

New Scotland zoning draft unveiled

Proposal would require developers to pay for feasibility studies

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At the Tuesday, March 3, meeting, the New Scotland Planning Board unveiled a draft of its commercial zoning law that calls on developers to prove the viability of projects larger than 10,000

square feet in the commercial zone.

According to the proposal, the developer would be responsible for showing that the impact on the community, economy, environment and infrastructure will not be negatively affected by the development. A potential developer would have to foot the bill for all of the studies related to the proposal.

Under state law, developers must provide certain impact studies, but Bob Staph, chairman of the New Scotland Planning

Board, said including a provision in the law will allow a "double guarantee" that the community will not be adversely affected.

Staph said the process of hammering out the law spawned a good amount of debate and discussion.

"I thought it was very good. Everyone on the board had different issues. There was a lot of back and forth," Staph said.

A draft of the law was first submitted to the planning board

Fatal New Scotland crash blamed on weather

Albany County sheriff's deputies say poor weather and poor road conditions were to blame for the death of 69-year-old Margáret Lozano who was involved in a fatal crash in New Scotland on Sunday, March 1.

Lozano, a Latham resident in the Town of Colonie, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident on Route 155 at 2:25 p.m. after colliding with a delivery truck, according to the Albany County Sheriff's Office.

Deputies said the driver of the truck was transported to Albany Medical Center by

a Voorheesville Ambulance squad, but that the injuries were not life threatening.

A funeral was held for Lozano on Friday, March 6, at the St. Pius X Roman Catholic Church in Loudonville, according to the Dufresne Cavanaugh Funeral Home in Latham. She was a registered nurse for more than 30 years and worked as a hospice nurse at St. Peter's Hospital for more than 20 years.

Lozano was a real estate agent for Tech Valley Homes in Loudonville at the time of her death.

• A Ravena man was arrested after police were called to the scene of a car collision with a large truck on Route 9W and the driver of the car tested positive for alcohol.

Jason T. Decker, 26, of 33 Railroad Ave., was charged Sunday, March 1, with DWI, operating a motor vehicle with a BAC of 0.08 percent or greater, and failure to keep right.

Bethlehem police said they received a call about a property damage auto-accident, and, upon arriving on the scene,

officers saw that a vehicle had come to rest in the inner southbound lane of Route 9W near Pictuary Road.

Tire and brake marks indicated that the vehicle had crossed over into the oncoming lane and made contact with a northbound "truck-trailer combination," according to the arrest report, which was stopped at the time approximately three-quarters of a mile away on the northbound shoulder.

Police said two individuals were with the vehicle and after identifying them, it was revealed that Decker was driving the car that was registered to its passenger.

Officials smelled alcohol on Decker's breath while interviewing him and also observed him display signs of intoxication, according to the report, and Decker told police that he had been "drinking earlier."

Decker was given a field sobriety test and tested positive for alcohol before being taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department, where he submitted to a chemical test, according to police.

The test revealed that Decker's BAC was above the legal driving limit of 0.08 percent and he is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on March 17 at 4 p.m.

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County considers discount drug law

Residents could save up to 50 percent on certain prescriptions

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A resolution proposed by county legislators could save residents up to 50 percent on prescription drugs if passed.

Albany County legislator Shawn Morse, D-Cohoes, said the measure, which failed to make it to vote four years ago when first proposed, would provide a free card for county residents that would allow discounts on brand-name and prescription drugs.

"Unfortunately, for whatever reason, that resolution never came to fruition," Morse said.

He said now, though, pharmacies are willing to bid for contracts to provide discounted medicine to help bring people in. Morse said that measure was unheard of four years ago, and likely the reason for the first resolution's failure.

The vote was scheduled for Monday, March 9, and Morse said he was optimistic of the outcome.

"I expect it to pass without a problem," Morse said.

Morse said the prescription drug card would come at no cost to taxpayers, and everyone would be eligible for the free card.

Schenectady County recently made a similar agreement with ProAct to provide discounted prescriptions to residents. Schenectady County residents can receive anywhere from 10 percent to 50 percent off of medicines.

The Albany County Legislature's agreement will feature discounts at 10 to 20 percent on brand name drugs and 40 to 50 percent on generic drugs.

The county would invite bids from companies willing to provide the service.

Cheryl Slavinsky, a representative of Eckerd, said pharmacies often participate in programs similar to the county-sponsored card, as well as creating their own discount programs.

"It's all about the economy. People are struggling," Slavinsky said. "We try to keep enhancing our benefits."

Engineering success

Project Lead the Way is in its first year at GHS, and has been linked to keeping students in the in-demand engineering field.

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An initiative to get students involved in the high-demand field of engineering has received high marks from Guilderland school officials.

Project Lead the Way, a nationally recognized program with its roots in Clifton Park, is in its first year at Guilderland High School.

Kathryn Perry, supervisor for career and technology education, said nationally it has been shown to help increase the chance students will finish a four-year degree in engineering.

"It's a great hands-on, minds-on, collaborative problem-solving based course," Perry said. "They get so engaged in the design process."

Planning to bring the program to Guilderland high school began in September of 2007, and took about a year to get everything in place. This year the school offered its first course in the program, "Design and Drawing for Production: Introduction to Engineering Design."

Over the next three years, a new course will be added each year.

"Civil Engineering and Architecture" is the next course, followed by "Principals

of Engineering" and "Engineer Design and Development."

The courses focus heavily on math and science, and progress in difficulty along with core math and science requirements. Perry added that the class counts toward the state-mandated art requirement needed to graduate high school as well.

Perry said the nation faces a scarcity of engineers, and colleges are seeing more and more students change majors away from engineering for a number of

reasons. This program, Perry said, has a high rate of students who follow through in the field, and its success could help lead to more engineers nationwide.

She said that despite the tight budget the district is facing, there has not been any discussion of cutting the program. It is included in the technology department budget line, she said.

Perry, along with teacher John Ball, presented a demonstration at the Tuesday, March 3, Guilderland School Board meeting, of the

work the students are doing in the program. An informational video was shown, along with a student-led demonstration by ninth-grader Charlotte Hayden and 10th-grader Nick McDonnell.

Perry said the adaptive nature of the courses are a must in the high technology ever-evolving society high school students are going to enter into.

Students in the course are responsible for creating a two-dimensional drawing, and then using software to produce a three-dimensional representation, much like real-world engineers do everyday.

"It's amazing how difficult it actually is," Ball said.

The district's board of education voiced its support for the program.

Board of Education member John Dornbush said he is happy to see Project Lead the Way succeed in the high school, and spoke on behalf of college Hy Dubowski, who has been a strong advocate of the program in the past few years, stating they are both excited to see it flourishing.

"I am definitely advocating we continue our commitment to the program," Superintendent John McGuire said.

He said funding for the program is in next year's budget, and he is "continually optimistic" it will not get cut.

Some concerns were raised about bringing more female students into the program, and the field of engineering in general. Perry said that was something that will be addressed in the coming semesters.

Glenmont Plaza gets finishing touch

Developer amends site plan and name Dollar Tree as 'end cap' store

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The Glenmont Plaza is back.

