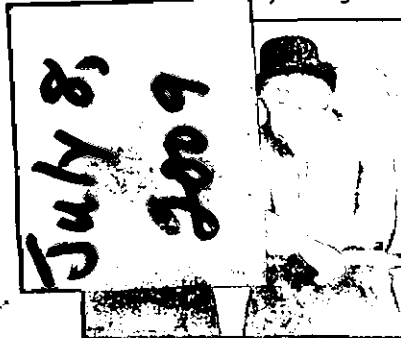

G'land playgrounds close for summer

Districtwide projects expected to run through 2010

As a result of districtwide construction projects in Guilderland, the playgrounds at Altamont and Westmere elementary schools will be off limits for the duration of the summer.

The other elementary school playgrounds will have limited access, according to the district, however, the extent of the work at Altamont and Westmere has shut them down completely.

"AES is slated to receive extensive renovations throughout the duration of the 18-month building project. For that reason, summer will be a very busy time for contractors within the building. Due to the scope of the work scheduled to take place in July and August, no one will be allowed in the building or on the school playground over the summer recess. This includes district staff members," according to an update released by the district.

In addition to work at Westmere and Altamont, districtwide improvements are expected to run through the fall of next year.

District voters approved the \$26.97 million capital project that

will include improvements for each school in the district except Farnsworth Middle School.

The project is expected to be completed by November 2010.

The tax impact of the building project is approximately 16.2 cents per \$1,000 assessed value. For district residents owning property with an assessed value of \$180,000, the average in Guilderland, the estimated tax increase is \$2.43 per month, according to the district's Web site.

The district is borrowing \$22.4 million over 15 years at an interest rate close to 4.75 percent. New York state building aid is reimbursing 60 percent of that amount. EXCEL aid will offset \$1.78 million, and the Capital Reserve Fund will contribute \$750,000. Also \$2 million will be used from the district's fund balance. Taxpayers will be responsible for the remaining \$9.4 million.

The district held a ground-breaking ceremony at Guilderland High School on Monday, June 22, to kick off the projects.

The high school is undergoing several major renovations including the relocation of the FOCUS classrooms; renovation of the technology education classrooms; infrastructure upgrades for the technology systems; masonry chimney repairs; a roof replacement; radon remediation; lighting upgrades in the new and old gyms; and construction work on the new classroom addition.

Bethlehem gets final 20/20 report

Committee of town leaders and residents tells board of future financial hardships

The report is in on Bethlehem heading into the year 2020, and although the report cites many things working in the town's favor, there is also a pending financial crisis that needs immediate attention.

The Bethlehem Town Board listened to a presentation by the co-chairs of the 20/20 Committee on Wednesday, June 24, and accepted a final draft report of 18 months worth of work by the volunteer group.

Former director of economic

development and current planning board chairman, George Leveille, gave the presentation, while former town supervisors Ken Ringler and Theresa Egan also fielded questions and gave recommendations on behalf of the committee as its co-chairs.

The committee's report focuses "primarily on our capital needs for the town," and "key values," said Leveille as he gave an outline on the report. He said the town needs to be adaptive and evolve with its needs.

"The needs of our community in 2020 will be different than in 1970 or 80 or 90," Leveille said. "What's good in 2002 might not be good in 2012."

The bad news came in the form of financial predictions.

"The town's tax base is primarily residential," he said. "The

Beth BOE begins a new year

School board jumps right in with a new bud- get, new board member

Even though graduations have just wrapped up, as of the beginning of July, the 2009-2010 school year has officially begun.

The Bethlehem Board of Education held its organizational meeting Wednesday, July 1, to welcome its newest member and vote for officers.

Elsmere Elementary's Parent Teacher Association President Charmaine Wijeyesinghe won her first three-year term on the board in May in a five-way race for two open seats. She won her seat along with long-standing board member Lynne Lenhardt, who will serve her eighth three-year term.

Bethlehem Central School District spokesman Matt Leon said the board unanimously voted for vice president James Dering to serve as the board's new president and board member Lisa Alendorph as vice president.

Dering will replace former President James Lytle, who did not seek another term this year.

Dering was elected to the board in June of 2005 and will be serving his current term until 2011. He grew up in Bethlehem and is an alumnus of the district. Dering holds a bachelor's degree in business management from Ithaca College and a law degree from Albany Law School.

He is currently the acting deputy bureau chief of the office of the state's Attorney General's Health Care Bureau. Before that, he served as a deputy general counsel of the state's Department of Health and as a partner in

Two men charged in DWI crash at Hamagrael

Police have arrested two men in connection with an alcohol-related property damage auto-accident at the Hamagrael Elementary School in Delmar.

Stephen R. Fellows, 26, of 24522 5th Ave., apartment 1, Troy, and Craig Herman, 26, of 44 Huntersfield Drive, Delmar, were both charged by Bethlehem police on June 6, on Parkwyn Drive after officers found them at the scene of the crash into the elementary school building.

Fellows was arrested for fourth-degree criminal mischief; DWI; DWAI of drugs; third-degree aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle; leaving the scene of a property damage auto-accident; third-degree criminal trespassing; and driving with an open container of alcohol.

Herman was arrested for seventh-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance; third-degree criminal trespassing; and

possession an open container of alcohol.

Bethlehem police said Fellows, with Herman as his passenger, "intentionally did strike the mailbox" at two homes on Parkwyn Drive before crashing into the brick wall of the nearby Hamagrael Elementary School.

Police discovered the two men at the school while investigating the mailbox incident and found Fellows, who verbally identified himself, on the ground outside of his car, according to the arrest report.

When asked who was driving Fellows stated, "Me," the report states, and then told officers that he "drank vodka and took some Vicodin pills."

Herman was also found outside of the vehicle, according to police, and was identified by his driver's license before an ambulance crew arrived on the scene to treat the

two men and transport them to Albany Medical Center "due to their intoxicated state."

Police said Fellows refused to submit to a chemical test twice.

Hamagrael and its surrounding neighborhood has been the scene of a rash of recent vandalism. Police were called to the area several times in late May and June, two times directly for vandalized school property, prior to this incident.

Bethlehem Superintendent Michael Tebbano said the school's maintenance staff and police have been working together to combat the issue.

Other arrests

• Ernest H. Balloni, 25, of 131 Quail St., Albany, was arrested on June 22, on New Scotland Road in Slingerlands, for aggravated DWI, driving a motor vehicle with a BAC

of 0.18 percent or greater; DWI; and operating a motor vehicle with a BAC of 0.08 percent or greater — all misdemeanors.

Bethlehem police said they received a call of a property damage auto-accident and arrived on the scene to discover Balloni with a vehicle that had a flat front tire while the vehicle was running with the keys in the ignition.

Balloni reportedly told police that he "needed help changing a flat tire and he called 911 for assistance," after driving east on New Scotland Road by himself and pulling into a nearby parking lot soon after getting the flat tire.

Officers on the scene said they could smell alcohol on Balloni's breath while interviewing him and that he displayed signs of intoxication, according to the arrest report.

Bethlehem police said Balloni

stated "he had a few beers at his friend's" and was driving home when he got the flat tire. Balloni failed three field-sobriety tests and tested positive for alcohol before being taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department for processing. After consenting to a chemical test, Balloni's BAC was found to be over double the legal limit of 0.08 percent, according to police.

Balloni's vehicle was towed and he was released on his own recognizance after being issued appearance tickets, the report states.

• Scot H. Sokolowski, 30, of 51 Van Buren Ave., Ravena, was arrested on June 21 and charged with felony fifth-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance and two misdemeanors: DWAI under the influence of drugs and second-degree aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle.

Bethlehem police said officers saw Sokolowski driving south on Route 9W without a license plate lamp and activated their emergency lights to stop him. Upon interviewing him, officers could smell burning marijuana inside the vehicle, and, when asked about the smell, Sokolowski stated, "he smoked a 'bowl' a few hours ago," according to the arrest report.

He then exited his vehicle and took a field-sobriety test, during which, officers noticed he "did show poor balance and coordination," but tested negative for alcohol, the report states. Officers discovered a small plastic bag containing what was later determined to be crack-cocaine inside of Sokolowski's vehicle, and a Colonie police K-9 unit was brought to the scene to search the vehicle for further contraband, according to police, but none were found.

