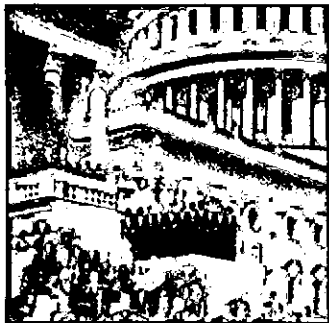

Bethlehem supervisor seeks two more years

Cunningham: 'There's
a lot of things still
to be done here'

Bethlehem Supervisor Jack Cunningham said he intends to run for another two-year term and serve the town he's known all of his life.

"I love this town ... being a supervisor has always been an opportunity I wanted. I grew up in this town," Cunningham said. "The community has been very supportive, and I've been really appreciative of that."

Cunningham has yet to be officially endorsed by his Democratic Party, a move expected in the coming weeks by the town party and its chairman Matthew Clyne, but he is actively pursuing other ballot lines in the form of the Independence and Conservative parties.

"We're having candidate interviews, and then we will make a recommendation for the full committee to vote on," said Clyne, who is also Albany Coun-

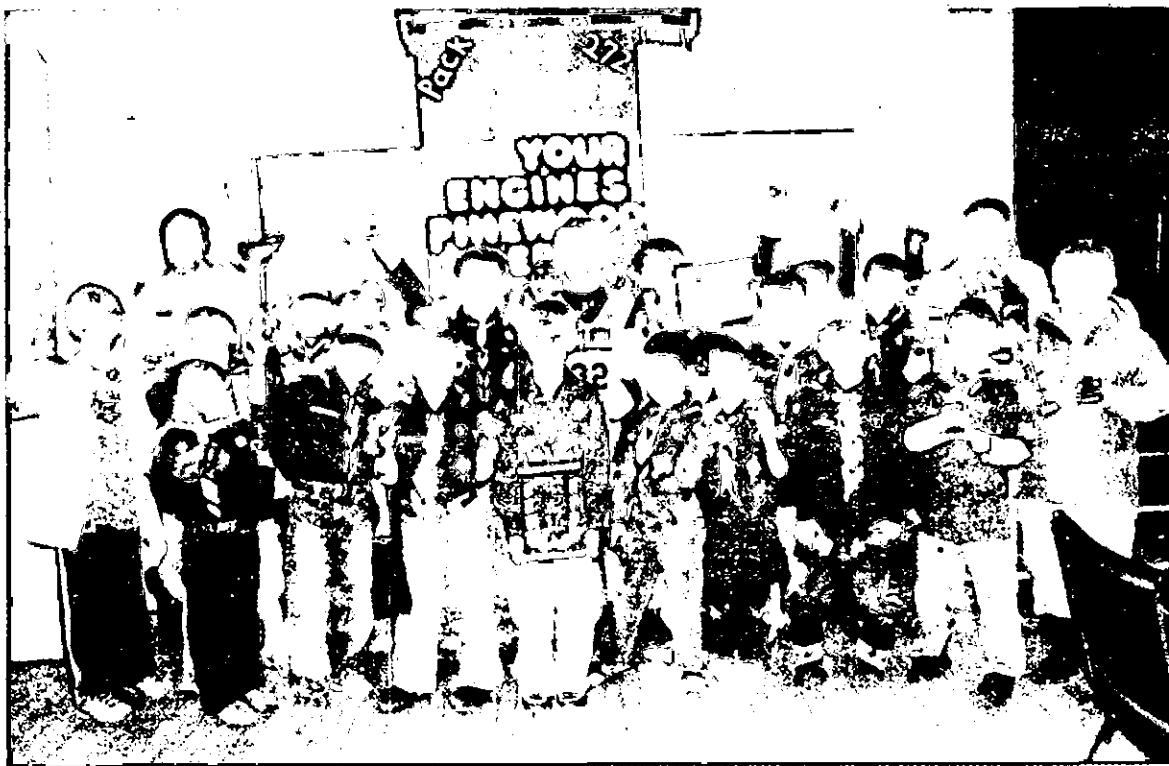
ty's Democratic Board of Elections commissioner. "We have 60 members in the committee, there's 30 election districts and two committee members per district."

Clyne said an executive committee of 11 party officers and ward leaders conduct the candidate interviews.

The supervisor will be making an official announcement Thursday;

Altamont mayoral race nears

Incumbent Gaughan faces challenge
from former trustee

With the Altamont mayoral election just around the corner, incumbent James Gaughan is touting future plans and past successes, while challenger Harvey Vlahos is pointing out where he sees room for improvement.

The Village of Altamont will be hosting its mayoral election on Sunday, March 18.

The village runs its own elections and is not on the same timetable as the county, state and federal elections, Town Clerk Jean LaCrosse said.

She said the town uses the same machines, and

the election is presided over by election inspectors who are village residents.

Gaughan said the village has much to be proud of, but more work needs to be done.

"I would, first and foremost, have wanted to sustain the promises I made and kept four years ago," Gaughan said of a reelection.

Gaughan said he promised to safeguard tax dollars, resources, senior services, community and youth programs and the historic charm of the village.

"[I have] a just-in-time way of operating. I try to act on issues brought up by the public quickly," he said.

A large part of Gaughan's plan was updating the village's comprehensive plan and continues

Three-tier plan totals
\$4.5 million
in possible cuts

The Bethlehem Central School District says it needs to make some cuts in order to make its budget viable.

The district's board of education listened to Superintendent Michael Tebbano's three-tiered reduction plan at its Wednesday, Feb. 25, meeting.

The suburban school district is currently facing a loss of millions of dollars in state aid under Gov. David Paterson's proposed budget, even in light of an estimated \$1 million from the federal government's stimulus package. Sen. Charles Schumer, D-Brooklyn, released a report Wednesday, Feb. 25, that shows Bethlehem will be receiving just over \$1 million in federal funds (see related story, page 3).

Tebbano and Board of Education President James Lytle have warned about tough decisions facing the school as a result of state cuts in education. Tebbano's reduction plan will outline proposals to reduce Bethlehem's expenditures and look at possible new revenue sources.

In Tebbano's plan, the district can cut nearly \$1.46 million in the first tier, an additional \$990,000

Police nab suspected heroin dealer

Guiderland Police arrested Matthew C. Bergeron, 19, of 31 5th St. in Scotia, on Sunday, Feb. 22, on felony charges of criminal possession of a narcotic with intent to sell, along with several other misdemeanor charges, according to police reports.

The reports states Bergeron was stopped by police and found to be driving with a revoked New York state drivers license. There were nine separate suspensions on 10 different dates, according to police. The report states he was allegedly in possession of 80 wax envelopes with heroin residue in side of them. He was also allegedly in possession of marijuana and a hypodermic needle with heroin residue on it.

Bergeron was arraigned later that day, the report states.

Other arrests

• Sonja L. Morris, 38, of 6 Cuyler St., Albany, was arrested on Feb. 18 on a bench warrant for a felony fourth-degree grand larceny charge.

Bethlehem Police said Morris turned herself into police on Feb. 3 on an arrest warrant signed by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan on Jan. 21 for failing to appear in court.

When she was arraigned, Morris was "inadvertently" arrested without being processed and came to court to be arraigned and processed, according to the arrest report.

Morris is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on April 21 for sentencing.

• Karl J. Baker, 48, of 1136 New Oregon Rd., North Collins, was arrested on an active warrant for the charge of criminal impersonation.

Baker turned himself in to Bethlehem Police on the warrant and was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan, according to the arrest report. He is scheduled to appear in town court on March 17.

Donovan sent Baker to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of a \$1,000 cash bail, the report states.

• Sally L. Minehardt, 49, of 156 Hill Rd., apartment 4, Cobleskill, was arrested on Wednesday, Feb. 18, on an active warrant for the charges of petty larceny and issuing a bad check with insufficient funds.

Minehardt turned herself in to police custody on the arrest warrant and was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer, according to the arrest

report. She is scheduled to appear in town court on March 17.

• Henry W. Kelly, 46, of 3 Lent St., Schenectady, was arrested by Bethlehem Police on Feb. 18, on an active warrant for theft of services.

Kelly turned himself in to police custody on the arrest warrant issued by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan on Oct. 28, according to the arrest report.

The charge stemmed from a tampering incident with Telecom, the report states, and Kelly is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on March 17.

• Guiderland Police arrested Leigh D. Kennedy, 47, of 275 Mariaville Rd. in Schenectady, on charges of DWI on Saturday, Feb. 14, according to police reports.

