Beth cop alleges racism cover up

13-year vet suspended from force, says chief ordered alleged audio tapes destroyed

Bethlehem police officer Christopher Hughes says he is being targeted for disciplinary action after

talking to Town Supervisor Jack Cunningham about alleged racist remarks made by Police Chief Louis Corsi.

Hughes said he spoke with Cunningham at the supervisor's home on Sunday, May 17, about a taped audio conversation in which Corsi used a racial slur. Days later, Hughes

said, he received a "notice of intent to conduct interrogation" about the conversation. In a formal complaint filed with the Albany County District Attorney Public Integrity Unit on May 27, Hughes said, "Town Attorney Michael Smith stated the town was seeking my termination, and I could be facing possible criminal charges based on my conversation with Cunningham."


District Attorney David Soares spokeswoman Heather Orth con-

firmed there is an investigation into the alleged comments and the resulting fallout, but could say little else.

"We don't comment on ongoing cases in the public integrity unit," she told *The Spotlight* on Saturday, May 30.

The police department's deputy chief, Timothy Beebe, said he, too, couldn't comment.

Vandals draw hate messages in Delmar

A number of properties found with offensive spray painted messages and swastikas

Bethlehem police are investigating a spree of offensive vandalism that occurred overnight Friday, May 22, into the early morning of Saturday, May 23.

Well over a dozen homes surrounding the Hamagrael Elementary School building, and the school itself, on McGuffey Lane and Wisconsin Avenue were found spray-painted with hateful messages, expletives, penises and swastikas.

Police told *The Spotlight* on Friday, May 29, that the case is under investigation. It isn't being treated as a hate crime, but that could change. Police say they are handling the matter seriously. The vandals face charges

of felony fourth-degree grand larceny, because the property damage exceeds \$1,000; fourth-degree criminal mischief, a misdemeanor; possession of a graffiti instrument, a misdemeanor; and trespassing, a violation. More charges may follow as the case progresses.

One home had "[expletive] U" sprayed on its left-side garage door and a red line across the right-side door, the report states.

County rejects N.S. zoning law

States it should address density issue

A public hearing on New Scotland's latest commercial zoning law has been canceled as the Albany County Planning Board decided it lacks provisions dealing with density.

A public hearing scheduled for Wednesday, June 17, was canceled after the Albany County Planning Board did not approve the Town of New Scotland's zoning law, Local Law B, calling for an 85,000-square-foot size cap on retail development. Town Board member Rich Reilly drafted the law.

The county planning board reviewed the law and determined it did not address the issue of density, and therefore needs to be revisited. Density refers to the number of stores or shopping centers that would occupy the more than 300-acre commercial zone.

"The consequences of multiple shopping centers with retail businesses occupying 85,000 square



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

Rollover leads to DWI, open container charges

Bethlehem police have charged a 20-year old Delmar man in a rollover incident on Feura Bush Road on the evening of Friday, May 8, which saw three people hospitalized, after finding an open bottle of liquor inside of the car.

Steven R. Dennis of 40 Euclid Ave., in Delmar was arrested for DWI; drinking alcohol in a motor vehicle on the highway; speeding; and failure to keep right.

Police said they responded to a vehicle rollover around 11 p.m. on May 8 on Feura Bush Road in Glenmont, and, upon arriving on the scene, discovered an overturned vehicle off of the roadway.

Officers saw no visible occupants inside of the vehicle but located the driver when they approached the car wreck, according to the arrest report, and Dennis identified himself with his driver's license.

Dennis allegedly told officers that he was driving west on Feura Bush Road and approached a curve in roadway just before "he

lost control of the vehicle because he was traveling too fast," the report states.

Police said Dennis also told them he crossed the eastbound land and went off the road and that while overturning that he struck a flowerbed, mailbox and a tree.

One of the officers on the scene was reportedly overheard stating, "These were three very lucky kids not to have been killed" while assessing the heavy damage to vehicle which was found lying on its passenger side.

Officers also reported that they could smell alcohol on Dennis' breath while interviewing him and that he displayed signs of intoxication, the report states.

Dennis allegedly told police when asked if he had been drinking that "he drank two beers at Lark Street."

Police said that when asked if he was injured, Dennis replied, "No," but that asked if he could perform a field-sobriety test he responded, "Yes," and "I think so."

Dennis only performed one of three field-sobriety tests because officers observed a laceration on the right side of his head and heard him complaining of leg pain, according to the arrest report.

Police said Dennis tested positive for alcohol and EMS workers evaluated him and determined he was not injured but placed him on a "back board" as a precautionary measure against possible internal trauma and he was transported to Albany Medical Center along with his two passengers.

The report states that Dennis was "Alert and logically consistent during a roadside interview."

Police said that his vehicle was searched prior to being towed and that officers discovered an open bottle of "Seagram's Seven," the report states, and the homeowner of the property where the vehicle struck submitted an estimate of damages to police.

• Tammy L. Zessin, 46, of 3

Winnie Ave., Ravana, was arrested by Bethlehem police for DWI; operating a motor vehicle with a BAC of 0.08 percent or greater; failure to obey a police officer; and failure to keep right.

Police said Zessin was driving west on Delaware Avenue in Delmar when they observed her failing to keep right. The officer on patrol activated his emergency lights but Zessin continued to drive west, according to the arrest report, and she proceeded to take a left onto Elsmere Avenue and continued driving until she stopped near Herber Avenue.

After failing a field-sobriety test and testing positive for alcohol, Zessin was taken into custody without incident and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department for processing.

She was scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on June 2.

• Prince Dobre, Jr., 33, of 61 Liebel Street, second floor, Albany, was arrested by Bethlehem Police on a bench warrant for DWI.

Police said Dobre was located by the Albany Police Department within city limits and discovered that he was wanted on an active arrest warrant out of the Town of Bethlehem.

He was transported to the city line where Bethlehem police officers took custody of him and transported him to the Bethlehem Police Department, according to the arrest report. Dobre was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer and released on a \$500 cash bail, the report states.

He was scheduled to return to court on June 2.

• Guilderland Police arrested Jennifer A. Sagendorf, 30, of 3091 E. Lydius St. in Schenectady, on several charges including felony criminal possession of stolen property in the fourth degree, on Thursday, May 21, according to police reports.

Sagendorf was also arrested on charges of petit larceny, permitting a minor into a sex/drug establishment and criminal possession of a controlled substance, all misdemeanors. Guilderland honors 19 retiring workers

Employees served a combined 407 years

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This year's Guilderland Central School District retirees have dedicated 407 years to the district, Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources Lin Severance proudly proclaimed on Tuesday, May 26.

The Guilderland Central School District recognized 19 retirees at its meeting and gave those who could attend the meeting plaques to commemorate their service.

"These individuals have demonstrated years of service, dedication and commitment," Severance said.

Severance said the 407 years of service to Guilderland represents 88.7 percent of those retirees' total years in the field of education, showing how dedicated to the district they have been over the years. She pointed to the "outstanding characteristics, dedication, responsibility and commitment," of the retirees as cause for mention.

"Thank you so much for your many years of service," Severance said.

Superintendent John McGuire spoke of the "bittersweet" reality of retirement, and jokingly alluded to jealousy on his part.

Condominiums get 'greener'

Keystone Builders present changes to plan on Delaware Avenue

Keystone Builders presented some changes to the Bethlehem Planning Board that will see the footprint of one condominium building shrink and allow the green space on the site to grow.

The Bethlehem Planning Board listened to Steve Bolduc present changes to his proposed 40-unit high-end condo plan along Delaware Avenue on Tuesday, May 19, and the board unanimously adopted them shortly thereafter.

Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli said a small amount of wetlands near one of the proposed buildings was at the root of the changes at 445 Delaware Ave., which is still owned and operated by Robert Verstandig.

"The units are already pretty generous, so they took the largest building and reduced the footprint," Morelli said. "Instead of surface parking, he has proposed building a six-car garage for the building."

Plans now call for the building to be reduced by a little over 1,000 square feet, which will now be turned mostly into green space, according to Morelli.

Bolduc has said he is looking to market the condos between the \$375,000 and \$450,000 range and is currently preparing to submit an application to the attorney general's office for approval on the project.

He said the plans were minor and the move was mostly a formality.