Sokolowski's vehicle was towed and he was transported to Albany Medical Center where a blood specimen was voluntarily taken from him and sent to the state toxicology lab for further analysis, the report states.

Bethlehem police said Sokolowski was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan but that a complete arrest form was not filled out at the time "due to the network being down."

County furlough plan in the works

Critic says program punishes workers for poor budget oversight

Albany County Executive Mike Breslin announced Friday, June 26, a furlough program for county workers to help cut a \$20.5 million budget gap.

"This is a difficult decision, but these are dire economic times, and it is critical we take actions now to address the budget shortfall," said Breslin. "I personally will be participating, as well as my staff, and I have asked my fellow separately elected officials to participate as well."

According to a release issued by the executive's office, all departments under Breslin's direction, except the Albany County Nursing Home and Sewer District, will be closed for five days during the remainder of 2009. Workers will not be paid for those days off.

Mary Duryea, a spokeswoman for Breslin, said the furloughs will take place the following Fridays: Aug. 28, Sept. 25, Oct. 25, Nov. 25 – the day after Thanksgiving, and Thursday, Nov. 24 – the day before Christmas.

Duryea said the last two days are traditionally slow days for those providing county services.

The furloughs would be treated as normal holidays, where emergency services would still be available.

"If there is an emergency, we do have coverage," she said.

Breslin will also participate in the furlough, although Duryea said he will likely show up for work that day.

"He'll probably come into the office that day, but he won't get paid," she said.

Breslin's salary is \$118,317.

In May, the county executive announced a \$20.5 million budget gap for 2009 due to a decline in sales tax revenues and state budget cuts. This represents approximately 30 percent of the county's tax levy of \$67.9 million, according to information from the county.

Breslin has called upon other elected officials in the county, including the sheriff, comptroller and county clerk, to enact furloughs as well, but Duryea said none has expressed interest thus far.

The plan is expected to save approximately \$1.4 million.

Albany County Comptroller

Mike Conners said his department will not be participating in the furloughs, and county employees should not be penalized.

"It is unduly harsh and unfair to punish county employees with a furlough," Conners said. "This is nowhere near as difficult a challenge as we faced in 1992."

He said in a letter dated from May that poor management by the executive's office has led to an overstatement of the budget deficit.

Conners also said the comptroller's office identified \$2.3 million in revenue the county executive's office incorrectly believed it did not have.

Conners said the county should look for other ways to cut spending, and added that, in his interpretation of the County Charter, Breslin needs legislative approval to enact the furloughs in the first place.

Albany County Sheriff James Campbell said that although he is not participating in the furloughs, he has enacted a hiring freeze in order to cut costs. He has opted not to fill positions in corrections and law enforcement and is anticipating that this year, the sheriff's office will save \$500,000 by not filling the positions.

"I'm doing my share, and I've certainly stepped up to the plate," Campbell said.

He added it would be difficult to shut down his office since he must keep many of his staff on-hand due to regulations.

Albany County District Attorney David Soares also released a statement with similar sentiment.

"I commend the county executive for his boldness in addressing the fiscal challenges of our county. The furlough program, while appropriate for some departments, is unworkable for those agencies responsible for public safety. Our work is determined by our investigations and crime. We are regulated by the strict time requirements in the criminal procedure law and the discretion of principals in the New York State Office of Court Administration," Soares wrote. "Our present budget was signed into law by the County Legislature to accommodate current needs in fighting crime throughout Albany County. ... Participating in the furlough would impact on our ability to fight crime, and the proposed sweeping budget reductions would compromise our ability to service victims of crime in Albany County."

Duryea said Breslin will be bringing a proposal to the County Legislature regarding measures that would provide buyouts for county employees to help cut additional costs. The measure would give monetary incentives to employees who left county positions for any reason, not just retirement. He is also proposing an additional \$5 million in cutbacks.

G'land report card mostly A's

District looks to improve English regents scores for special needs students

In an annual report card from the state discussed at the Tuesday, June 23, school board meeting, the seven schools in the Guilderland Central School District are considered to be "in good standing," but test scores for special needs students have been identified as an area "in need of improvement."

Every school in the district was identified as in compliance with the No Child Left Behind Act, however special needs students' English regents scores were cited as an area that needs to be addressed.

Demian Singleton, assistant superintendent for instruction, said that since this is the first year the issue has been noted in the assessment, there are no sanctions, however the matter will be addressed. If the problem persists into the third or fourth year, there could be sanctions and federal funding issues.

Singleton said one measure the district will take is simply making sure the students take the exams as soon as they are eligible so they can retake portions if they fail.

"Part of it is making sure kids are taking the test as soon as they can," he said. "That was one of those things that caused a little glitch for us."

Singleton said the district's accountability measures require that all districts reach Adequate

Yearly Progress, or AYP, and all students, including those with special needs, must be proficient by 2013 or 2014.

School board member Colleen O'Connell said that although the special needs AYP is increasingly difficult, she voiced confidence in the faculty and staff in the district.

O'Connell urged district officials to not eliminate personnel based on the report.

The New York State Department of Education released its annual report card last August, featuring more than 4,000 public schools in the state.

"We are very pleased with this report card as a whole," Singleton added.

Singleton touted the district's good standing as a testament to the hard work of the faculty and staff.

"That is getting more and more difficult as the bar continues to rise," said Singleton.

Singleton and data coordinator Mary Helen Collen presented the assessment, which was from the 2006-2007 school year, at the June 23 school board meeting.

High school graduation rates were "very good" Singleton said.

He said 88 percent of the four-year cohort graduated with a regents or local diploma. Of those students, 306, or 68 percent, received an advanced designation. Of the graduating class, 95 percent are going to college, 2 percent are joining the workforce and 3 percent are

undecided.

Six percent of the cohort "completed" high school, although are not considered graduates due to IEP's or individualized education programs, and 6 percent are considered dropouts.

Singleton noted a potential change in the metric for measuring graduation rate, and said the federal government is pushing to look closer at five-year graduation rates. He also said New York state could follow suit.

According to district officials, students performed well in several areas other areas.

Singleton said the district is doing well with respect English Language Arts and math.

In grades three through five, more than 83 percent of students scored at or above the competency standard in ELA and more than 94 percent scored at or above the competency standard on mathematics assessments.

Seventh-graders jumped 6 percent from 2005-2006 in competency in math and 12 percent in ELA.

Collen said 100 percent of students were deemed proficient in a foreign language.

Another area the district is looking to improve is the data teams, designed to provide information about what groups and sub-groups need improvement.

"The dissemination of information is one area we are looking to improve," Singleton said.

Singleton said one improvement the data teams are trying to focus on is looking beyond the scores of state exams and state testing data.

Collen is slated to head up efforts to streamline the data teams and quarterback the data collection, Singleton said.

Bringing the flavors of California home

The last time I flew to California, Elliot was a newborn. Zoe was a sweet 3-year-old and Lucy was my big girl at nearly 5 years old. It's funny, but many of the trip details are fuzzy to me now. I do remember being in the Los Angeles airport after a delayed flight at 10 o'clock at night. Lucy was crying, Zoe was crying. Elliot cried his tiny newborn tears. I accepted help from strangers – anyone willing to help me – so I could push the girls in the double stroller and pull carry-on bags. With Elliot tucked into the baby carrier, I pushed my crying children through the quiet airport. Flight attendants took pity on me and carried our luggage. They left me at the rental car counter with a pat on the back, wishing me luck. It seemed like parenting – and vacations – couldn't get any worse.

And here I am now, flying back to California to visit my sister. My children sit across the aisle from me, eating airplane snacks and contentedly watching a movie. I have been free to read my food magazines and listen to my iPod, even sip a Bloody Mary. Things I just couldn't have done with three children under the age of 5.

So as we set out on this next adventure, I anticipate a very different experience from five years ago. This time around, we'll be staying in San Diego. My husband had enough vacation days so that he is able to join

us. Gramps will be with us too. He is my father and the one who plans our trips together. To my children, he is beloved. Gramps sits at the side of the pool, cheering on each jump. He buys stuffed animals to give my kids and has been known to secretly give them chocolates before breakfast. What's not to love?

So when our plane took off from Albany, I was not quite as wary as last time. Paul would be joining us in a few days. My kids are old enough to enjoy a plane ride. The ocean, pool and all the Californian food awaited. It seemed like everything was lined up just right. I was going to spend a week with the people I love most. That, and have a few new food experiences.