Kennedy was arrested at the corner of Western Ave. and Willow St. and will reappear in court on Thursday, March 5 the report states.

• Tare E. Sheedy, 19, of 4006 Chaucer Place, Slingerlands, was arrested on Saturday, Feb. 21, on Hasgate Drive in Glenmont for DWI; driving a motor vehicle with a BAC of .08 percent or greater; speeding; and failure to change an address on her driver's license.

Bethlehem Police said Sheedy was stopped after she was found to be driving 43 MPH in a 30-mile zone; and, once stopped, police discovered her vehicle was registered in another person's name in Voorheesville.

While speaking with Sheedy, officers could smell alcohol on her breath, according to the arrest report, and when police asked her to remove her sunglasses they observed that her eyes were bloodshot.

Beth drug bust nets four

Bethlehem police have arrested four people in connection with a three-month drug investigation.

Police said they executed a search warrant on Friday, Feb. 20, at 3 Howard Place in Delmar where they discovered marijuana, cocaine, hydrocodone pills and \$5,700 in cash.

Ryan S. Flahsburg, Heather R. Ciccone, and Joshua M. Ciccone — all 24 years of age — were charged with felony counts of third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance; fifth-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance; third-degree criminal possession of marijuana; and a misdemeanor charge of second-degree criminally using drug paraphernalia.

All three lived in the Howard Place home.

Shawn T. Flahsburg, 19, of 158 Hudson Ave. in Delmar, was charged with felony third-degree criminal sale of a controlled substance. The Flahsburgs are brothers and the Ciccones are brother and sister.

During the search of the residence, police seized approximately 9 ounces of marijuana, 3 grams of cocaine, and 83 hydrocodone pills, along with money, computers and cell phones.

Police Lt. Thomas Heffernan said the arrests were made using good police work.

"We also have information

that the drug sales were tied to the high school, and we believe they were selling to students there," Heffernan said. "It's an important arrest just for that reason alone."

After being arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court by Justice Ryan Donovan, who signed off on the search warrant, all four were sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail. Heffernan said they have since been moved to the county court's jurisdiction and removed from the county jail.

"They live in a small house on a dead-end street, and we were looking at that residence and they were selling out of that residence," Heffernan said. "It is normally a quiet street but there were a number of people coming and going and that is something that we look for."

Heffernan said unmarked police cars went to the house once a search warrant was signed and that Ryan Flahsburg and the Ciccones were home at the time of the search.

"The younger brother [Shawn Flahsburg] pulled in the driveway while we were there," Heffernan said. "So all four were arrested the night of the search."

A return court date was scheduled for March 17, at 4 p.m.

The investigation is still ongoing and police are asking anyone with additional information to contact the Bethlehem Police Department's Detective Office at 439-9973.

Federal aid could restore state education cuts

Schools waiting on information about \$3.03B education package

Federal stimulus announced by New York's senior senator is slated to help with state education aid cuts, but area school officials are remaining cautious until more information is presented.

Guilderland Superintendent John McGuire said he received word in an e-mail on Friday, Feb. 27, that information would be sent to school districts the week of Monday, March 2.

"There are a lot of questions right now," McGuire said.

McGuire said he is thankful for any money to help fill in the gap that will be created by Gov. David Paterson's proposed \$2.7-million state aid reduction.

However, he is still waiting for more information about how and when the money will make its way to the schools, he said.

Sen. Charles Schumer announced Wednesday, Feb. 25, that Upstate schools will receive \$496 million in federal aid.

"The stimulus package will be a big boost to Upstate New York schools, students and taxpayers. We could not afford to risk the quality of education New York students receive by laying off teachers and slashing academic programs. This funding will make sure New York schools have the resources they need to continue to make the grade," Schumer said.

He said the aid should prevent most of the anticipated cuts in state education.

Albany County will receive more than \$14 million,

Schenectady County is slated for more than \$8 million and Saratoga County could be getting close to \$9 million in the Upstate stimulus package alone, according to a report from Schumer's office.

Schumer's announcement included \$1.17 million for Guilderland, and McGuire said the district is tentatively expecting that to come in over a two-year period. However, also included in Schumer's report is a potential \$3.03 billion from an economic stabilization fund to be split up among state school districts, McGuire said.

"We don't have information yet about how much would come to our district," McGuire said. "There has not been any indication yet."

With a share of the \$3.03 billion, McGuire said, the district would likely be able to replace all of

Paterson's proposed state aid reductions.

He added, though, that he is still being cautious with estimates and the district's budget.

Schumer's report shows that Bethlehem will be receiving just over \$1 million in federal funds.

"We don't know for sure on what's happening on the federal and state level, some people think that now we have special stimulus money coming that our problems are solved," Bethlehem Superintendent Michael Tebbano said during a Feb. 25 board of education meeting. "They are not solved. They're even worse because we are not qualifying for the Title-1 money."

Guilderland did not qualify for those funds as well, and the allocation of Title-1 money is based on the affluence of the district.

Tebbano said the \$1 million the district is receiving is slated for special education needs and that other funds are needed to help balance his district's budget.

He did say though, that stabilization money could help balance the budget.

"If that goes through the hopefully that will bridge the [budget] gap," he said.

McGuire said the budget proposal he will be presenting to the citizens budget advisory committee is "conservative" with respect to revenue predictions, so as not to worry about surprises down the line.

The committee's initial meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, March 3, after the *Spotlight Newspapers* went to print. Check www.spotlightnews.com for updates on the committee and the district's budget.

Porco files appeal

Christopher Porco, convicted in August 2006 of murdering his father, Peter, and attempting to murder his mother, Joan, in November 2004, has filed an appeal with the state's Supreme Court.

Albany County District Attorney spokeswoman confirmed the appeal and said that David Soares' office has not replied to it as of yet.

"There will probably be no comment at this time because we haven't filed the [reply] briefs yet," Heather Orth, spokeswoman for the district attorney's office, told *Spotlight Newspapers* on Friday, Feb. 27.

Assistant District Attorney David Rossi worked on the Porco trial in 2006, and Assistant District Attorney Christopher Horn will be handling the appeal. Attorney Terence Kindlon of Kindlon Shanks & Associates represented Porco during his trial and has remained his counsel during the appeals process.

Porco was sentenced to 46 years to life in state prison by an Orange County jury in December 2006 and is currently residing in Clinton Correctional Facility in

Dannemora, a maximum-security prison near Plattsburgh. The Dannemora prison is also where convicted murderer Erik Westervelt is serving a 25-years-to-life sentence for the murder of Timothy Gray in Delmar approximately five weeks before the Porco murder.

Kindlon and his firm also represented Westervelt during his trial and failed appeal attempt.

Porco's mother, Joan, suffered brain damage and lost all of her memory from the assault. Much of the

prosecution's case was based on a discussion between a Bethlehem detective and Joan Porco shortly after she was discovered badly wounded in her home, where she nodded "yes" when asked if her son had attacked her.

Joan Porco maintained that her son was innocent throughout his trial.

Kindlon has argued that much of the case against his client is based on circumstantial evidence and should not have been admitted in the original trial.

Stimulating the infrastructure

County planning several roadway projects with stimulus money

Albany County could see key infrastructure improvements at several locations due to federal stimulus money, according to county officials.

Mike Franchini, commissioner of the Albany County Department of Public Works, said the county has several projects it is considering, including a corridor project connecting Western Avenue to Central Avenue.

The second part of that project includes constructing a roundabout at the intersection of Washington Avenue and Fuller Road, but there are no definite plans to commence that project yet, Franchini said.

"The first project is on a list that can be obligated, or authorized, within 120 days," Franchini said.

Franchini estimated the cost of the corridor project at \$12 million at an information meeting last summer.

David Jukins, a planner at the Capital District Transportation Committee, said the county is expecting between \$65 million and \$70 million in federal stimulus money for the counties of Albany, Schenectady, Saratoga and Rensselaer. The funds would cover about a year's worth of projects.

Jukins said the county is planning to move forward with projects it already has in the works with the stimulus money. He said the planning process for projects can be time consuming, and rather than begin new plans with the money, it would be easiest to fund projects that are as close to "shovel ready" as possible.

Jukins said the four counties hoped for closer to \$100 million for the projects, a number thrown around at initial discussions, but they will do the best they can with the allotted funds.

"It's better than nothing. It allows us to do more than we expected to do," he said.

He added that without the stimulus plan, there would be no extra money, and many projects would still be on the back burner.

Jukins said New York state is expecting \$1.1 billion in funding for public works from the federal government. That number is just short of the \$1.4 billion initially expected.