"It was pretty much a no-brainer, but we wanted to get it on paper," he said. "We are now building the six-car garage where a storage shed used to be, which will help out with parking, and we combined the storage with a maintenance garage."

"It worked out really well actually," said Bolduc.

The plans have been in the works for nearly three years and

Town plans for earlier start

Planning Board will begin an hour earlier, at 6 p.m., on June 16

The Bethlehem Planning Board will now begin at 6 p.m. instead of 7 starting at its Tuesday, June 16, meeting.

Town officials said the move isn't permanent at this point, but they will make a final determination in a couple months on whether or not to keep the new schedule. The meetings are typically held in the Town Hall Auditorium or across the hall in the first floor conference room at Town Hall, 445 Delaware Ave., Delmar.

Planning Board Chairman George Leveille said the change may improve residential turnout.

"We're just trying to create some consistency with the town meetings," Leveille said about the time change. "There's not a significant number of people at our regular meetings except

for public hearings of interest. Moving [meetings] to six certainly wouldn't inhibit it."

Leveille said the new time slot is being used on a "trial basis."

"We're going to give it a try for a couple of months," he said. "The board members are all really flexible and if doesn't create an inconvenience the members or the public then we may recommend keeping it."

The planning board also recently adopted a 10-minute public comment period on agenda items, which is held before each meeting. Residents can typically find the Planning Board's agenda on the town's Web site, www.townofbethlehem.org, on the Friday before each meeting.

Agendas are also provided at each meeting at Town Hall or can be obtained by the board's administrative assistant, Nanci Moquin, 439-4955 ext. 1158.

have been before the Planning Board since February of 2008. A public hearing for the project was held in March and the board has given the proposal approval, so the final step is to get the okay from the attorney general's office.

"I believe he'd like to start this fall," Morelli said, "or by early next spring."

Verstandig still holds title to the property and is waiting until Keystone Builders gets final approval before he officially sells the property to him. Verstandig is currently expanding his Selkirk operation of greenhouses on Creble Road, a project that Keystone Builders is working on.

Bolduc wants to transform the 5-acre Delaware Avenue lot into nine, two-story buildings with 40 condominiums. A little more than 2 of the 5 acres would remain green space. There are greenhouses, a florist shop and a home currently on the lot, which are all slated for demolition in

Bolduc's plans.

Bolduc said he won't start construction until he has buyers for the condos, but that there has been a lot of interest in project. He plans to fill up each building with buyers before he starts construction and build out the property in sections and phases.

"It's tough because we can't market it at this time," he said about not having final approval from the state. "But I do get calls about the project."

Planning Board Chairman George Leveille called the changes "very minor amendments."

"It's a more efficient use of the land," he said. "The parking concerns I understand, and I think there is plenty of spillover parking and public parking nearby."

Morelli agreed.

"They were fairly minor changes, but they were good ones," he said. "I think it's going to be a really nice project."

Learning the 'FACS' about middle school

The only thing I understand about middle school is that I understand very little about middle school.

I have learned that "middle school" should not be referred to as "junior high." When my daughter was still in elementary school, I would accidentally commit this error. "Next year, when you're in junior high," I'd start to say. She'd cut me off, "Mom, it's called middle school."

I knew that. I really did. It's just that when I was a kid, the place I went after graduating elementary school was called junior high. The phrase is in my long-term memory, so it's more likely to resurface, than, say, anything that has happened this week or even in the last five minutes. Luckily, once Rachel got to middle school, she accepted the fact that the phrase "junior high" was likely to keep slipping from my lips, and it soon garnered no reaction from her.

It's possible that "junior high" and "middle school" have a lot in common, but I just need to brush up on the new terminology in order to recognize the similarities.

For example, the class names have changed. Home Economics (aka Home Ec) is now called

Family and Consumer Sciences (FACS). It took a while for me to remember what the acronym FACS stood for. I'd say, "Family and Community Service" or "Family and Contract Studies." Finally I gave up and just called it "the class formerly known as Home Ec." I like the new name FACS, but it's hard to rewire my brain to remember it.

Speaking of wiring, the kids now take "Technology," which was called "Shop" in my day, as in "Wood Shop" or "Metal Shop." Yes, when I was in junior high, girls were allowed to take Shop. What I remember of Shop was big tables, power tools and goggles. I also remember setting type and making personalized stationery using a printing press.

In today's middle schools, the kids call the class "Tech." Every other week, Rachel has to summarize and present an article on a new technology. She searches on-line magazines for interesting topics. The only restriction is that "a new computer game" doesn't count as "new" technology. The article doesn't even have to be about computers at all. "Mom,

a pencil is also technology," Rachel told me. Did she think that pencils were invented when I was her age?

I don't think my daughter can imagine a time without pencils or computers. On the other hand, I don't think she's ever seen a filmstrip. We watched a lot of filmstrips when I went to school. We also watched some videos, but we did not use computers.

Rachel's been using computers since preschool. Middle schoolers take a class called "keyboarding." Keyboarding is the modern word for typing. Typing wasn't offered when I was in junior high. I had to wait until high school, where I learned to "keyboard" on a manual typewriter and was sometimes lucky enough to use an electric one. If I made a mistake, I had to use "white out," which is known today as "the delete key."

Middle school kids today have fancy scientific calculators to perform math functions. Parents

fear that these (and other) pricey electronic devices will be lost. In my day, the most expensive item kids brought to school was their retainers from the orthodontist.

Kids today can take regular math, advanced math or double advanced math in middle school. If you double seventh grade math (2 x 7), then do you end up with grade 14 math? And exactly when do you get to grade 14? Is it two years after you graduate high school (grade 12 + 2), which would fall during your sophomore year of college? Or is it after you've eaten too much "pi"?

The answer is "none of the above." Seventh graders taking double advanced math are actually taking ninth grade math, also known as algebra. In middle school, math is not described by topic area. It's called math 7 and math 7y and math 7z. I've heard in high school, the kids take "Math A" and "Math B." It's quite possible those terms are secret codes for geometry and trigonometry. I admit it's a lot easier to say "A" and "B," though I have to wonder why the schools use letters instead of numbers to describe math.

Some classes have retained their names in the transition from junior high to middle school. These include Social Studies and English.

Thankfully, the English teachers still push concepts like correct spelling and complete sentences. They even require the students to write using complete words, which may be increasingly challenging for the "text messaging" generation.

As a learning exercise, Rachel's teacher shows the class

a sentence or a short paragraph. The text contains grammar and spelling errors. The students take turns pointing out the errors and offering corrections.

My favorite part of this is that the teacher uses an overhead projector to conduct the exercise. The text is written on a transparency and projected onto a screen at the front of the room. One of the students is selected to stand at the projector and use a marker to make the corrections identified by the class.

Overhead projectors and grammar lessons - I had those in junior high!!

The middle school Social Studies teachers also promote writing skills. They assign projects called Document Based Questions (DBQs). The students have to review a set of documents about a particular topic, answer a few questions related to each document and then write an essay.

I told my daughter that the skills involved in completing a DBQ - reading comprehension, analysis, summarizing information, drawing and justifying conclusions - are skills that she will use throughout her life.

"I handle DBQs all the time," I explained excitedly. "For example, it could be related to applying for a grant, justifying a new hire or developing a program policy."

None of this sounded appealing to Rachel. In fact, the prospect of DBQ-like assignments following her as she grows elicited nothing short of dismay.

I saw that I had taken the wrong approach. She was not interested in the long-term benefits of homework. I changed the subject.

"What's going on in gym class these days?" I asked.

She answered, "Mother, it's called PE."

Clearly, I still have a lot to learn about middle school. Only by the time I catch on, my daughter will be moving on to senior high, er, I mean high school.



N.S. Repubs pick slate

Board candidate expects possible cross-endorsement

New Scotland Republicans have picked a slate for November's elections, and they have thrown support behind Karen Moreau, a local attorney with tax-law experience in the state Senate for supervisor.

One candidate has also "heard through the grapevine" he may be receiving support from town Democrats.

New Scotland Republican Chair Joseph DeFronzo said the Republicans are supporting Moreau for supervisor against incumbent Tom Dolin.

Moreau is a lawyer who worked with the state Senate from 2001 until earlier this year.

"We needed a candidate and she was there," DeFronzo said. He said he was unaware Moreau was seeking the position until she showed up for the interview.

