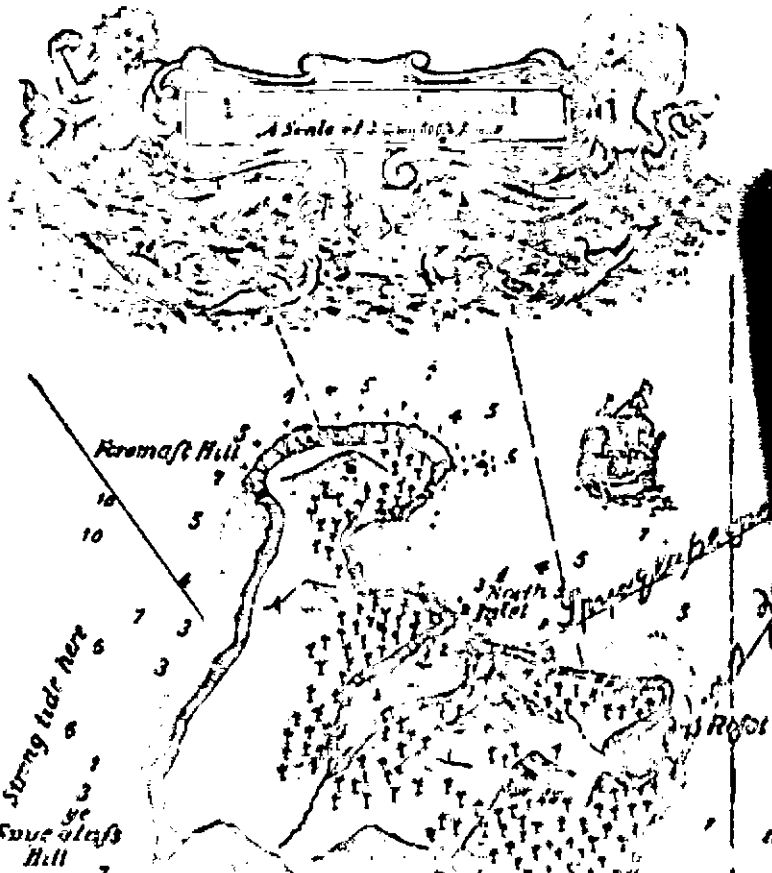
"I thought she was the one who could pull it off best," Chesser said.

"At first, you say, 'Oh my, I have to play a 12-year-old boy,'" said Kapusta Skiff. "But I think it's really fun."

The word "fun" came up often as Kapusta Skiff, castmate Robert Rice and Chesser talked about the play. "Treasure Island" is Robert Louis Stevenson's tale of a boy (Jim) who finds a treasure map and journeys halfway around the world in search of riches. Along the way, he matches wits with an assortment of pirates, including Long John Silver.

"It's a great play because it has the adventure aspect," Kapusta Skiff said. "It will keep the audience guessing."

That's true whether the people watching the play are young or old, Chesser said. This is the third time Steamer No. 10 has put on "Treasure Island," and it generally appeals to just

"about everyone, except maybe the teenage crowd."

"Kids loves it because it's just scary enough to give a real thrill," Chesser said. "It's told from the point of view of the boy, so you know that he survives - you have that. It's also kind of a mystery. The audience figures out what's going on at the last minutes. The kids are having a great time, and the parents are there totally engrossed."

Chesser found himself captivated by "Treasure Island" when he was just a kid himself and figured it would be a good show to adapt for Steamer No. 10's Kids' Fare series. So, he sat down with the book and a

highlighter, noting everything that he felt he had to be sure to include in the show.

Then, just to make sure he hadn't overlooked any critical parts, he leafed through the Cliffs' Notes for "Treasure Island."

The finished product is certainly a condensed product - while the book features three or four chapters where Jim is crossing an island on his trip, "I managed to knock that down to 45 words," Chesser said - but he's confident that his version stayed true to the story.

"If you'd read the book, you'd recognize the show," he said.

Harder to recognize might be Kapusta Skiff, who plays not only Jim but also an old, "really mean and nasty pirate."

In one scene, she plays Jim,

runs off stage and returns almost immediately as the pirate, which requires quite a vocal range, especially considering the pirate is "really raspy-voiced," she said.

Rice juggles multiple roles, too. He's Dr. Livesey and an assortment of pirates.

This is Rice's second show with Steamer No. 10. In December, he appeared in "Waiting for Sinterklaas: The Search For Santa Claus," after taking a two-year hiatus from acting while teaching English in Japan.

"I didn't get to act at all over there," Rice said.