Despite the common perception that New York City takes more than its share of the pie, Jukins said, the \$300 million it will receive also comes short of expectations. He said the suburban areas surrounding the city fared better than the city itself.

Jukins added that a project to improve Delaware Avenue between Albany and Bethlehem is likely to get first dibs on the money. Its cost is estimated at \$11 million, according to the CDTC.

Carried up and away by the festival of Purim

When you're sitting in synagogue dressed as a pumpkin, the last thing you need is to be embarrassed by a giant carrot balloon.

To help you understand, I'll start at the beginning.

I've never been a big fan of balloons. The latex kind pop and the ones filled with helium fly away.

Nevertheless, I was excited the day I won a nutrition-related trivia contest at work and got to choose from a selection of oversized vegetable-shaped helium-filled Mylar balloons. Although I am partial to potatoes and broccoli, I selected the carrot balloon because its face was smiling. On the ride home, Mr. Carrot kept trying to float into the front seat. I should have made note of this mischievous behavior.

My daughter, 11 at the time, laughed when she spotted the three-foot carrot balloon tied to a dining room chair. A few days later, we decided Mr. Carrot would be the perfect accessory to our Purim costumes.

The Jewish holiday of Purim commemorates the saving of the Jewish communities in Persia from the evil plan of the king's chief advisor, Haman. About 2,500 years ago, Haman



wanted to exterminate the Jews, because they wouldn't bow down to him.

The word "purim" is the Hebrew word for "lots" and refers to Haman's plan to use a lottery to determine the day on which the Jews would be killed.

However, the king's wife, Queen Esther, learns of the plan from her Uncle Mordecai. She lets her hubby know about her Jewish heritage, and the king puts an end to Haman.

The holiday is celebrated with much festivity and silliness. Kids and adults come to synagogue in costume to hear the reading of the scroll of Esther, known as the Megillah. It's fun to see people in costume, whether it's the folks who simply wear a funny hat or pair of sunglasses, or the families who join creative forces and appear as a box of crayons.

I've always gone for easy to assemble costumes. When my daughter was little, I started with pink-footed pajamas, tossed

on a bunny-ears headband, and, voila, Rachel became a rabbit. All three of us were bunnies that year. (No, I did not make Jeff wear footie-pajamas; he and I just wore the rabbit ears with our regular clothes.)

Last year, Jeff and Rachel dressed as farmers, wearing overalls and straw hats, and I went as their prize pumpkin. I wore a costume that Aunt Carol made when Rachel was in elementary school. This demonstrates two things: One is that Aunt Carol is an amazing seamstress. The other is that I get hand-me-ups from my daughter, which I must qualify by admitting that while Rachel and I are the same size in roomy pumpkin costumes, I don't actually fit into her slender Old Navy T-shirts.

Anyhow, having her mother dressed as a pumpkin wasn't harvest enough for farmer Rachel. She decided to bring the giant carrot balloon to the synagogue.

Jeff didn't think this was a good idea, but we took the balloon anyway. We tied it securely to a small weight, so that it could rest on the floor by our seats during the service or it could be carried around during the costume parade.

Mr. Carrot was well behaved for nearly the entire evening. During the reading of the Megillah, every time

the villain's name is recited the crowd creates a ruckus, booing and hissing and shaking noisemakers. There were arms twirling in the air, noisemakers whirring. None of this ruffled Mr. Carrot the least little bit.

Toward the end of the service, I was somewhat absentmindedly playing with Mr. Carrot's ribbon, making the balloon move up and down, left and right. That ribbon, you'll recall, was securely tied to a small weight, which at the time sat on the floor by my feet. Unfortunately, unbeknownst to me, the other end of the ribbon, the one tied to the balloon itself, was slowly loosening each time I made Mr. Carrot move.

Suddenly, Mr. Carrot floated away. He lifted off so quickly that I had no chance to even jump up and grab him. Within seconds he was on the ceiling, smiling his wide grin. I was mortified.

Now you might think that someone who was able to go out in public dressed as a pumpkin would have a sense of humor about a runaway balloon. But I didn't.

Purim is celebrated with a kind of carnival atmosphere, but it only comes once a year. Mylar balloons can hold their helium for months. And I had released such a balloon in the synagogue sanctuary, the place

where people pray.

A fellow congregant dressed as a banana reminded me that her family was celebrating a bat mitzvah at the end of the month. My heart sank at the thought of her relatives being greeted by a floating carrot.

But at regular services that very next Saturday one of the rabbis told me she had been in the sanctuary the morning after the Purim festivities and the sight of the balloon had made her smile. And it turned out that most people did not even notice the balloon, which basically kept to itself high in a back corner of the room.

A few weeks later, Mr. Carrot was gone. Instead of feeling relieved, I felt a sense of loss. I wondered what became of him. Did he fall abruptly? Did a Mylar rabbit eat him? Did an arrow fell him? I never found out.

I can look back now and see that I should not have allowed the balloon incident to squash my pumpkin spirit. I should have held my stemmed head tall and laughed it off.

Purim begins this year on March 9. I'm looking forward to the celebration, the silliness and the yummy hamantashen cookies. And I'll be certain to assemble a helium-free costume.

Students take 10th place in national competition with special communication award

A group of Farnsworth middle school students placed 10th at the Future Cities Competition National Finals on Wednesday, Feb. 18, in Washington, D.C., and took home a special award for their model's communication system.

"The experience was really outstanding," said middle-schooler Joe Sipzner, who represented the team in Washington. "It was great to see everyone's hard work."

The students were awarded the Best Communications System Award for their Personal Education Device featured in their presentation. The PED, as part of Cibola's communications system, would allow students in their futuristic city to go on virtual field trips, and communicate with others around the world.

"They gave thought and consideration to the capabilities and limitations of the technologies, including a consideration of spectrum crowding and frequency collisions," said Monica Mallini, one of the judges in a statement. "This distinguished them from the other teams."

The competition included using software to create a mock city, and then constructing a model using recyclable materials.

The students, though, were humble about their award.

Sipzner said the competition helped the team learn a lot about what engineers really do.

To complete the project, they had to extensively researched aerospace technology.

"I learned a lot about engineering, and that there is more than one kind of engineer," said Abigail Schnoor, another team member. She said she had fun presenting the project as well.

Faculty advisor Deb Escobar said the chance for Farnsworth students to interact with other students was important for her and the team.

"It was a grueling experience. You're on your feet for four hours," Escobar said. "The students were a real source of pride for our school, going out of their way to congratulate winning teams and to be kind to both students and adults alike."

Team member Jake Van Buren said he enjoyed the entire experience, but he had an especially fun time at the party at the end of the trip.

It featured a D.J., magician and face painter, Escobar said.

Each student took something

The uppers and downers of a bad economy

Over the past couple of weeks, *The Spotlight* has brought you news of various acts of drug-related malevolence that occurred within the confines of what we would like to think of as our bucolic coverage areas: a 19-year-old charged in Guiderland with dealing heroin; a state police officer assaulted by a Saratoga Springs man found with crack cocaine, ecstasy pills and marijuana during a traffic stop; a historic heroin bust in the Town of Bethlehem, followed by four arrests made in conjunction with a three-month drug investigation.

Some may be quick to link these criminal activities to the current economic crisis, but we at *The Spotlight* subscribe to the view that the economy is less likely to impact drug use as it is to affect drug policy and addiction treatment.

There have been a few recessions, albeit brief ones, in the near 40-year history of the "war on drugs." And, since the phrase was first used by President Richard Nixon in 1971, drug use — at the level it is seen in our coverage areas — has essentially been disconnected from the national economy.

"Despite decades of war, incarceration rates and billions of dollars spent, drugs are as plentiful as ever and easily accessible," said Tony Newman, director of media relations at the Drug Policy Alliance, in an October essay. "We have to accept that drugs have been around for thousands of years and will be here for thousands more. We need to educate people about the possible harm from drug use, offer compassion and treatment to people who have problems, and leave in peace the people who are causing harm to no one."

It is to that end *The Spotlight* feels the economy does affect drug use and sale in our communities. When our governments — local, state and national — tighten their belts, those unsavory (read: unpopular) programs that deal with drug and alcohol problems are usually the first to go. County- and state-funded addiction programs will have to reduce staff. Job loss means fewer people with insurance that can afford private drug rehab centers.

In short, a poor economy does not necessarily equate to a change in illegal drug use, it just means there will be fewer resources available to drug users who want to find the help they need to quit those drugs.