Moreau, of Fiera Bush, is a 20-year resident of the town and has practiced law for since 1987. She is a mother of five, which is her biggest priority, and she is concerned with keeping property tax down and building a tax base in New Scotland, she said.

She is running for supervisor to give voters a choice.

"I think that I have a lot I can add to the discussion," she said.

The New Scotland Republican Party is also backing incumbent Town Board member Doug LaGrange for his position and Chuck Voss, a planning board member, for the other open seat on the town board.

LaGrange said he has interviewed for the Independence Party nomination and has already received the Conservative party bid, but he also has heard a buzz from area Democrats.

"I'm not seeking it, but quite

frankly I've heard through the grapevine there are these people pushing for me," LaGrange said. "I wouldn't turn it down."

He said politics at the local level have frustrated him.

"It shouldn't be about party," he said. "It should be about what's best for the town."

LaGrange said he has voted both ways on may issues and has worked well with Dolin, a Democrat. Dolin and LaGrange have cosponsored a zoning law that would impose a 50,000-square-foot size cap, although that law was not forwarded to the Albany County Planning Board when a vote was taken in April.

He said for some, this year's election will focus mainly on the retail size-cap issue. While he acknowledges it is an important matter in the town, and it is part of a broader zoning issue that has been at the forefront of the town's agenda for years, it is not the only important issues facing the town.

"There's plenty of issues," LaGrange said.

Board member Peg Neri, an incumbent whose seat is up, said she has interviewed for the Conservative and Independence party nominations, although she did not receive the Conservative nod. She said her dedication to small government, fiscal prudence and avoiding duplication of services makes her a good candidate for them.

Neri also said the quality of water, especially in New Salem, has been an issue she wants addressed. This is Neri's first re-election campaign.

Daniel Mackay announced last month he will also seek a seat on the New Scotland Town Board. Mackay is one of the founding members of the New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, an advocacy group that supports a 50,000-square-foot size cap on retail developments.

More mercury found at water plant

Officials: Spill has no known source, may be work of saboteur

The Town of Bethlehem is launching a criminal investigation into a mercury spill at its New Scotland water plant as it finishes removing the last of its outdated water flow meter mercury switches.

Town officials said that last week a small amount of mercury was found at the bottom of a "backwash wastewater manhole" and has since been removed by a hazardous waste removal company.

A release from Town Hall states, "At no time was the drinking water exposed to potential contamination nor was there a risk to public health or safety."

Department of Public Works Commissioner Josh Cansler said a saboteur may be involved.

"These flow meter switches were the last of any equipment used to operate the treatment plant that contained mercury," Cansler said in a prepared statement. "However, our investigation did find additional mercury in a suspicious location and manner, which has triggered an investigation into whether the small amounts found this week are somehow connected in an attempt to hamper our efforts to complete the remediation at the water plant."

The incident has spurred a criminal investigation into the matter and officials said the mercury found has "uncovered evidence of potential tampering."

Cansler it's not known how the mercury got there.

"The flow meters were all intact when they were removed," he said, indicating the mercury didn't come from them. "We've had no [mercury] leaks in over a year."

There are only about a dozen workers in plant that have access to

the area, none of whom have access to the filtered drinking water going out to residents, he said.

"It's not that we think someone did it, but there's no source for it," Cansler said. "I want to be clear that it wasn't anywhere near the water supply."

Town attorney James Potter told *The Spotlight* he was made aware of the situation but that he was not personally handling the matter.

"We sent a police officer out to determine whether it is a criminal matter," he said.

Cansler said the leak was discovered on the morning of Wednesday, May 27, but couldn't reveal the name of who found it because the case is under investigation. He did say that the mercury was visible at the bottom of the manhole where it was discovered.

The last of the mercury flow meters were removed the next day on Thursday.

"We reported that incident as soon as it was discovered and immediately contacted the DEC and the Department of Health," Cansler said.

The original decision to remove the flow meters was the result of a consent order issued last year by the Department of Environmental Conservation after one of the

outdated flow meters leaked mercury onto the floor of the water plant located in New Salem. The meters are from the 1940s.

The town is contemplating the water plant because of its age and the problems associated with it (See related story, page 7). Rick Georgeson, a Region 4 DEC spokesman, told *The Spotlight* on Monday, June 1, that his agency was notified "within the time required," and that it is unknown how long the mercury has been there.

"We had our responders over there at the water plant ... and there was two to four tablespoons of mercury found on the site, which has been removed," said Georgeson. "I understand it [mercury] could have been there for quite some time."

As for the flow meters being replaced under consent order by the DEC, Georgeson said, "We weren't there when they were removed," but that "They were removed by deadline."

The Albany County Department of Health was also on the scene after it was reported and continues to monitor all activities at the treatment plant and the town's reservoir and drinking water supplies. Town officials said that water sampling continues to be conducted on a regular basis.

Good grief!

As this is being written, many New Yorkers are eagerly waiting by their mailboxes for a decision from their town's Board of Assessment Review.

One day a year, usually in late May or early June, any resident of a municipality can make the claim that the assessed value of his or her property is too high. If you are one of those, you have no doubt gone through the wonderful experience of filing a grievance of your assessment and may have even had the fortune to appear in front of the review board for the allotted 5-minute period most municipalities allow for a homeowner.

Grievance processes vary somewhat by municipality, but, for the most part, they consist of a few steps in succession: a notice of grievance that must be filed with the assessor's office before "grievance day," a hearing before the Board of Assessment Review and the resulting decision, usually mailed after the board reviews your assessment packet some weeks after the hearing.

If you don't like the decision, then you are free to litigate at will.

Like most things involving government in New York, the process is cryptic, arbitrary, secluded and slow. And, like most things involving government in New York, there is a great deal of conflict involved.

You see, every BAR in every municipality in New York has one thing in common: they all have a horse in the race.

The BAR consists of three to five members appointed by the legislative body of the assessing unit. Assessors and members of their staff are not allowed to be on the BAR, but they must attend hearings. So, the taxing entity — who will gain or lose tax revenue based on the BAR's decision — appoints people to the BAR. It is hardly impartial, especially considering that, for the most part, these decisions are made with the barest of data available — maybe a couple of pictures of the property, a quick hearing, some comparable property assessments — and there you go. Your taxes are set for the next year.

And, what if, after all the time and resources you put into battling your assessment, the powers that be still uphold their assessment? What if the value, though deemed fair, is too high for you to afford your taxes?

Well, the state Office of Real Property Services recommends you take it up with every single taxing entity that affects you.

Form its Web site: "If you feel as though your assessment accurately reflects the market value of your property, but you still feel that your property taxes are rising unfairly, you may wish to address this matter with the taxing jurisdictions — school board, county legislature, city council, town board, fire district and other special districts — that impose taxes in your community."

Good luck with that.

Health care system needs mending

I had a little accident a few weekends ago — I burned my leg. The burn got infected. And then there were several other complications from treating the infection. Since then, I have gone to the doctor's office several times, been prescribed several medications, and have purchased countless bandages, tapes and gauzes. The burn is finally "healed," but the scar it's left behind is pretty ugly.

Initially, when I was just having the burn on my leg treated, I went to the doctor's office twice. Those two visits to the doctor cost me \$40, antibiotics another \$30, and all of the dressings have cost about \$60 (who knew gauze was so pricy!). The personal and financial impact would have been far higher if I didn't have health insurance. A trip to the doctor without health insurance would break my weekly budget. In fact, I probably wouldn't have gone to the doctor (despite significant pain) until things became much worse. Whereupon, my infection, I am told, might have spread deeper and wider, making it more difficult and expensive to cure. I have heard tales of uninsured patients who generate lifelong indebtedness to belatedly treat complications caused by delay in seeking medical treatment.

When my friends and I were little, reaching adulthood was daunting. What would we be when we grew up? What would it be like to live on our own? What would it be like to pay bills? We worried about finding our callings in life (and many of us are still working on it). We did not imagine the trouble many of us would have in finding work in today's current economic crisis. Needless to say, it didn't even occur to most of us that we should worry about having

proper medical coverage. My peers who lack health insurance sometimes rationalize that it isn't a priority. "We're young and healthy," they say. "How often do we really need to go to the doctor? How likely are we to injure ourselves that badly or to require non-elective surgery?"

