

Delmar couple wins \$10M

It was the anniversary gift that will keep on giving — literally.

Patricia and Daniel Parsons of Bethlehem won \$10 million with a \$20 instant scratch-off ticket. They were presented with a check Tuesday, Jan. 27, at the Hannaford Supermarket in Delmar where Parsons bought the ticket for her husband as a last-minute gift for their 17th wedding anniversary.

According to the New York State Lotto, the couple opted to split the prize evenly, which works out to an initial payment each of \$80,000, or \$54,520 after taxes. The Parsons will then each receive quarterly net payments of \$47,297 for a guaranteed 20 years.

The magic number that let them know of their winnings was the number 17, which corresponds to the number of years they have been married and the date that Parsons bought the ticket: Jan. 17.

Patti, as she's known around town and at the Albany County Executive's Office where she works, went to Hannaford to buy a chicken dinner, but once she discovered they were sold out something else caught her eye.

"I was picking up a few things at the store on

Area schools face tough budget choices

Districts seeking feedback from residents to help cope with state cuts

New York schools have long had a reputation for being some of the best in the country, but the reality is that success comes with a price tag districts are now be-

ing asked to trim.

Gov. David Paterson released some preliminary budget proposals in November that would affect funding for programs from kindergarten to post-graduate levels. School districts are now scrambling to decide which programs are necessary and which ones will have to be put on the back burner until the recession wanes.

According to the governor's office, every district in the state will see some type of budget cut

in 2009-2010, from 3 percent to 13 percent of the total budget. State universities and colleges are considering tuition hikes, which could affect a student's option of going away and living off campus.

Many area districts are reaching out to their communities early in the budgeting process to find out residents' education priorities.

Snow cancels exams

Students will retake Regents in June

Local high school students got a day off from school and a reprieve from Regents exams due to a snowstorm that hit Wednesday, Jan. 29.

The state exams were scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 27, through Friday, Jan. 30, but the storm, which brought up to a foot of snow in some areas, forced the cancellation of several exams on Wednesday.

Assistant principal of Guilderland High School Brian Bailey, who is in charge of administering the exam at the school, said students taking the second part of the English Regents exams, as well as the earth science, Spanish and French Regents exams, will take the exams again at the end of the school year.

Bailey said handling the additional

Ditched car yields DWI charges

Bethlehem police charged an Albany man with DWI after his damaged vehicle was found on the shoulder of Route 9W in Glenmont.

Austin R. Flowers, 37, was arrested on Thursday, Jan. 22, and charged with DWI; DWAI; third-degree aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle; driving on the shoulder of the roadway; and leaving an unattended motor vehicle.

Police said they received a call about a vehicle with front-end damage that was in the roadway on Route 9W, and, prior to arriving on the scene, police received another call about a possibly intoxicated man at a nearby Stewart's.

Police located the vehicle before responding to the call from the store where a cashier reported that a man entered the store and stated that his vehicle had been stolen, according to the arrest report. When the cashier said he would call the police, the man left the store, according to the report.

Bethlehem police said they saw a person walking behind the store, which turned out to be the suspect, who told officers the vehicle on Route 9W was his wife's.

While interviewing Flowers, police said they could smell alcohol and observed signs of intoxication. Flowers told police that he had just come back from a dance club off of Central Avenue in Albany when his car "stopped working" and that he was "unsure" how the vehicle became damaged, according to the report.

However, police said, they noted that while Flowers lived in Albany,

he was found driving south on Route 9W in the opposite direction of the city.

Upon further inspection of the vehicle, which was on the shoulder of the road partially in the roadway, police said it was discovered that it was registered to Flowers and it was found with the engine still running and the transmission in the "drive" position.

Flowers failed three field-sobriety tests and tested positive for alcohol before being taken into police custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department, according to the arrest report.

He consented to a chemical test and was released to his wife after his vehicle was towed for impound, the report states.

allegedly stealing several items of clothing, handbags and sneakers totaling \$1,024.49, the report states. She is scheduled to reappear in court on Thursday, Feb. 12, the reports state.

Federal stimulus package could benefit schools

If passed by the Senate, bill could mean billions in education

Area schools may have finally caught a break, or at least a temporary reprieve, in the midst of state aid cuts, economic downturns and budget crunches.

A federal stimulus package that has passed the House of Representatives, and is being debated in the Senate, includes about \$3.4 billion in federal school aid for New York City and \$1.6 billion for upstate counties over two years.

New York's senior senator, Charles Schumer, has said the stimulus package includes about

\$825 billion in programs, with \$737 million in upstate Medicaid relief and at least \$860 million in education aid.

Capital District schools are expected to get \$87 million of the funds over two years if the stimulus package is passed. It was backed by President Barack Obama, a Democrat, and passed the House on Wednesday, Jan. 28, with a vote of 244 to 188, with Republicans unanimously voting against it.

The money could mean two-year totals of \$25 million for Albany County schools, including \$1.3 million for Bethlehem Central, \$1.48 million for Guilderland Central, \$1.15 million for Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk and \$320,000 for Voorheesville Central.

The money could certainly be useful in Bethlehem since the state budget proposed by Governor David Paterson in

December included a more than \$2.2 million reduction in state aid. State funding accounts for nearly a third of total district revenue.

However, district officials say the money isn't a solution to the economic problems facing schools.

"We know that we cannot simply transfer that loss of aid to local taxpayers," said Bethlehem Superintendent Michael Tebbano. "So, as we must plan for the worst case scenario, we can anticipate some reduction in programs and services to bring the tax rate to a level in the budget that we believe is responsive to what our community can bear."