Californian food appeals to me because of its fresh ingredients, Mexican influences and the idea that there is always something new and trendy happening there. A list of the foods I will look for comes mostly from memories of what I ate in California in the past. Once, I sat on a warm San Diego beach with an old friend and shared a plate of fish tacos. That meal remains one of the most memorable, ever. The tacos were served beach-style: in a

cardboard box. The tortillas were fresh and hot. Inside each was a strip of crispy white fish, a layer of finely shredded cabbage slaw and a creamy lime sauce drizzled over the whole thing. Each bite was a bit of chewy tortilla, tender fish and the tang of the creamy cabbage slaw. We washed down the tacos with cold beer.

Being the person in charge of finding good places to eat on vacation, fish tacos are a priority. As is good Mexican food. Before we left, I did a lot of reading, planning and considering. It's sometimes tricky to find a restaurant that is a food experience, and at the same time works for kids, too. My dear husband found one place that was so good, there was something for everyone. Described as Mexican food with French influences, this was not your typical combo-plate Mexican food. We let our kids have a Mexican soda, a rare treat. I did what the natives were doing, and ordered the house drink, a Caipirinha. It's a Brazilian cocktail made with plenty of limes and cachaca, a Brazilian liquor. My daughters played hangman with their aunt while Elliot watched the ships come and go in the nearby harbor. The food was exactly what I wanted to eat in California: creative and fresh. Everything we had at the table was so good, from the jalapeno and pumpkin seed rolls with honey butter to the local

greens salad and my entree, grouper sauteed in olive oil and set in a bed of creamy poblano chile sauce. Steamy, homemade tortillas were folded on the side. For those who like sweet, mild white fish, it doesn't get any better than that, with just a few flavors to complement it. And we have also managed to slip in fish tacos to at least one meal each day. Did I mention that Paul's passion for fish tacos is as great as mine?

With my foodie craving indulged, I had to admit that I was feeling a pang of regret for leaving New York state during the most bountiful time of the year. Our plane took off, up over the ridiculously green fields, and even with the excitement I felt for our trip, I did feel a little longing for the vegetables I would miss while gone. Sounds crazy, I know. But I have grown very attached to our box of fruit and vegetables that is delivered each week during the harvest months. Our family belongs to a CSA (community supported agriculture farm), where we buy a share of whatever comes out of a local farm in New York. There is excitement to see what is there each week, and also satisfaction in knowing I am feeding my family locally produced, organic produce. There is also a certain challenge in trying to use up what is delivered before the next box comes. During the summer months, it can take some planning and a fair amount of determination to get all of those leafy greens and fresh vegetables into little mouths.

The season of cabbage is upon us and it will be filling up local farmer's market tables and packed into CSA boxes for weeks to come. When our next box of CSA vegetables shows up, I'll secretly pray that there is a head of cabbage nestled among the lettuce and broccoli, and then I'll call Paul, to let him know that we'll be having fish tacos for dinner.

California Style Fish Tacos

- 8 corn tortillas
- A few tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 pounds mild white fish (halibut or grouper works well)
- Marinade for fish: 2 minced cloves garlic, 2 teaspoons lime zest, 1 tablespoons chili powder, 1 teaspoons sea salt, 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 small head cabbage, finely shredded
- Juice of 1 lime
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 3 green onions, sliced
- 3 tablespoons toasted pepitas (pumpkin seeds)
- Salsa and sliced avocado, for serving

In a small bowl, combine the ingredients for the marinade. Coat the fish and marinate for an hour. Light the grill to medium low heat. Meanwhile, place a little oil in a small frying pan over medium heat. Add two tortillas at a time, stacked on top of each other. Cook for a few minutes, until the bottom is crisp. Flip tortillas over together, and cook the bottom of the second tortilla. Each tortilla will have a soft, steamed side, and a crisp outer side. Stack tortillas in aluminum foil and keep warm in a low oven. Repeat with other tortillas.

Make the slaw: Mix the cabbage with the lime juice, olive oil, onions and pepitas. Taste and add salt and pepper.

Grill the fish for 4 minutes per side, depending on the thickness. Check it often and remove as soon as it's flaky in the center. Slice into strips.

Open dialogue over open space in Bethlehem

Residents have questions about conservation and land-use plan

The main issues concerning the Town of Bethlehem's possible open-space plan appear to be outright conservation, private ownership rights, recreational opportunities, development potentials and the major sticking point: money for open space.

On Wednesday, July 1, Town Planner Jeff Lipnicky gave a presentation to a couple dozen residents on an open space protection plan that created an agriculture and farmland protection subcommittee to "address issues, needs and opportunities."

The purpose was to create a "bottom-up process" of open space protection with "a heavy dose of participation" from town residents.

Lipnicky said simply defining what open space means has been a reoccurring theme.

"This whole process of open space protection involved the voluntary participation of willing land owners," he said. The town held a meeting of "large landowners" in May of 2008, which was any town resident with seven acres or more of property. The meeting brought up many of the concerns about respect for private property and trespassing.

A draft report from the town states that open space opportunities often present

themselves as development of the town continues.

"As the Town of Bethlehem continues to grow and evolve, new development projects will continue to be undertaken, and existing development sites may also be renovated or redeveloped," it states. "As such, there is an opportunity to preserve open space resources such as wetlands, streams, and steep slopes during the development process. Cumulatively, the preservation of these various resources across several development sites can provide the benefit of preservation on a larger town-wide scale."

Senior Planner Rob Leslie said recreation and pathways, parkland, agriculture and farmlands, and natural resources have all been discussed in various meetings held in town.

Education is another theme aimed at residents, according to Leslie, as well as the money issue.

"The fiscal ramifications really need to be looked at before the Town Board makes any decisions," Leslie said.

One conclusion of the draft recommendation's report to the Citizens Advisory Committee on Conservation (CACC) is that

continued public involvement is key.

"Through the evaluation of residents' input at public meetings and conversations with the Citizens Advisory Committee on Conservation, it appears that community interest lay in

developing creative ways to preserve and finance open space," it states. "During these difficult economic times, this report has established an action plan for the Town of Bethlehem that centers on recommendations that are both fiscally responsible and achievable. By continuing to work together as a community to address these needs and opportunities, the fruit of that labor will benefit not only current Bethlehem residents, but future generations as well."

Several of those in attendance said the town needs to draft an actual plan for people to look at.

"I think ... CACC should take a stronger stand on open space development," said town Planning Board member John Smolinski, who later added that "perhaps it's the Town Board that needs more resolve."

"If it has a plan and puts it on the table for everyone to comment on," he said, "then I think everyone would benefit."

A representative from the Hudson Mohawk Land Conservancy said there is a lack of response from town police when it comes to trespassing issues. Resident Lisa Evans, who has served on several town committees including the a local waterfront revitalization plan, said there needs to be more urgency in terms of funding a plan.

"There isn't anything [in the recommendation] in terms of funding things now," she said.

Another resident, Ted Jennings, said an open space plan would only serve to help residents.

"A strong open space program ... goes a long way to increase property values in town," he said.

Resident Ken Nevarro pointed to the low turnout at the meeting, saying, "This doesn't represent the community," adding that many in attendance were committee members and "this is a game between two groups."

Linda Jasinski, who frequents Town Board meeting, said private owner rights must be considered and if people wanted open space,

they could pool their resources to purchase it.

"I'm an advocate of private land ownership," she said. "I'm so happy with government ownership. Why doesn't the town open a bank account for an open space fund?"

The town will continue accepting written comments on the open space plan until Thursday, July 9, which can be e-mailed to cacc@townofbethlehem.org, or by mail to 445 Delaware Ave., Delmar 12054

The next CACC meeting will be on Monday, July 13, at Town Hall to discuss comments from the public and to update committee's report.

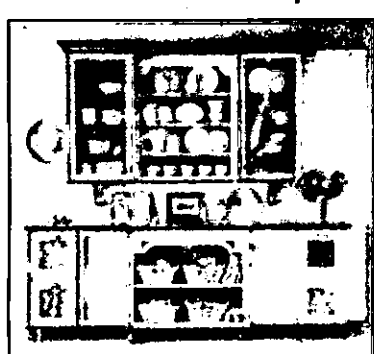

Editorial

Dan Button, a class act

Dan Button, a former member of Congress, newspaper editor, author, advocate of higher education and valued friend, has left a great legacy.