True, many minor ailments can be treated, or at least relieved, with a quick trip to the drug store. Some of us compromise, insuring only the cost of a highly unlikely major catastrophe — like getting hit by a bus — with less costly insurance that stipulates huge deductibles.

Getting back to my burn — thankfully not a major catastrophe — I question what I would have done if my injury required medical intervention beyond my truly meager means to pay for it. Would I have sucked it up and gone to the doctor in a timely fashion? I'm not sure that I wouldn't have tried to wait it out before letting my family know that I was getting into trouble. I'm so grateful that cost was not a major factor in my decision.

Health coverage is something that my friends and I are talking about a lot these days. It is nearly unattainable for many of us. I remember countless arguments with my parents after I graduated from college because I was tempted to accept job offers that didn't provide health insurance. After all, how often did I go to the doctor's anyway? My parents wouldn't hear of it.

Now, two years later, I have heard tales of peers (who did not land jobs offering health insurance or salary adequate to pay for health insurance) who suffered unexpected illness or injury. One friend tripped in his apartment and badly injured his face. The stitches and follow-up were costly. The patient works

full time, but could not afford insurance. He could not afford the hospital's and surgeon's fees, but also could not accept permanent facial mutilation that would result from lack of medical care. Months later, he and the hospital are still working out how he is going to pay for his treatment.

Another friend, a recent college graduate, was seeking a full time job. One afternoon, he suddenly became ill with acute appendicitis. His college health insurance had already terminated. The price of his day in the emergency room (consultations, laboratory tests, a CT scan of his belly), the visit to the operating room (hospital fees, anesthesiologist's fees, surgeon's fees), was far more than he could possibly afford on his own. Luckily, his family was able to sign up for COBRA (Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act) health insurance, a temporary extension of his college policy. The cost of his care was covered. However, the COBRA plans cost about \$500 a month. His family had seriously considered not applying for the COBRA policy, considering its high cost and the likelihood that he would find a job with health insurance before he had a medical problem. He was lucky to have been insured, when many others are not.

As I look at the ugly scar on my leg — an unsightly reminder of the trouble I've been through this past month — I feel mighty lucky. The injury was not major, though it did require early medical care. I was fortunate to have ready access to medical care, as I have health insurance provided by my employer. More and more people are going without the healthcare coverage they need but cannot afford, and many are going to get into big trouble for something they have no real control over.

Society had better look at this problem with new vigor.

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Bethlehem talks finance, pensions

Town comptroller presents first quarter numbers on sales tax and department spending

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Preparing for the report from the state comptroller on the gut-wrenching drop in the state pension fund, Bethlehem officials listened to its own comptroller give a presentation on first quarter number for the town's budget.

Its no secret that the sales tax drought is causing an Albany County crisis in the form of a \$20.5 million shortfall, but a state pension fund dive could even further the financial squeeze on local municipalities. Supervisor Jack Cunningham said despite the one-two punch the town is now facing, he pointed to a strong fund balance and the fact that spending is down.

Still, he warns of a tough year ahead.

"The departments heads have been working very hard to keep spending down, working with what they have and stretching out every last dollar," Cunningham said. "We spent less this year than we did last year."

At the Wednesday, May 27, Town Board meeting, town comptroller Susan Traylor presented the first quarter financial numbers that showed, although revenue was down, so were expenditures.

"I want to give all department heads a 'Thank you,'" Cunningham said after the presentation. "I appreciate everyone's hard work on this."

Traylor reported on the town's four main funds: the general fund, highway fund, water fund and sewer fund. She reported that the town's general fund is around \$4.5 million.

First quarter sales tax and mortgage tax are down, which Traylor described as "a significant portion of the town's budget."

The big topic of concern was the town's fund balance, which Cunningham likened to a savings account for an individual's personal budget and Traylor described as a rainy day fund.

"We are trying to keep that fund balance in that 15 to 20 percent range We keep it there for a rainy day when we know there will be uncertain times and times will be tough," Traylor said. "We had some recent news, we just heard the pension short fall is going to hit us in a big way."

Traylor told this board on the Wednesday before state Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli's Friday, May 29, announcement

DiNapoli announced the New

York State Common Retirement Fund has decreased 26.3 percent this year mostly because of the stock market downturn. The assets of the fund are now only valued at \$109.9 billion compared to the \$154 billion it was worth this time last year.

DiNapoli called this "the worst year in anybody's memory," pointing to a 33-40 percent drop in the major U.S. stock indices over the past fiscal year.

Traylor said from 2006 to 2007 Bethlehem had a 3 percent increase in total revenue but only a 0.5 percent increase of revenue from 2007 to 2008.

"We're micromanaging out expenditures in each department," she said. "We're hoping we'll be able to weather the storm."

As Bethlehem gears up to create a new budget for 2010 it faces a variety of infrastructure needs and improvements, not to mention maintenance, at a time when New York is hemorrhaging money and placing more financial responsibilities on local and county government that have less funding to work with.

"This year we're looking at an economic downturn," Cunningham said, but added a positive tone to what looks to be a mostly grim financial outlook. "From my perspective it's too early to tell."

The supervisor has initiated a hiring freeze at Town Hall and has eliminated three positions from the town's payroll, one of which was a non-replacement and another was a cutting, a proposed addition to the police force. The third was the elimination of a call center job.

There was some good news to report; Cunningham said gasoline was budgeted at \$4 a gallon last year, which has led to savings, and the town's fund balance is around 20 percent of the overall budget. The state comptroller recommends municipalities to have a fund balance around 15 percent.

"That's going to be very beneficial to the residents of Bethlehem," he said.

Traylor added to the good news by reporting that Bethlehem would receive FEMA funds for the December ice storm that knocked out power lines and down limbs across the region. She also reported a drop in the town's debt service.

However there will be more debt service increases to come.

Bethlehem is amidst a \$5.2 million dollar sewer pump station upgrade, for which it has only borrowed \$2 million for so far. Cunningham warned that there may be other, bigger bonding projects in the not-so-near future.

"The water treatment plant has reached its useful life," he said. "The

water plant itself has to be replaced. With all of the problems we've been having with it and the new EPA standards, the upgrades are so costly that it would be more cost effective to build a new plant."

Cunningham said the water plant is a necessary investment for the town and could be built to serve all of the town's future needs.

As for DiNapoli's announcement, Cunningham said the area has been somewhat insulated from the greater national economic crisis and that Bethlehem still remains "financially strong."

DiNapoli warned at his pension announcement that the market downturn would result in higher pension contribution rates for employers in the coming years. He has proposed legislation to give state and local government governments an option to manage the expected increases and spread them out over a longer period of time.

His proposal was met with opposition on the state-level.

Gov. David Paterson sent out a statement after DiNapoli's announcement saying, "The increases in employer pension contributions announced by the Comptroller today will have a devastating impact on already overburdened local property taxpayers. I am concerned that the Comptroller's proposal does nothing to mitigate these additional burdens."

Town auditors haven't finalized the Bethlehem numbers presented by Traylor, but another finalized financial report will be issued along with another Town Board presentation on Wednesday, June 10.

All of the other board members had questions and comments for Traylor and thanked department heads for controlling spending. Councilman Mark Hennessey pointed to the strong fund balance as very good news and something the town should attempt to preserve.

"If anytime it's raining," he said, "it's raining now."

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WWII hero remembered, celebration in Altamont

On Sunday, May 31, the Village of Altamont hosted a 100th Birthday Party for John F. Finn, a Medal of Honor recipient, the nation's highest military honor, according to the Village of Altamont's Web site.

Mr. Finn is the oldest surviving recipient of the Medal of Honor and was the first man to receive the medal in WWII. He received his medal from Admiral Nimitz for valor at Kanohe Bay, Hawaii during the attack on Pearl Harbor, it states.

Two of other recipients were in Altamont, Francis Currey, of

Selkirk, who is New York state's only surviving recipient from WWII and Nicholas Oresko, who lives in New Jersey, according to the Web site.

Currey received his medal for acts on Dec. 21, 1944 at Malmedy in Belgium. Oresko, a Master Sergeant, who served in the Army, Company C, 94th Division received his medal for near Teltington, Germany on Jan. 23, 1945.

The Altamont Fire Department, Veterans groups, students from local schools, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts attended the event.