"However," he added, "we have a responsibility to make sure that any reductions we do make are done as carefully as possible to leave a high quality educational experience for all students intact. Some people will

likely think that we did not cut enough, while others may think we reduced too much. This is why the public's input, through the forums and the entire budget process, is essential to helping us balance these multiple and varied concerns."

More than 70 community members provided valuable feedback on a series of issues on Monday, Jan. 26, as the district held the second of four community budget forums scheduled for January and February.

The questions, discussed in the smaller groups, centered around personal values and priorities pertaining to certain budget topics as the district braces for a potentially significant loss of state aid.

Tebano gave a presentation to the public on the district's budget situation during a community forum at the middle

school, where he noted that if the proposed state reductions become a reality, there are essentially only two ways to make up the loss in aid — through property taxes and reducing or eliminating programs.

At Bethlehem's second public forum on Monday, Jan. 26, more than 70 residents participated in roundtable discussions that were split into five smaller groups.

Some of the topics of interest brought up by residents included class sizes; self-funding and fundraising; alternative education and outside programs; transportation; athletics and extracurricular activities; special education; and savings and revenue.

The forum series is slated to end on Feb. 9 and the board's official budget development process will begin later in the month.

G'land seeks pair of principals

Application process has begun for heads of elementary, high schools

With two administrative positions open, the Guilderland Central School District is looking for someone with the right stuff to lead them to excellence next year.

The district officially opened up the application process posting positions to replace Westmere Elementary Principal Deborah Drumm, who will be retiring at the end of the school year, and former high school principal Michael Paulino, who is now serving as interim principal of Doyle Middle School in Troy.

Brian McCann has been serving as the acting Guilderland High School principal. He did not return *Spotlight* calls inquiring if he would apply for the permanent position.

Lin Severance, assistant superintendent for human resources in the district, said McCann is eligible to apply for the position like any other candidate, and added she said she hopes he does. She said his long history with the district is a benefit.

"He's doing a phenomenal job in our opinion," she said.

The job openings were posted in newspapers and on the district's

Web site Friday, Jan. 30, and will be closing after the February recess ends Monday, Feb. 23, Severance said.

An interview search team will consider the applications through March and April in a two-step process for each position.

Severance said she expects a good number of applications and is "not worried about attracting candidates."

Severance said the two searches will be handled separately. While the high school has seen a high turnover of principals in recent years, Westmere has had the same principal for six years.

Deborah Drumm has been the Westmere Elementary School principal since 2003, and before that served as an elementary school principal for 12 years in Beekmantown near Plattsburgh.

She started her career as an elementary school teacher, and then served as a staff developer at Shenendohowa and in Plattsburgh. She said her time as a staff developer sparked her interest in administration, and she pursued a degree at the College of Saint Rose.

Drumm, born and raised in Guilderland, said she is ready to spend some time with her husband, children and grandchildren.

"My career has gone full circle. My time here at Westmere Elementary has truly been the highlight of my career," she said.

She said the collaborative environment has been a pleasure, and she enjoyed her time a great deal.

She offered a word of advice to her successor: "Always value teamwork. Everyone's opinions are important."

Severance said she is planning a meeting with the faculty and other district officials Thursday, Feb. 5, to discuss what characteristics they are seeking for both positions.

"Do they need a high level of excitement, or quiet leadership skills?" Severance said. "We're looking for someone to provide strong leadership and be a stabilizing influence at the high school."

She said sometimes you need a "spark" and sometimes you do not necessarily need to shake things up when changing leadership roles.

Westmere was recently awarded the honor of the prestigious Blue Ribbon Award, and Severance said it is one of the best elementary schools in the area.

"I want to keep the positive momentum going," Severance said.

She said the district will be searching for a principal that maintains that standard of excellence.

"As a district, what we are looking for is someone who is an instructional leader," Severance added.

She said both positions call for someone child-centered and up on current trends and strategies to better teach students, not simply a manager.

"It's easy to find someone who can run a building, she said. "We need someone who understands the instructional process."



"This year, we wanted to take a leadership role with Go Red Day, get our entire staff in all of our regions to participate in this effort," she said.

Hess is also the chairwoman of the Go Red for Women luncheon.

According to the event Web site, www.goredforwomen.org, only 13 percent of women view heart disease as a health threat, even though it is the No. 1 killer of women. It also states that cardiovascular disease kills more than 480,000 women a year, about one per minute, and 1-in-2.6 female deaths are from cardiovascular disease, compared to 1-in-30 from breast cancer.

It kills more people than the next four most common causes of death combined, and claims an American life every 35 seconds, according to the Web site.

In response to the event, groups of all different

backgrounds are "going red."

On Feb. 6, First Fridays, a local art consortium in Albany, will promote Go Red for Women with its monthly "gallery openings, one-night shows, local shops, restaurants and live entertainment."

"So many people take advantage of Albany's arts scene during First Fridays. It's a great way to get the message out about the importance of heart health," said Maureen Lundberg, co-owner of Albany Aqua Ducks & Trolleys.

Lil Mohamed, a representative of the Guilderland branch of

There goes the neighborhood

Affordable housing, work force housing, inclusionary zoning – whatever it's called, the supposition that a community will benefit by making housing available to a different demographic by controlling the price of that housing is a great policy to rally around when you're fishing for votes or somewhat honestly trying to be compassionate.

This past week, Saratoga Springs Mayor Scott Johnson addressed rather frankly this particular problem that the city has struggled with since long before former Mayor Valerie Keehn used it as the cornerstone of her successful 2005 election bid.