On occasion, Dan would speak of his early days in Delaware but he had ancestral roots in Vermont. Unlike an earlier Vermonter, he chose neither of the "...two roads diverged in a yellow wood." He continually cut new trails throughout his life. And, I was privileged to walk with him on one of his trails, as a colleague, for eight wonderful years.

As editorial page editor for the *Bethlehem Spotlight*, Dan would carefully edit and publish guest editorials. He liked to improve work by others to provide a quality newspaper while enhancing the author's reputation.

When I was chosen to be president of the Commission on Independent Colleges and Universities, I asked Dan to write the news release announcing my appointment and to solve a problem I faced. The organization I was to lead had no formal communication with its 115 campus presidents and their public relations and government affairs administrators. In asking for Dan's help, I said I didn't want a periodic newsletter or magazine because they often became dust collectors in busy executive offices.

On the spot, after a little thought, Dan suggested the use of a post card. I frowned. He explained. On the address side of the card, to the right would be the address, and on the left, the headline news article. The other full side of the

card would accommodate three or four concise news briefs. It was thoughtful. It was original. It was classic Dan. Thereafter, our clcu News Notes would be on the top of the mail delivery to these campus offices because of their small size, lest they be lost.

Thus began a long and wonderful friendship. Dan was back in higher education. He came to Albany in the '50s with the new chancellor of the State University of New York in the position we today call vice chancellor for external affairs.

Dan took the yellow page torture out of my life. He got the morning mail. I got the replies to sign. He wrote letters to the editors, guest editorials, articles for professional publications. My nights and weekends were my own. His word processor — either the pen or the manual typewriter — gave me this free time. Presidents' requests for quick reply via fax machines or e-mail, both an anathema to Dan, were met with calm and confidence.

Often, I would bring home to my wife, Margaret, a guest editorial or article bearing my name. She became quite upset that I got the credit for articles that Dan authored. To Margaret, this was unfair. To me, this was wonderful. Dan and my continued employment was assured with every successive article. Dan loved hearing about Margaret's reaction and he knew of my gratitude.

Dan reached out and took a great interest in those of us who followed his generation. Ken Ringler was another one of "Dan's boys." He was so proud of Ken's many accomplishments, and their shared admiration of Mayor Tom Whalen strengthened that bond. In these last few years, after I returned to Albany as president of the Higher Education Services Corporation, I would visit Dan and Rena every few months for the two C's — conversation and a cocktail. These were special times. Ken enjoyed similar visits. Dan often talked about Ken and I visiting with him together. This finally happened last December. We chatted and told our tales while Dan sat and enjoyed our company, adding, of course, his quick comments. This was my last visit with Dan. He had two of his boys together.

Rena loved throwing parties for Dan. The cover invitation

to the most recent party read — "90 in the Shade." That puzzled me until I turned the cover and saw that it was classic Dan. The invitation to his 90th birthday celebration.

It was a unique celebration. Rena, Harriet Langley and Marcia Scharfman greeted about 30 of us as we arrived for breakfast at the Normanside Country Club. We sat at a large opened square table. After breakfast, Rena, Harriet and Marcia departed, leaving 30 men alone. We were speechless. Jake Kelliher sat at my right and asked me when I last attended a bachelors party. Just men. Dan was right at home.

Then, at Dan's direction, a select few gave brief remarks and greetings. Joe Curtin and Paul Gioia were asked to sing a cappella, "A Cottage For Sale." To this day, I can't figure that one out. Neither can Joe or Paul. Why this unusual song? How did Dan know that Joe and Paul knew the words and could carry a tune? Again, this was classic Dan. Following this, Dan left and reappeared wearing a Superman shirt. We all cheered because he was indeed a Superman to all of us.

Normally, that would be a fitting close to my remarks, but I must take one most difficult step to convey how grateful Dan was for our time together. On Dan's last day in the hospital, Rena left a message on my answering machine in Vermont. "Jim, if you get this message within an hour or two, please call. Dan is in the hospital and wants to talk to you." Fortunately, I was able to return the call and talk to Dan and hear him tell me, as he did so often, how grateful he was for the opportunity to work with me at the commission. This is the ultimate act of generosity from an extraordinary caring and courageous individual.

Dan Button, I love you.

Daniel E. Button was executive editor of the Times Union in the 1960s and editorial editor of the Bethlehem Spotlight in the late 1980s and early 1990s. He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1966 and served two terms. Button was president of the National Arthritis Foundation in the early 1970s and later, editor of Science Digest magazine. In 1965, he wrote "Lindsay, A Man for Tomorrow," about Mayor John W. Lindsay of New York. Another book, about Albany politics, "Take City Hall!" was published in 2003.

Guilderland Town Supervisor Ken Runion announced Monday, June 29, a plan to mitigate flooding issues in McKownville and at Blackberry Estates on the Curry Road Extension that could include bonding \$1 million.

"Stormwater issues have arisen in McKownville due to a rising water table and inadequate infrastructure," said Runion. "In Blackberry Estates, we are still working to clearly identify the source of the problem."

He said Blackberry Estates residents have resorted to filling their basements in with concrete, due to the "thousands" of gallons of water they were pumping.

Runion said he is planning to propose retaining Delaware Engineering to begin evaluating the situation in both locations. He said that the engineering work is expected to cost about \$35,000 at Blackberry Estates and \$75,000 in McKownville. That money would be taken from

a reserve fund if approved by the town board. The work would include mapping, reporting and describing the work that needs to be done to mitigate the flooding.

After the report is complete, Runion said he is planning to propose a \$1 million bond to take long-term problem solving steps.

"Total construction costs are expected to be significantly higher, and the projects will be conducted in phases," according to a written statement from the supervisor's office.

Runion said doing the project in phases would allow the town to use municipal employees rather than contractors, saving it money.

Runion said if the town bonds the project, the initial engineering funds would be reimbursed by the bond. He said he does not have exact figures regarding a bond yet, but is expecting to have them by the Tuesday, July 7, meeting.

"We're crunching those numbers now," Runion said.

Runion said the state's drainage system in McKownville is sub-par, and if the state is

willing to commit to upgrades, the project could become larger, although the town would not be paying to upgrade the state's system.

Runion said a scaled-back plan focusing on areas behind Stuyvesant Plaza on Western Avenue extending to the Albany City line would likely cost less than \$5 million. That would be without any work done on the states' drainage system. It is unclear how much the project would cost if the state commits to upgrades. If the state does contribute to making upgrades to its system, making the overall project larger in size, the federal government might be more willing to give federal stimulus money to the project.

"There's a couple of different ways to approach it," Runion said.

He said by beginning work on the project, the town might be able to get the ball rolling for the state.

money, but wants to move forward with the project due to safety and health issues.

"Guilderland has applied for and will continue to pursue economic stimulus funds and other grants to execute these projects," Runion said in a statement. "However, in light of the uncertainties involved in obtaining funding from this source in a highly competitive environment, we are committed to moving forward with the initial steps toward resolution using local resources to protect the public safety, health and quality of life of Guilderland's residents."

Runion said basements have caved in and sinkholes have appeared in McKownville, and "ponding" and pooling water encourage mosquitoes, which bring additional health issues.

Runion emphasized the importance of not spending the initial engineering fees and then

letting the data "sit on a shelf."

"We have to move forward with work," Runion said.

He also said the constant pumping of basements is time-consuming for emergency services.

"We do stress some of our resources because of the problems down there," Runion said.

McKownville Improvement Association President Don Reeb said "it's a wonderful thing" that the town is taking steps to deal with a problem he said has gone on since at least the 1960s.

"There are a thousand homes in McKownville and a couple hundred businesses," Reeb said.

Reeb said the construction of the New York State Thruway, University at Albany and Stuyvesant Plaza, along with other hard-top structures have contributed to the problem, and over the years, the problem has become worse.

He quipped that if the stormwater issue is resolved, he will be one step closer to enjoying "murder mysteries and crossword puzzles" in his retirement.

Plan would cap emergency budgets Burbank joins board of women's center

Tedisco, Amedore introduce idea to limit contingency spending plans

Voters and officials in school districts everywhere are bound by the same rules: school districts have two chances to present a palatable budget to voters. If both are turned down, then a contingency budget calculated by a state-set formula must be used.