Enjoy ease-care orchids at home

It may come as a surprise, but several types of orchids are easy-care houseplants. One of the best attributes is that several of the easier orchids bloom in the winter.

Orchids are either epiphytes (tree dwellers) or terrestrials (soil dwellers), and they come to us from all over the world but most often from rain forests and jungle environments.

Climates conducive to growing orchids, such as Florida and Hawaii, have become the source for many of the commercially grown plants that find their way to local garden centers. While humidity is an important factor, the orchids that we will consider are well within the range of most houseplant enthusiasts.

Perhaps the easiest of all orchids is the moth orchid, *Phalaenopsis*. This plant has long, glossy leaves, thick rambling roots, and one or more flower spikes that present a spray of dainty flowers that resemble moths in flight. It is not unusual for this orchid to be in bloom for several months.

The *Phalaenopsis* orchids are in the epiphytic group, which means that in their natural environment they grow in the branches of trees using their thick clinging roots to both attach themselves and to absorb moisture from the bark surface that is wet from dew or rainfall. Mother Nature has equipped the epiphytic orchids with a very clever root structure. The actual root is a very slender body within a spongy outer coat called a velamen. This outer layer serves to protect the fragile root and to absorb and store water. The potting media is loose and chunky insuring that the roots will not get soggy, but don't be surprised if the roots wander out of the pot.

The moth orchids prefer an east window except for the summer months when that will be too much heat. Use tepid water and hold the pot over a sink to allow the excess to drain right through. Water again when the pot feels lighter as you pick it up. As with many houseplants, you will not be able to put them on a schedule. It would be better to err on the side of caution and not water rather than to water too frequently. Fertilize with a special orchid formula such as 30-10-10 at half the recommended strength once a month but more frequently during growth spurts in spring and summer. Every few months substitute a more complete fertilizer that has major and minor elements. Extra humidity can be provided by a room humidifier or by placing the plants on top of pebble filled trays that are kept watered. Be careful to place pots on the top area and not actually in the water. Orchids can rot with astonishing speed!

Temperature is a key factor with orchids and in the spring and fall a drop in nighttime temperature is crucial. Orchids grown in a window may experience this naturally but in some houses with new, tight windows it may be necessary to control the temperature to provide the necessary drop (55-60 degrees) that initiates flower development.

Epiphytic orchids can be potted, grown on bark, or in a wire basket lined with a coarse moss. Remember that these types benefit from air reaching the roots, as well as circulating.

The slipper orchid, *Paphiopedilum*, is a terrestrial plant that requires a more typical houseplant mix that allows for good drainage. Also long-blooming, this orchid has a modified lip that is pouch shaped and resembles a slipper. The foliage is often variegated and very attractive. The typical bloom time is winter to spring and many bloom sequentially thus prolonging the show.

Slipper orchids are light feeders so do not overdo. As with the moth orchid, take care in the summer months to move the plant into a modified sunlit place. However, when in bloom an orchid should be out of direct sun and can be used decoratively. All slipper orchids are not alike, and while many varieties are easy care, there are some that are more demanding. Be sure to ask questions when purchasing orchids so that you understand exactly what you are getting.

Miltonia, the pansy orchid, is a good choice for medium light exposure. It gets its name because the flowers resemble pansies complete with interesting "masks" as designs in the center of the flowers. Many are fragrant.

This little charmer prefers a cool house with a day time temperature ranging from 65-80 degrees but 50-65 at night. Do not allow miltonias to dry out or you will see accordion like pleating on the leaves as they grow out.

The odontoglossums are a group whose members thrive in a variety of conditions from cool to intermediate and they quite often have flowers with bold color combinations resembling butterflies. The *Brassia* types have fantastic spiderlike flowers and require medium light and intermediate temperature.

For bright, sunny, warm locations choose cattleyas, dendrobiums, oncidiums, and cymbidiums.

Cattleya blooms are often sold as corsages and the lovely flower is what most of us think of when we think of an orchid. This beauty grows from a bulbous structure that seems all too plain to spawn such beauty. Primarily epiphytic, they enjoy good light, especially during the winter but will tolerate light shade in the summer. A rest from watering for 6-10 weeks after the production of the current year's bulb will promote hardening of the bulb and flower bud formation.

Cymbidiums present a bit more of a challenge but only in the area of re-flowering. To make cymbidiums truly happy, in June gradually acclimatize plants to the outdoors choosing a sheltered location to prevent leaf scorch. From spring to fall water with dilute fertilizer every third watering and clear water the rest of the time to flush harmful salts. The potting material should just dry out between waterings. Leave plants outside until the danger of frost is near as the swing between the day/night temperatures will encourage bud formation. Flowering can occur anytime from November to May with flower spikes lasting up to eight weeks!

No matter which orchid you choose, the No. 1 priority will be to understand that particular orchids' watering requirements. Viral infections and root rot are the leading causes of demise so learn the parameters for each orchid. Mealy bug and scale are the main insect pests, but spider mites are also possible. In general, insects present few problems compared to watering issues. Choose plants from a reputable grower and buy when the plant is beginning to flower. Feel the petals and the leaves gently to determine if the texture is slightly hard indicating that the flowers are opening. The flower color will be bright and the plant will look healthy. Availability has become more commonplace and with that, prices are more affordable than ever. So why not grace your windowsill with the divas of the plant world, the ephemeral orchid?

Library budget must be open book

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

This spring, the residents of Bethlehem will have the opportunity to vote on the Bethlehem Public Library annual budget.

We have a wonderful library, but a disastrous economy that makes it clear voters need to see the library budget in full transparency. In deciding whether to support this year's annual library budget, there are two key areas of information voters require: the amount of all management salaries, individually and in total; and all planned projects and operational costs.

The issue of payroll is vital in deciding whether to support this year's budget. The vast majority of library employees are hardworking, highly qualified and extremely helpful and friendly. And the vast majority of these people who the public sees and appreciates are staff, not management. The budget lumps all salaries together. This is unacceptable. Voters must know what amount of the budget is being spent on management and what each management

salary is.

The budget for the Bethlehem Public Library is a small fraction of the budget for the Town of Bethlehem.

The director's job is not on the same level of importance and responsibility as the town supervisor's. It is not appropriate for the director's salary to be on a par with or in excess of the town supervisor. Voters must be given specific salary information to determine if management has become bloated and overpaid, and also to compare with other local library management salaries.

Concerning projects and operational costs, to make informed decisions, taxpayers need to know all major projects planned for the coming year and total costs associated with those projects. This basic information has not always been available to the public when voting for the library budget.

Landscaping improvements at an approximate cost of \$250,000; and the purchase of two properties with homes and the demolition of one of

these homes adjacent to the library, are examples of projects that were implemented without taxpayer approval — these projects were not identified in the corresponding annual budgets.

These projects may all be excellent uses of taxpayer money. The problem lies in a failure to identify where this money comes from in the budget and how it is being used. For example, if a new parking lot is being planned, this should be included as a separate line item in the annual budget with an estimated cost and an indication of any applicable grant monies.

We have all painfully seen that government without transparency results in government without accountability. Our library board members are dedicated individuals who donate their time and talents to serve us. They simply need to know the public requires the information discussed herein so that our votes are based not on incomplete and/or inaccurate information, but hard facts.

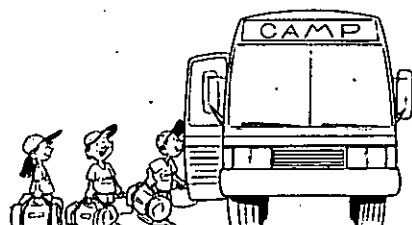

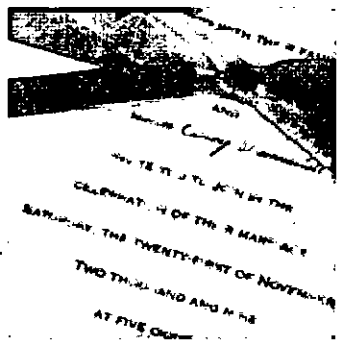

Town expanding water district

Bethlehem expanding the Elm Avenue water district, upgrading pump stations

Bethlehem's water works were the talk of the town during the last board meeting.

The town unanimously amended its stormwater local law, accepted maps and reports for a proposed Elm Avenue East Water District extension, approved starting a master planning study at the Dinmore Road Waste Water Treatment Plant, and also discussed three pump station renovations.

Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the water district extension is for a proposed development by Amedore Homes called the Elm Avenue East.

"There's a development down there ... and the proposal is going to need to have water and sewer and be included in the water district in order to be taxed," Cunningham said.