Developers have named the "end cap" store of the plaza, as the shopping center wraps up its renovation and revival following the departure of the former Grand Union supermarket. A 10,000-square-foot Dollar Tree is coming in and will be the finishing touch to the plaza that is now filled with a number of tenants.

Michael Mundy, a representative from the firm Benderson Development Company, LLC, out of Buffalo, gave a presentation to the town's planning board on Tuesday, Feb. 18, and was granted a site plan amendment by the board on Tuesday, March 3.

He said a dollar store was a desirable tenant for the plaza because it's a low-impact tenant with high sales and a popular stop with local shoppers. Mundy said the current mix of tenants, which includes a Bed Bath and Beyond, Creative Kitchens and a Marshall's,

would make an attractive location for shopping.

"By doing this Dollar Tree deal, it's a kind of small deal, but it completes the whole project," he said.


Part of the proposed amendment would include a reconfiguration of the large parking lot and the creation of "Main Street feel parking" in front of the tenants around the plaza, according to Mundy.

The new Dollar Tree store will have its merchandise loaded into the store from behind the building.

The site plans also call for new landscaping around the plaza edifice, extending the sidewalk along Route 9W into the plaza and making the site completely handicap accessible.

"This new configuration would add nine spots to the parking," Mundy told the board.

Because of the size of the parking lot, Mundy told the board

that developers might include some type of restaurant business on the other end of the lot in the future, possibly, he said, with a dining patio.

There was a lengthy discussion between Mundy, board member John Smolinsky and chairman George Leveille over the signage involved with the site plan.

"We, as a company, don't like the box sign," Mundy said.

At an earlier meeting, Smolinsky asked if the signs with single channel letters, which are lit internally, are allowed for shopping plazas.

"This type of lighting was approved in a previous permit," Leveille said.

Smolinsky brought up the

signage issue again during the March 3 meeting, when the board was preparing to adopt its minutes from the Feb. 18 meeting. He said he didn't believe the minutes were accurately "articulated" and that more could have been recorded on the comments made by him and others involving the signage issue.

The board tabled approving the minutes, and Leveille suggested that Smolinsky submit some of his thoughts to be included in the minutes to be adopted at the next planning board meeting.

"I'm not looking for a verbatim discussion on all of these topics," he said, adding, "I'd be glad to suggest a few sentences."

Continuing, he said, the current town code may have to be looked at.

"A future amendment is in order," Smolinsky said. "My problem isn't with this project, it's the interpretation of the laws for shopping centers."

Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli said the developers turned around what was a mostly empty plaza.

"They've done significant improvements," he said. "I think they've really turned this site around."

Daniel Coffey, the board's newest member, agreed with Morelli's assessment.

"I think it will be wonderful to fill this plaza out," said Coffey.

Trip to Manhattan inspires a new creation

Winter presents a problem for foodie types like me. During the long months before spring, inspiration to cook comes not from fresh just-picked vegetables, but from other places. Any place that brings thoughts of good food.

When I am not buying fresh produce at the farmer's market, my friends are a great source of inspiration to me. I have friends who are very good cooks, and more importantly, love to eat. So talk of food is common. Our conversations revolve around what we've been cooking up in our kitchens, who liked it and who didn't. We also discuss, in great detail, meals eaten in restaurants. Sauces, dressings, desserts — these things can occupy us for the good part of a morning jog.

And so I was feeling ready for a rush of fresh ideas when I headed down to New York City a few weeks ago. My kids were off from school, and we had no plans to fly off to a warm sandy beach. We did have a few play dates, an overnight at a friend's camp and plans to ice skate at the town park. I decided to finish off the week with a day trip to the city. Elliot was sold on the idea when I told him we would be riding on the train. And my girls both love everything about the city — especially people-watching.

We set out early on a Thursday morning. My plan went like this: drive to Poughkeepsie, train to

New York. We'd arrive in Grand Central before noon. Grand Central Station is a place of wonder, with its soaring ceilings and rushing people. Best of all, in the basement, one can eat just about any food desired. So we stepped off the train as scheduled, oohed at the grand old building, hustled around the commuters and headed straight down the stairs.

Full bellies are a must when walking the streets of New York City. There were so many choices: Mexican, Indian, sushi, pizza, soup and on and on. We were lucky enough to land a table in the middle of lunch hour rush. Our lunch table was like a well-traveled passport. First, we had pizza. Truly exceptional pizza. I suppose you need to be a lover of pizza to appreciate the beauty in a proper New York City slice. The crust is thin, but not too thin. The bottom is covered in a liberal amount of cornmeal, making it crunchy. And the cheese is just right, making blotting with a paper napkin optional (too much cheese makes for greasy pizza, and in my opinion, must be blotted.)

We also had a plate of Indian food, a mild, rich curry and Biryani. We ordered the

vegetarian Biryani, a rice dish full of cashews and Indian spices. Each bite is laced with cinnamon, cardamom, cumin and ginger. I had a small cup of spicy lentil soup, and mooched a bite of everyone else's lunch.

Soon we were walking up Fifth Avenue. The day was warm and we walked slowly, looking up at the tall buildings. Elliot chased pigeons. Lucy and Zoe giggled as we passed a group of young people, hair dyed pink and gelled into tall, stiff peaks. It felt good to be out of our usual surroundings.

First stop was Central Park Zoo. It's a sweet little zoo that can be seen in its entirety in under two hours. Afterwards, we sat in the sunshine on a park bench, happy to rest and watch the city move around us.

Next on our agenda was the Metropolitan Museum of Art. My kids were excited to see mummies, so we headed off to the Egyptian wing. While there, Elliot was scolded by the guards more than once. They don't take kindly to children hugging statues. Zoe was busy with my phone, taking pictures and sending them off to Paul at work. Lucy stood behind me as we approached the mummy exhibits, fearful that a body part would be exposed.

The time came to leave the museum. We stepped out onto the street as the afternoon light

began to fade. Our thoughts all turned to one thing: dinner. We saw one uninteresting diner, and dress shop after dress shop. After walking for many blocks, I realized two things: There is no fun and different food to be found in this neighborhood, and polka dots are in for spring.

Finally, remembering a Mexican restaurant near Grand Central Station, we hailed a cab and jumped in. At the restaurant, we flopped down into big soft chairs, exhausted and hungry. We ate everything Mexican: guacamole, salsa, rice, beans and far too many corn chips. The highlight was a quesadilla, filled with caramelized onions, black beans and fiery hot peppers. It was outstanding. Best of all, it inspired me to create a quesadilla that is different than the usual chicken or cheese.

Quesadillas are easy to make and a very kid-friendly food (because they are eaten out of hand and made even better when dipped in salsa.) The filling idea for this dish came from a catered lunch I attended, where a similar combination was put into enchiladas. When I prepared this for the first time, I hid the sweet potato from my kids. They are not fans of sweet potato, and I was afraid they wouldn't even try it. They did try it, and everyone loved it. The sweetness of the potato is a beautiful match to the creamy beans and cheese. Traditionally quesadillas are cooked in a frying pan. These are put in the oven, so that you can make many at one time. They are equally as good as the pan-fried version.