Voters in the Schenectady City School District had a difficult choice to make last week: a second and final budget proposal with a 5.8 percent tax levy hike, or a \$160.6 million contingency budget with a 15.8 percent tax hike.

In the end, they narrowly approved the proposed budget, but now two assemblymen are moving to close what they say is the loophole in school budget law that allowed the contingency to soar so high in the first place.

James Tedisco, R-Schenectady, and George Amedore, R-Rotterdam, introduced the School Budget Vote Fairness Act on Monday, June 22. They say it will keep voters statewide from being presented with choices like that in Schenectady.

"There's a potential for this to happen in any community, and I don't think our constituents want to be threatened by an 11 percent increase when they voted down the original budget," said Tedisco.

While a 4 percent increase cap is already written into the contingency budget formula, a provision allowing schools to adjust above that cap for

expected enrollment increases was the cause of the situation in Schenectady. The lawmakers' legislation would not allow schools to exceed the cap under such circumstances.

The district planned for a 471-student increase in the contingency budget, a number based on a study from an independent consultant. Tedisco said that number was "inflated" by 200 in order to drive up the contingency budget.

"[The Schenectady contingency budget] broke the straw over the camel's back," said Amedore. "A contingency budget should be under the initial budget."

Information provided by the state Education Department does indicate that a contingency budget is designed to be less than a budget turned down by voters. A department representative said the department has not yet received the bill text and could not comment on it.

But the district says it had little to do with figuring the contingency budget, and it simply adhered to guidelines set in state law.

"We followed the law as it stands. If they want to change the law, we'll follow that," said Superintendent Eric Ely.

Ely said that the school district has experienced an 800-student increase in enrollment over the past two years, in part because of charter school closures and fluctuating populations. While the enrollment study predicted a large enrollment increase, he maintains it was accurate.

"They look five years into the past and five years into the future using their methods, and we selected the one that was most accurate," he said.

Instead of pulling more money

from taxes to pay for more students under a contingency budget, said Ely, the district will cut costs and increase class sizes under the adopted budget.

Tedisco and Amedore maintain that the present law allows the opportunity for schools everywhere to pigeonhole voters should they choose to do so.

"What we don't need is any school board in the state of New York to threaten or to hang over the heads of the taxpayers huge tax increases if they don't vote in favor of the initial budget," said Amedore.

Amedore said that he's meeting with the Education Department to identify the specific methods to use in instating the cap.

Tedisco hinted that the bill could be a step towards larger reform like a property tax cap, which he favors. Under a tax cap, schools would be barred from proposing large year-to-year budget increases. The most typically suggested cap is 4 percent.

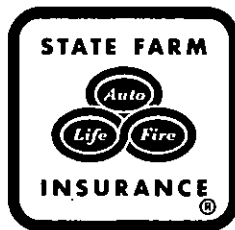

Town makes moves to leave Rapp Road landfill

As the City of Albany plans the expansion of its landfill, one of its customers is planning to bring its waste elsewhere.

Guilderland Supervisor Ken Runion said the town has entered into discussions with the Town of Colonie to use its landfill located near Boght Road in the Northeastern corner of town.

Runion said Guilderland has been searching for an alternate location to dump its trash for years, and an opportunity recently presented itself.

"We've been looking for a long period of time, and when this opportunity arose, we had to jump on it," Runion said.

He cited the recent expansion of the Rapp Road landfill, owned by the City of Albany as one of the reasons the town is looking to take its garbage elsewhere.

He said the expansion is going into lands that could potentially become Pine Bush Preserve lands.

"It's against what we're trying to achieve here," he said.

Runion said the town has looked at sites in Seneca and other western New York areas, and although they have been environmentally sound, the transportation costs were too great.

Runion said Colonie's landfill

"is run in an environmentally friendly" fashion and noted the cost of using their landfill would be close to the same as using Albany's.

The tentative four-year agreement calls for \$55 per ton on residential trash the first two years and \$56 per ton the second two years. Guilderland was paying \$52 per year to the City of Albany.

Runion said, though, construction waste that cost \$80 per ton with Albany, will cost \$60 per ton with Colonie, and that rate will remain constant for four years.

The town dumps about 1,500 tons of residential trash and 1,500 tons of construction waste each year, Runion said.

He said the costs for transportation will be more, but overall the cost of the switch would be a wash.

He met with Colonie Supervisor Paula Mahan and public works and landfill officials on Wednesday, July 1, to discuss the agreement.

The Town of Colonie has a board meeting on Thursday, July 16, and will be voting on a motion to take Guilderland as a customer.

The town of Guilderland is not required to dump a minimum amount of trash with the City of Albany, Runion said, and he is not expecting a legal battle.

"We're not obligated to submit a minimum amount of material," he said.

Town Board member Warren Redlich said he is in favor of switching over to the Town of Colonie's landfill, as he does not support dumping at Rapp Road, but voiced concerns that the agreement is a short-term solution, and noted that private haulers in Guilderland will still be using the Rapp Road landfill.

He also questioned the timing of the discussions between Guilderland and Colonie, and questioned why talks with the neighboring municipality did not begin sooner.

"How hard is it to find Colonie," he said. "It's not that far away."

Redlich also criticized Runion for voting in favor of a motion to "adopt a resolution of agreement to implement the terms of the Solid Waste Management Plan for the ANSWERS program." The program is no longer officially titled ANSWERS, which refers to the Albany New York Solid Waste Energy Recovery System.

The motion was passed 3-to-2 on May 19, with Redlich and Town Board member Mark Grimm opposing. They said voting to approve the Solid Waste Management Plan was essentially voting to expand the landfill. Runion said the move is not quid-pro quo, and the town had no viable alternative to dump their trash. He noted at that meeting that he is not in favor of a landfill expansion, and reiterated that sentiment in a Monday, July 6, interview.

Grimm said on Monday,

July 6, that he suspects the contract was hastily drawn up, as a typographical error notes the term City of Cohoes where the Town of Guilderland should be written.

Colonie Supervisor Paula Mahan said Runion approached her about potentially using Colonie's landfill and Mahan discussed the matter with town officials.

"It goes according to whether or not we have capacity available," she said.

She said the landfill has had some space since 2008, and taking Guilderland on for four years is within its capability.

The contract would begin in the last quarter of this year, and go through 2013.

Joe Stockbridge, director for the division of environmental services, said the town's permit allows up to 175,000 tons per year. Normally the town finishes with trash totals between 155,000 and 165,000 and a contract with Guilderland will leave them closer to the latter.

"Guilderland is not a very large generator compared to some of our other customers," Stockbridge said.

He added that if other municipalities are interested in discussing contracts, they should do so soon.

He said the City of Watervliet, City of Cohoes, and two private haulers have contracts expiring within one year.

He said no other contractors, private or municipal, have contacted Colonie thus far.

Mahan emphasized that running an efficient operation, within the landfills limit is a priority.

Memory of Selkirk's namesake lives on

Resident's great-great-grandfather served in the Revolutionary War, settled hamlet

Editor's note: This is the fourth article of a nine-part series of historical features on the hamlets of Bethlehem in commemoration of this year's Quadricentennial. The next upcoming feature article on the second week of August will focus on the hamlet of Cedar Hill.

Selkirk — As the Hudson Valley looks back 400 years to the European explorer who first charted its banks, the river valley itself was an integral part of another celebrated anniversary — America's War of Independence.

The Fourth of July holds even deeper meaning for one resident whose great-great-grandfather served in the Revolutionary War and settled the very hamlet he lives in today. Ron Selkirk is a direct descendant of James Selkirk, whom the southern hamlet is named after and who fought in the Battles of Saratoga.

James Selkirk was honorably discharged by Gen. George Washington after serving in the war. His descendant has an official copy of his ancestor's discharge papers encased in a glass frame at his home, which he and his wife, Judy, affectionately refer to as the "Back 40," because it sits on 40 acres of undeveloped former farmland.

"This farm when I was a kid was a hundred acres," Selkirk said of his property along Maple Avenue and River Road. "We raised chickens for eggs. They used to have very good egg routes in the city, not house to house, but the restaurants and the stores. ... At that time they had over 4,000 birds and we moved up to 7,000 when I got into the business."