FMS student stopped before semifinal's at spelling bee

Farnsworth Middle School student Luxi Peng did not advance to the semi-final round of the Scripps National Spelling Bee in Washington D.C. held from Monday, May 25, to Friday, May 29.

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Volunteer groups share ideas, support services

Community Caregivers and Community Hospice work together to provide care

Two local volunteer organizations are teaming up to provide services to residents facing severe illness.

The Community Hospice of Albany County and Community Caregivers are continuing their partnership by sharing information and ideas and working together, according to representatives from both organizations.

They recently viewed a presentation from hospice volunteer and communication specialist Donald Stake.

Stake, a public relations specialist for the Community Hospice, presented an informational seminar on Wednesday, May 13, called "Live Life to the Fullest," which provided insight into his experience as a volunteer. Several hospice and Community Caregiver volunteers attended to exchange ideas and discuss misconceptions about hospice, Stake said.

"Our missions are similar in that we both want to support people in their homes," said Linda Laudato, program director for the

respite program at Community Caregivers.

She said education and outreach programs are an important part of its mission.

Community Caregivers is a Guilderland based community service organization that "enables individuals of all ages to maintain their independence, dignity and quality of life within their homes and communities. It was founded in 1994," according to information from the organization.

They offer two or three education programs each month, she said.

Karen Berney, regional director of Albany County said hospice is important for both the physical and emotional needs of those facing serious illness.

She said Community Hospice provides end-of-life care for serious, but not always terminal, illnesses. They provide nursing, social work, special care, home health, aide, volunteer care and spiritual support, Berney said.

In addition to Albany County, Community Hospice services Saratoga, Schenectady, Rensselaer Columbia and Green counties, as well as the city of Amsterdam, Berney said.

The Albany County office,

located in Colonie, handles an average of 80 to 100 in-home patients and 60 to 80 nursing home patients on a given day, Berney said.

Laudato said Community Caregivers and the Community Hospice are separate entities, but often have an overlap in residents receiving their services, causing them to work closely together.

"If hospice is appropriate, we refer to hospice," Laudato said. "We work together, filling in the gaps, but not overlapping. We feel this such an important resource."

Stake, who presented information to a group of volunteers at the Community Caregivers office at 2113 Western Ave., Suite 4, and said there were several misconceptions he noticed while talking with the attendees. He said many of them did not know hospice involved in-home care.

She said one woman at the meeting was glad to learn that.

"She found out happily that we urge that as an option," Stake said. "If that's possible, we want to make it possible."

He said one of the most important themes he learned as a volunteer is that hospice is "not

about death and dying, but it's about living."

He said the family relationships, the friends and "unfinished business" are just as important as the physical care hospice can provide.

Stake volunteers in Schenectady and said one woman he was caring for recently passed this weekend.

On the day the woman died, she expressed her thanks to one of her daughters for all of her work caring for her, and that, Stake said, meant it was a "good day."

He said he urges people not to wait until they are lying on their deathbed to mend broken relationships.

Laudato said Stake's experience and stories are important to pass along to all those who care for those near death.

"It's important to hear, to pass tips on to volunteers to learn from Don's experience. [Volunteer's] will be more comfortable visiting."

"The stories are amazing," Berney said.

Berney said everyone has the right to die in comfort. She said the longer a patient is in hospice, the more time the benefits of the

program have to take hold.

Sometimes people "graduate" hospice, and become ineligible for its benefits, Berney said.

Stake said hospice allows both the patient and family to relax, and they feed off each other, making the process easier for everyone.

"Hospice care is for a whole person in a whole situation," Stake said. "It's a holistic approach."

Laudato said she has had personal experiences with hospice, and her mother has a "wonderful experience," but she also described it as a valuable asset to the community.

"To have control over your dying days, it just doesn't get much better than that," she said.

Sometimes, Laudato said, the patient's illness becomes so severe, and they are experiencing so much pain, that hospitalization is recommended.

"A caregiver reaches a limit and they just can't do it anymore," she said.

Community Hospice offers its services at the Inn at St. Peter's, which is a 14-bed facility and has hospital level pain management equipment, but still offers the services of hospice.

N.S. hires wind consultant

Considering wind-energy moratorium, awaiting county advice

The town of New Scotland has hired a consultant to help put the provisions for a wind-energy moratorium in place, but has not enacted a moratorium at this time, according to town officials.

The town hired Todd Mathes as a consultant from Whiteman, Osterman and Hanna, to help work out the legalities of wind

energy generators.

Mathes was unavailable for comment.

Board member Peg Neri, who has spearheaded efforts to obtain information about wind turbines, said there are positive and negative effects of the turbines, and the town is looking into them more.

"They are an abundant, renewable and non-polluting source of energy," Neri said.

She said that there are no plans for any commercial wind turbines in the town, New Scotland is "reserving the right" to put a moratorium in place to study the matter and put zoning laws in place. The town does not have statute regulating commercial wind turbines at this time, she said. It is permitted as an "accessory structure," for agricultural use, but is not a

permitted use in the town, she added.

Neri said the wind turbines can offer an "abundant, renewable and non-polluting source of energy," but also has impacts on noise, wildlife, view-shed, and ground erosion.

"The town board is attempting to learn about the issue. We need to be objectively informed. We are not endeavoring to facilitate wind-farm development in the Town of New Scotland," Neri said.

Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said hiring a consultant is a step in the right direction.

"We certainly do need some legal help," Dolin said.

Dolin said he has "nothing against Mr. Mathes, but my pick would have been Peter Henner." Henner has a law office in Fiera Bush.

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Delmar Saturday Farmer's Market to open

A new Saturday farmers market at Bethlehem Middle School to kickoff on June 6

Sick of traveling to other farmers market for locally grown produce, a group of Bethlehem residents decided to bring a market right here for everyone to enjoy.

Spinning the take on the old real estate adage, the rationale behind the new Delmar Saturday Farmer's Market is "local, local, local."

A new farmers market will be held every Saturday on the grounds of the Bethlehem Middle School, 322 Kenwood Ave., starting on June 6 and running until Oct. 31. The market will feature locally grown produce, fresh meats from local livestock and crafts and artwork created by local artists.

The exception to the local rule will be handcrafts created in Third-World nations for "fair trade," meaning the money is sent back to the country and workers there are given a fair wage for their work, helping to keep them out of poverty.

In addition to the market's regular goods, every morning starting at 9 a.m., breakfast and refreshments will be on sale from the Four Corners Luncheonette, the Java Jazz Café and Bakery and the Perfect Blend. The menus will

consist of local produce, eggs and meats.

There will also be other vendors such as a local masseuse offering chair massages and educational opportunities such as a kid's table that children can participate in ongoing activities and guest speakers to talk about farming and environmental issues.

The market will run until 1 p.m. each Saturday and live music will be provided.

One of the markets' founders Paul Tick said the interest and volunteer support has been "outstanding."

"I've been part of Troy's farmers market for a number of years with a table for wind energy," said Tick. "At the Troy market I would always run into people from Delmar."

Tick decided to make locally available goods and produce even more local. "Back in February, I said it's time."

Tick is the market's manager and also serves on the board of directors for the not-for-profit organization.

All of the farmers and artists are and their wares and products are coming from a roughly 50-mile radius of Delmar, according to Tick.

"We're trying to keep this as local as possible," he said, adding that the location is a major feature for market. "We're thrilled that the school district has been super supportive."

The Bethlehem Middle School Assistant Principle Mark Warford

is the president of the board of directors for the market.

"This is going to be a great thing for the whole town," he said about the market while being interviewed about his initiative to create an organic garden on school grounds to help supplement the school's cafeteria. "Everyone's really excited about it."

Another board member Agnes Zellin said the market will provide a viable local food alternative through much of the year.

"As the season progresses you'll be seeing all the fresh fruits and vegetables that are being grown in our area and hope to see some very good crops," Zellin said.

"It's all local, you're not going see papayas or pineapples there," she said.

She said it's all about the community. "The whole point of this is to build a sustainable, attractive community for everyone to enjoy," said Zellin. "The enthusiasm has really been incredible. ... It's going to be a lot of great people coming together."

Zellin concluded, "What people can expect to find is a variety of vendors and most importantly, the farmers themselves."

Jean Gerbini, who is also a member of the board, agreed with Zellin's community assessment.