Back on the train after our dinner, we talked about our day. What was the best? Lucy loved the animals the most, Elliot voted for the train and the taxi ride. Zoe couldn't pick just one thing. She loved it all. And I knew it was a long way to go for a bit of inspiration. But that was my favorite part.

Black bean and sweet potato quesadillas

- 1 medium sweet potato, peeled and cut into chunks
- 1 15-ounce can black beans
- 1 shallot, chopped fine
- olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon sea salt
- Juice of 1/2 lime
- 1/4 cup cilantro, chopped
- 2 cups shredded monterey jack cheese
- 6 whole-wheat tortillas

Place the sweet potato in a pot, cover with water and bring to a boil. Simmer for 15-20 minutes, or until easily pierced with a fork. Drain and leave in colander.

In the same pot, heat a little olive oil over medium heat and add the shallot. Cook for 3-4 minutes, until it softens. Turn off the heat. Add the black beans, stir and mash with a potato masher. Add the sweet potato, and continue to mash. Stir in the cumin, salt and lime juice.

On a large cookie sheet, place 6 tortillas (they will hang over the edges.) Place about 1/3 cup of the potato-bean mixture on 1/2 of each tortilla. Cover with a sprinkle of cilantro and a small handful of cheese. Place the baking sheet under the broiler on low heat. Broil until the cheese is bubbly, about 3 minutes. Remove the quesadillas and fold in half. Flip the quesadillas over, and broil the other side for 3 minutes. Remove from the oven.

Using a serrated knife, cut each into four pieces. Serve with salsa, avocado and a green salad. Leftover quesadillas are great in a lunch box, and leftover filling makes a creative addition to a taco salad.



Liquid deicing company slides over to Selkirk

Firm proposes moving from Port of Albany and revamping River Road site

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Old Texaco tank are hidden behind thick overgrown brush and are barely visible from River Road in Selkirk, but that may soon change. IMUS proposes moving its deicing operation from the Port of Albany to 454 River Road and re-using the tanks after the site is renovated.

The reception was far from icy as Bethlehem Planning Board members listened to a proposal to move a liquid deicing company from its current operation at the Port of Albany into an abandoned Selkirk site.

The company, called Innovative Municipal Products or IMUS, laid out its plans to revamp 454 River Road during the board's Tuesday, March 3, meeting.

Daniel Hershberg, of the consulting engineers, land planning and surveying firm Hershberg & Hershberg, is representing IMUS and its application to set up a distribution terminal in town.

"They sell chlorides, which are basically deicers, and the way that material arrives for use on roads is a ship comes in the Hudson River and docks at the dock and is tied into tanks," Hershberg said of the Ontario-based company. "It is diluted with water and stored in these tanks, and then there's some additives that are added to make it more effective at the temperature in which it operates."

The company began in 1986 in Ajax, Ontario, and creates products such as Caliber, which is a liquid magnesium chloride deicer that is sprayed into salt and sand or directly onto roadways. The product is sold to and used by many municipalities in the Capital District, according to IMUS representatives, who also say it is better for the environment than other methods.

Hershberg told board members that IMUS plans to move from the port and have its deicing material pumped up

directly from an onsite dock on the Hudson River to the River Road facility and that seven existing tanks have been identified as suitable for the company's needs.

"This is the existing Texaco plant and the basic operation is not going to physically change the site to any extent," Hershberg told the board. "We intend to maintain the existing curb cuts in and the existing curb cuts out."

The applicants proposed building two electronic gates on both ends of the site to allow for trucks arriving at the site to automatically operate the gates to come in and out, according to Hershberg.

Currently, IMUS has a storage capacity of 5 million gallons at its port operation and would be looking to store 10 million gallons at its Selkirk site, with a physical storage space of 40 million gallons for possible future growth potential.

Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli said the applicant's site plan fits in well with the town's Comprehensive Plan of reusing existing structures for businesses.

"This is kind of what the town

envisioned instead of greenfield development," Morelli said, referring to when a new business or construction project builds on an empty lot or open space.

Furthermore, Morelli continued, the state's Department of Environmental Conservation has deemed the IMUS products not to be a hazardous substance and therefore the company does not need a DEC permit. The applicant would need a special-use permit, an environmental review and a site plan review from the town's Planning Board, according to Morelli.

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The nature of the products and chemicals used by IMUS was an issue raised by several members of the board.

Board member John Smolinsky asked if the IMUS products would be considered a hazardous material prior to being diluted and if the company had a spill response plan in place. Board member Katie Powers asked if they anticipated any problems with the tanks that have been abandoned for the last decade and if there were any vapor issues involved with the chemicals used.

"At any concentration, they are not a hazardous substance," Hershberg told Smolinsky. Even though one isn't required by the DEC because no permit is necessary — IMUS has a detailed spill response plan in place.

"There was a full investigation done on all the tanks, and that's how we knew which ones to use," Hershberg said. "All of those tanks are in operable condition with minor improvements."

Representatives of IMUS said the liquids in use were not volatile and that odors would not be an issue since the product is fully contained with tanks and then pumped into trucks. They likened the substances to "salt

water."

The site plans call for painting the tanks and removing the overgrowth from the lot as well as rehabbing a building and new landscaping.

National Grid currently owns the site and will be leasing it to IMUS, according to Hershberg. He said there would be little traffic impact.

"We don't think the basic traffic pattern will change any because of the proximity of the two sites," said Hershberg. The company projects pumping between 90,000 and 100,000 gallons of product at any given time and said it has an average of 12 trucks an hour.

Site plans show that the River Road location can handle 20 trucks an hour without resulting in a backup or slow down on the busy trucking route. Because of the automated nature of the business, IMUS told the board that three employees would run the site.

Board member Katherine McCarthy, the board's most senior member, ran this particular agenda item because Chairman George Leveille cited a conflict of interest in past dealings with the company.

A stand worth taking

Phelps and the WBC are globally known for their harsh anti-gay stance and controversial signs. While on tour, they spread their hate-filled message that God will punish not only those who are gay, but those who live in communities in which homosexuals live. On Friday, March 6, members of the WBC stopped in the Capital District as they were passing through on their way to picket outside SUNY Plattsburgh. While here, the group protested in front of Albany High School and the University at Albany.

While we at *The Spotlight* support free speech — it is, after all, a very large part of the business we are in — and we encourage the exchange of ideas and opinions without fear of retribution, we cannot abide by the homophobic and hate-filled rhetoric that Phelps and the WBC use in trying to convey their message.

There is no doubt that Phelps and his crew are an adept publicity machine, skilled at sensationalizing events to maximize media exposure. To this end, the group directs its efforts at events that attract heavy news coverage, like protests at funerals for American soldiers killed in Iraq and Afghanistan, a tactic the group started in 2005.

One could make the argument that any media attention just feeds the WBC machine; that coverage is a tacit promotion of Phelps' message. So why, the same person may ask, would a newspaper such as ours cover Phelps at all?

Because we report on our communities and the people within them, and, in this particular situation, those people came out strong and banded together to counteract the WBC's message of hate. As members of the WBC screamed about dead children and trod upon the American flag, hundreds of people from *The Spotlight's* coverage areas were united in protesting them.

That was the story. Your story. And for that, we at *The Spotlight* commend you.