"Affordable housing," said Johnson at his second State of the City address, "is not the ruination of your neighborhood. As stated on prior occasions, the unfortunate truth is that many of our neighborhoods are still unwilling to have affordable housing nearby. Overall, that still remains the largest obstacle to development of more affordable housing throughout our city."

In other words, put up or shut up.

But once you start putting shovels in the ground in order to make that compassionate crusade a brick-and-mortar reality, the arguments against affordable housing will start cropping up, usually from the very people who were so in favor of affordable housing as a concept.

These arguments seem to run the gamut: Government-mandated price controls are fundamentally bad for an economy. The introduction of a different class of people into a community is a sociological nightmare that will not only put our children at risk, but also devalue our homes.

For the most part, these arguments boil down to a four-word phrase we at *The Spotlight* can't abide: "Not in my backyard."

It's too bad, really, because there are many valid reasons for arguing against inclusionary zoning than mere hypocrisy. There is the obvious reason that mandating a builder supply a certain percentage of their homes at a discounted rate will no doubt turn some developers away. The resulting shortage of housing units could restrict the number of new homes in a community and drive up the prices of newly constructed homes and existing homes – exactly the opposite of what was set out to be accomplished.

The Saratoga Springs City Council is entertaining an affordable housing proposal. *The Spotlight* does not endorse or disapprove of this or any other such project in any other of our coverage areas. We do, however, disapprove of the NIMBY-ism that these projects attract.

Sprint to Senate leaves voters little time

The Super Bowl may have been played on Sunday, but for political junkies the preceding days had all the action. Gov. David Paterson appointed Kirsten Gillibrand to the Senate, and when she was sworn in, she left her 20th Congressional District office wide open for politicians everywhere.

They noticed, and swooped in from every corner to grab a stake in a yet-to-be-scheduled special election. We now know that election will feature Republican Assembly Minority Leader James Tedisco and Democrat Scott Murphy, plus however many independents can rustle up 3,500 valid signatures in the limited time frame. Now that the candidates are in the blocks, Paterson need only say the word to trigger a 30-to-40 day race to Washington.

It's unfortunate that, as with Gillibrand's selection, voters had no say whatsoever in the selection of these two candidates. The procedure does not allow for a primary, meaning that party leadership from the district's 10 counties made the picks in this abbreviated process.

While allowing New Yorkers to go without a junior senator or short a congressperson would be unacceptable, the past weeks of musical chair representation raises some legitimate concerns over how these rare, but important, events are dealt with.

It started, as I'm sure you'll recall, with President Barack Obama tapping Hillary Clinton for the Secretary of State job, touching off a media blitz of speculation that reached a fever pitch when Caroline Kennedy stepped into the ring. The idea of a "campaign" for a single deciding vote is a bit ridiculous, but you have to call it something.

The circumstances were notable enough; a Kennedy on the scene

was like tossing a bloody ham hock into shark-infested waters. The media went into a legitimate frenzy.

Now that we've all watched the slow-motion car crash of that campaign, the dissection of the events is well under way. A slew of articles have emerged trying to argue a reasonable cause for Kennedy's withdrawal and Paterson's choice. All too often, these collapse into tired Upstate vs. Downstate treatises, with Manhattan-based commentators seemingly convinced that Gillibrand will put an Uzi in every grade-schooler's lunchbox and plant corn in Central Park, while Upstaters plan for the golden day when Gillibrand will return peace and prosperity to their wind-swept economic wasteland.

The media is often vilified in this post mortem phase, as Kennedy supporters line up to condemn reporters for taking the wind out of her sails. They feel that a political outsider like Kennedy shouldn't have been grilled like a big-shot statesman.

While that's just ridiculous, there is a modicum of truth in the argument. Political pundits watched Kennedy "um" and "you know" her way through early interviews with barely concealed glee before playing the best clips at the top of every hour. I'm not saying that it was unethical to have done so, but it does make one wonder where and how the line should be drawn. At what point have we, as journalists, sufficiently reported the fact Caroline Kennedy was a stammering mess at her first interview?

What it really comes down to is that Kennedy is no politician. In fact, she and her mother made concerted efforts to live out of the spotlight more often than not. Whether that's a good or bad quality, or whether it should matter, I'll leave up to you, but I don't think we can deny that appearance has an effect. After all, voters liked Caroline a lot more before she started talking.

And with this election approaching in the 20th, appearances are going to play a pretty big part once again. Murphy and Tedisco are going to have a tough time making elaborate points in the time allotted. It's unfortunate given the times we inhabit, but electability will more than ever be a matter of sight and sound over substance.

Murphy, a businessman from Glens Falls, has an impressive retinue of experience, but I honestly don't immediately recognize the man. He is president of the Upstate Venture Association of New York, which is a nod to maintaining the strong presence Gillibrand

provided.

Then you have James Tedisco, who I know is as savvy a politician as there ever was. This reporter spoke to more than one Grand Old Party figure that said The Disco will have the best chance of winning what will be a short and intense campaign, and that fact took precedence over what he would actually do once in office.

And for a party that, by all accounts, desperately wants that seat back, this makes sense. In this crazy sprint, the message can take a back seat to making contact with the voters at all. There will be no going door-to-door for petition signatures, no debates in all 10 counties and (if we are lucky) no time to cover every square foot of the 10-county district with tacky little campaign signs. It will be a different ballgame from the multi-month slough that typifies Congressional matchups.