Amedore Homes is owned by Assemblyman George Amedore, R-Rotterdam.

Cunningham said the new storm water amendments deal with new regulations that calls for all runoff associated with a building project to be contained.

"With the stormwater law, they have to keep all the runoff on the site," he said. "That's why we have to have a storm water district."

According to the regulations, all construction projects have to have small retention ponds and other types of storm water catch basins on site. Cunningham said it applies to all projects in town with the exception of single-family home construction.

Bethlehem is currently a member of the Albany County Storm Water Management Coalition, a group of county municipalities that are attempting to share services in terms of stormwater issues such as permit requirements, storm water management and environmental reviews.

The town pays \$14,000 to participate in the group.

The board voted to pay \$85,000 from the Sewer Fund Capital Reserve Fund to support the first phase of a master planning study at the town's Selkirk water plant. The supervisor said the town is looking at its infrastructure and taking a proactive approach.

Erik Deyoe, the town's engineer, gave a report to the board outlining what the study will be looking at. He said its purpose is to evaluate the pumps and motors of the plant, look at the structure itself and its tanks, as well as "long-term growth projections."

"It's [the study money] not an inappropriate amount of money to spend on a plant that could cost between \$10 [million] and \$20 million,"

When asked if the project could be done in house, Deyoe said it would be an unreasonable cost to Bethlehem if the town had to retain a number of specialized engineers and technicians that would only be used once in a while.

"It's in the town's interest to hire out," said Deyoe. "We're better suited to manage projects, not do specialty work."

The study is a part of two-phase project.

Cunningham announced at the end of the meeting that the town has brought three of 10 pump stations slated for renovation are now "on line."

Town takes its time with wind turbines

New Scotland officials consider temporary wind energy moratorium

The Town of New Scotland will host a public hearing on April 15 to discuss the merits of a six-month moratorium on wind turbines, according to town officials.

If the moratorium passes, the town will use that time to mull the pros and cons of wind energy and update its zoning laws to include provisions for wind turbines, which are not specifically allowed in the town's zoning laws.

Supervisor Tom Dolin said the town is generally in favor of the renewable energy source but needs time to study it closer.

"The current regulations, we don't think, are adequate," Dolin said. "We're not against them at all, but like every other use, it needs regulation."

A draft of the wind moratorium reiterates that point.

"The Town Board of the Town of New Scotland finds that wind energy is an abundant, renewable and nonpolluting energy source of the town, and its conversion to electricity may reduce dependence on nonrenewable energy sources and decrease the air and water pollution that results from the use of conventional energy sources."

The draft, though, warns of the potential issues that can arise from implementing such measures without fully understanding them.

"However, wind energy conversion systems, and related facilities, present significant potential aesthetic impacts because of their large size, lighting and shadow flicker effects. Such facilities may also present a risk to bird and bat populations if not properly sited," according to the draft.

Some of the board members expressed concerns over the

environmental effects of wind turbines.

Board member Peg Neri brought up several of these concerns at a Wednesday, Feb. 11, meeting. She said she has specific concerns with soil erosion and the potential harm to birds and other airborne wildlife.

The board was also concerned about the significant amount of noise the turbines could generate.

Building Inspector Paul Cantlin said there is no provision in the town code permitting the use of windmills.

"It's not a permitted use, or a special use, so it's not allowed at all," Cantlin said.

He said it is briefly mentioned in the section of the code dealing with height restrictions, and it states it, along with church and bell towers, are the only structures permitted to exceed the 45-foot height limit.

Dolin said if the moratorium passes, residential and commercial zones will not be permitted to construct wind turbines or apply for applications for them, until the board discusses the implications of them and the moratorium is lifted.

Dolin also said the state Department of Agriculture issued a letter to the town that stated agricultural zones are an exception to the moratorium's provisions, and said the town is investigating that as well.

An application by New Scotland residents Nancy and Henry Digiser on March 27 spawned interest about the zoning for the wind turbines. They were eventually granted permission to construct the windmill, Cantlin said.

Dolin said either a voluntary committee, or paid professional consultant will be charged with studying the implications of the turbines. He added more information will be discussed at the April 15 meeting.

"At that meeting there will be some discussion on how to proceed," Dolin said.

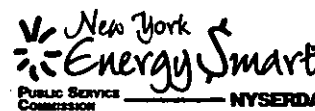

RCS proposes teacher layoffs Community talks Selkirk industry

The Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District announced that eight teachers could lose their jobs as district officials hammer out a new budget for the 2009-2010 school year.

The district's interim Superintendent Michael Johnson presented a preliminary budget to the RCS Board of Education at its meeting on Monday, Feb. 23.

The nearly \$42.86 million preliminary budget calls for a spending increase of \$957,238 over the current budget and has a projected tax levy increase of 4.44 percent.

"This was an especially painful budget to develop as our district is faced with more than \$2 million of increased costs," Johnson stated on the district's Web site.

In Johnson's presentation, he detailed how the staff cuts would affect class size. Currently the district's two elementary schools have class sizes ranging from 14 to 22 students per class. Under the proposed budget, class sizes next year would increase to 15 and 23 students

per class.

In the middle school, class sizes would increase from 16 to 20 students per class to 21 to 23 students per class.

However, Johnson said that even with the additional students in each class, the increase would still allow the district to maintain its class-size guidelines of 19 to 23 students per kindergarten-through-second-grade classes and 24 to 26 students per third-through-eighth-grade classes.

Johnson said the teacher cuts could have been worse.

"Facing a \$2 million budget dilemma forced us to look at staff reductions," Johnson said. "I clearly understand the pain this causes to those affected. Our administrators have personally notified the eight teachers with the least seniority in the district who, at this time, unfortunately, will not have a job in our district next year. I am hopeful that through potential leaves of absences, maternity leaves, and other voluntary staff changes that we will be able to reduce some of this impact."

The proposed budget includes a reduction of 20 teaching positions, but due to retirement and other forms of attrition, only eight teachers would lose their jobs.

In the neighboring Bethlehem Central School District, Superintendent Michael Tebbano presented his district reductions in a three-tiered presentation during his school's regular board of education meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 24. (See related story, page 1.)

The first tier of the Bethlehem plan includes the least amount of reductions, while the third tier contains more severe cuts to staffing, programs and athletics.

Town and community leaders talk industrial issues in Bethlehem

Bethlehem held its second Selkirk Yards Industrial District Focus Group meeting and tackled some substantial issues in building up business in the area.

The entire Town Board and Planning Board Chairman George Leveille attended the meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 25, as did many of the area's elected officials, such as Albany County Executive Mike Breslin; Albany County legislators Alexander "Sandy" Gordon, Richard Mendick and Charles Dawson; representatives for Congressman Paul Tonko and Assemblyman Tim Gordon; and several prominent business leaders.

Energy, expansion of the CSX rail yards, zoning and land use, and connecting to the state's Thruway were all on table for discussion, as well as other matters of importance.

John Calcagni, of the Department of Public Service, gave a presentation on energy demand reduction and market power programs and assistance.

"Every kilowatt you don't use is the cheapest energy you can buy," he told the large crowd assembled at Bethlehem Town Hall. He talked about that pros and cons of creating a municipally owned power district that could power the businesses in the Selkirk industrial area.

Calcagni said the town could control energy costs by doing so, but would also be responsible for maintenance and repairs of such a move, as well start up costs.

"It's not impossible to create your own municipal power district," he said.

After Joanna Moore from NYSEDA talked about what an energy audit of the industrial zone would consist of and describing many of her companies programs and resources, Justin Miller of Harris Beach spoke of possible implementation methods for the groups recommendations.

"We, unfortunately, have to live in the economic climate of today," he said, "but we're fortunate to have the stimulus package."

Although many of the Selkirk proposals will most likely not be eligible for stimulus money, Tonko's representative said the congressman is hopeful that a new bill in the fall could help provide some much-needed funding to the industrial area.

He urged the members of the focus group to utilize the

town's Industrial Development Agency.

"We have a very valuable tool in an IDA to deliver economic development," Miller said. He added that the possibility of co-generators, especially those run on alternative fuels, are very appealing to companies looking to set up shop in the area.

There was also talk about a possible countywide Municipal Development Agency or MDA.

The group is currently working with local leaders and the state's Thruway Authority on two possible options: an E-Z Pass-only interchange at the Clapper Road bridge or a new full toll booth interchange about 1,500 feet north of the bridge.