Intellect is key to avoiding incidents with stray dogs

The big black lab meandered slowly up a Delmar street, much to the consternation of my client. She froze and clung to the leash, aware that her own dog would, at any moment, see the loose dog and go into a barking frenzy. We backed away, turned and worked on maintaining confidence and purpose so that her dog would not react negatively. In the meantime, the lab, oblivious to cars stopping to let it pass, wandered away.

Stray dogs — dogs that have been abandoned, are homeless or, as the above incident describes, dogs that are running loose without their owners — are a growing problem nationwide.

By some reports, more than 500,000 dogs are lost or abandoned every month across the country, even more so during the economic downturn. Some are reunited with their owners; others are picked-up by animal control authorities, some are hit by cars and killed, and some become feral. All, however, can pose a threat to humans and our on-leash family dogs.

On average annually, about 800,000 people are injured by dogs seriously enough to require medical attention. Broad estimates indicate that about 10 to 12 percent of dog bites involve strays. However, there are no statistics for the number of leashed dogs attacked, bitten or killed by loose dogs, and sadly, we read about these occurrences every day.

One client told me about walking her leashed Maltese on a suburban sidewalk. A loose Boxer mix ran to them, barking furiously, and snapping at her little dog. At one point, the bigger

dog grabbed her dog's ear. The owner screamed, trying to scoop up her dog. A passerby was able to grab the stray's hind legs and pull him off, though her dog needed seven stitches in its ear, and both she and her dog have been traumatized by the incident.

We all know it is the responsibility of dog owners to care for, train, and look after their canine companions, but we also know this does not always happen. When I was growing up, it was commonplace to let our dogs out without accompanying them. No one had invisible fences. Leash laws and poop-scooping ordinances were relatively unknown. Times have changed, of course, but I suspect there are still many dog owners who recall the old days, and let their dogs roam at will.

So what should we do if we encounter a stray dog while out walking? Our attention to our surroundings and our intellect are our top defenses in avoiding an incident with a stray dog.

- Never approach a stray dog. Strays are usually hungry, thirsty, sometimes injured — and almost always frightened. They could also carry disease. There are too many unknown factors with a stray dog; it's simply not worth the risk. Even with your knowledge of or love for dogs, steer clear of a stray. A wagging tail does not mean that the dog is safe to pet.

- Walk with awareness. Even in familiar surroundings, scan the area, near and far. This level of awareness doesn't have to take away from the joy of your walk. You may see things you've not noticed before. It's always best to know who and what is around you. Stray dogs can approach very quickly, often from behind garbage cans or from the woods. Also, for a variety of safety reasons, always bring a mobile phone along with you.

- Seek a safe haven: If you see a stray dog approaching from a distance, look for a place that's secure. Step inside a fenced area, enter a place of business, or knock on a neighbor's door. It's always better to be safe than risk a potentially dangerous encounter.

- Carry food as a distraction: I disagree with those who believe that pepper spray (or some other non-lethal spray) is an appropriate defense measure. This doesn't always work and can make the situation worse, especially in the

hands of someone inexperienced. Carrying treats or a pocket full of kibbles along with you is a much better option. Because strays are almost always hungry, you can use the food to take the dog's attention off you. Throw the food farther and farther away from you so the dog focuses on the food while you retreat to a place of safety. Kibbles work especially well as the dog will forage to find every morsel.

If doing any of these things is not possible, or if a stray approaches you by surprise, follow these guidelines to protect yourself:

- Don't try to run. Stand still. Hold your arms close to your sides, and don't move. Keep your eyes focused downward and watch the stray with your peripheral vision. Don't stare at the dog. He could interpret this as a threat. Let the dog sniff you if he wants, but do not stick your hand out as this can be interpreted as a threat. When the dog leaves, do not turn your back on the dog. Back away slowly, so you can keep an eye on the dog.

- If you have been knocked down by a dog — don't get up and run. Roll into a ball. Cover your face and head with your arms, keep your legs together, and pull your knees up to chest. Don't get up and don't move until the dog has gone away.

- You must use your intellect to overcome your instinctual urge to flee. More than 90 percent of the time that dogs exhibit aggressive behavior it is a reaction based on fear. Your goal is to eliminate a perceived threat or remove an opportunity to attack. If you run, there is a high probability that the dog will chase and attack you. If you stand still, he will most likely sniff you, and go on his way.

- After the dog has gone, call the animal control authorities in your area. You are completely within your rights to do this. Don't be reluctant for fear that your neighbor might resent your intervention. There are leash laws that requires all dogs to be leashed unless accompanied by, and under the full control of, either their owner or another person responsible for the dog's actions.

Perhaps the dog got loose by mistake — and you know that you would want someone to alert you if it was your dog — to keep him out of harm's way. By doing so, you will give the dog the best chance for survival by getting him off the streets into a safe place and, hopefully, reuniting him with his owner, or new one.

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

Former Congressman, author, newsman Dan Button dies at 91

Daniel E. Button, 91, of Delmar, died of a respiratory ailment at Albany Medical Center, on Saturday, March 7.

Button was a former congressman, newspaper editor and author.

Button worked as executive editor of the *Times Union* in the 1960s, and crusaded against Albany's Democratic machine headed by Erastus Corning and Daniel O'Connell. He was elected as a Republican in the heavily-Democratic 29th Congressional District in 1966 and served two terms. In 1970, he unsuccessfully ran for re-election as an outspoken critic

of the Vietnam War.

Button also worked as an editorial writer at the *Spotlight Newspapers* in the late 1980s and early 1990s.

Dave Abbott, art director at *The Spotlight*, worked with Button.

"I enjoyed working with him, he was a great guy. The community and *The Spotlight* will miss him," Abbot said.

Nancy Grace, executive editor at the time Button was at the *Spotlight Newspapers*, said he will be missed.

"He was a very intelligent voice in the political and newspaper businesses for many, many years, Grace said.

"He was a gentle man."

Button was president of the National Arthritis Foundation in the early 70s and later was editor of *Science Digest* magazine. He wrote a book about New York Mayor John Lindsay in 1965. His book about Albany politics, "Take City Hall," was published in 2003.

Survivors include his wife Rena; a son; three daughters; 15 grandchildren; and two great-grandsons.

A private funeral was held Monday, March 9.

A memorial service will be held at a later date.

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Locally created social site connects communities

Founder envisions online meeting place

Albany County officials, along with local entrepreneurs, announced the start of locally created social networking Web site, which attempts to connect local communities while creating jobs and stimulating the area's shaky economy.

The launch of iZoca, www.izoca.com, was announced Wednesday, March 4, at the Center for Economic Growth on State Street in Albany. The site is based at 971 Albany-Shaker Road in Latham.

Albany County Executive Mike Breslin said at the announcement that he is supportive of the new endeavor, and was impressed by a demonstration of the Web site's features.

"This is a new and novel way for [the community] to get

together," Breslin said.

The site features three sections: member groups, calendars and the "world connector."

Chief technology officer Scott Stewart demonstrated the site's features. In one of the examples provided by the company about how the site could be used, a block of neighbors could use it to communicate information about a busted water main.