Delivery systems will be the artillery of this war, and it will be tough to top Tedisco. Besides being a well-connected politico in a high-profile race (meaning able to raise lots of cash, fast), Tedisco has already taken advantage of the 21st century's tools. He blogs. He maintains a Web site. He even Tweets updates on most days and, if you absolutely must know what's on the Assemblyman's mind in real time, you can sign up for Tedisco text message updates, which were flowing fast on Friday.

There's another politician who Twittered from the campaign trail: President Barack Obama. It might be hard to remember now, but his candidacy looked like an awfully long shot a year ago. His success was in large part due to his effective harnessing of new electronic mediums — he circumvented federal campaign financing and used technology to build a massive base of donors chipping in \$10 or \$20 to raise ludicrous sums of money, then he networked those supporters to build an army of campaign workers.

Though most pundits brushed off the fact John McCain couldn't use e-mail with a chuckle, figuring that voters wouldn't be swayed by such minutiae, in reality it wasn't a matter of programming prowess, but of attitude and strategy. The technological gap between those two men made a huge impact that wasn't fully realized until it was all over.

Of course, Obama clawed his way up from the bottom over the course of months. What would have happened if this presidential campaign wasn't the longest in history, but the shortest? Polls show that most Americans are happy with the choice we made after such a long thought process.

Now, we have no choice other than to see what happens with a rushed decision.

National Guard moves to upgrade pistol range

Flooding of Normanskill complicates training exercises

Difficulties arising from a flooding river have led National Guard officials to seek permission to improve a Guilderland training facility, according to information provided by the military outlet.

The New York National Guard is in the planning stages of rebuilding the Guilderland Weekend Training Site pistol range used by the National Guard, reservists and law enforcement officials.

The training facility is located on the Normanskill Creek, and is susceptible to flooding when the water rises, according to information provided by the National Guard.

"If it's flooded, you can't train there," said Eric Durr, a representative of the National Guard. "The pop-up targets don't work that great."

The National Guard is projecting a 2012 start date to begin the improvements, which would be paid for with federal and some state funds.

Durr said the training facility is used for a number of activities, and has needed the improvements for some time.

"This facility provides a rifle range and a pistol range," Durr said. He added that it is also used for small amounts of infantry tactical training.

It is located close to 20 miles west of the City of Albany, and rests on 1,613 acres, although only 200 are used for training with the

rest sitting on wetlands. The gun ranges take up 41 acres, according to the National Guard.

Durr said the upgrade effort is in the preliminary stages, and the National Guard is in the process of obtaining permission from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation to go ahead with the improvements.

The review identifies three options. The first option is to proceed with improvements on the facility, the second is to implement improvements without the need for construction, thus requiring some training to be

The statement attempted to determine the "physical, environmental, cultural, and socioeconomic aspects of the project area and its region of influence."

According to environmental review, "the preferred action alternative is not expected to result in significant impacts to the current environmental setting. However, additional data is required to assess whether or not training at several of the proposed new ranges and range improvements would increase the risk of projectile escapement off of installation boundaries."

The National Guard is also seeking improvements at facilities in Peekskill and Niagara Falls. The work is part of the New York National Guard's Range Complex Master Plan, according to information it provided.

Doctors seek Tourette's patients

Doctors at Albany Medical Center are seeking volunteers for a research study to determine if a drug called Pramipexole can alleviate the symptoms of Tourette's syndrome.

Pramipexole has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in patients with Parkinson's disease and restless leg syndrome, but is investigational for treating Tourette's syndrome. The study will evaluate the efficacy of the medication in suppressing motor and phonic tics in pediatric patients with the disease.

Albany County releases 2008 arrest figures

Sheriff says \$1.9 million in narcotics, 19 revolvers recovered

The Albany County Sheriff's Department continues to crack down on illegal drugs in 2009 as it looks back at its arrest records from last year.

Although the number of individuals arrested was down in 2008 compared to the year before, the numbers of felonies and violations were up. Albany County Sheriff James Campbell reported that his department recovered six pounds of powdered and crack cocaine, worth \$544,800; 812 "dime bags" of heroin, worth \$20,300; 121 pounds of marijuana, worth nearly \$1.4 million; and \$15,000 worth of other miscellaneous drugs — all in 2008.

The miscellaneous drugs included hallucinogenic mushrooms, Methadone, Oxycontin, Xanax, Valium, Ritalin, steroids, crystal meth, Ecstasy and morphine.

Campbell released the numbers on Thursday, Jan. 29, from his department's Drug Interdiction Unit.

The "street value" of the drugs confiscated are based on \$200 per gram of powdered and crack cocaine, \$25 per dime bag of heroin and \$25 per gram of marijuana.

In addition to the drug-related arrests, Campbell said, 14 individuals were arrested on gambling charges, 26 wire taps were executed and eight individuals were arrested for prostitution.

"The year-to-year activity totals of our drug unit continues to indicate that we must collectively continue our law enforcement efforts throughout Albany County," Campbell said. "This past year our unit alone removed \$1.9 million in narcotics and 19 revolvers from the streets of Albany County."

According to Albany County District Attorney David Soares' office, along with the state's Division of Criminal Justice Services, crime in New York has steadily decreased for the past 17 years.

An FBI report released in September stated that between 2006 and 2007, "crime fell at a much greater rate in New York state than the rest of the country."

Campbell's 2008 arrest records show that out of 195 subjects arrested, five individuals were arrested at the Albany Bus Terminal and 22 were either inmates or visitors at the Albany County Correctional Facility. There were 240 individuals arrested by the unit in 2007, which was 45 more than 2008.

Misdemeanors were also down from the 177 in 2007 as Albany County sheriff's deputies processed 105 misdemeanors in 2008.