Mark Sargent from Creighton Manning Engineering gave a presentation on the Clapper Road Interchange Feasibility Study. He said the two options of an E-Z Pass only interchange at the Clapper Road bridge would cost an estimated \$21.1 million and that a full tollbooth interchange would cost an about \$37.1 million.

The state's Thruway Authority and Federal Highway Administration are both in talks with the town, as the groups look at the possibilities of getting a more direct route for trucks from the Selkirk Industrial Yards onto the Thruway.

Special events planned as part of quadricentennial celebration

The Hudson River Valley Greenway and the Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area awarded a total of \$50,000 to 14 projects throughout the Hudson Valley as part of the Quadricentennial Implementation Grant Program. Funding for this grant program was allocated by the National Park Service and is part of the \$492,000 secured by Congressman Maurice Hinchey for quadricentennial programs and events.

"I was very pleased to secure the federal funds that will make these grants possible and look forward to the final passage of an additional \$1 million for this historic celebration," Hinchey said. "These grants will support communities and local organizations throughout the Hudson Valley as they organize events and develop educational materials for the upcoming quadricentennial. This year's celebrations will truly be memorable for all those who participate in the wide variety of events throughout the state and our region. The quadricentennial offers us a once in a lifetime opportunity to highlight, promote and celebrate the extraordinary history that occurred in our own backyard 400 and 200 years ago."

Mark Castiglione, acting director of the Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area and Greenway, stated, "We applaud Congressman Hinchey for his initiative to secure these funds for the quadricentennial. The diverse projects funded through this grant program will help our partners throughout the region to celebrate our nationally significant natural and cultural resources while commemorating the legacies of Hudson, Fulton and Champlain."

Sarah Olson, Superintendent of the Roosevelt-Vanderbilt National Historic Sites, said, "This grant opportunity is a great way for Hudson River communities to help celebrate the quadricentennial and we salute the Greenway for providing these grants."

Tara Sullivan, executive director of the Hudson Fulton Champlain Quadricentennial, said, "With quadricentennial partners including Gov. [David] Paterson, Congressman Hinchey, [DEC] Commissioner [Pete] Grannis, our Dutch counterparts across the ocean, and most importantly the communities of the valley, we are grateful for the opportunity to use this and other quad funding to help commemorate this great

moment in our history."

"There's a lot of things still to be done here," Cunningham said about running again.

Continuing the infrastructure improvements and getting federal and state stimulus funding for local projects were on the top of his list, as well as pedestrian pathways.

"Everyone knows that sidewalks are my passion in this town," he jested.

Cunningham said automating the town was a previous priority that he plans to continue. Town assessment roles are now online, as well as registration forms with the Department of Parks and Recreation, he said, and paying for fees online has become the norm.

"Believe it or not, you couldn't do that just a little while ago," Cunningham said.

Currently some of the town's water pump stations have to be checked on every day by town workers, according to Cunningham, but soon the town will be able to monitor any water and waste water problems remotely because of computerized upgrades.

Cunningham won his first full term in 2007 by nearly doubling his challenger James Grady's 3,299 votes with 6,045 of his own. Prior to that, he was appointed by the town board to replace former supervisor Theresa Egan. He was an Albany County Legislator before becoming supervisor, a seat now occupied by Tom Cotrofeld.

There will be four other townwide seats to be voted on in November, including two town board seats, town clerk and highway superintendent.

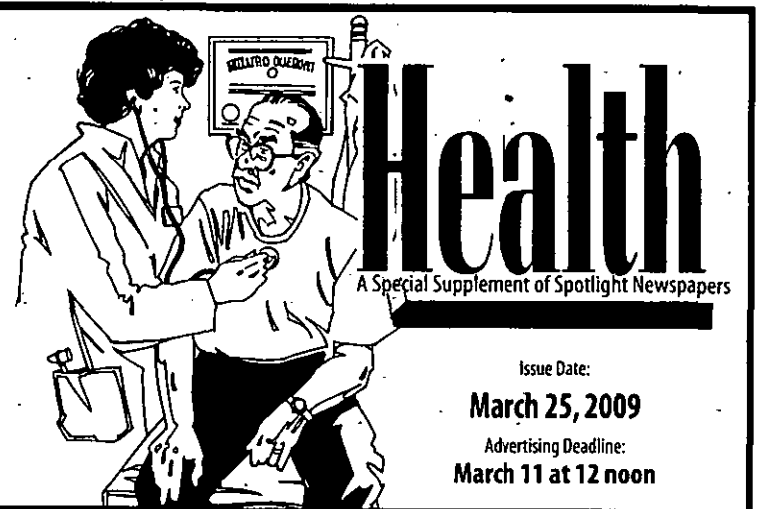

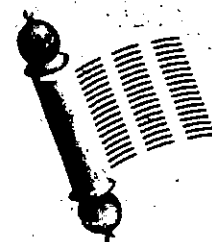

with initiatives to connect walkways and bike paths within the town.

"It was a 25-year-old plan. It was out of date," Gaughan said.

He said he is especially concerned with the aging sewer system, and he plans to seek federal funding to upgrade it.

He also touted some of the village's past accomplishments, and said he plans to keep the momentum of his successes.

Gaughan said the AAA bond rating the village enjoys and the inter-municipal services the village shares with the Town of Guilderland, such as fuel and heavy equipment, are accomplishments he is proud of. He also said he is pleased with the \$17,000 he helped raise to build a playground and park on Maple Avenue.

Gaughan said he also helped secure several grants for the police department, senior citizens and cyber-protection software used by the Altamont police to help track Internet stalkers.

His challenger, Harvey Vlahos, sat on the Village Board of Trustees from 2003 to

2007, and finished second to Gaughan in the 2005 mayoral election, four years ago.

Vlahos said he has reservations about some of Gaughan's tenure.

"I realized near the end of the campaign that Jim Gaughan spent \$7,000 for a village race. That bothered me not because I lost, but it just changes the whole way people get elected," Vlahos said.

Vlahos took issue with mayor Gaughan's contributors, coming from outside of Altamont. He said contributors from California, Illinois, Virginia and New York City comprised a large portion of the \$7,000 Gaughan raised.

Gaughan acknowledged the money, claiming he was unsure how much money would be needed to make a successful run, and raised as much as he could from family and friends from around the country. He noted that he filed all of the proper paperwork, as he did in this election.

Gaughan also claimed Vlahos has not filed any paperwork related to his 2005 bid or this election.

Vlahos said that since he has not raised more than \$1,000 he is not required to file. He said he raised close to \$500 in 2005 and plans to raise the same amount this time

around.

Vlahos criticized Gaughan for what he characterized as the mismanagement of a legal settlement regarding the senior housing complex Brandle Meadows and the 5-acres of land that featured a well that rested on private property.

Vlahos contested that the legal battle was drawn out longer than it needed, and the village had spent close to \$30,000 on legal fees, he added.

He said Jeff Thomas, the developer of Brandle Meadows, was considering a \$100,000 offer to the landowners to settle the matter, and allow the village access to the water, which would partially be used by Brandle Meadows, but took that offer off the table when Thomas was faced with a potential \$180,000 benefit assessment fee.

Vlahos said he warned the board of that possibility, but it fell on deaf ears.

"That was just fiscal mismanagement," Vlahos said.

"It's one thing to talk the talk, but you got to walk the walk."

Gaughan responded, though, and said Thomas was asking for concessions and faster access to the water, as well as having several fees waived in order for him to foot

the \$100,000.

Gaughan said he questioned the legality of waiving the fees, and added the town was compensated by the well-owners with an additional 28-acre buffer around the well.

He also criticized the police force budget, stating that it jumped in 2003-2004 from \$109,000 to \$158,000 but did not yield enough benefit to warrant the extra spending.

He also said the crime rate has stayed low, and spending the additional money may not be worth it.

He also criticized the police force for its high turnover of part-time officers and their predominantly "city" oriented training.

Gaughan states though, that the increase under his administration was only from \$140,000 to the current \$158,000 and that is mostly represented increases in the cost-of-living.

Vlahos also criticized

Gaughan for not making the printing of the village newsletter more competitive. There were 700 copies of the spring newsletter by Minuteman Press, Vlahos said. Another company, Data Flow, printed the fall newsletter. Vlahos questioned the change and why a bid was not offered to local media printer, The Altamont Enterprise, to see if a better price could be obtained.

"It certainly does appear it was a conscious decision," Vlahos said.

Gaughan said his staff was entrusted to find a printer that would turn the product around quickly, and that no bid was legally required for the printing of the newsletter, since its cost was less than \$1,000.