Members of iZoca receive invitations to groups based on their geographic location and interests. Members have the option of becoming a "limited" member of a group, which would prohibit the other members from seeing their personal information without their consent. The calendar feature allows members to see all of the events hosted by the organizations they are members of displayed day-by-day. The final feature, the "world connector" allows the members to see updates of the events going on in their area.

Some local organizations already actively seeking members on the site are the CEG, Albany Symphony, New York State Museum, Live Nation and Big Brothers and Big Sisters of the Capital Region.

"In these difficult economic times, we are providing a free platform that allows groups and individuals to stay connected with the world around them," said iZoca president and chief executive officer Jeff Goronkin, a Clifton Park resident, in a written

statement.

Goronkin said at the March 4 unveiling of the site that he is hoping to generate revenue from advertisers, but signing up for the site is free.

He said he conceived the idea while waiting in an airport terminal, and left a position as vice-president of life sciences at Evident Technologies to pursue the idea. He has already raised \$500,000 in capital funds for the project, and said one of the key investors was entrepreneur Bob

Blackman.

Blackman said the iZoca team was one of the key reasons he signed on to the project.

"They're really dedicated to taking this to the next step," Blackman said. "It's cool to be part of something with its grassroots in Albany County."

Michael Tucker, the chief executive officer of the Center for Economic Growth, said he supports the local business venture.

"It will connect people not only in our region, but around the world," Tucker said. "After participating in a demonstration of the site and meeting the iZoca team, I am excited by the opportunities this company can create for our region."

The site's administrators claim it sets itself apart from other social networking groups such as Facebook and LinkedIn because those sites connect members to a crowd, where, "iZoca's group networking platform organizes that crowd into groups and provides users with features to keep them connected with those groups at all times," according to information from the iZoca team.

The team noted the name, iZoca, is derived from the Spanish word for square or plaza, zocalo.

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Guilderland board courts third justice idea

Heavy caseload cited as reason, but one councilman questions cost-effectiveness

Guilderland Town Board members are discussing the benefits of adding a third town justice, but the issue was tabled at a Tuesday, March 3, meeting to allow time for more research. Town Supervisor Ken Runion

said the discussion is slated to continue at the Tuesday, March 17, meeting.

The proposal was raised after state Supreme Court Third Judicial District Administrative Judge George B. Ceresia Jr. sent a letter to the town recommending they consider hiring another judge to help handle the nearly 11,000 cases the town court sees each year.

His recommendation was based on a study from the Office of State Court Administration, according to Runion.

The Town of Guilderland has a population close in number to the Town of Bethlehem's — around 34,000 — however Guilderland processes twice as many cases each year, Runion said, "principally because of the [Crossgates] mall."

Runion said although the justice's salary would be an expense, the town will see savings in other areas.

"If we hire the third judge, we could run a daytime session of our court once a week," Runion said.

Runion said this would cut

down on the overtime needed to pay police officers to appear in court after hours. Often officers will be asked to appear in court for five minutes, he said, and the town will need to pay them for three hours overtime to wait their turn.

He also said the backlog of cases the town faces would be processed faster, increasing revenue each year.

He added that consolidating the court with the state might also be an efficient way to handle the matter, and said he supports any effort to make the process run more efficiently.

"Maybe some of the local courts should be district courts, rather than town courts or village courts," Runion said.

Town Councilman Warren Redlich said he has some reservations about the cost effectiveness of hiring a third justice, and he is actively seeking more information about how other municipalities operate, such as Bethlehem, Clifton Park and Rotterdam, three towns that generate more revenue each year from their courts than Guilderland.

Redlich said the cost of the salary for a new judge, likely to be set near \$42,000 per year is deceiving, and he estimates the actual cost will be closer to \$100,000 after court clerks are hired and benefits are included.

Redlich also said he has reservations about the schedules of the police officers, and said some of them work nights and could be asked to appear in the daytime session.

He said that generating revenue faster from an additional

justice does not equate generating more revenue.

Redlich said resolving more cases by mail and having pretrial conferences with the town prosecutor without a judge or officer present could save time and money.

Another measure, he said, would be to spread out the time the defendants show up for court, so that everyone is not there at once. When the 200 or so defendants come all at once, at 5:30 p.m., Redlich said, time gets wasted.

Redlich also suggested asking the police officers not to write tickets for offenses that will likely be thrown out by the prosecutor or judge. He said writing a ticket for DWAI for a BAC under 0.05 percent is a waste of time, since those charges will be thrown out anyway.

Assemblyman Jack McEneny, D-Albany, who represents the town of Guilderland, said he would be willing to sponsor a bill in the state legislature to add a justice if the town decides on that route. A bill passed by both the Assembly and Senate, and signed by Gov. David Paterson, would be needed for the measure to be enacted.

"Crossgates adds an enormous amount to the public protection responsibilities," McEneny said.

McEneny added that the judge, if hired, would serve a year and then be subject to election the following fall.

Sen. Neil D. Breslin, D-Delmar, echoed McEneny, stating he would gladly sponsor a bill in the Senate if the town desired.

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

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



1. Yaddo, Saratoga County

Imagine a place where some of the greatest creative minds go to focus their gifts and produce art and literature for the ages; and imagine finding that artistic solitude in southern Saratoga Springs.

Yaddo is a 400-acre property featuring a mansion more than 110 years old and a garden that has served as the location for many a Saratoga social event. It also features a 5,000 book library, with works from authors who have written there.

Lesley Leduc, the mansion's public affairs coordinator, said the house that sits there now was built in 1893, two years after the original structure burned down.

After the deaths in 1900 of owners Spencer and Katrina Trask, the house became the highly sought after creative location it is now, Leduc said. Katrina, who was an avid writer and member of the performance community, and Spencer, included the parameters for use of the house in their will.

Leduc said legend holds that Katrina had a vision, where the greatest creators in all artistic fields were at the residence "creating, creating, creating."

Perhaps the most famous writer to work on the premises was there before the current house was built. In 1842 and 1843, it is said that Edgar Allen Poe wrote part "The Raven" at that location, according to Leduc. Another no-

er Matt Whitten, who counts the television series "House" among his credits. The event is scheduled for June 19, and will feature a Web series preview from Whitten's upcoming project.

2. The Egg, Albany County

Located in the heart of the Nelson A. Rockefeller Empire State Plaza, the Egg is one of the most architecturally unique buildings in the state.

Its construction began in 1966, and it was completed 12 years later in 1978. It was designed by Wallace Harrison to accommodate a variety of events and performances.

"Architecturally, The Egg is without precedent. From a distance it seems as much a sculp-

ture as a building. Though it appears to sit on the main platform, the stem that holds The Egg actually goes down through six stories deep into the Earth," boasts its Web site. "There are virtually no straight lines or harsh corners inside The Egg. Instead, walls along the edge curve upward to meet gently concave ceiling light for celestial effect."

Jim Jamieson, the preservation officer for the plaza, said the story of The Egg's shape is one of legend. He said the idea for the design came about when Gov. Nelson Rockefeller traveled to Brasilia, in Brazil, and was reportedly influenced by its progressive architecture. He is said to have balanced a grapefruit on his cup to explain to Harrison his vision for the structure.