The Drug Interdiction Unit is under the supervision of Inspector John F. Burke, Campbell said, and is a five-member unit that has been

involved in "numerous drug investigations ranging from street-level sales to wholesale suppliers" throughout the county.

The county's drug unit executed 219 search warrants last year, according to Campbell.

Seeking re-election for his fifth term, Campbell made the announcement on Thursday, Jan. 22, that he would run for county sheriff again.

Campbell, 68, said he plans to continue to provide the county with innovative and progressive programs and that he is running again because he is still excited to come to work every day and help keep the county safe.

It is unknown at this time if Campbell, a Democrat who has been sheriff since 1989, will be challenged for his seat.







At home:

Help your young child brush two times a day with a pea-sized dab of fluoride toothpaste. Set a good example and brush together letting your child watch you caring for your teeth

Floss:

As your child teeth come in, teach flossing habits. Flossing aids made for children are helpful to young hands.

Fluoride:


Talk to your dentist or pediatrician about fluoride in your water or if fluoride supplements or rinses are needed.

Nutrition:

Your child needs to eat a variety of healthy foods. Sugary

Your dentist may want to "paint" a coating (clear sealant) to teeth with pits and grooves when your child nears age five. This is one of the most cost effective ways to prevent cavities.



Sports:

Avoid athletic injuries with a mouthguard that can be made by your dentist.

Developing good habits at an early age and scheduling regular dental visits helps children get a good start on a lifetime of healthy teeth and gums.

Dental Emergency Tips

- ◆ **Knocked-Out Tooth:** It's important to retrieve the tooth, hold it by the crown, and rinse off the root of the tooth if it's dirty. Do not scrub it or remove any attached tissue fragments. If possible, put the tooth back in its socket. If that isn't possible, put it in a container with milk or water and then get to the dentist as soon as possible.
- ◆ **Broken Tooth:** Rinse your mouth with warm water to keep the area clean. Use cold compresses on the area to keep the swelling down and get to your dentist's office quickly.
- ◆ **Bitten Tongue or Lip:** Clean the area gently with a cloth and then apply cold compresses to reduce the swelling. If the bleeding doesn't stop, go to a hospital emergency room immediately.
- ◆ **Objects Caught Between the Teeth:** Try to gently remove the object with dental floss and avoid cutting the gums. Do not use a sharp instrument. If you're not successful in removing the object, go to the dentist.
- ◆ **Toothache:** Rinse the mouth with warm water to clean it out. Make sure food or foreign objects aren't lodged around the tooth by using dental floss. Don't ever put a aspirin or any painkiller on the gums or around the aching tooth. It can cause a burn on the mouth and do more harm than good.

Railroads make plea for state money

Group says economy is off track, asks for funding

In order for the state's railroads to help New York, one group said, New York has to help the railroads.

Railroads of New York (RONY) Legislative Counsel Scott Wigger testified at the State Transportation Joint Legislative Budget Hearing on Wednesday, Jan. 28, and called on the state Legislature to restore \$10 million in rail capital assistance.

He said the money would ensure the advancement of rail freight capital projects, and include rail freight projects in the federal stimulus package and the next five-year transportation capital plan. Rail advocates across the state argue that these measures will help New York address key long-term economic, environmental and foreign oil dependency issues, according to Wigger.

"While we acknowledge that the state is currently facing unprecedented fiscal constraints, growing New York's rail freight system now is critical to our future and essential to moving goods and growing jobs," said Wigger. "We have serious concerns about the state's level of support for the rail freight industry, demonstrated by the devastating cuts for rail freight assistance contained in the proposed 2009-10 executive budget."

The governor's proposed budget has cut capital assistance from the state's base Passenger and Freight Rail Assistance Program. The railroad group argues that while other modes of transportation currently receive billions of dollars each year from the state, the budget slashes two-thirds of the annual

rail capital funding.

Wigger also stressed that rail freight can be a critical factor in retaining and attracting manufacturing industries and jobs that are key to New York's economy.

RONY is a not-for-profit statewide association with members serving 60 of New York's 62 counties, advocated for more investment in New York's rail freight system as a

strategic way to move goods in a safer, more economical and environmentally friendly manner.

"The rail freight industry today is stable, productive and competitive," Wigger said. "But it needs the Legislature's assistance to bring its rail infrastructure to a level necessary to meet the growing and complex needs of New York's present and future."

Investing in Difficult Times: Own the Winners

“Is this financial crisis different?”

People often ask me this question. The first American financial crisis was under a President by the name of George Washington, so we've endured many before. Human nature and the cycles of fear and greed are timeless — even after this crisis has abated, there will be another someday. The current credit crisis is different in that it's very large due to global economics and technology. This, for example, allows someone to write a mortgage in California and sell it immediately to a buyer in Singapore. The good news is that a period of significant growth has followed every previous crisis and the basic principles of investing remained viable for creating wealth over the long term.

So what can an investor do during difficult times?

There are a few key factors for making educated investment decisions and weathering the storms including adhering to investment fundamentals, focusing on your financial goals, and having patience. While short-term approaches may work occasionally, one should pay close attention to the economics and fundamentals of businesses when investing for the long term.

There is no substitute for thorough research and finding companies with great financial strength, clean balance sheets, cash profits, and significant cash flow. It is financial strength that allows enterprises to pay dividends, invest in their operations, make acquisitions, repay debt, and survive an economic slowdown. These are the stocks that I feel are the “winners.”