"The notion behind it is that food dollars will stay in the community and help our neighbors during hard times,"

she said. "Although I tend to pay a little bit more for produce at a farmers market, but it is so fresh and so much better than what you can get from a regular market."

Tick said those interested in participating in the market, becoming a sponsor of it, or just looking for more information can go to www.delmarket.org. The Web site outlines the purpose of the market and what people can expect to find. It also gives some visibility to sponsors for listing them and giving out their Web sites and contact information.

It also allows people to discover a little bit about the farms and artists they are buying from. "In the last few days I've still been getting plenty of calls," Tick said.

The Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce is one of the sponsor's of the market, and Chamber President Marty DeLaney said she's happy to welcome the market to town, posing the question, "Need more reasons why we're lucky to live and work in

Bethlehem? Two weekly Farmers Markets: Tuesday afternoons and Saturday mornings."

DeLaney said having the market will be a big win-win for town.

"The working farms in this area provide fresh produce and Farmers Markets, bring together market vendors, local not for profits, entertainment, chair massage and so much more," she said. "And it's a good opportunity for your kids to meet the growers and learn where our food comes from."

A full list of vendors, crafts, artists, goods and sponsors are available at the organizations Web site.

Gerbini said she will probably be "running into" a lot more people at the farmers market.

"I've been going to farmers markets for several years," she said. "I don't think I've been to a farmers market where I didn't run into at least two or three people I know."

Students portray famous historical figures for final project

Roger Maris, Mickey Mantle and Michael Jackson roamed the halls of Guilderland High School on Wednesday, May 27 — or rather, their impersonators did as part of the school's "11X class," a hybrid English and Social Studies course.

Students were asked to create a "living museum" where they portrayed American historical figures as part of their final project.

The students answered questions, discussed their subjects at length and displayed extensive visual aides to help viewers gain an understanding of their respective subjects.

Erin McNamara, who teaches the English portion of the class, said students and staff have really grown to enjoy the project over its six-year history.

For the first two years the presentations were contained to the classroom, but McNamara said the quality of work was too high to be kept a secret. It was presented and open to the public in the New Gym at Guilderland High School on May 27.

"It's too good not to be shared," she said. "It's needs to be accessible."

She said the students were required to find characters from American history and literature that "impacted the societal view of culture."

"It doesn't have to be a good person either," she added. She pointed out infamous bandits Bonnie and Clyde made appearances at the living museum.

She said the students were encouraged to choose people that were the first of their kind, and that "landed a spot in history."

The students choose an array of characters, from a number of genres.

Juniors Christian O'Brien and Matt Wyland chose to represent famous New York Yankees Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris, who chased Babe Ruth's single season

home-run record in 1961. Maris eventually broke the record hitting 61 home runs that year.

O'Brien, who said he has loved the Yankees his whole life, pointed to Billy Crystal's big-screen interpretation, "61*", of the chase for Ruth's record, as inspiration for his character.

"It is one of my favorite movies," O'Brien said. "I love the Yankees."

Wyland said he appreciated having the freedom the project allowed, and getting to choose from any of American history's vast influential characters.

"It's been a lot of fun," he said.

Music was another popular genre for students, as several of them chose famous musicians — alive and dead.

Kevin Collins, a junior, said he choose Grateful Dead front-man Jerry Garcia because he was a "pioneer," one of the recommended qualities for the students to seek in their choices, and said he was great musician. He joked that the fans of the Grateful Dead, appropriately named Dead Heads, are interesting, and helped him create his display.

"Dead Head's are a lot of fun," Collins said.

Collins had a copy of Garcia's biography, "Dark Star" on hand, and touted he has read it several times. He was prepared to quote information readily upon request, he said.

"If I wanted to, I could have come in and talked off the top of my head," Collins said.

Rebecca Vega, also a junior, made her contribution to the museum as the so-called "King of Pop," Michael Jackson.

"He's one of the greatest singers of all time," she said. "He's influenced all of the current pop singers."

Kim Wyland, Matt's mom, who was working as a volunteer at the event, said she supports the 11X program and the living museum because it allows the students to take a hands-on approach to learning.

"It's a great educational opportunity for the students to learn not only about the person they are portraying or studying, but the others in the exhibit as well," she said.

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Teacher wants to bring ailing mother home Vandals

Injury abroad left Kier Aspin's mother in coma

Farnsworth Middle School Teacher Kier Aspin wants to fly his mother home from Egypt. The problem though, is that his mother is in unstable medical condition, slipping in and out of consciousness, and to do so would run close to \$100,000 he said.

Kier's mother, Mary, and her husband were traveling to Egypt on vacation in January, he said. While at the Cairo museum on Jan. 13, Mary fell and hit her head, causing her to slip into a coma. Kier said the museum is old, and cluttered, and could have contributed to the accident.

Kier, who taught at the school for 11 years, said although the incident is unsettling, he was comforted by the state-of-the-art medical facility in Cairo is one of the best in the world. She is recovering, and at the "end of the coma scale," but Kier said it's time her family be able to spend time with her.

"It was like Albany [Medical Center's] intensive care unit," he said of the great care she received.

"We're at the point now, [though], where she needs to come home."

His father has been traveling back and forth to take care of routine matters like bills, and his sister, as well as family from England, has come down to visit Mary in Cairo.

Kier said the matter has been difficult on his family, and the high price of bringing Mary to the States, is a serious impediment.

"There's no way she wouldn't be on a plane without a breathing apparatus," Kier said. He said the possibility of insurance reimbursements between \$5,000 and \$20,000 could help mitigate the costs, but a significant amount of money still needs to be raised.

Students and staff at Farnsworth Middle School have stepped up to help out, Keirsaid. They participated in a "casual for a cause" where if you dress down for the day, you would be required to donate to a cause. The cause on Friday, May 22, was Mary Aspin's ride home.

Farnsworth Middle School Principal Mary Summermatter said the initiative started three years ago to help faculty in times of need, and has helped raise many for many charitable causes, including this one.

"Everybody likes to dress casual on a Friday," she said. "Our students wanted to get involved too, so they wore hats for a day."

She said the staff is valued at the middle school, and this is a "truly wonderful way to help out."

A savings account, Wings for Mary, has been set up at the Delmar branch of Citizens Bank at 180 Delaware Ave., near the Aspins' residence, to collect donations to get Mary home.

Kier said his family is planning a meeting with Sen. Charles Schumer's office and has made inquiries in the State Department, to see if it would be possible to have the United States government assist.

Inquiries to Schumer's office about the matter were inconclusive.

Kier said at first, he was reluctant to bring the matter up, and did not want to alert or worry his students and colleagues. He said his visit to Egypt overlapped with a school break in April so he was only gone for a limited number of school days.

"I didn't want anyone to know," he said. "The word is sort of getting out now."

The vehicle parked outside of the home also had an expletive written on its front windshield.

A few houses down, a garage down had "supercalifragilistic-expialodotious," sprayed onto it. At the end of the driveway, a German swastika was sprayed onto a landscaping rock near the mailbox.

A home on Wisconsin Avenue had a vehicle in the driveway sprayed with an "X" on its rear windshield. Police said the owner told them he hadn't heard anything during the night but that his Sirius car radio had been taken from the vehicle.

Another McGuffey home had "No gays" and a homosexual slur sprayed onto the building and officers discovered a beer bottle on the front lawn, which they secured as evidence for possible fingerprints. The owner told officers that the bottle had not been on the lawn the day before.

One vehicle had its driver's side door window "completely painted over" with red spray paint, the report states. There were also license plates that were sprayed painted over in red at

some of the homes.

Although some of the messages were more innocuous, such as the smiley face and "MO" spray-painted onto one McGuffey home, one home had a message written on its garage door that read "You are a [expletive]." On the side of the same home, a homosexual slur was spray painted next to another German swastika. A penis was drawn across the garage doors of another nearby home, according to police reports.

Bethlehem police said they found a number of penises drawn onto the elementary school along with the word "Giles" on the side of the building. With the assistance of a school maintenance worker, officers also discovered a can of red spray paint on the roof of the school, which they believe was used in the crimes.

Property damage estimates are still coming in from homeowners in the area, according to police, but they have listed a preliminary damage report of \$2,900. The Bethlehem Police Department has its youth bureau working on the investigation and is working with the Bethlehem School District and its resource officers.