3. Nott Memorial, Schenectady County

Located on the Union College campus on Route 7 in Schenectady, the Nott provides one of the more "distinct" college structures in the country, according to one school official.

Eliphalet Nott commissioned the structure during his tenure as president of Union College from 1804 to 1866. Charles Casey, a communications representative, said that, to the best of his knowledge, Nott held the longest tenure of any college president in the United States.

He said the French architect Josef Ramee was commissioned in the early 1800s to design a central rotunda building on the campus.

"It was always a part of the plan for this campus," Casey said.

The Nott features the Mandeville Gallery Art Museum and lecture centers for professors and public speakers. It is two floors, with 16 sides, and has ring-shaped balconies around the inside.

"We try to use it as much as possible," Casey said. "It's a real eclectic assemblage of styles. ... We think it's the most distinguished college building in college America."

He said two notable exhibits recently featured the Erie Canal and French Children of the Holocaust. Many of the displays are student art, as well as local, regional and other artists.

He said the best way to describe the structure is "Venetian-high-Gothic."

4. Proctors, Schenectady County

Opened in 1926 and designed by famed architect Thomas Lamb, Proctors has been the location of many historic events. The theater is also on the National Historic Registry.

Purchased for \$1 in 1979 from the City of Schenectady by Arts Center & Theatre of Schenectady, Inc, or ARTS, its revitalization has helped unite downtown

Schenectady.

Philip Morris, chief executive officer of the theater, said when Proctors was first built it was something the community was proud of, and was a symbol of Schenectady's rich history.

Improvements, such as farmer's markets, public spaces and community centers have made it even better.

"As a new entity, with all the component parts, it's a symbol of its next best days," said Morris.

5. Thaddeus Kosciusko Bridge, Albany and Saratoga counties

Touted as the highest volume bridge in the Capital District, the "Twin Bridges" are crossed by more than 110,000 vehicles each day, according to the Department of Transportation.

It was named in honor of Thaddeus Kosciusko, a Polish engineer and volunteer who was a general in the American Revolution.

There is also a bridge between Brooklyn and Queens named after Kosciusko, according to the DOT.

Construction began in 1957, and it was opened to traffic in 1959.

Last year a \$12 million project began in the summer of 2008 to replace the bridge's 168 suspension cables. The project is expected to be completed in December, according to information provided by Peter VanKeuren, a representative from DOT.

6. The Latham Circle, Albany County

Just south of Saratoga County, east of Schenectady, west of the Hudson River, and north of the City of Albany, the Latham Circle is the first rotary hub of its kind in the state.

The circle was originally built as an "at-grade traffic circle" in 1934. In 1958, an underpass was added to skip the circle and continue on Route 9.

According to information provided by DOT, characteristics of roundabouts were installed within and adjacent to the traffic circle in 2002. In doing so, the circle retains the size of a traffic circle, but, "due to the more angled entrances to the circle, nar-

rower ramps, improved signage and pavement markings and the restriction of using one lane in part of the circle, travel is safer," said VanKeuren.

Prior to its upgrades, it is believed to be the first traffic circle in the Capital District, according to DOT.

The safety upgrades helped decrease accidents between 60 and 70 percent. DOT was awarded for its efforts with the 2003 National Roadway Safety Award from the Roadway Safety Foundation and Federal Highway Administration.


7. No Exit 3 on the Northway, Albany County

The Northway itself is considered the artery of Upstate New York, and it connects Albany to Saratoga Springs and eventually dumps off into Canada. Interesting, though, is its curious lack of an Exit 3.

"When the Northway was built, an additional highway was anticipated to be built connecting the I-90 Corporate Woods complex to the Northway between Exits 2 and 4, to be known as I-687. That highway was never built and, as we know, the gap in exits still exist," VanKeuren said.

There is a project in preliminary stages to remedy that, however projected construction would not be until 2013, according to DOT.

"We have a long history of engineering expertise that translates into providing safe and efficient transportation operations, from planning, designing, and constructing new ways to improve the transportation networks throughout the state, to maintaining and improving the existing system," said VanKeuren.

table author who worked there is author Charlie Kaufman, who is responsible for films such as "Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind" and "Adaptation," as well as "Synecdoche," which was partly filmed and based in Schenectady.

Leduc said Yaddo gets about 1,100 applications each year from artists seeking to use its distraction-free facility. Out of that number, typically 200 are selected and can use the premise for intervals between two weeks and two months.

"It's totally uninterrupted. There are no phones in the studio. Your time is your own," Leduc said.

Accommodations are taken care of by Yaddo, which is a non-profit organization and operates largely on donations. Leduc said, although, each year the organization must raise \$1 million to help sustain the premises.

Upcoming at Yaddo is its summer benefit, featuring screenwrit-

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


and next.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said even though the district didn't realize any savings, he was appreciative of the teachers' willingness to come to the table for the sake of their school.

"We tried, and we've explored a number of options. ... I commend the teachers for at least talking, and I'm very grateful," he said. "I'm saddened we couldn't see this resolved, but we're going to get through this together."

The BCTA is one of the few teacher unions in the state to re-open its contract; a move applauded by district officials and community members alike. Ultimately union representatives and the school's board of education could not agree, though board president James Lytle said they were on the same page.

"I think we came pretty close," he said. "We were not miles apart on this."

Lytle said the unions and the district as a whole are unsure of "what the world is going to look like in even a year from now," and that the cash-strapped district simply couldn't make any future concessions.

"They [teachers] were prepared to give up something and justifiably expected something in return," said Lytle. But in the end, he continued, the district wasn't prepared or in the position to make promises on the union's next contract in return for a reduction in today's.

Lytle concluded that the next BCTA contract negotiation would be "tough."

The current contract contains an average of a 3.23 percent salary increase until 2010 with a "step increase" for each position, which translates into a more than 5 percent salary increase.

With 465 employees covered

by the teacher's contract, the district's budget increases each year by hundreds of thousands of dollars just to cover the pay raises. There are two other union contracts with the district: The Bethlehem Central United Employees Association and Bethlehem Principals Association.

The BCUE covers 509 employees, such as maintenance workers and other essential staff; and the BPA covers the district's 16 principals and administrators that typically collect the highest salaries.

Tebano told local residents the contract talks during the district's final public budget meeting on Feb. 9, and now that talks are over he said there are no intentions of approaching the other two unions about re-opening its respective contracts.

The superintendent said that even if teachers had agreed to reduce their raises, the Bethlehem district would still be facing reductions in expenditures over this year's budget. In his reduction plan unveiled on Wednesday, Feb. 25, Tebbano proposed three levels of cuts, with the first being the least reduced plan and the third containing much deeper cuts.

Tebano said Bethlehem could eliminate nearly \$1.46 million of spending in the first tier, an additional \$990,000 in the second tier and then an additional \$2.15 million in the third.

The three tiers represent more than \$4.5 million in budget cuts.

Nothing is "off the table," according to district officials, as the board of education goes through each school department every Wednesday night through March. The meetings are open to the public and begin at 7 p.m. at the school's district offices, 90 Adams Place, Delmar.

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crushing operation could have more of a negative impact on the community than a 60,000 square foot market, he said.