So have a sound strategy and stay on track. I look at an investment as if I were going to buy the entire company. When

I seek high quality company stocks, I look for:

- Good businesses that I understand, have a competitive advantage, and possess high profit margins
- Companies that have little or no debt, free cash flow, and deploy capital wisely
- Enterprises with superior management teams; leaders who are honest, ethical, energetic, and have a solid track record of performing through difficult times
- Businesses I can buy at a discount to my estimate of economic value — in fact, there haven't been such bargains since the early 1970s

It's also important to focus on your financial goals and remain patient. Various studies have shown that the average investor significantly underperforms the overall market because they let their emotions get in the way of rational decision making. They often chase the latest trends with the typical result being that they miss the initial upswing

and their gains are substantially less than what they would have been if they had just stayed the course.

I believe that following the Wall Street crowd is not a sound plan for long-term financial success. Attempting to time the market is an exercise in futility and usually hurts the financial results of those who try. And being fully invested, even through a downturn, yields better investment results over the long term than attempting to time the decline, remove capital from the stock market, and get back in when “things are better.” *It's time in the market — not market timing.*

We obviously cannot predict how long this recession

will last, but we know it will end. Since 1948, the last 10 recessions averaged 10.4 months in duration and the longest two lasted 16 months. The National Bureau of Economic Research officially declared December 2007 as the start of the current recession. While recessionary fears may continue to depress stock prices in the short term, they are also producing great opportunities to buy the winners at discounts.





A new approach to the family-oriented wedding

Moving their relationship from dating to marriage was a big step for Lynn Lehman and Cliff Simonelli. One primary concern was how their respective children – Lynn's two young sons, ages 5 and 8, plus Cliff's three youngsters, ages 9 to 15 – would come together as a family.

"Cliff and I were both divorced," explains Lynn, a 38-year-old marketing manager. "Divorce turns kids' lives upside down. My boys didn't verbalize anything, but I knew they were worried. It differs from the traditional wedding in only one respect, after the newlyweds exchange rings, their children join them for a special service focusing on the family nature of a marriage. Each child is given a Family Medallion pendant (or ring) with three interlocking circles, a symbol that represents family love (for ceremony information, see FamilyMedallion.com).

The Wheaton, Ill. couple liked the message of the family ceremony, which included a pledge to love and care for all the children either spouse brings to the marriage. "We were making

a commitment to the children, and we wanted them to make a commitment to work through the challenges that our new family would inevitably face," Lynn adds.

The Simonellis say they will never forget the special family service that was the highlight of their September 2008 wedding. The justice of the peace called each child forward and, while he read the words of the ceremony, Lynn and Cliff placed the medallions around the necks of their children. There was a lot of hugging and tears.

"I could tell by the way the kids reacted that on some level, they understood," Lynn says. For example, Lynn's youngest son, 5-year-old Christopher, clutched his medallion and beamed at his stepdad Cliff. "This is cool, dude," he said. "I love you." Cliff, a 41-year-old salesman, had been concerned that his teenage son and daughter might not warm to the idea of a family service. "But once we gave them the medallions, I could feel in them a palpable sense of relief – that they knew everything was going to be OK."

Most of the guests attending the Lehman-Simonelli wedding were awed by the family ceremony. "We got tons of compliments," says Lynn. "People told us that they had never seen such a unique and beautiful way to recognize children."

the bond between parents, stepparents and children. "I was very impressed with the Family Medallion ceremony," says Rev. David Schaal, a Minneapolis minister. "When I recently used it during a wedding, I could see the pride and happiness in the face the little boy who received the medallion. It's my feeling that when children are involved, it's important to do something tangible to recognize them during the

wedding."

Lynn and Cliff believe that their decision to have a "family" wedding will strengthen their family bond for years to come. "As our kids grow older, I hope they appreciate the value of family and what we did to assure them that they would always be an integral part of our lives," Lynn says.

Andrew Lehman, 8, isn't thinking much about the future. He

wears his Family Medallion every day and refers to the wedding as, "The day my mom, my stepdad and all of us kids got married. My medallion means family. That's what we are."







He said he was planning to retire during the check presentation at Delaware Plaza but that Patti hasn't made up her mind. He's a car salesman for Capital Cities Imported Cars.

Dan Parsons said they couple will pay off some bills, put some money aside for their daughter's college and then take a vacation.

"We've always wanted to go to Hawaii and Europe," he said.

"Now we can do both."

Patti Parsons, 52, has been active in local politics, running for offices in Bethlehem in the past and serving a brief stint as the town's court clerk.

"I was so excited I couldn't contain myself," Parsons said in a release. "The ironic part of all of this is the number we matched, 17, is also our anniversary date as well as the day I bought the ticket. I sure know what my lucky number is now."

Guilderland's water filtration facility is in Industrial Park, and pulls water from the same place the City of Watervliet does — the Watervliet reservoir. The already convenient scenario helped spark discussions to file for the startup grant.

Watervliet Mayor Mike Manning said the discussions are in the most preliminary stages, and nothing has been decided yet.

"We brought it up. Ken [Runion] and his staff have been receptive," he said. "We proposed that we build a joint facility out there since we share the same water."

He said Watervliet's plant is close to 100 years old, and a new facility could increase efficiency and provide more modern means to deliver water to the residents of both municipalities.

Manning said one of the difficulties would be to determine who runs the plant. There could be joint authority, but it is unclear what would be the best way to go about it. He also said the state might need to create legislation to form a governing entity, since the city or town might not have the authority needed.

He said these issues would need to be hashed out as plans progressed. The cost of planning the consolidation would be paid for by a "local efficiency grant," which could help pay for a study of the proposal and then possibly a new facility.