No debates have been scheduled regarding the election, but both candidates said they would be willing to participate in an open discussion of village issues.

the second tier and then an additional \$2.15 million in the third. The tiers, totaling more than \$4.5 million in cuts, are just the "starting point" for the district's budget process, according to Tebbano, as the board of education will be going over the budget department-by-department over the next several weeks.

"We have no idea what direction the state will eventually go," Tebbano said at the meeting. "We are planning for the worst case scenario and that's why these numbers are in front of you and how it impacts the budget."

"We don't know for sure on what's happening on the federal and state level, some people think that now we have special stimulus money coming that our problems are solved," Tebbano said of the funds. "They are not solved. They're even worse because we are not qualifying for the Title 1 money."

He said the \$1 million is slated for special education needs and that other funds are necessary to help balance his district's budget.

"The second pool of money is the stabilization money and if that goes through, then hopefully that will bridge the [budget] gap," he said.

The district's Chief Financial Officer Judi Kehoe said the school must not only reduce expenditures, but also increase its revenues in order to create a balanced budget that would rely on a large tax levy increase. If the currently project budget of roughly \$89 million was reliant on the levy, she said, there would have to be a 10 percent increase in the current tax levy.

Tebbano said that would not be acceptable and that community wouldn't support it.

"If we do nothing at all, if we just try to float an \$89 million budget, the community will not necessarily be happy about that, especially if we raise the property tax levy," Tebbano said at his presentation. "Even if we get some kind of stimulus money or stabilization money from the state, it's still going to place us in a category where the tax levy is going to be very high."

The Tier-1 reductions include eliminating the elementary dean and some advisory positions; eliminating some after school supervision and evening chaperones in the middle school; some athletics department cuts such as no evening games and removing \$25,000 from its budget; the elimination of an instrumental music teacher in the high school; eliminating non-public services for BOCES; the elimination of sabbaticals; and the elimination of a subject supervisor.

The second tier would include a reduction in special-subjects staff and the Jump Start program in the elementary school; the elimination of supervisor at the front office in the middle school and a reduction of \$41,000 in the modified sports budget; the elimination of a math lab position in the middle school; an additional \$50,000 reduction in the athletics department in the high school as well as some elimination of electives; the elimination of five special education aide positions; cutbacks in sporting transportation and supplies; and not sending one student to Tech Valley High School.

The third tier, and "deepest cuts," as Tebbano said, could include the elimination of a teaching position and a clerical assistant in each elementary building, and of a homework club; the losses of the Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday middle school late bus; a middle school house leader; the GED program in the high school and an additional \$75,000 cut in the athletics department; the elimination of some monitoring and supervising staff in the high school; the reduction of BOCES safety specialist position by one day; cutting the technology replacement program; the elimination of a district secretary; the non-replacement of two Tech Valley High School students; and a \$50,000 cut in supplies.

A full list of the school's proposed cuts can be found on the district's Web site, www.bcsd.k12.ny.us.

Lytle said he will continue working closely with the community on the budget but warned possible government funding will not prevent every possible cut the district must consider.

"We're not anywhere near out of the woods," he said.

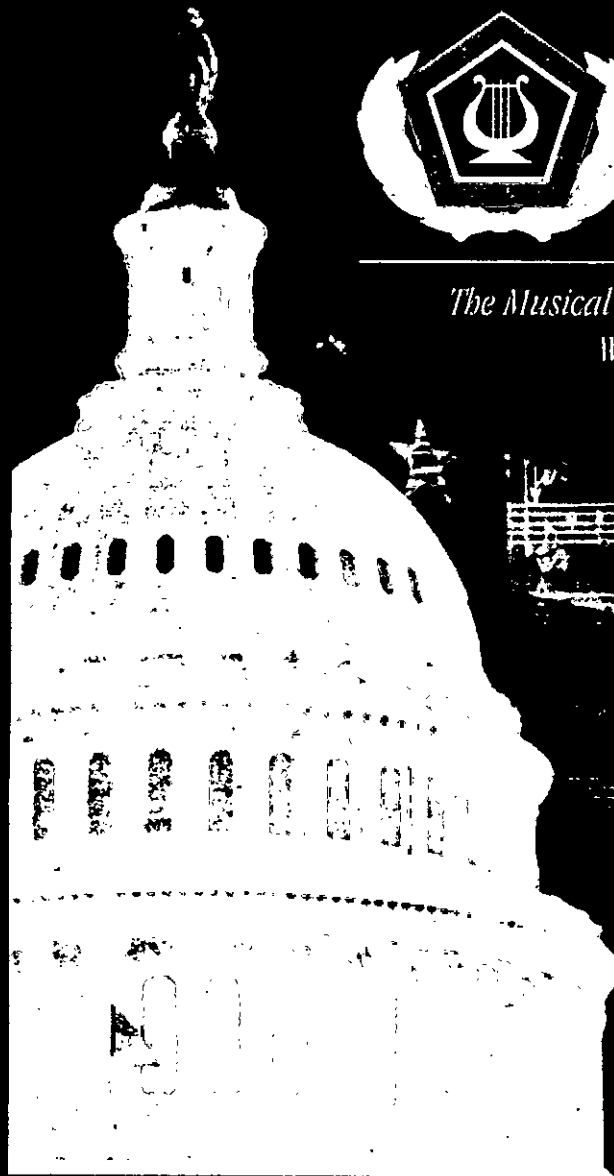

V'ville 'peeping Tom' nabbed by deputies

Man allegedly leaned out window to photograph woman, tried to erase evidence

Sheriff's deputies arrested a Voorheesville man following a report that he allegedly photographed an 18-year-old woman while she was in the bathroom at his home.

The Albany County Sheriff's Office arrested Keith B. Miller, 41, of 29 S. Main St. in Voorheesville, on Sunday, Feb. 22, and charged him with second-degree unlawful surveillance, a class E felony. Miller allegedly "candidly photographed" the victim inside his home with a digital camera, according to police.

The complainant alleges that he took the photos while she was inside of a bathroom of Miller's residence, and when she caught him taking the photos from an exterior window, she confronted him before leaving the apartment complex.

Chief Deputy Craig D. Apple said that Miller was cooperative with the investigation, but that he attempted to erase several

images on the camera and claims he only took one.

"He reached out with his camera from his window and could access the window below," Apple said. "They did a forensic evaluation of the camera, and we did uncover probably upward of a dozen photos."

With the evidence found on the camera and around the apartment, Apple said, he didn't believe the photographing went on for more than "a couple days."

Sheriffs said the victim contacted their department, which ultimately led to Miller's arrest. Miller was issued an appearance ticket and is expected to appear in Voorheesville Village Court on March 30 at 6 p.m.

Apple said it would be up to a district attorney whether Miller would be charged for each photograph or for the entire incident, and that it is now a matter for the courts.

He added that the incident was a serious invasion of privacy.

"It can't be taken lightly," Apple said. "Here's a woman who expected privacy, especially of all places, in a bathroom."

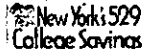

"He had a wonderful sense of humor and really enjoyed watching reruns of the 'Dennis the Menace' TV show," his family wrote in tribute.

He was the husband of the late Bertha Cowan Mayes; to whom he was married for 44 years.

MUSIC FROM THE MILITARY

Army Field Band to give free concert at The Egg

Not long ago, Peter Lesser got a call from a representative of the U.S. Army Field Band.

The band was looking for places to play, and it wondered if Lesser, executive director of The Egg in downtown Albany, would be interested in booking it.

"We said sure," Lesser said. "It's just a great way to bring some good music into the area."

The band, which will play at the Egg on Saturday, March 7, at 3 p.m., regularly tours the country. It's traveled to all 50 states, performing shows that are always free.

"It's a way for the Army to reach out to communities across the country," said Heather Santos, director of public affairs.

That mission was born near the end of World War II, when soldiers who had served in combat in all theaters of the war joined to form The First Combat Infantry Band. They spent a

year and a half traveling the country to encourage support for soldiers, as well as the purchase of war bonds.

In 1946, the band was renamed the Army Ground Forces Band. There was another name change in 1950, when the Army Ground Forces became the Army Field Forces and the band was rechristened The United States Army Field Band.

Some members were already in the military and joined the band when there was a vacancy. Others joined the service as musicians.

Either way, band members have to audition. They must demonstrate a professional performance level, strong sight-reading skills and the ability to play assorted musical styles.

Once they make the band, which pays in the neighborhood of \$50,000, they have to enlist in the Army for a minimum of three years, which is largely

spent traveling with the band. The band tours for more than 100 days each year, completing a circuit of the entire country every two and a half years. Concerts are free because they are sponsored by local groups or venues like The Egg.