Police are asking anyone with information regarding the vandalism to call 439-9973.

"Because this is being handled as a personnel matter, all comments are being directed to our town attorney," Beebe said.

Town Attorney James Potter said the alleged tapes were from three years ago and that to his knowledge, no tapes on file at the police department have ever been purposely erased.

"This alleged tape would be roughly three years old to the best of our knowledge," he said. "Everyone who had access or authority over the tapes has been interviewed."

The department currently records over audiotape after 30 days, according to Potter, but that system "wasn't in place back then."

Under a Civil Rights law, police personnel records are confidential and not privy to Freedom of Information Law requests.

Hughes is also claiming that the department brass is targeting him for suspension and possible termination for being vocal about contractual issues, making complaints about a detective and for taking sick leave.

"I find the timing suspicious," he said of his back-to-back 30-day suspension notices, received within the past month. "I am not paranoid, I am not a conspiracy theorist and I can read the writing on the wall. I'm a thorn in their side, I'm starting to be vocal and I'm starting to get agitated."

"What they're trying to do is terminate me," Hughes concluded.

Cunningham told *The Spotlight*

during a Friday night telephone interview that he couldn't comment specifically on the matter because it is currently under investigation, but did confirm he spoke with Hughes about the matter.

"The content of what we talked about is consistent," he said of an internal police investigation. "I can confirm that ... Until the investigation is completed, I cannot comment on it."

He said he contacted counsel after speaking with Hughes.

"After I spoke with Officer Hughes I immediately called our Town Attorney James Potter," Cunningham said. "As soon as I learned of this, I took action with the town."

Cunningham added that the two town attorneys have been conducting an investigation for "some time now," and that they could conclude their findings by next week.

Hughes said he received the intent of interrogation letter two days after speaking with Cunningham and contacted attorney Steve Coffey.

"Two days later I get a letter of notice to interrogate me based on comments that I made to Jack Cunningham," Hughes said.

The Spotlight has obtained copies of the original "notice of intent to conduct interrogation" sent to Hughes by Beebe on May 19. The notice states the police department wanted to question Hughes "in relation to its investigation of certain claims made by you to Supervisor John Cunningham ... in relation to the alleged conduct of Chief Corsi during a phone conversation with a representative of the Albany County Sheriff's Department ... Since this investigation will also involve an inquiry as to how you obtained

the tape, or how it is this information came into your possession; and what town or other systems were accessed by you or on your behalf, and your use of your claimed possession of this tape during your conversation with the town supervisor, and otherwise, your answers and the conduct which will be the subject of this investigation may give rise to disciplinary charges against you for misconduct."

"I never threatened him and I never coerced him," Hughes said of his conversation with Cunningham. He added, "At no time did I ever say that I had a copy of the tape."

Hughes then hired Coffey and did not attend the "interrogation," and had his attorney explain to the town he was not in possession of the tape.

The conversation in which Corsi allegedly uses a racial epithet is said to be taped off the police department's main telephone line, and allegedly records Corsi describing another administrative officer as a racial epithet "in the wood pile," according to a complaint sent to District Attorney David Soares' office.

Cunningham said he had never spoken to Hughes before May 17 and he had not heard about the alleged audiotape before that conversation. Hughes said he made his first attempt at using the chain of command to report Corsi on April 17.

Hughes also said he hand-delivered five copies of a letter describing problems within the police de-

partment to Cunningham's office — one for each member of the Town Board — but that those letters were never disseminated by the supervisor.

Cunningham acknowledged he received the letters, saying Friday night, "On advice of counsel, I did not distribute the letter to the Town Board."

Hughes said he contacted Councilman Sam Messina to see if he had received the letter.

"Chris called me, I knew the name but didn't know the person," Messina said. "He told me he had submitted a letter to the supervisor and the Town Board, and I told him I didn't believe I had received it."

Hughes then asked Messina if he wanted the letter.

"He asked me if I was willing to receive the documents, and I said to him that I would never discourage someone from sending me a letter as a town official," Messina said. "Two days later I went out to my mailbox and there was a letter folded up with several attachments. It wasn't in an envelope."

Aside from the letter to the Town Board concerning strife in the police department, Messina said, "Nothing else was discussed."

The councilman said he isn't aware of the allegations against the chief, but added he understood the reasoning if Cunningham was advised not to deliver the letter.

"For personnel matters, we are not allowed to comment on an ongoing situation," Messina said. "But in this case, I don't have any comment because I really don't know."

Hughes said he went to the supervisor and then the DA's office because the regular chain of com-

mand was "getting me nowhere."

In June of 2005 the Public Integrity Unit was established by the district attorney's office, and it is designed to report directly to the district attorney. It actively investigates cases and tips from constituents with information on possible corruption.

The unit's mission is "To ensure that public officials, law enforcement, white collar criminals, and cyber criminals are held to the same standard of justice as any other."

"We will have only one system of justice here in Albany County," Soares' stated at the unit's inception. "We will prosecute based on the evidence, issues of who you are and who you know will no longer be factored into the decision-making process as to who we indict and eventually who we prosecute."

Hughes, a 13-year veteran of the force, has filed grievances through his union against the two 30-day suspensions, which he called "comical." The suspensions claim Hughes took unwarranted sick time and filed false time records.

The suspensions will be dropped, Hughes said, because he was asked to disclose detailed medical information, which violates state HIPPA Laws and there are no grounds for the other claims. He said the suspensions are indicative of the many internal problems in the department, and added that he isn't alone in his dissatisfaction with how things are currently being run.

"All I want is to be treated fairly, I don't have skeletons in my closet," Hughes said. "I'm not backing down from this."

Corsi did not return numerous calls for comment on this story.

feet, each with significant regional draw, at or near the proposed development caps, is unacceptable in terms of cumulative impacts," the board stated in its decision.

In its denial of the local law, the county board also cites the effects of state and county roadways, law enforcement, health, safety, noise, solid waste production, and "erosion, flooding, leaking and draining problems, the removal or destruction of large quantities of

vegetation or fauna, visual and aesthetic impacts and related impacts to adjacent municipalities."

Michael DeVall, the chair of the county planning board, said the potential effects of a number of small shopping centers in the commercial zone could have a "multiplicity of impacts."

"The primary theme revolves around density," DeVall said. "[We are concerned] in how much is going to happen in one place."

DeVall said the county planning board did not make any official recommendation on a size cap for retail developments. "To our way of thinking, that's more a local is-

sue," DeVall said.

DeVall said the county planning board is charged with officially with looking at issues as they pertain to the broad impacts, and officially offers its approval in county matters, but they can offer guidance for the municipality.

"We try not to interfere with how a locality sees itself. That's not appropriate," DeVall said. "We're not passing some judgment."

The county planning board offered advisory opinions to New Scotland, including seeking a generic environmental impact statement and adding design guidelines to the zoning laws, regardless of a cap size.

Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said the town's Comprehensive Plan already featured similar studies, and said he is unsure of what would be gained from another one.

"With all due respect, to the county," Dolin said. "I'm confused by what we would gain by another assessment."

Town Board member Peg Neri said a traffic study might help get a better handle on the situation.

"I think that a rigorous traffic analysis would satisfy a lot of people," Neri said.

The next meeting of the Town Board is on Wednesday, June 10, and Dolin said the board will discuss possible alternatives to the law. A four-vote supermajority would be needed to pass Local Law B, but cannot be voted on until a public hearing is held.

"We have to go back to the drawing board, have further discussion," Dolin said.

Dolin added that the 85,000 square-foot retail size cap makes Local Law B a "big-box" law, and is hoping to revisit Local Law C, which featured a 50,100 square-foot size cap.

At first glance, the New York State Theatre Institute's version of "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" doesn't seem like a typical play.

There's no central story line. Characters are essentially acting out strips from the beloved Peanuts comic strip, instead of following a plot with a clear beginning, climax and end.

But "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" packs more into those vignettes than it might appear at first glance, several of the people involved with the show say.

"It's very cleverly put together," director Robert Whiteman said. "It gives each character an arc."

Take Charlie Brown. At the outset, the character is "a misfit, an outsider," said Brian Sheldon, who plays the title character. But by show's end, Charlie Brown is warmly accepted by the rest of the gang.