Manning said the "rough" cost of a facility of that magnitude would be between \$10 million and \$12 million, based on a calculation of approximately \$1 million per million gallons per day. He said the facility would serve both towns, and potentially other municipalities, with about 10 million gallons daily.

Manning said he thinks the state is hoping to encourage projects of this magnitude with the efficiency grants.

"I think what the state really wants to see is stuff we're talking about here," Manning said. "I think this is in the spirit of what they really wanted."

He said the municipalities are planning to have their application ready by the submission date of Wednesday, Feb. 11.

Runion said the town is also in the midst of other plans to share services. He said the town and the Village of Altamont are considering a similar application for a grant to study the consolidation of their Web sites.

"What we would use is common software and a common server," Runion said.

He said this could generate savings, but the study would likely determine exactly how much that would be.

Runion also said the county is in the planning stages of finding ways to combine 911 emergency telecommunications, something Albany County Sheriff James Campbell is pushing for if elected to another term.

Runion said with the recent transition to forcing municipalities to handle 911 calls from cell

phones, a task handled by state police until several months ago, it is important to be as efficient as possible.

"It puts a burden on our local responders," Runion said.

Runion briefly addressed the possibility of taking consolidation one step further, and possibly dissolving the Village of Altamont in the town.

He said the move is unlikely at this time, and the village has the option to dissolve itself, and it must be done by referendum of the residents.

In that case, the town would be required by law to handle all of the services the village provides, however it would not inherit any of the debt the village has.

"You can't escape your debt," Runion quipped.

He said dissolving villages has not become the trend in municipal consolidation, and more villages are being created than dissolved.

He said the reason is most likely because of the benefits of planning and zoning sovereignty.

Altamont Mayor James Gaughan said the village prides itself on its high efficiency and said a survey done by the Rockefeller College at the University at Albany cited Altamont four months ago as one of the most efficient municipalities in the area.

He said the village shares equipment, fuel depots, and public safety services.

Gaughan confirmed that there are no plans for the village to dissolve into the town.

students at the end of the year will not be too difficult, and there will be few instances of any conflicts regarding end-of-year exams.

"They're good about creating a schedule where there are very few conflicts," he said of the Board of Regents.

Jody Monroe, assistant superintendent for educational programs and instruction for the Bethlehem Central School District, said one downside of the cancellation is that the seniors who need to pass the exams to graduate missed an opportunity to do so before the summer.

"For any seniors who were taking these exams today, there would be somewhat of a concern that you have now limited the number of times they could take and pass an

exam," said Monroe. "If they have to take a Regents exam in June, which they have taken in the past and been unsuccessful with, there is always a concern

about graduation."

The students will be taking the first part of the English and earth science exams on June 17, and part two of the English exam on June 18, Bailey said. He said there were nearly 225 students scheduled to take exams on Wednesday, and they will be folded into other groups of students in June, totaling close to 450 total students taking the English Regents in the summer.

Seniors who need the tests to graduate would be given permission by the state to take a "component" exam, and make up the second part of the Regents in May. They can only take the exam if they have failed twice before, though, Bailey said. He added that those who participated in part one the English Regents will be able to count that exam toward one of their two attempts needed to qualify for a May component exam.

He said the situation becomes more difficult if the first part of the English exam was administered, and the second part was canceled. In this case the entire test will be administered again in the summer.

Bailey said there are a few reasons for doing this. Mainly, it is to make sure that other students in the state who did take the second part of the exams do not give any information to the students who did not.

The other reason, Bailey said, is so that the students receive a fair chance to succeed.

"They design the test so there's a balance between the two days," Bailey said.

Monroe said the State Educational Department could provide an alternative to having students take the entire exam again, but it has not so far.

The largest inconvenience the high school will face, Bailey said, is that "local" exams or midterms that would count toward second quarter grades might not be graded in time to make the Wednesday, Feb. 4, deadline.

Bailey said it is up to the teachers how to handle the issue, and they can either count the exams toward the third marking period, postpone them or grade them by Wednesday.

"They'll be creative about that, and they'll be fair," he said.

Mohonasen Central School District created an online survey about those priorities. So far, according to the district's communications department, those responding to the survey are saying they want to preserve electives and technology programs.

"Like many districts across the state, we are bracing for a difficult budget year," Superintendent Kathleen Spring said. "We know that we will have to make some tough decisions, and before we do that we want to reach out to the community to hear their concerns."

Budget forums are a new part of the Mohonasen budget process. Each forum is scheduled to highlight a different aspect of the budget. Other districts are looking at similar forums as a way to gauge what the public is willing to stomach as far as cutbacks to their children's educations.

Local districts are also getting creative, with some looking at four-day weeks and consolidating buildings.

The Schenectady City School District extended its school day by a half-hour last year, and Superintendent Eric Ely said while a four-day week is probably not an option for them, consolidation is. The city is looking at using a middle school building to merge Howe Magnet with its Central Park Middle School, creating a centralized kindergarten-through-eighth-grade building. The change would then save the district on energy and transportation costs.

One thing that could be affected by cuts is the number of teacher's aides in the classrooms. Guilderland remains one of the only area districts that still has aides in many of

the kindergarten classrooms.

"Cutting back on staff, such as aides, has a huge effect on instructional success. I liked the fact that there was an extra pair of hands in my daughter's classroom," said Guilderland mom Tara Attanasio.

Guilderland Superintendent John McGuire said the district stands to get \$2.7 million less in state aid than it received for 2007-2008. He said that reductions in all areas are imminent but eliminating entire programs is not. The district plans to hold informational meeting and discussion groups throughout March. McGuire said district officials know they cannot put too much of a burden on already cash-strapped taxpayers.