The town currently has a moratorium in place on new commercial buildings larger than 30,000 square feet while it examines the zoning laws that affect residents. The moratorium is set to expire Wednesday, April 1. The town will be scheduling a public hearing on the zoning proposal in the coming weeks.

Greg Widrick, a representative of Sphere Development LLC, a Syracuse-based company with plans to develop a 137,000-square-foot retail anchor store, such as Target, at the corner of routes 85 and 85A in New Scotland, said he is hopeful for the opportunity to present the board with its plans.


"We would obviously do whatever is necessary under the law," Widrick said.

He said under the provision of the proposed law, known as Local Law I, Sphere would provide a feasibility study to determine the viability of their development.

Attempts to contact Daniel Mackay, founder of NS4SED, were unsuccessful.

Well attended by area Democrats, as well as elected and appointed officials from around the county, Cunningham promised supporters to continue infrastructure improvements and maintain fiscal responsibility during an economic downturn. The supervisor reflected on his time in office and pointed to the New Scotland Road improvements; multiple sidewalk projects; the acquisition of the Colonial Acres Golf Course; automating Town Hall; electronic success under his tenure. After nearly six years of holding an elected office, this will be Cunningham's first re-election campaign. He was first an Albany County legislator before being appointed as supervisor and then winning his first term of office in 2007. "I've made no secret of the fact that I thoroughly enjoy being the Bethlehem town supervisor," Cunningham said at the announcement. "This has been one of the most interesting experiences of my life and certainly of my career and I'm just so pleased to be able to serve my community."

Currently the board has no public comment period, but frequently holds public hearings. A hearing is a required project-specific forum at which residents can air concerns or comments to the board, which are added to the town's official record and meeting minutes. Many other boards, such as the Town Board, have a public comment period as a part of the regularly scheduled agenda.

Leveille said he met with Planning Board members Katherine McCarthy and Nicholas Behuniak, as well as Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli and Administrative Assistant Nancy Moquin.

"I think it's a reasonable way to get additional input," Leveille said during the Tuesday, March 3, board meeting at Town Hall. "What we're trying to do is get more comments."

The planning subcommittee has put together a format they believe will foster a more open dialogue with town residents by creating a vehicle to receive and record important feedback from people who could be affected by proposals before them.

McCarthy said the group is proposing to hold the public comment period at the beginning of their meetings, which starts at 7 p.m. at Town Hall, for a length of 10 minutes.

"This is separate from a public hearing," McCarthy told board members. "This would be at every meeting ...

comments would be limited to the items on the agenda for that meeting and each speaker would be allowed to speak for two minutes."

McCarthy said it wouldn't be a "question and answer" format, and that the board would not be responding to the comments, but merely listing to the speaker's. She added that board members could clarify issues or items and that any board member could extend the comment period by another 10 minutes if necessary.

"We'd like to make all of this clear before it starts, so the public can know what to expect," she said. "Members of the public can also always send letter to the town if they have a question."

Behuniak reiterated that the board would not be engaging in a back and forth dialogue during this time.

"I would just point out that we as members wouldn't be answering questions, nor would staff of the town," said Behuniak. "But we could, as Kathy was saying, ask for clarification from people who would be speaking."

Leveille said it would be the responsibility of the board chairman to run the public comment period.

"I think the chair really should preside over that section," he said. "To the extent that members want clarifica-

tions, they just ask for them."

All specific questions would be answered, according to Leveille.

"If there are questions that people have, yes, we'll direct them to staff, and we'll be sure to provide answers at the next meeting," he said.

Leveille added that the two-minute time frame was a reasonable and manageable proposition.

"I think our intent was not to have some kind of [stop watch] here, but two minutes is a lot of time ... to be able to speak a comment within reason depending upon how many speakers are there," Leveille said. "It's a guide."

The specifics of the proposed public comment period are being drafted and will be presented at the next Planning Board meeting on Wednesday, March 17. If the board adopts the proposal, the first official public comment period would be held at the board's first meeting in April.

"I think it's a reasonable way to get additional public input that's consistent with what other boards are doing," said Leveille. "Many boards and advisory committees operate this way and it's a final opportunity for somebody to speak to the planning board before action is taken on a particular item."

Father-daughter duo brings Irish music to the masses

Music really wasn't Kevin McKrell's thing. Growing up, his passion was art. But when a buddy suggested they form a band when both were about 19 or 20, McKrell was game. "He started singing and we

just threw some stuff together," McKrell said. "It was just something to do until something else happened."

What happened was McKrell got a rush out of being on stage.

"I fell in love with performing," he said. "I love the energy of being in front of people, the spontaneity."

McKrell never abandoned his love of art — he's a painter who has had several shows throughout the Capital District — but he quickly got serious about

music, too. He and his buddy, Jeff Strange, founded an Irish folk band called Donnybrook Fair with David McDonnell and toured the country. When McKrell had a daughter, Katie, he brought her on the road.

He never pushed music on her — "He's definitely not a stage dad," Katie said — but she fell in love with it, too.

Some 30 years later, McKrell is still performing and Katie is still at his side. About two years ago, the duo formed their own band, The McKrells, performing mostly Irish music. They'll stage "An Irish House Party" Saturday, March 14, at Home Made Theater in Saratoga Springs, followed by a St. Patrick's Day show at the Parting Glass in Saratoga Springs.

Both of the McKrells are prolific songwriters. Their shows generally include some of their own numbers, as well as traditional Irish tunes. While both write and perform other styles of music — Katie has her own album of "indie folk" songs in the works — Irish music has always held a strong appeal, and not just because both grew up with it.

"It's the stories," Kevin said. "The songs evoke politics, freedom, love. They're not just verse, chorus, verse, chorus love songs. They're told to pass along stories."

"Because Irish songs tend to emphasize storytelling, Kevin's

quick to admit he doesn't have a great grasp of the technical side of music. In fact, he doesn't even know how to read music — he plays by ear.

"It's like hieroglyphics to me," he said. "I just fuddle along."

Katie, on the other hand, has studied music theory, and in her formative years, she spent a lot of time listening to the likes of Joni Mitchell and Simon and Garfunkel. Harmonizing is one

The two have shared the stage not only locally, but as far away as Italy and Scotland. Kevin has also traveled and performed extensively in Ireland.

At this time of year, they both always look forward to the Home Made Theater show, an annual event held in the Spa Little Theater in Saratoga Spa State Park.

"Home Made Theater is a gem of a theater," Kevin said, noting the venue's outstanding acoustics. "I've played some great theaters around the world, and that's one of them."

The Parting Glass, where Katie works, has its own selling points. Billed as "Saratoga's original Irish pub," it always draws a packed house on St. Patrick's Day.

"It's a full-contact day," Kevin said. "It's very crowded and everyone has a beer."

"It's a laugh riot," Katie said, adding that her dad is "the king of the sing-along" and often gets one side of the room to compete against the other.

The McKrells, with special guest Brian Mellick, will perform at Home Made Theater in Saratoga Springs Saturday, March 14, at 7:30 p.m. For tickets or information, contact Home Made Theater at 587-4427 or info@homemadetheater.org. of her strengths.

One of her dad's strengths, she said, is simply his experience. When he makes a suggestion, Katie knows he knows of what he speaks.