Selkirk's father, Robert Selkirk, retired from the family business in 1965, and Selkirk took over, but it wasn't as profitable as it once was.

"In eight months, I made only a couple of nickels," he said about the family farmland that was eventually sold to a man from New Jersey who built a truck stop near

the new state Thruway.

Selkirk, 75, is five generations removed from James Selkirk (1756-1820), who immigrated to the Colony of New York from Scotland and served in the Second Regiment during the Revolutionary War. He participated in the war's turning point 232 years ago while fighting near Stillwater in a group of battles that eventually became known as the Battles of Saratoga.

He eventually went on to settle the area now known as Selkirk in 1786.

"He saw a lot over six years and five months," Selkirk said about his ancestor's service in the militia.

Historical records of James Selkirk's first-hand accounts from fighting in the war are on file at the Bethlehem Town Hall. They paint a picture of a brave, yet kind man, who fought for his country in several intense battles despite becoming deathly ill more than once.

He saw companions die and looked into the face of the enemy both on and off the field of battle. James Selkirk wrote extensively about the Battle of Saratoga against British Gen. John Burgoyne's army.

"We came where the battle was flying thick and fast. We made a short halt in a meadow where we were wholly exposed to the fire of the enemy. We immediately

marched on, jumped over a brush fence and commenced fire," James Selkirk wrote. "The smoke was very thick and the enemy was just before us. ... [a man] received a ball in his arm which went through his body. He turned round on his feet and fell down dead close by where I stood."

The battles raged on from Sept. 19 until Oct. 7, 1777, as Gen. Burgoyne waited for reinforcements from New York City that never arrived.

The victory was pivotal for the Colonists because it convinced France to lend solid support to the cause.

James Selkirk fought under the command of Brig. Gen. Ebenezer Learned and alongside other notable American commanders such as Col. Daniel Morgan and Gen. Benedict Arnold.

He wrote about the scene after the fighting subsided when he came upon a gravely wounded German mercenary.

"I went and spoke to a poor Hessian grenadier that was very badly wounded through the groin looking wistfully at me. [He] asked me in broken language if I had any water seeing a canteen about my neck," James Selkirk wrote. "He said he was almost faint. I told him I had some rum if he would drink some of that, I should make him welcome and he thankfully accepted my offer and drank what he pleased."

The humble graciousness of the German soldier left an impression on James Selkirk, who then wrote, "I have never seen a man so thankful as he was ... and he offered to give me his grenadiers cap for he had nothing else to give me."

James Selkirk was also witness to another historical footnote when he saw Benedict Arnold break his leg in battle.

"General Arnold was wounded through the leg and his horse shot from under him," he wrote.

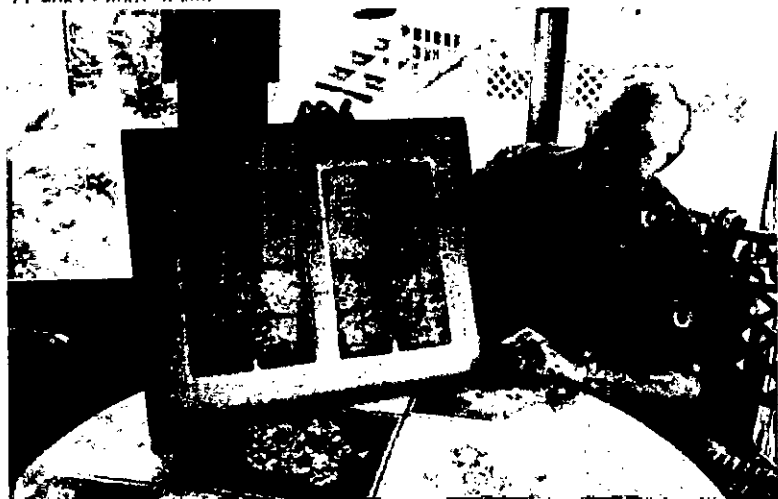

There is a monument that depicts a boot in the Saratoga National Historical Park in honor of Arnold's injury and valor in the Battles of Saratoga and other American victories. It reads, "In memory of the 'most brilliant soldier' of the Continental Army who was desperately wounded on this spot."

However, it never mentions Arnold by name as he is forever stigmatized as a traitor in the annals of American history.

On the back of Selkirk's framed discharge papers is a hand-written genealogy of sorts that listed the male line from James Selkirk down to Selkirk himself and his brother Charles Selkirk. Selkirk has added his own two sons to the list.

His uncle Russell Selkirk moved to Cobleskill to open a hardware store while his father, Robert Selkirk, ran the family farm. Russell Selkirk went on to become the supervisor of Cobleskill and eventually the state assemblyman for Schoharie County from 1959 until 1966.

The famous Selkirk Rail yards bear his family name as well and were a huge development boom for the entire area. Selkirk said he heard family stories about its construction in 1924, which cost \$25 million and was part of the Castleton Cut Off and encompassed the freight yards and the bridge over the Hudson River.

"The man came and said, 'We're gonna name it the Selkirk Rail yards,' Selkirk said. "And my grandfather said, 'Well, that'll be nice.'"

Town Board candidates gear up

Democrats, Republicans have both put forth full slates in Bethlehem

Ah, summertime.

Lazy days next to the pool, backyard barbecues, summer vacations, cocktail parties at the country club — and political campaigns?

As the rest of us try to figure out how best to spend our three-month window of summer between a slumping economy and torrential downpours, local politicians and political newcomers are knocking on doors and asking for signatures to run in the local elections.

In Bethlehem, a lively campaign for Town Hall has developed as Democrats and Republicans have both put forth full slates for the 2009 elections, with cross endorsements from minor parties all around.

In what may be a first in town history, a sitting councilman is challenging an incumbent supervisor seeking re-election. Democrat Supervisor Jack Cunningham is asking residents for another two years in office as Independence Party Councilman Sam Messina is seeking a term of his own.

Cunningham got the backing of his own party and Messina's, while Messina got the cross endorsements of the Republican, Conservative and Working Families parties.

For Town Board, there are two open seats being sought by four men. Since Messina's current term is ending and he is running for supervisor, Democratic Councilman Kyle Kotary is the only incumbent in the race.

Kotary has received the endorsement of his own party and was cross endorsed by the Independence Party and is running with Bethlehem Independence Party Chairman Mark Jordan, who is seeking his first elected office.

Jordan, along with his own party, has the cross endorsements of the Democrat, Conservative and Working Families parties.

On the other side of the aisle, two political newcomers say they, too, want a seat of their own on the Town Board.

Fred (Fernando) Di Maggio and John Flanagan are being backed by the town's GOP and Di Maggio just recently picked up a second line with the endorsement of the Albany County Conservative Party on Monday night of Kotary.

Albany County Conservative Party Chairman Richard Stack said his party had some last minute endorsements come its way and that the Bethlehem Conservative Party, led by Albany County Legislator Richard Mendick and former party chairman Bob Jasinski, recommended Di Maggio for Town Board.

"They sat down and met with him and think he's right for the job," said Stack.

Di Maggio said he sought the endorsement as soon as he decided to run.

"I was happy to get their endorsement and to have an important extra [ballot] line for my campaign," he said of the news.

All the candidates appeared to have been announced for the Town Board along with the town clerk, for which Democrat Nanci Moquin and Republican Melanie Calzone are vying, and highway superintendent, which incumbent Republican Gregg Sagendorph is seeking unopposed.

Jordan, who is Assemblyman Tim Gordon's chief of staff, lives in Slingerlands with his wife, Jeannette, and has two daughters.

"I am running because I love Bethlehem. It is the jewel of the Capital Region, offering a high quality way of life with superlative municipal amenities," said Jordan. "From

the outstanding school districts to the town parks to the hamlets with retail stores to the 10 miles of Hudson River shoreline. ... It is a tremendous place to raise a family and just an all-around fantastic place to live."

Flanagan, who is an East Greenbush teacher, lives in Selkirk with his wife, Beth, a Glenmont teacher, and their young daughter.

He said he is running because of a lack of fiscal restraint at Town Hall.

"I recently heard the supervisor say Bethlehem was unaffected by the recession," said Flanagan. "Even with the way things are, the town keeps spending and giving 4 percent raises. I'm a person of less government and a person of responsibility."