"Right now, we are working internally to see how we can

ensure meeting the needs of all our 5,300 students," said McGuire. "We are working really hard to balance the reductions we make."

McGuire said staff reductions are a possibility, but some programs may continue to grow, such as special education programs.

In Scotia-Glenville, a program new this year, Brite Beginnings, will add more students next year. The program is for autistic elementary-age students and is held at the Glen Worden Elementary School. The program currently has four students and could expand to eight next year.

Special education teacher Lois Long said she is grateful the program was able to obtain the funding and offer a program that allows students to integrate into the tradition-

al school setting.

"It's amazing to see the changes in these students. We are very thankful we have had this opportunity," said Long.

Scotia-Glenville will probably see cuts of a few thousand dollars in state aid. Superintendent Susan Swartz said what that means for the district is that the possibility of adding programs or expanding current ones disappears.

"We have to nurture and take care of the programs that are in place," said Swartz.

In Saratoga County, the Furr Hills-Ballston Lake district is also holding community forums as a way of tackling the budget by gaining insight from parents and taxpayers. The forums take an in-depth look at the governor's proposals, which could lead to cuts close to \$3.6 million for the

district. Superintendent Jim Schultz said in a statement that staff reductions, as well as cuts in services and programs, will be inevitable if the budget is passed.

Administrators across the Capital District said they are aware that this is not the only year they could see decreases in aid, and they are already anticipating the same for 2010-2011.

The governor's office issued a statement in December regarding the budget cuts, saying New Yorkers must understand there is no alternative given the dire straits of the economy. Paterson also encouraged residents to remember this is not only about New York, but also about the entire country.

"New York is not alone in a budget crisis," Paterson said. "But if the United States is the epicenter of a global financial meltdown, New York is the focus of our financial woe."

There is one bright point for schools. Under President Barack Obama's proposed stimulus package, Capital District schools could receive a much-needed \$84 million over the next two years. According to the U.S. Department of Education, if approved, that money could come as soon as April.

Lincoln and Fido

Pictures of presidential pooch on display at Brookfield Museum

Abraham Lincoln needed someone to take a picture of his dog.

The newly elected president had decided not to take Fido to the White House, instead leaving him in Springfield, Ill., with family friends. But before they parted ways, Lincoln wanted to get pictures of Fido for his kids.

So, he took the dog to FW Ingmire's photography studio in Springfield for a now-famous photo session. The pictures of Fido became part of the Lincoln legacy, with many calling it the first time a president's dog was photographed.

It wasn't the only time Ingmire captured noteworthy photos associated with the 16th president. When Lincoln's body was brought back to Springfield after he was killed by an assassin's bullet, Ingmire was taking with his camera. He took some of the most well-known pictures of the funeral procession and Lincoln's coffin.

Pictures of both Fido and the funeral have been passed down through Ingmire's family, and on Friday, Feb. 6, his great-great-nephew, Lance Ingmire, will show them at the Brookfield

Museum in Ballston Spa as part of a celebration of Lincoln's 200th birthday.

"These are two of the rarest-known photos of Lincoln's casket," Ingmire said. "They're the rarest of the rare."

The photographs are so unusual that when he took them to the Lincoln Presidential Library in Springfield, officials expressed such great interest in obtaining them that they were "just short of foaming at the mouth," Ingmire said.

"They were amazed," he said.

The Ingmire family's connection to Lincoln can actually be traced to upstate New York. FW Ingmire went to divinity school at Colgate, and his first assignment was in Springfield. There, he opened a photography studio not far from the office of the up-and-coming lawyer Lincoln.

Ingmire, a family historian who has devoted countless hours to genealogical research, said Lincoln visited the studio with Fido because he did not want to subject the dog to the train trip to Washington, D.C. Legend has it that Fido did not like loud noises or crowds.

At the studio, Lincoln and his sons, Willie and Tad, watched as Ingmire snapped pictures of Fido sitting atop a fancy rug.

"The Fido photos really became quite famous," Ingmire said.

The bulk of Ingmire's business came not from presidents, but from Civil War soldiers. He would take pictures of men in uniform that fit in the palm of a hand and were used by the soldiers "as a calling card," Ingmire said.

When Lincoln was killed, Ingmire took it upon himself to take pictures of the funeral. The procession included not only Lincoln's casket, but that of his son, Willie, who died while Lincoln was in office. Standing at the entrance to the Lincoln's crypt, Ingmire was able to take the photos of the caskets.

Ingmire said he's never shown the pictures locally, other than to a well-known Lincoln historian who visited the area. He's excited to share his piece of history at the museum and hopes to have some of the photos enlarged before Friday.

Ingmire will be joined at the museum by Michael Yates, a local Civil War re-enactor who will play authentic Civil War era music, and a Lincoln impersonator. The museum's Civil War exhibit will also be open.

Rebecca Codner, Brookside's public programs manager, noted that the event is being tied in with First Friday. The museum doesn't always take part in First Fridays, but when it knows it has an upcoming program, it

often tries to schedule it for First Friday, she said. The Lincoln event seemed like a good fit because it will appeal to all ages.

"I thought it was a great idea," Codner said.

Ingmire said he's always

happy to show the photos, so they might make more local appearances if people approach him. He doesn't have any intention to sell them, though. He has two children and will let them decide the photos' future, he said.




On the girls' side, Guiderland's Karley Giles took second place in the high jump by clearing 5 feet, 2