That was tough because Rice, a 2002 Shaker High graduate, fell in love with acting years ago, appearing in plays and musicals throughout high school and college.

"I really like being able to dig into the characters," he said.

He also likes being able to personalize the parts he plays. Unlike Chesser, Rice wasn't too familiar with the story of "Treasure Island." He's been reading the book, but he's made a point not to watch any film adaptations because "I want to have my own take on the characters."

"Treasure Island" also stars Rebecca Boswell as Billy Bones, Squire Trelawney and Long John Silver. It will be staged at the Steamer No. 10 Theater, 500 Western Ave. in Albany, at 3 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 24, and 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 25. On Saturday, Jan. 31, the show travels to Saratoga Springs for a performance at the Arts Center, 320 Broadway. For information, call 438-5503 or visit www.steamer10theatre.org.



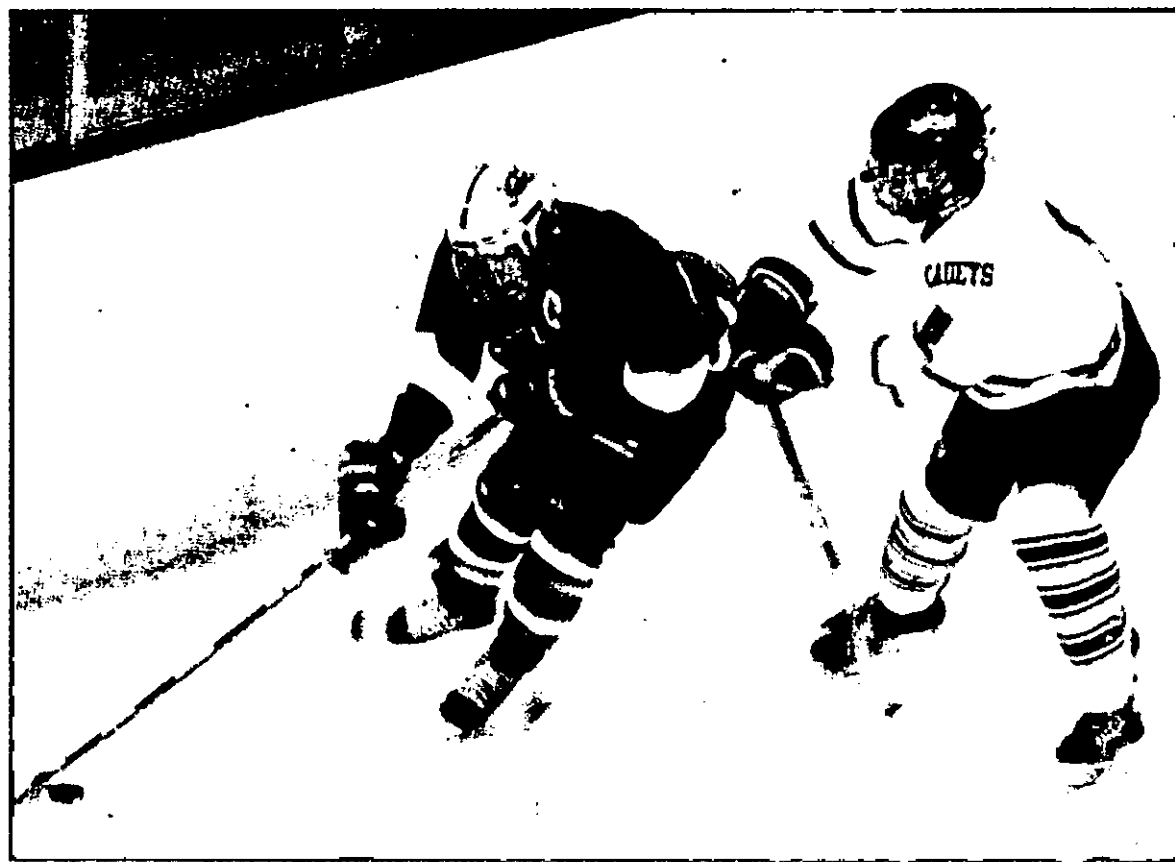
Warnken's two goals lifts Guiderland past LaSalle

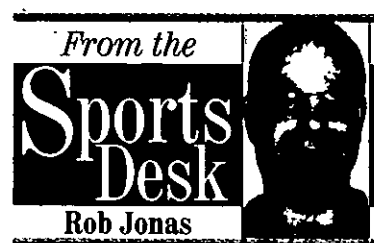
Time to get these things off my chest