Kotary, who runs a public relations firm in Albany, lives in Delmar with his wife, Laura Jane, and has three young children in the Bethlehem School District.

He said he is running to continue what he started.

"Four years ago, I ran for Bethlehem Town Board on a promise to implement the town's first comprehensive plan, preserve more open space, build more sidewalks, support town planning, make town government more efficient and effective, improve our communications, and create more opportunities for community participation, and four years later, I'm pleased to say that we've accomplished all of those goals," said Kotary. "I'm running to finish the good work we started four years ago."

Di Maggio, a small business owner and former state Empire Zone Program director, is a longtime resident of Slingerlands, where he lives with his wife, Sheila. The couple has three grown children.

He said he was inspired to run by Messina and wants to rein in town spending.

"I'm running because I support the candidacy of Sam Messina and I wanted to be a candidate on his slate to help open up Town Hall," said Di Maggio. Pointing to the town's former GOP century-long rule, he added, "I hope I can help continue the governance of the town and bring back some fiscal restraint."

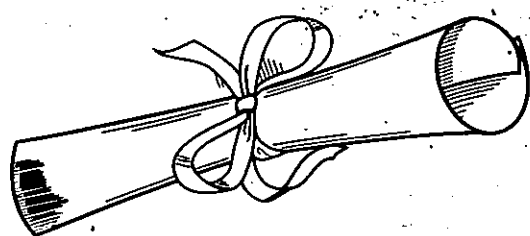

town's revenues are growing slower than its expenditures."

It is something Supervisor Jack Cunningham has mentioned frequently over the past year, as Bethlehem dips into its reserve funds to balance the budget.

Leveille put an actual date on the crisis. He said that by the 2014/15 budget the town could be spending more than it is taking in if there aren't any significant changes in economic development.

Ringler echoed this sentiment, but said by acting now, the town could lead other municipalities by example during a time of economic woe and ever-increasing state mandates and expenses.

"There's a key message here: The town is not sustainable on its current path," Ringler added. "Out of crisis sometimes comes opportunity."

He told the board, "Bethlehem should be bold; Bethlehem should take a leadership position."

Controlled economic development and "not just focusing on the big-ticket items" such as big-box stores or the Vista Technology Park as a financial solution was a sentiment put forth by the group.

Egan said now that the report is finished, the board should act on the recommendations as quickly as possible.

"Now that we've done all of this work, what do we do next?" she asked the board before offering her opinion to "take this framework ... and get going as soon as possible. The time to act is now."

Egan told the board another opinion that was shared by several other 20/20 members regarding the tough decisions that lie ahead of the town.

"We don't envy your position; it's going to be very difficult," she said, adding that the current financial crisis was "not of your own doing."

Another committee member, Steve Baboulis, took a small swipe at neighboring Colonie's financial deficit.

"I think it would be virtually impossible for this town to come up with an \$18 million deficit," he said before thanking the board. "I would like to say to thank you, especially to Jack [Cunningham] for putting this together and to Kyle Kotary and Sam Messina for attending many meetings."

The report points to many of the positives the town has to offer, too, in its vision statement.

"In the Year 2020, the Town of Bethlehem is a community of attractive residential neighborhoods, vibrant hamlets, successful mixed-use commercial centers, modern industrial facilities, and productive rural lands," the report reads. "These are well connected by regional highways and local streets, adequately serviced by public transportation, and linked by a network of sidewalks and trails."

Location and natural resources were also on top of the list.

"Situated at the heart of the Capital District, Bethlehem offers convenient access to all that the region has to offer. It is recognized for the excellence of its schools, the quality of its public safety and community services, the abundance of its recreational opportunities, the productivity of its local businesses, ten miles of Hudson River waterfront and the beauty and health of its natural environment," the report states. "This exceptional quality of life contributes to the economic growth and prosperity of the town and the region, assuring that the community can continue to meet the increasingly diverse needs and expectations of its residents in a fiscally sustainable manner."

All of the Town Board members and the supervisor thanked the 20/20 members for their work on the project.

"They all did a great job and worked very hard together on this," Cunningham said of the bipartisan group. "Now we have to start looking at our infrastructure needs and our priorities."

Open wide and say 'Awww'

Married dentists give new meaning to 'family practice'

It's a story so sweet it will give you a toothache.

Not only is Dr. Rebecca Szymczak-Evans returning to her hometown of Glenville to open up a family dentistry practice, she's opening it right next to her father's practice... along with her husband, Dr. Don Evans, whom she met their first day of school at the University of Buffalo School of Dentistry.

Rebecca said she and her husband leaned on each other throughout their residency at Ellis. Having the same educational background made it that much easier to share ideas, she said.

Don added this is particularly helpful with those late-night or early-morning emergencies. "When you have a phone call with a 10-year-old who knocked his tooth out, you can wake up the other person and say, 'What do you think?'"

Rebecca and Don were the only two students to graduate this year from Ellis Hospital's Dental Residency Program, which means that one of them was always on call. They alternated nights.

"As far as being a couple, one of us is always on call, which means that neither of us can go out to a movie and we can't go out and have a glass of wine together because one of you is always on call," Rebecca said.

Don added that there are probably some movies that have come and gone through the theaters without their knowing, but it's a career choice that they made.

"I wouldn't have traded it for anything. I think I made the right decision and it's a hurdle that we needed to jump through in order to get where we wanted to be," said Don of the past year.

Their new practice, which is set to open Aug. 25, will be in

the same building as Rebecca's father's practice in Glenville.

"We're all going to be in the same location — [my father is] going to continue practicing as he always has, and we're going to start our own practice and recruit our own patients," said Rebecca.

She said she has always known she wanted to return to the area. She went to Burnt Hills High School and has always loved the community. "Having my dad as a dentist, I was fortunate enough to have met a number of dentists in the community. It's been a wonderful experience to have known them growing up and now to interact with them on a one-on-one basis," Rebecca said.

an Albany law firm.

Dering and his wife, Cynthia, have a daughter who is a Bethlehem Elementary School student. He also coached in the Bethlehem Soccer Club for seven seasons, serves on a corporate board and is a former church trustee.

Allendorph was first elected to the board in May 2007. She has lived in Delmar since 1994 with her husband and two children, both of whom are Bethlehem High School students. She has been active in the school district since the mid 1990s, serving on the board of the Slingerlands and Elmsmere PTAs, President's Council and Citizens' Budget Group.

She volunteers as a financial secretary for her church and has served on its governing session. Allendorph previously served as treasurer and board member of the S.I.D.S. Alliance in the late 1990s.

Holding a bachelor's degree in business management from Plymouth State College (now Plymouth State University) in Plymouth, N.H., she moved to

New York after living and working in Pittsburgh and San Francisco.

Allendorph is the finance manager for Prevent Child Abuse New York, a private not-for-profit group in Albany.


The school's budget of \$87.56 million was passed in May by 2,410 votes to 1,215, or 66.8 percent of those who voted. There was also a bus proposition that was passed in May by a vote of 2,109 to 1,492, or 58.6 percent.

The new budget constitutes a \$2.8 million or 3.29 percent spending increase over last year's and offers a 2 percent tax levy increase. There will be a 1.76 percent tax rate increase.

This means an owner of a \$200,000 home in Bethlehem would see an increase of \$64 in their school taxes before any STAR benefit reductions were applied.


The owner of a similar \$200,000 home in New Scotland would see an increase of \$66 this year.

The new school year also means the beginning of a newly negotiated teacher's contract that will be in effect until 2012 and the elimination of night games for the athletic department.

Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

When people hear that Jeff Hocking is directing "Titanic: The Musical," they often have one question.

Is this the same story on which the movie was based?

No, Hocking said, this version doesn't tell of the love story between Rose and Jack, portrayed by Kate Winslet and Leonardo DiCaprio. But like its film counterpart, "Titanic: The Musical," a Tony Award-winning show, features a love story among passengers, as well as tales of folks common and famous.

So while some people may be hesitant to invest their time in a show whose ending is so well-known, Hocking stressed that "Titanic: The Musical" is a story about people, not so much a sinking ship.

"I think there's something new and different in this journey, and it's really beautiful," he said.

The journey kicks off Wednesday, July 8, when the Family Players of Northeastern New York put on the first performance of "Titanic: The Musical" at Tawasentha Park in Guilderland. The show runs through Sunday, July 12, with performances at 7:30 each night.