At the same time, her dad is flexible enough to respect her suggestions, she said.

The result is a musical collaboration that's free of power struggles.

"We're really good at the things that cause bands to break up," Katie said. "We naturally — maybe instinctively — just get along. He didn't even realize it, but he raised me to be the perfect band mate."

For his part, Kevin said performing with his daughter is "an enormous amount of fun."

"It's like doing it for the first time myself," he said.

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

Olsen earns most valuable player honors in victory

With 11.3 seconds left in last Saturday's Section II, Class AA final at Hudson Valley Community College, Bethlehem's Megan Olsen is at the free throw line. The Lady Eagles have a three-point lead and are close to avenging last year's loss to Shenendehowa.

Olsen misses the first free throw, and the Shen crowd goes wild.

The building quiets again. Olsen begins to shoot, everything goes into slow motion. You can taste the tension in the air.

The shot is up, it's over the rim and it... is... in, like a dagger through the Plainsmen's heart.

Bethlehem wins the title 46-42.

"It's unbelievable. We finally did it," said senior center Alex McCullough. "It feels great."

But let's start at the beginning.

"Welcome to the main event," booms over the P.A. system as the game gets underway. Shen quickly builds a four-point lead,

but then something clicks with Bethlehem's offense. The Lady Eagles (18-6) go on a 13-0 run to grab an eight-point advantage.

The Plainsmen (18-5) don't back down. They come back with six consecutive points to end the quarter down only 13-10.

As the second quarter starts, it's clear that the Plainsmen do not have anyone big enough to stop McCullough, who scores 13 of her 14 points in the first half to help Bethlehem build a 29-20 halftime lead.

Starting the second half nine points down seemed to energize the Plainsmen, who came out of the locker room on fire and cut Bethlehem's lead to five points. They also find an answer for McCullough: get her into foul trouble. The only problem was Shen has even fewer answers for McCullough's back-up, Rosie McKee, who scored eight points and contributed four offensive rebounds.

"Rosie had a great game coming up with rebounds and hitting big shots," said Olsen.

But then things start to get interesting in the fourth quarter. Shen cuts the lead to only two points with less than one minute remaining in regulation.

"I'm sure Bethlehem was a little nervous when we cut it to two," said Shenendehowa head coach Ken Strube. "But they

Platel wound up with the

state title since he needed fewer attempts to clear 15 feet than Helman.

Platel was one of four Section II athletes to win state titles and the only male athlete to top the medal podium.

Saratoga Springs sprinter Madalayne Smith won the girls 55-meter dash and 55-meter hurdles, Colonie's Kyle Plante

claimed the girls 300-meter dash title and Schuylerville's Sarah Palmer finished first in the girls high jump.

Fellow Bethlehem senior Sam Smith tied for seventh place in the high jump. Smith and Beacon's Tejorn Davis each cleared 6 feet, 2 inches, but failed in their attempts to clear 6 feet, 4 inches.

Hilton's Eric Fontanez won

the high jump after he cleared 6 feet, 8 inches in fewer attempts than Greece Olympia's Jerry Ntumba.

Bethlehem's Yousef Zaid competed in the boys 1,600-meter race at the state meet. The junior placed 17th in a time of 4:36.59.

Jordan Hamm from Canisius (Buffalo) won the state title in the 1,600 with a time of 4:19.3.

Get organized for spring

Don't try to tackle all your cleaning in one day

The drudgery of winter is giving way to the excitement of spring. It is the time of year in which many people find themselves looking to put their house in order. Their rejuvenated spirits are often tempered as they realize that the task at hand seems daunting. It most certainly doesn't need to be.

As a professional organizer I make my living helping people clean out, pare down and get organized. Spring-cleaning, like any other type of organizational project, is all about the approach. When you know where to start and what to do, the unmanageable becomes manageable.

Here are a few simple steps to help you get started:

Step one: Make a plan. A plan will help you identify your goals and determine how much time you need to devote to achieving them. A word of advice: start small. Setting out to get the whole house organized in day is setting yourself up for failure. You'll feel burned out and disappointed.

Step two: With a plan in place your ready to get started. Evaluate the space you've decided to start with. What is

the purpose of the space? Is it serving its purpose or has it been overrun by doing double or triple duty?

Step three: Once you've determined the purpose of the space you're ready to break it down into zones. Each area within the larger space is given a purpose. For example, in a home office there might be four zones. A bill paying zone, a filing zone, a workspace zone and a supply zone. In a closet you might have a zone for pants, shirts, shorts, sweaters, sweatshirts, dressy clothes and dirty laundry.

Step four: Clear your space. Take everything and I mean everything out. This allows you to see the space in a new way, making it easier to determine the best place for things to go.

Step five: Sort through your belongings. Make three piles: keep, donate and toss. If you find it hard to get rid of things ask yourself if the item has meaning and value to you. Why clutter up your space with things that aren't important to you. Also, keep in mind that someone else might be able to use what is just sitting around and collecting dust in your house.


Step six: Put your belongings back according to their zones. Make sure that everything is easily accessible. If you find that an object doesn't fit into

any of the zones you've created then you need to make a new zone. Everything must have a home. Disorganization finds its way into your space when things have no place to go or they are to time consuming to put away.

Step seven: Maintenance. Everything must be maintained in order to keep it working. Think of your car. If you never changed the oil you'd run it into the ground. It's the same with organizational systems. If you do no upkeep it will turn back into a disorderly mess. Set aside 10-15 minutes once or twice a week, depending on how much the spaces gets used, to make sure everything is remaining in order. Pick a time that fits into your schedule. Be realistic about when you will and will not do it.

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

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



Never leave either unlocked and be sure your front door has a deadbolt lock - the kind that can only be opened with a key from either side. If your garage is attached and offers direct access into your house, never leave the garage

door open for an extended period of time and always lock - again, with a deadbolt - the door that leads from the garage into your house.

If you must leave your car sitting on your driveway overnight, always lock it and never leave a spare key or garage door opener inside the car. Thieves know that by breaking into your car, they may find a way to access your home.

Beef up security with simple, low-cost devices

"There are many simple-to-install, economical devices that can help enhance your home's security," says Hemphill. Here are a few items, all available online from Montgomery Ward, which can improve your home security in just a few minutes:

- **Telespy Intrusion Detector** - The detector looks and functions like a normal telephone, but when you're away you can set its special motion detector sensor to alert you when the device detects motion

inside your home. The device calls a number you preprogram into it - a cell, office phone or friend's home phone - and allows you to listen to what's going on inside your house for up to 30 seconds.

- **Replace your garage door opener remotes with a Keyless Entry System** on the outside of the garage. The system reads your fingerprint to identify you as someone authorized to enter the garage. You can program the system to recognize up to 10 people's fingerprints. Don't want to get out of the car to open the garage door? Mount the system on a post beside the driveway so that you can reach it from the driver's side window.

- **Still want a home security system, but hesitant to take on the costs associated with professional installation?** It's possible to create your own low-cost security system, tailored to your needs, with programmable components that interface with one another. Start with a command center, available for less than \$35 and add components to monitor doors, windows and garage entries for around \$20 per component.



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


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Spring's top home decor trends influenced by nature