"He comes full circle," Sheldon said.

Julia Franklin, who plays Lucy VanPelt, sees her character undergo a transformation, too — although in Lucy's case, it's a little more humbling.

"Lucy learns about herself a lot," Franklin said. "She learns she has some flaws."

Whiteman believes the depth of a story is a testament to Peanuts creator Charles Schulz, whose strips were about a lot more than cute kids and sassy dogs. Whiteman calls himself a "huge fan" of the Peanuts, and he's been intent on making sure the young cast members of "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" have an idea of just how much Schulz poured into the strip.

To that end, Whiteman looked for strips that captured the essence of each character. He assembled them into "research packets" that he handed out to the actors. He encouraged them to bring their own persona to the role; but "when in doubt, we would refer to the original," he said.

Or, as Sheldon described it, "It's got a lot of Brian in there, and then I put a lot of Charlie Brown in."

Sheldon said he was somewhat of a natural fit for the part. "I have a round head, and I'm a bigger actor," he said.

Unlike Charlie Brown, though, Sheldon has a niche. "I kind of just have been the funny guy all the time," he said.

That led him to give acting a try, and today he is a student in Russell Sage College's Male Actor Apprenticeship Program. He's the oldest cast member in the show, with everyone else still in high school.

"It's been a lot of fun," he said. "They're very funny kids."


Despite the actors' youth, it's a very accomplished group, Whiteman said.

"This cast — it's just incredible," he said. "They are superstars."

That's a credit to time they're willing to spend learning their lines and parts, as well as their experience, he said.

"They've performed with every group in the Capital District," he said.

For Franklin, a senior at the Academy of the Holy Names, those appearances usually come with other members of her family. Franklin and her siblings and parents have performed in more than 30 local productions together.

It's a little strange to be the only Franklin appearing in "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown," she said.

"It's very difficult to not be able to come home and talk to them," she said.

But like Sheldon, she's had a lot of fun with her castmates. In fact, of the six leads, she knew all of them before rehearsals started, so she's still among familiar faces.

"It makes an actor feel very lucky to be an actor," she said.

Whitney, a senior at Niskayuna High School, agreed. A few years ago, he was more apt to be described as an athlete than an actor. He had always thought it would be fun to act, but he was busy with baseball, football and track. Then he hurt his arm, and he had a chance to try acting.

"It just fell into place for me," he said.

Since then, he's been in plays at his high school and with Schenectady Light Opera.

But "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" marks the first time he's done what he calls "real theater."

He laughs as soon as the words are out of his mouth, acknowledging that the concept of the show "is not at all high brow."

But it's a challenge to tackle a role that doesn't stick to the standard storytelling method. "There's no through line," he said. "It's nice for me to try something different."

He's grateful to the internship program for providing such an opportunity. He said he felt he'd gotten all he could out of high school productions, and he's in awe that through NYSTI, he's working with veteran actors and being exposed to so many aspects of theater.

"It's the best thing I could have done," he said.

Whiteman was a NYSTI intern himself back in 1985. Just like Charlie Brown, you could say he has come full circle. He spent his early years as a director before getting a chance to merge his loves of theater and teaching, starting a theater program at Doane Stuart. Today, he is a teacher at Westmere Elementary School in Guiderland in addition to serving in several capacities with NYSTI.

As director of "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown," he strives to stay true to Schulz's vision for the Peanuts characters, but he also took some liberties with costumes and props to "make it relatable."

For instance, "one character uses a cell phone, and one uses a laptop," he said.

He thinks the modifications will keep the show "refreshing and new," while still offering plenty of laughs that are characteristic of the comic strip.

He and others encouraged people to come out if they want a good time.

"It's such a great show," Sheldon said. "It's so iconic. You know who these kids are."

"You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" opens on Friday, June 5, at 8 p.m., running for one weekend only. The Sunday, June 7, show is sold out. All performances will be held at the James L. Meader Little Theatre, 5 Division St., on the campus of Russell Sage College in Troy June 3 to 15. Tickets are \$15 for adults, \$12 for senior citizens and students and \$7.50 for children to age 12. For tickets, call the NYSTI box office at 274-3256 or visit www.nysti.org.





Spartans pitching for 12 hits. Matt Branigan led the hit parade with three RBI on a triple and a single, while Kyle Niehaus contributed three singles.



Bethlehem boys finish third at Class A meet

It took until the final event of the day for the Shaker boys track and field team to secure the Section II, Class A title.

Led by Brian Gallagher's first-place finish, the Blue Bison took two of the top four places in the pentathlon to earn enough points to edge Shenendehowa for the team title at last Thursday's rain-soaked meet in Guilderland. Shaker finished with 134.5 points, while Shen placed second with 131 points.

Gallagher was one of four individuals to win their events for Shaker. Oluebebe Abara edged teammate Jaquell Chandler at the finish line to win the 110-meter high hurdles with a time of 15.3 seconds. Chandler returned the favor by edging Abara for first place in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 55.6 seconds, and Prince Abban finished first in the triple jump with a distance of 45 feet, 3.75 inches.

Shaker also claimed a Section II title in the 3,200-meter relay. The team of Craig Weiss, Christian Delago, Chris Vanzetta and Mike Libruk took first place in a time of 8:08.9; less than one second ahead of runner-up Bethlehem.

Shen's strengths were the long-distance races and the throwing events. Alex Leuchanka finished

first in the 1,600- and 3,200-meter races with respective time of 4:16.1 and 9:331.5, while Evan Palmer swept the shot put and discus events with respective throws of 56 feet, 4.5, inches and 161 feet, 7 inches. Jamie Glover contributed a victory in the 3,000-meter steeplechase in a time of 9:45.5, and Brian Campoli added a first-place finish in the 400-meter dash with a time of 49.7 seconds.

The next five places in the team standings were tightly bunched together. Bethlehem was third with 53 points, while Ballston Spa placed fourth with 49 points. Saratoga Springs finished fifth with 43 points, Albany took sixth place with 42 points and defending champion Colonie was seventh with 40.5 points.

Bethlehem's Jake Platel and Sam Smith successfully defended their Class A titles. Platel won the pole vault by clearing 14 feet, while Smith finished first in the high jump by clearing the bar at 6 feet, 4 inches.

Saratoga's Alex King took first place in the long jump with a leap of 21 feet, 8 inches, and Niskayuna's Louis Serafini won the 800-meter race with a time of 1:56.5.

At the Class CC boys meet last Thursday, Voorheesville placed third with 57 points. Conor Cashin led the Blackbirds with a victory in the 3,200-meter race with a time of 10:12.2, and Colin Kelly cleared 6 feet, 2 inches to win the high jump.

control over the outcome of a game as I have over the weather. I'd like to have no rainouts during Sectional playoff time in the spring, but all I can do is watch as rain wipe out a full day of baseball and softball contests.

At least, the NBA and NFL have strict rules about when sideline reporters can ask a coach or a player questions on camera during a game. It's always at halftime, just before the teams head to their locker rooms or just after they get back to the court or the field. It has to be that way. Otherwise, these sideline reporters might find themselves in personal danger, especially on a football field. Can you imagine what would happen if a sideline reporter tried to ask Bill Belichick a question during a New England Patriots game?

Reporter: "Bill, what did you think of that last play when Tom Brady threw that interception?"

Belichick: "Get that microphone out of my face before I hockey check you."

(Side note: Belichick would probably say something far more vulgar, but this is a family column. Thus, another hockey check reference.)

Frankly, I don't know why coaches put up with this. They

should tell the networks, "I'm all for telling people what I think, but not in the middle of a game. I'm trying to win, and I don't need some unathletic dweeb from journalism school asking me questions about a mistake one of my players just made. Let them try to do my job, and I'll ask them questions about a miscue. Let's see how they like it."

Sadly, coaches do have to put up with these added distractions because the networks believe sports fans really do want to know what they think seconds after something happens. But, do sports fans really want that kind of access? Aren't they more interested in the game itself than what the coaches are thinking? Remember, the average sports fan makes derogatory jokes at color commentators for their observations just because the comments are so obvious. Fan: "Duh!"

So, consider this a modest proposal to the networks. Keep your sideline reporters away from the coaches during a game, and I won't have to hockey check you. And believe me, it won't be a friendly hockey check, either.