"We just have to provide space and an audience," Lesser said.

To be part of the audience, people just have to call The Egg box office and ask for tickets, Lesser said. They will be mailed. He expects a big crowd and encouraged people to show up early so that if any seats are unfilled, additional tickets can be given out.

Those who do get to see the show can expect a good time, Lesser said.

"They're supposed to be one of the top-notch bands in the country," he said.

The band does some patriotic tunes, such as "Stars and Stripes

Forever," but the show actually includes a wide range of numbers. A sample program includes songs by everyone from John Phillip Sousa to Billy Joel to Miles Davis, Lesser said.

In fact, while he balked at using a cliché, "It's really, really something for everyone," he said, noting that the concert "is definitely rousing enough" to keep kids entertained.

The band's command and conductor, Col. Thomas H. Palmatier, is from Ballston Spa. He was appointed to the position in 2007.



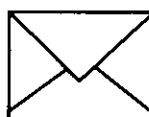

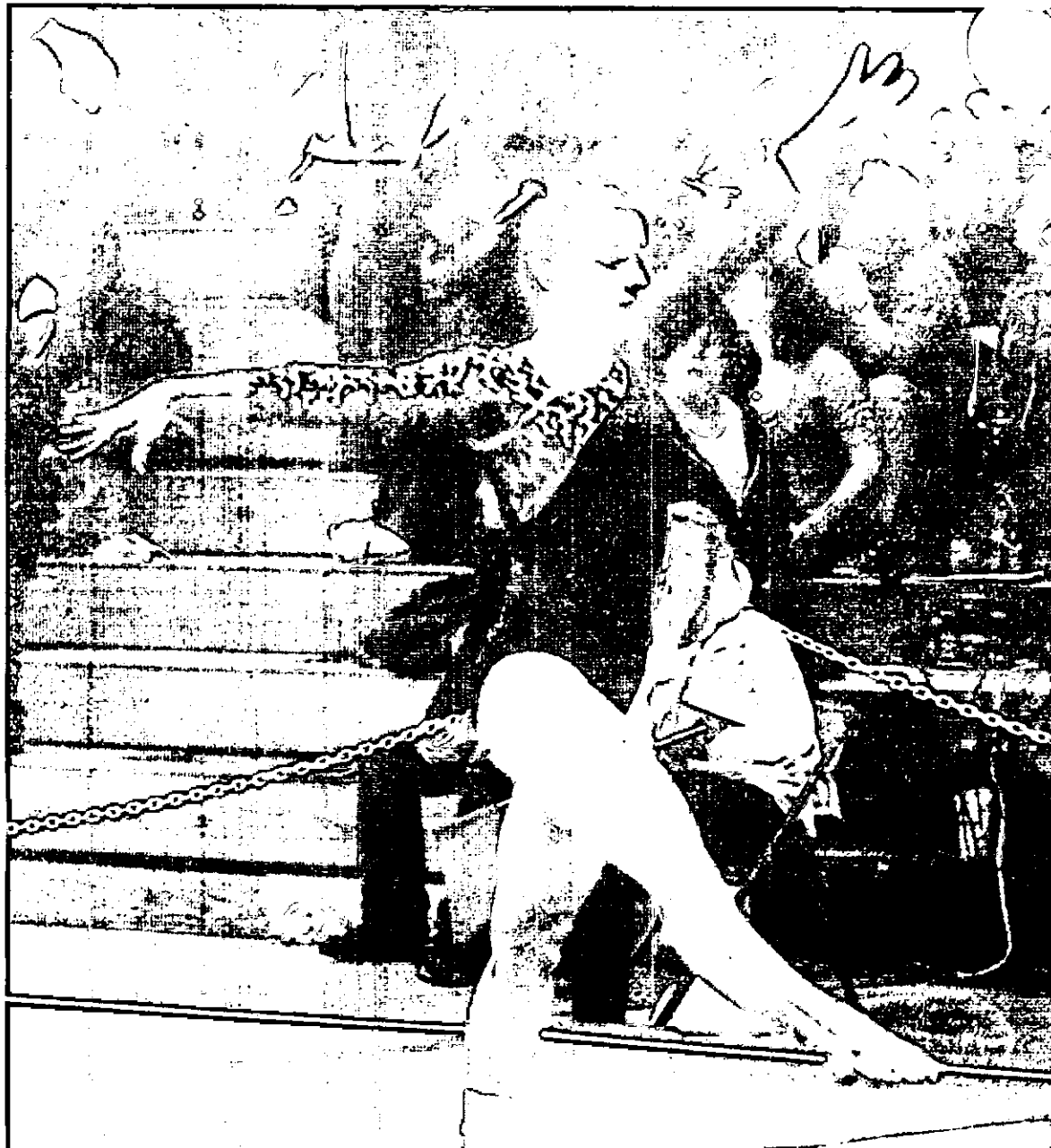

Cubillos opened the tournament with a 6-4 victory over Islip's Kyle Wade.

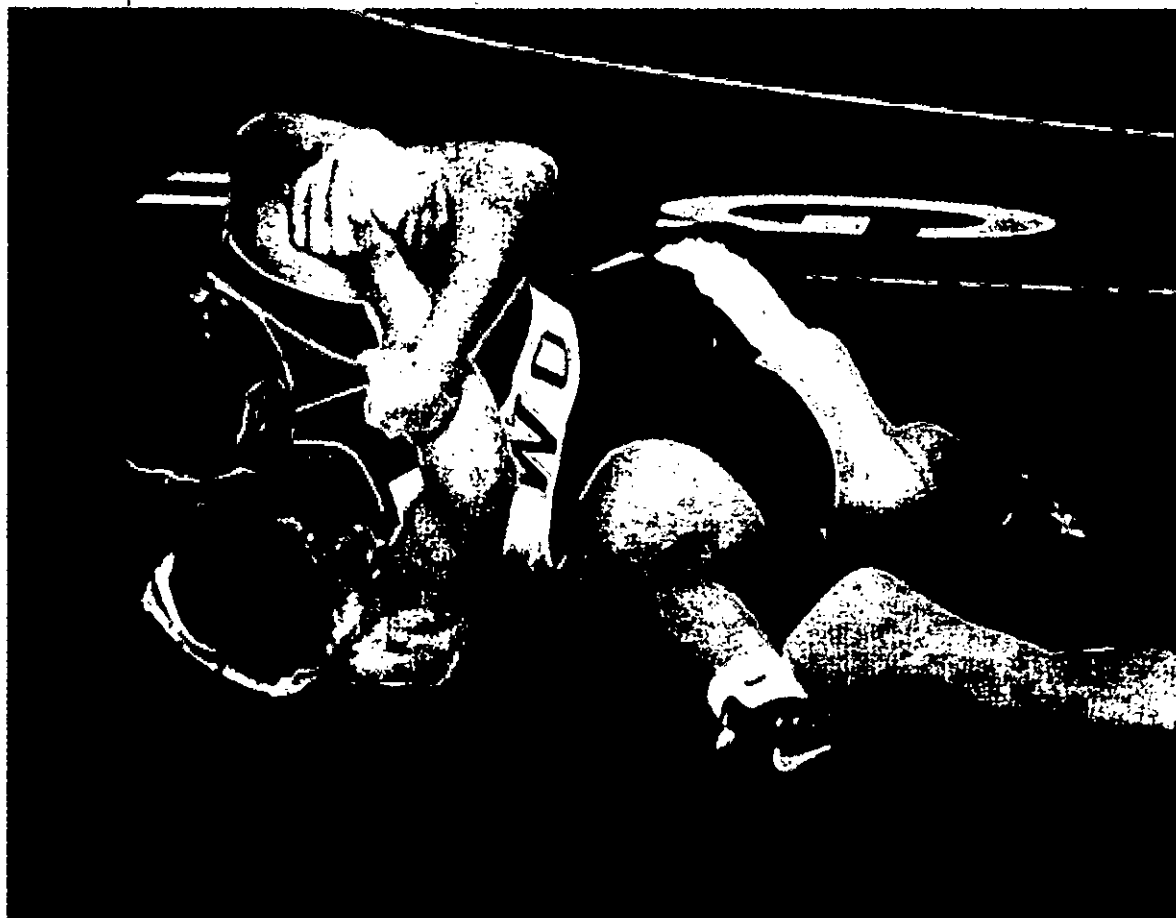
Guilderland's Devan Van Auken failed to place in the 215-