This is one of Family Players' biggest productions ever. The cast numbers about 70, with another few dozen people working backstage or sitting in on the orchestra. Hocking said that the show attracted people who wanted to be in "Titanic: The Musical," which is not often staged locally, as well as people who just enjoy community theater regardless of the show.

True to its name, Family Players also attracts a lot of families, he said.

Casey Kalica and her mom, Mary, for instance, are both involved with the show. Casey plays Kate McGowan, while her mom is a co-producer.

The two first worked with Family Players about 15 years ago, when a then-5-year-old Casey landed a part in "Annie." She's now a student at Hartwick College in Oneonta, but she was excited to come home to be in "Titanic."

"I like that I can be someone else," she said.

In this show, she's an Irish girl who is trying to make a better life for herself. It's one of the show's fictional roles.

In real life, Kalica credited her mom with making her a better actress.

"I love working with my mom," she said. "She always gives me hints on how to improve myself."

For her part, Mary said it's been a thrill to watch her daughter grow up on the stage.

As much fun as the pair has, though, putting on a play is hard work, especially one the size and scope of "Titanic."

Mary Kalica and co-producer Julie Phillips are in charge of securing the funding for the show, which pays for everything from the royalties to the orchestra to the elaborate sets. Kalica said one of the chief income sources for Family Players is the ads that local businesses buy.

"We have the cast solicit ads," she said. "With almost 70 people, that adds up."

Still, Hocking is quick to admit that a community production like this one can't have all the bells and whistles that the Broadway show did. For instance, the Broadway version used an 8-ton lift to tilt the stage at a 45-degree angle when the Titanic was sinking.

"We allude to the sinking," he said with a laugh.

Phillips, who described her job as "really from nuts to bolts," also oversaw the audition process with Mary Kalica. Despite having such a large cast, no one was handed a role.

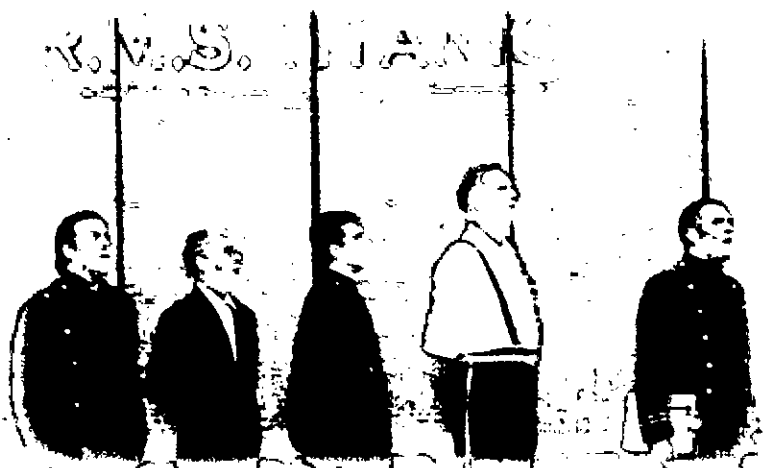
"We auditioned for everything," Phillips said. "Thankfully, a lot of people showed up."

Phillips said she has been impressed with how seriously people have taken their roles, with those who are portraying real people devoting a lot of time to researching their characters.

Keith Searles plays one of those real people: Isidor Strauss, a German immigrant who co-owned Macy's with his brother. Searles looked at old pictures of Strauss and read up on him to get a feel for the man who sings during the show that he will not take a seat on a lifeboat ahead of a younger man.

"Because it's a real character, I wanted to honor that character," said Searles, who recently visited a monument to Strauss in New York City.

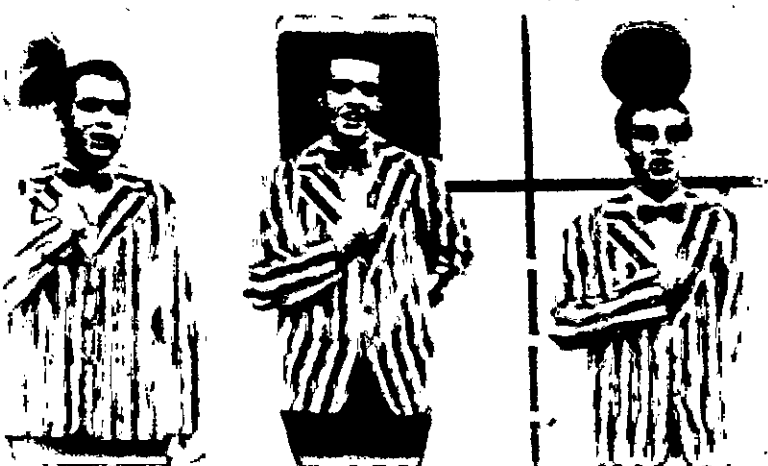
Strauss is part of the show's great love story with his wife, Ida, portrayed by Janice Walz. When

her husband doesn't want to get off the ship, Isa balks, too, even though both were first-class passengers and extended preferential treatment.

"It's touching," Searles said. "It's not a fluffy musical. It has meaty stories."

Hocking said the songs beautifully complement those stories - "The music is absolutely jaw dropping. There are songs that I can't listen to without getting choked up," he said.

"It never ceases to get me," he said.

While some characters die,

Hocking believes "Titanic: The Musical" is ultimately an uplifting story, a sentiment Phillips echoed.

"It's really about making the most of your journey," she said. "You never know what's going to happen."

Kandath and the Buzz's other free starters – Lauren Embree, the Will and Jarmere Jenkins were pressed into service once the team's regular four-person roster was in London last weekend competing in the junior law at Wimbledon.

Philadelphia was also shorthanded, as regular starters Madison Keys and Lisa Raymond were not in the lineup. Still, the Freedom had veteran professionals Nathan Healey and Travis Parrott, who between them had won six ATP doubles championships.

That didn't seem to bother Kandath and Jenkins in the opening men's doubles set.

Kandath held serve in his two games and scored several points on volleys as he and Jenkins defeated Healey and Parrott 5-3.

"I was pretty nervous going in, but I was hitting my shots and that helped me relax a bit," said Kandath.

"He made a lot of first serves," said Pedroso. "He didn't go for huge serves, but he made good decisions."

What gave Kandath some confidence was his cumulative tennis experience, which included state high school singles titles in 2007 and 2008.

"(Playing for state titles) gives you a ton of experience. Without it, you get in front of a big crowd, you don't know what to do," said Kandath.

It also helped Kandath to have a large cheering section from Gansevoort headed up by his mother, Cindy. "I was happy to see him serving so well," she said.

Kandath returned for the mixed doubles set. Teamed up with Will, Kandath again held serve and made some nice shots, including a forehand winner that landed inside the baseline while Philadelphia's team of Parrott and Surina de Beer were both close to the net. Parrott and de Beer recovered to defeat Kandath and Will 5-3 for the only set win the Freedom recorded in the match.

"Many of these guys are solid," said Kandath. "They make great decisions and put the ball in play."

Jenkins came back to edge Healey 5-4 in men's singles, and Embree easily handled Asia Muhammed 5-1 in women's

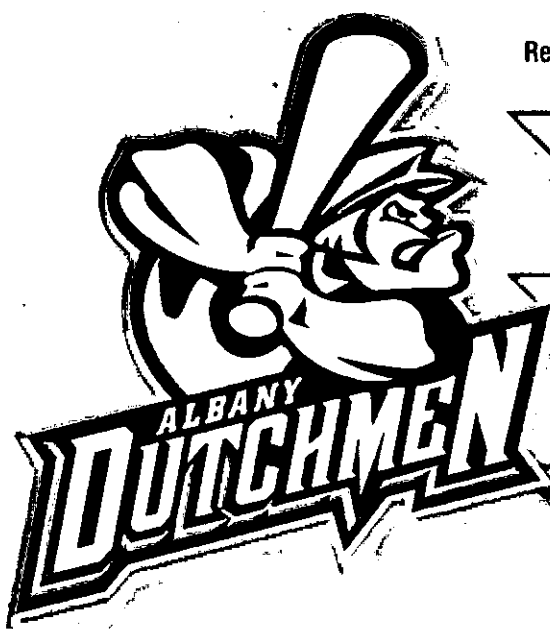
